



Merchant Ship Arming Urged By Committee

Protection Against Submarines, Aircraft And Surface Raiders Is Nearer

No Record Vote Is Made

No Report Made On Allowing U. S. Vessels In War Zone

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The arming of merchant ships for protection against submarines, aircraft, surface raiders moved a step nearer actuality today with the approval by the House Foreign Affairs Committee for repeal of the Neutrality Act provision which now prevents such arming.

Committee members said there was no change in the simple resolution originally considered. There was no record vote.

Mr. Ladd, chairman of the committee, said that the committee had received many suggestions from ship owners and industry groups to allow merchant vessels to be armed for defense against submarines, aircraft, and surface raiders.

The committee's action today was a significant step toward the arming of merchant ships. It allows the War Relocation Authority to make grants for the arming of merchant vessels.

The committee also considered a resolution allowing U. S. vessels to operate in war zones. The resolution was not passed.

C. I. O. Strike At Hillsdale Is Called Off

Workers Return To Job Of Building Tanks At Request Of Defense Board

DETROIT, Oct. 15.—(AP)—At the request of the Defense Mediation Board the C. I. O. United Automobile Workers called off a strike at the Hillsdale Steel Products Company plant today, ending a dispute which had tied up an estimated 70 percent of Army tank production.

The defense mediation board was asked by the labor department to try to settle an inter-union strike which has delayed production of transmissions for army tanks and "jeeps."

The case was certified to the board after a labor department conciliator had failed to bring about an agreement between the Hillsdale, Mich., steel products company and representatives of rival C. I. O. and A. F. L. United Auto Workers union.

The C. I. O. workers struck at the Hillsdale plant Oct. 9, protesting that 11 C. I. O. employees had been discharged by the company.

The Hillsdale company is a subsidiary of the Spicer Manufacturing Corp., Toledo, Ohio.

Navy Questions And Answers

What would happen if I enlisted in the U. S. Navy and became sick? You would receive the finest care from trained Navy doctors and surgeons absolutely free.

When do I get my first leave after I have enlisted? In a few weeks after you have completed your recruit training period.

Who pays for my meals and care when I am first sent to a U. S. Navy training station? The Navy furnishes you all transportation and meals.

If I attend a Navy trade school, how many hours a week of school work will I have? Navy men in trade schools are given thirty-two hours of school work a week and about three hours of night watches.

Does a bluejacket have to pay for his own food and board on his Navy pay? No. The Government gives you excellent food and board free.

Must my parents consent to my enlistment if I am under 21? Yes. All applicants must be at least 17 years of age and if under 21 years of age they need the consent of their parents or guardians.

How did the term "cut of his jib" originate? In the days of sailing vessels, nationalities of boats could be distinguished by their jibs (type of sail). A Spanish ship had no jib, English ships had one jib and French ships usually two. The phrase was last used to apply to men and gradually came into general usage.

If I join the U. S. Navy will I have to buy my own uniform? No. You receive a complete outfit of uniforms free when you enlist.

What is the cost of torpedoes used by our Navy? Modern U. S. Navy torpedoes cost from \$5,000 to \$15,000 each. They are 21 inches in diameter, are driven by a mixture of compressed air and alcohol and carry up to 600 pounds of T. N. T. Their speeds vary from 25 to 60 knots and they travel from 6,000 to 30,000 yards.

If I join the Naval Reserve how long must I serve? Naval Reservists serve for four years. Reservists will be returned to civil life as soon as possible after the National Emergency is over so that the term of active service may be less than 4 years.

Does the Navy offer retirement pay? Yes. It is possible for an enlisted man to receive as much as \$135.75 a month in retirement pay.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Oct. 15.—(Special)—Enough food to serve every man, woman and child for one entire day in practically every large city on the Eastern seaboard, including New York, has been procured by Brigadier General James L. Frink, Fourth Corps Area Quartermaster, to feed the First Army of Lieutenant General A. Hugh Drum during the Carolina maneuvers.
Allowing each person three wholesome meals, the supplies stored in Quartermaster warehouses at Wilmington, N. C. and Fort Jackson, E. C., would be sufficient to serve breakfast, luncheon and dinner to the entire population of New York City, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Boston, Pittsburgh, Washington, D. C., Buffalo, Newark, Rochester, Jersey City, Syracuse, Hartford, New Haven and Albany with enough left over for every resident of Maine and Delaware.

The huge quantities of food which General Frink has ordered purchased for the 450,000 soldiers of the First Army during their 27-day maneuvers is enough to stagger the imagination. For instance:
The French fries, if placed end to end, would make a chain stretching 365 miles—the distance from Portland, Me. to Trenton, N. J. to "decorate" the enormous supply of hot dogs the Quartermaster has purchased more than 22,500 gallons of mustard and 100,000 gallons of catsup.
Enough tomatoes best will be consumed during the maneuvers to fill the refrigerator cars, packing to the cars, to the front of the line, to the trains to haul the food from warehouses to maneuver camps.
More than a thousand acres of the home town farmlands would be plowed to grow the fourteen million pounds of potatoes needed to feed the First Army.

Ship arming legislation moved to the House floor yesterday coincident with announcement by Navy Secretary Knox that the Navy "is ready to put guns" on American merchantmen as soon as Congress gives the signal.

The House probably will give its vote on Friday night, but sharply opposing views in the Senate where Republican leaders have organized for an all-out fight against the move.

Supporters contend arming of these merchantmen is a reasonable chance for their lives against Germany's "unrestricted and lawless" ocean warfare and to recover the cost of the war.

Opponents of the measure argue it is "another step toward war" and will "bring us closer to a world of peace."

Six Republican members of the foreign affairs committee signed a minority report which sharply criticized the ship arming bill and which predicted that "as surely as night follows day an overwhelming vote for arming ships will be followed by a vote for arming down the remainder of our neutrality or peace laws."

Truckers from the Carolinas and Pennsylvania are already arriving at the State Farmers' Market looking for vegetables, but are finding a shortage, H. J. Lehman, manager of the market, said this morning.

Yesterday Camp Blending wired for a huge order of turnips but Mr. Lehman was unable to supply them. The truckers are demanding beans, egg plants, yellow squash and bunch turnips, Mr. Lehman revealed. Cucumbers are in demand now but there are none at the market.

At present Mr. Lehman is afraid the demand is going to exceed the supply in vegetables. He predicted, in view of present conditions, good prices for vegetables unless the vegetables from the "Glades" section start coming in.

One packing plant is expected to start packing grapefruit next week and the packing of oranges will probably start in the first of November, Mr. Lehman declared. Beans brought between \$1.50 and \$2.00 per bushel hamper this week and egg plants are demanding between .75 and \$1.00 per bushel hamper.

You should retire yourself rather than make General Truman the goal."

Final Approval On Runways At Airport Given

Lubinsky Is Supervisor For Work Starting Monday

Final approval of the FAA and WPA on the Sanford Municipal Airport runways was announced yesterday by Marion Goggans, district manager of the WPA at Orlando, and work is expected to be started Monday.

Ralph Lubinsky has been hired as supervisor of the work and a fragline and 10 trucks are expected to be put into operation in grading the site of the runways, Edward Higgins, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, said today. Materials amounting to about \$20,000 have already been ordered.

Up to now the grounds of the airport have been cleared and the ditches dug for the drainage, but the pipes have not yet laid, Mr. Higgins explained. All of the fields expected to be runways has been completed and the stakes set to mark them.

Cost of the airport exclusive of the paving costs is estimated at \$215,692 and the total cost, including the paving and lighting of the fields, is expected to exceed \$400,000, according to the report of Mr. Goggans.

Approval of the Leeburg airport was announced at the same time and work is expected to be started at the same time.

Runways for the local airport will be 4,000 feet long and 100 feet wide, making it a Class Three airfield in specifications. About 75 men are expected to be employed on the project.

AFL Bands Ordered Off Air By Petrillo

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(AP)—James C. Petrillo, president of the AFL American Federation of Musicians, Wednesday ordered all bands off the air in connection with the Columbia Broadcasting System and National Broadcasting Company networks.

The union said the order resulted from a dispute with two radio stations in Pittsburgh, WJAS, CBS outlet, and KGV, NBC outlet there. The union has been deadlocked with these stations over a demand that they engage eleven-man sustaining orchestras.

A statement, disclaiming responsibility for the strike was read over the Columbia network this afternoon at the hour the Columbia Concert Orchestra's program was scheduled.

The speech of Senator Pepper will take place at the Post at 11:00 o'clock in the morning, following the Armistice Day service, Mr. Smith revealed.

"I am pleased to accept generous invitation of your Legion Post extended to me by Ned Field and discussed with you to speak at 11:00 o'clock, Nov. 11, in connection with Armistice Day ceremonies. Of course I must necessarily be subject to any emergency which might not allow me to leave Washington on the morning of the eleventh. I will have to leave Sanford at 12:00 o'clock noon of the eleventh. I will be pleased to have the pleasure of being with you on that day."

Arrangements for the parade are being formulated now and Mr. Smith had no statement to make concerning the participants in the parade until there are more particulars available. At present it is assumed that the Drum and Bugle Corps and the Sanford unit of the State Defense Force will march in the parade.

Teachers' Fund Gets Part Of School Money

TALLAHASSEE, Oct. 14.—(AP)—The Florida teachers' salary fund Wednesday received 20 percent of the October allotment of 1,418,827 and State Comptroller said the fund probably will run behind the remainder of this year.

Government Stands At Crossroads As To Possible Break With Russia, U. S.

Moscow In Hour Of Great Peril

Plans To Move Government Is Reported To Be Complete

Despite the "defeat" of Russian defenses west of Moscow, Russian dispatches today declared the Red Army's resistance had not been broken and would not be broken.

Germany, they said, is now awaiting the fall of the offensive power.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—(AP)—The United States still negotiates with the United States in an attempt to maintain peace in the Pacific, major General Kyotomi Okamoto was quoted in a Domei broadcast today. But the Japanese people should be fully prepared for the worst in case the talks fail.

Okamoto, chief of the general staff of the army, said that Japan is determined to keep her resolve of policy of bringing the China incident to a successful conclusion, as well as work toward the creation of a new sphere in East Asia.

The Japanese cabinet resigned today in disapproval over war rumors as Japan stood apparently at the crossroads, weighing peace with the United States or war against Russia. The Japanese government had advised the United States staff in Moscow to prepare to withdraw.

Moscow is in a hour of peril, with the German army resolutely attacking the front line in the west and the British and American forces in the east.

The German army admitted that it had broken through the front line in the west and the British and American forces in the east.

Earlier the Germans had been reported pushing toward Moscow from the northwest and west without apparent interruptions. Moscow admitted the hour of extreme peril had struck.

From the imminent menace capital those civilians not able to aid in the defense were pouring out into the hinterlands and the black marble tomb of Nicolai Lenin, an ideological shrine for the convinced Bolshevik, was closed—perhaps the most ominous portent of all.

In the vicinity of Kalinin, 95 miles above the capital and along the western approaches within 60 miles of the Kremlin the Nazi columns drove on, although often, said the Russians, "only across heaps of their own dead."
