Longwood mom indicted for slaying 3 kids

The Seminole County Grand Jury issued a three-count first-degree premeditated murder indictment Tuesday against Andrea Noel Williams, 32, for the deaths of her three children in early May.

The indictment charges that Williams planned to kill Ilona, age 9; Ian, age 6; and Ivey, age 5, and carried out her plan between May 7 and May 10 at the family's home at 890 Georgia Ave., in Longwood. The exact cause of the death remains open pending final autopsy results.

Investigators suspect Williams fed the children stolen prescription pills sometime Mother's Day and watched them die about two hours later.

After the children died she moved them into one bedroom and placed them under a trundle bed. No trauma was found on their bodies.

Assistant State Attorney Pat Whitaker presented testimony to the Grand Jury from a Longwood Police Department detective and a medical examiner. Ms.

Williams remains in the Seminole County Jail where she is being held without bond.

Townhouses slated for downtown

A Volusia County man plans to build residential units on Palmetto Avenue

SANFORD — A Volusia County developer will publicly unveil plans Thursday night to build eight townhouses on one of the more blighted blocks in downtown Sanford.

John Giuliani of DeBary proposes to demolish the existing tire and mechanic shop on the west side of

Palmetto Avenue between 2nd and 3rd streets and build a mixed use residential/retail development if the city approves his plans. The Historic Preservation Board

(HPB) will consider the project Thursday night and determine whether to issue a certificate of appropriateness. If HPB approves the project, Giuliani will need to obtain a condi-

tional use permit and submit site plans to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The property on Palmetto Avenue between 2nd and 3rd streets is actually divided into

eight separate lots. Giuliani plans to building eight separate buildings that about each other.

"There will be an inch between the buildings, but you won't be able to see it," Giuliani said.

The two-story buildings will see for \$375,000 to \$400,000 each, Giuliani said.

Council seeks greater police borders

SANFORD — A speeding motorist is pulled over by a Lake Mary police officer on County Road 46A. How much does the citation cost?

Depending on what side of the street and where the infraction took place the driver could slide away with absolutely nothing. It's a loophole in a state law that the Council of Local Governments of Seminole County (CALNO) is looking to close with any luck of gaining support from the legislature and law enforcement associations.

CALNO, which has a representative from all seven cities, the county, school board and Seminole Community College, unanimously approved a resolution last week that would encourage the state to amend the statute to slightly increase law enforcement jurisdictional boundaries.

Currently, municipal police officers are only allowed to provide mutual aid outside its boundaries for a felony or misdemeanor involving the breach of peace. A civil traffic infraction is another issue.

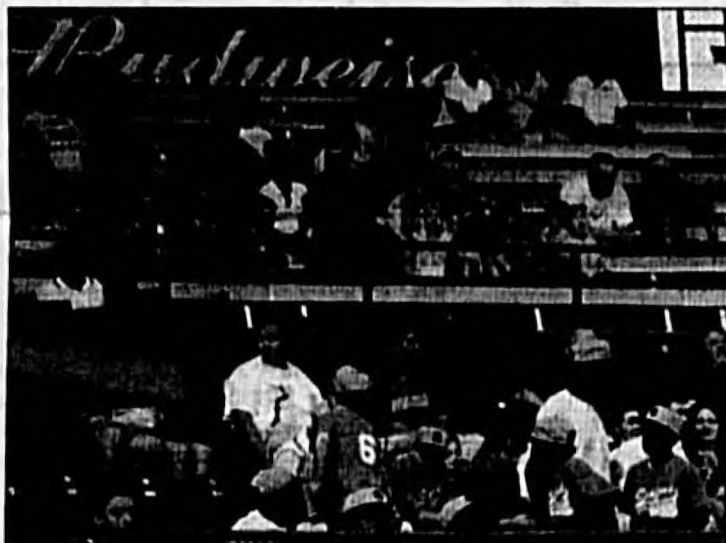
According to Lake Mary Commissioner Gary Brender, several cases have been recently dismissed in Seminole County because the officer writing the ticket was outside its municipal boundaries — by only one lane of traffic. Around many of the cities in Seminole County the yellow line painted on the roadway is all that separates two municipal jurisdictions.

"If an officer is driving

Farmers' market reopens

SANFORD — The State Farmers' Market open-air pavilion is officially back in business, and with a few new twists officials say it may be better than before.

Standing empty for much of the spring, the retail market that

offered

vendors an opportunity to peddle fresh fruits and vegetables to locals

closed after Less than

three months from its grand opening.

The project was a community redevelopment project with participation from the U.S.17-92

Community Redevelopment Agency, the city of Sanford and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. After it's

rapid decline from an average of about 20 vendors on every Friday in its early months of operation to a measly three in February, some local officials and citizens began to criticize the public project.

Venus transit is a passing lesson

SANFORD — To conduct a science lesson sometimes a teacher doesn't need a classroom — or students for that matter.

Lawton Chiles Middle School teacher Joe Laughlin set up a video camera Tuesday morning on the banks of Lake Monroe to catch the spectacle of "Venus Transit 2004."

Unlike other astronomers in the eastern hemisphere, the planet crossing the sun was only visible in Florida for less than an hour, and for those Seminole County observers even less as clouds shaded the view for sometime.

With a convex-lens equipped telescope projecting the image of the passing Venus into a homemade shadow box, Laughlin spoke to a recording

video camera as if he were teaching class. Looking directly into the focused sunlight of the Venus transit can burn the retina of the eye, he said.

"Since it's occurs only every 120 years, I decided I'd put some package together," he said. "We just have to get a cooperative sun here."

About 15 minutes after sunrise, a large cumulus cloud lifted to the east, and the show began. It would be Laughlin's next to last chance to catch the celestial wonder. Venus Transit will occur again in 2012 but then won't return for another 120 years.

Laughlin started the astronomy lesson with a history about Capt. James Cook.

Sponsored by England's Royal Academy in 1768, Cook's mission was to cross the Atlantic to reach the island of Tahiti before June 1769 to

observe the transit of Venus. Using trigonometry, Cook and 76 observers around the globe were to use the passing of Venus to calculate the size of the solar system.

"Can you imagine if it was cloudy that day after all that," Laughlin quipped.

According to historical records, Tahiti's weather wasn't the problem for Cook, but rather his inability to determine when the transit exactly started or ended.

"Imagine running a race without a definite start or finish," Laughlin said.

In one of his "in-box updates" where Laughlin crawled into the shadow box in the back of his Plymouth Voyager, he pointed out how the planet becomes fuzzy when it reaches the end

of the sun. "It's like when you almost put your two fingers together," he said. "Now I see the problem he faced 240 years ago and you can see it for yourself."

As a result, Cook's and the other observations of the 1769 Venus transit were not accurate enough to judge distances of the solar system. With advanced still photography in the 19th century, astronomers were finally able to precisely determine the finish and end of the transit, Laughlin said.

"(Cook) made sacrifices for the good of people for the advancement of science and the advancement of people," he said to the video recorder. "Can you imagine putting your whole year into this? Let's think about the sacrifices these people went through to give you what you have today."

Laughlin said his pre-recorded lesson would be used as a tool in teaching lenses and math in his eighth grade science class.

"Practical everyday use of it people don't need, but if we lose the history of this that's not good," he said.

eastbound and sees an oncoming vehicle doing 70 mph, in some cases he technically cannot turn around a write a ticket," Brender said.

The proposed one-sentence amendment to the state law would give public agencies the option of entering a mutual aid agreement to authorize officers to enforce traffic laws on roadways adjacent or bisecting its boundaries.

"The sheriff's office would be in support of such an arrangement because it would clarify any and all jurisdictional questions concerning traffic enforcement particularly where one jurisdiction abuts another, i.e. the city of Lake Mary and the city of Sanford adjoining in the middle of the roadway, which often happens," said Chief Deputy Steve Harriett of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office. "Literally, the center of the median will be the legal boundary so on one side of the road is the city of Sanford and the other side is the city of Lake Mary. There are others where a city has half of a roadway and the county has the other half of the roadway."

The definition of legal boundaries can be difficult to ascertain for all municipal police forces because with annexations the lines are often always changing. For motorists facing a hefty traffic fine in court knowing which

city the offense took place can be a last ditch effort to skirt the law, but Brender insists the attempt to change law is for the general safety of the public.

"The key is traffic enforcement can be a preventive action for accidents and those type of things," he said.

Harriett agrees, though he speculates getting the measure approved in Tallahassee may be a tall order.

"In this day and time when traffic safety is such an important and priority matter in our various communities it would seem to me that it would be something the community would desire," he said.

"This whole concept is going to require the statewide support of the Florida Sheriffs Association and Florida Police Chiefs Association, all of the county government organizations," Harriett said. "Certainly it's worth discussing and seeing if there is legislative interest in tweaking this issue, but it is going to be a major undertaking to get this to become state law. I can assure you of that."

Harriett added if the change in law was only applicable in Seminole County it could work because of the excellent working relationships between all the law enforcement agencies.

The problem is convincing other counties to agree to the

need when perhaps all those agencies protecting and serving the community do not get along.

"It may not happen here, but it may happen at those counties way off," said Altamonte Springs Commissioner Steve Wolfman.

CALNO representatives are hoping the proposed amendment, which gives agencies the option to enter a mutual aid traffic enforcement agreement will be a selling point.

"I think this preserves everybody's turf that doesn't want to do anything," said Longwood Commissioner Dan Anderson.

The state law change would not only allow abutting municipalities to enter mutual traffic enforcement agreements, it would also give the option to neighboring counties. On example CALNO representatives cited was McCulloch Road where Seminole and Orange counties meet.

"I think that is the opportunity to get the sheriffs association involved," Anderson said.

Seminole County and the seven cities will be asked in the next two months to support CALNO's resolution, however, the ultimate test may be selling it to state leaders.

"Hopefully we can get one of our legislative delegates to take this to the state next year," Brender said.

with residential space on the second floor and retail space at street level.

"Our idea is that people will live above their stores, though some may want to lease their space to another business," Giuliani said. "We're a custom home builder and plan to use quality construction — granite counters, exposed bricks, hardwood floors. They will be very nice."

Giuliani is currently working with the city to come up with a landscaping plan along Palmetto and hopes to install a fountain at the intersection of 2nd Street and Palmetto.

"There used to be an artisan fountain there many

years ago where people watered their horses when they came to town," Giuliani said. "The city wants to do something like that but they are a little short of funds. We're working with them to see if we can get that accomplished."

City officials and planners have long said that for any downtown revitalization to be successful, the city must attract more people to live downtown. Suncor Properties Inc. has already begun work on a \$17 million condominium project overlooking Lake Monroe and Giuliani said other developers are taking an interest.

"I understand the property owner across the street from our Palmetto Avenue project is looking to do the same thing we want to do," Giuliani said. "We're optimistic about his plans," said Bob Horian of Suncor. "I think the timing is right and it's a great opportunity."

Giuliani is no stranger to breaking new ground. A two-story home he built on the 500 block of Palmetto Avenue was the first new residential structure constructed in the Historic District in decades.

"It took us some time to get everything worked out with all of the city boards because there had not been any new

construction in the historic area in recent years," Giuliani said. "That was a success and we're looking to build more."

In fact, he said he plans to focus his efforts in Sanford.

"We were a little surprised by the response we have received from people with our other projects," Giuliani said. "I went into this very slow and conservative, but now, any property we can find, we'll buy it."

"We're not interested in renovating old buildings," he added. "We want to build the new stuff and make it look old. We're looking for vacant property or property that has non-historical buildings."

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Dying, marrying is becoming costly in Longwood

LONGWOOD — For non-residents of the city of Longwood, the cost of dying and marrying is increasing.

City commissioners approved Tuesday the first reading of an ordinance that hikes an hourly rental fee for the Community Building and considered raising the cost of burial plots in Longwood Memorial Gardens. Both measures would only affect non-residents.

According to city officials, the two-year-old Community

Building is regarded by many wedding planners to be a top spot for matrimony in Central Florida.

Tired of fighting for equal time and fearing city residents were unable to reserve a date for the often-booked Community Building, Longwood commissioners moved to increase the hourly rate for non-residents and businesses from \$75 to \$125. Hourly rental rates for groups and organizations were also raised from \$25 to \$75. Resident fees to rent the facility remained at \$25 an hour.

In addition, commissioners

set advance reservations limits to more than 18 months for residents and six months for non-residents. To prevent further scheduling snafus, such as the temporary displacement of the monthly Blue Grass Pickin' to Lyman High School, the third Friday, Saturday and Sunday of the month will be set aside for city functions.

Mayor Butch Bundy said the Community Building success had far surpassed any of the commissioners' expectations and the rate adjustments would help put it in line with similar facilities in Winter

Park and Sanford.

Higher increases were originally proposed for non-residents, but they were met with opposition from several city leaders, including Commissioner Dan Anderson.

"I see the building as an ambassador," he said. "I would want to keep it available for everybody."

Availability is even a larger issue with the city-owned cemetery. With about half the cemetery available, the City Commission discussed the possibility of raising the cost of interment for non-residents by almost double. Currently,

plots are available for residents for \$625 and non-residents for \$850.

Bundy said the city should consider restricting Longwood Memorial Gardens to residents and relatives.

"I would have no problem to restricting the cemetery to residents only," he said, "because long after it's full that's who is going to be paying the taxes to maintain the cemetery."

The City Commission is expected to further discuss fees charged at Longwood Memorial Gardens at its June 21 meeting.

"It's really hot here during the summer and a lot of those markets are under tents so it's a lot warmer," he added. "We have the open-air facility and as hot as it was Saturday it was still cool underneath there because we had a nice breeze blowing through."

In addition to the date change, the market will soon be offering a fresh fish market. Other new features include karaoke and possibly fresh baked goods.

The open-air market is located near the corner of U.S. Highway 17-92 and 13th Street on a former tractor-trailer parking lot directly in front of the State Farmers' Market Warehouse. The site features a southern-style, open-sided pole barn that is surrounded by bricked pathways, oak trees, grass and a gazebo.

Despite its improvement on the once sea of asphalt, the root problem of the facility's viability is its apparent lack of local support.

"The vendors are really not a problem as long as people can come out and make money they are more than happy to be here," Henderson said. "It's going to take support. The customer is what is going to keep this alive."

During its re-opening, Henderson said the market is offering vendors free space to increase competition at the market. For more information call 407-330-6783.

A slick win

Mark Martin ends long drought in race marred by controversy

Out of the smoke and carnage that punctuated Sunday's MBNA 400, Mark Martin emerged with his first victory in two years after going 72 races without one. Martin, in the No. 6 Ford, beat Tony Stewart, driving the No. 14 Chevrolet, and Dale Earnhardt Jr.'s No. 8 Chevrolet at Dover International Speedway.
"Man, I forgot what it feels like [to win]," Martin, 45, said after his 34th career win. "Everything went our way today. That's a fairy tale story. It was just a gift."
The race itself was hardly a fairy tale, however. It took nearly five hours to complete the race. Nearly half of it was run under red [39 minutes of stoppage] or yellow flags. A wreck on Lap 347 collected 19 cars.
And just 19 laps from his first Nextel Cup win, Kasey Kahne's No. 9 Dodge ran into oil that Casey Mears' blown engine had just deposited on the concrete track, sending Kahne to a race-ending collision with the wall and three other cars.
Martin avoided the oil and led the final 18 laps on older tires than the runners-up.
Martin was running second to Kahne, both staying on the track when other contenders pitted after the big wreck, when the leader got caught up in Mears' oil before NASCAR threw the 11th caution of the race [they consumed a total of 90 laps, nearly a fourth of the event].
"When the oil was in the corner, I was running low and I didn't get it in it," Martin said. "Kasey's misfortune was our fortune. [Crew chief] Pat [Tryson] just made the right call [to stay out on the next-to-last caution]. If I had gone in for tires, I'd bet you I'd have hit the oil, too. It was meant for us to win today."
It was a tough day in the NASCAR timing and scoring booth. Some competitors ripped NASCAR's inability to quickly sort out the two big issues of the long day.
First: how to properly penalize Ryan Newman when he spun out as the only car on the lead lap, then ran the stop paddle at the end of pit road. (It finally held him for a lap). Second: for not flagging the race before Kahne drove into the oil.
Newman indirectly figured in the 18-car pileup. He smacked the wall on Lap 321, just before he ran the pit-road stop sign and NASCAR needed 24 caution laps to figure things out and reset the field. But it may have set up the big wreck by placing a number of lapped cars ahead of the faster leaders. The wreck occurred two laps after racing finally resumed.
Matt Kenseth, driver of the No. 17 Ford, was livid after his car was eliminated from competition in Kahne's wreck.
"If I was a fan, I'd be mad," Kenseth said. "First, NASCAR spends 40 laps under caution screwing around for who knows what. Then a car blew up half a lap before we got there and they never threw the caution. They just let it go green until

we all rode in there and wrecked. On top of that, I sat on the frontstretch for two laps and waited for an ambulance. I'm glad I'm OK because I haven't seen an ambulance yet."
"I think that was the biggest joke of a race as I've ever been involved in," said Jamie McMurray, whose No. 42 Dodge was wiped out in the big one. "It was kind of ridiculous, all the cautions and the oil on the race track. It kind of looked like an ARCA race."

Kahne sees victory slip out of reach

Right about now, Kasey Kahne is probably wondering what it'll take to finally win a Nextel Cup race.
In a three-week stretch this spring, the rookie driver of the No. 9 Dodge finished second, second and third. He was second again at Texas.
Sunday, he was within 19 miles of his first career victory at Dover International Speedway when he drove right into oil dropped by Casey Mears' blown engine.
Suddenly, the sure victory went slipping away.
"I went down into Turn 1 and there was no grip when I got there," Kahne said. "There was oil all over the race track. After I hit the wall, I opened my eyes back up and cars were coming at me, spinning sideways, crashing. I spun and I just had the view of everybody coming at me."
Kahne had taken the lead on Lap 346 of the 400-lap race and appeared to be in control. Then disaster struck and he walked away with a 21st-place finish.
"We had a great car," Kahne said. "It's disappointing. We went from just about winning our first race to nothing."
Team owner Ray Evernham said "there were people screaming about it on the radio" when Mears was losing oil on the track. But NASCAR's caution came too late for Kahne.

Not every competitor was angry with NASCAR's apparent decision in the timing and scoring booth. Dale Earnhardt Jr., who spent most of the race a lap down, rallied for third to boost his points lead to 98 over Jimmie Johnson.
"It's unfortunate that we had so many cautions and stuff, but that's what this sport's about," Earnhardt Jr. said. "It's drama, it's exciting. It's exciting in the seat when you're out there dodging guys spinning around and crashing, sparks flying, dust everywhere. It's wild. I had a great race. It's unfortunate that some people don't have that same opinion."

Things looking up for Mayfield

Jeremy Mayfield was pleased with winning his eighth career pole and a top-10 finish at Dover.
"His going to be a huge momentum boost for us," Mayfield said.
The No. 19 team has been quietly digging out of a hole.
After finishing second at Atlanta in March, Mayfield was seventh in points. Then four finishes of 21st or worse over the next six races sunk him to 16th. After Dover, Mayfield is 15th in the standings.

Electronic monitor snares burglar

A man, who was on pre-trial release, and monitored by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office EMPACT program, now finds himself behind bars, after his movements were tied via GPS to a crime in the city of Sanford.

Sanford police arrested David Lowe, 25, of Sanford, on Wednesday, June 2. This occurred after electronic monitoring data showed him in the area of where a burglary occurred on May 21. This data led to a search of pawn records by SPD. Investigators found

items that had been pawned that were similar to those stolen during the burglary in Sanford. A latent print, recovered at the scene, was then matched to Lowe's.

EMPACT is the acronym for Electronic Monitoring Protection and Crime Tracking. It electronically monitors pre-trial release defendants as they await trial, by tracking their whereabouts, and matching it

with reported instances of crime. Satellites and computers do the monitoring. It's believed the Seminole County Sheriff's Office was the first in the nation to do this, when the program came on line in August 2002.

Lowe's arrest, where electronic tracking tied him to the crime, is the first for the EMPACT system in Seminole County.



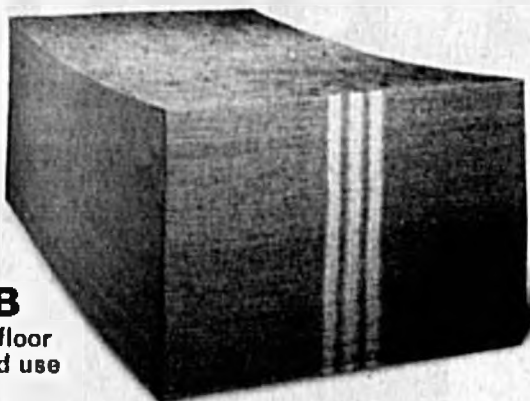
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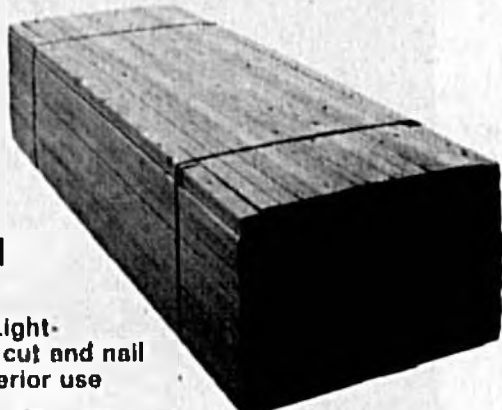
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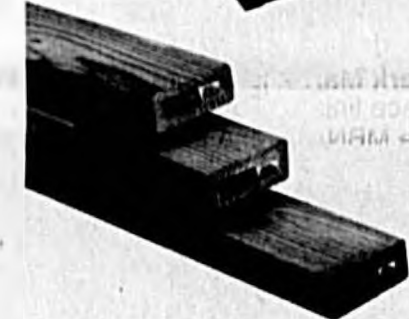
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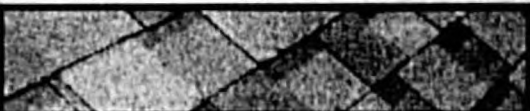
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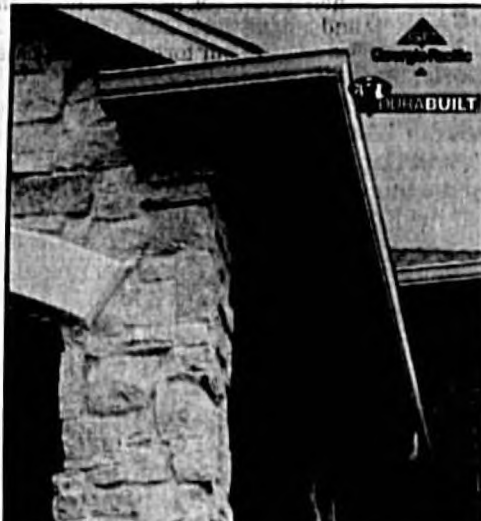

Local college stars go in draft

UCF All-American pitcher Matt Fox was selected with the 35th overall pick to the Minnesota Twins Monday in the 2004 First-Year Major League Baseball Draft. Fox was taken in the supplemental first round by the Twins, becoming just the fourth first round draft pick in school history.

Junior center fielder Clay Timpner was the 130th overall selection in the fourth round by the San Francisco Giants.

Sophomore All-American pitcher Kyle Bono was later selected with the 245th pick in the eighth round by the Boston Red Sox.

Fox joins Justin Pope (St. Louis, 2001), Joe Wagner (Milwaukee, 1993) and Chad Mottola (Cincinnati, 1992) on UCF's all-time first round draft pick list. Fox is the second first round selection under the current tenure of UCF pitching coach Craig Cozart.

"It is a great feeling to know all of the hard work paid off," stated Fox. "I am excited and happy to be drafted by the Minnesota Twins."

Fox had one of the finest seasons in UCF history in 2004. The right-hander was 14-2 with a 1.85 ERA in 17 starts. In 11.2 innings of work, Fox recorded 125 strikeouts and opponents batted just .191 vs. the right-hander.

Fox finished tied for second in UCF single-season history in wins, tied for fourth in strikeouts, and 10th in innings pitched.

Fox was named to Collegiate Baseball News All-America First Team and was a second team All-America selection according to USA Today/Sports Weekly. Fox was a sixth round draft pick of the Arizona Diamondbacks in the 2002 First-Year Player Draft.

Timpner put together a phenomenal junior season in which he led UCF in runs (69), hits (96), doubles (20), triples (6), home runs (6), total bases (146) and stolen bases (43). The 2004 A-Sun First Team All-Conference selection ranks among UCF all-time leaders in hits, runs, stolen bases and total bases.

Timpner was a 41st round draft pick of the Texas Rangers in the 2002 First-Year Player Draft.

Bono was a second team All-America selection by USA Today/Sports Weekly and a third team All-America honoree according to Collegiate Baseball News. The draft-eligible sophomore was 8-2 with a 1.94 ERA in 97.1 innings of work. The Lake Mary native amassed a UCF single-season and career record five complete-game shutouts in 2004 and totaled 107 strikeouts, to rank in the top 10 in UCF single-season strikeouts.

Two teammates from the Longwood Babe Ruth Prep All-Star Team that won the World Series back in the early 90's were also taken on the first day of the draft.

Stetson University All-America catcher Chris Westervelt (Batesville, Ark.) was selected by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 11th round of the 2004 Major League Baseball Amateur Draft. Westervelt, who also played at Lake Mary as a freshman before moving to Arkansas, was the 328th overall pick in the draft and the 13th selection of the Dodgers.

UCF's bid for three wins in one day came to an end with a 19-3 loss to top-seeded Florida State Sunday in the NCAA Regional Championship game at Dick Howser Stadium in Tallahassee.

The 20th-ranked Golden Knights defeated 24th-ranked Oklahoma State 12-9 in 10 innings Sunday morning just after midnight and beat the 16th-ranked Seminoles 7-5 Sunday afternoon before the Seminoles prevailed in the seventh and final game of the regional.

UCF came within one win for the third time in school history of the NCAA Super Regionals. The Golden Knights ended the season with a 47-18 record, including the fourth highest win total in UCF single-season history.

Knights run out of pitchers in Championship Game

Stephen Drew welcomed Brett Bordwine into his first career start with his 16th home run of the season to right field in the top of the first to give FSU a 1-0 lead. Matt Sauls added to the FSU lead with two outs with a RBI single to center to give the Seminoles a 2-0 advantage.

Shane Robinson hit his first career homer in the second to extend the FSU lead to 3-0. Eddy Martinez-Estevé added a sacrifice fly to give the Seminoles a 4-0 lead after two innings

of play.

UCF chipped away at the lead in the third as Matt Ray singled up the middle with two outs to score Lake Mary's Drew Butera, an All-Tournament selection, cutting the deficit to 4-1. Lake Mary's Ryan Bono added a two-out single to score Ray, slicing the lead to 4-2.

FSU ripped the game open with a five-run fourth to take a 9-2 lead. Bryan Zech started the big inning with a solo homer to left center as the Seminoles recorded six hits in the frame.

The Seminoles added 10 runs over the next three innings while Matt LaFleur blasted his third home run of the season to close out the scoring at 19-3.

"First of all, I want to congratulate the baseball team of Florida State for a championship very well deserved," said UCF head coach Jay Bergman. "I want to thank the people at Florida State for everything they did. We had lightning, rain and everything else and got the games in and other than that, I just wanted to say how proud I was of our baseball team. Playing three games within 24 hours and playing until one (a.m.) in the morning we played a great game but we just ran out of pitching. That was all there was to it. We've

Sanford River Rats inaugurate league with 6-2 victory

SANFORD — A baseball fan could not have asked for much more.

The St. Petersburg College duo of Paul Buhrow and Peter Taraskevich hurled one shutout inning each in relief for the River Rats.

Quartararo, a second baseman who helped SCC to its first-ever State Championship last year before heading to South Carolina-Aiken, tripled his first two times to the plate and finished the game 3-for-4 with two triples, three runs scored and two RBI.

Jon Lozada, another player who just completed his freshman year at SCC, also had a big night, singling in Quartararo his first two times at the plate, finishing the night 2-for-3.

"That was fun," said River Rats coach Ricky Plante. "It was a very good beginning, but we will get better once we get the whole roster here and get some time playing together. We hope to sign a couple more pitchers and when we get Zac McCamie back we should be really good. Unfortunately, I really don't expect McCamie back until July."

McCamie, who was the ace for SCC last year, is the No. 3 starter for the University of South Carolina, which is one of the favorites to reach the College World Series in Omaha next week.

The game did not start out the best for Shetrone however, as he hit the first two batters he faced and gave up a sacrifice fly to Jon Roberts and a run-scoring double to

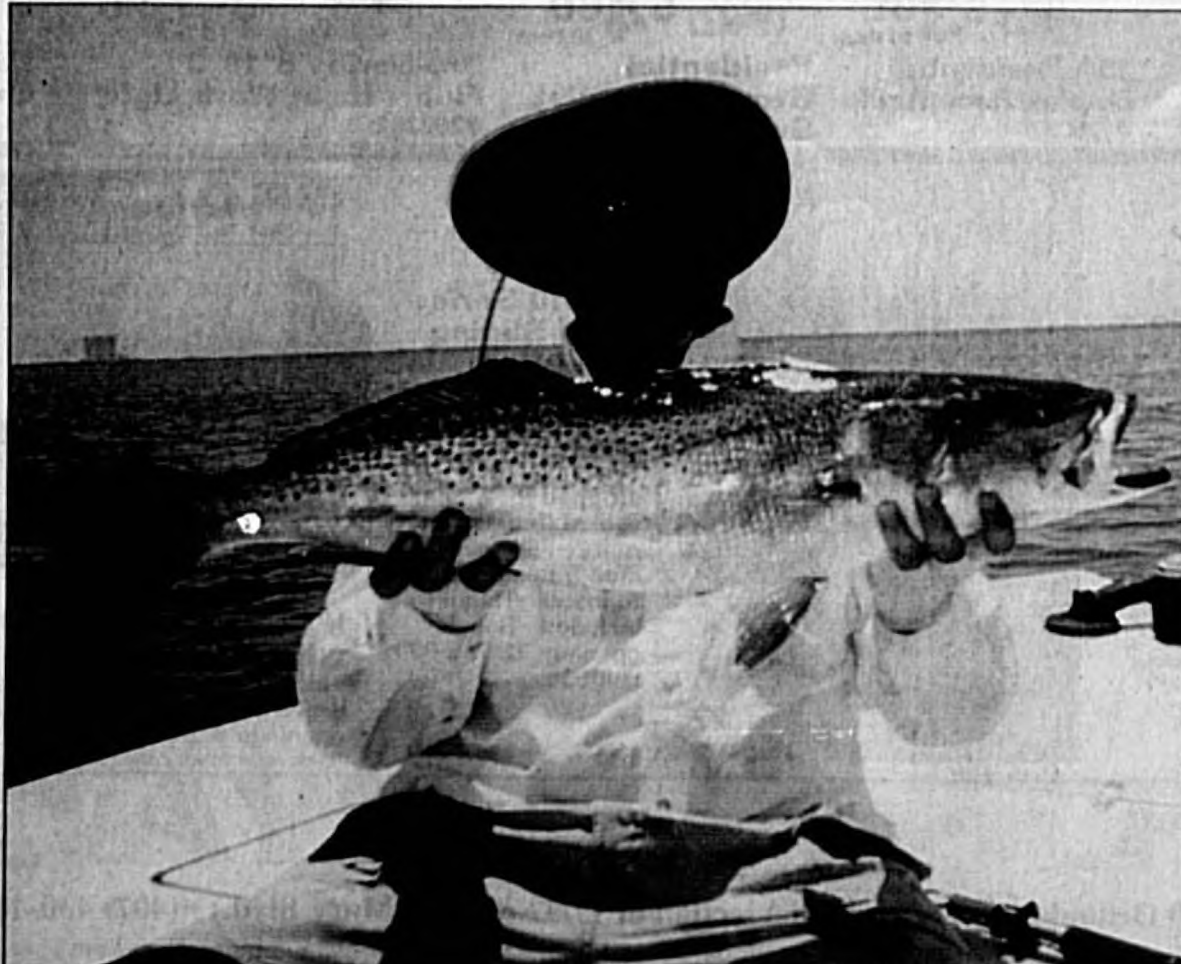
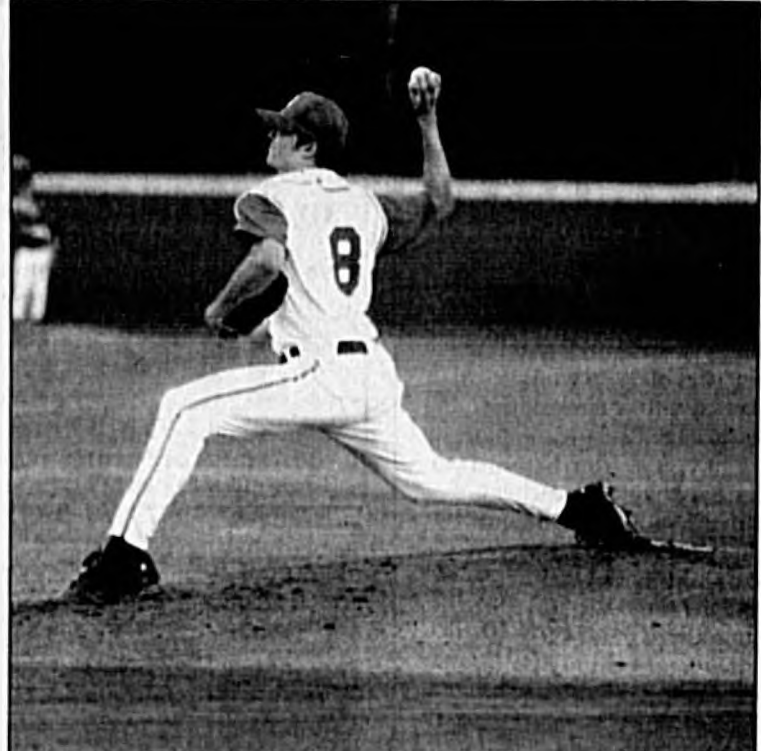

Big trout smashing the mullet on coast

If you want to have fun and catch some trout, break out the top water plugs, jigs and jerk baits. The trout bite is going off.

We have landed several trout in the last week. These trout are following the huge pods of mullet that have infiltrated the Mosquito Lagoon and Indian River Lagoon.

All you have to do is find the bait pods and start chugging and winding. I landed my largest trout on Memorial Day. This big girl went 31-1/2 inches and weighed and even 10 pounds on the Boga Grip. We were poling down the flat when I spotted this beast out of the corner of my eye. I told my client to hand me his rod. I cast into a large sand hole and WHAM! She latched on the Rip Tide three-inch Mullet and after running some drag and a 10 minute battle she was land-

ed. After a few pictures she was released to roam the flat and lay her eggs. We also landed 12 more trout that day on top water plugs, jigs and the Rip Tide Flats Chub.

It is really important that you release these bigger trout. They produce so many eggs. Take pictures and measurements if you would like to mount one of these big "Gator" trout. Usually these fish have worms and would not be good to eat. If you want to eat dinner, eat the 15 inch to 20 inch trout. They are mighty tasty.

The trout have been biting very well at first light and then after 11 a.m. The 10 pound fish was caught at 12:45 p.m. Another important thing to remember is to wet your hands and be gentle when handling the trout. They have a protective slime and can catch disease if not handled properly. See Fishing, Page 9A

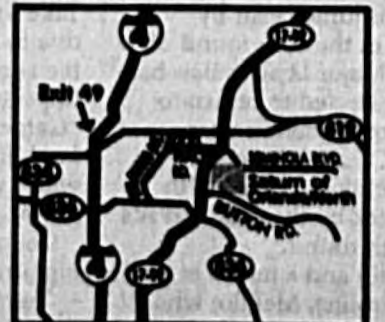

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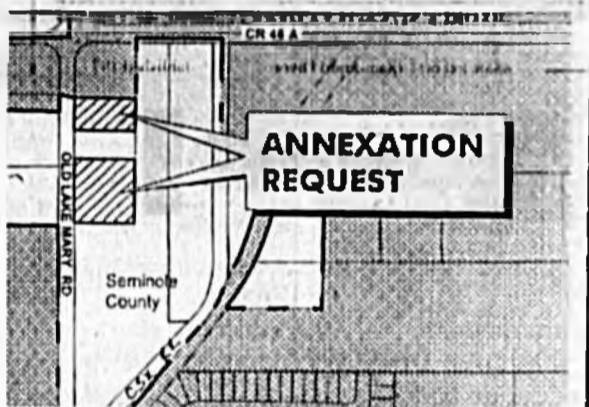

AAA executive charged with child porno

A pornography case, under investigation by the Seminole County Sheriff's Office for the past seven months, has finally resulted in an arrest. Richard Ira Whitcomb, 48, of Sunwood Drive, Longwood, has been taken into custody.

The case started on Nov. 3, 2003, when deputies were contacted by an Audit Services representative at American Automobile Association (AAA), reporting that an employee had pornographic images of children on a laptop computer owned by AAA.

The employee was identified as Whitcomb, a manager in driver training at AAA, who was questioned concerning the information. The laptop was seized and photographs and movie files were located in a file folder named "Dazzle." The images were of 7- and 8-year-old children in sexually explicit positions.

Whitcomb was subsequently placed on administrative leave.

According to the arrest report, there was probable cause to believe Whitcomb did knowingly possess photographs, motion picture, exhibition, show, representation or other presentations which, in whole or part, he knew represented sexual conduct by a child. Each representation is a separate offense, and there are 926 representations, each a felony of the third degree. The dates of the entries reportedly ranged from Dec. 15, 2002 until Oct. 31, 2003, a time during which the computer had been issued to Whitcomb.

The computer information was turned over to an investigator for a final Computer Forensic Examination on May 24 of this year. The report revealed 859 images of suspected child pornography and 67 movie files of child pornography.

On June 4, Whitcomb reported to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and was placed under arrest.

also asked former superintendent Hagerty if he would consider an alternative.

Residents have been unsuccessful on both fronts, but will try again at the June 22 board meeting in Lake Mary, accord-

ing to a Web site hosted by the Concerned Citizens of Oviedo.

"This is wrong," said Carolyn Klages of Oviedo. She said the concern is for the community and especially the

young people.

"What about the one kid who is gay?" she asked. "How is he or she going to feel when they are called a Hagerty Hag or Hagerty Fag."

Hagerty retired in August

2003 after serving 11 years as superintendent. It also marked his 42nd year in education. The superintendent opened 14 new schools during his tenure, and the district saw increasingly good FCAT scores during Hagerty's time. Updating technology, securing funding for future education needs, and creating magnet programs were just some

3 school principals awarded top honor

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — The principal asked new students whether they thought the week had been worthwhile. Almost everyone raised a hand.

The former elementary students were participating in a transition program that Teague Middle School offers those entering sixth grade. Principal Roger Gardner asked for honesty and questioned who had not found the transition time worthwhile. Slowly two boys raised their hand.

Gardner thanked them for their honesty. Outside the classroom he said that was an example of trying to make students feel part of something larger. It is part of his philosophy that garnered him Middle School Principal of the Year for Seminole County Public Schools.

He was one of three principals who received the honor at the three levels of education. Barry Liebovitz, principal at Wilson Elementary in Sanford, and Boyd Karns, principal of Lake Mary High School.

Gardner served as assistant principal for 20 years at Sanford Middle School and led Teague for four years. At Sanford, he said, he learned to understand children of diversity. That helped him at Teague.

"This door is always open to kids, parents and teachers to communicate with me about the classroom," he said, pointing to his office door.

"I expect people to do their best," he said, and communication is the key.

Last year, for example, there was a problem with recidivism of minority students sent to the principal's office. They formed a plan to have these students "adopt" school personnel to guide the young people. The plan worked, he said.

"I'm not a micro-manager, but I'm inclusive of all in an attempt to make things better for everyone," he said.

Sanford man kills girlfriend, self

SANFORD — A three-hour police standoff in a neighborhood off South Sanford Avenue ended with two dead Thursday afternoon in an apparent murder-suicide.

Police responded to the Rose Hill subdivision at about 12:30 p.m. to a report of shots being fired. Sanford police Officer Mike Bernosky was immediately on the scene, but before he arrived, authorities say Francisco Rivera, 50, had fired a shot at his girlfriend and dragged her back into the home at 122 Rose Hill Trail.

"We had an officer — who lives in the area and was going to lunch — respond as it was happening," said Cleo Cohen, Sanford police spokesperson. "The response time was incredible with the first unit."

Unfortunately, quick police work couldn't save Evelyn Schumann, 28. She was pronounced dead at the scene, three hours later when police finally gained access to the home.

With a U-Haul parked in the driveway, Sanford police surrounded the home and tried to make contact with Rivera, but were unsuccessful many times as he repeatedly hung up the phone as police negotiators tried to reach him.

Police said Schumann's father and Rivera's son Francisco Rivera III were outside of the home when the incident began.

"She had arrived there with her father and (Rivera's) son with the U-Haul,"

Cohen said.

An argument apparently broke out as the three began moving furniture into the rental truck. Investigators said Rivera became upset because we claimed some of the furniture was his.

"That erupted him into anger," Cohen added.

Nearby homes were evacuated and the entrance to the subdivision was blocked off as about a dozen residents waited to return. Other family members

were allowed into the cordoned area to speak with Rivera by telephone, Cohen said.

Rivera did speak to several family members and gave conflicting reports of Schumann's condition, Cohen said. In a last attempt to negotiate with Rivera, he told police he was contemplating suicide.

"The last communication on the phone with him he said he had killed her and

Port of Sanford turns over \$300,000 to county coffers

SANFORD — The Board of Directors of the Seminole County Port Authority (SCOPA), presented a check on April 27, to the Seminole Commission in the amount of \$300,000. The money will go into the county's general fund.

Dennis Dolgner, administrator of the Port Authority, presented the check to Seminole County Commission Chairman Daryl McClain.

"This is the third consecutive year we have been able to turn over \$300,000 to the county," he said.

The money is in addition to the ad-valorem taxes paid by

the port's tenants, which now approaches \$150,000 annually.

"It is my pleasure, on behalf of the Board of Directors, to be able to present you with a check for an additional \$300,000," he told McClain, "bringing the total of direct contributions from the Port to just under \$1 million."

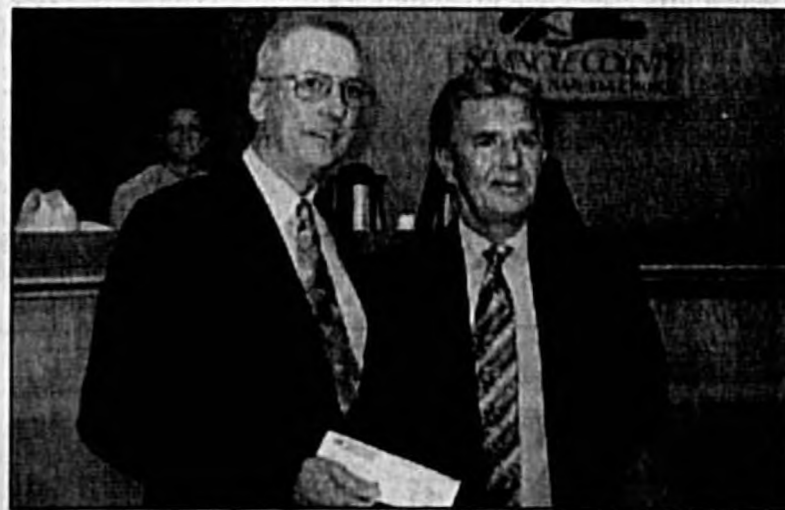
"As a thriving and growing small business center, we thank you for your commitment to use these funds to enhance Seminole County's outreach to the small business sector, and we look forward to continuing to work with you to perpetuate these community efforts in years to come."

Over the past five years, the Port Authority has transferred a total of \$690,000 of reserve capital to the county's general fund.

Dolgner said the Port is in an aggressive building plan, and during the next fiscal year, beginning in October, he expects the Port to be built-out.

"The engineering for the final building is underway right now," he added.

Dolgner predicted that once the Port is built-out, the amount of money which will be able to be transferred to the county general fund could reach \$1.1 to \$1.2 million annually.
