

Churches Boot Voting Machines

Seminole County elections officials are scrambling to find some new polling places for the first of this fall's elections two weeks from today because several churches used as polling places have given voting machines the boot.

Twenty-two Seminole County churches didn't like state lottery proponents on their property collecting petition signatures to place a lottery referendum on this fall's ballot. Five of the churches have refused permission to the county elections office to use their buildings for this fall's vote. A sixth church may also close its doors on voters.

County elections officials are searching to find new polling places for up to 9,000 voters for the

first primary of the year, two weeks from today. The five churches which have decided to call a halt to voting at their facilities are:

• First Baptist Church, 770 Seminola Blvd., Casselberry, used for the 1,155 voters in the 52nd precinct:

• Tuskawilla United Methodist Church, 3925 Red Bug Lake Road, Casselberry, used for 1,155 voters in the 56th precinct;

• Rolling Hills Moravian Church, used for 1,250 voters in the 47th precinct;

• St. Augustine Catholic Church, 375 Sunset Drive, Caselberry, used for 1,147 voters from precinct 57, and 664 voters from precinct 77; and Lake Howell Bible Chapel, 2584 Lake Howell

Lane, Maitland, used for 831 voters in the 90th precinct.


The sixth church considering discontinuing serving as a polling place is First Baptist Church of Sweetwater, according to Lee Hornbeck, church Elder. Hornbeck said the church is particularly concerned over the solicitation of voter interest on issues "the church finds itself in conflict with." He said his church is working with the county elections supervisor to fashion an agreement so the church can continue as a polling place. And while there are only two weeks left for the coming election, Hornbeck said if a solution is not worked out by then, the church will still serve as a polling place. But, Hornbeck said, "in the long term, if we can't work this out, we'll reserve the right to refuse to do so in the future."

The quandary is that state law allows solicita-

tion of voter interest on issues outside a 50-foot area from the precinct entrance. That, however, still has them on church property in this instance, Hornbeck said, and the church doesn't want soliciting on church property. Whether the county elections supervisor can legally prevent it is unknown at this time.

The elections supervisor cannot order anyone to provide a building for a voting precinct. according to Caryoin Cohen, office manager. "We go around and ask if they'll allow us to use their facility as a polling place, but we can't require them to. We pay an average of \$30 to \$35 a day when they're used as polling places to help offset cost of utilities, although not everyone asks to be paid."

Sanford's Marina Isle **Expansion On Schedule**

Development on, and just off, Sanford's marina isle is progressing, with the three lessors on the city-owned, 12-acre parcel focussing attention on enhancement of existing offerings and construction of new ones.

Forty rooms will be added at the Holiday Inn. the first phase of John Smith's One Harbour Place commercial project. It is expected to be complete by Oct. 1, and the same date is being eyed by Monroe Harbour Marina operator Chuck Velk for start-up of a 98 slip dock expansion.

Ed Welch, who operates the Holdiay

Inn with Wally Schoettelkotte, said the motel addition is still in its planning stages, and is hoped to begin within the next two years. He said the rooms will be located on the two acres of grass lying between his Fitzgerald's night spot and N. Palmetto Avenue.

In addition to Fitzgerald's, the Holdiay Inn operates Dock N' Shoppe, a lake-front package store which offers its patrons dell service, potables such as champagne and a wooden deck, outdoor eating area.

Taking shape just east of Dock N' Shoppe is Smith's One Harbour Place, a two story, 14,000-square-foot-commercial

complex. The approximately \$1.3 million venture is the first of two Smith plans. with second phase efforts to be either a yacht club or second retail complex.

Grand opening for the first phase project will probably be the weekend of Oct. 25, as a follow-up to the anticipated Oct. 1 construction completion date, Smith said.

Golden Age Winners Will Qualify For The National Senior Olympics

Sentor athletes will be going for national recognition as well as the gold during this fall's Sanford Golden Age Games.

Top finishers in the Sanford games will be told on-site they are qualified to go head-to-head against the county's best during the first U.S. National Senior Olympics. The national games will be held in St. Louis next summer, with qualifiers attending at their own expense.

Jim Jernigan, Sanford Parks and Recreation Department Director and Sanford Golden Age Games chairman, has been named as one of 19 regional representatives on the national olympics coordinating committee.

Jernigan met with the committee for a planning session in St. Louis last week.

Iranian Oil Minister Seeks Soviet Backing For OPEC

MOSCOW (UPI) - Iranian Oil Minister Gholamreza Agazadeh was in Moscow today to seek Soviet cooperation in OPEC's campaign to cut oil production and boost prices.

The Iranian Embassy confirmed that Aqazadeh, who left Tehran Monday, had arrived in Moscow but made no other comment. The Kremlin also had no comment.

Analysts say the cooperation of major non-member oil producers, such as the Soviet Union. Is necessary for the success of the OPEC agreement to stop the world oil glut and price decline by production cuts.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries agreed Aug. 5 to slash its production by nearly 4 million barrels to about 16.7 million barrels daily and called on non-member producers to follow suit.

Soviet-Israeli Talks End Suddenly

HELSINKI, Finland (UPI) - The first Soviet-Israeli talks in 19 years broke down after 90 minutes over the thorny issue of Jewish emigration from the Soviet Union but an Israeli official raised the hope of future discussions.

'We met for an hour and a half ... (and) decided that we will not have any further meetings here in Helsinki," Ehud Gol, an Israeli Foreign Ministry spokesman, said after the breakdown in talks Monday.

But Gol denied the talks had failed, saying the two sides agreed to continue contacts through "proper diplomatic channels." Israel and the Soviet Union might send delegations to each others capitals for further discussions. he added.

Budget Deficit Estimates May Mean Major Trimming

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Today's estimates of the budget deficit, required under the Gramm-Rudman balanced budget law, will mean major spending cuts unless Congress can reduce the red ink, says the head of the Senate Budget Committee.

Congressional efforts to cut the deficit, however, may get a boost from the tax reform bill. Preliminary estimates show it will raise \$11 billion next fiscal year, although it is supposed to neither lose nor gain over five years.

In a letter to colleagues on the Senate budget panel. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., said a joint report due late today from the administration's Office of Management and Budget and the Congressional Budget Office will show an average deficit of slightly below \$165 billion - \$20 billion over Gramm-Rudman's \$144 billion maximum deficit for fiscal 1987. 1753 B4140 N .

Tax Bill Faces Problems

By Joseph Mianowany WASHINGTON (UPI) - The force that carried tax reform over one of its final hurdles, the House-Senate conference com-mittee, was not a desire to lower rates or improve economic policy. It was simply a wish to get a popular bill - and the deals cut in that final drive could be costly.

In the flurry of horse-trading that produced the measure, Sen. Bob Packwood. R-Ore., the business that was considerably rather intellectual leader of the Senate forces on the conference. had to give up a lot to Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-III., the head of the House team known more for being a tough, streetwise politician.

In the process. Packwood lost some valuable assets he had relied on heavily to push his radical bill through the Senate earlier this year.

Essentially, the conference committee's bill kept the most important of the symbols that Packwood had so prized - low tax rates. But in many other important areas. It resembles the bill passed by the House more than many senators care to think about.

When the Senate debated and passed its bill, Packwood's main argument was that the radical measure he guided to the floor was untouchable.

He contended time and again that no major change could be made to the bill or the entire measure would crumble.

He repeatedly stressed that the 'magic" of the bill was in its low tax rates of 15 percent and 27 percent for individuals and 33 percent for businesses. Those, he said, were the "Holy Grail" of tax reform and he stressed that if they were changed even one percentage point he would drop his support for the bill.

The tactic was a good one and won him Senate passage of the bill virtually unchanged. However, when he and his fellow senators bargained with the





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Let's Say Bye, Bye BIA

An election year usually brings a lot of rhetoric calling for change, but it is usually just that - rhetoric. Few proposals are specific and even fewer offer anything truly new

Rick Lavis, a Republican candidate for the 1st Congressional District scat in Arizona being vacated by John McCain, offered one of those rare bold political ideas at a recent forum in Mesa, Ariz.

Lavis called for the abolition of the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the distribution of the annual BIA appropriation to the various Indian nations to establish their own programs for the people.

He also called for incentives for the Indians to help educate their young people and reduce reservation unemployment with BIA funds.

Lavis, a former deputy assistant secretary of the Interior for Indian Affairs, believes the day of federal paternalism toward the Indians should be eliminated. The tremendous overhead of a bureaucracy like the BIA can be eliminated and the money more efficiently used by tribal governments to further individual tribal priorities.

The Indian nations are treated as sovereign entities on most matters. Yet, the most crucial portions of their existence, the implementation of social reform, education and economic assistance have been kept in the hands of white bureaucrats in Washington. They have little sense of Indian culture or priorities. All they have is money.

With access to the BIA funds and their knowledge of their needs and desires, a big step toward eliminating poverty, unemployment and ignorance on the reservations may be at hand.

Regardless of whether Lavis wins the seat, or even his party's nomination, we commend his approach to one of the great social problems of this country.

WASHINGTON WORLD Maryland Has Several Political 'Firsts'

By Arnold Bawislak WASHINGTON (UPI) — Maryland got a casonably good start in American politics.

One of the original states, its capital. An-napolis, was the site of the preliminary meeting that led to the drafting of the Constitution in Philadelphia. A few years later. Maryland had the distinction of providing the land that is now the District of Columbia for the national capital.

After that, Maryland became something of a political backwater.

It did provide one obscure Speaker of the House, George Dent. in 1797. and one very famous Chief Justice, Roger Brooke Taney, who presided over the Supreme Court from 1836 to 1864.

But Maryland, unlike neighboring Virginia, never produced a president or a major candidate for the post. In fact, the last Marylander to receive electoral votes in a presidential election was William Wirt in 1832. He got Vermont's seven votes, but Maryland's eight votes were divided between Andrew Jackson of Tennessee and Henry Clay of Kentucky.

Maryland did give the country a vice president. Spiro Agnew. but' the state doesn't brag much about him.

Agnew, and his successor as governor of Maryland, Marvin Mandel, probably had the most to do with giving the state a reputation in the 1970s for corrupt politics. But even in the realm of cash-and-carry politics Maryland was not regarded as a pace-setter, as connoted by the nickname "New Jersey South." given it by contemporary students of the subject.

There is. however. an area of progressive politics in which Maryland is a leader and an example to the rest of the country.

Maryland has more women in its congressional delegation than any other state. Half of the state's eight congressional districts are represented by women, and they make up almost 20 percent of the entire 22-member female contingent in the House.

In years past, many of the women in Congress got there by succeeding deceased husbands. Rep. Beverly Byron. D-Md., won the seat that had been held by her husband, but she has been no mere caretaker, winning re-election three

times on her own record.

The other Maryland women - Democratic Rep. Barbara Mikulski and Republican Reps. Marjorie Holt and Helen Bentley - got to the House entirely on their own, and like Byron probably could continue to hold their seats for the forseeable future.

But Holt is retiring and Mikulski is running for the Democratic nomination for the Senate seat being vacated this year by Sen. Charles McC. Mathias. R-Md.

Mikulski ran against Mathias 12 years ago and lost in a campaign that developed the slogan still seen on feminist T-shirts. "A woman's place is in the House ... and the Senate." Now, she is the favorite in a primary contest that includes the outgoing governor. Harry Hughes, and one of her House colleagues. Rep. Michael Barnes.

If Mikuiski wins the Democratic nomination Sept. 9. her Republican opponent probably will be Linda Chavez. a former Reagan White House aide and Civil Rights Commission official. Chavez has some opposition in the GOP primary, but like Mikulski is expected to win.

"I started searching around for a layman's explanation of what living with cancer was all about." Hastings says. Welcome **To New** Panama Jack Sachs' first surprise was

walking into the middle of a beauty contest.

He saw no reason to object. Quite the contrary.

"See." he jokingly told a traveling companion, "when I lay something on, I do it first class."

That was early in the morning of Thursday, July 10. The two had arrived in Panama City to discover the Miss Universe Pageant in full swing at their hotel.

Sachs, a New York attorney, and his companion were representing a client in a banking transaction. They had an appointment the following morning with a Panamian law firm.

They never kept it.

The trouble began with a delay over their rooms at the hotel desk. They were finally assigned to different floors.

Then Sachs was handed a letter left for him at the desk - that he instantly read as big trouble.

For several months, environmentalists and air tour operators have been battling. At issue is whether or not airplanes and helicopters should be allowed to fly into or over the Grand Canyon.

Several proposals have been made which range from banning flights into certain portions of the canyon to a total ban on flights over the national park.

Everyone agrees on one thing. The Grand Canyon is a national treasure. It must be preserved for future generations.

Environmentalists argue that flights must be above a level that will not disturb visitors on the ground or the park's wildlife. Operators say it is unfair to deprive visitors of the chance to view the canyon from the air.

But how do the people of Arizona feel about the issue? According to a recent survey by the Behavior Research Center of Arizona, a majority of the people of Maricopa and Pima counties, which contain most of the state's population, favor restrictions on sightseeing flights.

Sixty percent of those surveyed said that they favor limiting flights. Another 19 percent say that all flights should be banned.

Arizona Reps. Morris Udall and John McCain have introduced a bill in Congress to ban most flights below the rim. That is tokenism and will not solve the problem.

In light of the survey, Congress should enact a tougher ban, perhaps a 9,000-feet-above-the-rim limit. Flights still would be possible, but the rights of the vast majority, as well as the non-political wildlife. would be protected.

Airport Must Clamor For Funds

WASHINGTON - Incredible as it may seem. Federal Aviation Administration bureaucrats are willing to withhold money needed to make air travel safer in order to force airport managers to bow down to the FAA's standards on permissible aircraft noise levels.

The FAA apparently intends to make a test case out of San Francisco International Airport. which had the effrontery to set noise standards stricter than those of the federal agency. Determined to bend the airport's management to its will. the FAA has threatened to withhold \$8 million in federal funds earmarked for such safety improvements at San Francisco International as improved runway lighting.

Rep. Tom Lantos; D-Calif., in a letter to FAA administrator Donald Engen, seen by our associate

"I wish to re-emphasize my deeply held view that it is bad public policy to attempt to blackmail the San Francisco International Airport with the threat of withholding funds because of its appropriate attempt to mitigate the horrendous problem of aircraft noise - a nightmare for tens of thousands of citizens who live nearby.

"The airport continues to be under the threat that badly needed funds - to which the airport is entitled and which are for the safety of the millions of travelers who use unless the airport surrenders to the unacceptable demand that aircraft which do not meet noise standards be allowed to land."

What exacerbated Lantos' outrage was the fact that while the air freight company's complaint was being reviewed by the FAA, the agency's chief legal counsel, E. Tazewell Ellett - the man who will ultimately rule on the issue - was making public statements describing the airport's refusal to let Burlington Northern's 707s land as 'flagrant discrimination.'' 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Eager Fans Keep Mets' Turnstiles Spinning

(Editor's note: This is the third in a series on the 1986 Mets Are Amazin'. Today: The Fans.)

NEW YORK (UPI) - The New York Mets' huge lead in the National League East has ruined any chance of a tight pennant race. The Mets, however, are in the middle of an attendance гасе.

The Mets may reach three million in home attendance this season and join the Los Angeles Dodgers as the only teams in history to hit that plateau.

"We have a fighting chance to make it," Mets director of marketing Drew Sheinman said.

"But we've lost (larger crowds) through the threat of bad weather.'

The Mets concluded a homestand Aug. 10 with three straight sellouts against the Montreal Expos for a total of nine sellouts this season.

The Mets set a club attendance record and a New York City major league record last season when they drew more than 2.7 million at Shea, the 12th highest figure in major league history. They are ahead of that pace this season. After 51 home dates, the Mets' total attendance was 1,897,820.

Entering a six-game series against the Cardinals Aug. 14.

they had 26 home dates left and would have to average 42,392 to reach three million.

"The Mets have a good organization," said Barry Stockhamer. the Dodgers' director of ticket marketing and promotions. . "If they don't do it this year they have a good chance next scason.

Winning, weather and good marketing strategies are the key factors to bringing people to the ballpark.

"It's a combination of good

exciting baseball and planning Stockhamer said. "You have for a number of years, aggressive more people in April and May." sales and planning." said the Ironically the last obstacle of Mets' Sheinman. "Winning the Mets' road to three millio makes it easier, but you really have to have all the necessary ingredients lined up in advance clinch the NL East by early sales, promotions, etc., to make a total success.'

As for the weather Sheinman added: "The Dodgers have (they're) hungry for the team to weather. If you knew you had a 95 percent chance of clear, sunny weather (every game). you can plan well."

Stockhamer, who has been with the Dodgers since 1969, agrees

With the (good) weather you have bigger advance sales."

Ironically the last obstacle on the Mets' road to three million may be their overwhelming success this season. New York could September which may keep big crowds away until the playoffs.

"The fans will still come out, win," said Sheinman, who has been the director of marketing since January. "We have plans to maximize every game left in terms of attendance.

Sheinman said the Mets have lined up a promotion called "A September to Remember" to keep the Shea packed.

"It's added promotions on top of what is scheduled." Sheinman said.

Regardless of what is planned. fans say they will keep coming.

"I think they will still come out." Anjie Boyle, a season ticket holder from Middle Village, N.Y., said. "(We) waited so long for them to win."

Another season ticket holder. T. Barry Schlatter of Long Island, agrees.

"The fans will still come out even if they clinch (early)." Schlatter said. "We finally have a penant-winning team. (the fans will keep coming) even at the end."


Will Leonard Accept Hagler Arrangement?

United Press International Two promising quarterbacks joined the NFL Monday and one great running back left.

Jim Kelly and Chuck Long signed contracts with the Buffalo Bills and Detroit Lions, respectively, on a day New Orleans Saints running back Earl Campbell called his last as a professional football player.

Kelly signed a 5-year, \$8 million contract with the Bills. making him the highest paid player in NFL history. Kelly, who passed for 83 touchdowns in two seasons with the USFL's Houston Gamblers, is expected to take part in his first workout with the Bills Tuesday at their Fredonia state college training camp

At St. Louis, wide receiver Clyde Duncan, a first-round draft choice in 1984 who caught only four passes in his two-year NFL career, was released by the Cardinals. Duncan. 25, had signed a four-year contract worth a reported \$1.3 million, meaning he was paid about \$325,000 for every pass he caught for the Cardinals. At Denver, the Broncos waived 11 players, including former starting wide receiver Butch Johnson and veteran tight end Mike Barber, and placed four more on injured reserve. Leonard of College Park, Md., has a 33-1 record. He returned to the ring in May 1984 against lightly regarded Kevin Howard. He retired moments after he won the fight by technical knockout in the ninth round.

This spring Leonard shocked the fighting world when he said he would end his retirement a second time - but only to fight Hagler.

"I know I can beat Hagler, my way." Leonard said then. "I'm not going to fight Hagler his style, if you know what I'm saying. He's a big guy and I think I can outbox him, outmaneuver him and beat him scientifically."

USFL Files For New Trial To Raise Award

NEW YORK (UPI) - The U.S. Football League filed papers in federal court Monday. asking for a new trial to raise its \$1 antitrust damage award against the NFL.

USFL attorney Harvey Myerson cited jury confusion in the July 29 decision. The panel concluded a three-month trial by finding the NFL guilty of monopolizing pro football but awarded the 4-year-old league just \$1, which is tripled under antitrust law.

"The thrust of our motion is based on what we perceived to be, and what the country perceived to be, jury confusion." Myerson said Monday at a news conference in his law office.

Myerson said he has submitted an afladavit containing 42 news reports, which he claims supports the contention that the unless great pressure is exerted on the juror cities where there are no franchises.

A January state statute change allows political campaigning as close as 50 feet from polling places. Prior to the change, campaigning was re-stricted to 300 feet from the polls.

During the June 3 MTA referendum election - the first vote since the statute change campaigning to get the lottery issue on the ballot was done at 44 precincts, including 22 churches used as polling places in Seminole County, and all 22 called the county elections office to complain, according to elections supervisor Sandy Goard.

Ms. Goard said 37 of 93 county poiling places in the June 3 vote were churches.

"I've got to find someplace for people to vote. I hope we can get all this cleared up by the end of the week. We have to notify the voters, and advertise the poll locations," Ms. Goard continued.

She said anyone with a building large enough to host elections in the precincts where a polling precinct is needed should call her office.

Ms. Goard said she has gone so far as to send an elections staff person out to drive around the precincts "looking for a building big enough" to hold elections.

She said calls and letters began to come in from churches after the June 3 vote, and the list of six churches was compiled during the process of confirming poll locations.

One church pastor wrote to Ms. Goard after the June 3 vote, and said while the church is pleased to provide a community service by allowing its use as a polling place, "certain activities of that day dismayed us greatly and place in jeopardy our future willingness to provide this vital community service."

Pastor Gregory B. Champagne of the First Baptist Church, 770 Seminola Blvd., Casselberry, which was used for the 1,155 voters in the 52nd precinct, declined to allow another vote at the church in a June 6 letter.

During the June 3 vote, Pastor Champagne wrote. "I was soliciting on our property for an tion."

issue we strongly oppose. I would not have liked anyone soliciting without our permission but the pro-lottery group being here was intolerably unaccepta-

ble." The 1.155 voters who cast ballots at the church will now vote at the Senior Citizen Multi-Purpose Center at 200 North Lake Triplett Drive. Casselberry.

Another church withdrawing as a voter precinct is Tuskawilla United Methodist Church, 3925 Red Bug Lake Road. Casselberry.

"Our congregation cannot, in good conscience, loose control of our property on election days ... With current interpretation of the law, our church must immediately withdraw as a polling precinct," wrote Barbara Williams Riddle, church minister, in a July 30 letter.

Lewis B. Swaim, minister and chairman of the Board of Elders of Rolling Hills Moravian Church, on State Road 434, Longwood, wrote on July 14, "In view of the fact that ... the election law has been amended to allow solicitations, including the gathering of signatures on petitions on poiling place pro-perty, and in view of the fact that this law takes from us the authority to determine what happens on our church property. we have no choice but to deny the use of our church facility as

a poiling place." The 1,250 voters in the 47th precinct which formerly voted at that church will now vote at Long Hills Baptist Church, 1255 E.E. Williamson Road. Longwood, according to Ms. Goard.

The Lake Howell church has hosted 831 90th precint voters. who will now cast ballots at the Plantation Apartments Clubhouse, 2105 Howell Branch Road, Maltland.

Other churches have agreed to allow their buildings to be use for this fail's elections, after Ms. Goard agreed to provide a disclaimer sign reading. 



There's A New Look In Nation's School Lunches

ATLANTA (UPI) - Lunch is becoming as popular as recess in schools across America thanks to an ongoing push to make once-drab meals more like a field trip than a pop quiz in algebra.

"If you haven't been in a school . lately." said Eugenia Seay, coordinator of the School Nutrition Program in the Georgia Department of Education, "you wouldn't recognize school lunches."

There are salad bars, potato bars, taco bars and all sorts of other tasty offerings that provide students with a appetizing choice instead of a plateful of heartburn.

"Many schools serve lunch more like fast-food restaurants today instead of the old take-it-or-leave-it method," said Gene Vincent, a spokesman for the Food and Nutrition Service

Agriculture, which oversees school lunch programs for 24 million students nationwide.

"But they keep it more nutritious than fast food by cutting down on salts, sugars and fats."

The shift in school lunches originated in 1966 with the National School Lunch Act and Child Nutrition Act that required the Department of Agriculture to set minimal nutritional requirements. However, the biggest changes did not arrive until the past decade. Lunch planners began getting more creative - although keeping within the nutritional guidelines set by the federal government - and the result was more variety for students. who often preferred shooting green peas at each other to eating them.

The taste trend nationally is away from the old standards.

branch of the Department of Vincent said pizza has replaced hamburgers as the overwhelming school favorite. Chicken nuggets and Mexican dishes, such as tacos and burritos, are close behind along with make-your-own salads.

Cheese, pasta and nuts are in widespread use. The traditional carton of milk is still there, but schools also are required to offer either lowfat, skim or buttermilk. Fruit juices are available in some areas.

In DeKalb County, Ga., which includes part of Atlanta, students have an alternative to the typical tray lunch: they can select from salad, potato and fruit-and-cheese bars as well as soup-and-sandwich lines.

Dot Dusenberry, the county coordinator of food services who started as a school nutritionist 19 years ago, says the changes she has witnessed have been remarkable. "When I started, we offered

virtually no choice whatsoever," said Dusenberry. who is reponsible for feeding 50,000 students each day. "The child came through the line, got the tray and that was it.

"We were not nearly as concerned about overall nutrition or even teaching students something about nutrition. Of course, all this is more readily acceptable today because the public is much more aware of the necessity of good nutrition."

The new motto for lunch preparers in DeKalb schools is "Scratch and Batch," a theme typical across the nation as school kitchens improve operations with the use of computers and state-of-the-art equipment.

"We're going to prepare many more items from scratch and do more batch cooking," Dusenberry said. "More cooking in small quantities so we'll maintain the quality so when it's been just prepared."

It all sounds nice but seems awfully troublesome for kitchen workers preparing lunch for hundreds of students.

"Not really." Dusenberry said. "It offers us a challenge. We want to offer several choices and hopefully please everybody. That's the purpose of the whole thing."

In the past, very few were pleased and as a result, waste was staggering. Food many youngsters did not like - cabbage, green beans and cole slaw are prime examples - traditionally went untouched and landed in the trash heap.

Said the USDA's Vincent, "By having choices, there is less waste. I guess it's finally eaught on that there's no use in giving vitamins to the garbage can."

Dusenberry said her DeKalb system, as well as others across the nation, is providing niceroffered on the line it will have lunchroom atmospheres - in- j u s t k i d s .

cluding colorful decorations and meal garnishes - to help make the food more appealing.


"The key is to make meals not only more nutritious but appetizing," she said.

Most school lunches run around \$1, although nearly half of all students pay reduced prices or get lunch for free as a financial aid, Vincent said.

The federal government pumps \$3.5 billion into the school lunch program each year, making low prices possible and keeping school kitchens out of the red. But school meal planners still have to balance tight budgets and they have learned that it's smart to run their kitchens like little restaurants.

"I think school lunch people are more aware than in the old days that the students are customers," Vincent said. "Not

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Treatment Doesn't Suit The Problem

DEAR DR. GOTT - Several years ago I started to get severe itching after my shower; later, I began to itch at other times. Recently I had to have surgery and the doctors found that I had a very high red blood count. They removed four pints of blood. Now the polycythemia is controlled by a phlebotomy every two to four months. The surgeon thinks this is what's causing the itching, but the hematologist says it's my emphsyema. What do you think? DEAR READER - Both

doctors are correct: The cause of your itching may be the polycythemia (too many red blood cells) that, in turn, is caused by emphysema.

Patients with emphysema have too little oxygen in their systems. To counteract this, the bone marrow manufactures more red corpuscies - the cells that carry oxygen in the bloodstream. Although your pulmonary problem prevents oxygen from entering the lungs. your body has misinterpreted the cause of your low oxygen and is attempting to supply more corpuscles to pick up the oxygen that you are unable to breathe in. As a result, patients with emphysema frequently have polycythemia.

Treatment must be directed at correcting the oxygen abnormality, not at removing the excess blood cells that your body has been fooled into making. I'm a little surprised that your hematologist has chosen phlebotomy (blood removal) as therapy. This seems to be addressing a symptom, not a cause, of your difficulty. I have been taught that treating the emphysema, rather than the polycythemia, would be more effective. As long as your oxygen level is deficient, you will continue to make too many red blood cells.

In my view, there are at least three useful treatments for your emphysema:

First, bronchodilators may be helpful. Many emphysema patients have a tendency to develop airway spasm, which can be alded by drugs that relax bronchial passageways and allow

freer flow of air. Second, breathing exercises can improve the efficiency of air exchange in the lungs. Emphysema causes overinflation of the lungs. Patients can often be taught ways of more effectively emptying the lungs of stale air. These include the use of accessory muscles of respiration, including the abdomen.

Third, oxygen supplements might improve the oxygen levels in your system. Low-flow
