













## Hearing Slated In Florida On Citrus Situation

### Brannan Is Asked To Allow Shipment Of Unwashed, Unsized

WASHINGTON (AP)—A group of independent Florida citrus growers agreed today to petition Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to allow the shipment of unwashed, unsized and ungraded citrus from the area south of the Mason-Dixon line and west of the Mississippi River.

However, Sen. Holland (D-Fla.) said he did not believe Brannan would or could act without hearing the views of all Florida growers, and suggested that Cohen and his delegation ask Brannan to call for a full hearing in Florida as soon as possible.

The Marketing Agreement was adopted by more than two thirds of the state's 18,000 growers and it was agreed that unless Brannan abrogated the entire Marketing Agreement, it could only be changed by the growers themselves.

Cohen cited low prices now being received by growers and said he had letters from truckers willing to pay \$1.50 a box for fruit on the trees.

WASHINGTON (AP)—A full hearing on the Florida citrus situation may be held in that state soon, it was indicated today.

Barney J. Cohen of Orlando, head of the Florida Independent Citrus Growers Association, and a group of growers were to meet with Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to discuss what Cohen said is a "state of emergency" for the small growers.

growing the cotton is that for every bale produced, 1,000 pounds of seed is derived, and this is valuable not only for replanting more cotton, but fertilizer and cattle feed as well.

Local growers have been taking their cotton to the new gin in Leesburg. If, however, there was sufficient acreage of cotton here, it would pay to erect a local gin, as the expense for this would not be heavy, said Mr. Schmah.

Celery — Maturely in all sections hastened by warm weather. Cooler weather would benefit quality and improve sizes. Harvest rate increased and volume should continue to grow.

Corn — Good rain would greatly improve yield prospects.

Cucumbers — Winter crop ranges from poor to good with prospects for a fair yield. Volume down but should increase as winter acreage comes in.

Eggplant — Fair to good progress in important Pompano and Ft. Myers sections. Warm weather has caused heavier production during early winter than has occurred for several years.

Endive — Escarole and chicory crops have made rapid growth due to warm weather but quality and yields not up to expectations.

Lettuce — Weather too warm for best development. Harvesting active in all producing areas but yields below normal. Everglades, Manatee-Ruskin, Zellwood-Sanford-Winter Garden and Webster sections sources of supply.

Pepper — Weather favorable but rain would be of material benefit.

Potatoes — Dade County and Fort Myers winter crop making fair to good progress. Blazing active in Ft. Myers area.

Squash — Fair to good progress. Strawberries — Plant City, Wauchoula, Webster and Starke Lawley sections crops in air to good condition. Harvesting active in Central Florida sections with light supplies from North Florida area.

Tomatoes — Weather favorable but rain lack causing some reduction in yield prospects. Fall harvesting completed in Inmukalee section but now active in Dade County fields. Spring plantings in Port Pierce, Inmukalee and Manatee Ruskin areas generally making favorable progress.

Watermelons — South Florida plantings up and some beginning to run. In Central Florida some planting still being done, no ma-

## DiSalle Quits As OPA Chief To Run In Ohio

### Price Boss To Seek Democratic Nomination For U.S. Senate Against Bricker

WASHINGTON (AP)—Michael V. DiSalle announced today he will quit as price boss to run for the United States Senate in Ohio.

DiSalle would seek the Democratic nomination. Sen. Bricker, Republican, comes up for re-election this year.

DiSalle said a news conference on the date he leaves the Office of Price Stabilization will be determined later. He said he might remain for some time, possibly until President Truman names a successor.

At the Capitol, Sen. Bricker said he welcomed DiSalle as a prospective opponent. He issued a statement saying:

"I have opposed the consistently excessive spending, the inefficiency, Communistic and left-wing entanglements of the New Deal, and the program which has brought inflation and war."

"I hope a Truman supporter will be nominated by the Democrats so that the issue will be clear-cut and the result decisive."

"Mr. DiSalle meets these requirements."

There are now two other announced candidates for the Democratic senatorial nomination—Henry Miller Busch, a professor at Western Reserve University, and George L. Mark of Cleveland, national commander of the Polish Legion of American Veterans.

The primary is May 6. The filing deadline for entries is Feb. 8.

DiSalle made the announcement after he had talked with President Truman at the White House for some 30 minutes in an early forenoon conference.

There had been reports that DiSalle might be offered another high post in the Truman administration. DiSalle himself had denied it.

DiSalle was at the cabinet level. Attorney General J. Howard McGrath also visited the White House. DiSalle was there to give the price to run in Ohio.

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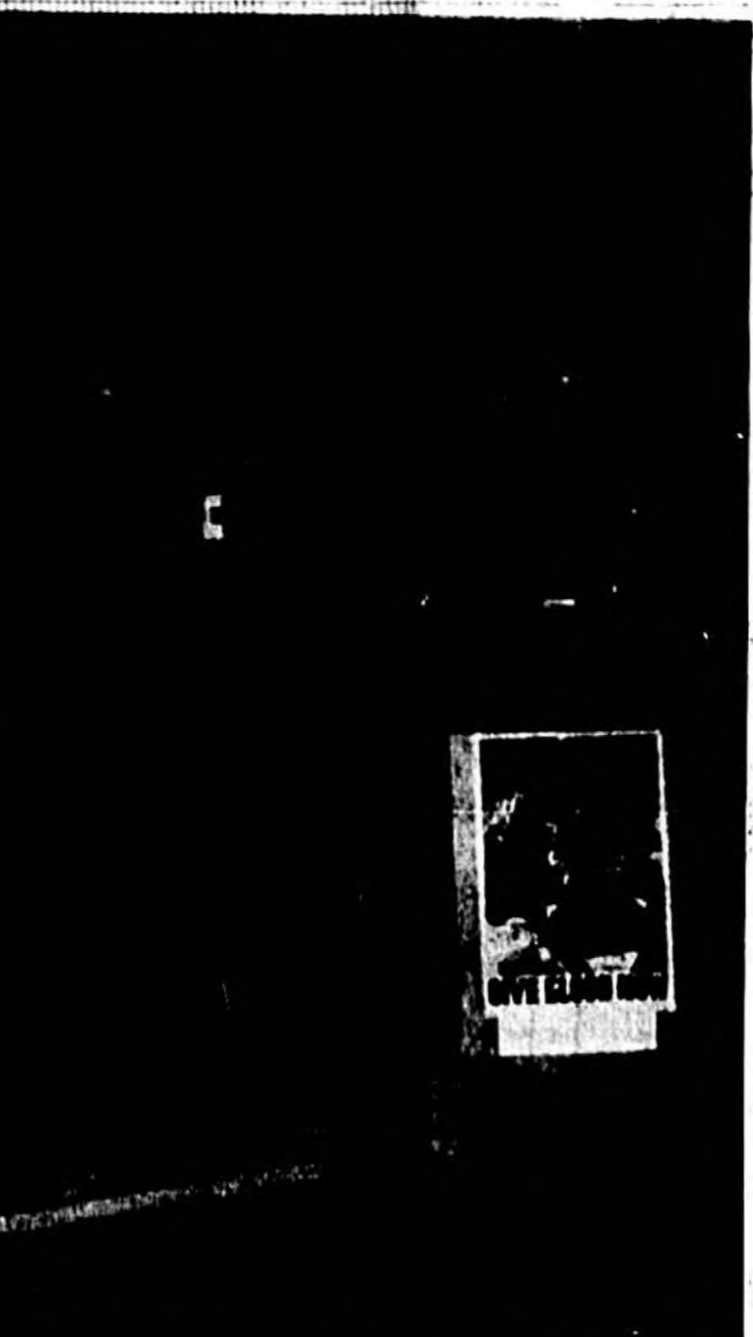
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## Demands Growing For Removal Of Newark Air Base

## Mangle Says There's No Doubt He'll Run; Kefauver Expected To Announce Today

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Former Sen. Claude Pepper said today he will announce his political plans in next Sunday's newspapers. He denied telling radio commentator Carter Mangle of Florida Liberty Network that he was going to run for governor. The report was broadcast today that the would run for governor with backing of the Warren administration.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman's home state national Democratic committee said today there is "no doubt" in its mind that Mr. Truman will be a candidate for re-election.

John Mangle, the Missouri committee member, told reporters after a White House call that Mr. Truman had not informed him of his intentions, but "I do think President Truman will run for the presidency again."

Mangle had said earlier he thought Mr. Truman had "retired from office" but the news of his return and repeated today he still thinks so. However, he said he favors the President's making the race.

In other political developments, The New York State Democratic chairman, Paul A. Fitzpatrick, told White House reporters he hoped Mr. Truman would run but that he didn't know whether he would support him.

Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee made ready to announce his presidential candidacy plans at an afternoon (3 p.m. EST) news conference. Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) indicated he would support Kefauver for the Democratic nomination.

Supporters already have entered Kefauver's name in the April 8 Illinois presidential primary, where Sen. Brian McMahon, Connecticut Democrat, also will be a contestant.

Noting McMahon's entry in that primary, Kefauver commented, "Competition is a fine thing, and it is a fine thing to have a race in the fine spirit." That sounded to politicians like Kefauver was getting ready to make it official.

The Tennessee described McMahon as "a good friend and an able man."

Reports persisted that McMahon was in the Illinois race as part of a move by backers of President Truman to center Kefauver-Kefauver has said, however, he (Continued on Page 11)

## Business Activity At Farmers Market Sets New Records

All records for business at the Sanford State Farmers Market for this season were again broken yesterday when during a 24 hour period more than 2,500 units, comprising 67 cases of vegetables and fruits, were sold. Manager Sandy Anderson stated this morning.

"Talk about your northern blizzards, I'm simply snowed under this morning," he declared. "It was a night for big semi-trailer trucks were weighed in by Mr. Anderson on the new weighing platform right in front of his office."

Another record was broken yesterday, and there was the worst traffic jam in the history of the market, with 102 of the big trucks jammed into the area, he reported.

"I walked last night until my feet hurt, trying to untangle the jam," said Mr. Anderson.

King cabbage, while failing to soar to the 300 mark of last year, recently climbed to about \$1.80 per 60 pound sack, but has eased off now to the \$2.75 to \$3.00 range. Quality of all vegetables at the market, cabbage, included, is reported to be above par.

Last week at the market was another record buster, with 78,102 units selling for \$275,000, the biggest week of the season so far. Mr. Anderson predicted that the business this week will be even higher.

Major items of sale last week were cabbage, celery, radishes, turnips, mustard greens, parsley and iceberg lettuce.
