### AN ORDINANCE Granting to S. O. Chase, A. T. Rossiter, A. P. Connelly, F. P. Forster and J. N. Whitner, Their Associates and Assigns, Certain Rights and Privileges Pertaining to Street Railroad in the City of Sanford, Florida

Be it ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Sanford, Florida:

Section 1. That S. O. Chase, A. T. Rossiter, A. P. Connelly, F. P. Forster and J. N. Whitner, hereafter designated as GRANTEES, their associates and assigns, are hereby given and granted municipal franchises, rights, privileges and authority to have and operate street railways, and the right of way therefor, upon, along, through, over and across the streets and avenues of the City of Sanford, as follows: Constructing first on Sanford avenue from south city limits to First street; and from Sanford avenue to Oak avenue on First street, according to E. R. Trafford's map of the town of Sanford, Orange County, Florida, and such other streets and avenues as the City Council shall from time to time direct by resolution or ordinance. Said rights and privileges are hereby granted to the said Grantees for the purposes of construction, maintaining and operating by electricity, gasoline or such other motive power, except steam, as may be from time to time authorized by the City Council, a line of street railway for the transporting of passengers, in event the tracks shall be laid on the ground, ground wires, and such side tracks, switches, turnouts and connections as may be approved by the City Council or its street committee, as may be necessary to the proper operation of street railways in said streets and parts of same, for the full term of thirty (30) years, from and after the date of the going into effect of this ordinance.

In the operation of their motors and cars upon said street railway, herein provided, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall conform to and be governed by such rules and regulations as have been heretofore and shall hereafter be adopted by ordinance of said city.

Section 2. The tracks shall be laid with rails suitable for operating with motive power as herein provided, and in such manner as not to impair the usefulness of the street as a thoroughfare for the passage of other vehicles, and so that no inconvenience or obstruction shall be caused to the travel on the street or shall establish such grade. Where the streets are not graded, said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall grade the space between the rails and tracks, together with the ends of the ties on such streets or parts of streets, and shall remove and adjust their tracks to conform to said grade with as little inconvenience and hindrance to the use of such street as possible, and in no event shall the tracks be laid so as to prevent the paving taken up so as to conform to the established grade, making the needed repairs with like material used in such paving.

Whenever or wherever the city or owners of the abutting property on any street shall have paved or shall pave, or cause to be paved, any street or part of street on which said Grantees, their associates or assigns, now have or will have their said tracks or any part thereof, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall at the same time, and upon notice in writing, given by the said city, and under its supervision and direction, pave the space between its rails and tracks, and at least two feet beyond the ends of the ties, in the same manner and with the same material as is used in paving the remainder of the street; and shall maintain the same in good order and condition.

At all crossings on unpaved streets, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall, under the supervision and direction of said city, cover the space between their tracks and between the rails of their tracks, and even therewith for at least two feet wide, and the approaches thereto on such side, with rock or shell, or with such other material as may be permitted by said city, and shall maintain the same in good repair and condition.

Section 3. The laying of said tracks, crossings and approaches at crossings, and the locations of wires within the said city limits, and maintaining the same, shall be under the supervision of the proper authorities of said city, and shall be done in accordance with their instructions.

Section 4. The fare charged by said Grantees, their associates and assigns, from any point on their line or branches, attainable by one continuous passage within the city limits along said lines and

branches, shall not exceed five (5) cents. No fare shall be charged for children under five years of age when accompanied by a person paying fare.

Section 5. The said City of Sanford shall in no case tear up or undermine said tracks of said Grantees, their associates and assigns, to lay down new pipes or ducts or sewers, or for any purpose, without re-laying said tracks.

Section 6. Said Grantees, their associates and assigns, and their officers and agents, shall be subject to all ordinances and resolutions which the City Council may, from time to time, enact.

Section 7. The cars of said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall have the right of way on and over their railway tracks, turnouts and switches, to the exclusion of all teams and vehicles (except the fire apparatus in case of fire), and any person who shall obstruct such tracks or parts thereof, or otherwise retard the progress of said cars, after due notice is given by the car bell or whistle, or other proper signal, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding five days. Provided, however, this section shall not operate as a release from lawful damages for accidents.

Before this ordinance shall become operative, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall enter into a written contract, to be filed with the City Clerk of the City, agreeing to be bound by all the terms, stipulations, and conditions of this ordinance. Such contract to be executed within sixty days after notification by the Mayor in writing of the passage and approval of this ordinance. Failure on the part of the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, to carry out and perform all or any of the conditions or undertakings expressed in this franchise, shall work a forfeiture of all rights on the streets of the City of Sanford.

The granting of the rights and privileges, herein set forth in this ordinance, is upon the express condition that the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, obligate themselves to build, construct, equip, and operate their said railway on Sanford avenue from the south city limits to First street, and on First street from Sanford avenue to Oak avenue, as herein set forth, within eighteen months from the passage and approval of this ordinance. And shall begin to construct and prosecute the construction vigorously to completion of their said line of railway, as herein provided, and a failure to do so shall constitute a forfeiture of all rights and privileges herein granted.

Said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall, within thirty days after being notified by the Mayor in writing of the approval of this ordinance, notify the City Council in writing of their acceptance of the provisions and conditions of this ordinance, and the failure on the part of said Grantees, their associates and assigns, to notify the City Council within sixty days after the receipt of notice of the approval of this ordinance as herein prescribed, shall constitute a forfeiture of all rights and privileges granted and comprised in this ordinance.

Section 8. The City of Sanford gives and grants the franchises and rights herein set forth, reserving the right and requiring the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, as a condition precedent to the taking effect of the grant, to give and grant to the City of Sanford, the rights, at and after the expiration of the term of thirty (30) years hereinbefore mentioned, to purchase the street railroad and other property used under or in connection with the franchises and rights hereby granted, or such part of such property as the City of Sanford may desire to purchase, at a valuation of the property, real and personal, desired, which valuation shall be fixed by arbitration as provided by law, in accordance with and to the full extent of the provisions of the laws of the State of Florida in such cases made and provided.

Section 9. It is further provided that nothing in this franchise shall be construed so as to deprive any abutting owners along said railway from recovering any damages that may be lawfully claimed, from said Grantees, their associates and assigns.

Section 10. It is further provided that if the Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall abandon said railroad, or shall fail to operate its cars for public use for a term of sixty days at one time (except in cases of war, strikes, earthquakes, floods or epidemics), it shall work a forfeiture of this franchise and all rights and privileges herein granted.

Section 11. The Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall at no time operate freight cars, except one trailer, within the city, without special permission being granted by a resolution of the City Council.

Section 12. Be it FURTHER ORDAINED, that whenever the City of Sanford shall have within its corporate limits a population of ten (10,000) thousand, the

said company shall exhibit to the said city and permit the examination by the said city and its proper officers, all books of accounts to ascertain the amount of its gross earnings; and after ascertaining such amount, and the population having reached such number, the said City of Sanford shall have the right to levy a tax of not exceeding two per cent annually on the gross earnings of said company, which levy shall be collected as other taxes due the city, and shall become a lien upon the property of the said company.

Sanford City Bonds for Sale

We, the undersigned, bond trustees, offer for sale fifteen (15) Bonds of the City of Sanford, Florida, of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, bearing six percent interest, payable semi-annually, coupons attached, and payable at the National Park Bank of New York City, on January 1st and July 1st of each year.

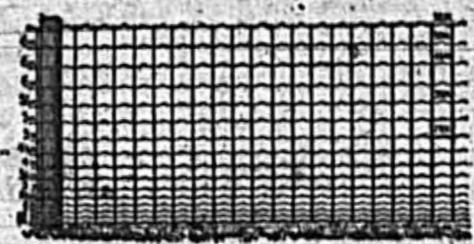

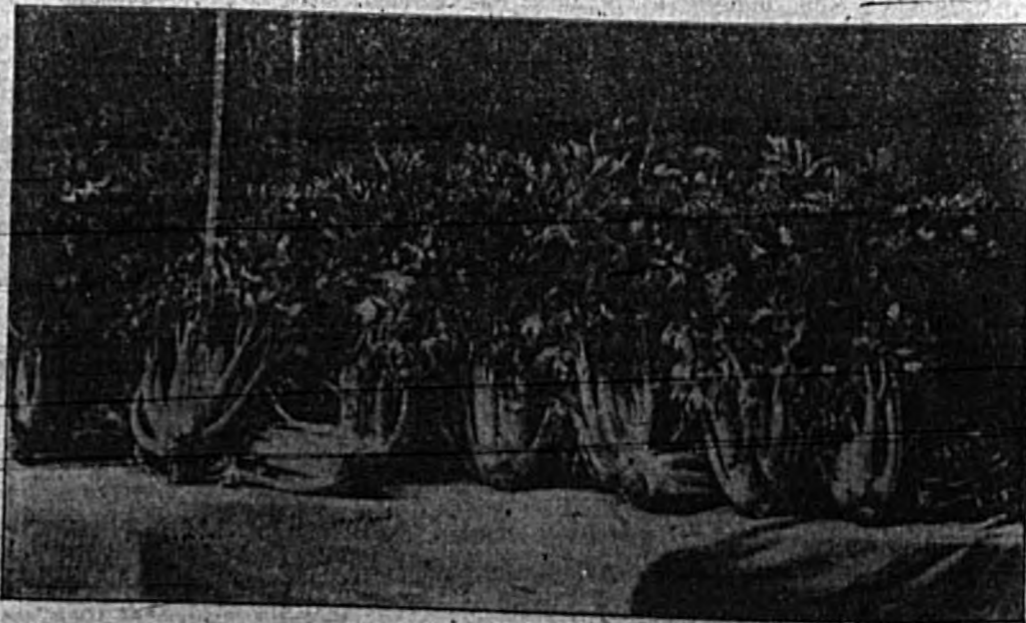

We have been much pleased with the grade of editorial work done by the fraternity. It is of a high order. It seems to us that there is more improvement in the average country newspaper than in almost any enterprise with which we are acquainted. While we are on this subject, we will take occasion to say that the country editor, the country preacher, the country doctor, and the country school teacher will never be appreciated as they should. There is not enough gratitude in the human heart to adequately appreciate the work of these self-sacrificing individuals. Brethren of the weekly press, we are glad to be with you.

**BRYAN WILL BE ELECTED**

Next Tuesday is the day for every true and loyal Democrat to go to the polls and cast his vote for William Jennings Bryan, the man who is destined to lead the Democratic hosts to victory, and whose election means so much to the entire country, and especially to the south. Never before has Bryan's election seemed so sure, and now is the time to speak and work and give to the Democratic cause, and thus insure supremacy to the party that has been kept down so long by the money power of the land, and not by the will of the people.

Every part of the United States seems intent on the election of Bryan, and for the first time in many years there is harmony in the Democratic ranks and a desire to elect the man who, though suffering two defeats, still has the love and esteem of so many thousands and the general endorsement of the party.

The following from the Miami Metropolis in a brief summary fully explains the situation:

"An impartial summary of the political situation discloses conditions that may well incite Republican fears and inspire Democratic hopes.

"Taking the results of the national elections of 1904 and 1900 as a basis, it is next to impossible to figure out how Bryan is going to overcome majorities and secure the larger share of electoral votes."

"But conservative writers, who have gone over the political field, east and west, agree that while on the face of things Taft ought to win, it is by no means certain that he is going to win.

"In almost every community, east and west, Republicans are to be found who make no secret of their intention to vote for Bryan. Fully nine-tenths of the Democrats who opposed him in 1896 and 1900 are now in line to support his candidacy.

"The labor vote, which went largely to McKinley and Roosevelt, is now largely for Bryan. Republicans admit that he will likely get 60 per cent of this labor vote. Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, says he will receive fully 80 per cent of this labor vote—probably not one-fourth of it in the Roosevelt campaign. Although not counting heavily upon the negro defection from the Republican party, this loss will probably amount to 10 per cent.

"General situation—Democratic organization better than at any time since 1892; Republican organization weaker than at any time since 1892. Taft handicapped in conservative quarters by Roosevelt's championship of him; Bryan greatly strengthened throughout the west by radicalism built up by Roosevelt; conditions mixed and unusual in every quarter; no basis for wholly reliable prediction anywhere, save for a landslide throughout the west; Bryan must have New York in order to win; an upheaval may give him a number of western states and still permit Taft to win if Taft carries New York."

**HAS HIS WIRE CROSSED**

"The City Council of Sanford has granted a franchise for an electric light plant for lights and a street railway to S. O. Chase, T. P. Forster, A. P. Connelly, A. T. Rossiter and J. N. Whitner.

"We learn from a gentleman holding extensive interests in Sanford that no one should jump to the hasty conclusion that this means the immediate building of an electric railway, but that the right is included in the franchise for future use should the company deem it wise to undertake such a project.

"We are glad our sister city is to have a system of electric lights. Next to celery that will help make the town more than any one thing. We should be pleased to see her take up the electric railway project, and with others project it southward to Orlando and Kissimmee, but with the money conditions as they have been for some time past, we realize that this important step can hardly be more than thought of.

"As much as we have wished for an electric road and advocated it for the past ten years, we are not going 'off our trolley' over the matter until we know some men of means are back of the scheme."—Orlando Reporter-Star.

Bro. Howard is slightly off his trolley regarding the franchises granted, as the one for electric lights has not yet been granted, although the Sanford Gas & Fuel Co., having a franchise under the existing charter, contemplate putting in an electric light plant.

The franchise granted to S. O. Chase, T. P. Forster, A. P. Connelly, A. T. Rossiter and J. N. Whitner is for the Sanford Traction Co. to have right of way over the city streets. A petition for franchise is pending for another electric light and power plant, thus giving Sanford electric lights and a street railway in any event.

We are certainly sorry that Orlando falls in the capital to put in a trolley line, but then they can come to Sanford and ride on the cars to see how they are manipulated.

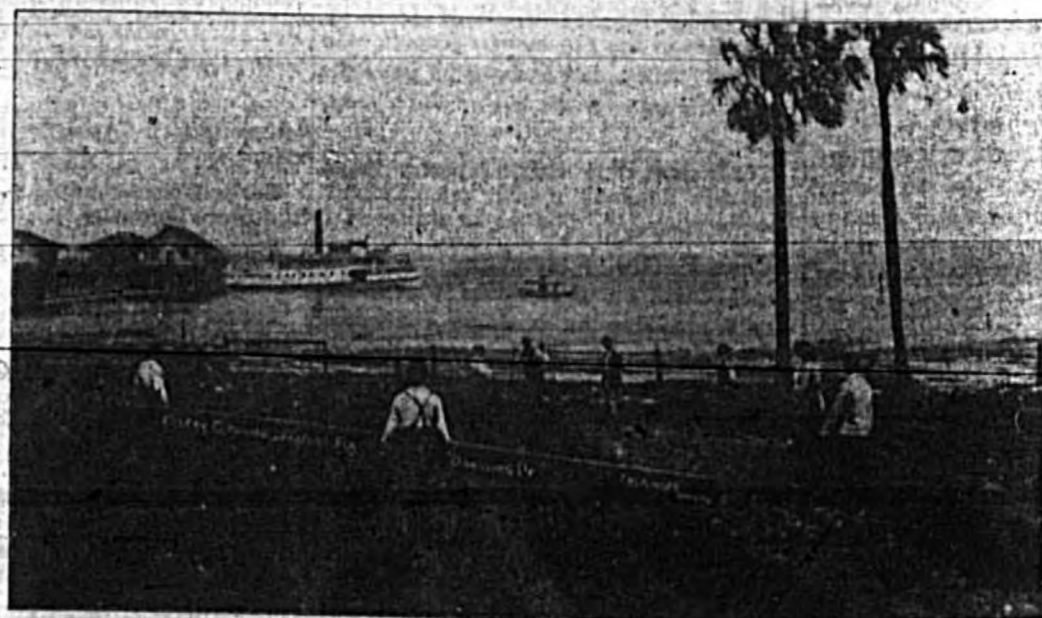

AN ORDINANCE

Granting to S. O. Chase, A. T. Rossiter, A. P. Connelly, F. P. Forster and J. N. Whitner, Their Associates and Assigns, Certain Rights and Privileges Pertaining to Street Railroad in the City of Sanford, Florida

Be it ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Sanford, Florida:

Section 1. That S. O. Chase, A. T. Rossiter, A. P. Connelly, F. P. Forster and J. N. Whitner (hereafter designated as GRANTEES), their associates and assigns, are hereby given and granted municipal franchises, rights, privileges and authority to have and operate street railways, and the right of way therefor, upon, along, through, over and across the streets and avenues of the City of Sanford, as follows: Constructing first on Sanford avenue from south city limits to First street; and from Sanford avenue to Oak avenue on First street, according to E. W. Traylor's map of the town of Sanford, Orange County, Florida, and such other streets and avenues as the City Council shall from time to time direct by resolution or ordinance. Said rights and privileges are hereby granted to said Grantees for the purposes of constructing, maintaining and operating by electricity, gasoline or such other motive power, except steam, as may be from time to time authorized by the City Council, a line of street railway for the transporting of passengers, baggage and freight together with such underground wires, and such side tracks, switches, turnouts and connections as may be approved by the City Council or its street committee, as may be necessary to the proper operation of street railways in said streets and parts of same, for the full term of thirty (30) years, from and after the date of the going into effect of this ordinance.

In the operation of their motors and cars upon said street railway, herein provided, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall conform to and be governed by such rules and regulations as have been heretofore and shall hereafter be adopted by ordinance of said city.

Section 2. The tracks shall be laid with rails suitable for operating with motive power as herein provided, and in such manner as not to impair the usefulness of the street as a thoroughfare for the passage of other vehicles, and so laid as to conform to the established grade on which the railway is to be built, wherever the city has established or shall establish such grade. Where the streets are not graded, said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall grade the space between the rails and two feet beyond the ends of the ties on such streets or parts of streets, and shall remove and adjust their tracks to conform to said grade with as little inconvenience and hindrance to the use of such street as possible, and in no event shall the city be liable to said Grantees, their associates or assigns, for any damage on account of said change. When the said Grantees, their associates or assigns, shall lay or repair their tracks on said streets or portions of streets at the time paved, they shall at their own expense relay the paving taken up so as to conform to the established grade, making the needed repairs with like material used in such paving.

Whenever or wherever the city or owners of the abutting property on any street shall have paved or shall pave, or cause to be paved, any street or part of street on which said Grantees, their associates or assigns, now have or will have their said tracks or any part thereof, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall at the same time, or upon notice in writing given by the said city, and under its supervision and direction, pave the space between its rails and tracks, and at least two feet beyond the ends of the ties, in the same manner and with the same material as is used in paving the remainder of the street; and shall maintain the same in good order and condition.

At all crossings on unpaved streets, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall, under the supervision and direction of said city, cover the space between their tracks and the rails of their tracks, and even therewith for at least two feet wide, and the approaches thereto on each side, with rock or shell, or with such other material as may be permitted by said city, and shall maintain the same in good repair and condition.

Section 3. The laying of said tracks, crossings and approaches thereto and the location of said wires within the said city limits, and maintaining the same, shall be under the supervision of the proper authorities of said city, and shall be done in accordance with their instructions.

Section 4. The fare charged by said Grantees, their associates and assigns, from any point on their line or branches, attainable by one continuous passage within the city limits along said lines and

branches, shall not exceed five (5) cents. No fare shall be charged for children under five years of age when accompanied by a person paying fare.

Section 5. The said City of Sanford shall in no case tear up or undermine said tracks of said Grantees, their associates and assigns, to lay down new pipes or ducts or sewers, or for any purpose, without re-laying said tracks.

Section 6. Said Grantees, their associates and assigns, and their officers and agents, shall be subject to all ordinances and resolutions which the City Council may, from time to time enact.

Section 7. The cars of said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall have the right of way on and over their railway tracks, turnouts and switches, to the exclusion of all teams and vehicles (except the fire apparatus in case of fire), and any person who shall obstruct such tracks or parts thereof, or otherwise retard the progress of said cars, after due notice is given by the car bell or whistle, or other proper signal, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding five dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding five days. Provided, however, this section shall not operate as a release from lawful damages for accidents.

Section 8. This ordinance shall become operative, the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall enter into a written contract, to be filed with the City Clerk of the City, agreeing to be bound by all the terms, stipulations, and conditions of this ordinance. Such contract to be executed within sixty days after notification by the Mayor in writing, of the passage and approval of this ordinance. Failure on the part of the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, to carry out and perform all or any of the conditions or undertakings expressed in this franchise, shall work a forfeiture of all rights on the streets of the City of Sanford.

The granting of the rights and privileges herein set forth in this ordinance, is upon the express condition that the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, obligate themselves to build, construct, equip and operate their said railway on Sanford avenue from the south city limits to First street, and on First street from Sanford avenue to Oak avenue, as herein set forth, within eighteen months from the passage and approval of this ordinance. And shall begin to construct and prosecute the construction vigorously to completion of their said line of railway, as herein provided, and a failure to thus construct within the reasonable period specified, shall work a forfeiture of this franchise and all rights and privileges herein granted.

Said Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall, within thirty days after being notified by the Mayor in writing of the approval of this ordinance, notify the City Council in writing of their acceptance of the provisions and conditions of this ordinance, and the failure on the part of said Grantees, their associates and assigns, to notify the City Council within sixty days after the receipt of notice of the approval of this ordinance as herein prescribed, their acceptance thereof, shall operate as a forfeiture of all rights and privileges granted and comprised in this ordinance.

Section 9. The City of Sanford gives and grants the franchises and rights herein set forth, reserving the right and requiring the said Grantees, their associates and assigns, as a condition precedent to the taking effect of the grant, to give and grant to the City of Sanford, the rights, at and after the expiration of the term of thirty (30) years hereinbefore mentioned, to purchase the street railroad and other property used under or in connection with the franchises and rights hereby granted, or such part of such property as the City of Sanford may desire to purchase at a valuation of the property, real and personal, desired, which valuation shall be fixed by appraisers as provided by law, in accordance with and to the full extent of the provisions of the laws of the State of Florida in such cases made and provided.

Section 10. It is further provided that nothing in this franchise shall be construed so as to deprive any abutting owners along said railway from recovering any damages that may be lawfully claimed from said Grantees, their associates and assigns.

Section 11. The Grantees, their associates and assigns, shall at no time operate freight cars, except one trailer, within the city, without special permission granted by a resolution of the City Council.

Section 12. Be it FURTHER ORDAINED, that whenever the City of Sanford shall have within its corporate limits a population of ten (10,000) thousand, the

said company shall exhibit to the said city and permit the examination by the said city and proper officers, all books and accounts to ascertain the amount of its gross earnings; and after ascertaining such amount, and the population having reached such number, the said City of Sanford shall have the right to levy a tax of not exceeding two per cent. annually on the gross earnings of said company, which levy shall be collected upon the property of the said company.
