Sheriff's office warns against check scam

FERN PARK — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office has received several complaints in reference to a check writing scam.

Auto repair stores in the Fern Park area reported that checks are being fraudulently manufactured with their company name on them and cashed.

It is possible that the bank account numbers are being obtained through contracted delivery services that are paid at the time of delivery.

Another scenario is one person distracts the business representative while another grabs a bank statement or check. The suspect usually grabs checks from the back of the book so that no immediate alarm is raised.

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office suggests that businesses insure that financial documents are kept secure.

Also be aware of payments made to contracted delivery drivers or vendors who may retain the services of day labor who have not been through background checks.

Athlete awaits SCC decision

LAKE MARY — Eighteen-year-old Beth Laurence has played ball since she was 10.

The Lake Mary pitcher signed a scholarship in February with the Seminole Community College's Raider's fast pitch softball team.

She signed with the intent to play two years, but now an upcoming decision by the college's Board of Trustees may change all of that.

On Tuesday, SCC administrators announced that because of budget crunches they would soon consider

"Do I go there for one year and then have to transfer? It makes me question everything," Laurence said in an interview Thursday.

Laurence started out playing Little League when she was 10 and then started playing 12 and under tournament ball. She has continued playing tourna-

ment ball throughout her career, thus far. She also played for two years at Lake Mary High School where she made the varsity team as a freshman, and then her last two years of high school she played for Lake Highland Prep where she graduated with a 3.8 GPA.

"I had other offers, but I've been playing with Fields since I was 10," Laurence said.

She also said that she wanted to go to school close by her family and there wasn't any other community college nearby that she could do that at.

Sanford loses blues expert

SANFORD — Henry Byrd, 80, of Sanford knew the blues.

Byrd was a retired construction worker and a blues expert. He died Friday, July 8, 2005, at Central Florida Regional Hospital of lung disease.

Byrd played with many blues legends throughout his life such as: BB King, Blind Boy Fuller, Blind Lemon Jefferson, and Lightin' Hopkins.

He used to sit under a tree talking and playing guitar and harmonica at his house off of 13th Street with 35-year-old Scott Riggan, of Sanford.

"He was mostly a harmonica player, but he also played guitar," Riggan said.

Riggan befriended Byrd three years ago when he was doing work in Byrd's neighborhood in Goldsboro.

"I would come around and help him with things. In exchange, he told me anything I wanted to know about blues," Riggan said.

SANFORD — Local law enforcement agencies are not getting desperate for recruits. The young, police-uniformed teenagers seen around town are part of the Central Florida Law Enforcement Explorer Academy.

The Academy, which began in July 2003, is a two-week school where select teens learn about law enforcement.

Officer William Willis of the Sanford Police Department helped launch the Explorer Academy because he was an Explorer as a young man.

"We're carrying on the tradition of what has worked well in the past," Willis said.

This year marks the graduation of Phase III

Explorers. These youths have been involved with the Academy since its inception three years ago.

Earlier this week, the five Phase III Explorers were out investigating a mock crime scene at The Palms Island Resort and Marina on Lake Monroe, which the Florida Department of Law Enforcement set up.

The Phase III Explorers will spend the remaining week solving the fake crime, which was a mock murder set in a hotel room at The Palms complete with a fake body, which the suspect made look like an overdose.

Phase III Explorers also will learn how to fill out police reports, make requests for arrest and search warrants, and learn the other tools that

A GLANCE AROUND OUR COUNTY

Kicked in the balls: You've got to wonder about the administration over at Seminole Community College. The revelations this week that the Board of Trustees was ready to eliminate athletics at its July 19 meeting indicates that college officials are wearing their mortar boards too tight.

The official reason for the attempted axing of the athletic department was budget constraints. But with athletics using just 1.4 percent (\$770,000) of the college's \$57 million annual budget that argument rings hollow. **Word Around The Clock** is James "The Hitman" Henningsen isn't fond of athletics in the academic world. Henningsen joined the SCC staff last year as vice president of Student Success Services/Chief Student Affairs Officer.



Admittedly athletics take on too much importance on some campuses. The University of Alabama, my alma mater, is a good example. That's not the case at SCC. The administration tried to sneak this under the radar. With the exception of upper echelon administrators, discussion with the athletic department about the proposed cuts did not take place until Monday, just one week prior to the Trustees meeting. In addition, Henningsen tried to pressure the Student Government Association into rubber stamping his vision for the college.

When word about the proposal began leaking off campus, officials at the college clammed up and the public relations department was missing in action. The most asinine reaction, however, came from the president's office where employees attempted to illegally withhold the agenda. *Herald* reporters were told on three separate occasions that because their names were not on the "approved list of recipients" they could not pick up a copy of the agenda or have one e-mailed to them without first filing a written request.

For future reference, President E. Ann McGee might want to have her staff review Chapter 119.01 of the Florida Statutes which guarantees "all state, county and municipal records shall be open for personal inspection by any person." Any person means even those not on the "approved list of recipients." McGee should also have her staff read *Dade Aviation Consultants v. Knight Ridder Inc.* (800 So. 2nd 302) where the courts ruled "There is no requirement in the Public Records Act that requests for records must be in writing."

The college does face funding issues. It's the fastest growing community college in the state, yet it is dead last when it comes to receiving state dollars. That's a problem. If E. Ann is looking for solutions, she might try whizzing a few fastballs under the heads of the bone-headed politicians in Tallahassee. I'm sure some of her school's softball and baseball pitchers would be happy to oblige.

A fitting farewell: I'm not much for funerals, but I understand Don Knight's service was one of the best in recent history.

Work obligations did not allow me to attend, however, more than a dozen people called to give me the scoop on the ceremony. Those who attended said the service was an uplifting celebration for probably the nicest man in Sanford.

Long-time Sanford resident Jerry Waller spoke during the funeral and got a little city business done at the same time. He proposed — and received a second on all his motions — that the city's name be changed to **Knightsville**, that **Lake Monroe** be renamed **Lake Knight**, and that **Orlando Sanford International Airport** be rechristened **Don Knight International Airport**. **Word Around The Clock** is that Larry Dale, president and CEO of the **Sanford Airport Authority**, seconded that last motion. The motions, of course, are not binding, but Dale did say that he will propose to the airport board that **Lake Golden Park** be renamed **Don Knight Park**.

Don will be sorely missed by all. He was one of the first people I met when I moved to Sanford, and he was always unwaveringly friendly even when we discussed issues where our views were opposing. I'm glad I got to know him.

Something's brewing: The Devine Deli closed for business June 30 because owner **Drew Fischer** is battling cancer. The deli's spot won't stay empty for long, however. **Volcano's Coffee Bar**, a Longwood-based company, is slated to open for business this fall.

In addition to taking the deli's space, Volcano's will also occupy the space recently vacated by **Blue Hen Office Furniture**. (Blue Hen, by the way, relocated to the second floor of the building which houses the **Emerald Hen Irish Pub** on the first floor. I guess the building can now be officially called "the chicken coop.")

Volcano's will roast their own coffee beans on site and the owners say they hope to open in October.

"SCC is supposed to support the community and by getting rid of athletics they are taking away chances for students in the community," she said.

Her father, Steven Laurence, said his daughter had a high school career batting average of .350. She also won writing awards at the local and state level including the Holocaust Award for the state of Florida.

"She's a good student, as well as a good softball player," her father said.

Steven Laurence said that his other daughter, Meredith, is a product of SCC and so is her husband. Meredith was the editor of SCC's college newspaper and her husband was the valedictorian. Both went on to the University of Central Florida with full academic scholarships after attending SCC.

The proud father said that SCC's athletic program is excellent.

"They have some of the best teams in the state and the country. This is a nationally recognized ball club that they're trying to axe. It's ridiculous," he said.

Currently, the Laurences are hoping they don't have to worry about where Beth will attend school in the fall.

"We haven't even talked about it. We're going to put up a big enough fight to where that won't be an

issue," Beth Laurence said. Beth's father and sister are currently calling, emailing and writing everyone they can to stop the possibility of the program's end.

"I've emailed the Board of Trustees, state senators, and local representatives," Steven Laurence said. "We're just trying to rally forces."

Steven Laurence said that 86 percent of SCC students are from Seminole and Orange counties. He said this would have a direct impact on local high schools that are trying to find their athletes' scholarships.

"A vast majority of scholarships come from local kids," he said.

As of Tuesday, the SCC's Board of Trustees, had on their July 19, agenda to consider axing the athletic program after the 2005-2006 year. By Thursday, SCC sent out a second release that said they plan to recommend to the Board that a three-month, in-depth study on athletics should be undertaken starting next week to evaluate the future of SCC athletics after the 2005-2006 school year.

"We have heard this week from supporters of SCC athletics that it is important to consider the longtime and successful impact this program has had on SCC student-athletes," James Henningsen, Vice President of Student Success said, "so

we plan to recommend to our Board that we engage in a comprehensive three-month study of our athletic programs and their impact on SCC students and our community, as well as the future of SCC athletics as we expand our college to four distinct sites in 2006-2007."

The Laurences, along with other athletic program supporters, are not buying it. Steven Laurence said that school athletics at colleges is a way for students to rally together and to support the school.

"What are you going to rally around, the debate team?" Steven Laurence said.

The recommendation for a three-month study of SCC athletics will be presented to SCC's Board of Trustees during the Tuesday, July 19 Board meeting. The meeting will be held in the SCC Board Meeting Room, A-200 on 100 Weldon Blvd. in Sanford at 7 p.m.

Wrong Way

I could write about hurricanes in this column, but I feel we've all heard plenty about them and the steps we should take to prepare for them. You should know these matters, especially since we've already had several scares this month and during June. So let's move on and I'll look in my history book to find items that happened on these next few days in history, some of which you may already know, others to refresh the memory.

On July 17, 1938, a 31-year-old unemployed airplane mechanic took off in a 1929 Curtiss Robin monoplane, from Floyd Bennett Field in Brooklyn, N.Y. He told everyone he was going to fly to Los Angeles. His plane had a compass, but no radio or special navigational equipment.

He said his compass apparently was not working properly, and 28 hours and 13 minutes later, rather than Los Angeles, to his west, he arrived at Dublin, Ireland's Baldonnell airport, to his east, 3,150 miles away from Brooklyn.

When he returned to his hometown of Galveston, Texas, Douglas Groce Corrigan was nicknamed "Wrongway Corrigan". He continued to use his compass as an excuse for the overseas flight, but had he filed a flight plan to Ireland, he would have been in violation of American and Irish flight regulations.

In his later life (he died in 1995), he admitted knowing exactly where he was going but wanted to skirt international air regulations.

Here's one for the golfers. On July 18, 1893, the first 18-hole golf course in America was incorporated in Wheaton, Ill. Charles Blair MacDonal, who became the architect of many golf courses in the following years, laid it out. Attempting to model his courses after those in Scotland and England, it was his belief that at each tee, a golfer should face a hazard at the average distance of his shot. Now we know who to blame, other than ourselves, when we see our ball land in a sand trap or man-made lake.

We've just had our July 4th Celebration in honor of the Declaration of Independence. But have you ever heard of the Declaration of Sentiments? I'll tell you.

On July 19, 1848, a convention concerning women's rights was held in Seneca Falls, N.Y. It was called by Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Stanton. The convention drafted a "Declaration of Sentiments". Its words paraphrased the Declaration of Independence, but addressing men rather than King George. It called for women's "immediate admission to all the rights and privileges which belong to them as citizens of the United States." This convention was the beginning of an organized women's rights movement in the United States. The most controversial issue at the meeting was Stanton's demand for women's right to vote. A woman's right to vote measure was introduced to Congress 30 years later, on Jan. 10, 1878, but was not approved until Aug. 26, 1920, 42 years later.

Finally, let's read 'em the Riot Act. That's an old axiom. It started on July 20, 1715 in 18th Century England. King George had decreed, if 12 or more persons were unlawfully assembled causing a disturbance of the public peace, an authority was required, (town crier or official), "with a loud voice" to command silence and read the riot act proclamation. (Thus reading them the riot act). After the act was read aloud, "the crowd must disperse immediately, and depart to their habitations, or to their lawful businesses, or they would, within one hour, be seized, apprehended and carried before a justice of the peace."

Bush decision would be easier if Rehnquist resigned

If President Bush has to find a Supreme Court nominee who will appease the religious right on the one hand and be confirmed by a majority of the Senate without a filibuster on the other, he's sunk.

There is no such person. Even the most obscure, Janus-faced among the possible court appointees could not thread that particular needle.

Thus, in the seminal event of his second term, the president would be doomed to failure and, due to the massive attention the battle will draw, to premature lame-duck status. The divisions that such a fight will kindle will rip the country's fragile political consensus apart, drive women into the arms of the Democratic Party for decades and destroy the Bush second term.

But if Bush has three jobs to give away — two seats on the court and one as chief justice —

he can find a way to cut the Gordian knot. It's all up to Chief Justice William Rehnquist.

If Bush has to name a strong pro-lifer to hold his right-wing base intact — and has no offsetting appointment with which to balance it — he will widen the gender gap and virtually assure Hillary Clinton's election in 2008. The effect of a bruising battle where Bush lines up behind a pro-lifer will be the same on the single-female vote as Barry Goldwater's opposition to the 1964 Civil Rights Act was to black voters. A swing constituency became Democratic for life because Barry was one of only six Republican senators to vote against the bill.

But if Bush names a Souter, O'Connor or Stevens (all appointed by Republicans) to the court — and has no offsets — he will drive the base into rebellion and possibly fracture the Republican Party just when it appears on the verge of a permanent consolidation of its national strength.

The political consensus of

this nation is divided, and that division can only be mirrored on the court if Bush has multiple seats to distribute.

To force this president, who barely mentioned abortion in either the campaigns of 2000 or of 2004, to make a choice as draconian as which one justice to put on the court is to invite a disaster.

If Rehnquist were not old and if he were not sick, the self-sacrifice of resignation would be unthinkable to ask. But let him stop kidding himself. He is too sick to sit on the Supreme Court and should resign. He can't participate in court sessions and only is able to vote through his clerks.

Recognizing reality is the ultimate repayment that I think he owes the political party that gave him the opportunity to sit on the high court as its chief justice in the first place. Even more, it is the obligation he owes the nation not to split it apart and enfeeble its president by forcing a litmus-test decision upon him.

With multiple choices for the court, Bush can appease the

center and the right and, at the same time, make further inroads into the pivotal Hispanic vote by naming at least one Hispanic justice. But if Bush is forced to choose and comes down on the right-wing side of the dilemma, as he probably would, he will empower the feminists in the Democratic Party just as Clinton warmed up for her presidential run.

If Rehnquist does not want the honor of raising his right hand to swear in Clinton as the 44th president of the United States, he should step aside now and give Bush a chance to find his way out of this political quandary with his presidency and party intact.

Oviedo middle school first of new models

OVIEDO — Lawton Chiles Middle School is the first in a series of prototypes for new middle schools in Seminole County.

The student capacity for the new middle school is 1,450 students. Chiles Middle currently has approximately 1,420 students enrolled. The facility will open Monday, Aug. 1, at 9:20 a.m.

Six grade schedule pick-up and classroom visitation is scheduled for Wednesday, July 27, from noon to 3 p.m. Seventh grade is Thursday, July 28, from 9 a.m. to noon. Eighth grade will be Friday, July 29, from 9 a.m. to noon.

The school features three two-story grade level centers,

and each grade level center will be a self-sufficient entity. Essentially, the administrative, guidance and media functions will be decentralized into the grade level centers. Each academic building will have its own grade level administrator, guidance counselor, and secretary. There will also be a research center in each building with 32 computers and work stations. Grade level appropriate reading materials will also be located in each of the research centers.

The gymnasium features a wood floor and bleachers on each side. Adjacent to the gymnasium is a black box theater designed to accommodate up to 300 people. The black box the-

ater will be a facility for plays and chorus performances.

The cafeteria is V-shaped, with two separate dining areas for students. There is also a covered outside dining area.

What was traditionally the main office will be referred to as the welcome center. Located in the welcome center will be a receptionist, the principal, the principal's secretary, a guidance secretary, a bookkeeper, and a clinic assistant.

This facility encircles a courtyard appointed with elevated planters with benches on which students may sit. There is also a well-landscaped amphitheater for student performances. For more information, call 407-871-7050.

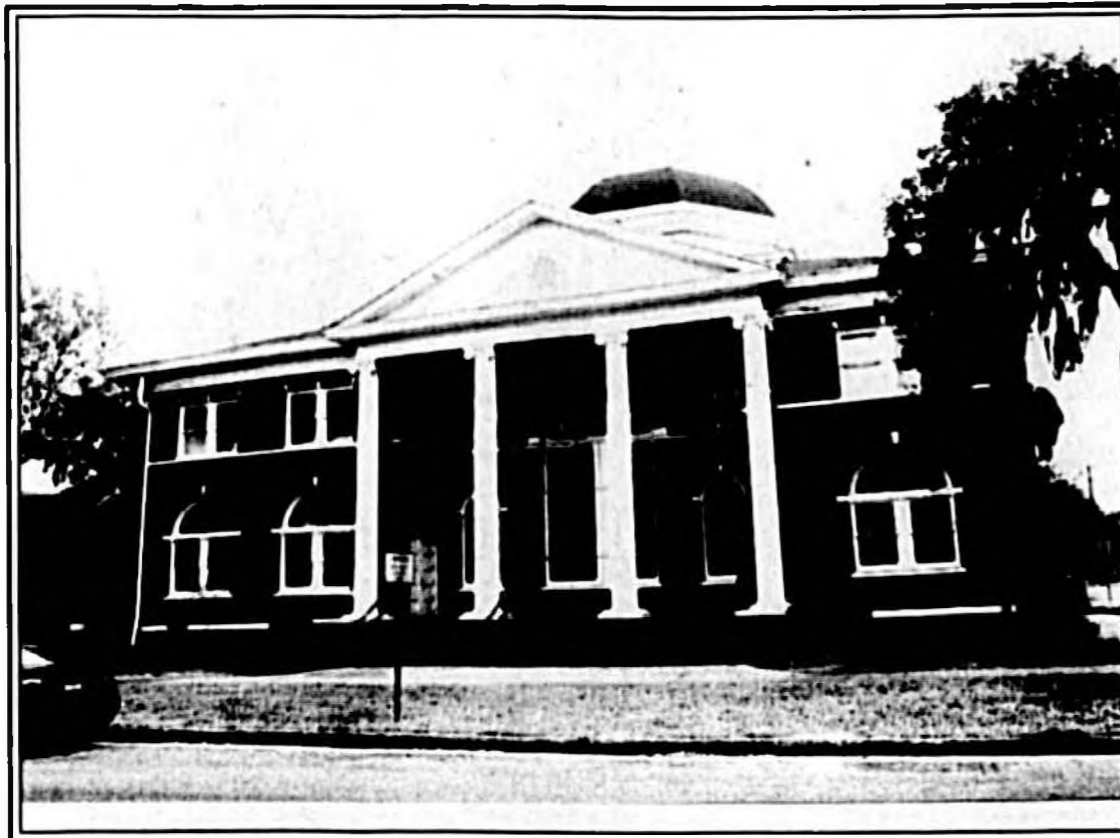

The Way We Were:

Wedding marks 1972

The following was edited from the Sunday, Dec. 17, 1972, edition of *The Sanford Herald*.

Susan Stein, Dr. H.A. Marblestone Married
There was a lengthy account of the Stein-Marblestone wedding. Here is a condensed version.

Miss Susan Stein, daughter of Mrs. Fred Stein and the late Fred Stein, and Dr. Howard A. Marblestone, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ike Marblestone, San Antonio, Texas, were united in Holy Matrimony, Nov. 26, 1972, at noon in the Temple of Liberal Judaism, Orlando.

Officiating were Rabbi Larry Halpern, Orlando, and Rabbi Sidney Guthman, Long Beach, California.

The bride, dressed in a beautifully described traditional gown, was given in marriage by her brother, Charles Stein.

The only bridesmaid from this area was Betty Kellett Ziegler. Ushers from the Sanford area were Stephen Gordie and Steven Stein, twin brothers of the bride.

Following the ceremony, a reception was held at the Howard Johnson Convention Center with approximately 200 guests attending. Delicious hors d'oeuvres, champagne and punch were served on the patio followed by a buffet lunch.

The couple left for a wedding trip to the Virgin Islands and their future home would be in Houston, Texas.

The bride was a kindergarten teacher and the groom had his own dental practice.

(I taught all three Stein children — Charles, Susan and Steve. Charles is a gynecologist in Ormond Beach, Susan is happily married in Houston and I believe that Steve is still in this area, but I can't recall what his occupation is. I see them occasionally at class reunions, SHS 1965 and 1966).

Mrs. Everett Dirksen Keeps Busy

Many of you may recall that Senator Everett Dirksen (R-Ill) and his wife Louella built a winter home in DeBary in 1962 and retired there a few years later. They created quite a lot of press during that period.

In this 1972 Herald there is a lengthy account of an interview with Mrs. Louella Dirksen which I will condense. Senator Dirksen died in 1969.

Louella and Everett had met in Pekin, Ill., on July 2, 1924. They were cast in a play as a prince and princess. They were married Dec. 24, 1927 and their daughter, Janice Joy was born two years later.

Everett was a Republican in a Democratic predominating era, so his rise to fame as a political figure came slowly. He began his first term as a U.S. Representative in 1932. He and Franklin Roosevelt were installed the same year.

Louella Dirksen was shy and was afraid of facing the other wives of congressmen so she stayed home in Illinois until 1938. They then lived in a modest apartment at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington for many years.

She found that the social life that she had dreamed of wasn't very active during the war years, so she began helping in Civil Defense and Red Cross work. She later became chairman of Camp and Hospital Services.

When they would go back to Illinois, Louella found that she enjoyed addressing people and began accepting speaking engagements for women's groups.

In 1946, Mr. Dirksen began to lose his eyesight and didn't run for reelection.

They remained in Illinois with Louella helping him and praying. In 1948 he regained his eyesight and in 1950 decided to run for Senate.

He, Louella and Joy traveled 81,000 miles in four months and wore out three cars campaigning. It paid off with his election.

All of his life, Everett Dirksen was known for his love of marigolds. In 1959 he introduced a bill in Congress asking that the marigold be made our national flower. It was defeated then and several times later. After his death, his wife continued to lobby for this.

The W. Atlee Burpee Seed Company had perfected a marigold seed which they named the "Senator Dirksen, the Big Smile Marigold".

In 1962, President Kennedy asked Senator Dirksen to help him make decisions on the Cuban Missile Crisis. He was up for reelection so Louella and Joy traveled the state campaigning in his stead. He won the election.

Since his death, Louella had made her home in DeBary enjoying playing bridge and activities of the Woman's Club. She had written a book "The Honorable Mr. Marigold" and helped raise \$50,000 for the erection of the Everett M. Dirksen Memorial Library in Illinois, which was dedicated in 1970. Frank Sinatra attended and sang Dirksen's favorite song, "Danny Boy".

Louella was the only woman on the Board of Directors of the First National Bank of DeBary, chairman of the Heart Fund for three years and President Nixon had appointed her to serve on his Committee on Aging.

Stetson's Corner: A Time for Heroes

On Friday evening, July 8, under an overcast sky, more than 100

people gathered to honor the memory of the five deputy sheriffs who gave the ultimate sacrifice to their community. Uniformed law enforcement, family, and friends participated in the moving ceremony held at dusk on the seventh anniversary of Deputy Sheriff Eugene Gregory's death.

Deputy Gregory was killed on July 8, 1998, during a landlord/tenant dispute in Geneva and had served as a full-time deputy sheriff since September 1991.

The four other deputy sheriffs honored were: Cleveland J. Jacobs, killed Sept. 14, 1922; Robert O. Moore, killed June 9, 1975; George A. Pfeil killed Dec. 29, 1977; and Hugh E. Thomas Jr. killed March 28, 1989.

Sheriff Donald F. Eslinger led the ceremony, an annual tradition held every July 8 to honor and preserve the legacy of the five fallen deputies. Sheriff Eslinger spoke of the five deputies as "ordinary people, whose strength of character allowed them to live extraordinary lives." The sheriff continued, "Let us not forget what we do not value, will not be valued; what we do not remember, will not be remembered, and what we do not change will not be changed. It is not about simply what to do, but the will to do it. We must remember the families

who bear the pain of their sacrifice."

Sheriff Eslinger introduced guest speaker Carlton D. Henley, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, who spoke of the history, bravery, and commitment of all deputy sheriffs and their families. Chairman Henley spoke about a changed America enduring acts of terror from within and without, child molestation, and violence at every turn. He challenged us as a people to demand more from ourselves and from our leaders and to devote the commitment of time and resources to support law enforcement efforts.

The ceremony began with an invocation and the American flag was raised, then lowered to half-staff. Law enforcement officers stood by their squad cars and motorcycles surrounding the memorial area. Bagpipes played in the background throughout the ceremony, and as five long stemmed roses were placed at the base of the memorial stone, the flashing lights of the law enforcement vehicles bathed the scene in a blue glow. An honor guard also fired rifles in memory of the fallen deputies. At the conclusion of the ceremony, a Seminole County helicopter performed a flyover above the memorial area.

There is a silver lining to this story, well documented by Executive Director Mary Zdanowicz of the Treatment Advocacy Center last year.

Linda Gregory, widow of Deputy Gregory has been working for more than four years with the Florida Sheriff's Association; with Linda Petree, the sister of Alan Singletary, the mentally ill man who killed her husband;

and with various groups and families to enact Baker Act reform. Due to the large number of mentally ill in the homeless and prison populations, Florida deputy sheriffs are much more likely to interact with them on a daily basis and initiate the Baker Act an average of 100 times a day. The risk of violent interaction or death for both the deputy sheriffs and the mentally ill population is high. Court ordered assisted outpatient treatment has been documented successfully in other states in helping stop the revolving door of patients released from hospitalization without a mechanism for follow up to continue their medications. The outpatient treatment has added benefits of being less restrictive, less expensive, and ultimately safer for all parties involved. This landmark legislation was passed in June 2004 and was effective Jan. 1, 2005. This will prevent tragic outcomes as the homeless and prison populations hold more mentally ill individuals than do psychiatric hospitals.

We salute the fallen heroes of the Seminole County Sheriff's Department and the living heroes, like Linda Gregory and Alice Petree who turned personal tragedy into a positive legacy. As Sheriff Eslinger said: "What we do not change will not be changed; it is not about simply what to do, but the will to do it."

Riggin and Byrd became close through a blues foundation called Music Maker Relief Foundation. The foundation is based in Durham, North Carolina and is geared toward helping blues musicians, and is also a place to learn more about some of the old blues musicians such as BB King. The foundation's slogan is "Keeping the bluest of the blues alive."

Music Maker Relief Foundation compiled interview footage from Byrd and created a documentary that is now on DVD. More information on Music Maker Relief Foundation can be found at their Web site, www.musicmaker.org.

According to Riggin, Byrd had a very sharp memory of the older blues guys, so Music Maker came down to ask as many questions about them as Byrd could recall.

"[The foundation] is in Blind Fuller's hometown, but they didn't even know as much about them as Henry did," Riggin said. "That's because Henry sat on the street corners and played with them."

Byrd grew up on a farm in Fort Valley, Georgia, where the Peach Festival came through yearly.

"The biggest blues people would come through and they'd get to mingle a lot," Riggin said. "He was probably the only one left alive who can say he played with them."

During the depression, Byrd told Riggin that he spent time as a hobo, catching trains. He and fellow musicians would lay under

railroad cars with their guitars on their chest.

"You didn't even find a cigarette butt or an apple core during the depression, he used to say," Riggin said.

Byrd told Riggin that he once had the opportunity, when he was back on his family's farm in Georgia, to go all around the world with Lightin' Hopkins.

"He didn't go. He said he liked the farm too much," Riggin said.

According to Riggin, Byrd and many of the old time blues musicians didn't play for the money.

"It was in your off time. Some people gamble. This is what they did. They called it a get-together," Riggin said.

When Byrd got married, his wife wanted to get away from the cold weather. They both had family down here so they moved to Sanford.

In Sanford, he worked as a construction worker through the 1960s and 1970s for Graham Contractors.

"He built a lot of Sanford and a lot of Orlando," Riggin said.

Byrd's love for music ran in the family. His father was a musician who played mountain music, Riggin recalled.

"They sang about their troubles, instead of the alternative," Riggin said. "Anything that was going on, they would write songs about."

While living in Sanford, Byrd lived a few houses away from Ray Charles' mother. He told Riggin the last time he saw the blind musician was when Charles came to bury his mother.

Byrd spent his life as a

simple man. Riggin said he didn't require much.

"He just wanted somebody to be there. Just like anyone," Riggin said.

When the two met, Byrd hadn't played a guitar for nearly 30 years, so Riggin gave him his guitar.

"Two weeks later, he was playing like he had never dropped the guitar. After 30 years, he still had it," Riggin said.

A final memory Riggin shared was Byrd discussing how he and his musician friends would make their own guitars when they couldn't afford to buy one. They would use a cigar box and strings made from old metal screens.

"You must want to play pretty bad to build something like that," Riggin said.

Byrd was a member of Macedonia Primitive Baptist Church in Sanford. He was survived by stepdaughters, Sally Perry of Sanford and Dorothy Moore of DeLtona.

Other survivors include Mattie Saddler, Ollie Mae Byrd and George Byrd, all of Sanford, who were reared as his children.

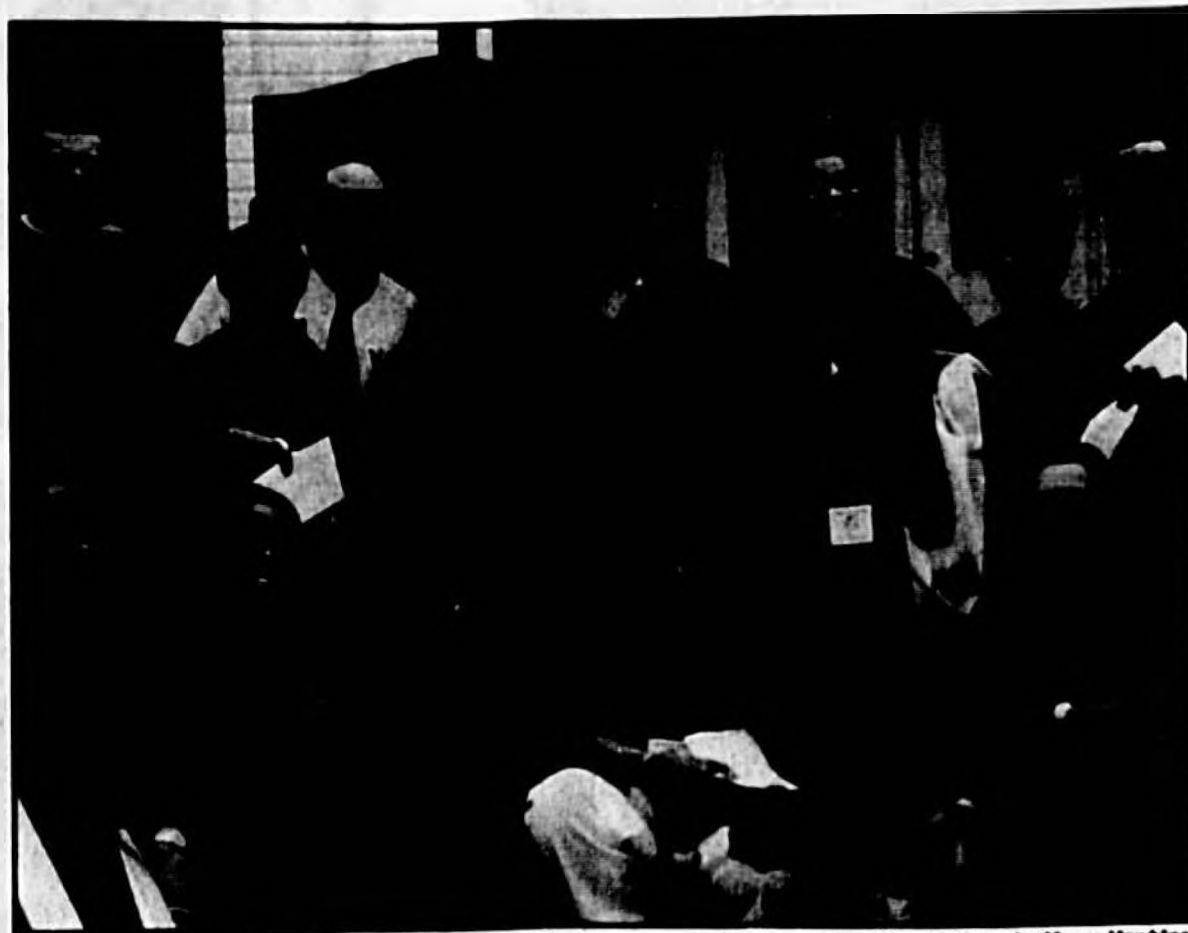
He had 17 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

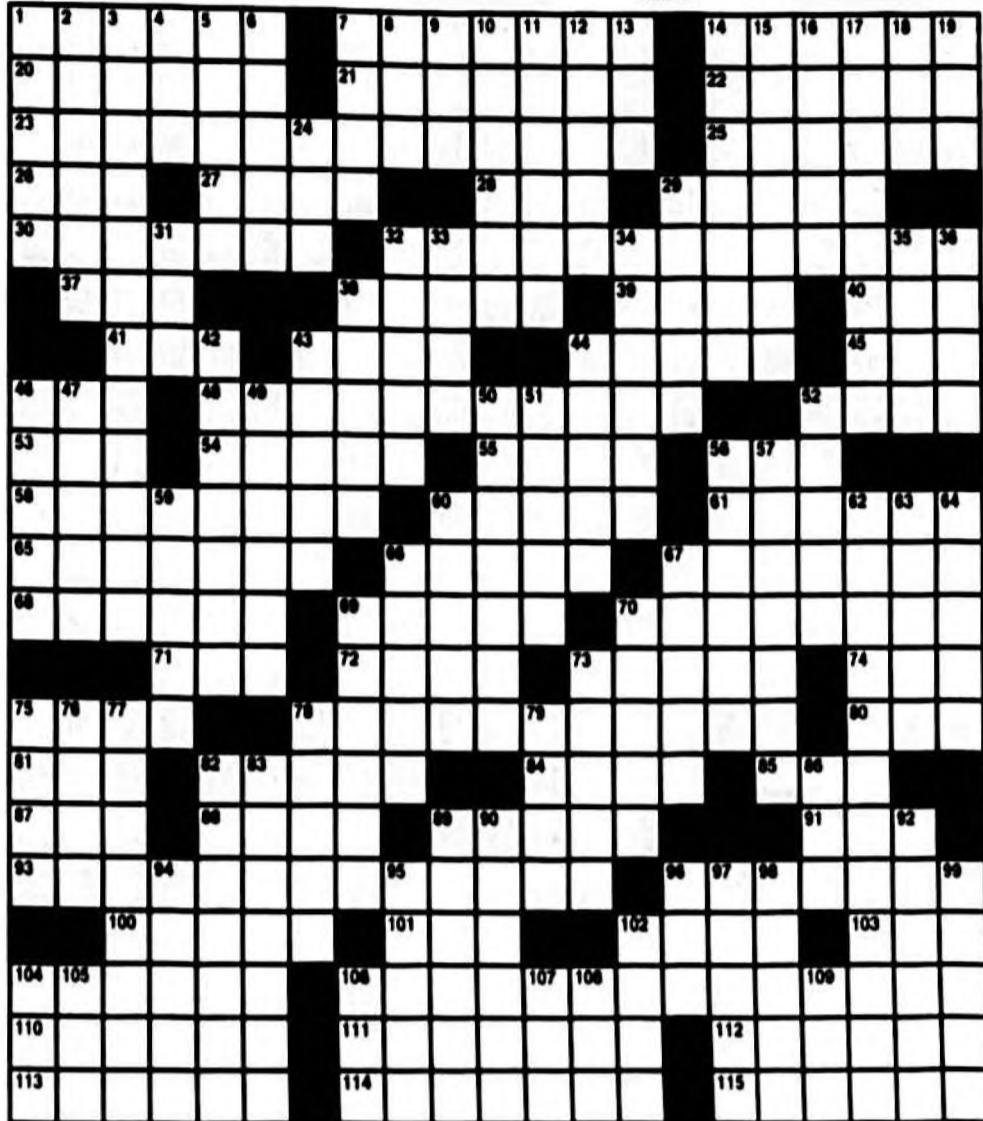

form of exercise.

Club member Randy Poole referred to a printed list called *The Best Kept Secrets About Square Dancing*. The list states that unlike some forms of exercise, square dancing is fun. Randy's list also stated that square dancing keeps a person's circulatory system moving, lowers a person's blood pressure and helps people recover from accidental injuries and ailments such as strokes and arthritis.

According to Poole's list, the effort put forth square dancing in an evening calculates to 2.5 exercise program points. By comparison, a 28-minute walk/run earns 1.8 exercise points. A 30 minutes game of tennis earns 2.5 points, as do 18 holes of golf. According to

Poole's list, only aerobic dancing, rated at a whopping 6.0 points, earns more exercise points than square dancing. In case you are curious, or concerned, Polka dancing, garnered a 2.5 rating as well.

Poole's flyer listed emotional benefits as well. Square dancing gets you out of the house so you can make new friends and spend time with those you already know. Dressed in their bright red outfits, long time club members Jerry and Mary Jo Dunagan serve as just one example of the benefits of square dancing, emitting good health, graciousness, gracefulness and a strong sense of fun.

Like many Starlight Promenaders, the Lysobeyes have danced with groups from

all over country. Dick Lysobey described an experience he and Jeanne had while traveling. "We've been in the mountains of Virginia, where we looked up a club in a book that listed square dancing groups from all over the world. The club in Virginia gave us directions and they were waiting at the door when we got there. They even made sure my wife won the door prize, which took two attempts. They treated us like cousins. They even called upon a member to guide us back to our lodging at the end of the night, traveling on back roads we have never known otherwise."

Many in the group have traveled to Lakeland for annual state conventions. The Lysobeyes attended a nation convention in Oklahoma City in 2003. Randy Poole has square danced in Korea and Iraq.

Clubs members often visit other clubs, performing what is jokingly referred to as a "raid." The previous week, the Lysobeyes raided a club in Flagler Beach. Dick Lysobey said, "You could dancing any night of the week in Central Florida and not repeat groups. "Square dancing is a lifestyle," Jeanne added.

Square dancing conventions draw square dancers from as far as Japan, China, Korea, Germany, Ireland, Sweden and England. Regardless of the nationality, the dances are always called in English.

Vital to the enjoyment of any square dancing group is the caller. While the music plays, the caller speaks above the

music, deftly announcing the commands for the dancers to follow. A good caller can make or dance a break group," Jeanne Lysobey said.

The Starlight Promenaders feel they have one of the best square dance callers in Central Florida. Whit Brown has been calling dances for 28 years. What started out as a hobby, eventually allowed Whit to retire from his previous job as a police officer. Whit call dances five or six nights per week, sometimes calling more than once in a day. Whit's wife Dee accompanies him to most of his gigs.

Standing on the Debarry Civic Center stage, looking every bit the entertainer, Whit holds a microphone in his right hand while operating the turntable, a lap top computer and a vocal effects unit with his left hand. "I have the desire to give people a good time, calling is a form of entertainment." Whit is prone to break out in snippets of song in between commands, serving as both a caller and a singer. Whit's song list ranges from traditional square dancing songs to specially remixed versions of Elvis Presley songs, Pop songs, country songs and classics like "Dream Lover." Whit says the modern rock and roll just doesn't work for square dancing. Like many forms of dance music, square dancing songs are usually in the 120 to 130 beat per minute range.

A typical Wednesday evening with the Starlight Promenaders begins at six o'clock with Round Dance lessons given by Daphne Martin. Round dancing has more in common with ballroom dancing than square dancing and

serves as a good warm up to the more complicated routines performed by square dancers.

At 7:30, a "club level" workshop begins. Club level refers to a dancers association with a club, or a level of skill acquired from previous associations with dance clubs. The workshop gives dancers a chance to work on the specific steps and moves associated with certain songs or steps. Assisting the always eager to improve dancers is Whit Brown, who gladly calls the workshops in addition to the club level dancing that gets under way at eight o'clock.

From 8 to 10, the inside of the Debarry Civic Center feels like a place from a far-gone time, a country gathering with friends and loved ones. Throughout the course of the evening, dancers alternate between round dances and square dances. Having both types of dancing each night allows those with style preferences a chance to relax while the other dancers are dancing. On the particular rainy night in mention, a reporter from the Herald and his date for the evening were invited to sit in on a round dance, knowing full well that the reporter had two left feet. The reporter survived his spin around the floor, even managing a few successful promenades and corner calls.

For an active group such as the Starlight Promenaders, the fun doesn't stop when Whit calls for a group "Thank You" at the end of the night. While Whit disassembles and packs his sound gear, the club members quickly and efficiently put away the tables, chairs, coffee pots and punch bowl.

A good number of the dancers agree to me at the

Perkins Restaurant on Saxon Avenue. The staff at Perkins knows to expect the dance club members and a table is set up and waiting when they arrive. Once settled, the conversation turns to politics, national news, work, grandkids and square dance tales. The club's newest members, Becky and John Cole, from Pennsylvania, were made to feel as welcome as old friends. Coffee and ice cream sundaes were the most popular item ordered. Being in the presence of the Starlight Promenaders for an evening gives one the feeling that at least a small part of the old-fashioned, wholesome, American lifestyle that once existed is still in tact.

Dancers with club level experience can contact the Dick Lysobey at 386-789-8018 to get more information on upcoming events and the summer schedule, during which the group meets only twice a month during the summer months of July and August.

For those interested in square dancing but unfamiliar with the techniques, a two-week open house, with lesson session included, is scheduled for October.

Cost of an annual membership with the Starlight Promenaders is \$8, including a minimal amount of insurance against injury. Club members are encouraged to make a \$4.50 donation per dancer, with non-members being asked to donate \$5. Interested parties can contact Dick at the number above.

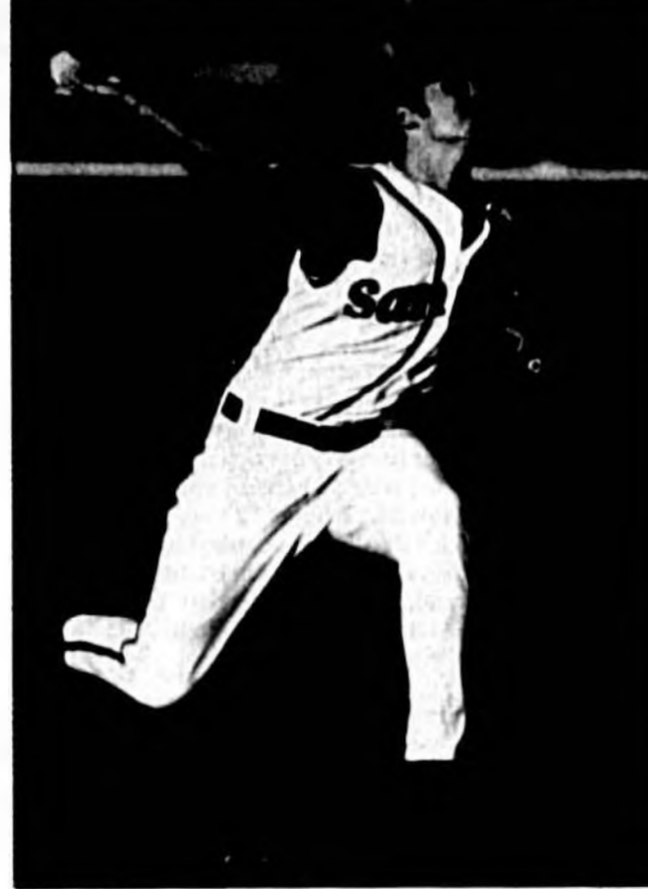
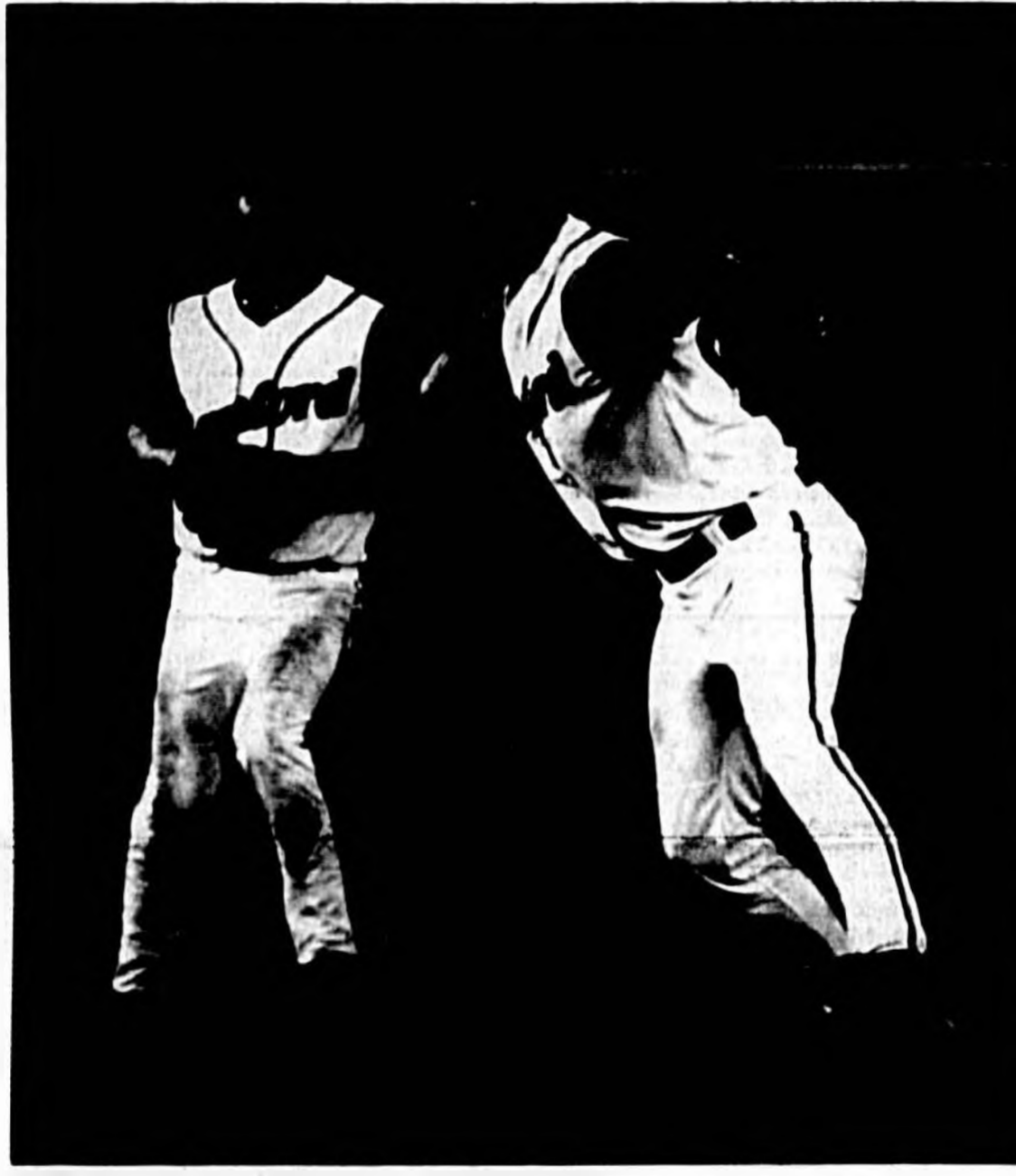

What a day for Georgia as she caught her first redfish.

Actually she caught her first three and she did it in style.

The morning started with Georgia hooking into a nice 24 pound redfish. The school was 200 strong and the tails were up high. After a few pictures we moved back toward the school and Georgia hooked up with a 15 pound fish. Once the fish was landed we took a short break to rest and have a cold drink.

Moments later the school showed themselves again. Carl and Georgia both made great casts to the school and wham, Georgia hooks another fish. This was no ordinary fish.

He took off like a fox in a 4 foot fire and the drag was screaming. The battle was on. The fish would take off and Georgia would hold on.

Then she would gain some line. After 25 minutes or so of tug-o-war Georgia defeated the slobberknocker. Pictures don't lie, this was one fine fish and it weighed in around 35 pounds. What a great way to start your redfish career.

The redfish bite has been strong some days and a bit slow some days. Look for a strong red bite next week before the full moon. The trout bite is on fire with top water plugs early. Once the sun rises switch over to the Rip Tide 3 inch mullet and swim it slowly just off the bottom. Rig your reel with 4/15 Power Pro Line and Daiichi Circle hooks for live bait with a 20 pound fluorocarbon leader. Look for trout in 2-4 feet of water.

The reds are hanging in potholes and edges of bars. Tiger Shoals has a nice school just south of the airplane wrecks.

On Dec. 3, UCF heads north to Gainesville to face Florida. The in-state rivals have not met since 2003, when they played in Jacksonville. The Gators, one of two Southeastern Conference opponents on the schedule, went 24-8 last season and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

After a Dec. 16 home contest with Norfolk State, the Golden Knights travel out west to participate in the Fiesta Bowl Classic in Tucson, Ariz. In addition to host Arizona, Sam Houston State and Western Kentucky are also participating in the tournament.

UCF will open the tournament against Western Kentucky. The Hilltoppers were 22-9 last season and participated in the postseason

National Invitation Tournament.

A year ago, Arizona went 30-7, including a 15-1 mark at home in the McKale Center. Wildcat head coach Lute Olson coached Kirk Speraw while Speraw was a student-athlete at Iowa.

Following the trip to Arizona, the Golden Knights will host their own tournament, the UCF Holiday Classic. The two-day event, which begins Dec. 29, includes Birmingham-Southern, North Florida and Western Illinois.

UCF concludes its non-conference road schedule on Jan. 3

at Kentucky. The contest will mark the first meeting with the Wildcats, who posted a 28-6 record in 2004-05 and made their 14th consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament.

For the second straight season, the Golden Knights will host South Dakota State. The date for the meeting is still to be determined.

Before kicking off the regular season, UCF will face Barry in an exhibition game on Nov. 9.

The C-USA schedule will be

announced in late August.

UCF's league slate will consist of 14 contests.

The Golden Knights return three starters and seven letter-winners from last season's squad that went 24-9 and made its second consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Dating back to the start of the 2002-03 season, UCF has won 70 games - a mark that ranks 23rd nationally and first in the state of Florida during that span.

Season tickets are scheduled to go on sale in early-August.

FWC OFFERS CLASSES ON ALLIGATOR HUNTING; PERMITS AVAILABLE

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is offering alligator hunters no-cost, three-hour classes to help prepare them for the coming statewide alligator harvest, which runs Sept. 1 through Oct. 8.

This is an opportunity for hunters who have never participated in the state's alligator hunts to learn what hunting alligators is all about. The class topics include: preparing for the hunt; hunting techniques and safety; harvesting and processing; caring for your alligator skin; and alligator rules and regulations.

Since 1988, the FWC has offered alligator hunts, which provide a thrilling, hands-on, face-to-face hunting adventure that is unlike any other hunting experience imaginable.

Sale of alligator permits began June 6, but more than 2,000 Alligator Harvest Permits are still available on a first-come, first-served basis through Sept. 20. Permit hold-

ers are authorized to take two alligators from designated areas during specific harvest periods. Alligator harvest areas are listed at MyFWC.com/alligator under "Alligator Harvest Permit Availability."

Applicants have their preference of applying at any county tax collector's office, license agent (retail outlet that sells hunting and fishing licenses), online at MyFWC.com/license or by calling toll-free 1-888-HUNT-FLORIDA (486-8356) from anywhere in the United States or Canada.

To reserve a permit, applicants must submit payment for an Alligator Trapping License and two alligator-hide validation tags, or provide proof of a valid Alligator Trapping License (must be valid through Oct. 8) plus pay the fee for two hide validation tags. No other hunting licenses are required.

The cost for a Resident Alligator Trapping License and hide validation tags is \$272, and non-residents pay \$1,022. Any hunter who takes an alligator must complete and send in an Alligator Harvest Report Form. The information gathered from these forms enables

FWC biologists to monitor population trends and impacts of the annual harvest.

An Alligator Trapping Agent License is also available for \$52, which allows the license holder to assist a trapper in taking alligators, but only in the presence of the permitted trapper. All persons seeking a harvest permit must be at least 18 years old by Sept. 1, and only one harvest permit per person will be issued.

DON'T WAIT TO TAKE HUNTER SAFETY CLASS

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) is encouraging would-be hunters to sign up and take their mandatory Hunter Safety Course this summer and not wait until the fall. This time of year provides the best opportunity to get into a class as slots are more readily available. During hunting season and just prior, classes usually fill up fast.

The FWC Hunter Safety Course, or similar approved course by another state,

province or organization, is a requirement to obtaining a Florida hunting license for anyone born on or after June 1, 1975. Even though the course is not required for persons born before that date, it is recommended, especially for beginning hunters.

Classes are taught throughout the state by certified volunteer instructors who teach firearm safety and laws, basic hunting terminology, conservation, safe hunting practices, outdoor ethics, wildlife identification and management, survival, field first aid and the Florida Wildlife Code. The course is free and prepares sportsmen for a safer, more rewarding experience while in the outdoors.

"Don't wait until the last minute to sign up to take a Hunter Safety Course or you may have a hard time getting into a class," said Bill Cline, program administrator. "A large number of courses are being offered statewide this summer, and it's best to try to get into one while more space is available. Then, when hunting season gets here, you'll be ready to go."

The Florida Hunter Safety

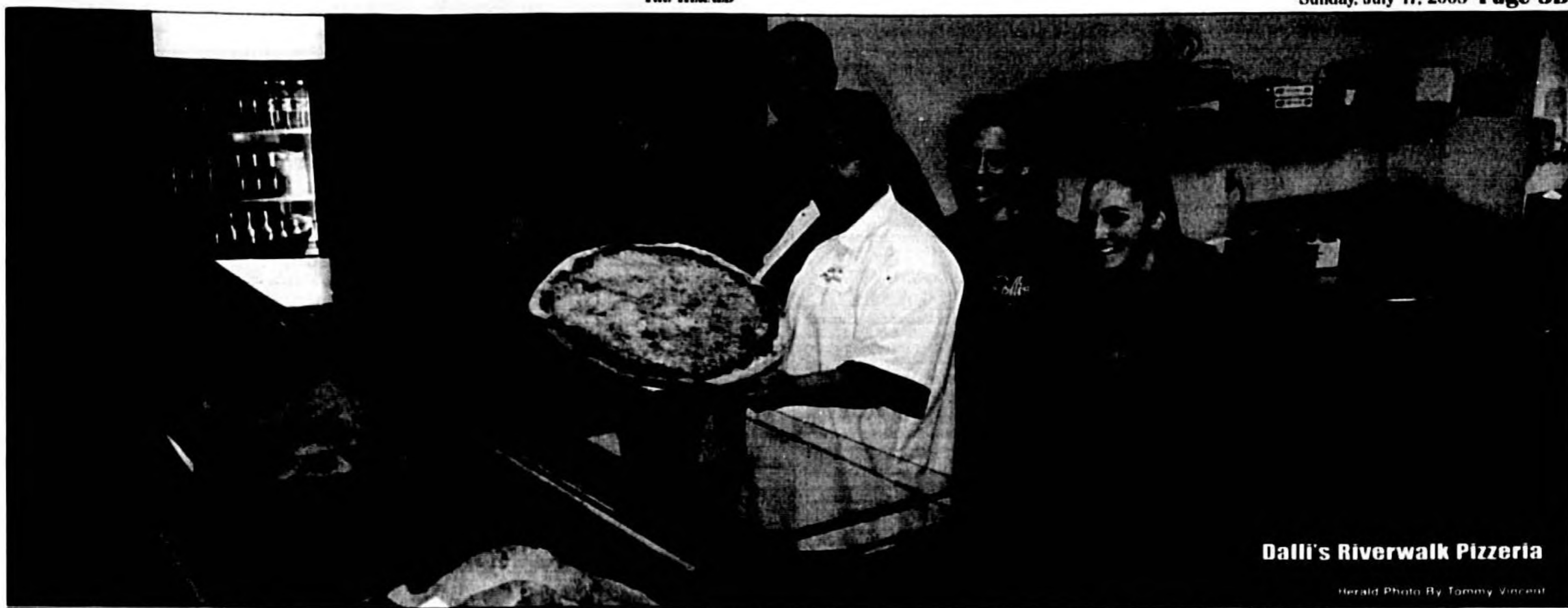
Course meets all the requirements for hunter safety training throughout North America. It also is essential for Floridians who wish to hunt in most other states or in Canada and need to purchase a non-resident license.

The course is available to be taken in a classroom setting, and it is offered in all of the state's 67 counties. In addition to the traditional in-class course, hunters now have the option of taking most of the classroom instruction online or on compact disc, without leaving home.

However, hunters who choose the Internet or CD-ROM version must take an additional three hours in the classroom; successfully pass a written exam; and participate in a field-day class that includes live-firing instruction on a shooting range.

"Don't wait to take the class, and make arrangements now to sign up for one this summer," Cline said.
