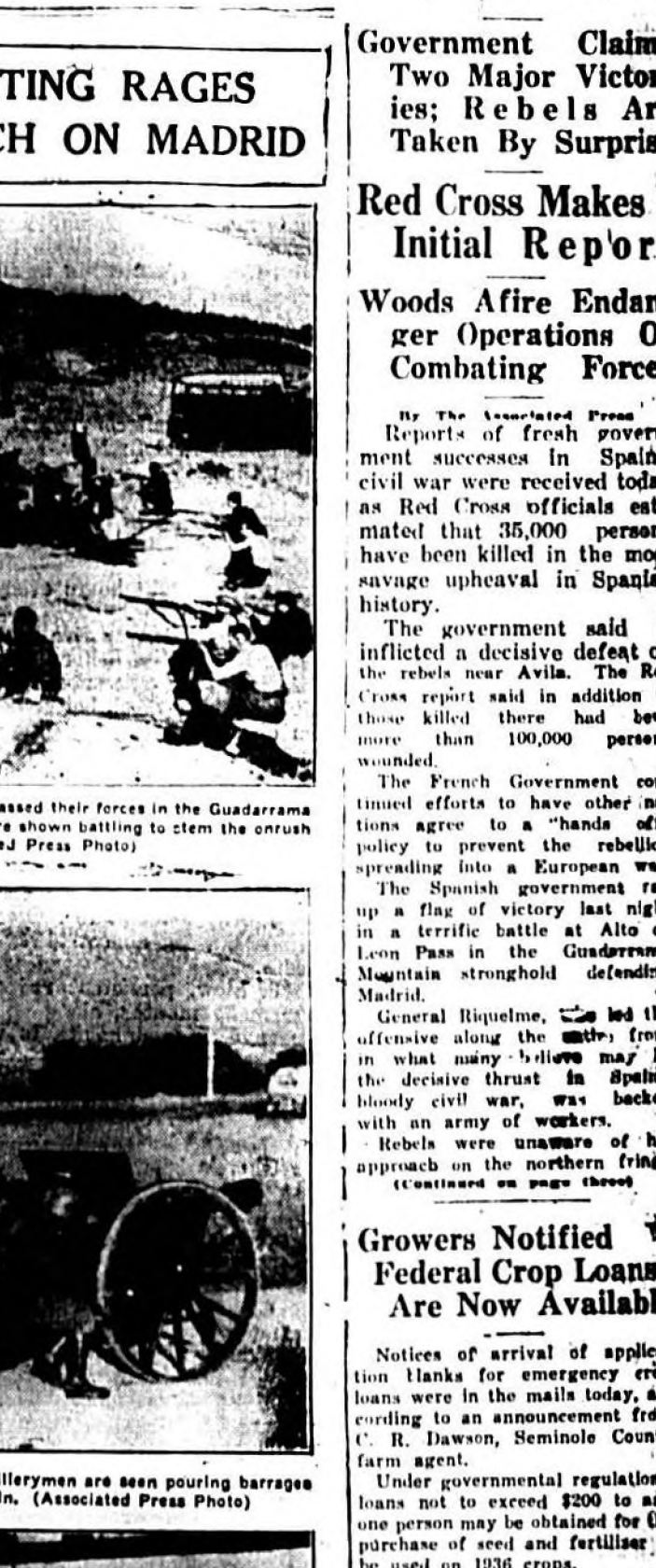

## In Spain's Most Bloody Rebellion

(Continued from page one)  
of the mountain range and stormed down the Madrid side of the pass to raid General Riquelme's headquarters in the town of Guadarrama.

Bullets from rebel guns were said actually to have penetrated General Riquelme's cottage headquarters. While the general was taking coffee a bullet smashed the cup.

Their attack repulsed, the rebels withdrew to find General Mangada had cut off their retreat.

Combined loyalist forces were confident of annihilating the rebels in an enclosing operation which raged on the mountain-side.

Burning woods set flame by shell fire hampered movements of both sides.

While the critical engagement was fought in the Guadarramas, throughout most of Spain thousands of troops were marching against each other.

There was conflict in the Balearic Islands and in the Spanish Moroccan cities where the revolt started 19 days ago. Loyalists forced the fighting in the Guadarramas outside Madrid, as nearly 400 were listed dead.

Madrid and a military directorate were the Fascist goals. Rebel defeat everywhere was the Loyalist objective. Wherever opposing forces met, vicious battle ensued.

PORT SAID, Egypt, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Ras Inru, Ethiopian commander in the northwest, authoritatively reported advancing on the cities of Dessye and Addis Ababa with 40,000 warriors. Ethiopian columns were said to be advancing from the west in the general direction of the capital and principal city on the northern end of a mountain road leading to Addis Ababa. Many Italian outposts are reported to have been destroyed during the Ethiopian advance.

Wood's game collapsed completely in the face of the Southerner's steady driving and he was beaten in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4.
