PEIPING, Nov. 5, (P)— Chinese Communist troops attacked several towns to the south of Chefoo in what observers said was an action to divert government strength from its Chefoo offensive. The Communists attacked numerous towns along the Tsintno-Tsinan railroad about 120 miles south of Cheloo. At the same time, Communist reinforcements are being rished from southern Santung province into the Cheloo area where severe fighting is raging for Chefoo and other port cities.

The government is continuing a virtually complete blackout of news from their side of the fighting around both Chefoo and Dairen. Elsewhere the government announced capture of two towns. in southern Manchuria and Hopeh

Chinese Foreign Office sources at Nanking, meanwhile, claim they have no knowledge of pegotiations said to be going on with Russin about Dairen. Earlier it had said the Chinese government was dictering to take over the Russian controlled city, under the terms of a treaty made in 1945.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5, (P) Senator Claude Pepper f Florida declared today that a Republican victory in the general election 'would wreck the labor laws of our country." Pepper also asserted that with a G.D.P. Victory "there would be no National Labor Relations Board after a few months."
