



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## Sanford's Zinn Beck: King Of Baseball

There was a touch of class when Zinn Beck and Pete Rose were introduced as the two newest members of the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame Tuesday night.

Beck, 85, a grand old man of baseball, was crowned King of Sanford at the gathering of major league executives and personnel at the winter meetings at the Sheraton Tropicana in Orlando.

Beck, who earlier in the day landed a three-year post with the Florida Marlins for \$3.2 million—a record year—was honored with the title of King of the Year by his son, John.

John Beck, who has written a book on his father, said he had been awaiting his father's return since 1987 at a dinner, which included the likes of Sen. George Mitchell, to a dinner, which included the likes of Sen. George Mitchell.
