Charter Changes Nixed By Voters

Ten per cent of the registered voters of the City of Casselberry went to the polls yesterday to cast ballots in the special amendment election and turned thumbs down on a section that would have changed terms of office of mayor and councilmen from two years to three years.

With 1,184 qualified voters, only 115 turned out for the referendum.

Of this number 81 voted in favor and 34 were opposed.

The idea behind changing the length of terms was, among other things, to eliminate the possibility of electing the majority of Council in a given year and further to insure that the majority of the governing body would have some experience.

Mayor Curtis Blaw looked at the election philosophically today as he stated, "It is a matter of the democratic process working."

"The city had a decision to make and we thought it directly affected the people so we placed the issue in their hands. They made their choice."

The Herald disclosed a partial listing of the salaries on Aug. 1 with the disclosure that an increase in utility rates would be forthcoming.

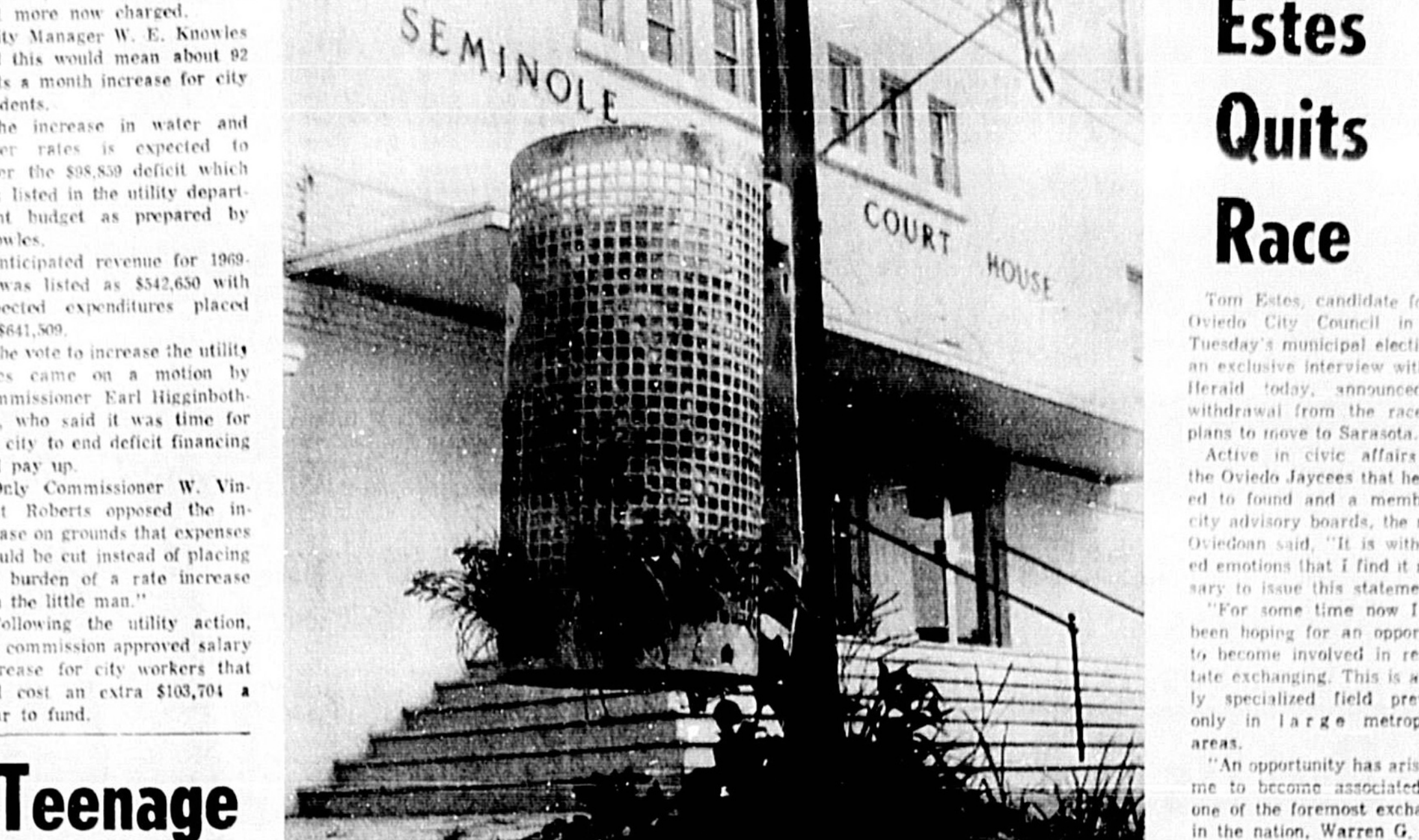
The salary hikes were granted by unanimous vote after the city manager stated the city risks losing important key personnel to other cities unless the increases are approved.

Commissioners, to increase the city's contingency fund, voted to increase the city's utility rates. The increase included increasing cuts for library cards for non-residents from \$2 to \$4 a year; increase out-of-town recreation



Estes Quits Race

Tom Estes, candidate for the Orlando City Council in next Tuesday's municipal election, in an exclusive interview with The Herald today, announced his withdrawal from the race and plans to move to Sarasota.

Active in civic affairs with the Orlando Jaycees that he helped to found and a member of city advisory boards, the native Oklawaha said, "It is with mixed emotions that I find it necessary to issue this statement."

"For some time now I have been hoping for an opportunity to become involved in real estate exchanging. This is a highly specialized field prevalent only in a large metropolitan area."

"An opportunity has arisen for me to become associated with one of the foremost exchangers in the nation, Warren G. Harding of Sarasota. This will necessitate my moving there in the near future."

"For this reason I regret deeply that I will have to withdraw my candidacy from the City Council election in Oklawaha. I had looked forward to continued participation in local civic affairs. I would like to thank the many friends who have lent their encouragement."

"I feel fortunate in having worked with Ben F. Ward Jr. and all the people associated with him. I feel this has been an invaluable experience and I would like to 'ask this time to publicly thank him."

"Mr. Ward and I have discussed this matter thoroughly and he has heartily encouraged me to pursue this particular field."

"This is a move I feel is necessary in order to obtain an education and experience in this phase of real estate. Very few realtors specialize in property exchanging and I feel fortunate in finding this opportunity nearby."

Speculation also had centered on a rumor that Commissioner W. Vincent Roberts would run for the mayor post to succeed present Mayor-Commissioner Lee P. Moore.

Thus far, Roberts has made no announcement confirming the report.

Higginbotham thus became the second person to indicate a preference for the mayoralty since the state legislature changed the method from having the commission select a mayor for a year allowing the people to vote their choice for three-year terms.

Previously, Harry Sharp, Sanford merchant, had made known his intention to seek the city's top spot.

Airport Operation 'In Black'

According to information from Sanford Industrial Director Tom Pothel, the Sanford Airport operation by the City of Sanford is "in the black" after four and one-half months of SIC operation.

Rathel, in a special report for the city commission, listed the total annual income from leasing properties at the former Navy base at \$176,728 and compared this to the proposed budget of \$192,252 being considered by the commission for 1969-70 airport operation.

"This shows an excess of \$6,448.80 over cost of operating the airport," Rathel said.

The requested airport budget is for \$192,252, but according to the SIC official, \$25,520 of that amount is expenditures involving building repairs, equipment purchases, use of city equipment, legal fees and consulting engineer fees, and will be deducted unless reserves are available to pay the costs.

The SIC director said, "we expect to end this fiscal year with \$9,990 of the \$10,000 loaned the SIC by city in the bank."

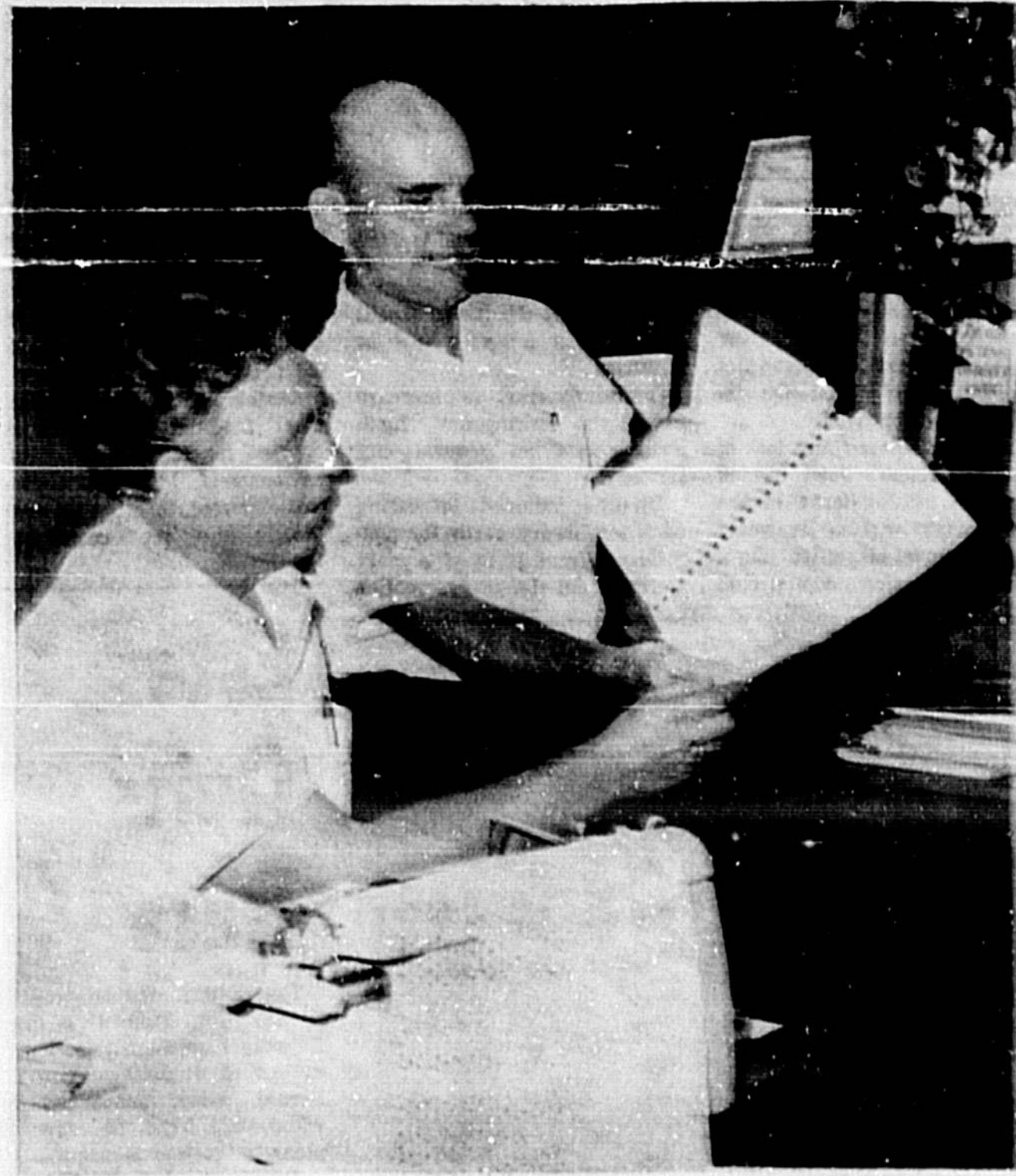

Lawmakers Claim Ignorance Of Bill New S&L Law Puts State 'In Red'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—A law that will exempt savings and loan associations from payment of up to \$15 million in state taxes was not written as a tax dodge, says the lobbyist who drafted it.

The tax exemption will throw the state's budget into the red, Secretary of Administration Sam Tucker told the Cabinet Tuesday.

Drew-affiliated said the deficit could run to \$15 million.

"We haven't been and aren't seeking any exemption," said Robert Tucker, who drafted the bill, when they passed this year.

Tucker ducked the question, but said he was surprised the bill had not been sent to a tax committee.

Sen. Frederick Karl, D-Daytona Beach, said neither he nor other legislators are state officials thought the bill dealt with taxation, Karl was a sponsor in the Senate.

"It was a rewrite of the savings and loan law," Karl said. "There were hundreds of minor changes in it."

Rep. Robert Harnett, D-Miami Lakes, said he was sure most legislators did not know the effect on the bill when they passed it.

"The title does not mention taxation, and the constitution requires titles to summarize laws."

Tucker said there may be an end to it. He said he will ask Attorney Gen. Earl Faircloth if there is a defect in the law's title that renders it invalid.

"I expect that's true on a technicality," he said.

America's Grocery Bill \$90 Billion Annually

WASHINGTON (AP)—The cost of getting food from the farmer to the housewife has soared 100 per cent in two decades and now consumes two-thirds of America's grocery bill, the House Agriculture Committee cites these figures.

Twenty years ago, when Americans spent \$4 billion a year for food, the farmer got about \$2 billion and the middlemen \$3 billion. Today, when the nation's annual food bill is about \$90 billion, the farmer gets about \$30 billion and the middlemen about \$60 billion.

The recent upward trend, the Labor Department reported Friday, says that the cost of living advanced again in July and is going up at the fastest rate in 16 years, has been no store that in some areas housewives are talking of buying in an attempt to bring down the cost of food.

"My food bill averaged \$115 a month in 1948 and the same stuff would cost me about \$275 monthly in 1968. That has led to a protest movement in Cocoa Beach Fla.

Similar complaints are being sounded elsewhere.

The widening farm-to-consumer gap is clear in a comparison of Agricultural Department statistics showing what happened to the money a housewife paid for a loaf of bread years ago and what happens to it today.

"I think they should," said John Wagner, a Dunn County Wis., dairy farmer. "Compared with other countries they're living cheap—they're making high enough incomes to afford paying more for food."

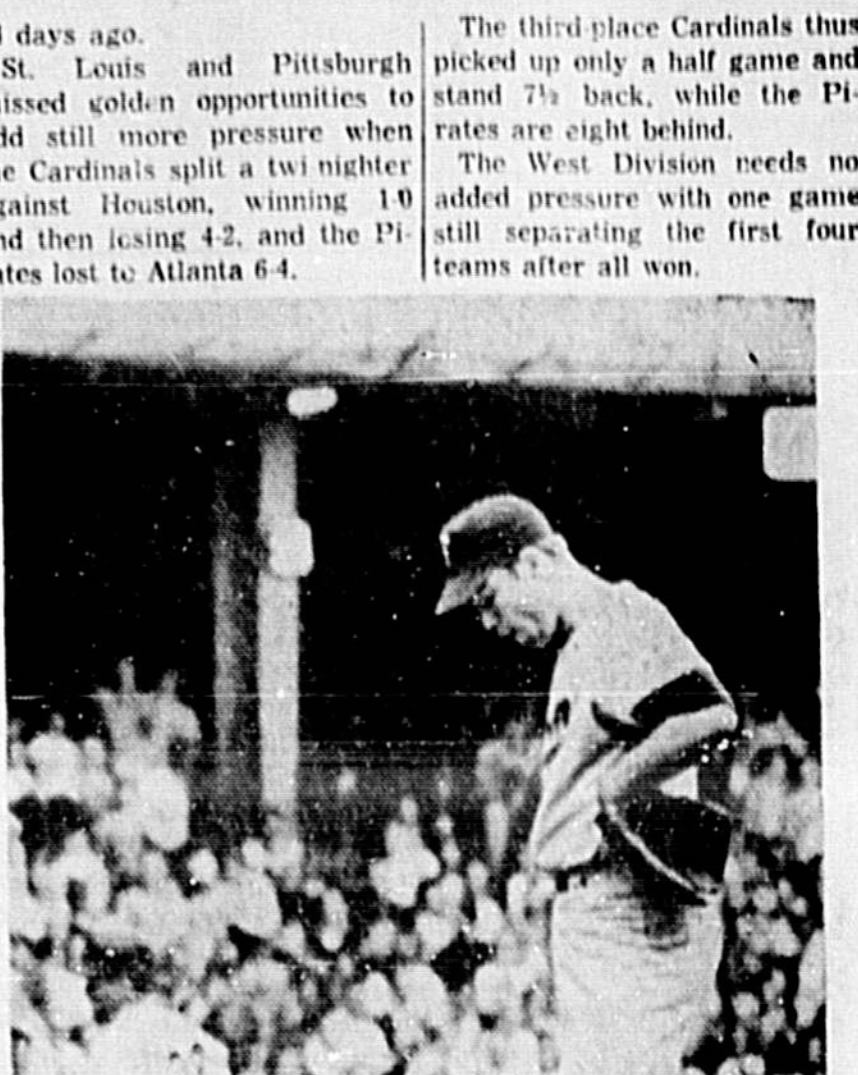

could indeed insist on immediate payment—without leaving any loopholes at all.
There is something about parking meters that at times excites the rebel in a rugged individualist. Nevertheless, in assorted courtroom confrontations between citizen and meter, the law has usually upheld the meter. As one judge put it:
"Some hardships must be undergone by those who enjoy the benefits of life in large communities."
Thus, in another case, a court found parking meters with parking meters that sold 12-minute intervals for the first hour—but only an undivided one-hour's worth for the second hour. If this was discrimination against second-hour users, as a citizen charged, it was held not to be unreasonable discrimination.
Another citizen, attacking from a different direction, refused to accept a parking ticket from a "meter maid." He argued that the city could not use anything less than a regular policeman for law enforcement. But again, the court decided a city had this much leeway in running its parking meter system.
Still, the law won't tolerate everything. For example, meters cannot ordinarily be used for purposes outside the field of traffic control. Accordingly, a court decided that a city had no right to pay for harbor improvements out of parking meter income.
And another court added this warning:
"A municipality cannot turn parking meters into a business for profit. It cannot establish a commercial enterprise on the public easement."
