savagely than he had seen them
before.

And so he stands before the
American people today like Jeho-
shaphat of old denouncing the
kings of our Government for their
iniquities in office, business for its
greed and union leaders for their
brutal selfishness.

As he sees strikes and show-
downs and mean and sordid quar-
rels about which union is to have
prevalence and duty, he sees also
before him the blood-stained
bodies of the dying with whom he

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Compensation For Added Costs To Farming Planned

GAINESVILLE, Feb. 3 (Spe-
cial) This act will under way
will probably take effect in Florida
the program for incentive pay-
ment to producers of vital food
and fiber crops recently an-
nounced by Secretary of Agriculture
Henry Wallace, it was stated to-
day by H. G. Clayton, chairman
of the Florida USDA War Board.
Florida crops affected include
white potatoes, peanuts and sweet
potatoes.

The incentive payments are in
addition to any price support
paid in effect. Secretary Wallace
said they are part of the De-
partment of Agriculture's broad
policy of giving farmers the
greatest possible assistance in
producing maximum amount of
essential farm products. The pay-
ments would compensate farmers
for the added costs they will en-
counter in greatly increasing produc-
tion of the vital crops.

Each incentive payment is
based on the production of a
particular crop. The amount of
incentive to be paid has been de-
termined for the crops.

To help farmers increase their
production, the program also
includes for last year to the year
of 1942-43, a maximum amount of
\$100 for each acre over 50 per-
cent of the base yield of the
crop. The increased production is
needed to meet more adequately the
increasing needs for food and pro-
ducts.

Yankees Still Are A Big Menace In Spite Of Losses

By DILLON GRAHAM AP Features Sports Editor NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—They're still the Yankees, still the team to beat, even though the military services have claimed a handful of their stars.

Three-fourths of the New York infield, two outfielders and the club's most experienced pitcher are gone, all but one of them wearing the garb of Uncle Sam.

Some clubs haven't lost so many key players and there's been a bit of popping off about the American league pennant going to the Indians or the Browns this year. But the Yankees will remind you they were country mile ahead of the field at the 1942 finish, and so can slip quite a bit and still be right up in the thick of the flag race.

But as long as those three guys named Joe—DIMAGGIO, GORDON and MCCARTHY—are around, the Yankees will be tough. And this trio will be on deck, although there has been some talk that DIMAGGIO might enter service.

The infield will be built around the veterans, Joe Gordon at second and Frankie Crosetti at third base, capable of steadying the newcomers. Three-fourths of the Newark infield—George Stirnweis, 2b; Bill Johnson, ss, and Henry Majecki, 3b—are on hand and the Yankees shortstop will be selected from this trio. Chances are, too, that one of them may wind up at third in place of the aging Crosetti, who will be out for a few months anyway, because he passed an umpire in the last World Series. The veteran Bill Knickerbocker, obtained from the A's, will be on deck, too.

Byrne, the Newark lefty who led his league with 17 wins and four losses, and batted .325 in 64 games, and Charles Wenzloff, a righthander with a 21-10 record at Kansas City, only American association twirler to win 20 games.

Five recalled players also fit into the pitching puzzle—catchers Ed Kears from Seattle, Ken Sears from Kansas City and Aaron Robinson from Newark, and right-handed pitchers Milt Mirk and Rinaldo Ardizola from Kansas City.

Robinson probably will be kept to spell the veterans Bill Dickey and Rolfe Hemaley, and replace Buddy Rosar who, with outfielder Roy Cullenbine, was sent to Cleveland in exchange for Weatherly and Grimes.

Overall, the pitching appears about as good as last year, the power is available, and the Yankees would look a long time before they lapsed better looking recruits. Maybe the Yankees won't win but they're still the team to beat.
