

# Riot Insurance Seen Favorably

A majority of the Sanford and Seminole County insurance men contacted by The Sanford Herald seem to favor some form of riot insurance program, like the Fair Access to Insurance Requirements program scheduled for public hearing Monday at Tallahassee.

Florida Treasurer-Insurance Commissioner Broward Williams set the hearing into the State Insurance Department's riot insurance program for property.

Most local insurance men thought the riot program was "good" as long as it stays in a re-insurance program and not involves taxes. A good example is the Federal Housing Act, which has a small premium in loans to cover home-owners who decide to return houses to government before paying off mortgage; thereby no tax money is involved.

The new "Fair Access" covers all dwellings and commercial property and insures against fire, wind, hail, explosion, riot, civil commotion, aircraft, vehicle, smoke, vandalism, malicious mischief, burglary and theft.

Commissioner Williams said the federal reinsurance program was not a giveaway or subsidy program. "This is strictly a reinsurance program," he said, "in which the federal government lends money to the insurance industry in time of catastrophe to prevent too great a financial drain on any one company."

"This loan will be repaid by the insurance industry," he said. "Essentially, the program provides for a mandatory inspection of each property before declining to insure it. That property for which insurance cannot be obtained in the normal, voluntary market will be assigned on a rating basis to one of the large companies equipped to write a wide variety of risks. That all companies in Florida that want federal reinsurance will provide insurance in proportion to the amount of premium they collected the previous year."

—And that losses in excess of relatively low levels would be paid from federal reinsurance funds set up in the law.

"Judicial Administration and Respect for the Rule of Law" was the topic of an address by Judge David L. McCain, Fourth District Court of Appeals, before the Sanford Kiwanis Club yesterday.

McCain is Republican nominee for the State Supreme Court, group 2.

The judge, citing judicial administration, explained the hierarchy of judicial opinions from trial level to appellate level to supreme court level.

McCain stated, "This system is necessary because it affords our society the means by which our law is recognized and enforced."

The judge continued, "It is necessary that judges should not try to make law that inherent changes are the function of legislation."

McCain is a 37-year-old native of Indian River County and now resides, with family that includes four daughters and a son, in Fort Pierce. He was appointed to court in August, 1967, with temporary headquarters at Vero Beach. A graduate of University of Florida in 1956, he practiced law in Fort Pierce until his appointment to court.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Third party presidential candidate George Wallace will visit Tallahassee, Daytona Beach and Orlando Friday on his last stump through Florida before the election in November.

Wallace is expected to return to Alabama for his home state election on Nov. 5.

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## Osten To Appeal P. O. Site

A delegation of Osteen residents protesting the proposed construction of a new post office on a two-block site at the corner of New Smyrna Boulevard and Florida Avenue will take the issue before the Volusia County Board of Appeals, a spokesman of the group advised The Herald today.

The denial was made at the board's August meeting after a delegation of some 50-60 residents of the area appeared to protest, objecting to what they termed "spot" zoning.

William W. Austin, owner of the development company which will lease the building to the Post Office Department, says he has "surveyed the community and selected what appears to be the best possible site," noting that it is "centrally located, near the old post office, and is situated across from another public facility, the Osteen Civic Center and Fire Hall."

There is an alternate site, however, Austin said. It also is near the existing post office, but will be used only after all avenues to build on the original site are exhausted, he added.

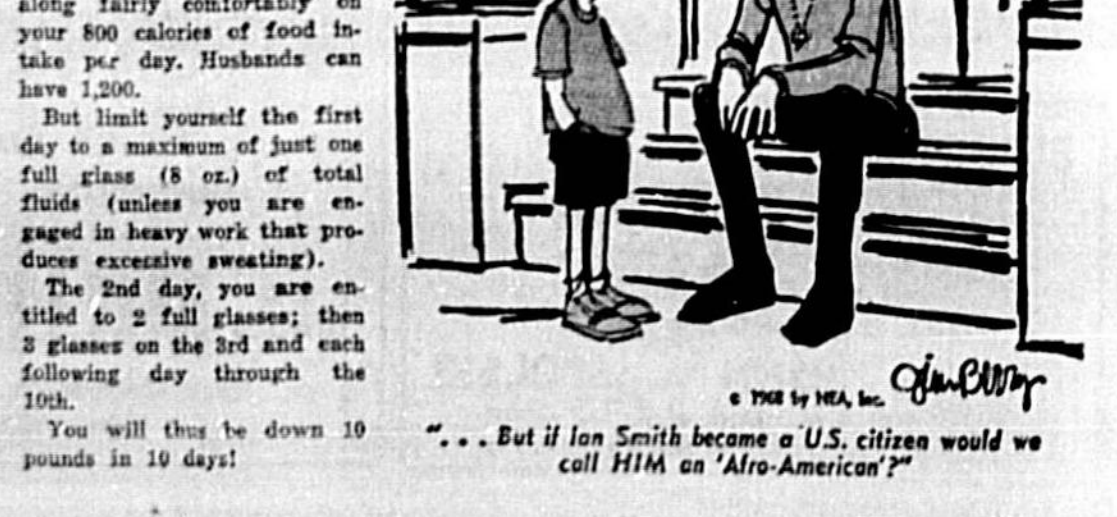

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP)—Like many other people, Earl Schenberger Jr. would like to do something about the welfare program which is costing \$150 million a year in Florida.

Unlike other people, Schenberger is in a position to do something. As the new State Welfare Board Chairman, Schenberger says, and he plans to take a lot of time away from his Jacksonville insurance business to devote to supervising the state agency's program.

But there won't be immediate, drastic changes, he said in an interview after his election Thursday.

"My job is to administer the approved programs with the money made available by the legislature and the federal government," he said. "With the amount spent in Florida, we are providing for some of the most able-bodied aged people in the country. We will have to wait and see what comes in the way of recommended changes."

Schenberger said he doesn't see that as an improvement. "I am opposed to any program that would stifle an individual's ambition," he said. "Without a study of a revenue income tax system, proposed by some as an alternative to national welfare programs, I see no way of cutting the bill."

He said he recognizes the need to take a lot of time away from his Jacksonville insurance business to devote to supervising the state agency's program.

But there won't be immediate, drastic changes, he said in an interview after his election Thursday.

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# Kidnaped Boy Found; Three Persons Held

OAK BROOK, Ill. (AP)—FBI agents recovered an 8-year-old boy who was kidnapped Wednesday from a school bus. The boy was found in a home on Chicago's South Side. The ransom was not paid, and the boy was held for three days. Three persons—two men and a woman—were arrested in connection with the kidnaping.

Two persons, variously described as two women or a man and a woman, entered him to get into the car. Schoolmates who witnessed the exchange from the nearby bus told investigators the boy rebelled at the idea of getting into the car at first.

A short time later Wednesday, Marks received the first of several telephone calls demanding \$125,000 in ransom for the boy's safe return. Investigators said the phone calls sounded as though the caller's voice was tape-recorded.

Details of how the investigation unfolded were not disclosed.

Agents theorized that the boy, who is a student at St. Ignace Elementary School in nearby Hinsdale, was held in the Maria home since his abduction Wednesday afternoon.

The Marks couple has one other child a daughter, 14.

"There was no radio contact from the pilot," said Boatman. "Communications suddenly halted when the plane veered to the left and headed for Cuba."

Boatman said authorities on Havana's Jose Marti Airport said the hijacked craft touched down at 9:45 a.m.

Boatman said the flight, EAL 595, carried 23 passengers and a crew of seven. He identified the pilot as "Slim" Habitt.

A spokesman for Eastern in San Juan said the flight departed at 8 a.m. He said the plane was taking the "Yankee Route" to Miami.

## Nixon, Wallace Raise \$\$

Senators and Democratic presidential candidates Richard M. Nixon and George Wallace raised \$3 million in contributions for his third party effort with a luncheon, dinner and rally at Montgomery, Ala., where he had a crowd of 13,900.

"We're going to show them that we represent the mainstream of thought in America," Kennedy said.

"Your actions are taking the cause of peace and democracy and putting it in jeopardy," he said.

Humphrey went from Boston to Sioux Falls, S. D., to receive the endorsement of Sen. George S. McGovern, D-S.D., a rival for the nomination and critic of the Vietnam war. The vice president moved on to Springfield, Ill., today where he renewed a challenge to Nixon for a debate, either face to face or on television.

# Allies Repulse Commies

SAIGON (AP)—Allied forces drove back two strong attacks early today by some 600 North Vietnamese northwest of Saigon, rocket-propelled grenades, machine guns and 81 mm mortar rounds.

The attackers hit the 200 American defenders with mortars, rocket-propelled grenades, machine-gun fire and small arms, but the U.S. troops—well entrenched for the night report only three men wounded.

The North Vietnamese were fired upon by the military spokesman said 12 enemy bodies were found on the battlefield, along with three bazooka-type rocket launchers.

About 10 miles west of Tay Ninh and barely a mile from the Cambodian border, about 300 North Vietnamese attacked a government outpost defended by militiamen.

Although outnumbered 2 to 1, the militiamen held out through the night with the help of helicopter gunships and five bombers. Then 150 reinforcing troops were rushed in by helicopter.

After the fighting subsided, 35 bodies were found, the spokesman said. The number of the defenders was nine militiamen killed and 28 wounded.

In the northern provinces about 15 miles south of Da Nang, two companies of U.S. Marines from the 7th Regiment were engaged in a fight with North Vietnamese. They were reinforced by three rifle companies and scrub hill country when they ran into a strong force believed to be from the 30th and 33rd North Vietnamese Regiments.

The battle lasted 12 hours, with the U.S. Marines calling in air strikes and artillery. But when it was over, the enemy report only four of the enemy dead, while Marine casualties were 11 killed and 54 wounded.

The heart came from a Baytown, Tex. man who died of a self-inflicted bullet wound, Doctors said Robert Gordon Muir, 46, died at about 8:30 p.m. Thursday, and they began the operation about one-half hour later.

Pohl's doctors said he was suffering from congestive heart failure and a severe coronary arterial occlusive condition. They reported he had undergone repeated heart attacks.

The heart transplant operation was the 15th performed at Houston.

Another Floridian, William Whaley, 32, of Fort Lauderdale was the recipient of a transplanted lung during an historic operation here Aug. 30. Both kidneys, the heart and one lung of a dead person were transplanted into four other persons during the course of that operation.

Whaley has since developed viral pneumonia in his transplanted lung.

**Helpful Hints On Bargains**

Before you rush off to the store with that bargain ad for plant material, be sure to consider these points:  
A "bargain" is only a bargain if you get something that gives enough personal satisfaction to make you feel it is worth the money needed to purchase it. Therefore, a cut-rate "special" may be a very unwise purchase for the unsuspecting buyer.  
Good bargains do exist within the retail nursery trade, but how do you know if you're not just getting a bargain? The first rule is to always buy quality. Unless the nurseryman has been quality-conscious throughout his entire operation, the plant may not be a bargain at any price.  
Plants will always cost more than their purchase price after purchasing, a homeowner must plant the tree or shrub. This involves more money for soil, fertilizer, tools, and other materials.  
Keep this in mind: If a plant fails to survive because of poor production and handling before you bought it, it is no bargain. In fact, you've lost money. The easiest way to be assured of good quality plant materials is to always deal with a local established and reputable nurseryman. To help identify a bargain the next time you are in the market for nursery stock—ask yourself the following questions:  
1. Can you recognize quality stock? It not, does the firm have a good reputation for quality?  
2. Are the plants tagged and identifiable with specific variety names?  
3. Are the sales people able and willing to offer opinions on what plants might best fill your needs in the landscaping?  
4. Do you have a varied choice of sizes, colors, and shapes from which to choose?  
5. What type of guarantee is mentioned, and is the salesman willing to discuss any inquiries you make about guarantees?

**Long View**  
**Figs Are Back For Season**  
By LOUISE LONG  
County Home Economics Agent

Florida figs are back for a two-week season to tend their staves—beginning to summer months. The purple-bronze to light-brown delicate ripens in late July to the end of August and its close rival, the bronze 'Bruno' variety, begins at the same time and stays until late fall. The Green Ischia also ripens in late July. Two larger varieties, the purple-black 'San Pons' and the violet 'Brumwick' join to make the backyard fig trees a source of good eating. Figs are among the most profitable fruits. They're hard to transport and don't store fresh for any length of time. Simple preserving methods can stretch their use for a long season. Many markets throughout the winter.  
If you have a plentiful supply but time is limited, dipping them and refrigerate them to avoid spoilage. Mix one cup sugar and three cups water; heat it to simmering temperature. Then add washed figs and simmer for 10 minutes after water returns to temperature. Drain well, cool, and refrigerate in plastic bags or containers. They'll keep about a week this way.  
Have you tried plumped figs for breakfast? Or a French Florida fruit salad? These are good ways to enjoy them while they last.  
Then for later winter treats, make old-fashioned fig jam now. To each quart of washed figs (clip stems of course), add 2 cups sugar and mix together with a potato masher. Cook slowly at low temperature to avoid scorching. Using a candy thermometer, cook until the mixture reaches 220 F. Remove from heat and pack into clean, hot jars. Top with a layer of melted paraffin.  
This jam is good as a spread on hot biscuits or toast or as a filling in a biscuit roll. Try it sometime as a surprise in muffins, or between cake layers.  
As a topping on ice cream, it goes high-class with whipped cream and chopped pecans. If desired, mix the jam with honey or blue juice for a pleasing tartness.  
Figs may also be frozen or dried for year-around treats. Ask your County Extension Home Economics agent for further information.

**Farmers Served By HUD, Too**

The new Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 isn't just for people living in cities. People living in rural areas also come under the provisions of the bill.  
Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman said recently that rural Americans will share fully in the new housing and community planning programs which the act created. It's part of the effort to remove all standards housing in the United States within ten years. This includes about 2 million substandard houses in rural areas.  
Floridians who have their share of substandard houses, might pursue the possibilities under the act by contacting local offices of the Farmers' Home Administration.  
A rural area, for purposes of the new act, includes not only the countryside, but also towns and villages with a population of less than 5,000 people. New services under the act include housing loans, interest supplements, and rental assistance for families with incomes too low to meet full amortized loan payments on individual rural housing loans.  
The interest supplement plan seeks to put adequate housing within reach of lower-income families by reducing their loan or rent payments.  
A minimum requirement is that a home-ownership borrower who doesn't have enough income to pay his loan installments in full will pay at least the interest rate that would be due if the interest rate were one percent.  
The actual amount a low-income family would have to pay would depend on its income and the size of the family.  
Here is a tentative plan which has been proposed for computing the interest supplement, and if so, how much the supplement will be:  
The applicant's scheduled annual interest and principal installment on the loan based on 5 1/2% (assumed), plus annual real estate taxes and insurance, will be added together.  
The difference, if any, between the total and 20% of the family's gross income (less a \$20 allowance for each dependent child) will be calculated. The applicant's annual installment will be determined as if the loan were made on the basis of a 1% interest rate. Then the difference between a 1% rate installment and the scheduled installment will be calculated. The interest supplement granted will be the smaller of the 2 "difference" amounts.  
For example, if a family of 8 children and an annual gross income of \$1,000 applied for a \$8,000 rural housing loan, the interest supplement should be \$225 a year, based on the interest rate assumption made above and assumed taxes of \$100 and insurance of \$40.  
The borrower would then make monthly payments, including principal and interest of about \$24.66—much less than he'd pay without the interest supplement.

 Eight homes, totaling in value more than \$255,000, were viewed by some 500 families of the public Sunday in the grand opening of the second section of Idyllwilde of Loch Arbor. The Shoemaker offerings, the "El Granada" and the "Mayfield," are a contrast in elegant living and "homey" type living. There is a formal courtyard entry, a spacious two-car garage, a "mudroom" and a laundry room.

## Swofford Belies Milliot

 County Commissioner W. Lawrence Swofford today branded the statement of Sheriff Peter Milliot which appeared in Friday's edition of The Sanford Herald "a malicious, deliberate and calculated lie."

"I am not surprised at the statements attributed to Milliot in the news article appearing in The Sanford Herald last Friday," Swofford declared. "His charges are typical. When a spotlight catches a man hiding something he attempts to make all kinds of excuses. His ridiculous accusations about me are designed to take the heat off of himself and the sheriff's department. This won't work. He blew his cool."

"The facts are a heinous crime was committed. It was apparently covered up by the sheriff's office and not made public. Milliot said the assault was made by mistake, and apparently decided to cover it up. Now this is not the way to ferret out crime and protect the citizens of Seminole County. "If we are going to have law and order, the sheriff's department must be vigorous and impartial in making arrests. Milliot should equally enforce all violations of all laws coming to his attention."

"As a public official, this matter came to my attention and I made it public. I apparently touched a nerve and got a reaction. Mr. Milliot lost his cool. This resulted in wild accusations, unfounded charges and false references to my association with outsiders in this matter. I am a malicious, deliberate and calculated liar. His reference to a conspiracy is a malicious, deliberate and calculated lie. "The fact remains that a serious crime was committed in this county. It was not brought to the attention of the public and no action was taken until I brought it out. Now the State's Attorney is attempting to get some action. Why wasn't this done previously? The State's Attorney and Mr. Milliot both know that this matter does not have to be brought before the Grand Jury and that the State's Attorney can file a direct information, himself. I am ready to appear before the grand jury at any time. Milliot should know that the deliberations of the grand jury are secret and any testimony by any person cannot be revealed except in a court of law. "Our grand jury is made up of responsible citizens in this county who will not be misled by political or ulterior motives of certain individuals. "If anyone has discredited Seminole County, it is Mr. Milliot by his failure to impartially enforce the laws. "The only interest of myself and the citizens of Seminole County is that the guilty parties be properly charged and brought before a Court of Justice." ## Thos. Warriner Expires; Salfi New Candidate?

 "Bombshell" in the acquisition of the Sanford Naval Air Base property by the City of Sanford from the federal government was dropped this morning at a meeting of the Sanford Industrial Commission by Chairman A. K. Shoemaker Jr. The chairman reported that the federal government has included in the proposed deed of the facility to the city a "reverter" clause. This clause, he explained, gives the federal government the right to reactivate the base in the event of a national emergency.

Shoemaker explained further that this clause would cause some hardship in getting financing from banks for industrialists desiring sites. It is conceivable he said, that certain firms could not receive adequate financing because of this drawback. The City of Sanford had a reverter clause in its original deed of the property to the Navy, but failed to include it in the second instrument turning the site over to the Navy in the 1960s. City Manager W. E. Knowlton revealed that any industry can be located "today" at the former Naval air station on a lease basis.

Knowlton advised the industrial commission that city has right of early entry and can, therefore, allow base occupancy on a lease basis pursuant to the final acquisition of the facility expected about Oct. 15. This is latest mentioned date for the reversion of the base to Sanford the entire base—now being referred to for industrial purposes as Sanford Air Park—since it will encompass an airport, along with property for industrial lease.

Knowlton informed the commission that appraisals of the property is one reason for the delay in receiving the facility. He said the U.S. Department of the Interior is waiting for evaluation of base land before releasing property. Industrial revenue bonds may be one approach Sanford Industrial Commission can use in setting adequate financing for industries wanting to locate at the Air Park. Revenue bond financing may be available for qualified industries if new Florida state constitution can be revised.

This will be a legislative matter and it will require some new changes in federal law now prohibits industrial revenue bond financing of over a million dollars. (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 4)

Osteen P.O. Building To Start  
 Construction on the new Osteen post office will commence "just as soon as necessary legal and paper work is completed and on record," William W. Austin, of Altamonte Springs, who has the government bid to put up the building, told The Herald today. Building permit has been issued and is posted on the two-block site at the corner of New Smyrna Boulevard and Florida Avenue across from the Civic Center and Fire Hall. Permit was issued following a ruling by zoning board attorney John Chisolin at the September meeting of the District 3 Zoning Board stating that the board has no jurisdiction of over-sites that had been termed "spot" zoning where a federal building is concerned. Request pending by Austin at the August meeting of the board for a zoning change from residential to commercial was denied at that time on basis of a protesting group that it would result in the spot zoning. At the same time, a petition bearing signatures of 167 Osteen residents was presented in favor of the proposed site. A spokesman for the protesting group Friday advised The Herald that it is their "intent" to take the matter before the Board of Appeals. However, it is Austin's opinion that ruling of the attorney is sufficient and he is "proceeding under normal circumstances" to erect the facility which will be leased to the Post Office Department for an eight-year period.

## 16 Injured At Game
