

## NATION IN BRIEF

Revenue Sharing

### Legislation Proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) - Should the nation's mayors, county officials and governors be allowed to use revenuesharing money to visit Washington, meet with congressmen and lobby for more revenue-sharing

Rep. Jack Brooks, chairman of the House Government Operations Committee and a vociferous opponent of revenue-sharing, insists that they should not, and he is pushing an amendment to revenue-sharing legislation to insure that they do not.

Whether money allocated to the nation's states, program is actually used to fund trips by public officials to Washington is difficult to determine. The money is distributed with few federal instructions on how it should be spent, and in most cases it goes directly into a general

But Brooks suspects that cities and states have, in some way, used the money to pressure Congress into giving them more money.

The revenue-sharing program has become extremely popular with the local and state officials, returning to their jurisdictions approximately \$30 billion from the federal treasury since it was started in 1972.

### Truckers Return To Work

ARLINGTON HEIGHTS, Ill. (AP) - Teamsters union truck drivers returned to the roads today, but trucking irdustry leaders say the settlement that ended their threeday nationwide strike is going to cost the public money. The agreement, reached Saturday night, now goes to the rank-and-file for ratification. It was recommended unanimously by union negotiators. A simple majority is needed for approval, a Teamsters spokesman said, and results of the mail balloting will be available in two to

Meanwhile, officials at union locals throughout the country reported their members returning to work. Plans by General Motors Corp. and other auto manufacturers to shut down several plants today if the strike continued were canceled, although one GM plant will remain closed because of a shortage of parts.

### More Airlines Competition?

WASHINGTON (AP) - Legislation to introduce more showcase of the Ford administration's efforts to provide what it says will be new benefits to American consumers. A Senate panel starts hearings Tuesday on the proposals which would shorten the federal regulatory reach over the airline industry that says it likes govern-

It would allow the airlines new freedom to raise and lower their rates on a route-by-route basis and make it easier for new and existing carriers to start service on . new routes or halt service on routes that are unprofitable.

### **Hopefuls Face \$ Shortage**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Presidential hopefuls are facing a growing shortage of money because of the inactivity of the Federal Election Commission. Ronald Reagan said over the weekend that a lack of money has forced him to dispense with a charter plane for

And other candidates indicated that the lack of federal money will soon be having an effect on them too, unless the commission gets back in business by being restructured to meet the requirements of the Supreme Court.

Callaghan Is New

**Prime Minister** 

LONDON (AP) - Foreign Secretary James Callaghan was named to succeed Harold Wilson today as prime minister and leader of Britain's ruling Labor party. He is a strong advocate of improved relations between Western Europe and the United States.

Callaghan, 64, who represented his party's center-right majority, defeated Employment Secretary Michael Foot, 62, a left-winger, in a vote by Labor members of Parliamnt. He got 176 votes to 137 for Foot.

The new Labor party leader was assured of an early evening summons to Buckingham Paiace from Queen Elizabeth II. Her royal assent, a formality, is needed to make him prime minister.

### Sadat Ousts Soviet Navy

PARIS (AP) - Egyptian President Anwar Sadat says he canceled the Soviet navy's rights to use Egyptian ports when he terminated the 15-year Soviet-Egyptian friendship treaty last month.

His statement at a news conference Sunday confirmed earlier reports that the Soviet navy's rights to use the Mediterranean ports at Port Said, Alexandria and Matruh

Sadat said the friendship treaty was canceled because the Soviets were putting pressure on Egypt by refusing to let India provide spare parts for Soviet arms previously supplied to Egypt.

### Congress To Debate Issues

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two of the most controversial subjects before the Congress this year are up for formal

debate this week in the Senate. Debate was scheduled to begin today on a 43-provision compromise measure drafted by the Senate Agriculture Committee to overhaul the foodstamp program. And, on Thursday, the Senate Budget Committee will

call up its initial resolution on federal spending for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1. That resolution would limit actual spending to \$412.6 billion, Revenues are calculated at \$362.4 billion. That would mean a budget deficit of \$50.2 billion.

## Court Rules **Need Tightening**

The Twentieth Century Fund, an independent research organization engaged in policy studies, has long been concerned about the balances bet ween America's free press and the rights of it dividuals and institutions.

In 1967 the Fund study "Crime and Publicity" found reason to believe that the press was losing ground in its efforts to cover the courts. Another study issued recently "Rights in Conflict," con cluded that the restraints courts are imposing on the media are "a growing threat to freedom of the

Four major problems concerned authors of the study. More and more judges are forbidding the thouse, excluding the press from court proceedings or forbidding reporting of trials and imposing gag crucas on participants in thats. They also believe that the press lacks a method to appeal judicial arbitrariness quickly which often means that a constitutionally invalid order often continues past the point when news value of trials passes.

Appropos the last point, it is significant that nearly all gag orders are usually modified or rescinded by appeals courts—and the United States Supreme Court has never sustained one. The closest it came was when publication of the Pentagon Papers was restrained temporarily while the court considered the government's suit. However, Justice Henry Blackmun currently is prohibiting the publication of evidence given in open court in a murder trial until the Supreme Court adjudicates

Most conflicts between the constitutional guarantees of a free press and fair trial are not as dramatic, usually involving minor murder cases, secrecy, court harassment of reporters and contempt citations. No matter how obscure they are, each involves a major rightfreedom of speech and communications. Each also encourages more of the same.

Quite apart from the American citizens' right to know, the First Amendment also assures that the adversary American system of justice is fair to both sides of a dispute and that no official is arbitrary and vindictive—in other words, a fair trial.

The Twentieth Century Fund concludes its most recent study of the press and courts with the conclusion that "courts can maintain the Sixth Amendment's promise of a fair trial as well as the First Amendment's promise of free speech and press by a general tightening up of procedures that stop short of forbidding publication or taking judicial proceedings underground."

## Robbing Taxpayer

Disclosures of cheating in the Medicaid program, the federal government's answer to the health problems of the poor, indicate that up to \$4 billion annually is siphoned from the program fraudulently. The direct victim is the American taxpayer, but the


ultimate losers are the poor and elderly who are supposed to benefit the most. The funds diverted to bill padding, kickbacks, duplicate billing, illegal claims and other abuses are denied to people who really need help.

Hospitals, laboratories, pharmacies and other providers of specialized services are involved in the offenses. Doctors, however, are the chief culprits, according to federal investigators. Physicians were the targets of 73 per cent of federal medicare abuse investigations last year. They say Medicaid probes reveal the same pattern. Other dispensers of health care depend upon doctors for cooperation in their illegal practices.







## Help Your Heart Beat The Odds

Heart attacks are the number one health problem in the United States - but we need not feel impotent before this catastrophe. What we have created, we can reverse. In order to reverse habits or conditions which might be leading toward a heart problem, a special coronary risk screening program called 'Heartbeat' is to be con-

ducted in Seminole County this week. The 'Heartbeat' program will be conducted with the cooperation of the Florida Hospital and physician consultants. It is available to all county residents. The 'Heartbeat' program was developed by J.A. Scharffenberg, M.D. of Lama Linda University in California as a preventative measure against heart disease. It endeavors to discover and alert individuals with high heart attack risk and to educate the public of these factors and how to avoid them.

It is not the purpose of 'Heartbeat' to diagnose or treat heart problems. This should be done by the participant's

The objective of 'Heartbeat' is to detect and urge individuals to modify certain conditions predisposing to heart disease. It is hoped and believed that if these risk factors are discovered and altered, disease and mortality The program consists of a 12-hour fasting blood test to

When the results of the blood tests are returned from the laboratory, and the questionnaire has been analyzed by a physician as to recommended programs, such as exercise, dietary habits and other factors, then a report is typed on each participant.

A coronary risk evaluation booklet, along with the test result report, is given to each participant when he attends the group evaluation session. This is held two to three weeks after the blood drawing - in Seminole County, the group evaluation session will be held on April 29 from 7 - 9 p.m. at the Seventh Day Adventist Church, Moss Road,

At this evaluation session, the physician explains in general terms to the group as a whole, the meaning of the reports and the material contained in the coronary risk evaluation booklet. Although 'Heartheat' is a non-profit program, a \$15 fee will be charged per participant to help defray expenses. The participants are encouraged to show the results

of the blood tests to their physicians. The effectiveness of the program depends on the participant following his physician's advice and adopting a way of life that will reduce heart disease risk factors. Specific follow-up programs will be offered at various
