

Orange Juice Better Than Vitamin Pills

LAKELAND, Feb. 27.—(Special)—Orange juice, cod liver oil and the sun's beneficial rays are better than vitamin pills and "shots" in treatment of most persons suffering from nutrition deficiencies, the Army's wartime nutrition director believes.

Dr. John Harley Youmans, dean of the University of Illinois College of Medicine, who during the war was director of the nutrition division in the preventive medicine service of the Army surgeon general's office, told a group of doctors in Washington, D. C., recently that greater attention should be given to preventive measures and simple remedies in treating nutrition cases.

A Washington Evening Star reported that Dr. Youmans stressed the importance of a doctor training his patients to develop proper eating habits as a guard against recurrence of vitamin deficiencies, rather than seeking merely to provide temporary relief through use of concentrated vitamin prescriptions in intravenous injections.

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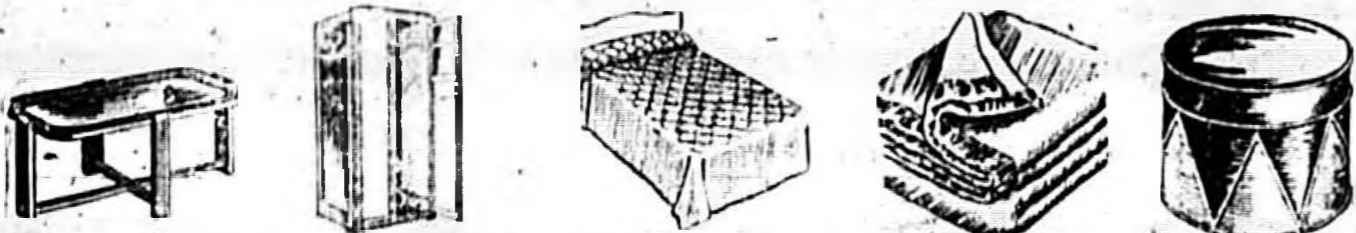

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2 Day Glider Meet Opens Tomorrow

Searchlight Display Scheduled Tonight; Contests Begin At 11 A. M. Saturday

Everything is all set for the First Southeastern States Glider Contest to be held Saturday and Sunday at the Sanford Municipal Airport, according to George Touhy, general contest manager, who predicted this morning favorable weather for the two days.

Many prizes will be given to contestants in the motorless plane soaring, and national champions in gliding will compete. Col. D. B. Herron's 915 Army unit is expected to arrive this afternoon to set up the giant searchlights which are reported to be the most powerful in the world and these will be turned on shortly after dark. At about 11:00 P. M., Richard Shotwell and Eddie Bergida of the Sanford School of Aviation are scheduled to make thrilling parachute jumps. They will be on display Army anti-aircraft batteries, and life saving rafts and equipment.

Pilots will hold a meeting at 9:45 o'clock Saturday morning, and visiting power plane pilots and the public may attend. From 10:00 to 11:00 A. M. there will be four flights; glider assembly, and pilots will receive their final instructions.

Between 11:00 o'clock and 1:00 P. M. there will be contest take-offs, spot landing contests, ribbon cutting, and a stunt take-off by Steve Bennis. Power gliders and demonstration of latest aircraft models will follow. At 3:00 P. M. there will be an aerobatic contest, followed by Army demonstration of radio controlled flight. At 10:00 there will be searchlight demonstration and at 11:00 o'clock an Aviation Ball will be held in the Main Hangar.

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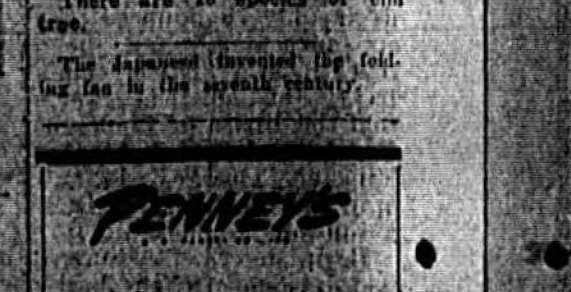

Soaring In Sanford

The First Annual Southeastern States Glider Contest gets under way tonight at the Municipal Airport where there will be a display of giant anti-aircraft searchlights and a series of parachute jumps by two former paratroopers who have over 450 jumps to their credit.

Thus will be inaugurated a fine new sport for the recreation loving state of Florida which has long been known as the "Millionaire's Playground" but is rapidly becoming an amusement park for everyone.

Soaring, though comparatively a new sport in this country, has long been recognized as one of the most fascinating of all aerial activities in Europe where ever since the first World War it has been developed as a preliminary training process for future fliers.

That Sanford is peculiarly well adapted for soaring is attested by such well known authorities as Paul Tuntland who first discovered the admirable thermal conditions existing here when serving in a weather observation project for the U. S. Weather Bureau at Pinecastle last year.

It is largely through the efforts of Mr. Tuntland, and those enthusiastic soaring friends of his, Steven and Virginia Bomb, who are now in the process of becoming "native sons," and the enthusiastic co-operation of William C. Lazarus, State Aviation Director, that this soaring meet has been brought to Sanford.

With the co-operation and support of the senior Chamber, City officials and the merchants of Sanford, the First Southeastern States Glider Contest, should be an outstanding success.

The Warm Antarctic

The most exciting geographical discovery in many years was that lately announced by Admiral Byrd's expedition. It is the finding of an apparently warm area in the Antarctic, warm enough at any rate to have bare earth and what seem to be unfrozen lakes.

Veterans Administration Warns Quick Senate Passage Seen On Chiselers of GI Benefits For 2-Term Tenure Amendment

WASHINGTON—The Veterans Administration is carrying on a quiet but vigorous drive against ex-GIs who are "chiselers," too many benefits.

Principal offenders are former servicemen who have been collecting both jobless pay and educational or training subsistence allowances.

There have been instances in which a veteran has sought to obtain subsistence allowances from two different employers at the same time.

VA officials point out that up to the present they have had their hands full getting the various programs in operation. Now, however, the routine machinery is functioning smoothly and enforcement efforts can be put on a rigid basis.

The VA emphasizes that dishonest veterans are far in the minority, but will help out a number of "chiselers" by punitive action in the past few weeks.

THE NEWFOUND FRIENDSHIP between AFL and CIO maritime unions may give a push to the larger issue of merger between the two labor groups.

CIO President Philip Murray is expected to appoint a five-man committee to confer with a similar delegation from the AFL on "organic unity."

It is possible that Joe Curran, president of the CIO National Maritime Union, will be named to the committee. Curran was instrumental in bringing about the AFL-CIO maritime union harmony.

"Small Farm" Is 50 Acres Larger Now

CHICAGO—That nostalgic vision of a little farm out on the prairie, with a white picket fence and a few chickens, is a little farther from the city traffic snarl, will have to undergo revision.

The little farm ain't what it used to be. Specifically, it's bigger and growing all the time.

The department has all sorts of statistics on this trend. For example: (1) The average farm is now 50 acres larger than it was in 1920.

(2) Today over half the farms and half the farms have more than 500 acres, compared to only a third of all farms in 1920.

Mostly, the mechanization of farm crops and the building of big cities has pushed the farmer out to the edge of the prairie and spread the mechanical reaper plant on the north side of the Chicago river.

The ride and trade, also the sale and lease of the black bass fisheries, will become idle during the month of March, Kennedy announced. March is the month when the season closes on these fisheries.

The director explained that in all districts of the State of Florida, except the Third District, no person shall take or be in possession of any black bass during the month of March this year.

The new closed season was brought about by the extremely warm weather in the southern part of the state where the spawning season was found to be practically over by the first of April. Consequently, the Commission deemed it practical to eliminate the month of April as a closed season in all districts except the Third.

In regard to the Third District, the part west of the Aucilla River, no person shall take or be in possession of any black bass during the months of March and April of this year.

Other species of fresh water fish may be taken at any time over the entire state with the exception of the counties of Bay, Calhoun, Franklin, Gulf, Jackson, Liberty, Washington and Wakulla. These counties are restricted during the months of April and May of this year.
