## Fruit Canners Ask That They Be Left Alone

### Texas, Florida Canners Oppose Bill To Place Them Under Marketing Pact

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Florida and Texas citrus fruit canners told a congressional committee today they don't want government controls over marketing of their product.

"All we want is to be left alone," said G. O. McDaniel, president of the G. O. McDaniel Company of Edcough, Tex.

A Senate Agriculture Subcommittee is considering a measure by Senator Pepper (D-Fla.) and nine other senators that would include canners of citrus fruits under the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act. This sets up controls and regulations for marketing of farm products.

J. Logan Bloodworth, representing the Cherokee Products Co., Fort Pierce, Fla., testified this legislation applied to canners would be impossible.

"The proposal would penalize efficient canners," he said. J. Adams Bruce, president of Bruce's Juices, Inc., Tampa, Fla., said the problem of surplus citrus would be solved "by finding new markets and increasing consumer use."

## School Board Asks Youth Government Be Tried Annually

Supt. T. W. Lawton and the members of the County School Board have approved by the Youth Government program, which for the first time in the history of Seminole County, school pupils yesterday actually participated and assisted in a board meeting, that they recommended that the program, initiated by John Krider, continued in the future to educate children in practical civics.

A resolution of appreciation for the many years of service rendered to the public schools by Dr. E. D. Brownlee, was adopted. Dr. Brownlee recently retired after 35 years of service as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

The board accepted the \$500 bid of the Rev. Douglas Charles, Presbyterian pastor, for one of the surplus school buses which will be used for church work. Joe Corley and John Krider, accounting for the bid to the meeting to make the bid.

**OLEO TAXES**  
WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—The National Grange, one of the largest farm organizations, told Congress today that special taxes on oleo are needed to protect both consumers and the dairy industry.

Kenneth S. Bagshaw, chairman of the Grange Executive Committee, made this argument to the House Agriculture Committee. That group is considering 18 bills to repeal all federal taxes on oleo-margarine.

## Meyers Convicted On Perjury Charge

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—A federal court jury today convicted Maj. General Bennett E. Meyers on charges of inducing a witness to lie to a Senate committee. The wartime deputy Army Air Forces purchasing chief was found guilty on all three counts of an indictment. Judge Alexander Holtzoff said he will sentence Meyers Monday. The retired general could get a maximum of 30 years in prison.

## President Blocks Deportation Of Romanian Doctor

### Woman Surgeon Came Here From Germany On Temporary Visa

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Deportation of 39-year old woman doctor who served under the Nazis in the Auschwitz and Belzec prison camps was blocked today by President Truman.

He signed a bill allowing the woman, Dr. Gisela Perl, a Romanian Jew, to remain permanently in this country.

Rep. Sol Bloom (D-N.Y.), who sponsored the bill, said Dr. Perl now lives in New York City. She came here as a lecturer in March, 1946, on a temporary visa.

The Justice Department refused to endorse Bloom's bill, saying Dr. Perl would not be subject to prosecution if she returned to (Continued on Page Four)

## Weight Reduction Of Celery Crates Announced

A reduction in weight classification of celery containers 8012 by railroads from a former 68-pound to 61-pound weight is expected to save shippers many thousands of dollars, particularly in the Belle Glade area, which uses this type of crate to a greater extent than the Sanford-Oviedo district, according to William C. Hutchison.

Mr. Hutchison, an authority on rates, reported that the reduction went into effect on Mar. 9 to points in the south, east of the Mississippi and north of the Potomac and Ohio Rivers, according to information received from the Florida East Coast Railway Co.

The weight of 57 pounds is continued to points of Western Trunk Line territory, which includes the states of Kansas, Iowa, Minnesota and Nebraska. The crate has 3120 cubic inches capacity and measures inside 9 1/2 x 20 inches.

Weight of the Howard celery crate shipped from Florida to official territory is 68 pounds, and to Western Trunk Line territory is 57 pounds. The container, known as No. 3610, has inside dimensions of 10 1/2 x 22, or 3,520 cubic inches capacity.

The California railroads accept celery from California to the above territory, Mr. Hutchison stated, in a container of which the inside dimensions are 11 1/2 x 20 1/2 at a weight of 50 pounds, or 3,330 cubic inches capacity. The lesser billing rate from California is being handled and relief is expected, said Mr. Hutchison.

## Caldwell Asks Senate Committee To Okeh Southern Education Bill

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Southerners said today the question of racial discrimination is in no way involved in their plan to set up regional universities and professional schools. They told a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee their plan has been under discussion for years—long before the present controversy over civil rights legislation.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Governor Millard Caldwell of Florida today asked a Senate Judiciary Committee to approve a resolution which would give congressional consent to a regional education compact between Southern states.

"We ask no financial help from the federal government," the governor said. "All we ask is that the Congress do in this instance what it has done more than a hundred times in the past, and that is to approve the compact between the interested states and allow us to help ourselves by pooling our resources and coordinating our efforts."

The compact would permit the Southern States to establish regional professional schools for both white and negro students. It would allow states which could not afford to support such institutions by themselves to contribute towards their operation by the South as a whole and send their students to them.

Most of the Southern governors already have signed the compact and Governor Caldwell said he supported all will have not their names to it by today. Resolutions which would give the necessary congressional consent have been (Continued on Page Five)

## Truman Talks With Leaders On Civil Rights

### No Final Decision Is Reached But Pleas For Peace Said To Fall On Deaf Ears

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—President Truman reviewed with the cabinet today the state of world affairs, which Secretary of State Marshall says have reached a "great crisis." One of the topics, it was disclosed, was the move to form a Western European alliance. The chief executive met with cabinet officers after throwing the nation's full political power and prestige against the spread of Communism anywhere, including China.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—The Democratic National Executive committee today debated without agreement President Truman's civil rights program. Then committee members lunched with the President and Mrs. Truman at the White House.

Frank McHale, Indiana national committeeman, told reporters no official action was taken because the executive committee is not a policy-making group.

"The voice of the party is its convention," McHale said. The convention will be held at Philadelphia in July.

McHale acknowledged there was much discussion of the civil rights program. This has stirred some Democratic leaders to call for withdrawal of the so-called "Solid South" from the party's ranks. Some have urged defeat of the President, who has said he will accept the party's nomination if it is given him at the national convention.

Several southern committee members were reported to have spoken out today against the civil rights program, which proposes anti-segregation and anti-lynching legislation. Pleas for settlement of differences within the party were voiced last night by Alabama Democratic Senators, Hill and Sparkman. But their plea, (Continued on Page Four)

**UNEMPLOYMENT UP**  
WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Unemployment rose sharply in February, the Census Bureau reported today. Bad weather and the fuel shortage were blamed. A census sample survey early in the month showed a 574,000 increase in unemployment since January. That put total unemployment at 2,630,000, which was 149,000 above the level of February, 1947.

## U. S. Consulate Is Evacuated Due To Unknown Threat

### Personnel Returns After Search Fails To Find Explosive

LONDON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Police scrutinized all visitors to Prime Minister Attlee's official residence today after an anonymous telephone caller said "No. 10 Downing Street will be blown up tonight."

Telephone company officials traced the call to a public telephone booth in a West London suburb. Several similar telephone threats to bomb public buildings recently have been made.

JERUSALEM, Mar. 12 (AP)—An anonymous bomb threat today emptied the United States consulate building, 300 yards from the blasted Jewish Agency headquarters where 13 were killed and nearly 100 were injured.

American personnel returned to their offices after an hour-long search by police failed to turn up any explosives. The consular staff had moved out after a telephone caller said in English:

"Get out of the building—it will blow up in five minutes."

The building also is used as a residence by Consul General Robert B. McAtee, Consul William Porter and Vice Consul Wells Stabler.

The death in a hospital of another victim raised the death toll to 13 in yesterday's bombing of the Jewish Agency building. The agency says an Arab, driving a car stolen from the American consulate, entered the Jewish compound and ignited a bomb. Three of the dead were women.

In Tel Aviv, the Jewish Agency announced its ratification of a merger of two Jewish fighting forces, Hagannah and Irgun Zvai Leumi. Final approval depends (Continued on Page Four)

## MacArthur's Staff Complains Of Anti-MacArthur Vet Groups

TRENTON, N. J., Mar. 12 (AP)—An attempt to enter the name of General Douglas MacArthur in the New Jersey Republican primary as a candidate for president failed today.

Petitions for two district delegates and one delegate-at-large pledged to MacArthur's candidacy were received today at the office of the secretary of state.

Chief Clerk Ernest H. Kerr said the MacArthur slogan was unacceptable because it was not accompanied by the general's written consent for use of his name.

TOKYO, Mar. 12 (AP)—General MacArthur's key staff officers complained today about a news broadcast that "Anti-MacArthur" veterans clubs are being organized in the United States. Then they announced a policy of limiting broadcasts by the Armed Forces radio here to "factual events" in their chief's presidential campaign.

Organization of U. S. clubs opposing MacArthur's candidacy was reported in a news summary broadcast by the Armed Forces radio in Japan, Station WYTR, last night. The summary also included news of activities by MacArthur supporters. The officers said the new policy will not apply to a regular 10:00 P. M. shortwave broadcast from Los Angeles, which is heard throughout Japan through WYTR. They acknowledged the policy might bring criticism that military and civilian absentee voters (Continued on Page Five)

## Babe Ruth, Sent To Florida To Die A Year Ago, Is On Recovery Road

MIAMI BEACH, Mar. 12 (AP)—Babe Ruth, the one-time King of Slap who was "brought here to die" a year ago, today is on the road to full recovery.

Florida sunshine and medical attention have worked wonders. He is big and brawny, more alert than he has been since before his operation two years ago, able to "sleep and eat better than I have in all that time."

The headaches which plagued him day and night when he last arrived here five weeks ago have steadily diminished under the soothing rays of the tropical sun and the expert care of Dr. Walter Hotchkiss, ear, nose and throat specialist, and Dr. James Armstrong, dentist.

So well does the old Yankee slinger feel that he has been driving an automobile around on short jaunts.

Tonight he sets out for a tour of the Florida baseball camps. The Babe will take a train for Tampa and operate out of there by automobile to see all the nine (Continued on Page Four)

WASHINGTON, Mar. 12 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson said today he will remain in the cabinet at least until the end of the present session of Congress and "may not get out at all."

Anderson has considered running for the Senate seat now held by Senator Hatch (D-Mex.), who has said he will not seek another term.

The secretary told reporters after a cabinet meeting, that President Truman had repeated his desire that Anderson stay in the administration.

Mr. Truman told a news conference yesterday that Anderson had done an excellent job at the Agriculture Department and expressed hope he would remain.

## Britain, France, Benelux Adopt 50 Year Treaty

### Members Agree Not To Discuss Pact Till Governments Sign

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Mar. 12 (AP)—Britain, France and the Benelux nations adopted today a 50-year treaty for a political, economic and military union of Western Europe intended to check the march of Communism.

Conference officials said the accord and allied documents will be signed here next Wednesday by the foreign ministers of Belgium, Britain, France, Luxembourg and the Netherlands.

The text of the agreement will not be released until the signature ceremony, to give the five governments of the negotiators opportunity to examine it closely, the officials said.

Delegates from the five countries, including four of the world's greatest colonial powers, completed their efforts on the Western Union suggested in January by British Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin at 11:30 A. M. after more than a week around the conference table.

## U. S. Insists On Peaceful Solution

### Refusal To Consult On Partition Of Palestine Is Decried By U. S.

NEW YORK, Mar. 12 (AP)—The United States insisted in a special statement today that a peaceful solution of Palestine partition is required. It did not mention Russia's opposition to American efforts at conciliation between Arabs and Jews or the Russian-American difference over Palestine.

The new American declaration came to the press from a spokesman for the U. S. delegate to the United Nations. It was the second such special statement issued in two days in avowed efforts to clarify the U. S. position.

The spokesman said each of the special statements was put out to correct impressions left by published interpretations of U. S. policy.

The statement said that attainment of a peaceful solution was not being aided by the refusal of "one or more of the parties to take part in consultations."

This was a reference to an Arab boycott of partition talks and the refusal of the Jewish Agency for Palestine to take part in any discussions which might modify or kill partition.

Palestine Arabs submitted to United Nations delegations what they entitled a "black paper on the Jewish Agency and Zionist terrorism."

The Arab Higher Committee, representing the Palestinian Arabs, charged the Jews with plotting, totalitarianism and terrorism. The Arabs made no reference to the big power Palestine consultations now under way.

 long absence from the United States (since 1937) and that he has not announced a platform. Several other stories are being held up, although it is understood that none has been killed.

It was understood also that Allied Headquarters censorship received no new instructions regarding the United States presidential campaign. The general policy has been to delete criticism of MacArthur as supreme commander of the occupation, or as an individual under the overall policy that criticism of the occupation is not permitted.

MacArthur has issued a blunt verbal order against any political activity at headquarters.

His attitude was reflected in the public information office statement Wednesday. This said the campaign was MacArthur's personal matter and would not interfere with operations of his "military headquarters solely concerned with the conduct of the occupation of Japan."

But news of the reaction in the United States to MacArthur's announcement he would serve if called by the American people continues to pour into Japan. Some of it is favorable and some is critical.

Staff officers in charge of the Army newspaper Stars and Stripes and the Armed Forces radio network in Japan say their job is to cover the campaign while retaining the neutrality ordered by MacArthur. There are thousands of absentee voters here in military and civilian service.

The staff officers are responsible for the policies of Stars and Stripes and the Armed Forces radio network.

U. S. soldiers and civilians depend primarily on both these sources for world news.

Both the newspaper and the network were under orders to use only "actual, factual news stories" about the presidential campaign. This is not clearly defined, but it would eliminate such reaction stories as editorial comment, both favorable and unfavorable.

"We want to avoid any idea we are trying to run the campaign from here," said one officer. "If we run any editorial comment we will be accused of prejudice either one way or another. And we don't have newspaper space or radio time to run all this kind of news."



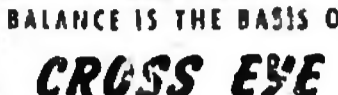

Arabs detailed charges of terrorist acts between March, 1943, and March, 1946. The accusations included bombings, assassinations and kidnappings.  
The Arabs also charged that: 1. "The Zionists have incited the Jews of Europe to migrate to Palestine, and to that end have been the real obstacle in the way of the settlement of the ter-

fugees and displaced persons problem.  
2. "The Zionist setup in Palestine is totalitarian. Their youth movement and their system of education have inculcated a generation of Jewish fanatics. Their methods have been equalled only by the Nazis."  
The document said "the most dastardly outrages have been committed in Palestine by the Jewish illegal organizations". It added: "Although the perpetrators of

these crimes are so-called terrorist organizations, they are directed, supervised and financed by the Jewish Agency, or its subsidiary organs or collaborators."

Bordo Products Co., Winter Haven, Fla., said putting the citrus canners under the marketing agreements act "would merely increase the costs to consumers."  
McDaniel said grower cooperative groups are the only ones in Texas who favor the proposed legislation. He added: "All others in the state in the

citrus business just want to be left alone and get the industry on a sound basis. No program that stifles individual initiative should be enacted."  
He said a previous marketing agreement "just did not work out." It was abandoned in 1938.  
C. L. Skaggs, president of the Borden Packing Co., Westaco, Tex., testified growers will need the canners "more and more in the years to come."  
Production of citrus in Texas at present is "only 50 per cent

of what it will be when newly planted trees come into production," Skaggs said.
