

## County Official Favors SCC Management Courses

Choice Would Cost Less Than F.T.U.

At least one county official is leaning toward Seminole Community College for each management course to top-level county employees.

Bob Andrew, the county's education coordinator, said SCC courses will cost about 10 times less than a similar under consideration by the county officials.

If SCC instructors are chosen, the cost will be about \$10 per employee, Andrew said.

When Andrew — the director of public works — first reported on the availability of management courses, county officials leaned toward selection of the more costly FTU proposal because FTU's staff is larger and is

composed of professors who have published books. But Andrew said the county staff reevaluated its position after meeting with SCC. He said it looks as if SCC will teach about 30 county employees.

Before classes begin, however, the Board of County Commissioners must give the proposal. Andrew says he may present the matter for the commission's perusal at Tuesday's meeting.

Though some citizen criticism has risen concerning the county's paying out taxpayer money to train county employees, two county commissioners—John Kimbrough and Harry Kwiatkowski—defend the practice.

Kimbrough said keeping county employees up to date on the state of the art of management will save thousands and thousands of dollars in the future.

I would be nice, Kimbrough said, if all management

employees had all the skills necessary to do a top-notch job. But, he added, that just isn't the case — not in private industry, nor in county government.

Kimbrough also said cost management has the potential to save taxpayers a bundle. All 15 all Kimbrough said the commission would be neglecting its duty not to insure county government against poor management. If it costs money, Kimbrough says it's a small price for the benefits that will be reaped in the end.

Kwiatkowski said managerial employees need to be brought up to date, also, on the latest theories of employee relations and that state of the art which deals with labor problems.

Not to do that, Kwiatkowski maintains, could leave the county in an awkward position when it comes time to bargain with county employees. Public employees this year

for the first time have the right to form unions and bargain collectively for wages and other benefits.

Commissioner Richard Williams, who initially favored paying taxpayer money to train county employees, said he wasn't aware of any controversy concerning the issue.

Commission Chairman Michael Hattaway questioned the facts in a newspaper article which said county officials initially chose FTU courses at \$3,000, as opposed to SCC courses for about \$300.

However, Hattaway plus the county's department chiefs chose FTU over SCC at a staff meeting at the county courthouse in Sanford.

Of course the choice was merely an indication of preference — not an official action by the board.

## Sheriff Denies Promises Made

In Longwood Case

Sheriff John Polk denied today that any member of his department promised to help a Longwood mother assist in her son's arson charges dismissed against her son Saturday that Sgt. William Vinton of the Seminole County Sheriff's Department gave her "assurances" that the arson charges against her son, Charles Edward Jones, 22, of 274 Warren St., Longwood, would be dismissed. The charges stem from a firebombing at the Church Street, Longwood home of Mr. and Mrs. Linton King.

Mr. King said harassment began after neighbors reported to police that 20-30 carloads of men and women in their 20's were nightly visiting a neighbor home, leaving in the wee hours of the morning in what appeared to be "intoxicated" or "drugged" state, making an excessive amount of noise, laughing and screaming.

Mr. King said his frame home was bombarded with large chunks of concrete thereafter and his wife's culminating with the attempted firebombing on Nov. 10.

Saying they had been living in fear of their lives, the couple said in addition to the gunshot fired into their home Nov. 10, the house was again hit by gunshots 10 days ago and last week's incident was the third.

Mrs. Ora Jones, who said Saturday she and her family were the Kings' next door neighbor, claimed the city police harassed her over a period of months in a dispute with the Kings.

Mrs. Jones said she would appear before city council tonight to "laud" the police department "for doing its job."

"The police department performed their duties, they were called by Mr. and Mrs. King and they came," assistant fire marshal said, Mrs. Jones said.

## Lab Reports Delay Trial For Murder

Assistant State Atty Bill Heffernan told Circuit Court Judge Richard Muldrew today that the prosecution is having difficulty in getting laboratory reports on evidence in criminal cases and joined defense attorney Chris Ray in asking for a continuance in the first-degree murder trial of Mrs. Nancy Mrs. Black, 33, is accused of killing her husband, Billie Wayne Black, 46, with a .38 caliber pistol on Dec. 27 at the Sanford Crime Lab, in Sanford, home of her sister, Mrs. Archie McCormick.

Judge Muldrew, sitting this week for Circuit Judge J. William Woodson, continued Mrs. Black's trial until the week of March 8.

Heffernan said that the State Attorney's office hasn't been getting reports on examination of evidence by the Sanford Crime Laboratory and that State Atty. Abbott Herring's chief investigator, Jack Fulenwider, had been dispatched to the lab at the Sanford Airport "to demand reports."

Chandler Smith, acting director of the facility that went into operation last July, wasn't available to comment today on backlogs in cases in which evidence is being examined.

Sheriff John Polk, who previously supervised the lab, said there is a "big backlog" of cases being handled by the state lab and that he has been told more elements are being employed to relieve the situation.

Polk said, and a laboratory source confirmed, that the backlogs in cases in which evidence is being examined are no longer made at the Sanford facility and firearms evidence must be forwarded to the FDLE's Tallahassee laboratory.

The Sanford facility had a firearms examination section until the death in July of its firearms examiner.

"When the lab was operated by the county," Polk said, "the State Attorney got a copy of the reports. But now, under state operation, the reports go directly to the law enforcement agency submitting evidence for examination."

The sheriff said, in order to help relieve the pileup of evidence to be examined at the Sanford Crime Lab, that he has ordered all deputies to immediately notify the lab of any cases "washing out" — that won't go to trial. He said this diverted, and fired two shots from a pistol that he had intended to use to kill himself.

In other actions today, Judge Muldrew accepted a plea from Patrick John Gregg, 36, of Winter Park, to aggravated battery in connection with the Dec. 22 wounding of William Maloon at Forest City.

The court ordered Gregg committed to a state mental hospital for evaluation and ordered a pre-sentencing investigation to be delayed until Gregg is released from the hospital.

Gregg could receive a maximum sentence of 15 years in prison on the plea.

Gregg told the court he went to the home of his ex-wife at 5302 Don Mar St., Forest City, the day after they were divorced, and fired two shots from a pistol that he had intended to use to kill himself.

## Cable TV Increase Before Commission

New customers of Seminole Cablevision will have to pay \$25 instead of \$9.95 to have their sets hooked up to the service if a rate increase request is approved at tonight's meeting of the city commission, scheduled for 7 p.m. at City Hall.

According to the proposed new rates submitted to commissioners by Seminole Cablevision, the monthly service charge will increase from the present \$4.95 to \$6.95 for the first outlet.

In a memorandum to commissioners, City Manager E.S. Knowles recommended the proposed rate schedule be approved, except for a monthly fee of \$2 proposed for each additional outlet. Knowles recommends the additional outlet service charge be set at \$1.50. The charge is now \$1.00 for additional outlets.

Seminole Cablevision's formal request for the upward rate adjustment states that the company is experiencing substantial operating losses; is not a utility with a guaranteed rate of return; and points out that the company has not had an increase in rates in five years.

Other items on the city commission agenda tonight include a request by Jack Horner and Mrs. Dora Lee Russell, on behalf of the Sanford Ballet Guild, to use the Civic Center, public hearings on considering closing, vacating and abandoning alleys between 18th Street and 20th Street; and a request for time extensions on condemnations.

## Derby Conditions Good

Entrants in Sanford's 17th Annual Shad Derby can look forward to excellent fishing this year because all commercial shad nets have been removed from the St. Johns River, according to Larry Hartzog, biologist with the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission in Welaka.

The nets were used in former years to trap shad on their spawning migration to the upper reaches of the river and the fish were made into fertilizer. Hartzog stated that the fertilizer factories have found this practice to be economically unfeasible.

Shad Derby committee members will meet tonight at 7:30 at the Chamber of Commerce building to complete plans for "kick-off" day Saturday.

The Derby, sponsored by The Evening Herald and backed by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, will run through March 14.

Following the 30 day contest, the Sanford Police Benevolent Association will sponsor a barbecue at which time awards will be made to the winning contestants.

The list of prizes contributed by participating Central Florida merchants includes a six HP Johnson motor furnished by Monroe Harbour Marina, and a 12-foot Taylor fiber-glass boat mounted on a Harding galvanized tilt trailer supplied by Seminole Sporting Goods. This will go as a complete fishing outfit to the person landing the heaviest shad during the month-long tournament.

A 7½ HP Mercury motor donated by Meador's Marine will be featured as a door prize at the barbecue.

complete spinning outfits, are offered for the heaviest caught in each of two age categories, under 16 years and over 16 years of age.

Additional participating merchants have added to the prize list to include a pair of \$100.00 gift certificates, 46 gasline certificates, four \$5 gift certificates, a \$25 gift certificate, a \$10 gift certificate, 52 free oil changes, free front end alignment, \$5 certificate, Propane camp lantern, pocket camera outfit, 100 certificate, AM-FM table radio, two \$5 certificates, eight passes for pier fishing in Daytona, a diet knife, \$15 certificate, portable radio, instant camera, two certificates for \$15 and \$10, another spinning outfit, three \$5 certificates, an electronic fish finder and depth sounder, \$10 certificate, and two galvanized boat anchors.

All fishing camps on the river reported good fishing over the weekend with the percentage of roe shad running almost 75 per cent. One large one, weighing nearly six pounds, was landed by a young fisherman near Marina Isle.

## Owner Is Victor In Tax Skirmish

An Allamonte Springs man said this morning he won a skirmish with county officials after no one offered to pay \$180,000 for land on which the Seminole County tax appraiser had set an evaluation at \$214,070.

Albert Pope spoke with reporters in front of the courthouse after he said no one offered to buy his property for \$180,000 at a public auction. If someone had offered \$180,000, Pope would have been obligated to sell.

"I was a little concerned," Pope said this morning. Pope said no one offered to buy his 8½ acres on SC 406, about one mile west of 14.

Pope said last year the appraised value was set at \$28,300. But, when his tax bill arrived this year the valuation for tax purposes had been upped to \$214,070. So, he offered to sell the property at public auction for what he considered a fair price — \$180,000.

Pope's attorney, William Leffler, said today's action means that by law the new value of the property for tax purposes is \$180,000.

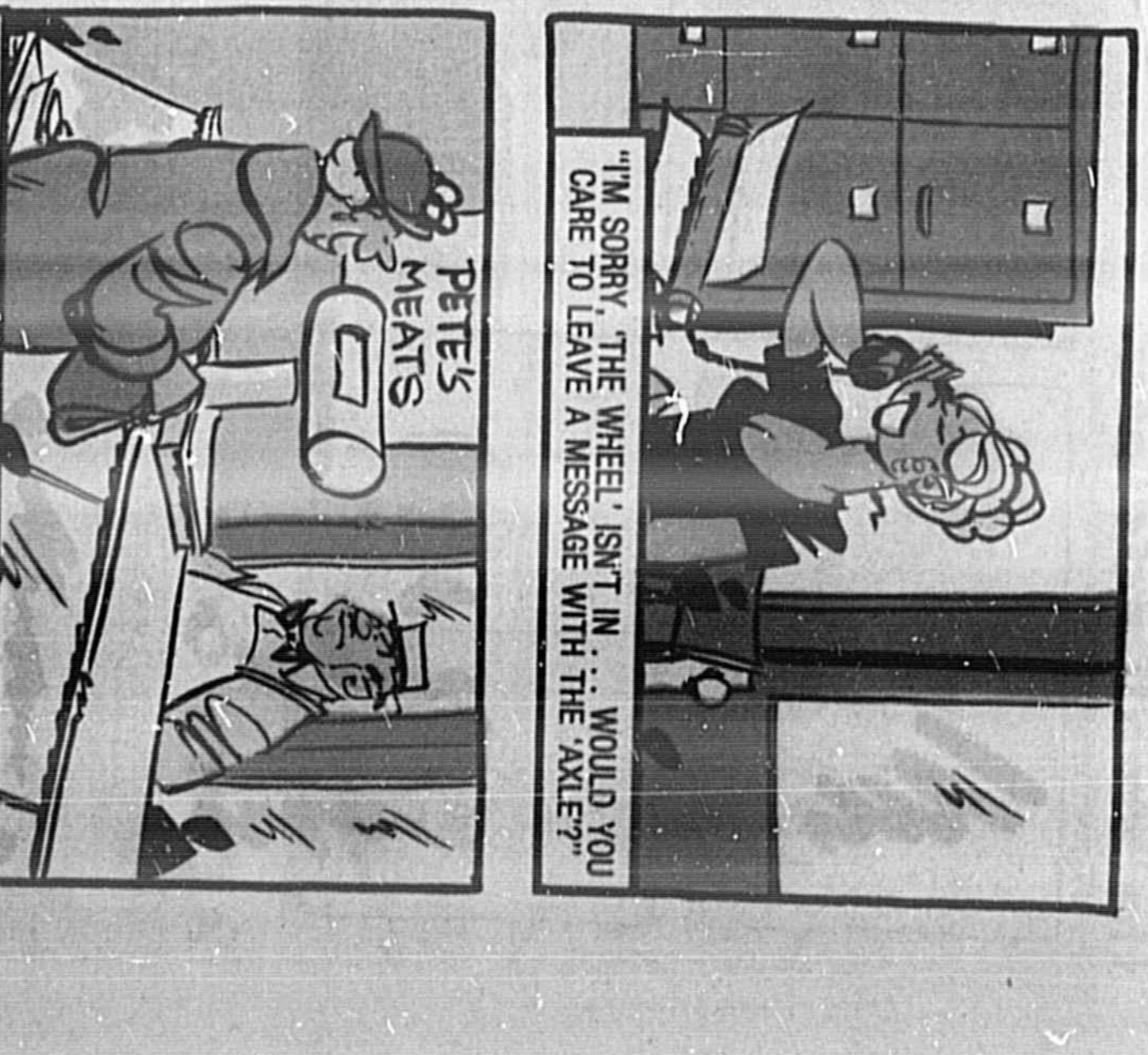
Pope said he wasn't irate or disturbed with county officials. However, he said he just wanted to insure himself that the property had been marked at a fair price.

Pope said he did not know what basis county officials used for the \$214,070 evaluation. He pointed out, however, that this year's 100 per cent evaluation did result in higher tax bills for area residents.

Both Pope and Leffler said they were satisfied with the \$180,000 evaluation.

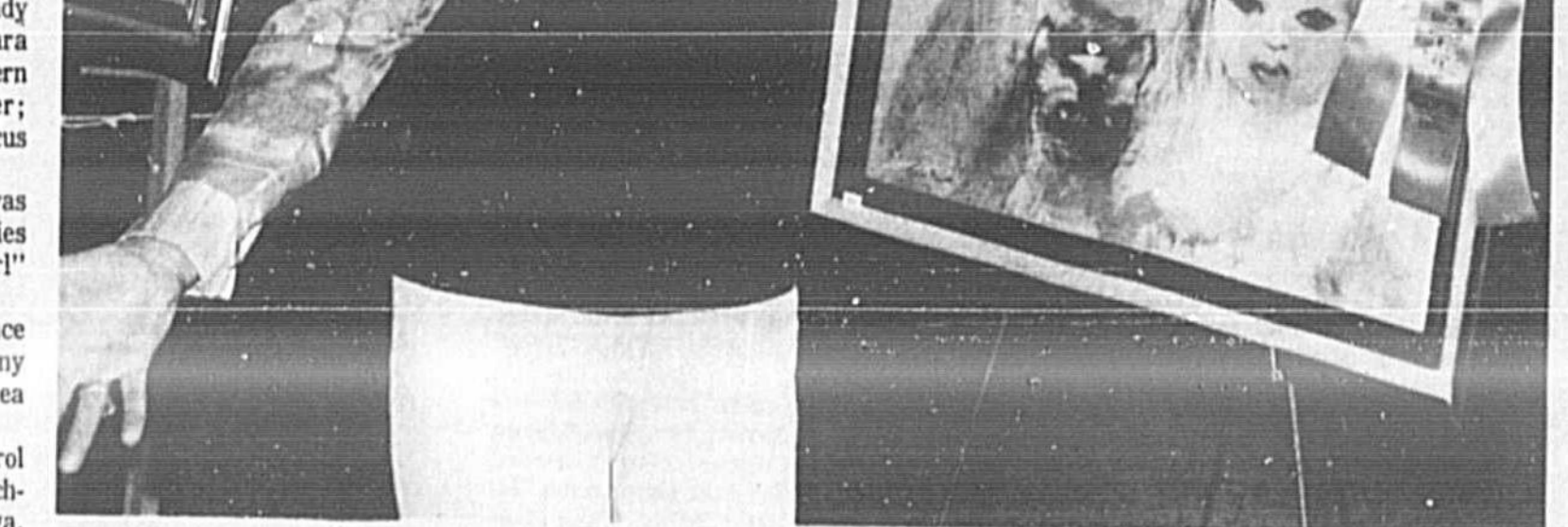
