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Trial Seats Saved For Press By Polk

The trial of Mrs. Mabel Frances Thompson, who is accused of murdering her fireman husband, Bobby, and stuffing his body in a closet while authorities conducted a missing persons investigation, will begin next Monday, Jan. 19. The trial was changed from Oct. 20, when defense attorney, Mack Cleveland requested a continuance after state's attorney, Abbott Herring subpoenaed 15 additional witnesses. The date was set for Dec. 15, and was again postponed due to the conflict with Christmas and New Year's holidays.

Although a packed courtroom is anticipated, ample space has been provided for press coverage, according to Seminole County Sheriff, John Polk. Polk stated that 10 seats in the first two rows, looking right from the judge's bench, have been reserved for members of the fourth estate.

A venire of 227 has been summoned, and 50 witnesses have been subpoenaed by the prosecution.

Mrs. Thompson was indicted on Jan. 28, 1969, after the decomposed body of her husband was found by Sanford detectives Ralph Russell and Donald Brunley in the unoccupied Thompson home. She was arraigned on Feb. 2, 1969.

On Oct. 7 of last year, a motion was entered to control prejudicial publicity in the case, and police, sheriff's department, state's attorney, defense attorney, and courthouse officials were enjoined from comment on the case. Public records in the court clerk's office were not affected by the ruling.

Judge Thom Hamberger also ordered that photos of the defendant were not to be taken on or about the courthouse.

Project Is On Display

A scale model of the project with artist's renderings showing the \$1.3 million federal project is expected to be on display for those persons who maintain the erection of the unit to house 140 elderly citizens will become a stigma and hurt property values.

At least 60 one occupant efficiency apartments and 40 one-bedroom units for a husband and wife are slated for construction on a 4.53 acre site.

Newly renamed Redding Gardens in honor of Clarence Redding, who recently died, the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) approved the grant to cover construction costs on a site selected by the governmental group.

According to HUD sources, the present site was picked to avoid having the project located in an all white or all black neighborhood in line with latest governmental requirements.

Present location would place the facility in a "gray" or a black - white neighborhood, where the racial composition is nearly equal.

A second public hearing on another federally financed low income housing project will follow the elderly presentation.

This low rent HUD financed project is scheduled to house 150 families on 13.8 acres in the Goldsboro area between Third and Sixth Streets and Avocado and Jasmine Avenues.

Some opposition to this project has also been evident from property owners who are objecting to what they call the "low price" offered for their land.

Public hearings for federally financed housing are required by only Orange and Seminole Counties within the state and is a result of a special act passed by the two-county legislative delegation.

Also on tonight's agenda for commission action is a resolution on condemning 13 dwellings terminated in a dilapidated condition by city building officials.

A public hearing is expected to be set to bring the blighted housing under city mandate to either fix up or demolish.

At least two appointments to the Sanford Industrial Commission are also on the agenda for commission approval.

Replacements are needed for Carl Schick and Clifford McKibbin, two SIC commissioners, who have either resigned or served length of service.

New Council Chairman Seen Blow's Appointments 'Up' Tonight

A controversial and lengthy agenda is on tap for tonight's Casselberry City council meeting. The main subject will be appointments by the mayor, specifically concerning present police chief Donald Brunley who was not reappointed by Mayor Curtis Blow.

The second controversial subject could be the election of a new chairman for the five member council. Dr. Edith Duerr presently chairs the council, but it is understood from reliable news sources that a move is underway by council members to 'ask' councilman Thomas Napier as the new chairman.

It was not known at press time today if Mayor Blow would submit a tentative appointment to replace Chief Brunley. However, it appears from council reaction during the month long controversy over Brunley that a majority of the council will continue to back him (Brunley) as police head and refuse any other appointment for the post.

Another hot spot on tonight's agenda will be a move by Councilman Richard Wirz to confiscate the mayor's police band radio. Wirz said, in a planning session several weeks ago, that he felt the mayor should not have such a radio with a police wave length, but one on the city's utility channel. Blow is expected to ask the council to leave the radio the way it is.

All complaints about building flaws on the new city municipal complex are expected to be resolved tonight as the council will discuss a letter from architect Eoghan Kelley on suggested changes to be made. It is understood that Kelley spent a full morning at the building last week in an effort to study changes desired by the council and to lay-out plans to do so.

Other main agenda items tonight include swearing in the mayor and council, considering Mrs. Hilbard Casselberry's zoning request, discussing and possible approval of a beverage permit for the High Chaparral restaurant and approving bids for street paving.

Various other items are also listed.

Angel Disputes Dope Claim

Seminole County School Superintendent John Angel does not agree with published reports that at least 50 per cent of Lyman and Seminole High School students have been in contact with drugs.

Angel said personally, I am not prone to agree, that, generally speaking, high school youths in contact with drugs are a small minority.

The educator was replying to a boy's questions from The Herald over a statement made by Dr. Luis Perez, Sanford physician, during a recent Boy's Club luncheon, in which Perez was the guest speaker on narcotics.

The doctor, a former Cuban known for his fight against dope and communism, indicated at the same luncheon that over some junior high school students were buying narcotics, which were being sold along Highway 17-92 at various places by pushers who traffic in LSD and marijuana.

Angel admitted that "in a few instances drugs have been found on students at schools, but it is not rampant in any school."

The superintendent said he had recommended that school principals report to him any drug discoveries.

Angel said he did not want teachers to call parents of youths in whose possession the narcotics were found.

"The teacher should notify the principal of any incidents of drugs and we will handle it," he advised.

Asked if the school officials hold any "shakedown" of suspected drug users, the superintendent said "if a principal knew anything or suspected anything that had been reported to him, he would investigate the person under suspicion."

Angel said there are no investigations being made of lockers or personal belongings in a search for drugs.

The educator said narcotics is not a school problem, but rather a community problem.

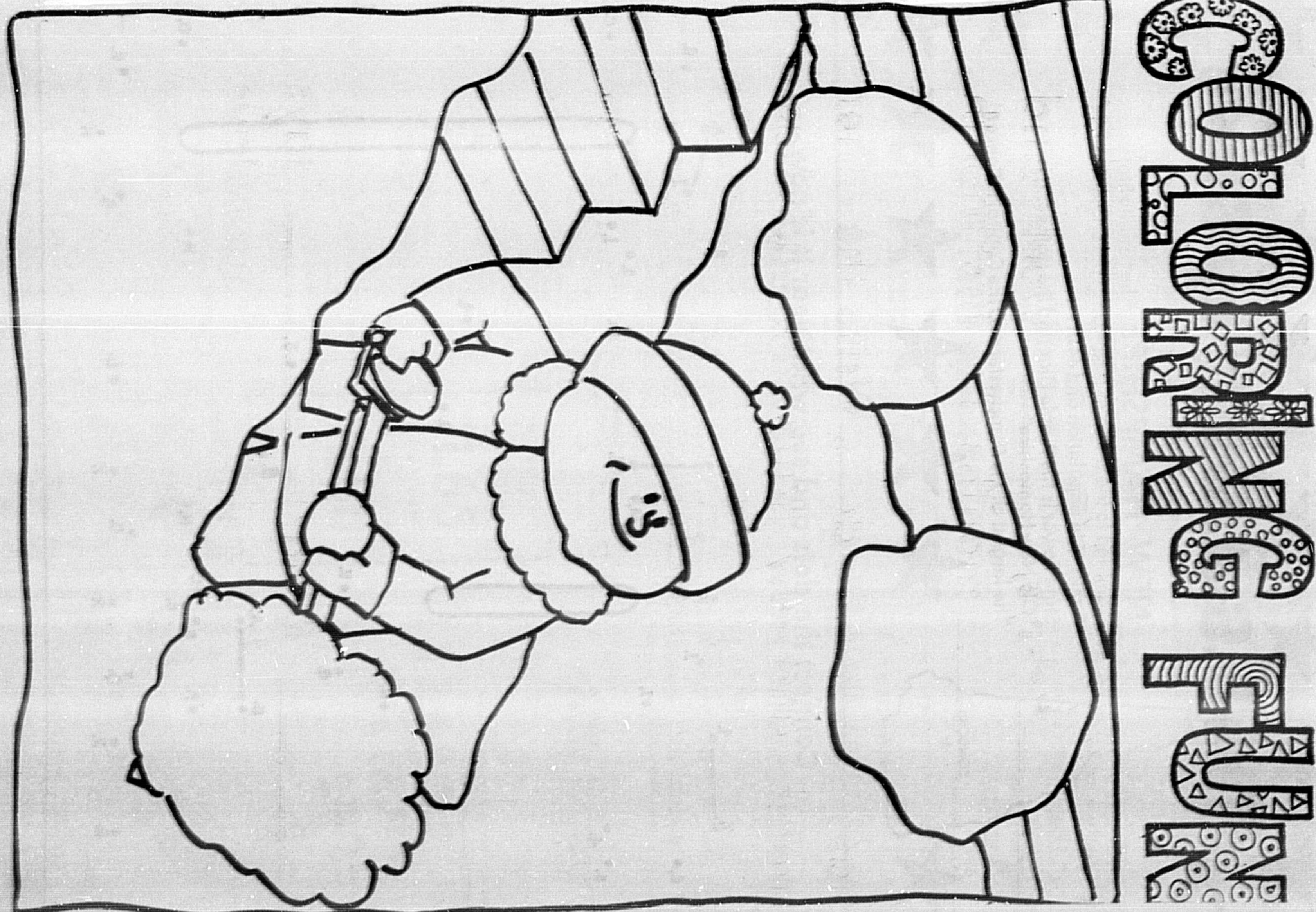

Let's Get 'Redding Gardens' Underway Now!

Immediate approval and speedy construction of the garden apartments — to be known as Redding Gardens — in Sanford for senior citizens with limited income should be welcomed by every resident interested in a much-needed upgrading.

These apartments will be built by the Sanford Housing Authority using a \$1.5 million funding by the United States Housing and Development Authority, commonly referred to as HUD.

These gentlemen, in accordance to a 1969 bill engineered by the Seminole-Orange State Legislative delegation, must hold public hearings when such projects are proposed. Seminole and Orange Counties are the only ones in the state with this proviso.

We believe that there should be no hesitation by our mayor and commissioners in approving this construction which already has an OK from HUD.

Choose-A-Month

More seriously and importantly January is National Blood Donor Month. It has been so proclaimed by President Nixon in recognition of the vital role of the volunteer blood donor in medical care.

This was asked by the American Association of Blood Banks, of which our Seminole County Blood Bank is a member, and has the endorsement of the American Medical Association, American Heart Association and many other organizations interested in a safe and adequate supply of blood in every community.

The importance of the volunteer blood donor cannot be overestimated. Surgery and therapy require more and more blood. A press association item says 30 pints were used in an effort to save the life of Jack Kerouac, the writer, who died recently in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Nearly every big hospital has a few children with leukemia and grave forms of anemia who are being kept alive by blood transfusions. The first heart transplant patient in the country received 289 pints of blood and platelet concentrates supplied by California volunteer donors at San Francisco and Burlingame community blood banks.

In all we are now using blood at the rate of 6,500,000 pints a year with 90 per cent of this coming from the volunteer unpaid donors who are being honored this month. Besides saving millions in medical costs, voluntary donation greatly reduces the hazard of infectious transmission. There is no reason for a volunteer to misrepresent his medical history.

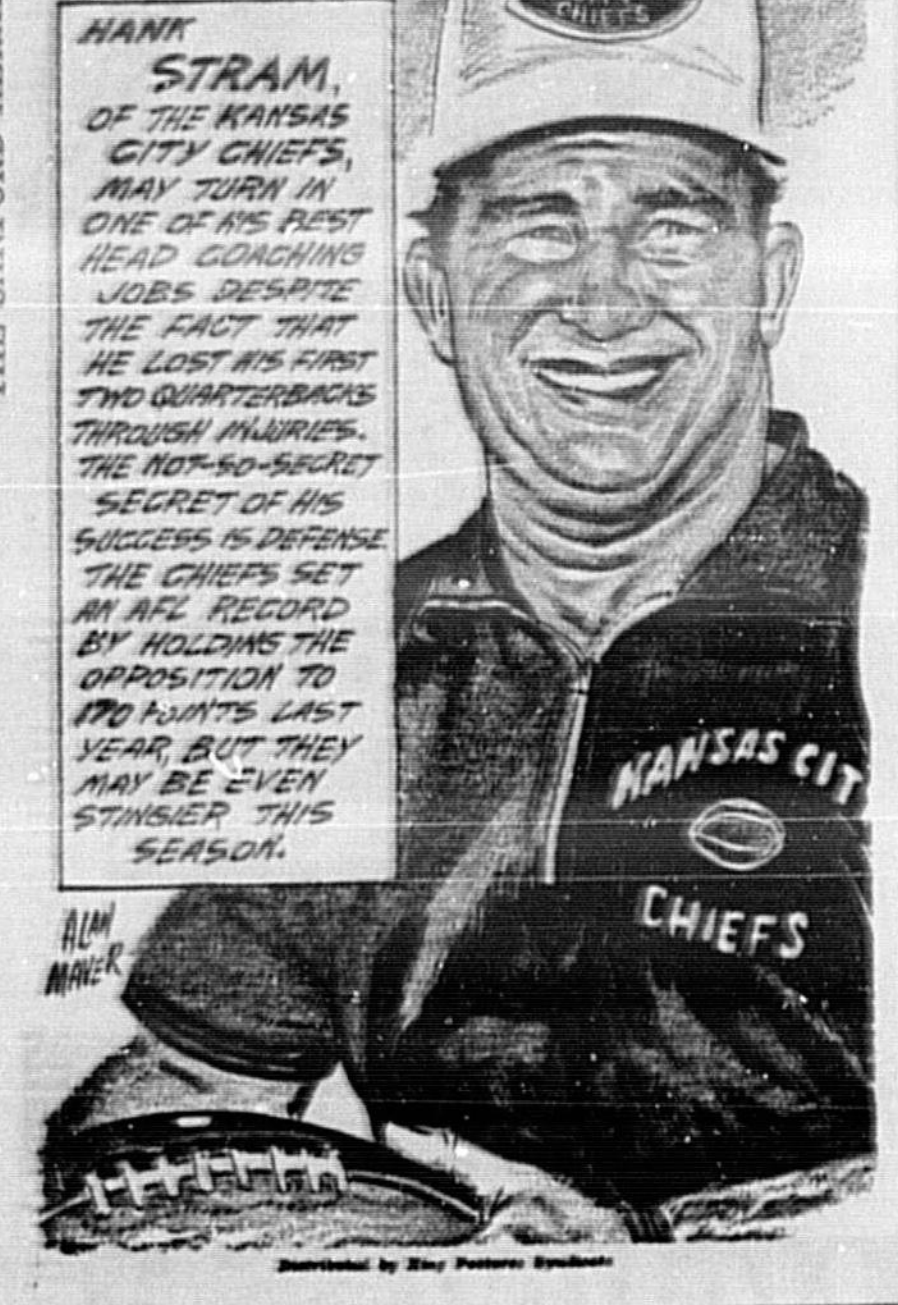

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Special Prosecutor In Thompson Trial?

With the trial of Mable Frances Thompson, Sanford woman accused of murdering her husband and hiding his body in a hall closet, just six days away, reports were rampant at the Seminole County Courthouse this morning that a "special prosecutor" would be brought in by State Attorney A. J. Herring to assist him and Thomas Spear, his Seminole County assistant, in prosecuting the case against the 25-year-old mother of four.

Herring was not in his Titusville office this morning when contacted by The Herald to comment on the report and did not discuss the report except to say that Herring would be here this afternoon and he would speak with him concerning using another prosecuting assistant in the trial scheduled to start Monday morning.

In the past, Herring has used Dan Cerna, Assistant Broward County Solicitor, in handling criminal cases in Broward County.

Spear is expected to last for at least a week and perhaps longer because of the lengthy list of persons called to testify.

By A 4-1 Vote City Approves Housing Site

By a four to one vote the Sanford City Commission last night approved the site recommended by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for construction of a 100-unit low rent housing project for the elderly.

With only Commissioner J. H. (Jimmy) Crapps opposing, the commission voted to allow construction of Redding Gardens in a 4.33 acre site located on Locust and Chapman Avenues near Fifth Street.

Despite opposition from several persons living in the affected neighborhood, the commission, on a motion by newly appointed Commissioner Gordon Meyer, approved the area for construction of the \$1.5 million complex.

Before approval, Commissioner Crapps made a general statement critical of the method by which the public hearing for the project was handled by city commissioning authority and architect.

Meyer said the commission committed itself to approving the project on July 25, when it approved the closing of certain streets for the site.

Meyer blasted the housing authority for not informing those property owners around the project site what was to be done.

"The Housing Authority stated they had already spent in excess of \$75,000 in putting the package together, and I believe it, but not one thin dime had been spent on the surrounding property owner's behalf to inform him of what you were attempting to do in his neighborhood," Meyer said.

The commissioner said the architectural firm (John A. Burton IV) brought a million-dollar view of scrambled roof tops in first drawings of the project, instead of elevation drawings and scale models.

Meyer indicated his approval of the project and seconded the McDaniel motion for approving the site.

T. B. Allen, 803 East Second Street, a property owner in the affected area, stood up and wanted to know who voted for the measure so he could keep them in mind. "Neither of you live in the area, so you will not be affected," he added.

A second public hearing approved a Goldsboro area site to construct a federally financed low-income project on 13.8 acres between Third and Sixth Streets and Avenida and Jasmine Avenue.

Jack Stamper, a property owner, opposed to go on record as opposing the project which left his house encircled.

On a motion by Meyer, the site was approved by a four-zero vote with Crapps abstaining.

"In a 'blow-by-blow' battle last night, the Casselberry city council ordered Mayor Curtis Blow to relinquish his city police utility department radio, and by doing so, the public may have learned two reasons why Blow saw fit not to reappoint city police chief Donald Brunley.

The battle erupted after councilman Richard Wirz asked that Blow turn over his city owned radio to police chief Brunley for the purpose of police stakeouts. Blow, in defending his right to have the radio said:

"I am the chief administrator of the city, and it is my duty to see that the city's radio is used for the benefit of the city at different times. Blow continued defense of his radio by stating that on October 14, around 5 a.m., he was lying awake in bed with his city radio turned on. Blow stated that he heard a police car calling the police station. There was no reply from the station according to the mayor. Blow then said, he heard another car calling the station. Still no reply. The Casselberry mayor then told the jammed council chambers that he got into his car and proceeded to the police station after trying himself unsuccessfully to raise the dispatcher.

In another instance, Blow took a second shot at the police department by describing a police stakeout he had witnessed. Blow said a city car with a city license tag, and Blow said it was a city car.

Commissioner Dan Palhan, a staunch adversary of pollution, wants the committee's appellation changed to include "pollution advisory." Chairman John Alexander advised Palhan to find the proper nomenclature to encompass the new term and report to the board at its next meeting.
