Atlantis' launch delayed

CAPE CANAVERAL — The twice-delayed mission to put a huge space communications satellite into orbit was delayed again late this morning.

The 100-ton Space Shuttle Atlantis was to set off on the nine-day voyage at 11:01 a.m. but the blast off was put on hold.

Workers had filled the shuttle's rust-colored external fuel tank before dawn. The astronauts, wearing bright orange flight suits, strapped into their cabin seats 2½ hours before liftoff.

The mission, commanded by John Blaha, is the 42nd shuttle flight for NASA.

It was delayed twice in as many weeks — once for one day to replace a bad connector in a circuit used to separate the orbiter and fuel tank than a scent, then by eight days to replace air engine computer, which failed hours away from liftoff last week. It was found to have a cracked

The high point of the flight — releasing the \$120 million should communications satellite — was set for six hours after liftoff.

The crew was to free it from the cargo bay, and an hour later an attached rocket was to boost the 4,600-pound craft 22,300 miles above the equator to join three other such Tracking and Data Relay Satellites in orbit.

The network of satellites is an improvement over NASA's old ground tracking stations in enabling Mission Control to talk to astronauts in space virtually all the time. The satellites also allow controllers to communicate with the Hubble Space Telescope and a half-dozen other NASA satellites.

The newest satellite is 57 feet across when its twin solar panels are unfurled.

Suit seeks repeal of boat fee

WASHINGTON — Congress and the Bush administration violated the Constitution by taxing up to 4.1 million pleasure boats to help reduce the budget deficit, boat owners contend in a lawsuit seeking to void the levy.

The 395,000-member Boat Owners Association of the United States said it sued the government in federal court Wednesday, contending that the \$718 million the bill would raise over five years would go into the general treasury instead of Coast Guard boating programs.

Thus, although described by Congress as a user fee, it actually is a tax on an arbitrarily selected group — a violation of the Constitution's equal-protection guarantee, association President Richard Schwartz said.

In two 1974 cases, the Supreme Court ruled that user fees must raise money directly for services that benefit people who pay them, said Larry Mallon, the group's attorney.

Crime fee investigated

SANFORD — Seminole County will research a criminal Justice fee for new homes to help pay for law enforcement, courts and Jall space.

Tuesday night was the second time commissioner Larry Furlong made the proposal, but the first time his fellow commissioners were willing to look into the proposal. In January, commissioners said Furlong seemed like he was trying to push the fee forward without asking staff to research it.

"It's a stop the bleeding approach." Furlong said. "The longer we put this off, the worse it gets. This is another cost of growth that we're not recouping by the tax structure that we have."

Furlong said crime tends to increase as population increases, so it will be fair to get new residents to help pay for that impact when they buy a new home. Similar "impact fees" are now charged for roads, fire protection and as of June 1. libraries. Furlong said criminal justice impact fees are already being charged by Oviedo and Citrus County.

Furlong noted the growing needs of the criminal justice system. This year, county and circuit court officials sought \$7 million for new equipment and employees. The bulk of the amount, \$6 million, was to expand the Seminole County Courthouse in Sanford to accommodate the increase in cases.

County Manager Ron Rabun and commissioners reduced the spending to about \$215,000.

Furlong said he wasn't certain all of the requests from court officials were urgent, noting a \$5,000 request for draperies for a judges' suite. Commissioners approved that request.

Sheriff Don Eslinger requested a total of more than \$1 million for new employees and equipment. Commissioners granted about \$733,000 of the request.

Furlong suggested two separate fees. One to be charged on all new home built in the county to help pay for the courts and Jail, which are used by all residents, and for countywide sheriff's operations, such as the City-County Investigative Bureau. Furlong suggested an additional fee would be charged on unincorporated homes for sheriff's law enforcement protection.

LAKE MARY — Drainage problems will be discussed over and over during tonight's Lake

Mary City Commission meeting.

Both a stormwater utility study, and a proposed bond issue which would finance drainage improvements are on the agenda.

One item to be brought up tonight is a resolution authorizing \$5 million in revenue bonds for capital improvements, which, among other things, includes \$2,350,000 for paving and drainage improvements. The Commission has already discussed the bond issue several times during various meetings.

The paving and drainage portion of the proposed bond money would be almost half of the total item list, which includes undergrounding of power lines and beautification on Lake Mary Boulevard, as well as construction of Phase 1 of the Sports Complex.

Early in tonight's mating, results of the stormwater utility study will again be discussed. The focal point is expected to be responses to questions previously asked by commissioners and citizens that required more explanation.

Ron Ferland, Vice President of the Environmental Division of Dyer, Riddle, Mills and Precourt, engineers, led the stormwater utility discussion during the July 18 meeting. At that time he explained the studies made in the city concerning drainage problems, the extensive rainfall that has caused flooding, and why water does not drain from certain areas of the city.

During the July meeting, Ferland received so many questions from members of the City Commission as well as private citizens, it was the consensus of the Commission that the issue be continued during a future meeting.

The major question brought out by citizens who spoke on the matter last month centered on exactly what the city planned to do, and when efforts would begin, to resolve the problem.

SANFORD — Two crumbling Midway streets that might have been replaced under a new county program probably will continue to detertorate and rural roads throughout the county will decline without maintenance and upkeep.

A \$1.2 million street replacement program is one large neck on the budget chopping block today as Seminole County commissioners try to cut about \$5 million from the county budget that supplies fire protection and street maintenance for unincorporated residents.

Tuesday, commissioners heeded the opposition of about 75 people attending a hearing and decided not to impose a 10 percent tax on utility bills for residents of the county who don't live in cities. City residents already pay the tax. Because the tax would be collected from unincorporated residents, unincorporated programs must be cut.

Commissioners did tentatively allow County Manager Ron Rabun to retain the same \$3.13 tax rate paid by non-city residents when considering which cuts to make. Commissioners had proposed cutting the immeorporated tax rate to \$2.82 along with adopting the utility tax.

Rabun is also recommending cutting another \$1.2 million from spending that would be used for repaying other strees and roads.

Among the streets considered under the reconstruction program is Beardall and Sipes Avenues between State Road 46 and Celery Avenue, sections of Celery Avenue between Beardall and Sipes Avenues, and sections of Upsala Road.

Although no final decisions had been made to do the work on the four streets next year, they were considered the prime candidates in northern Seminole County, said Herb Heroy, assistant county road superintendent

Heroy said under a major reconstruction all of the asphalt is removed, the base is patched if needed, then the asphalt is melted and poured on the base again. Heroy estimated Sipes and Beardall would cost about \$150,000 each to reconstruct. The Upsala Road repairs would cost \$100,000 and the Celery Avenue repairs would cost about \$50,000, he said.

Midway residents living along Beardall and Sipes were mixed in their reaction to the probable delay in the road repair work

Father charged with murder

TAMPA - A father has been charged with murder in the death of his 3-month-old son, who doctors say had a fractured

skull, broken ribs and brain hemorrhage.

Tommy J. Young, 21, was arrested Wednesday on charges of first-degree murder and aggravated child abuse in the death

Sunday of little Ryan Thomas Young.
Young claimed he dropped the infant Friday night and didn't tell his wife, authorities said.

But a Hillsborough County medical examiner's report concluded the injuries were too severe to be caused by simply

Doctors found that Ryan had "six fractured ribs, a blunttrauma to the head and shaken-baby syndrome," said sheriff's Lt. Ken Allen.

Allegations directed at SWAT member

DELAND - A mechanic says the SWAT team member who fatally shot a woman last week threatened to "blow my brains out" in December.

Charles Montgomery, 27, who has a lengthy arrest record, said the incident happened as he was being led in handcuffs to a patrol car after being arrested for making verbal threats to a police officer. Montgomery said Tuesday the Volusia County sheriff's

deputy. George T. Hernlen, punched him repeatedly and then placed the barrel of his gun against Montgomery's head, cocked it and said he would kill him. Sheriff Bob Vogel, who said the SWAT team killing of 61-year-old Helen Lucille McConnell last Saturday was justified, dismissed the allegation against Hernien. Vogel said

the accuser is a drug dealer and that his attorney, Jim Crock, is capitalizing on media attention. Hernien fired the shot that killed Ms. McConnell after a 45-minute standoff during which she threatened to commit suicide and fired at deputies with a shotgun.

Body of missing teen found

ST. PETERSBURG - The body of a missing 16-year-old was pulled from Tampa Bay a day after the bodies of his stepfather and stepsister were recovered near a beach where the family had been swimming.

Sheriff's investigators believe the three became stranged on a sandbar and were caught by an incoming tide during a squall. They were identified as Donald D. Williams, 41, his

7-year-old daughter Kari and stepson Ricky Ortwin. "It was windy, choppy. They were trying to get back to shore," said Marianne Pasha, spokeswoman for the Pinellas Sheriff's Office. "There's a bit of a drop-off that they maybe didn't know about."

Witnesses reported seeing the family struggling in the water just beyond a safe-swimming buoy off Fort DeSoto Park and alerted a lifeguard. Rescuers found the bodies of the father and daughter Tuesday, and the teen was found Wednesday at

Civilian naval employees terminated

The layoffs Wednesday are part of cost-cutting reductions of defeu for the Navy's now volume depots across the country.

Two are in viorida, at the Pensacola and Jacksonville naval air stations.

The Naval Air Systems Command expects to save about \$72 million over five-years by eliminating 2,450 jobs at the six

In addition to the layoffs, about 550 other Pensacola employes were notified they will be reassigned to new jobs. some with pay cuts, said Harry White, a civilian public affairs

Those changes and the terminations will be effective Sept.

Fire ravages landmark

MIAMI BEACH - A fire destroyed much of the Forge Restaurant and Bar, an elegant Miami Beach landmark where the rich and famous have gathered for decades.

The restaurant, which underwent a \$5 million renovation last summer, has been a watering hole for celebrities such as Godfrey, Judy Garland, Jackie Gleason, Sammy Davis Jr., and Frank Sinatra and gossip columnist Walter Wynchell.

Wednesday's fire was already well under way when a restaurant employee opened the front door at about 7 a.m. and was greeted by flames and smoke, said Detective Larry Carmody of the Miami Beach police.

Smoldering debris showered onto Arthur Godfrey Road, the main thoroughfare through central Miami Beach. Police redirected traffic while firefighters worked inside the restaurant, which is filled with antiques and artwork. No injuries from the fire were reported.

Suit: Bank financed smuggling

MIAMI - More than \$100 million in falsified letters of credit were supplied by the Bank of Credit and Commerce International to back a massive coffee-smuggling scheme that cheated U.S. Customs, according to a lawsuit filed here.

The fraud ring was headed by Munther Bilbeist, a Florida businessman and brother of BCCl's regional manager in Jordan. Fakhri Bilbeisi, the racketeering lawsuit filed by Lloyds of London claims.

Munther Bilbeisi also traded arms between Jordan and Guatemala, and was

involved in weapons deals with Israel and South Africa, witnesses and attorneys in the

case say.
In May, he was indicted in Fort
Lauderdale for \$3 million in tax fraud linked to the coffee case, and fled to Amman,

BCCI's role in the coffee-amuggling and other activities also are the focus of federal grand jury probes in Miami, according to court statements Wednesday by Arthur Koski, a laywer for Bilbeisl and his compa-

Koski and BCCl's Miami attorney Gregory Baldwin fought Wednesday before U.S. District Judge Federico Moreno to limit

depositions and avoid turning over records in the case. The judge did not rule immediately.

Lloyds attorney James Dougherty mocked BCCI's complaints that opening its records would violate the privacy of its account

"They are asserting confidentiality for the world's greatest collection of criminals," said Dougherty.

In the suit flied last year, Lloyds underwriter Nicholas Sturge charges that with BCCI's help, Munther Bilbeisi mounted the coffee scheme in 1983 as a deliberate fraud.

Republicans elated over Burt's victory

TALLAHASSEE - Locke Burt became the newest Republican in the Senate by 227 votes, and now he's ready to get to work.

"The next step is to get my committee assignments." Burt said Wednesday after a recount confirmed his victory in Tuesday's District 10 special election. "I was obviously pleased."

Republicans were elated by the victory, which made the Democrats' margin 22-18 in the state Senate and gave the GOP another vote with reapportionment coming in 1992.

"Eighteen instead of 17 guarantees that the reapportionment process will be more fair than it would have been," said Senate Minority Leader Ander Crenshaw of Jacksonville. "It helps lay the groundwork for the 1992 elections, when I think we can take over the Senate."

The recount, required by state law if a margin of victory is 0.5 percent or less, showed that Burt defeated Democrat Ed Dunn 20,616 votes to 20,389 votes Tuesday. Independent Tom Visconti, a Republican who ran on an anti-abortion platform, finished third with 6,366 votes.

Trial delayed; polister says major shift against Smith

WEST PALM BEACH - William Kennedy Smith's attorneys have gained a postponement of his rape trial, but their own polls indicate his image has been rocked by three women's claims he also sexually attacked them.

Palm Beach County Circuit Judge Mary Lupo granted the motion Wednesday to put off the trial, which was scheduled to begin Aug. 5. She told prosecutors and attorneys she would confer with them on setting a new date.

LOUISVILLE. Ky. - Convicted child molester and former physician Fred Rainey will learn by next week whether he can move permanently to New Smyrna Beach, Fla.

Rainey, apparently traveling in Florida now, pleaded guilty last year to sexually abusing seven teen-agers, some of them his patients. In Hardin County between 1959 and 1988.

Rainey, 60, was sentenced to 10 years in prison, but gained shock probation after serving seven months. One condition of his probation is that he move out of Hardin County.

On Sunday and Monday, news media in New Smyrna Beach publicized Rainey's plans to move there, as well as his criminal record.

Oregon head signs school overhaul bill

Roberts said the measure represents "another major Oregon first" that will be copied by states across the

The program, called the Oregon Educational Act for the 21st Century, will revamp high school so that students get a "certificate of mastery" in the 10th grade. Students then will be steered toward college preparatory courses or a program combining academic work and vocational training.

The reforms also will eliminate the traditional grade structure from kindergarten through third grade, grouping children according to abilities rather than age.

Construction on the bridge is scheduled to begin Oct. 21 and be completed by Sept. 29, 1993. according to Seminole County Expressway Authority director Gerald Brinton. The bridge is considered the key to the entire 12-mile tollroad from Aloma Avenue to U.S. Highway 17-92 at State Street because it links north and south Seminole County.

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

Voter apathy

Eighty-six percent of Americans who were registered to vote did vote in the 1968 presidential election, but 75 million eligible Americans are not registered, so they don't vote in any elections at all.

Some people may see nothing wrong in this. But it does give a hollow ring to "government of the people, by the people, and for the people." Seventy-five militon is more than the population of many a country. Most of these 75 million Americans live in households with incomes below the median.

Complexities of city life, red tape, party double-dealing, machine politics, official apathy, difficulties in getting off work — there are all kinds of reason why eligible voters don't register.

Legislation now pending in the Senate the National Voter Registration Act of 1991, S.250, is designed to raise the current agencies, which could register approximately 91 percent of eligible voters.

Registration opportunities would be offered to people renewing or applying for drivers' licenses or personal identification insued by motor vehicle agencies, which could register approximately 91 percent of eligible voters.

Also, employees in public welfare, un-employment and disability services offices would be required to offer assistance to applicants who wanted to register to vote.

States would be required to provide registration by mail in all federal elections.

Registered voters who move would remain registered. At present, one in three Americans moves during two years and lose registration

A comparison made in 1983 showed the United States has the lowest rate of voting in federal elections among major democracies. In a list of 23, the United States is ranked

Isn't it time to improve the U.S. record?

Don't blacklist China trade

The Bush administration's logic in extending most-favored-nation status to China for one year is irrefutable. Congress' attempt to put China on a trade blacklist should be vetoed by the president. It's unlikely the Senate has a two-thirds vote to override.

The way to press change upon China is not through blacklists, but through opening it up to the fresh winds of trade and exchanges. Democrats have chosen China's status as an issue for next year's elections, and they have chosen badly.

To grant trading privileges to China is not to condone its communist government - any more than granting it to Romania, Libya, South Africa, Iraq or Iran, all nations with most-favored-nation status, is to condone theirs. The Tiananmen brutality two summers ago was an offense against humanity. but cutting ties with China will not keep it from happening again.

Deepening economic ties with China just

China's communists showed two years ago they weren't ready to be swept away by student protest, but resisting the tides of history is another story. Albania, Yugoslavia and Ethiopia are now following Eastern Europe out of the shadows. North Korea, Victnam and Cuba are next, and China will not be far behind.

The last thing the West wants to do today is to force China back into resentful isolationism, the only atmosphere in which communism ever had a chance.

Using trade as a political lever can be successful. It worked in Rhodesia and South Africa, and is having a devastating effect in Iraq. It will work in Cuba as soon as Moscow cuts off its subsidies.

But it won't work in China. China is too big. too diverse, too open (primarily through Hong Kong) for Congress' gestures to have any effect.

The debate in Congress on China's MFN status has been entertaining, and in putting the Chinese on warning, even has served a purpose: A majority of America's representatives don't approve of Beijing's policies. It will not take much for that simple majority to become a two-thirds majority.

Space station in free-fall?

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration and industry lobbyists have saved Space Station Freedom for at least another year, with both the House and Senate voting to continue funding in 1992. However, the victory may be short-lived as critics have vowed to renew efforts next year to kill the costly project.

The administration asked for \$2.02 billion for continued development of Space Station Freedom. Originally slated to be launched in 1992 at a cost of about \$8 billion, the project now carries an uncertain completion date sometime late in this decade at a cost now estimated at \$40 billion.

The full cost to build, equip, launch and maintain the space platform for its estimated 30 years of life is \$120 billion. About \$5 billion has been spent so far.

Opponents of the project — and there are many both inside and outside the scientific community - argue that the space station is too costly and scientifically unnecessary.

As originally envisioned by the Reagan administration in the early 1980s, the space platform would be a floating laboratory and factory, developing wondrous new products in near-zero gravity. There was even talk that the space station might earn money by charging private industry for working there.

However, it soon became apparent through experiments done on space-shuttle flights - that near-zero gravity was not commercially important. At the same time, NASA began to realize the space platform would cost vastly more than first estimated. and that it was questionable whether something that big could be maintained in orbit. So the purpose and the size of the space station

were changed. After downsizing, the Reagan administration emphasized that the new, smaller-scale space station would be the site of invaluable scientific experiments. However, the scientific community came forward to say that it was

neither needed nor desired. The opponents pointed out that we have done about all the near-zero gravity experiments needed on the various space-shuttle flights. Now, they say, shuttle crews are hard-pressed to find enough scientific experiments to fill up six-day missions. (On the most recent launch, the main scientific experiment was ascertaining the effect of zero gravity on 2,400 jellyfish. The conclusion:

They seemed confused.) Recently a consortium of 14 major scientific and professional research organizations warned that the space station was of dubious scientific merit and would drain badly needed research funds from higher priority research. The joint letter - signed by the American Geophysical Union, the American Physical Society and the American Chemical Society,

merit of the currently planned station." Now the Bush administration has again changed the underlying mission of the space station. It is characterizing the project as the first step in "a new age of exploration" of space and our solar system. D. Allen Bromley assistant to the president for science and point

man for selling the program — puts it this way: "... the space station is our initial permanent step into space, the critical next chapter in a grand story of exploration that will take humans away from the home planet into an endless fron-

But at the same time, the space station is being sold to Congress in a much different and far more blunt way. Quite simply, Congress has been told to consider the space station as a massive

The project now carries an uncertain completion date. employment bill

aimed at helping states and congressional districts hold jobs they might lose in the forthcoming Pentagon cutbacks.

NASA sent every senator and congressman a map of the United States subtly titled "Businesses Get The Bucks." The map pinpointed the location of every company that would share in contracts and subcontracts from the project. Not surprisingly, they were in almost all 50 states, and spread across almost every congressional district.

Early in this year's congressional budget process a House appropriations subcommittee voted to strip space station funding from this year's budget. But congressmen representing districts that will share heavily in contracts fought back and got the decision reversed on the House floor by a vote of 240-173. Opponents vowed to take their fight to the Senate, but now they have lost there as well. after a key appropriations subcommittee voted

to fund the program. Opponents did score some points in the Senate arguing that the project was simply unaffordable. The Senate found the space station money, in part, by cutting \$1.2 billion from the program to provide affordable housing to the elderly.

The Bush administration wisely did not seek a long-term funding commitment for the space station this year. Rather, it will come back to among others - sharply questioned the Congress in the '93 and '94 budgets.

Syrian snitches for U.S. officials

WASHINGTON - The brother of Syrian President Hafez Assad is a longtime, clandestine snitch for the Central Intelligence Agency, feeding the CIA information about other countries in the Middle East and passing back-channel information to Washington for Assad.

The spy is Syrian Vice President Rifaat Assad: the younger brother of the president and the man most likely to succeed Hafez Assad if he ever steps down.

It is almost unheard of in the Arab world in recent times for the CIA to land a contact as high up in government as Rifaat Assad, especially in an Arab country with a history of hostile relations with the United States.

Sunni Muslims. Rifaat became the hatchet man of his brother's government in the early 1980s. He led government military forces in quelling an uprising in the city of Hama in February 1962 when a fundamentalist sect tried to take over the city and kill Assad's supporters. By the time Rifact was finished with the city, at

least 10,000 people were dead. He is despined by many Syrians for that, and for his ostentatious lifestyle that he flaunts in a poor country. Hafez Assad leads an ascetic life, but Rifast loves luxury. He has at least four wives and a fortune of more than \$100 million. He alternately lives in Paris, Geneva and other European capitals.


Knowledgeable sources say it was Rifaat who first approached the CIA about a proposed relationship. This happened before the summer of 1982, because the CIA stepped in to smooth over some trouble Rifaat had in the United States that fall.

Through a front corporation, in August 1982, Rifaat bought a \$1.1 million mansion in Potomac. Md., the priciest suburb of Washington. Neighbors, unaware of who the new guy was on the block, soon began to count more than 40 burly armed guards hanging around the place and other strange goings on. Then, in September, the fire department responded to a fire at the house. The residents had already fled, but fire investigators managed to snag two maids hurrying out with guns in briefcases. Inside, it looked like Rifaat's men were prepared for what organized crime syndicates call "going to the mattresses" - hunkering down in a house furnished with little more than guns and mattresses to wait for a gangland war.

Our sources say the CIA tried to keep the incident under wraps because of their growing relationship with Rifaat.

While he has received CIA gifts and money. Rifaat does not work with the CIA for profit. He likes the intrigue and the clout it gives him in the West. His brother has not discouraged the relationship, even at a time when the Soviet Union was the primary external source of funding and arms for

Some CIA officials became uncomfortable with the relationship after their dealings with Panama's Manuel Noriega came to light.



NAACP opposes Thomas' nomination

WASHINGTON - More than any other group, the NAACP's decision to oppose Clarence Thomas for the Supreme Court encourages the emergence of a solid and credible coalition to fight President Bush's nominee.

The NAACP's strong denunciation of Thomas on Wednesday

doesn't by itself spell doom for the nomination, but it provides

the key ingredient for an effective opposition.

Without the nation's oldest and biggest civil rights group in their corner, opponents had little chance of seriously contesting the nomination of a black judge to replace Justice Thurgood Marshall.

Bush leaves Moscow

MOSCOW - President Bush, venturing into the volatile world of Soviet politics, is attempting to strengthen ties with the nation's restive republics while underlining support for the central government of Mikhail Gorbachev.

After a warm farewell to Gorbachev this morning. Bush left Moscow to undertake the politically sensitive mission with a visit to the ancient city of Kiev, capital of the Ukraine and an agricultural and industrial stronghold in the Soviet heartland.

"My optimism about the future of the Soviet Union stems from the strength of its leadership, that of President Gorbachev and many others in Moscow and across this great land," Bush said in a carefully balanced departure statement.

Gas tax proposal faces veto

WASHINGTON - For the second time in less than a year, a 5-cent increase in the federal tax on gasoline is making its way through Congress. But unlike 1990, the White House says, this one will be vetoed.

A badly split House Ways and Means Committee agreed Wednesday night to boost the 14.1-cent-a-gallon tax by a nickel next Jan. 1. In addition, the increase enacted last year would be extended an additional three years beyond its acheduled 1996 expiration.

The vote was 19-17, with most Republicans opposing the bill. The new money, about \$26 billion over five years, would help finance \$153.5 billion worth of highway and mass-transit improvements. That total includes \$6.8 billion in demonstration — or "pork barrel" — projects in members' districts.

Baker back in Isreal

MOSCOW — Secretary of State James A. Baker III, on yet another trip to the Middle East, hopes to secure a promise from a reluctant Israel to attend an October peace conference with Its Arab neighbors.

The United States and the Soviet Union turned the spotlight on Israel again Wednesday by announcing a Middle East peace conference after months of Israeli resistance to diplomatic

Baker left Moscow this morning to fly to Jerusalem for meetings today with Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir and then on Friday with a Palestinian delegation in attempt to secure their attendance at the conference the superpowers want to

The idea is to resolve the Israeli-Palestinian dispute over which Palestinians would be engaged in the negotiations.

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

Cyst removal is a simple procedure

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have structures of the body, thereby everal sebaceous cysts of the enabling doctors to see if small tumors or growths are the cause several sebaceous cysts of the scalp. Can they be treated with an oral medication, or should I see a surgeon?

DEAR READER: Sebaceous cysts are harmless bumps in the skin caused by a backup of oily material in the sweat glands. Over time, this substance ac-cumulates in a blocked pore to cause the painless swelling.

Such cysts can occasionally become infected, necessitating drainage or removal. There is no medicine or non-operative treatment for sebaceous cysts. Therefore, I recommend you see a surgeon who can remove the cysts quite simply in the office, under local anesthesia.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from vertigo, which my doctor attributes to an inner ear infection. He has suggested an MRI if the problem continues, yet I am reluctant to undergo the procedure.

DEAR READER: Your doctor has given you appropriate in-formation. Vertigo (uncontrolled loss of balance, associated with a sensation of spinning) is usually caused by irritation of the balance mechanism in the inner ear. This irritation can result from a presumed virus infection. in which case the vertigo will disappear in a few days as the infection resolves of its own accord.

However, vertigo can also be caused by an acoustic neuroma. a growth in the inner ear. This is usually associated with continuous vertigo, or progressive worsening of symptoms. In such cases, further testing is needed to determine if a neuroma is present. MRI scanning is useful for this purpose. Using electromagnetic waves, the MRI machine creates a picture (on X-ray film) of the inner

They have no legal responsibility to return the money to the car's original owner. To illustrate, here's a similar case that went to the Supreme Court in 1981: In the case of the City of Everett v. the Estate of Sumstad. the Mitchells were a couple who purchased a used safe at an auction for \$50. The safe had previously belonged to the Sumstad estate and contained a locked inside compartment. The Mitchells had a locksmith open the compartment and discovered \$32,207 inside.

The Everett police impounded the money and brought an action against both the Sumstad estate and the Mitchells to determine the owner of the money. The trial court decided in favor of the estate, but in appeal, summary judgment was for the Mitchells.

Since the Mitchells understood the sale was final, and the auctioneer reserved no rights of the estate to any contents of the safe, the reasonable conclusion is that the autioneer objectively intended to sell both the safe and its contents, and that both


