Over Session Finally Hands Delegation Findings Conference Past Few Days

Germans To Express Views Tomorrow

Only two Points Which Dele-gates Can Object To Are Recognized By Conference

LONDON, Aug. 5. - Premier McDonald, presiding at the plen-ary session of the inter allied conference at noon today, formally handed the German delegation the proctocol embodying the program of the conference for putting the Dawes reparation plan into effect. He asked the GeGrmans to study the report and be ready to express their opinions Wednesday. According to a high American authority, there are but two points in the program to which the Germans can raise even a technical objection. One is the extension of deliveries in kind of coke, dyes and coal beyond the Versailles treaty date of 1930. The other is arbitration of the question whether financial manoeuvers are taking place in Germany to defeat ference at noon today, formally
