More Permanent Residents

For a long time most northerners have thought of Florida primarily as a winter resort, a place where warm sunshine and balmly breezes are delightful in winter but where a deadly heat suffocates all living creatures in summer. But what Florida is just beginning to do, and needs to do more, is to tell the world that people can live here the year around.

That we should have more permanent residents is the belief of the Florida Grower which goes on to say: "Our state is only a little more than ten percent developed. There is room here for several million people. The land will produce enough to keep them fairly well fed and as we continue to develop more lands we will broaden our interests. This, in turn, will help to establish the trades and industries that we now lack and which are absolutely necessary for a normal development.

"Florida should be largely self-supporting. It is more nearly that today than ever before. We should grow not alone our fruits and vegetables but our dairy, meat and poultry products as well. And we can do this very thing. It has already been demonstrated that the state is a great potential producer. With the tick eradicated the cattle industry will be safe. With better pastures livestock of all kinds will thrive. With a local market resting on a larger population these broader producing industries will find local support.

"All of this is in the picture of Florida's future. The broad program of production will lead to industrial development and this in turn will support the producing portion of our population. It is the permanent population that counts most in developing a state. A sound development cannot come entirely through the tourist business. That feature of our state life is all right, but it should be regarded as a by-product rather than as a leader."

As a means of assisting the body in its fight against ill health, Dr. Russell C. McCaughan, secretary of the association, presented the following rules:

4. Never allow yourself to become too good at competitive sports and games. Leave perfection to professionals and to youth.

5. Walk a lot. 6. Learn to think deliberately and usefully. Worry and hurry are the twin sisters of fate. They insure a short life and anything but a merry one.

7. Any attempt to reduce faster than one or two pounds a week almost always results in failure, or bad health.

8. Slow, persistent reduction in the diet extending over many months, along with a gradual-and permanent -change in food habits, is what insures success.






