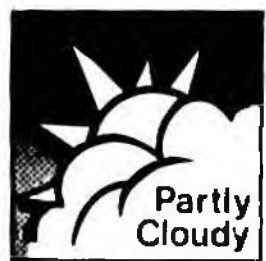
## Developer makes some concessions, stands firm on density

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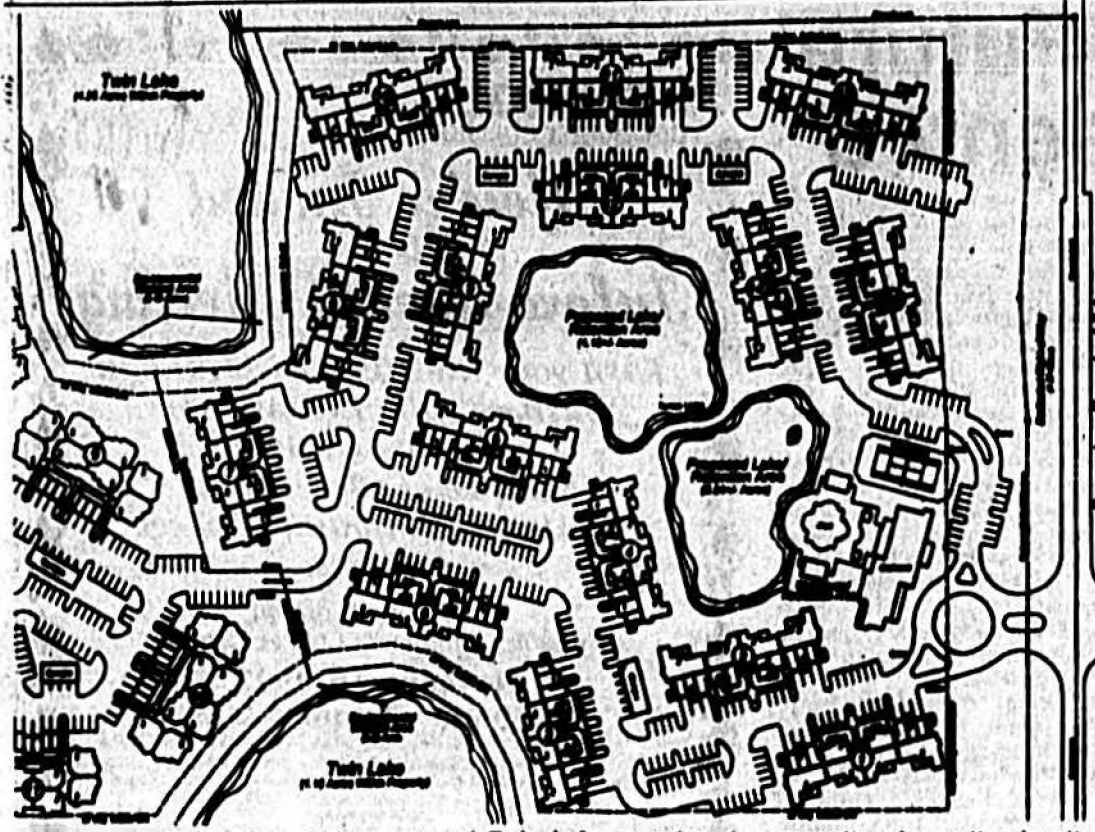

The development agreement presented Monday included other items the homeowners and Kevin had discussed: a 100-foot set back from County Road 46A right-of-way, two-story units on the property adjacent to C.R. 46A with three-story on the balance of the site, the construction of a brick wall and entryway features along 46A "consistent with the residential character of other developments," the restriction of power boat use on Twin Lakes, and a conservation easement around wetlands on the property.

"We still want to work with the residents," Huttonway said. "They still have a voice."

While several residents were in attendance at the work session, public comment was not allowed. Residents can speak at the Sanford City Commission meeting on Monday, Nov. 10, when the public hearing on the land use amendment continues. The development agreement becomes part of the specifics of the amendment which will have to be approved by the Florida Department of Community Affairs, after it is voted on by the Sanford City Commissioners.

"We got a call from the Secret Service yesterday at about 3:30 p.m. that they would be looking through the football team's locker room," Finnerly said.

Finnerly said the investigation started several weeks ago, however UCF officials were not aware of the case until a few minutes before the search.

"We were sprung on this thing ourselves," he said.

According to Finnerly, none of the football players was arrested or questioned.

"It's still very early and these players will have to go through three levels during this investigation - the Secret Service, the University, and also football

coach Gene McQuell," he said.

Of the former Seminole County athletes, Finnerly called Cleveland "one of our best pro prospects." The NFL scouts have been looking at him over the past months.

"Tyson's brother Darren used to play football here and he was following in his footsteps."

Finnerly said UCF plans to conduct an internal investigation.

"We're trying to get our ducks in a row," he said. "If the investigation turns up any wrongdoing that will not be tolerated. If necessary, the University will take action."

Patrick Brinson, 20, a former

football player and current student at UCF was arrested in connection with the case, which allegedly involves the unauthorized use of 36 phone numbers from AT&T Wireless Services.

Secret Service documents allege that Nikisha Bronson, an AT&T employee and the daughter of Orange County Circuit Judge Theotis Bronson, helped Brinson avoid charges for the calls.

Brinson, who was charged with possession of 13 cellular phones with stolen numbers, is being held at the Seminole County jail pending a federal hearing.

have made - could save as much as \$25,000, Morse said.

The most innovative action, however, was McLain's proposal to drop the Orlando Sanford Airport area from consideration for future adult entertainment sites - offering three other areas identified at a meeting he had Tuesday morning with Sanford Mayor Larry Dale and City Manager Bill Simmons.

The three sites are: North of Narcissus Ave. and east of Old Monroe Rd.; the southwest corner of Rand Yard Rd. and the railroad track, and north of State Road 46; Both sides of Fifth St. east of Airport Blvd., and south of S.R. 46.

"The airport site was ludicrous," McLain said. "Sanford wants to cooperate the best it can and has offered these other sites. McLain's proposal was attached to a vote by the commissioners to drop the Chuluota site. It passed, 3-2."

Van Der Weide said he voted against the new Sanford sites because "I'm not going to be voting for any other site than the site they're already at (Fern

Park and Casselberry)."

McLain was elated that instead of having 158 acres of Sanford (airport) property being zoned for possible adult entertainment use it now had 35 acres.

"I don't like having any chance of this industry in our city but this plan is a victory over what they had been talking about," Mayor Dale said. "We've done our part. Identified an area to meet the court's demands. Now let some of the other communities do likewise."

Recent court cases indicate that Seminole County needs to provide sites for 80 acres for adult businesses (one acre per business). There are public meetings on Dec. 2 and Dec. 16 on the issue, but the county has until 1998 to identify additional sites.

McLain, for one, hopes other cities do as Sanford did by identifying sites. It is wrong to dump all the responsibility on Sanford, where he has his business and is within the district he represents as commissioner.

The county's new law re-

quires adult businesses to change their operations or move to new locations by 1999. At the same time the county is negotiating with the eight legally operated businesses - all located in the Fern Park/Casselberry area. These places may be grandfathered in rather than forced to move.

House of Babes is one of these clubs and has been in business for 21 years. It had a liquor license when it first began but has been a "juice" bar in recent years. Steven LaFret, an Orlando attorney representing the club, was miffed at the commissioners' deferment on Tuesday.

"It was a men's not to be put on the spot," LaFret said. "If this had been a billiard hall or restaurant it wouldn't have been an issue." County Attorney Bob McMillan had told the commission that it couldn't deny the request because "you don't like what they're doing on the site."

Adams suggested the matter go before a special hearing officer. That will take a month or two more before House of Babes could get its license.

Leasard said bike patrols are a major crime deterrent for a city like Sanford with its many alleys. He added that there would be road patrols to back up those officers on bikes at all times.

"Bike patrols will put the pedestrian criminal element on the run and I think crime will decrease dramatically," Leasard said. "I've seen it. Most of the crime in downtown Sanford is in the alleys."

Leasard said he has been working closely with the police department to see the bike patrol come to fruition and he is very excited to see this become reality.

There are currently two trained SPD officers who ride on bikes conducting several successful runs, most notably during the Fourth of July celebration near Fort Mellon Park on the lakefront, Leasard said.

In addition, Leasard said, the bike patrol is also about better communication and fits in perfectly with the concept of

community policing, which the SPD is trying to enhance.

"If you see a cop out on a bike by the lake go out and say hi," he said.

The goal is to train all of the SPD's 50 patrol officers on the force on the bikes, said Deputy Chief Dennis Whitmire, who fully supports the idea of a bike patrol.

"This puts the officers in closer contact with the citizens and the community in general," Whitmire said.

The bicycles give officers a crime fighting advantage because the bikes aren't as recognizable. They can ride up to the criminal activity without being noticed.

Also, Whitmire said, bicycles are more mobile and officers can patrol and park in areas which are not accessible to police cars.

This is not the first time the SPD has delved into bicycle patrols.

Through a grant several years ago the SPD, in partnership with the Sanford Housing

Authority, offered bike patrols for one year.

Earlier this year four officers were sent to Deland for specialized training on bicycles. One remains and plans are in the works to send four officers for a training course being offered at the University of Central Florida next month, Whitmire said.

His ultimate goal, he said, is to send an officer to an instructor's course so that the SPD could have an in-house program.

The mountain bikes, valued at about \$1,100, are outfitted with special headlights and tail lights and a storage container. All bikes will have toe clips. Officers wear helmets and gloves and don a uniform made of special material. The cost of the uniform is about \$100, which has been included in the SPD's current budget, Whitmire said.

The SPD hopes to have the rest of the bikes in and ready to roll by December.

tions Committee.

"The sooner the better," said Mayor Larry Dale, who was interviewed by the committee.

"It's the right thing to do," said City Manager Bill Simmons, who could become the line supervisor by spring, eliminating the "confusion" and "resentment" existing in the system that the police and fire chiefs report to city commissioners.

Prior to a new commission and a new mayor coming into office this year, there was little controversy, Simmons told the committee. But the arrangement wasn't good and was rare for the form of government that exists in Florida cities such as Sanford.

There was a similar referendum last year that was lost in a general election and was narrowly voted down. This, McClannahan said, won't be the case if the new referendum vote

is "isolated" and residents made aware of its importance.

To be sure, the Sanford Police issue is a hot one in 1997 - particularly after a \$53,000 independent review study found the SPD to be dysfunctional, disorganized and in need of repair. "The whole town is aware of the problems," Dale said.

Dale, in his initial efforts as the commission's police liaison officer, said he met with resentment from the police department. "I was depicted as the enemy," the mayor said. "And I'm not the enemy."

The options committee listened to Dale and Simmons on Tuesday and is set to recommend to the city commission that a referendum be placed a ballot soon as possible - probably after the holidays. There was debate about how to word the recommendation. This missed several committee members who want immediate action.

No matter what choice the

committee makes on options A, B or C to the city commissioners, the referendum is still important, Simmons said. "It's the right thing to do, and I'm all for it even though it will be more work for me if approved. I'm prepared to make it work."

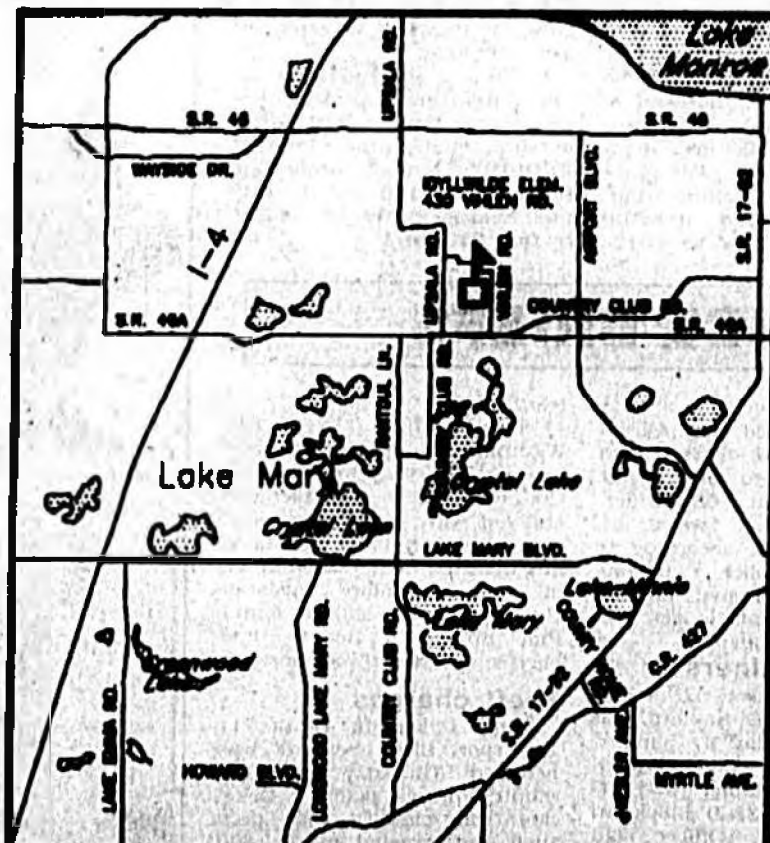
Option A - rebuilding the SPD and Option D - contracting some services from the Sheriff's Department - require the immediate services of a line supervisor. Even if Option C - contracting the Sheriff's Office for law enforcement services - should be the call - the city manager would be the contract administrator.

The options committee, which has met on five consecutive Tuesdays, will interview Sheriff Don Eslinger next week. Its final recommendations to the city commission may come by December. The recommendation will not be "binding" Dale said Tuesday. The official call will be made by the city commissioners.

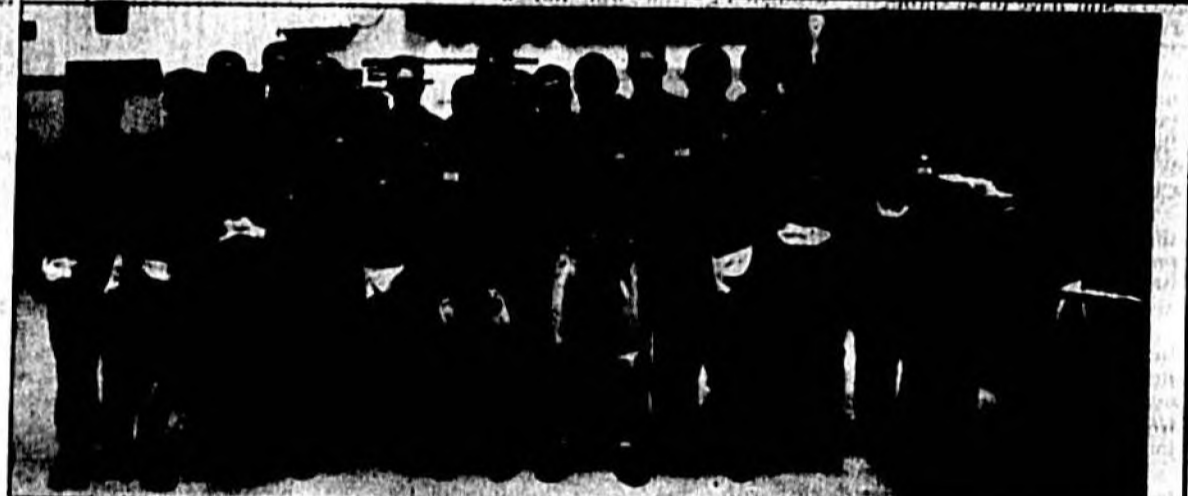
In the other game at Pinehurst, the Sharks outscored Insurance World 12-10.

# Oatmeal cookies: Raisin d'etre

I love oatmeal: hot oatmeal, oatmeal scones, oatmeal bread and oatmeal pancakes. But most of all I love oatmeal cookies. Chewy, warm, not-too-sweet and totally satisfying, oatmeal cookies are right up there on my list of favorites. Like chocolate chip cookies and peanut butter cookies, however, oatmeal cookies should be homemade; packaged ones don't come even close to the real thing.

The best place to find recipes is on the oatmeal box; Quaker Oats has been printing them there for 80 years. According to the "Quaker Oats Favorite Recipe Collection" cookbook, the 1988 recipe for Oatmeal Cookies was the first-ever recipe printed on a cereal box.

You can get the Quaker Oats cookbook, which costs \$11.95 plus shipping, by calling 1-800-377-8844, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Eastern. The book includes recipes for cookies, muffins, breads, breakfasts and main dishes.

The first recipe printed below, however, is not from Quaker Oats; it's from Chef Michel LeBergue of the New England Culinary Institute in Montpelier, Vt. His Cowboy Cookies are fabulously buttery and tasty, and my children (and I) love them. The trick with these cookies, says Chef Michel, is to resist the urge to beat the butter and sugar until it is light and fluffy; in the mixing department, less is more for this recipe.

Because the Cowboy Cookies use a whopping 8 sticks of butter, I decided to follow up with a lower-fat Lemon-Walnut oatmeal cookie from Quaker, which uses a practically anemic 1 stick of margarine and has a fat content of just 2 grams per cookie.

Then my love of peanut butter got the better of my health consciousness, and the final recipe here is for a decadent mixture of oatmeal, cocoa, peanut butter and peanut butter cup candies.

Note that ALL the recipes call for old-fashioned or quick-cooking, uncooked oats. Instant oatmeal is not

recommended for baking. If you want to buy cookies from a store, stick to Oreo or Mallow-Mars — cookies that you couldn't possibly replicate at home. But if you want a good oatmeal cookie, start baking.

### COWBOY COOKIES

- 1-1/2 pounds (8 sticks) unsalted butter at room temperature
- 1-cup light brown sugar
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 eggs, lightly beaten
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 4 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 8 cups oatmeal (old-fashioned)
- 2 cups raisins

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Line several cookie sheets with baking parchment.

In a large bowl, mix by hand the butter and sugar until smooth. Do not overmix. Add the eggs, vanilla and cinnamon, and mix to combine. Add the flour and baking powder, and mix gently again. Gently fold in the oatmeal and the raisins, using your hands, if necessary.

Scoop out the dough with a 2-ounce ice cream scoop or 1/4 cup measure, well packed. Place onto the prepared cookie sheets, and lightly flatten each cookie with a wet fork. Bake for 8 to 10 minutes. The cookies will be slightly underdone; they will continue baking after being removed from the

oven. Allow to cool for several minutes on the pan; then transfer to a rack. Cool thoroughly and store in an airtight container.

Yield: 3 dozen cookies.

### LEMON WAFERS

- 2 cups oats (quick or old-fashioned, uncooked)
- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour, plus more for flouring hands
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1-1/2 cups granulated sugar, plus a bit more for dusting cookies
- 1/2 cup margarine, softened
- 1/2 cup plain nonfat yogurt, or lemon-flavored yogurt
- 2 egg whites, or 1 whole egg
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon peel
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- Non-stick cooking spray
- 1/4 cup powdered sugar

In a bowl, combine the oats, the 1-1/2 cups flour, the baking powder and the baking soda.

In another bowl, beat the 1/2 cup granulated sugar and the stick of margarine together until creamy. Add yogurt, egg whites (or egg), lemon peel and vanilla; beat well. Gradually add the combined dry ingredients; mix well. Cover and chill 1 to 2 hours.

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly spray a cookie sheet with nonstick cooking spray.

With lightly floured hands, shape dough into 1-inch balls. Place 3 inches apart on cookie sheets. Flatten to 1/8 inch thickness with bottom of glass dipped in granulated sugar.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until edges are lightly browned. Cool 2 minutes on cookie sheets; remove to wire rack.

Sift powdered sugar over warm cookies. Cool completely. Store tight-

ly covered.

- 1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1-1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 cup margarine or butter, softened
- 2/3 cup peanut butter (regular, not reduced-fat)
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups oats (quick or old-fashioned, uncooked)
- 5-ounce package of miniature peanut-butter cup candies (about 30 candies, unwrapped, cut into halves or quarters)

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a small bowl, combine the flour, cocoa, baking soda and salt (if using).

In a large bowl, beat the sugar, margarine (or butter) and peanut butter until creamy. Add the eggs and vanilla; beat well. Add the dry ingredients; mix well. Stir in oats and candy; mix well.

Using a 1/4 cup measure, drop the cookie dough onto ungreased cookie sheets, keeping the cookies 3 inches apart.

Bake 12 to 14 minutes, or until cookies are slightly firm to the touch. (Do not overbake.) Cool 1 minute on cookie sheets; remove to wire rack. Cool completely, and store tightly covered.

# Merchant's marketing demand is blow to customer's privacy

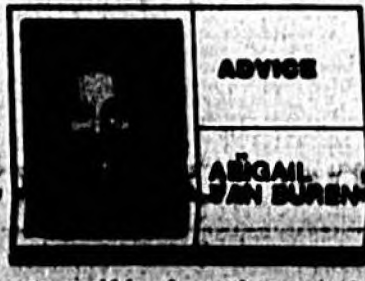

# Should I worry about a hydrocele?

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is the prognosis for a hydrocele?

DEAR READER: A hydrocele is a collection of fluid under the membrane that surrounds the testicle. The collection can be quite small and hardly noticeable, or it may be very large and equal the size of the testicle itself.

In this case, the patient may experience a sense of pressure, fullness or pain, especially after prolonged standing.

The condition is harmless and common.

Removing the fluid with a needle gives only temporary relief, as the fluid will soon reaccumulate. Therefore, if a person is bothered by the symptoms I mentioned, the appropriate therapy is surgical excision of the fibrous sheath, a simple operation.

In any case, the prognosis is excellent.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Because of a variety of health problems, my doctor has prescribed the following medications: Cozart, Maxzide, K-Dur, folate, vitamin K, Lodine, Promarin, Propulsid, Prilosec, Accolate, Aerobid, Proventil inhaler, and Pamelor.

I feel awful. DEAR READER: I'm not surprised. You are taking 13 medicines, all of which have potential side effects. Heaven knows how these powerful drugs are interacting in your body. I believe that your situation represents precisely the problem that I constantly carp about: overmedication. While you should address the issue with your doctor, let me make some obvious suggestions:

— Cozart, Maxzide: Used for hypertension. One or the other might suffice.

— K-Dur: A potassium supplement. Should not be needed with the other drugs that you are taking.

— Folate, vitamin E: Safe. But E can cause fatigue. Don't exceed 800 units a day.

— Lodine: An anti-inflammatory for arthritis. Causes intestinal bleeding. Substitute Tylenol or ibuprofen as a trial.

— Promarin: Female hormone. Make sure you have annual mammograms.

— Propulsid, Prilosec: Used for gastric hyperacidity. One or the other should suffice, both not needed.

— Accolate, Aerobid, Proventil: Prescribed for asthma. Use as directed, but don't overdo.

— Pamelor: Anti-depressant. Many side effects, including heart problems and seizures. Do you really need this?

Let me know how your doctor responds to this thumbnail analysis of your prescriptions.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Several years ago, I went to our local emergency

room because of a painful rash on my left side. The doctors diagnosed shingles and said there was very little they could do until the infection ran its course.

Later that day, while rinsing my mouth with an over-the-counter mouthwash, I hypothesized that the

numbing effect might help my shingles. Subsequently, I sprayed Scope on my rash. The mouthwash cured my pain, although the shingles didn't dry up for another four weeks. I mention this to help your readers with the pain of shingles.

DEAR READER: I appreciate you sharing your experience. However, I cannot endorse it. Sometimes shingles — a virus infection of the nerves in the skin — is exceedingly painful; often, it is not. The pattern is unpredictable. In fact, the pain of shingles may spontaneously disappear without any therapy. Therefore, I cannot conclude that Scope helped you; maybe it didn't, perhaps it did.

The modern treatment of shingles consists of anti-viral drugs (Famvir, Zovirax and others) with or without prednisone, a corticosteroid derivative.

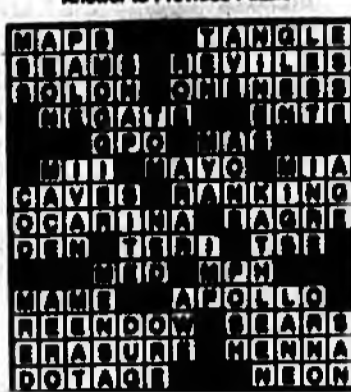

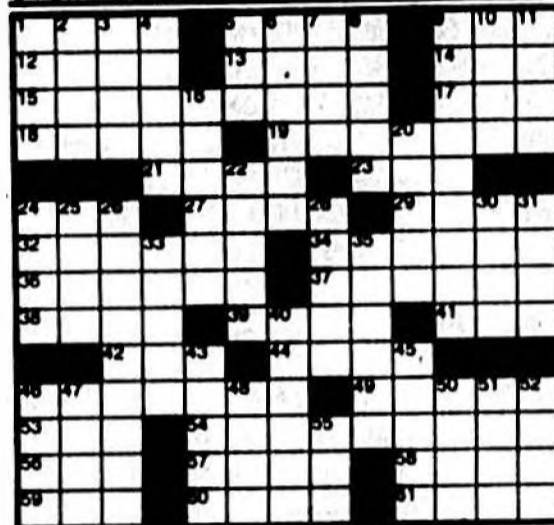

## WIN AT BRIDGE

### Nothing by wire, only on paper

The 10th Internet daily bulletin from Albuquerque included no deals. However, there were several in the printed version available at the tournament.

This deal contained some interesting features. How did South try to make his ambitious six diamonds after West led a spade?

When North cue-bid three hearts, South, Brian Gunnell, expected both a stronger dummy and a heart lead. However, West had a good excuse for not leading his partner's suit!

South decided to play for a 4-4 spade break, which would allow two club losers to be discarded. Yet dummy was short of entries. So, after throwing a club on the spade ace, Gunnell

ruffed a spade in hand, then led a diamond to dummy's eight! (This finesse looks dangerous, but with the inferred 7-0 heart break, West was more likely to have the trump 10.) Declarer continued with a spade ruff in hand, a trump to dummy's jack, and another spade ruff, getting the bad news.

After drawing the last trump, Gunnell played a club to dummy's ace, finessed the heart queen, and exited with his last club. Bingo! East had to win with the king and return a heart, allowing declarer to repeat the finesse. South's 12 tricks were one spade, three hearts, seven diamonds and one club.

No doubt you noticed that the defense missed a chance. Under the club ace, East must sacrifice his king. Then, when declarer exits with the club nine, West must go up with the queen to ingest East's jack: the so-called Crocodile Coup.
