## BILLY SUNDAY IN ST. AUGUSTINE

### MID-WINTER INTERNATIONAL BIBLE CONFERENCE WILL ALSO BE HELD IN ANCIENT CITY

St. Augustine, Feb. 20. St. Augustine is to enjoy the distinction of having a series of meetings of the world's most famous evangelist, Rev. William W. Sunday, without putting up one penny as a guarantee. It is the hope of the city fathers that the Rev. Mr. Sunday, acting pastor of Memorial church in the city, who is at the head of the great Winona Lake Assembly in Indiana, Billy Sunday is coming to Florida on his first tour accompanied by Mr. Sunday and that famous music director, Homer Rodeheaver, Accompanist Matthews and Miss Grace Saxe, one of the best authorities on the study of the Bible. There are but two cities in the state where Billy Sunday will speak, St. Augustine and Tampa. He will be in St. Augustine the six days from March 4 to 9 inclusive, going from St. Augustine to Tampa for a similar period. Already many advance reservations have been made at the St. Augustine hotels while a committee from the W. C. T. U. is undertaking a complete compilation by card index of every room in the city that can be secured for the housing of the great crowds expected. A huge tented auditorium has been secured, to which no admission will be charged, all the meetings being absolutely free. A master choir will be directed by Homer Rodeheaver, music being always one of the big features of the Sunday meetings.

For eight days prior to the coming of Billy Sunday and his party St. Augustine will hold its first international Mid-Winter Bible Conference, beginning Feb. 23rd and running to March 3rd. Such notables as Rev. John McNeil of Edinburgh, Rev. Campbell M. Coburn of Meadville College at Allegheny, Pa., Non-William Jennings Bryan, Rev. Dr. James M. Gray, dean of the Moody Institute, Chicago; Rev. Frank Nelson Palmer, D. D., of Winona Lake, Rev. A. T. Robertson, D. D., of Louisville, and Mrs. B. Mabel Quam Stevens of St. Augustine are on the program. The music for the Bible Conference will be in charge of Prof. J. H. Heaton of Winona Lake.

## CLEMENCEAU IS NOT BADLY INJURED

### REPORTED TO BE ONLY SLIGHTLY INJURED BY WOULD-BE ASSASSIN

Paris, Feb. 20.—Good news came early this morning from the sick room of George Clemenceau where he was being attended for the wound inflicted upon him yesterday by the anarchist, Emile Cottin. While all France, and in fact all the world, was waiting in suspense for word of his condition, an announcement was made that the aged statesman was feeling comfortably, no fever had developed and no complication had occurred. There is no knowing, however, how serious the premier's injuries are, but it is reported that a X-ray examination is completed.

The wound is slight, but nevertheless serious for a man as old as the French premier. Physicians, however, say the heart and arteries are unharmed and that he has recovered from a shock which would have been fatal to a younger man.

## INTERESTING MEETINGS OF CATTLE MEN

### MET AND ORGANIZED ON 17TH AND WILL HAVE ANOTHER INTERESTING MEETING ON 27TH

In pursuance with call issued by Nicholson Brothers, Joe Cameron and Seth Woodruff for a meeting of the cattle owners for that portion of Volusia county lying south of the Smyrna and Orange City Railroad, to be held at 17th Street, Sanford, Feb. 17th, 1919, at 10 a. m. to consider the question of co-operative systematic dipping of cattle to begin April 1st, 1919, a large and representative number of such cattle owners met.

Mr. Seth Woodruff called the meeting to order and read the call and stated that nominations for a chairman and secretary would be in order.

Mr. Seth Woodruff was re-elected chairman and Mr. Alfred L. Smith, secretary of the meeting. The following nominations were made: Chairman, Mr. Woodruff; Secretary, Mr. Smith.

The meeting then read a copy of an agreement entered into between Nicholson Brothers and the cattle owners of Volusia county, and having present to business purposes the agreement. This agreement is being put to all present to be signed, and will be published in the next issue of the Herald.

Mr. Mark then addressed the meeting as to the advantages of the systematic dipping of cattle to begin April 1st, 1919, and it would suggest those who dipped this year to dip again next year.

After a most excellent and bounteous repast the meeting was called to order by the chairman.

The point raised by Mr. Marks was again placed before the meeting. This agreement, which stated that as soon as the Seminoles county fair was held in Volusia county would be placed in a very serious position unless they began dipping at the same time. After a thorough discussion of the question, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the cattle owners assembled here are desirous of learning of the attitude of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board and the United States Bureau of Animal Industry relative to the commencement of systematic tick eradication

work in Volusia, Brevard and Seminole counties;

And Whereas this information can best be gained by meeting and thoroughly discussing this matter, therefore, be it

Resolved that this meeting respectfully request that a member of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board and one of the U. S. Board of Animal Industry and one from each of Seminole, Brevard and Volusia meet with them at the court house at Sanford, Florida on Feb. 27th at 10:00 a. m.

Mr. Joe Marks then addressed the meeting relative to the advantages derived from "dehorning" cattle and stated he thought it was a good time to begin a "dehorning campaign," whereupon the following resolution was adopted:

Be it resolved that all cattle owners present adopt the practice of dehorning as soon as possible and advocate same in their respective districts.

### WORK ROOMS IN SANFORD MUST BE CLOSED UNLESS MORE HELP IS GIVEN FOR MAKING OF REFUGEE GARMENTS

Shall the Red Cross work rooms in Sanford remain open or shall the Chapter be disbanded?

This is the question which is confronting the local Red Cross organization. Since the war is over, it seems that interest in the work of the Red Cross is over too, at least as far as Sanford is concerned, with the exception of the few faithful ladies who have labored long and hard to keep up Sanford's allotment of refugee garments.

The matter has at last come to the position where more interest is necessary if the work room is to be kept open. The need now is just as great as ever. Thousands of refugees are without homes, clothing and the necessities of life. The Red Cross is doing what it can for these people and the great need at this time is for refugee garments. The material is furnished and all that is asked is that some one volunteer to make the garments.

The Red Cross workrooms are open on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 to 12 and 1 to 4 o'clock. The call for workers is urgent. Unless more help can be had the room will be closed. All those who wish to volunteer to help call Phone 89 and offer their services.

Last week the War Relief Committee of the Woman's Club forwarded to the commission for the relief of Belgium at Newark, New Jersey a box of clothing that contained over two hundred garments. #### ARRESTED FOR LARCENY

Man Badly Wanted in Colorado is Found in Sanford

Considerable excitement was caused here Saturday night by the arrest of a man who was said to be a bad character and was wanted by the authorities on a charge of grand larceny. He had just arrived in Sanford when arrested.

The man, who is said to be J. P. Kinsman, alias J. P. Baker was arrested here Saturday night on First street, upon complaint of Albert Backus, an ex-man from Oklahoma who claims that Kinsman stole a sum of money \$5,000 during the summer.

Hearing on larceny corpus proceedings was begun on Saturday night at 10 o'clock before Judge Household, ex-judge commissioner for Judge Perkins. At midnight the hearing was still in progress and was adjourned until next morning.

## Place Of Fertilizers In Southern Agriculture

Farmer-Banker Discusses Real Value of Fertilizers Out of His Years of Experience, Observation and Study—Timely Topic Relating to Vital Southern Problem—Extracts From an Address.

Bright Williamson, Darlington, S. C.  
 Agriculture is the bed rock and foundation upon which every other industry must stand or fall. All the people prosper or fall to prosper according to the abundance of the harvest of the soil, and upon agriculture depends the prosperity and happiness of the world.

Better methods of agriculture include the use of modern implements, modern cultivation and soil improvement. They bring us directly to the importance of the fertilizer industry as a means of improving our soils. Fertilizers are absolutely essential in order to increase the fertility of the soil. They have a direct effect upon agricultural production and through the products of agriculture a direct effect upon all other industries.

Anything which contributes to an increase in our agricultural production contributes to the welfare, comfort and prosperity of our people as a whole, and this brings us directly to the importance of the fertilizer industry.

Fertilizers Necessary in South  
 The very nature of our soil climate and rainfall makes it impossible to raise crops fully adapted to our soil and climate from natural sources with at best two of the six essential elements entering into the composition and development of plant life. Without fertilizers much of the best producing cotton land in the south would become unproductive and farming would be unprofitable.

Transformed Sections  
 Large sections of land in various parts of the South Atlantic States, for instance, were once required for the purpose of producing one bushel of cotton which now, by the use of fertilizers, would produce one hundred bushels of cotton.

Prosperity Due to Fertilizers  
 Whatever may be the direct benefit it is obvious from a study of the situation that the present prosperity and greater population in South Carolina is due more largely to the use of commercial fertilizers than to any other cause.

Products of Cashew Tree  
 Besides the nuts used in confectionery the India cashew tree yields an insect repelling gum, a juice that makes indelible ink, and three kinds of oil, one edible, the others used to tan fishing nets and preserve wood.

Without Fertilizers  
 A man who makes \$15 a week has been advised by a writer that he can marry and get along, provided he has saved up a fund. That sounds reasonable. A man who can save a fund out of a \$15-a-week salary has nothing to fear from marriage or anything else.—Kansas City Star.

To Conserve Firewood  
 In burning wood in a furnace built for coal the firebox should first be lined with firebrick or sheet iron, so as to check the draft. Otherwise, the wood will burn too rapidly.

## After-The-War Problems Affect Telephone Service

WHILE the nation was under the stress incident to winning the war, we asked our subscribers and the public to be patient with the telephone service and to limit its use as much as practicable in order that we might handle the urgent business of the nation efficiently.

Now that the armistice has been signed and hostilities have ceased, we are confronted with problems of the reconstruction period, which are equally as serious and which will require time and patience for solution.

The policy of frankness which we have practiced prompts us to make it clear that the difficulties under which we are now operating are such that it will be many months before we can bring our service back to the standard of efficiency prevailing prior to the European war.

The abnormal increase in the volume of telephone calls due to war activities created a need for a greater number of operators and we have been diligently building up an enlarged operating force. When this situation was very well in hand last fall the influenza epidemic played havoc with our forces and our losses from illness and death are still alarming. As a result of this combination of circumstances, the percentage of now and inexperienced operators is large and there is now a serious shortage although our training schools are graduating large classes every month.

Although our service has suffered from these causes the public has been considerate and we have been able to handle a heavier traffic than seemed humanly possible and have installed promptly and operated efficiently the telephone plants required by the government at army camps and other similar institutions.

The situation confronting our service is more serious now than it was when fighting was in progress. **DOUGHBOYS INVADE HISTORIC RESORTS**

Haunts of Napoleon Are Home to A. E. F. Troops Through Efforts of Y. M. C. A. Forces to Better "Leave" Facilities.

Paris Where Napoleon III and King Edward VII of England spent many leisure hours the American Expeditionary Force is now at play. The famous resort clubs and casinos, founded and patronized by King Edward, and St. Sauveur, where the Third Napoleon went to rest with his court, indicate the variety of attractions offered by the Y. M. C. A. in the leave areas system operated in cooperation with the military authorities. From the Alps to the Pyrenees and from the Brittany coast to the Riviera, there are seven "Y" leave areas in which the Expeditionary Force is entertained at one time. Preparations are now under way to increase these much appreciated facilities to double their present capacity.

Representatives of the army and of the Y. M. C. A. are now traveling from one end of France to the other seeking new spots in which to set up leave areas. The experiment at Aix les Bains has been successful from the start. An American news column pretty well from first-hand information carried home by Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., who organized the women's convalescent work at Aix.

"Aches and Pains" was an ideal spot for the experiment, but six others have been found and put in operation, each equally satisfactory as the original model. Consequently it is with optimism that the army and the "Y" seek to increase the centres where sure cures have been found for homesick doughboys.

Location, climate, hotel accommodations, opportunities for entertainment and sight-seeing and the moral and physical cleanliness of the area are important in the selection of a leave resort. As soon as a site is selected the largest available is obtained by the Y. M. C. A. as its main center of operations, men and women are assigned to service and negotiations are begun to secure reduced prices from such entertainment enterprises as cannot be duplicated by the Y. M. C. A. and every effort is made to give as much service as possible. The army provides transportation and pays the hotel bills, thereby enabling the soldier to enjoy all the attractions formerly restricted to kings and emperors and malefactors of great wealth.

## Aim At Above-the-Average Yields In 1919

(From Progressive Farmer, Dec. 31.)  
For the average Southern farmer, we cannot think of a better resolution for the New Year than one calling for better than average yields. Average yields, whatever the crop, mean over a period of years, little more than a living wage. But as the individual farmer rises above the average, his net profits, nine times in ten, correspondingly rise. The man who raises cotton must see that our average of about one-third of a bale per acre can only mean poverty to the grower; the man who grows corn and oats at our average rate of 15 to 20 bushels per acre must see that there can be no profit in such yields; our peanut and tobacco farmers, our dairy and general livestock farmers must see that so long as they are content with a mere average yield per acre or per animal, just so long will they find the farming game unprofitable and unattractive.

them, it should be remembered that rather liberal expenditures are justifiable. For instance, when a bale of cotton with the seed is worth \$150, our average per acre yield of one-third of a bale is worth \$50; but when we increase this to two-thirds of a bale, worth \$100, we have a gross profit of \$50 with which to pay for the cost of the increase. Of course the cost of this increased yield, if the matter is gone about judiciously, will practically never be as much as \$50. More often than not, in fact, it will be \$25 or less, leaving a net profit of \$25 or more per acre. And the same rule will hold with other crops and livestock as well. The higher the yield per acre or per animal, within certain limits, the greater the net return.

The new year and the years to come hold great things for the thinking, progressive, business-like farmer. Prices promise to remain good for a long time, and fair profits seem certain for the man who farms right.

Let us, as our first New Year resolution, aim at putting our farms on a big-yielding, money-making basis. There is no surer way for making farm life more attractive and desirable and for keeping the boys and girls on the farm.

## "Y" ENTERTAINERS NEEDED IN FRANCE

While certain branches of the work of the National War Work Council of the Y. M. C. A. has been doing for some time are being curtailed, one type of service is being called upon for more cooperation than ever before. Although for some time there have been approximately 400 to 500 entertainers in France, many difficulties have surrounded this type of service and the thousands of shows which have been given in France have only been put over in spite of almost superhuman difficulties. Now, however, with the period of demobilization forcing upon the Army new problems has a real spirit of cooperation been shown by the Army authorities. Therefore, General Pershing has detailed Colonel Kelly, from his own Staff, to act as entertainment officer for the A. E. F., which position places him as the liaison officer between the Army and the "Y" Entertainment Bureau in Paris.

Theatres and large buildings are being taken over, mechanics supplied by the Army are getting them into operation and the "Y" is producing shows, given by soldier talent alone, and also dramatic and vaudeville performances and miscellaneous musical programs, the personnel of all of which must be recruited from this country.

Owing to the large number of men in the Army with entertainment ability, no effort is being made to send men to the front. Women, however, are wanted for these positions in large numbers. 125 must be sent out from this country every month, which will require the cooperation of every recruiting agency throughout the country. All entertainers are supplied with uniforms, life, accident and health insurance, transportation, and allow \$160.00 per month for living expenses in France.

The women should be preferably between the ages of 21 and 30 and attractive and intelligent. A pronounced ability in their particular line. The field for entertainment now reaches from the coast towns in France right up to the front lines, for while the "Y" cannot do much with the Army of Occupation in the way of entertainment it can supply entertainment and is doing so on an increasingly large scale.
