### Markets Strive To Aid Smaller Florida Farmers

#### Some Will Plan More, Some Less Acreage, W. L. Wilson Says

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 4. — Florida's large vegetable growers will plant less acreage this fall and our small growers will plant more, according to reports from managers of State Florida's Markets. William L. Wilson, State Market Director, said in his report and market review yesterday.

The special purpose of State Florida's Markets is to take care of small growers, he continued. "We are doing all we can to help them in the matter of receiving adequate prices, sufficient containers for the marketing of their crops, enough labor for planting

and harvesting, and other production items about which they are now much concerned."

Conditions at specific markets he reported as follows:

Farmers in the Palatka section say they are not going to buy seed potatoes or do any planting until they find out more about the ceiling prices which will be imposed by the OPA.

At Plant City the ground is being prepared for the fall crop and will be planted if the growers get reasonably ceiling prices.

Strawberry plants are very scarce. Strawberry plants under favorable conditions, which is about only one-fifth of the normal crop. The cut in acreage will be due to the scarcity of plants.

"Growers at Marke are preparing their land now for the planting of fall vegetables, mainly turnips, squash, and English peas. The strawberry crop there will be only ten percent of that of normal years.

Larger growers in the Fort Pierce section will plant only about one-half their normal acreage this year, according to present indications. However, small growers are expected to double their acreage. Total acres planted there this fall will probably amount to about 5,000 acres. This will be some 2,000 acres below last year's plantings. Principal crops will be tomatoes, beans, peppers, and eggplant.

"Crops in the Palmetto section were slightly damaged by recent rains. Our market manager says he is unable at this time to estimate with any degree of accuracy what percentage of the normal acreage is being planted. A 128 foot extension is being added to the market for the coming season.

"Sanford will have the normal percentage of crops it has had in past years. Much of the celery is already set out. Some of it was damaged by rain, but was immediately replanted. Fresh snap beans are expected to begin movement through the market within the next two weeks, and cabbage will be ready for harvest by the middle or last of October.

"The market manager at Palmetto has just returned from spending the summer managing a market in Mountain City, Tennessee. He reports that he is expecting a few winter season at Palmetto.

"The Wauchula market will open about October 15 and will have cucumbers, a few squashes and peppers for movement. Crop production there is estimated at between 50 percent and 75 percent of normal years.

"Growers at Pompano are preparing for a larger acreage than they had last year. The first beans should begin to move through the market about November 15. The annual drawing for the allotment of space on the platform will be held on November 1. This is always a big day in Pompano.

"Miscellaneous damage to trees of all sorts and annually amounts about 3,000,000 tons of hay and large quantities of alfalfa in the U.S.

### British 8th Army Outflanks Germans In Seaborne Hop

(Continued from Page Three)

...to the river line on which the Germans are expected to make the most determined stand in their effort to block the road to Rome.

As Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark's men entered Benevento, Gen. Sir Montgomery's troops plowed farther westward along the east coast and elements of both the American Fifth and British Eighth armies closed the Germans out of the central sector to straighten the Allied line, which now extends to a point on the Adriatic well above the square on the Italian coast.

Disclosure that the Eighth army had overrun another sizeable chunk of the Adriatic, south of the central sector, was reported from Allied headquarters saying the enemy had retreated from the entire Mezzogiorno in the central sector.

Benevento, situated in the mountains on the main highway and a road from Naples, overlooks the valley of the Volturno, which flows into the Gulf of Salerno about 17 miles west of Benevento. The Volturno reaches the Tyrrhenian sea 23 miles above Naples and it is along these sea rivers that the Nazis are believed planning a stand with the aid of the natural defenses.

Armored units under Clark's command made contact with the enemy on the west coast while other Fifth army troops on the extreme right flank captured Frigento, 45 miles inland from Naples, to help clear the central salient. At least 11 other central and eastern town fell to the Eighth army and troops on the right wing of the Fifth army as the result of the collapse of the enemy's Mezzogiorno.

The French announced meanwhile that Moroccan Goums and sharpshooters on the island of Corsica had seized Teghime hill, the "key to Bastia," in the face of vicious counter-attacks and now hold the entire ridge dominating the German-held city of Bastia and Biguglia lake.

Corsica covers a large area in the nearby American Rangers and French shock troops routed several enemy groups and pushed to the northern point of Cape Corca. This means that the remaining Germans on the Corsica now have been pressed into a narrow strip some 30 miles long and no more than four or five miles wide along the east coast.

Details of the thrust into this vital town were not disclosed, but American units of the Fifth army were last reported at Avellino 15 miles to the south. The road from Avellino to Benevento runs through the twisting mountain valley of the Sabato river.

### Big Increase In War Taxes Asked Solons

...congress today outlined the administration program as follows:

1. Individual income taxes to be raised so as to produce an additional \$6,000,000,000 annually, including the postwar refundable \$3,500,000,000. The present 20 percent withholding levy against the taxable portions of wages and salaries would be graduated upward, possibly to a rate of 29 percent for some incomes.

The individual exemptions for married persons would be pared from \$1,200 to \$1,000, exemption for single persons would remain at \$500, and dependents reduced from \$150 to \$100. The Victory tax would be integrated in the regular income tax.

2. Corporation incomes. A rise in the rate from 10 to 15 percent calculated to bring in an additional \$1,000,000,000.

3. Excise taxes. The dollar sum representing incomes in revenue.

Distilled spirits (from 40 to 50 cents a gallon), \$200,000,000. (figuring 80 drinks to a gallon this would be 12 1/2 cents a drink.)

Wine (47 to 50 cents a gallon) \$210,000,000.

When 10 to 15 cents a gallon for the lower potency group, in excess also for the fortified group, \$400,000,000.

Beer (14 to 15 cents a gallon) \$1,000,000,000.

4. Tobacco. Smoking, chewing and snuff 18 to 21 cents a pound) \$1,000,000,000.

5. General admissions (10 percent to 30 percent) \$282,000,000.

6. Entertainment (10 to 20 percent) \$62,000,000.

7. Housing allowances (10 to 15 percent of receipts) \$400,000,000.

8. Transportation (10 to 20 percent) \$100,000,000.

9. Communication (10 to 20 percent) \$100,000,000.

10. Telephone service (10 to 15 percent) \$40,000,000.

11. Telegraph service (10 to 15 percent) \$40,000,000.

12. Postage (10 to 15 percent) \$40,000,000.

13. Fuel (10 to 15 percent) \$40,000,000.

14. Gas (10 to 15 percent) \$40,000,000.

15. Tolls (10 to 15 percent) \$40,000,000.

16. State and gift taxes. Exemption lowered from \$10,000 to \$5,000 calculated to bring in \$100,000,000 additional.

### New Restrictions On Deliveries Revealed

ORLANDO, Oct. 4. (Special)—George H. Coelner, district manager of OPA's Division of Motor Transport, today emphasized restrictions on deliveries which will go into effect on Monday, Oct. 11.

The restrictions include:

1. A prohibition against the retail delivery of packages which weigh five pounds or less or measure 60 inches or less in length and girth combined.
2. Limitations upon the frequency of retail and wholesale deliveries of certain commodities.
3. A prohibition against Sunday retail deliveries except of tea, milk or cream, and all Sunday wholesale deliveries except of tea.

In announcing the extension of restrictions, Joseph B. Eastman, OPA head, said: "The necessity for this action has been
