Cone mystery solved

SANFORD — It looked like orange traffic safety cones were sprouting up like mushrooms Wednesday in the Seminole County Courthouse parking lot. At midday 22 cones were blocking 13 parking spaces. However, they hadn't been put out to save primo parking spots by lunching courthouse workers. Sanford Parks Department employees blocked off the spots early in the day to facilitate removal of several small trees which are dying. An anonymous donor is giving the city several Laurel Oak trees to replace the ailing ones, according to parks supervisor Howard Jefferies.

Reception planned for Sturm

CASSELBERRY — A reception sponsored by Dot Boling in honor of the late Seminole County commissioner Bob Sturm will be held following his funeral tomorrow at Casselberry Senior Citizen's Center on North Lake Triplet Drive. The center will be open an hour before the noon services at St. Augustine Catholic Church for food drop-offs.

Ciotti sentenced

ORLANDO — A Lake Mary man was sentenced to five years in federal prison Wednesday for possession of LSD.

Erich Ciotti, 19, was also ordered to serve five years probation following his prison time by U.S. District Judge G. Kendall Sharp.

Ciotti was arrested by Seminole's City-County Investigative Bureau after paying an informant \$1,200 for enough LSD to make several thousand "hits" of the drug. During his arrest in early April, Ciotti rammed a CCIB vehicle head on at a Lake Mary convenience store, slightly injuring two agents.

Surfer bitten by shark

JACKSONVILLE — Arthur Quick says he doesn't plan to stop surfing just because a shark bit his left foot.

"I'm not going to let a little fish scare me out of the water," said Quick, who was surfing Tuesday at Jacksonville's Huguenot Memorial Park when a 3-foot shark attacked.

"All of a sudden, I wasn't going nowhere," the 19-year-old surfer told The Florida Times-Union. "When I started to pull my foot out, he started flipping. I was scared. I just wanted to get my foot out of that thing's mouth."

Quick was wading in about 2 1/2 feet of water near a school of mullet. The bite hit the bone in his foot and left markings of two rows of teeth.

The shark attack was the second in five days in Jacksonville. Jerry McInarnay, 16, was bitten in the foot when a shark attacked him about 60 yards off Little Talbot Island on Sept. 9.

They were the first shark attacks reported off Duval County since 1981 and the 11th and 12th recorded in the past 100 years, said George Burgess, a senior biologist at the University of Florida.

Walkway collapses

ST. PETERSBURG BEACH — Five British tourists suffered minor injuries when a walkway to a catamaran collapsed, pitching them into Boca Ciega Bay along with cable, nails and chunks of wood, police said.

Twenty Britons were walking toward the boat for a farewell cruise when at least 12 landed in the water Wednesday. Three were taken to Palms of Pasadena Hospital, where they were treated for minor injuries and released.

Rest areas guarded

Tourist murders lead to armed cops along I-4

LAKE MARY — Travelers at rest stops on Florida's Interstate highways are being protected by armed law enforcement officers these days. Officers from the State Department of Agriculture are guarding the 14 rest areas in Seminole County.

Michele McLawhorn of the DOA's Consumer Services Department in Tallahassee said five uniformed officers and two investigators were sent to the three rest areas in the Seminole/Orange County areas early yesterday. "We will be sending at least six more today to help relieve them with these long shifts," she said.

All of the personnel are certified law enforcement officers and are armed.

Gov. Lawton Chiles ordered dozens of officers from various state police agencies to put aside their normal duties to guard rest areas.

Police sweep draws protest

MONTICELLO, Fla. — The tactics of an intense police sweep that rounded up at least a dozen youths for questioning and fingerprinting in a British tourist's slaying drew protests from some parents in this small town.

"They just feel like they can do anything," said Susan Mae Johnson, mother of a 16-year-old brought in for questioning Wednesday. "They said he might be involved. I'm not going for it."

With no prime suspects and little more evidence to go on than the stolen car used by the attackers, authorities sum-

State 4th-grade reading poor

TALLAHASSEE — The latest test scores for Florida's college-bound seniors aren't bad, but when it comes to how well the state's fourth-graders can read, the news is dismal.

Fifty-one percent of Florida fourth-graders fell below the basic reading level for their grade, according to a report from Washington by the National Center for Education Statistics, part of the U.S. Department of Education.

Specific figures for Seminole County students were not available at press time.

"Number one, there has to be more emphasis on basic reading and writing skills," Education Commissioner Betty Castor said Wednesday.

But, she was quick to add, Florida is handicapped because English isn't the first language of many students.

"Our demographics are overwhelming, especially in those younger grades with a far larger portion of fifth-graders and below who are coming from families where English was not the primary lan-

Board member resigns in protest

SANFORD — Bill Horn, 66, was elected to serve on the Sanford Civil Service Board as of August 25. Last night, Horn attended his first meeting and promptly resigned.

"I did it out of protest to the city," he said. "When they verified my election Monday, the city commission told the city attorney to draft an ordinance which would prevent any future Civil Service Board member from being related to a present city employee."

"That would prevent me from being re-elected to serve on the board," he added.

Horn was employed by the city as superintendent of Building Maintenance since March, 1981, and retired in July of 1990. His son is a member of the Sanford police department. Horn was elected to serve the unexpired term of See Resign, Page 5A

Finding money for affordable housing projects

Sanford could hike building permit fees

SANFORD — City Manager Bill Simmons said he may reconsider a proposal to raise building permit fees to generate money for affordable housing projects.

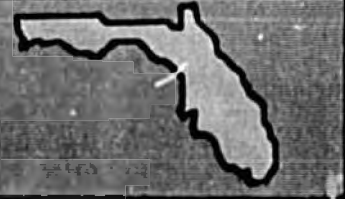
Simmons said this morning that a suggestion from GoldenRule Housing and Community Development Corp. may help rekindle interest in the proposal considered by the city six months ago. Then, Simmons said he briefed commissioners on the potential to have a steady income from permit fees.

Simmons said the proposed 15-cent-per-foot increase would likely generate less than \$50,000 annually. He said such a fee, if adopted, probably would not begin to accumulate revenues until late next year.

In August, GoldenRule director Amelia Geuka wrote the late county commission chairman Bob Sturm and Mayor Bettye Smith seeking \$75,000

Pilot training program scrapped

WHITING FIELD — A program that trains enlisted personnel who have at least two years of college as pilots will be scrapped in October because of a reduced need for naval aviators.

The Naval Aviation Cadet, or NAVCAD, program has been implemented periodically, usually during wars or national emergencies, but most recently was revived in 1988 as part of the Reagan administration's plan for a 600-ship fleet.

"With the end of the Cold War and the Navy on course for a smaller fleet, the program is being discontinued," Lt. Dan Bates, spokesman for the Bureau of Naval Personnel, said Tuesday.

Pilot training again will be limited to commissioned officers who must be college graduates.

NAVCADs receive commissions upon winning their wings, which leaves them two years behind officer-trainees in the promotion chain. They also must finish their college degrees within seven years to remain in the service.

HRS ordered to pay negligence award

FORT LAUDERDALE — The state child protection agency was ordered to pay a \$14.5 million negligence award to a young boy who suffered permanent brain damage after repeated reports of abuse.

Joseph S. Bellamy was 6 months old when his mother was accused of throwing him against a wall and violently shaking him for crying and not eating in November 1985.

Attorney Sheldon Schleisinger charged the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services was repeatedly called before that, but "they dropped the ball on each occasion."

HRS received three abuse reports on the boy before he was hospitalized. But attorney Bartley Miller, who represents HRS, contends the brain damage was caused but misdiagnosed a month before hospitalization — and 12 days before the first abuse call.

The Fort Lauderdale boy, now 8 years old, needs constant custodial care.

Miller promised an appeal of Wednesday's decision.

13-year-old boy murdered

FORT WALTON BEACH — The death of a 13-year-old boy is being treated as a homicide because he was beaten before he drowned in the Gulf of Mexico, a police spokesman said.

An autopsy results show Nicholas Maxwell Bishop of Fort Walton Beach had been hit in the face and head with a blunt object, although the cause of death was drowning.

Tourists found his body floating face down in 2 feet of surf Monday night behind a hotel on a Santa Rosa Island beach near here.

"We are making some progress" in the case, said Okaloosa County sheriff's spokesman Rick Hord on Wednesday.

Dr. Edmund Kielman, the deputy medical examiner who performed the autopsy Tuesday, said Bishop suffered from internal bleeding and very severe black eyes.

Officer exonerated for running over kids

CRESTVIEW — A woman was charged with giving alcoholic beverages to five children on the night the youngsters were run over by a police car while they slept in a street, killing one.

Shirley Mundy, 29, was charged Wednesday with three counts of felony child abuse in connection with the accident. She also faces two counts of sexual activity with a child and multiple counts of delivering marijuana and alcohol to minors during the preceding six months.

Mundy is the mother of one of the children and aunt of two others who were injured.

Investigations by the police, Florida Highway Patrol and state attorney's office exonerated the driver, officer Terry L. Selvaige, of wrongdoing.

County sets tentative tax rate

SANFORD — Seminole County commissioners set their tentative tax rate Tuesday night for the next fiscal year about a half of a percent lower than the current year's rate.

Following more than three hours of public input, mostly protesting their property value increases, commissioners agreed to hold a special work session Sept. 24 to review the citizens' proposals. Commissioners also adopted their tentative \$276.3 million spending plan for the year beginning Oct. 1.

Tentative tax rates can be lowered at the final adoption hearing Sept. 28, but not increased without notifying each property owner, a costly delay.

Commissioners set their tentative tax rate at the "roll back" rate of \$5.39 per \$1,000 of taxable property, three cents less than current rate of \$5.42. The roll back rate is the tax that generates the same amount of

revenues from the previous rate for existing properties, excluding new construction and re-appraisals.

A property owner of a \$100,000 home taking a \$25,000 homestead exemption will see their countywide tax payment drop from \$406.50 to \$404.25, a \$4.25 savings. Unincorporated residents, paying taxes on \$75,000, will see a \$5.25 savings on their county, fire and road taxes.

Several residents Tuesday night had specific proposals for cuts. Grant Malloy, president of Central Florida Tax Action Network, submitting a list of cuts, which recommended:

- Abolish the Cooperative Extension Service to save \$323,674.
- Eliminate the county's tree farm at a savings of up to \$94,984.
- Abolish the economic development program for a \$365,340 savings.
- Slashing program improvements from \$9 million to \$2 million, allowing the added

gas tax penny to be eliminated.

● Reconsider vehicle purchases.
● Eliminate a \$5,000 appropriation for Charter Review Commission travel and office expenses.

● Eliminate \$40,948 from county commissioner's and county manager's expenses.

● Eliminate a \$40,000 water and sewer rate study, noting the county raised water and sewer rates 18 percent last year.

● Shopping around for computer equipment to save 50 to 75 percent from the suggested cost of hardware.

● Requiring employees to pay their own disability insurance, a \$150,800 savings.

● Selling Sanlando and Sylvan Lake Parks for \$10 million to \$15 million and cutting the size of the Recreation Division.

● Delaying plans for a multi-year, \$75 million building construction program until more county services can be shifted to private firms.

SCC rehires teachers, consolidates positions

SANFORD — A move designed to save Seminole Community College money three years ago has ended up costing the college quite a bit more.

In 1991 when the state legislature and state Department of Education made severe cuts in the education budget, the college tried to save money by eliminating the positions of the three teachers.

Now, all three have been rehired and they have been paid nearly \$130,000 for eight months of salaries and benefits.

When their positions were eliminated, Matilda Morabito was teaching culinary arts, Robert Reko was teaching welding and Joe Williams was teaching upholstery.

The classes suffered from low attendance and were eliminated so the college could channel funds into more popular courses. Now, all three have returned to SCC full time. All but one are in non-teaching positions.

"It was time to move on," Williams said. "It's another key to open another door. I needed a good, vibrant change."

Williams will be paid \$63,589 as nighttime coordinator. He said he is in charge of scheduling and overseeing the new night programs at Lake Howell and Oviedo high schools. He also serves as a liaison between

nighttime instructors and the administrators and staff who work during the day.

The position had been shared by a variety of staff members from the time the paid position was eliminated six years ago until Williams took over the job.

From October, when he was officially rehired, until July, Williams was working part time at Lake County Area Vocational School teaching upholstery. SCC paid him the difference between what he was making and what he would be making as a full time instructor at SCC: \$25,311.

"I think the board did a fair thing," Williams said.

Morabito has been given a new job training position which was created especially for her. She will be paid \$52,203 a year to help train and find jobs for unemployed special needs students.

Two part time employees who recently held those duties have left and the new position was created.

From October through July, she was paid \$35,827 to help prepare a safety report for the federal government.

Reko was rehired to teach welding during the night program only, lowering his hours from 30 to 12 per week. He was still paid \$37,624 annually.

"I think the decision of the board of trustees is one that everyone can be happy with," Williams said. "I think everyone will find this acceptable."

NAFTA opposition high in agriculture rich Florida

TALLAHASSEE — Florida representatives are worried citrus and vegetable growers back home won't support the Clinton administration's attempts to open a North American free trade zone, a survey indicated.

Only one backer of the North American Free Trade Agreement was found in an informal AP poll Wednesday: Democratic U.S. Rep. Sam Gibbons of Tampa, whose area could gain export jobs from trade growth.

Among Florida's 10 U.S. House Democrats, only two of those responding remained undecided about the agreement. Among the state's 13 House Republicans there were no supporters, and only three members undecided.

Florida's top Democratic state officials are divided over the pact.

Gov. Lawton Chiles has said Florida and Mexico can work out agreements to jointly sell farm products, and Mexico can become a new market for Florida fertilizer, computer parts, paper products and transportation equipment.

State Commerce Secretary Greg Farmer estimates trade growth under the agreement would create at least four new manufacturing, seaport and airport jobs for every farm job lost.

But Agriculture Secretary Bob Crawford has said even if agriculture workers could be trained for new jobs, "Our farmers don't want to be retained."

"Farming isn't a job, it's a way of life — a way of life we're not ready to part with," Crawford told

a U.S. House Agriculture Committee hearing in Orlando.

Crawford estimates NAFTA could wipe out 54,000 of Florida's 500,000 agricultural jobs, trading a sure thing — Florida's \$6 billion-a-year agriculture industry — for a gamble on future jobs.

However, U.S. Transportation Secretary Federico Pena said Wednesday the state would benefit from liberalized trade with Mexico, and urged small-business officials in Miami and Hialeah not to listen to "fear-mongering" opponents of the agreement.

"No state has a deeper stake in passing NAFTA than your state," Pena said. He said exports of Florida crops to Mexico have increased 28 times since 1987.

Members of the congressional delegation, like

Republican U.S. Rep. Dan Miller, got the same message from constituents during their August recess.

"I'm traditionally a free-trader, but they had some legitimate questions," said Miller. The Bradenton businessman said he is reconsidering his original leaning in favor of the agreement.

Miller heard from believers in Ross Perot's refrain that the pact would cause a huge "sucking sound" as 5.9 million jobs vanished south of the border.

His district also includes major citrus and tomato growing areas around Ruskin and Manatee County.

"No one can tell them they are going to be better off under NAFTA," Miller said. "They are going to be in direct head-to-head competition."

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23-year fugitive, anti-war protester surrenders

BOSTON — For months, Katherine Ann Power struggled to reconcile her desire for freedom with her need to answer for her actions as a young anti-war radical.

As she stood in court 23 years after the bank robbery that sent her into hiding, her family struggled too — torn between joy at the reunion, pride in her decision, sorrow at her fate.

Power, 44, pleaded guilty to charges of manslaughter and armed robbery in state court in the Sept. 23, 1970, robbery and killing of a police officer.

"This building isn't big enough to contain my grief," Power's husband, Ron Duncan, said, fighting back tears as his wife calmly surrendered.

Power, 44, had lived since 1977 in Oregon, under the name Alice Metzinger. There she

raised a son, worked as a chef, taught cooking classes, paid her taxes.

Duncan, 57, married Power a year ago after a 13-year relationship, apparently aware of the truth.

Her closest brush with the law was in 1974, when authorities figured out one of her aliases, her lawyer said. The FBI dropped her from its most-wanted list in June 1984 for lack of leads.

On Wednesday, the case ended. After 18 months of negotiations, she surrendered.

"I look at this as the end of an era, if you will. It's kind of like closing a book," said Boston Police Commissioner William Bratton.

Power's 14-year-old son, Jaime, learned his mother's true story about a month ago. Power held a farewell party and revealed her secret to friends three days before she surrendered.

Doubts about Mideast agreement

I don't particularly enjoy being the skunk at this garden party, but I must admit to having grave doubts that peace in the Middle East has been brought any closer by the agreement just reached between Israel and the Palestine Liberation Organization.

First, a few preliminary questions. What, or who, brought about the agreement? Certainly not the Clinton administration — the deal was struck in secret face-to-face negotiations between Israel and the PLO in Norway, and afterward Israeli Foreign Minister Peres had to track down Secretary of State Christopher in Santa Barbara, Calif., (where he was vacationing) to tell him about it.

What caused agreement to be reached at this particular time? Almost certainly, exhaustion on both sides. Ordinary life for Israelis has been made almost unendurable by recurrent episodes of Arab terrorism. As for the Arabs, the collapse of the Soviet Union deprived them of their chief supplier of weapons. They could only visualize themselves becoming relatively weaker in the years directly ahead.

What has actually been agreed to? It is here that the balance tips heavily against Israel. It has turned over the Gaza Strip to Arafat — no great

loss, it is generally agreed. But it has also turned over Jericho, the de facto capital of the West Bank, and any Middle Easterner can tell you what happens when a camel gets its nose inside the tent.

In return, Israel has gained ... what? The signature of Yasir Arafat's representative, who can plausibly claim to represent some fraction (but only a fraction) of the Palestinian Arabs, on a piece of paper saying Israel is entitled to permanent existence and security within its borders.

These are far from equal concessions. The late James Burnham was fond of saying that "Who says A must say B" — or, in other words, that taking the first

step in a logical progression inevitably leads to taking the others. Israel, having agreed to give an elected Palestinian council certain legislative powers over the West Bank and Gaza, and give Palestinians in Gaza and Jericho extensive control of their internal affairs (plus a police force), must now face, year after year, further political and territorial demands from a political entity that they themselves called into being. They can say "No" once, or five times, or 10 times; but they cannot, and will not, say "No" forever.

As for the Palestinians, they will keep right on believing that Palestine — all of it — is rightly theirs, and there will, as the years roll on, be no lack of ambitious politicians to inflame them, and their fellow Arabs in adjoining regions, against the Israeli "invaders."

In reply, Israel will point to the PLO signature. In the same spirit (and with about as much effect) Britain today could point to the Treaty of Nanking, which it signed with representatives of the Emperor of China in 1842, and under which it received title to Hong Kong in perpetuity. Today, the Chinese couldn't care less. It was, they say, an "unequal treaty" — and who is contradicting them?

The walls came tumbling down

Tension — for some, even palpable fear — gripped the West Wing of the White House and seventh floor of the State Department as America's leaders awaited word of the fate of their ally, Israel, which was fighting to survive. It was June 1967.

General Yitzhak Rabin was becoming a hero of the Six Day War. In a pre-emptive strike, Israel vanquished the much larger force of Gamal Abdel Nasser's Egypt, captured the Golan Heights from Syria, seized the West Bank, which was the safe haven of Palestinian terrorists — and forcibly sealed its right to survive forever.

Yasir Arafat was establishing himself as the leader of the al-Fatah guerrillas who would rain terror, vowing to destroy Israel — there could be no other solution — to regain a Palestinian homeland.

Bill Clinton was embarking upon a job in Washington as a young go-forer for Chairman J. William Fulbright, D Ark., of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

And I was covering my first crisis as a Washington correspondent, shuttling between Lyndon Johnson's White House and State Department. I was seeking answers from officials who, in an era of uncertain global communications, knew little more than I about events on battlefields halfway around the world. There was a brief explosion of confusion when a State Department spokesman said, in an unthinking response to a reporter, that yes, the United States was officially neutral "in word, thought, and deed." But the spokesman dashed back to say that, of course, he'd misspoken. Israel was America's ally. The United States wasn't even on speaking terms with Egypt, a Soviet client.

Fast-forward to Monday, Sept. 13, 1993. Twenty-six years of images blur before our eyes; suddenly we see scenes once unimaginable.

There is Rabin, now Israel's prime minister, and a burmose-topped Arafat — walking in peace across the South Lawn of the White House with Bill Clinton, now president.

Yitzhak and Yasir (and Bill). They climbed four small steps to a makeshift ceremonial platform — and reached unprecedented heights. There were speeches of measured eloquence. Rabin spoke directly to the Palestinians. "Enough of blood and tears. Enough... We have no desire for revenge... We are today giving peace a chance. And we are saying to you: Enough!"

Arafat embraced the theme of the day: "Our two peoples ... want to give peace a real chance." And Arafat extended his hand to Rabin, who grasped it — the audience of dignitaries gasped and ooohed.

The Israeli-Palestinian breakthrough was born in the days when the Berlin Wall crumbled and the Soviet Union collapsed. No longer could the Palestinian Liberation Organization's Arafat be a client of the Kremlin. Nor, of course, could Syria's Hafez al-Assad. The war in the Persian Gulf forged a new coalition that was once unthinkable but became unshakable: Traditional leaders of the Arab world (Egypt, Saudi Arabia, and even Syria) joined with the West in opposing the forces of Islamic fundamentalism and extremism (Iraq and Libya, plus the extremists in Iran).

Yet doubters and doomsmen remain on all sides. Hear ex-Reagan ambassador to the United Nations Jeane Kirkpatrick. She notes that the PLO had been created to destroy Israel and that Arafat is opposed by extremists in his own ranks. She asks: "Why did (Israel) choose Arafat — of all people — as its negotiating partner?"

Answer: Because one makes peace with enemies, not friends. And the ever-shrewd Rabin has strengthened Arafat just in time to give peace a chance.

So it was that the secret Israeli-PLO agreement was built upon a firm foundation not of mutual trust, but distrust — the clear-eyed realization that Israelis and Palestinians cannot be expected to blindly trust each other, so there must be signed agreements, internationally guaranteed, leading step-by-step to peace.

On Monday, Sept. 13, 1993, the new age of satellite communications carried news images of peacemaking live from the White House to Jerusalem and Jericho. And the walls came tumbling down.

Astronauts float out hatch

SPACE CENTER, Houston — Two astronauts in bulky white spacesuits floated out Discovery's hatch today for six hours of testing tools and techniques for the all-important Hubble Space Telescope repair mission.

Astronauts Carl Walz and James Newman, both first-time spacewalkers, were so eager to start their big day that they began donning their suits early and left the airlock nearly a half hour ahead of schedule. Walz was the first man out.

"It looks like a beautiful day for a spacewalk," Newman said. The excursion is considered a dress rehearsal for the Hubble mission in December.

Bargaining marathon ends

DEARBORN, Mich. — A 40-hour bargaining marathon between the United Auto Workers and Ford Motor Co. ended with tentative agreement on a contract that includes lower pay for new employees and improved retirement benefits.

The three-year pact, reached Wednesday and still subject to ratification by union members, is expected to serve as a model for the auto industry.

New hourly workers at the No. 2 automaker will earn 75 percent of what current workers make.

What will health care package cost?

WASHINGTON — Victor Siegel wants better health care for the 25 workers at his hardware store, but he's got a question about President Clinton's plans to change the system: "What's it going to cost me?"

Carol Oudegeest of Sunnyvale, Calif., likes the work surgeons did on her bum knee, but she thought \$2,407 was a little pricey for crutches. "Did someone pocket that money?" she said in a letter to Clinton.

They and other ordinary Americans were getting a chance today to pose their questions directly to the president, who is using a personal touch to kick off his health care campaign and open a debate that promises to stretch well into next year.

Ultrasound may be unnecessary

BOSTON — The practice of routinely giving ultrasound scans to all pregnant women is not only unnecessary, it may waste more than \$1 billion a year, a landmark study concludes.

Researchers found that 80 percent of all mothers-to-be are at such low risk that they do not need ultrasound unless problems arise.

"Doctors using their judgment about when to order ultrasound tests results in just as good care as doing it routinely," said Dr. Bernard Ewigman of the University of Missouri-Columbia, principal author of the study.

Prominent blacks voice criticism

WASHINGTON — Judging from the noise being made by prominent blacks at the Congressional Black Caucus' annual meeting, one would think the Republican administrations they loved to hate were still in power.

On Wednesday, they voiced the same criticisms against President Clinton that they had lodged against Presidents Bush and Reagan for 12 years before: Too little is being done about racism; there's no policy on civil rights; leadership is not coming fast enough from the White House.

"We're looking for moral leadership," said Lani Guinier, Clinton's abandoned nominee for head of the Justice Department's civil rights division. "We're looking for a president who's not afraid to talk about race in a public forum. The entire country is running from this problem."

Sorcerer's apprentice

Secrets of the shamans from the innermost jungle

WASHINGTON — He has sampled potent hallucinogenic snuff in French Guiana, lived among Indians armed with poison-tipped arrows in Suriname and witnessed a Yanomamo exorcism deep in the jungles of Venezuela.

Once, his canoe sank in a Peruvian river, miles from nowhere, where insects swarm so thickly they could eat a man alive.

Adventure and danger are part of a day's work for Mark Plotkin, a Harvard-educated scientist who has found his calling in the lush rain forests of the Amazon.

Plotkin is an ethnobotanist. He studies the healing properties of rain forest plants through the age-old wisdom of tribal shamans, or medicine men.

To do so he lives for weeks in remote villages, getting to know the people, earning their trust. He even gulps down their "dread cassava beer," a syrupy concoction made by women chewing up cassava — a type of shrub — and spitting into a pot.

Armed with his camera, backpack and hiking boots, he makes his way through forests with men dressed in loincloths, who negotiate their way perfectly with no shoes and no noise.

They may look primitive, but they out-science the trained scientists.

"Talking about plants with these people is like playing basketball with Michael Jordan," he says. "They know

everything." Between trips to the Amazon and work for a conservation organization in Washington, Plotkin has written "Tales of a Shaman's Apprentice," a fast-paced memoir of his Amazon adventures.

He hopes his many stories will spark interest in his work and in the urgency of fighting to save the rain forests.

"We're standing on the edge of a precipice," Plotkin recently told an audience at the Smithsonian Institution. "Thousands and thousands of years of accumulated knowledge of how to use plants in the rain forest is about to disappear."

The rain forests are full of medicinal plants that Indians have used for centuries to cure everything from coughs and colds to diabetes. This leaf brewed in a tea helps digestion. The sap of that tree is good for the blood. Squeeze this fungus into ears and earaches disappear.

Somewhere in among the thick tree trunks, leaves and brilliantly colored flowers may be a cure for cancer, a cure for AIDS or the elusive cure for the common cold.

But without the knowledge of the Indians, they may never be found. And the people with that knowledge are growing old and dying.

That's why Plotkin and Washington-based Conservation International, where he is a vice president, have started an apprenticeship program to help elderly Indians pass down their knowledge to the younger generation.

It's an idea that Plotkin got studying with a shaman among the Trio Indians in Suriname. He promised the tribal chief he would give the tribe back what he had learned by translating his research into the tribe's native language.

To do so he worked with younger Indians, sparking their interest in preserving the ancient ways. They are now learning from the shaman themselves.

A similar apprenticeship program is under way with the Bri Bri Indians in Costa Rica.

It is Plotkin's firm belief that nothing should be taken from the forests without something being given back in return. It isn't right, he says, for pharmaceutical companies to

grow rich off the knowledge of poor tribes.

Take the case of curare — the Indian arrow and blowdart poison first brought back West by explorers as early as the 18th century. Curare can kill quickly by causing its victims to suffocate. But in lower doses, it is a highly effective muscle relaxant — used for problems like lockjaw and epilepsy.

It's a staple in hospitals worldwide.

But when Plotkin went to visit the Macushi Indians in Guyana, the blowgun hunters whose poison first sparked the interest of Western scientists, he was shocked to find they had some of the trappings of modern life — boom boxes, sunglasses, Bibles — and that he had to teach them about curare. The tradition had died out.

He is working now to get pharmaceutical companies interested in cooperative arrangements in which they pay tribes back for the medicines they help the outside world uncover.

"You can't check these people out, take all their plants back home, say 'Thanks a lot' and leave it at that," he says. "That's not acceptable."

But a lap-10 mixup between Ponder and Peter Chichitano at the start/finish line sent Chichitano to the pits and Ponder to the rear of the pack.

Ponder was back in the top five by the 12th lap, took over fourth two laps later, moved into third on lap 17 and second on lap 19 before finally taking over the lead on lap 22.

"All the guys were running real good, but we had a goal in mind," Ponder said after his win but before the announcement from NASCAR. "We knew we wanted to run well tonight."

Rogers, a Sunbelt Region champion two years ago at Volusia County Speedway as the track's Winston Racing Series champion in the Late Models, jumped into the lead by the end of the second lap, then set sail for the rest of the 30-lap feature.

Bobby Blake finished second, taking over the spot after Ronnie Burkett and Guy Thomas tangled with two laps to go. Burkett came back to finish third, Thomas was fourth, and Jeff Burkett came in fifth.

Laughlin started on the outside pole of the 15-lap Street Stock race but was in the lead after the first lap and stayed on the point for the rest of the dash.

Daytona's Tony Ponder is officially the Sun Belt Region champion of the NASCAR (National Association of Stock Car Auto Racing) Winston Racing Series for 1993, officials announced Tuesday.

The 30-year-old Ponder won 15 of the 22 races he competed in at Volusia County Speedway in Barberville during the 22-week NASCAR Winston Racing Series season, which ended Sunday. He will receive \$25,250 for the title.

The Sunbelt Region is one of eight regions that the series is divided into. The series includes 96 NASCAR-sanctioned weekly short track across the country. Tracks in the Sunbelt Region are located in Florida, Alabama, Texas, California, North Carolina, Missouri, Nevada and Arizona.

Ervin Breiten of Atascosa, Texas, who raced at San Antonio International Speedway, finished second in the Sunbelt Region. Ponder scored 3,516 points, while Breiten tallied 3,450 by winning 12 of 21 starts. Regional

standings are determined by the 30 finishes posted by drivers during the 22-week season that runs from April through September.

Mike Goldberry of Bolivar, Missouri, finished third with 3,420 points, followed by Bruce Stone of Madison, Alabama, with 3,300 points, and Monk Clary of Brodnax, Virginia, with 3,385 points.

David Gibson of Apopka was sixth. Completing the top 10 point earners were Kevin Rinker of Riverside, California, Linwood Arnold of Clayton, North Carolina, John Royster of Middleburg, North Carolina, and Donny Horeika of Jourdanton, Texas.

Barry Beggarly of Pelham, North Carolina, champion of the Mid-Atlantic Region, won the NASCAR Winston Racing Series national championship.

Ponder and the rest of the top 10 drivers from the Sunbelt Region, along with drivers from the seven other regions, will be honored at the NASCAR Winston Racing Series banquet at the Opryland Hotel in Nashville, Tennessee on November 6th.

F1 trial over for Andretti

NEW YORK — It appears that Michael Andretti will make a less than triumphant return to the Indy car circuit.

The 30-year-old Andretti cut short his disappointing Formula One rookie season and will sign a contract, possibly as soon as today, with Chip Ganassi Racing, sources told The Associated Press on Wednesday.

Andretti, mostly ineffective on the international circuit through the first 13 races of 1993, will leave Team McLaren without competing in the final three races of the season.

"It's a done deal, they've just got to sign the contract," said a source who spoke only on the condition that he not be identified. "He's coming back to the States."

Sources close to both Team McLaren in England and the Ganassi team said the situation will be clarified by Friday, with an announcement possible by today.

Andretti won the Indy car PPG Cup championship in 1991, as well as finishing second in 1987, 1990 and 1992. He had 27 poles and 27 race victories in an Indy car career that began in 1983 and ran through the 1992 season.

But the son of longtime Formula One and Indy car star Mario Andretti, a four-time champion in the American open-wheel series and the 1978 Formula One champion, wanted to make his mark in the international series.

At the end of the 1992 season, the younger Andretti signed a reported three-year contract with Team McLaren.

However, things did not work out well, with McLaren losing the powerful Honda engines and a

series of rule changes making 1993 mostly a nightmare season.

"Everything has been new to me this year and there just hasn't been enough time on the racetracks," Andretti said recently. "We're limited on the number of laps we get each day during race weekends, and what I need most right now is seat time. You have to be familiar with the tracks to really find the limit, otherwise you either fall short of the limit or, worse, you go over it."

With three Formula One events left, Andretti has seven championship points, including four from a third-place finish Sunday at Monza, Italy. He also has a fifth and a sixth, but has failed to finish a majority of races because of accidents and mechanical problems.

Andretti apparently will be released from the remainder of his Formula One contract and will be replaced for the rest of the Formula One season by Mika Hakkinen of Finland, who has been under contract this season as McLaren's test driver.

It was not known if Andretti will drive in either of the final two Indy car events this season — Sunday at Nazareth, Pa., and Oct. 3 at Monterey, Calif. Both Andrettis live in Nazareth.

Arie Luyendyk is the current driver for Ganassi, who apparently will retain the 1990 Indianapolis 500 winner and run a two-car team in 1994.

Andretti was replaced this season on the Newman-Haas Racing team by 1992 Formula One champion Nigel Mansell of England, who became Mario Andretti's teammate and currently leads in Indy car points.

Mansell is expected to announce this weekend that he has signed a two-year contract to remain with Newman-Haas.

Some board members said they felt it was justified after a student survey found that 27 percent of sixth-graders and 49 percent of eighth-graders said they were sexually active.

Under this program, school health care workers will give condoms to students only on request — and after they have been counseled about risky sexual behavior and safe alternatives.

What is your opinion of this, Abby? I just can't see handing out condoms to school children. Don't you think it's the same as giving kids permission to have sex — and even encouraging it?

NERVOUS IN NEW YORK DEAR NERVOUS: No. Keeping children ignorant is far more dangerous than teaching them what they need to know. When children are at risk of dying for any reason (for example, AIDS is a killer), we have a moral obligation to do whatever is

necessary to save them. DEAR ABBY: Many years ago when I lived in the Midwest, I was married to an abusive man who forced me to write a bad check. It was so long ago that I'm fuzzy about the details. It happened sometime between 1968-'72. The check wasn't more than \$10 or \$20, but when it bounced, the service station manager who had cashed it had me arrested. I don't remember if it was a county or a city jail. I was fingerprinted, paid a fine, as I recall, made good on the check and was released. I spent no time in jail, and that was the end of it. It was the only trouble I have ever been in my whole life.

Now the problem: I am interested in a job with a nationally known company. As part of its

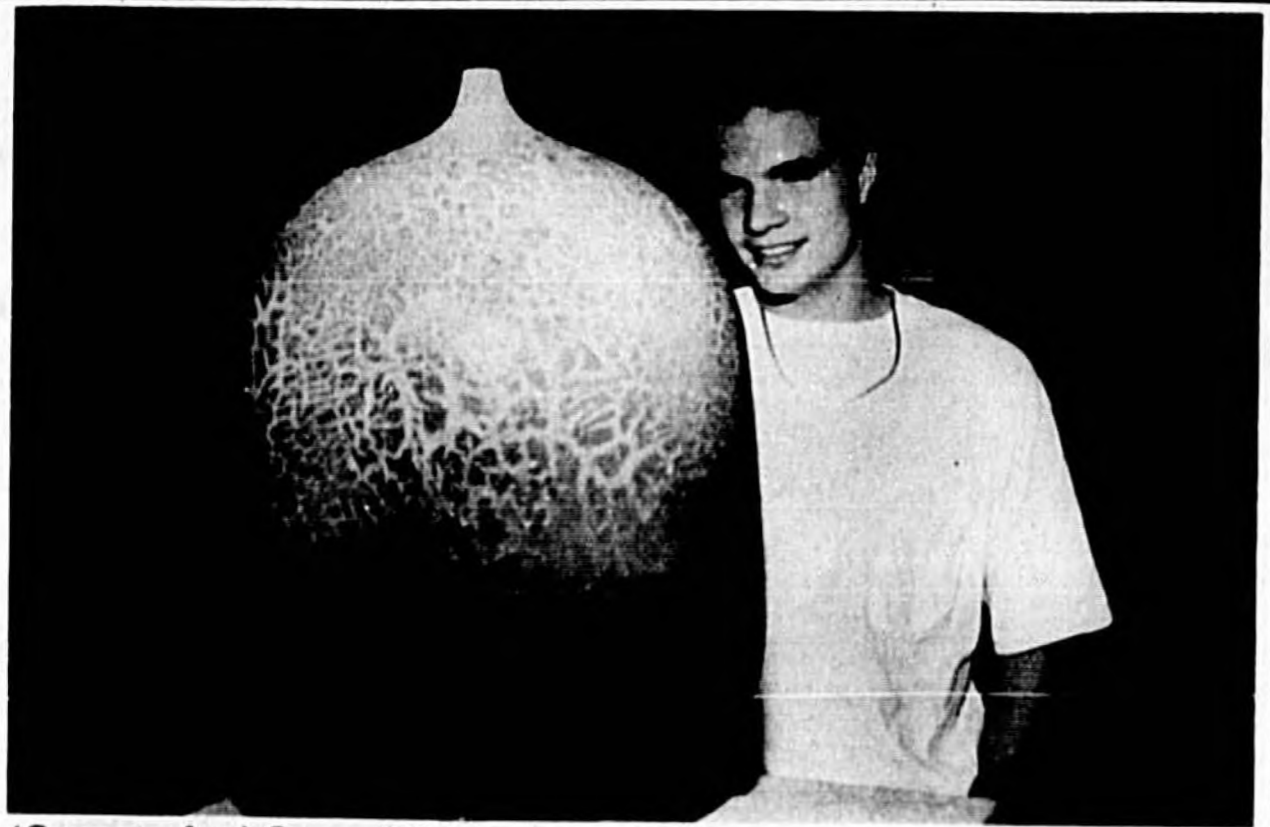

Can you help? I don't know whom to consult about this. And I don't want to ask questions that might call attention to my dilemma. How do I get the facts?

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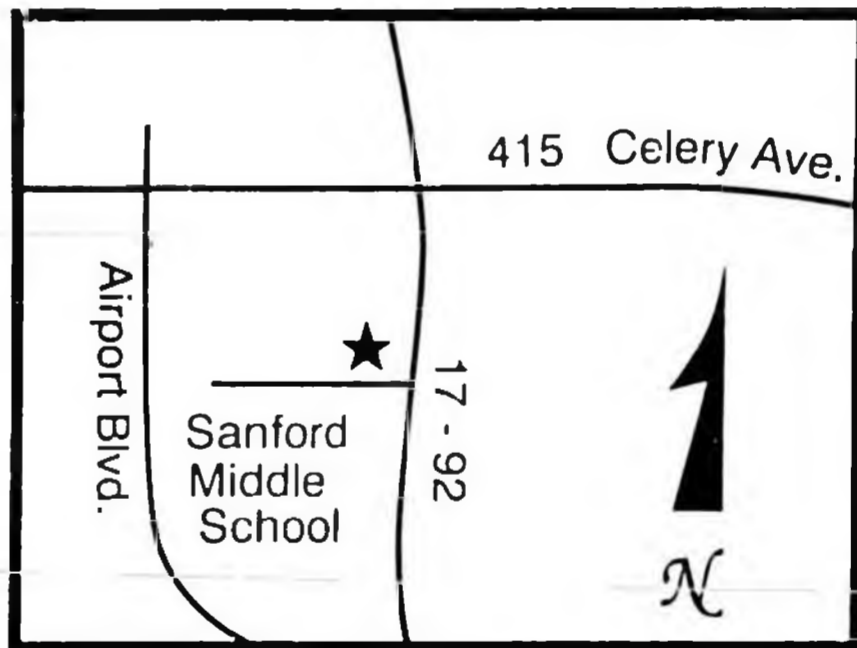

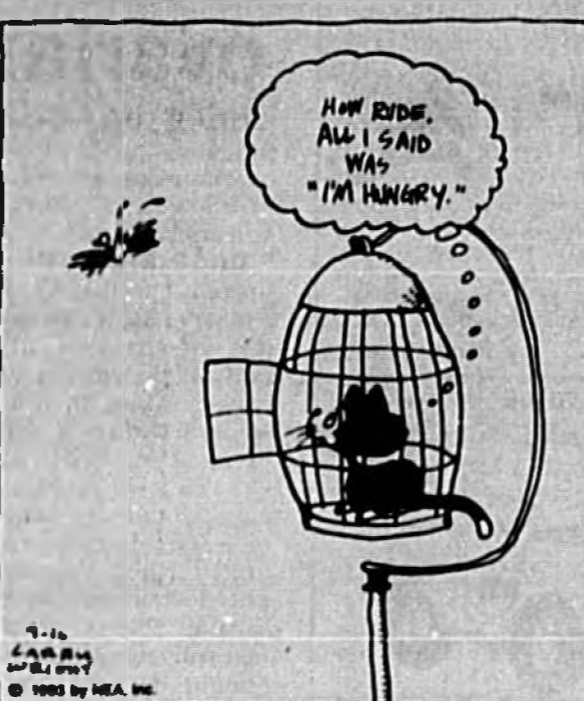

How to test for ovarian cancer cells

DEAR DR. GOTT: Please discuss the test CA-125 for ovarian cancer. Should it be done yearly, such as Pap smears?

DEAR READER: CA-125 is a protein produced by ovarian cancer cells. It can be detected in the bloodstream of up to 80 percent of women with ovarian cancer. Thus, it is a useful way of monitoring a patient's progress after treatment; if the CA-125 level increases, a physician would be suspicious that cancer cells are growing again and further therapy (such as chemotherapy) would be indicated. There is no hard-and-fast rule about how often the test should be performed. This decision is usually made between the doctor and the patient.

The CA-125 antibody test is not used as a screening test (to discover unsuspected cancer in healthy women) because it is not entirely reliable. For instance, 20 percent of women with ovarian cancer will not react; and the test may be positive in women with liver damage (and no cancer).

Thus, the test is merely one of many methods used to identify recurring ovarian cancer in women who have been previously treated. In addition, women who have a strong family history of ovarian cancer and who are at higher risk for this disease should probably have CA-125 testing periodically, at the discretion of their gynecologists.

DEAR DR. GOTT: During a recent examination that included a thallium stress test, I discovered I had a silent heart attack with no pain. My main arteries were not clogged, and my doctor said it would probably never happen again. What is your opinion?

DEAR READER: In rare instances, prolonged spasm of a coronary artery can lead to death of cardiac muscle (from lack of oxygen): a heart attack.

Although your doctor may be correct that this will not happen again, it's unsettling nevertheless.

I believe that your physician should prudently treat you with low doses of medicine -- such as beta-blockers or calcium-channel blockers -- to prevent

another spasm. If he chooses not to, request a referral to a cardiologist for a second opinion.

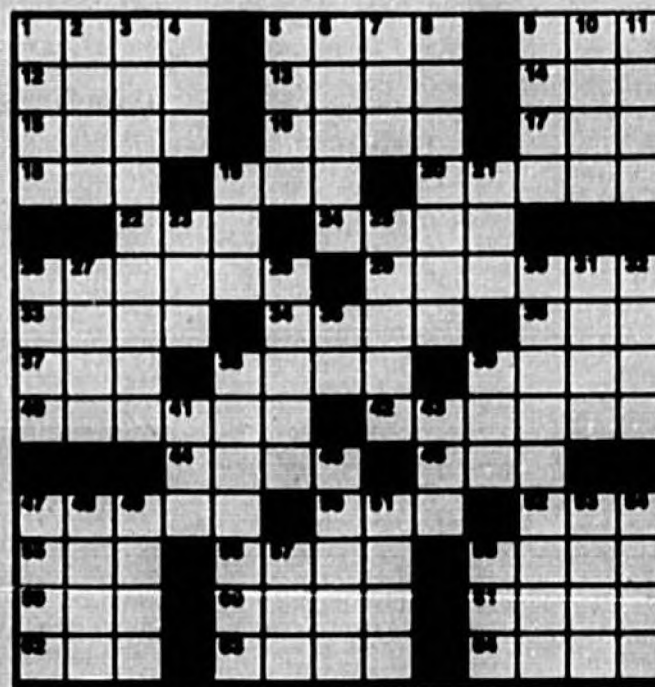

WIN AT BRIDGE

No sooner had I written last week's column in which a four-spade contract on a 4-2 fit was the only making game, than I came across today's deal. It occurred during the team event at the Icelandic Air Championships, held in Reykjavik last February.

Were North and South beginners? Far from it. They were two of the greatest players ever, Italians Giorgio Belladonna (North) and Pietro Forquet.

So what happened? Well, West's opening bid of two diamonds was the so-called Multi. It usually hides a weak two-bid in hearts or spades. Belladonna made what he thought was a natural overcall of two no-trump, but he had forgotten an exotic partnership agreement. They play that this bid shows interest in hearts.

Forquet liked the idea of hearts, of course. Belladonna raised what he thought was a five-card suit because clearly West held spades, and Belladonna didn't have a stopper there. (At the other table in the match, the first two bids were the same, but South just raised to three no-trump. East led the spade king and the defense took the first six tricks.)

West led his club. Forquet, despite the paucity of trumps, had no trouble in winning the first 10 tricks: four hearts, two diamonds and four clubs.

"God is still an Italian," observed Belladonna with his characteristic big smile.

Note, though, that if West had been an Italian, he would have led a low spade. On the third round of spades, East discards one of his minor-suit cards and the contract cannot be revived.
