100,000 JAPS TRY TO LAND AT LUZON

Hongkong Still Holds Out Under Japanese Attacks

Enemy Lays Siege And Hits Defenders Of Colony From Land, Sea And Air

Malaya British Strike At Foe

Wapon Airplanes Are Destroyed By R.A.F. In Eastern Thailand

London sources indicated today that Britain's Hongkong garrison still held out under the Japanese siege and direct attack by land and air.

In British Malaya, Japanese forces 800 miles north of Singapore are reported attacking heavily at the Japanese base in Bangkok.

From Bangkok, the R.A.F. attacked a Japanese air base in Thailand, destroying several planes and causing damage to the first serious smash at the base there, the British sources said.

Another source reported that British forces in Malaya had been successfully withdrawn from the area of Kelantan state between Kota Bharu where the Japanese made their initial landing Dec. 8, and Kuala Krai, 45 miles to the south.

British imperial defenders of Hongkong, deemed by an over-whelming Japanese siege to seemly certain death or waning captivity, told the world by radio Sunday that organized resistance continues in heavy fighting.

Another quoted by the British radio said the expected fall of Hongkong had been delayed by waning resistance. In the same broadcast the domestic radio said without amplification that the situation was a "a" of the main land section of the Crown colony, where they assaulted the Japanese from the rear.

Negro Runs Amuck, Is Jailed By Police

Meltdoro, one of Sanford's negro sections, was the scene of a drunk man's rampage Sunday morning when a drunk negro stole a shotgun and was shooting it on the street on his way to kill another negro. Chief Roy Williams said today.

The negro, Ed Ross, was disarmed and placed in jail by Chief Williams and Officer C. E. Hunter. After a preacher warned the intoxicated negro to stop, he ran into a house, where he began to shoot out the door. He was shot by police and taken to the hospital.

School Defense Stamp Sales Are More Than \$100

Mrs. Susan Kirtley, chairman of the defense stamp sales at Seminole High School, reports that the sales have amounted to more than \$100 in stamps while two bands have been purchased by individual students.

Mrs. Kirtley says her year's sales are in excess of the previous year's sales, which included the purchase of a band and a drum set. She says the sales are being used to purchase defense stamps and other war materials.

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Nazis May Be Preparing For Swift Attack

Hitler's Assuming Of Command Indicates Attempt To Close Mediterranean Sea

A source which often has had remarkably accurate behind-the-scenes information said today Adolf Hitler's assumption of full command of the German army, and new Axis movements, indicated the Germans are preparing for a swift attack to close the Mediterranean.

The object, he said, would be to salvage the Libyan campaign and offset the retreat in Russia.

Publicly recognizing the cold difficulties and torments suffered by the retreating German armies in Russia, Adolf Hitler announced today that he was taking over personal direction of the Nazi land forces, and he immediately appealed to his soldiers—"fanatically"—to put it to wait until the winter for new arms and troops.

Hitler first announced in a surprise move that he had replaced General Field Marshal Walther von Brauchitsch as commander of the army.

He said intuition led him to his fateful decision.

The dramatic announcements, including the hold-fast exhortation to his troops, contained the harsh implication that the great German offensive of recent weeks had hurtling Germany to the core and on the home front specifically.

The Russians have driven wedges into German positions which have made it impossible for the Germans to halt their retreat and have demolished the Hitler pretense that the Nazis are executing an orderly withdrawal to strategic positions, an authoritative military commentator said yesterday.

Other points mentioned in Russian reports indicated that "westward bulges were being made in the German front, the commentator said.

Axis Garrison In Libya Said To Be Seized By British

British Cairo headquarters indicated that Axis forces were retreating forward at top speed today and reported a successful attack against the Axis garrison 150 miles inside of the western section of Libya.

The Axis shattered army in Libya, split and in headlong flight, was pictured by British headquarters Sunday night as too disorganized to collect its strength for an effective defense of Benghazi, the enemy's last major position east of Tripoli.

Nazi General Rommel's remaining armored forces had been driven to Soluch, about 35 miles south of Benghazi, and Italian infantry was declared virtually isolated northeast of the port.

The rapid pace of the British pursuit, pressed despite severe dust storms, was indicated by the fact that Soluch, island terminal of a spur railroad from Benghazi, is 150 miles south-west of Derna, whose capture the British announced only Saturday and 250 miles west of Cyrenaica's frontier, starting point of the British offensive on Nov. 18.

John Wynne Dies At Lake Monroe Home

John L. Wynne, president of Seminole County for the past 51 years, died at his home Sunday night at 11:35 in Lake Monroe where he has lived for the past six years.

Mr. Wynne was born in Russell County, Georgia, Nov. 21, 1861. Funeral services will be conducted at the Sanford Funeral Home Wednesday at 4:00 p.m.

Mr. Wynne was a member of the Sanford Lodge, No. 1234, B.P.O. Elks, and the Sanford Chapter, No. 1234, O.E.S.

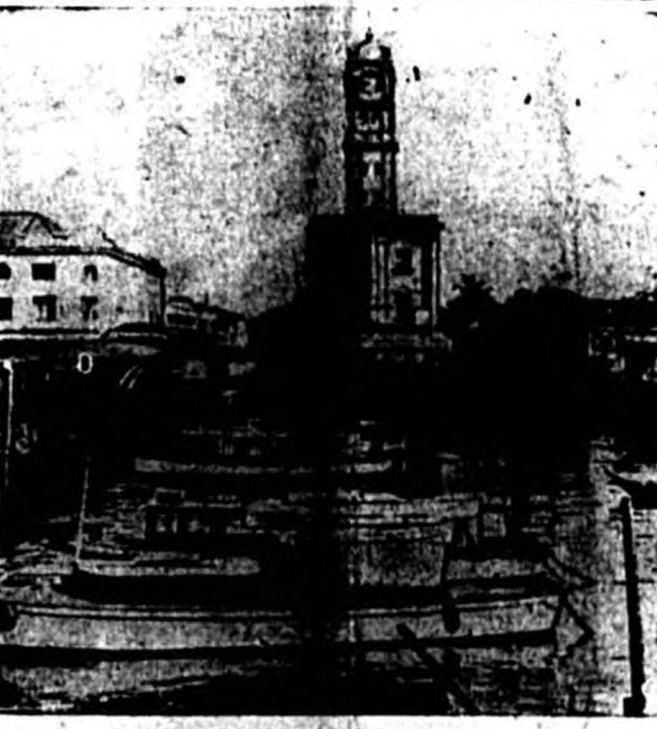
Military Service Bill Becomes Law

Previously today the Rotary Club voted to donate \$22.40 for the purchase of one quart of blood plasma for the blood bank which will be kept by the Fernand-Laughton hospital.

Mr. Morrison recommended that on account of the national emergency Ladies Night, which originally was scheduled for next Monday night, be postponed and that instead a "poor man's luncheon" will be held next Monday noon when the Rotarians would have a 15 cent meal and contribute the balance of their \$1 payments to some worthy charity.

Knox Reports U.S. Attacks On Axis Subs

14 Italo-German U-Boats, Several Jap Subs Sunk In Both Atlantic and Pacific

At least 14 Italo-German U-boats and several Jap submarines have been sunk or damaged, Secretary of the Navy Knox declared last night in an announcement of United States attacks on enemy sub fleets in the Atlantic and Pacific.

The announcement of the victories in the war at sea, presumably from the time of President Roosevelt's shoot-on-sight orders to the United States Navy on Sept. 11, came after disclosures that enemy submarines had carried the war close to both shores of the United States and sunk one American coastal ship with possible loss of 22 lives.

Enemy submarines, edging close to California shores, shell and torpedoes the big American tanker Smidio, and fired deck guns at the tanker Agawic.

Possibly five of the Enid's crew were lost. Five were injured and the vessel was still afloat but wallowing and riding low. She had been hit in the stern by the torpedo.

The Agawic escaped by turning from her course and racing shoreward. It was sunk only after a severe battle with a shell whizzing close by.

The actual identity of the 14 enemy submarines probably sunk or damaged in Knox's announcement but he added, in speaking of the Pacific, that "our Naval forces have already effectively dealt with several Japanese submarines."

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U.S. Troops Fight As Enemy Strives To Get Foothold

Support Given Boy Scouts On Paper Campaign

Clubs, Organizations Offer Aid Toward Defense Project

Clubs and organizations of Sanford have begun to pledge cooperation and support to the local boy scouts who are collecting waste paper in accordance with a request made by Leon Henderson of the office of production management, E. W. McAlley, a scout master whose troop was among the first to start the Sanford campaign, said today.

A number of citizens have telephoned and advised scouts of where they can secure discarded wrapping paper or boxes. Members of the Sanford Woman's Club, Mrs. C. R. Dawson, president, said, have also pledged their support in the campaign.

Mr. McAlley pointed out that Administrator Henderson wrote Mayor W. T. Hill, telling him that the national waste paper conservation campaign is rapidly getting under way throughout the United States.

"As you know," Henderson wrote, "waste paper is vital to defense because it is the principal raw material for the paperboard containers used to ship defense materials. Department of commerce figures show that about three-fourths of the paper produced in the United States each year is burned. We must stop the burning of old newspapers, corrugated boxes, magazines and waste paper so that a lack of paperboard containers will not become a defense bottleneck."

Troop 34 has secured a vacant building to use as headquarters on Second Street next to Lederer & Sons and here the paper will be weighed and packed. Anyone having any waste paper may call Mr. McAlley or any boy scout and provisions will be made immediately for collection.

Weekly Citrus Sales Show Great Increase

LAKELAND, Dec. 22.—(AP)—Spurred by abnormally light shipments and improved buying power, auction prices on Florida tangerines and grapefruit were better during the week ending Dec. 20 than for any corresponding period in the eight-year records of the Growers Administration Committee and orange prices were highest since 1935 for the same week.

Tangerines averaged \$4.44 per one and three-fifths bushel box; oranges \$2.55; and grapefruit \$2.50 on the 10 major auctions last week.

Memorial Service Is Held To Honor Kelly

MADISON, Dec. 22.—(AP)—The full-throated roar of three planes overhead supplied a military air Sunday to Madison's simple, one-hour memorial service for its home-town hero of the second world war—Capt. Colin P. Kelly, Jr.

The planes came from Army bases in special salute to the 27-year-old Army pilot whose bomber scored three direct hits on the Japanese Battleship Haruna and sent her to the bottom of the Pacific on December 8.

Directors Of State League Make Plans

SILVER SPRINGS, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Directors of the Florida State Baseball League decided Sunday to adopt a schedule and make final plans for the 1942 season at a meeting Sunday, Feb. 8.

The directors gave unanimous approval to a major-league agreement that would push the period for drafting players back three weeks, thus giving the minors more time to complete player deals prior to the annual draft.

The Tourist Outlook

Just what the war will do to Florida's tourist season, confidently predicted a few weeks ago as destined to be the best on record, is now somewhat problematical. When the first shock of the treacherous attack on Pearl Harbor is forgotten and the nation becomes accustomed to a state of war, it is quite possible that the thoughts of persons living in frozen climes will turn again to palms and beaches.

The manager of a tourist bureau in Miami reports that despite the bad news of Dec. 7, very few cancellations resulted during the first few days thereafter and that now his organization is receiving many new bookings not only for Florida but for Cuba and the Bahamas as well.

"Both Pan American and P. & O. have informed us," says R. T. Belchambers, "they intend operating as usual per their current schedules, the P. & O. having no intention that the government would take any of their boats. Pan American said they were geared to operate at least 10 flights a day to Cuba. We are going to have lots of people traveling, if we refuse to be stampeded and stay in their 'doing'."

Austin Williamson, traffic manager of the P & O Steamship Company, just returned from Havana, said, "They are looking forward to a busy season in Cuba. Our reservations are about normal. We have several large conventions booked for transportation to Havana during the holiday period. During World War I, we operated our service on regular schedules handling both mail and passengers. Of course, everyone familiar with our routes knows full well we are practically within sight of shore the majority of the time. I believe things generally will return to normal after the first shock is fully absorbed."

Edward Tietze, general sales manager of Havana's famed Hotel Nacional de Cuba, said, "The attack on Hawaii was very disconcerting. However, we've been in wars before and I do not think people are merely going to go into a blackout because of the present international situation. Our bookings are heavy, and we are preparing for a fine season."

H. V. Moon, general manager of Rainbow Springs, the widely-known attraction near Dunellon, said, "Undoubtedly we have had a temporary monkey wrench thrown into our December business. However, we do not believe thinking people are going to forget the need and value of the kind of relaxation such as can be found only in Florida and near-by Cuba. Once the holidays and the uncertainties of the present draft discussions are over we should see a large number of former and new visitors."

All in all we can see no reason why Sanford should be down-hearted. We have less stake in the tourist business than most Florida communities. We do not believe the tourist business will be seriously affected, but if it is, we will still have our principal mainstay throughout all these lean years and that is celery. And the outlook for agriculture in general is much better than it has been in many years.

Christmas Savings Clubs

Thus from their temporary savings, people are acquiring permanent savings and at the same time helping to win the war. If you have never joined a Christmas Savings Club, you should do so this year. You will be glad of it, when next December rolls around.

Here Are Instructions For Schools During An Air Raid

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—The Office of Civilian Defense reported yesterday that with services and newspapers carry a list of instructions on how to handle an air raid during an air raid. The instructions are: (a) Appointment of school building wardens, whose duties should be co-ordinated with their local zone or district warden service. (b) Special transmission of air raid warnings from the control center to school buildings. (c) Fire drills—appointment of present equipment, appointment of fire warden (or fire guards), and special training in combating emergencies. (d) Protection, construction, quick and simple measures to provide additional security. (e) Study of alternate air raid refuge for teachers and pupils in case of fire. Determine location, suitable buildings in the neighborhood that are available for use as air raid refuge. It is desirable to explore this possibility in order to effect dispersal when a fire alarm is sounded. (f) What to Do About Evacuation. Start your training now. Don't wait for the final plan. Each school should have a plan. A fire alarm may be sounded on any day until they are necessary.

handle them, and put them out with water spray. If the fire gets beyond control, the chief fire guard should sound the regular fire alarm. All pupils should then be conducted from the building as in regular fire drill. Class leaders should conduct them in an orderly fashion to shelter in nearby homes. Leaders must keep the pupils in control.

1. What to Organize. Do these things right away—they are essential now: (a) Select the air raid refuge—more than one if necessary. Be sure there is more than one exit to the refuge. (b) Determine how the school alarm will be sounded for an air raid. (c) Assign a refuge space or refuge room for each class or classroom. Assign class leaders to conduct the drill—the same as for fire. (d) Publish full instructions; have them read over and over again to pupils. Have them posted on bulletin boards. Be sure every teacher and pupil understands them—now. These things should be done at once. When you have completed all of these things, it is time to organize your long-range plans.

2. Here Are Some of the Steps to Take. The department of education or other authority, under the direction of the local defense coordinator, should plan and adopt a war program for the district. Here are some of the steps to consider: (a) Appointment of school building wardens, whose duties should be co-ordinated with their local zone or district warden service. (b) Special transmission of air raid warnings from the control center to school buildings. (c) Fire drills—appointment of present equipment, appointment of fire warden (or fire guards), and special training in combating emergencies. (d) Protection, construction, quick and simple measures to provide additional security. (e) Study of alternate air raid refuge for teachers and pupils in case of fire. Determine location, suitable buildings in the neighborhood that are available for use as air raid refuge. It is desirable to explore this possibility in order to effect dispersal when a fire alarm is sounded. (f) What to Do About Evacuation. Start your training now. Don't wait for the final plan. Each school should have a plan. A fire alarm may be sounded on any day until they are necessary.

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 22.—Examinations will be conducted Jan. 24 for 425 applicants seeking positions with the State Board of Health and the Crippled Children's Commission, as announced Sunday by the merit system council for the two agencies. The examinations will be given at Pensacola, Tallahassee, Jacksonville, Gainesville, Tampa, Orlando, West Palm Beach and Miami.

Positions to be filled are those of junior and senior clerk, junior and senior stenographer, typist, accounting clerk, statistical clerk, telephone operator, photostat operator, library assistant, artist, accountant and statistician. All appointments for services accustomed to it.

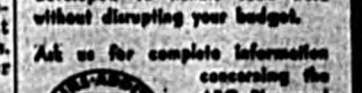

Inexpensive Fruit Cake Is Approved By County Agent

Mrs. Ouida Watson, county home demonstration agent, has tested and approved an inexpensive fruit cake which she calls a "fast minute" cake and recommends it as one that is "right" for holiday festivities. A six-ounce fruit cake crammed with fruit and nuts "It is not only delicious to taste but pretty to look at as well and weighs 2 and 1/4 pounds."

The recipe follows: 1/2 cup butter, 1 and 1/4 cups brown sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, well beaten; 1/2 package fast granola yeast; 1/2 cup lukewarm water; 1/2 teaspoon sugar; 1 and 1/2 cups sifted flour, graded rind of 1/2 lemon; 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg; 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves; 1/2 teaspoon baking soda; 1/2 cup sour milk; 1 and 1/2 cups seedless raisins; 1/2 cup seeded citron; 1/2 cup broken nuts.

Four eggs into lukewarm water, add 1/2 teaspoon sugar, stir and let stand five minutes to soften. Add 1/4 cup of flour, beat smoothly cover and let rise in a warm place. Add 1/2 to 2 hours. Cream the butter, sugar and salt until light. When soft butter becomes light, add lemon rind and spices. Sift the soda with the remaining flour, then add flour and sour milk alternately to the cake batter, blending thoroughly after each addition. Do not overmix. Lastly add the fruit and nuts, dredged with 1/2 teaspoon more flour.

Butter in 8-inch long form pan and dust with flour. Pour the batter into the pan until 1/4 full. Put the remaining batter into well buttered No. 2 and 1/2 tin can. Let the cakes rise in a cozy warm place for 4 and 1/4 hours. Bake them in a slightly cool oven, heated to 300 degrees and 45 to 50 minutes, increase the heat to 350 degrees and bake a total of 1 and 1/4 hours. Remove cakes from pans and let cool. Brush with apricot glaze and decorate with cherries and blanched almonds.

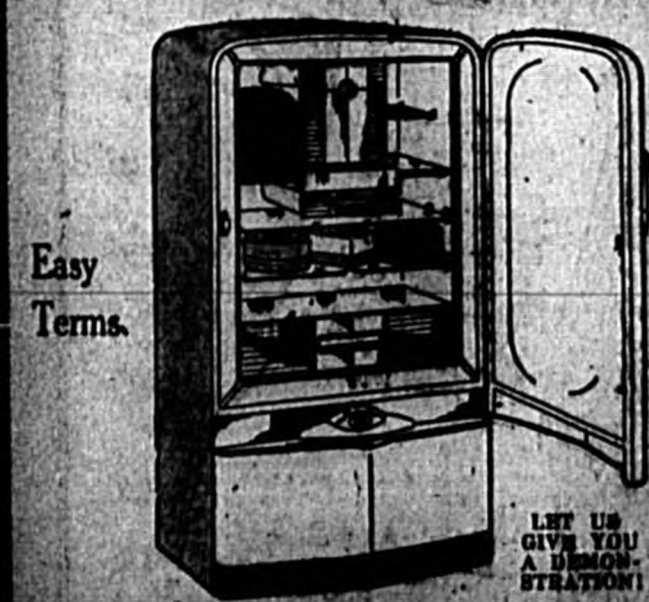

PHILIPPINE BATTLE IS INTENSIFIED

Hitler Plans Berserk Thrust; Churchill Visits Roosevelt

Reverses Jar German Armies And New Attacks Probable To Regain Prestige

British Isles May Be Target

Russians And British Continue Victories Over Sagging foe

(By Associated Press) Sharp new reverses jarred Adolf Hitler's invasion armies today on two fronts — Russian and North Africa — as the world speculated on the possibility of a sudden berserk thrust by the Fuehrer in an attempt to retrieve his tattered military fortunes.

European observers predicted Hitler in his new role as supreme war lord of the German armies would soon try to open a new front, Turkey, the Balkans, the Mediterranean, French Africa and the British Isles.

Reception of a number of British planes in the Red Sea was announced by the Soviet information bureau today. The communiqué said the planes were registered all the way from Leningrad in the north to the Sea of Azov in the south. It mentioned specifically heavy fighting in the sectors before Leningrad, Moscow and Kalinin.

At dawn after town littered with frozen Nazi dead and abandoned war equipment came back under the Red flag, the Moscow Committee of the Communist Party began plans for restoration of industries in the re-occupied area and mapped a spring planting program for fields now ruined from battle.

A British desert patrol plunged 150 miles westward into Tripolitania and reported officially last night to have wiped out a brilliant move to trap the main German and Italian forces in a fight near Bengasi, far to the east.

From Berlin came suggestions that Adolf Hitler was planning to jump out soon in new or currently inactive theaters, perhaps in the Near East or in the west, now that he has grasped personal supreme command of the German armed forces.

Two big United States bombing planes, dropped depth charges on the enemy submarine which torpedoed the tanker Emkido, and possibly hit the undersea craft, Captain Clark A. Farrow of the Emkido disclosed upon his arrival yesterday with 31 survivors of his ship.

"It may have been 10 or 15 miles off the coast," Farrow said. "The big United States bombing planes came roaring overhead from the east." Captain Farrow said in an interview. "To us in the lifeboats that was a really welcome sight."

Captain Nebt A. Blinnis of the lumber schooner Sampa said yesterday a giant submarine, presumably Japanese, fired five shells at the 2,000-ton vessel off the Central California Coast just before dawn Dec. 18 and that a torpedo went directly under the ship.

Fifth Attempt Off California Coast Since December 11

By Associated Press An enemy submarine launched three torpedoes at the Standard Oil tanker, H. M. Storey, yesterday off the American coast.

The coast guard said this attack, the fifth by Axis submarines off the California coast since Dec. 11, took place about two miles out from Point Arguello, rocky promontory 45 miles north of Santa Barbara.

With field glasses, several persons were able to watch the attempt of the submarine to scuttle the 10,000-ton tanker, southbound on its normal run.

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Military Leaders Of U. S., Britain Will Meet As War Council This Afternoon

Washington, Dec. 23.—(AP)—President Roosevelt called a conference for 5:00 P. M., EST, today with American Army and Navy officials and British Prime Minister Churchill and his staff.

The White House said the group might be called a "war council."

The daring trip by Britain's round little fighting premier was announced by the White House, which said that Lord Beaverbrook, minister of supply, and a technical staff accompanied him.

In a statement, President Roosevelt said there was one primary objective, the defeat of Hitlerism throughout the world, in conversations to be held during the next few days between the President and prime minister and the respective staffs of the two countries.

The statement said these conferences should be regarded as preliminary to further parleys which will officially include Russia, China, The Netherlands and the British dominions.

A separate announcement, telling of Churchill's arrival, was sent.

"The British Prime Minister has arrived in the United States to discuss with the President all questions relevant to the concerted war effort."

Earlier in the day, the President had consulted in turn with the Russian and Chinese ambassadors to the United States and the Netherlands minister.

It was also disclosed by the department that two Sanford youths are being held by Orlando police for an attempted robbery of a negro drug store in Orlando.

The two young men, Hubert Whitworth and J. Preston Stevens, were arrested by officers there yesterday.

In the economy store robbery, the thief literally dropped in the store. A skylight about 20 feet high was smashed and a long pole hung down from the skylight where it was fastened by several heavy wires. The robber evidently lowered himself down the pole and dropped the remaining 10 or 12 feet into the store. A small triangle of glass had been broken, and it was evident that the robber either was small in stature or a boy.

Police announced the arrest of a suspect, a negro boy who is said to have a bad record. G. M. Willis, manager of the store, disclosed the only clothing articles known missing this morning are two overcoats and one housecoat. He stated that numerous articles had been placed in the rear of the store but were not taken. Police say the robber left signs that he was frightened away before the job was finished.

General Motors Makes Huge Red Cross Gift
DETROIT, Dec. 23.—(AP)—General Motors Corporation announced a \$500,000 contribution to the American Red Cross war emergency campaign, the amount to be allocated among Red Cross chapters in 40 cities where G. M. plants and offices are located.

Michigan, where most of the corporation's manufacturing activity is centered, receives the largest portion of any of the 13 states represented. A total of \$223,000 goes to Red Cross groups in Michigan. New York chapters are next, receiving \$130,000.

Opportunity Offered Young Men In Mechanics Training

By RALPH WARNER Many local young men are passing up a good thing in regard to the national defense training classes being held five nights a week at the Future Farmers Building behind the high school.

The purpose of these classes is two-fold. One purpose is an aid to the men who receive the training and the other aids the government.

Men who take this training, which consists of metal work, motor mechanics and all general machinery repair, face a much brighter future as a result of the training. The age limit is 17 to 25, and many of the men who attend the classes, undoubtedly, will be drafted sooner or later.

When drafted, instead of joining the Army at \$21 per month, a graduate of this course is presented with an apprentice certificate that will be recognized in any defense industry or by the U. S. armed services, and thus, he can do his bit for the nation at a greater increase in salary.

If for some reason the graduate is not drafted, he will have a first class opportunity of obtaining a position in work he is trained in, whether lathe man, welder or anything else, because of the government demand for skilled mechanical labor. The new law which makes men up to 44 years of age liable for military service undoubtedly will take many mechanics and similar workers leaving openings for the graduates of these classes.

The other purpose of the training courses is to provide a sufficient number of skilled men.

The War Department and the National Office of Education sponsor the classes, which are under the supervision of the high school agriculture department and Alex Johnson, agriculture teacher. The boys tear apart motors and put them back together, they study and learn grinding, drilling, force work, cold metal work, all other similar types. James S. Webb teaches the class, and is described by Mr. Johnson as "very efficient."

Every opportunity is given to study the equipment. The shop is one of the best equipped in the (Continued on Page Three)

U.S. Men Halt Jap Vanguard As Enemy Swarms To Shore

Absolute Power Of Martial Law Given To Mayor

In Case Of Air Raid Or Blackout Hill To Control Town

Absolute command and the power virtually to declare martial law during an air raid or blackout was awarded to Mayor William C. Hill in an ordinance passed unanimously last night by the City Commissioners at their regular meeting in the City Hall.

Full control was given to the Mayor as an added safety precaution in the event of such an emergency. Another such precaution also was made as the Commissioners voted to allow the addition of one man to the police force.

Because of the winter influx of petty criminals which cause an increase in thefts at this period of the year, plus added duties by police because of national defense work, Chief Roy Williams told Commissioners additional police were needed at this time. Chief Williams will obtain a man immediately from the State Police and the matter again will be brought before the group at its second meeting in January to decide if it will be necessary to retain the extra officer during the winter.

During the discussion of blackouts, Commissioner Ed Higgins declared that all persons in houses or buildings should know exactly how to reach the shelter in case of an air raid. The danger of fire spreading from incendiary bombs, Commissioner James Gut brought up the point that air raid sirens have been appointed and are getting complete information on all air raid activities, and that a section of their duties would be to place men on all roofs in the downtown area. Mr. Gut added that as all work is done by volunteers who have other positions the work is not yet complete.

Among other business transacted, the Colough Realty Company was awarded the leasing contract for all City automotive equipment except fire trucks. A Ford tractor and grader was purchased from M. C. Britt for \$1,160, and 10 additional gallons of paint will be purchased to add to the original supply, which Streets and Parks Commissioner James Moughton said would be sufficient to paint all exposed parts of the grandstand at the ball park.

Rattlesnake Killed By Young Kennedy
With a .22 pistol, Allen Kennedy, son of Link Kennedy, killed a six-foot rattlesnake in the woods near his home on Sanford Avenue this afternoon.
