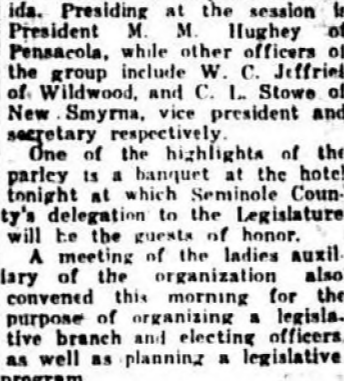

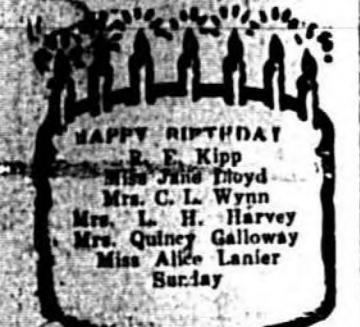

Color Blind Fliers May Prove Useful To U. S. Air Force

RANDOLPH FIELD, Tex., July 29.—An accidental discovery a few months ago that color-blind men can see through camouflage better than men with normal vision has led the army air corps to search its files here at the flight training center for the names of one-time candidates with that ailment.

What, if anything, will be done with such men in the air rearmament program remains to be determined, but the army's school of aviation medicine is re-investigating for possible future use those potential fliers who were turned down because they could not distinguish between colors.

The discovery occurred at Fort Bill, Okla., when an effort was being made to determine how many artillery guns, heavily camouflaged, could be spotted from the air.

Some 40 field pieces had been camouflaged against disclosure by normal vision.

An air corps observer with normal eyesight was able to pick out only 10 of the guns.

A color-blind observer, from the field artillery, who confessed to his ailment only after he had landed, picked out 40 of the guns.

Col. Fabian L. Pratt, commander of the school of aviation medicine, with headquarters here, said a totally different type of camouflage would have to be developed to hide guns, airplane hangers or other strategic materials from the vision of color-blind men.

Color-blindness in candidates for flight training long has barred them from entry at Randolph field, "West Point of the air," because a flier must be able to distinguish between different colored ground guides, especially at night.

It is a universal practice to mark with red and green lights the outlines of fields in night flying. Moreover, fliers must distinguish between signal flares of various colors shot from, very heights.

Butcher Negotiates Swim Of 292 Miles

CARLETONVILLE, Mo., July 29.—After being in the water for more than three days, John A. Swannick, St. Louis, has been to today set what was believed to be a long distance record by completing a non-stop swim of approximately 292 miles down the Mississippi River.

The 23-year-old swimmer reached his objective the foot of Ward Avenue here at 1:10 P. M. (CST), 89 hours and 48 minutes after entering the river at St. Louis at 7:22 P. M. last Wednesday.

Unable to walk or talk, he was helped from the water to a boat, where he rested a short time until a stretcher was improvised to carry him to a hotel.

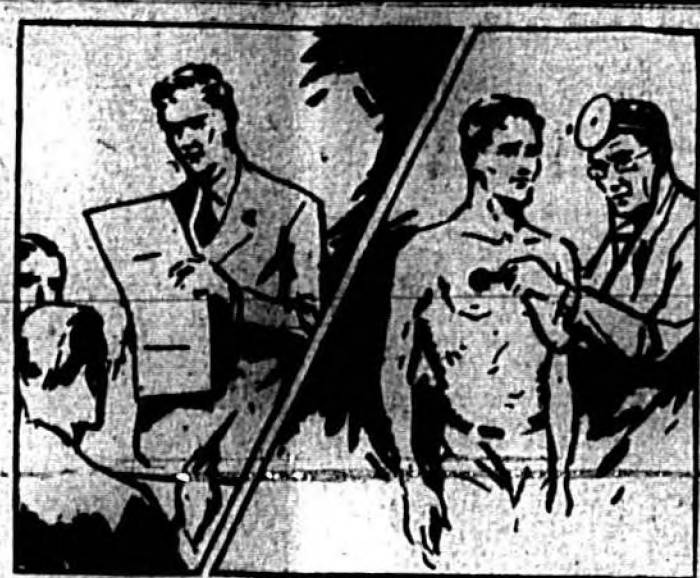
# News Of The World In Pictures



Here's how the compulsory military training will get started if the bill passes. First, all men between 21 and 24 will present themselves at designated spots for registration. Men from 18 to 21 and 21 to 24 will be registered later. Each man will fill out two yellow cards, keep one himself, give the other to the local drafting board.



Men holding the numbers drawn will go to local draft boards. All out long questionnaires, be examined for physical disabilities. Then boards will announce assignments which Congress or the President may have designated, including men with families and men whose social skills are needed in war industry or some phase of civil life.



Finally, all those left available for military service will go off to army training posts where, if they pass another physical examination, they begin training.



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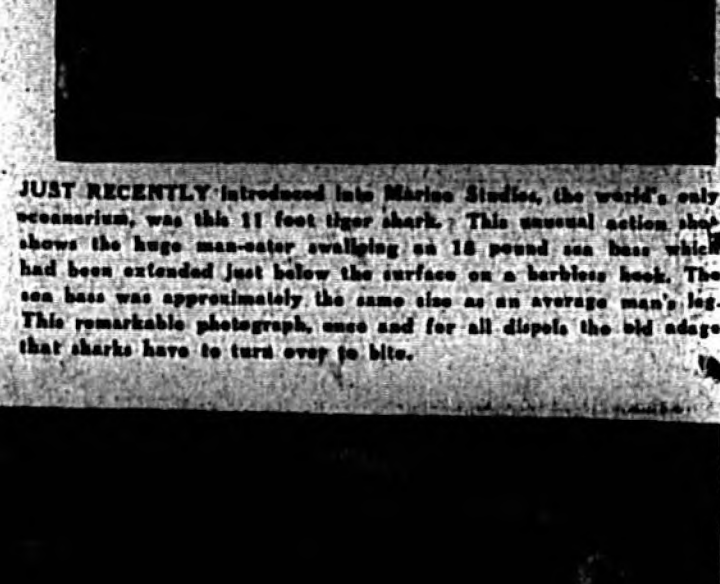

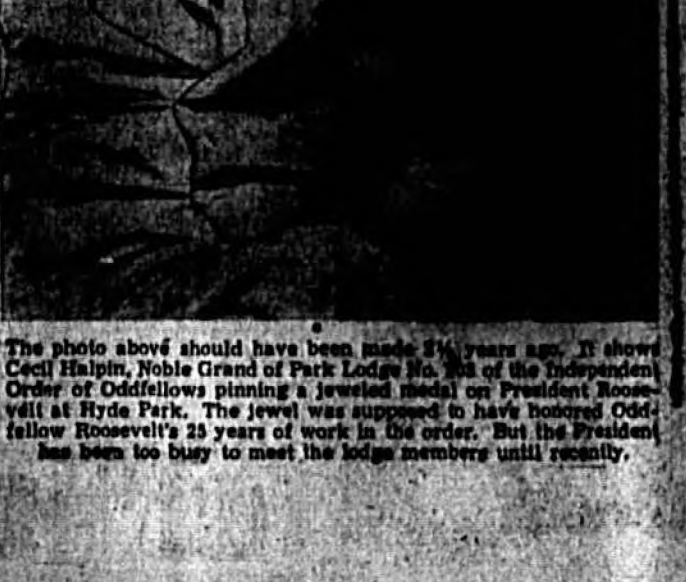
