

Great Cake A la Martha Washington

Our first First Lady, Martha Washington, collected recipes for Great Cakes — as they were called in her day. These were cakes rich in butter and eggs, flavored with spices and laced with sweet dried fruits. Nowadays cooks sometimes adapt her rules.

If you are curious to sample the kind of cake popular at Mount Vernon, we suggest you try baking this Raisin-Currant Cake — an updated version of a Martha Washington recipe. One warning: don't expect this to be a fluffy cake. There's not a particle of baking powder or leavening soda in it. The texture of the pound cake and fruit-cake variety.

RAISIN-CURRANT CAKE
1 1/2 cups medium raisins
1/4 cups currants
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1/4 cup half and half
2 cups sifted regular flour
2 large eggs
1/2 cup dry sherry

Grease the entire inner surface of a two-quart tube pan with butter; sprinkle with flour. Shake the pan back and forth so surface is well coated on bottom and sides; shake on excess flour.

Coarsely chop the raisins. Rinse currants under hot running water; drain; dry on paper toweling.

Have butter room-temperature soft. In a large mixing bowl thoroughly beat together the butter, sugar and vanilla. Add salt, cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg. Stir in the half and half and 1/2 cup of the flour.

In a medium mixing bowl with an electric mixer at high speed, beat the eggs until thick and lemon color. Gradually beat into butter mixture. With mixer at low speed, alternately beat in the remaining 2 cups flour and the sherry to make a thick smooth batter. Stir in the raisins and currants.

Turn into prepared pan. Bake in a slow (325 degrees) oven until browned, cake tester inserted in center should come out clean about one hour and 15 minutes. Let cake stand in pan about 10 minutes, then turn out on wire rack, turn right-side up, cool.

Wrap in transparent plastic wrapping and store in a tightly covered tin. Cake slices well and will keep for several weeks.

RECIPE NOTES
No leavening such as baking powder or baking soda is called for in this recipe. The beaten eggs act as leavening.


A good size of tube pan to use is one that measures about 9 1/2 by 2 1/2 inches. If you use a deeper, heavy tube pan that is about 8 by 3 1/2 inches, you will probably have to increase the baking time by five to 10 minutes.

If cake browns too much at very end of baking, gently place a sheet of foil over the top to prevent any raisins or currants that peek out from becoming too brown and dry.

Novadays cakes are wrapped and dried before they are packaged so it is not necessary to rinse them before using. Currants are also packed in this sanitary way, but because their crevices are so small, we suggest rinsing them as an extra precaution.

Teacher Strike Seen Monday-Schools To Open



Majority of Seminole County's 700 school teachers are expected to join with other members of the Florida Education Association (FEA) in a mass walkout on Monday in protest against Gov. Claude Kirk's and the Legislature's failure to reach a satisfactory settlement of teachers' disputes, especially salary increases.

Associated Press reported shortly before noon today that the FEA "has soundly rejected as unacceptable the compromise \$254.4 million education spending plan and is preparing to tell teachers to walk out of their classrooms next Monday."

The gun is cocked," an FEA spokesman said, commenting on a high level meeting of the powerful teachers' organization.

William P. Layer, assistant principal of Lynn High School and president of the Seminole Education Association (SEA) told the Herald:

"We have more than sufficient resignations in hand to close Seminole schools, and are receiving more every day." He would not elaborate on the number of resignations turned in to SEA and to be handed to School Supt. William J. Phillips if the FEA actually does call for the statewide walkout.

"We will wait," said Layer, "until we see what action is taken between now and Monday... but we will follow with the FEA and do whatever it decides."

Meanwhile, Phillips said at noon today that the "School Board has said repeatedly it will keep the Seminole schools open, and will do all that is humanly possible to do so."

He said that he has called a meeting of school principals for this afternoon to discuss the situation.

Further, he said, "the sea in the fortunate position—since this matter came to the fore a number of months ago—of having on hand many offers to pitch-in in an emergency from retired teachers, non-working people who have come into the area, and from professional people in other fields who are qualified to teach."

Governor Departs Florida

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Gov. Claude Kirk met with legislative leaders before leaving for California today and indicated he does not plan to extend the special education session which ends Friday.

"There is still the same time schedule," Kirk said, refusing to say anything about the outlook for the legislation passed and under consideration by the session.

"The only thing I got out of the Governor was that he did not intend to extend the session at this moment," said Senate President Verle Pope (D-R, Augustine).

Pope said the Republican governor did indicate he would like to see the Senate pass a House-approved plan that would set up a 10-man state public school board with members appointed by the Governor and the Legislature.

"I told him our views were open on the subject but I could make no commitment," Pope said.

Legislative aide Wade Jorgensen confirmed that the bill was "a key" part of what the Governor wanted from the education session to the way of structural changes.

Immediately after the meeting with legislative leaders, Kirk left on a six-day tour to Nevada, Oregon and California.

Included in his schedule are meetings with business and industry leaders in the state and political meetings, including Republican Party fund-raising affairs.

Included on the schedule are meetings with California Gov. Ronald Reagan, Nebraska Gov. Norbert Tiemann and a brief stopover in Arizona for a meeting with Gov. Jack Williams and former GOP presidential candidate Barry Goldwater.

Kirk is scheduled to reach California Thursday night and spend most of his time there, returning to Florida next Tuesday night.

The Governor has made no appointments for next Monday, the first anniversary of his marriage to his pretty, blonde wife, Erika.

Mrs. Kirk did not accompany the Governor but the governor's office said she will join him in California later in the week.

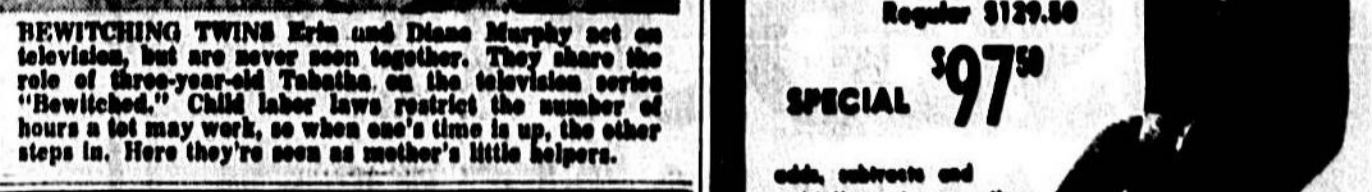

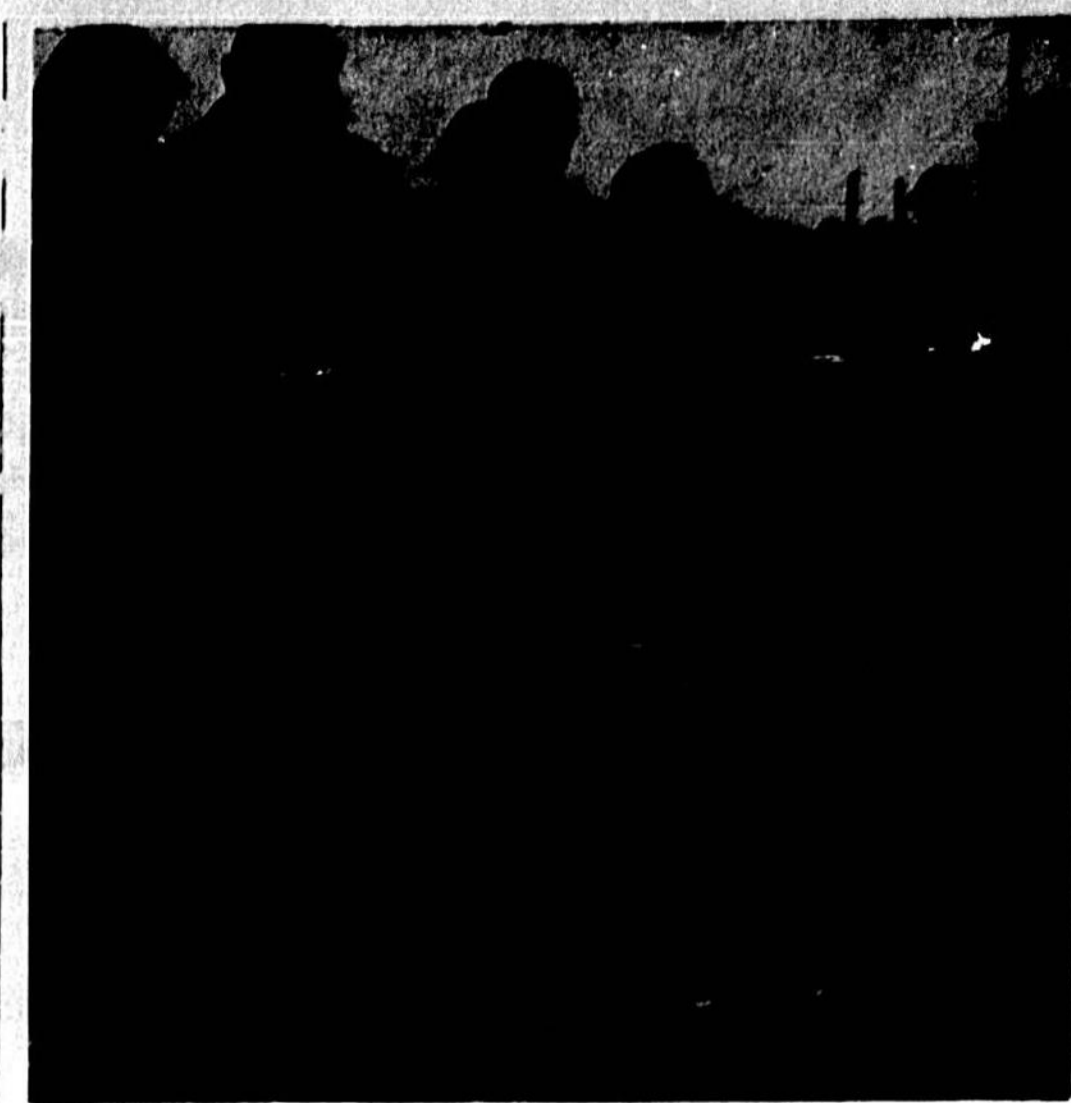

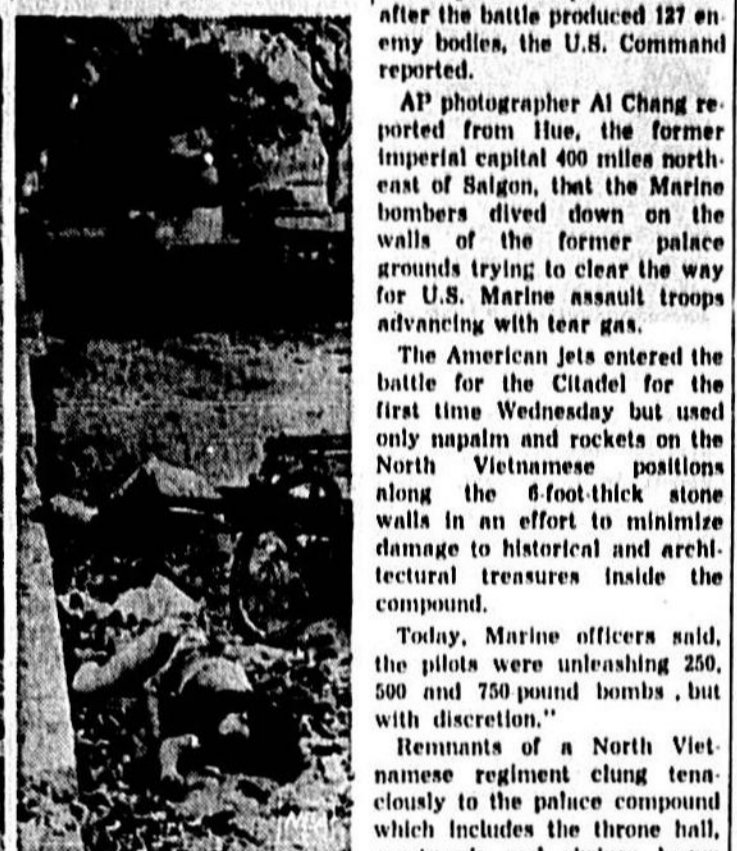
Marine Jets Bomb Hue's Former Imperial Capital

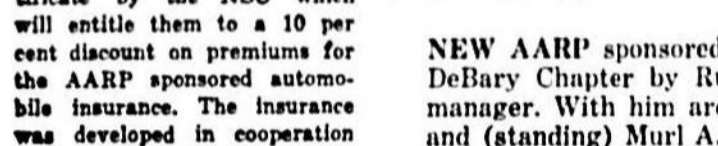

Program About India Presented

A discussion and color-slide program on India was presented for the February meeting of the Bear Lake Community Club by Mrs. Jack N. Purdum of Leesburg who presently is studying for her master's degree in arts and teaching at Rollins College.

"While there we lived with the farm families but this was difficult because it was hard to find a suitable family due to health reasons. We had to be careful what we ate because we are not tough enough to stand the diet of these people," she informed.

"If you drink milk or eat food which has not passed inspection, you sign your death warrant. Our group lost a total of 100 pounds during the six week stay in India. However, the heaviest one in the party didn't seem to lose an ounce and we later found he had been wise enough to load his suitcase with candy bars."

"Their clothing is quite different from ours. No pins or buttons are used and the materials are wrapped around one's body and tucked in," she advised.

"Naturally, we found their customs strange. For instance, when one of their buildings falls down, they do not remove the ruins but go right ahead and build another next to the debris.

"Wages are very low. Men can make as much as 20 cents a day, women, 10 cents, and children, five cents. Where there is more than one man on any single job, one always has to be supervisor."

"It is wise not to look into the wells in the ponds for you will see many dead animals floating around in the water. However, the natives think nothing of this."

"The only furniture in most of the homes are beds and these are removed during the day to provide more space within. When we visited and were taken by some of the families to see the latrines, we were at a loss for words for they were so very proud of their newly acquired possession. Most of the people are not so fortunate and I think nothing of going to the bathroom anywhere handy," she reported.

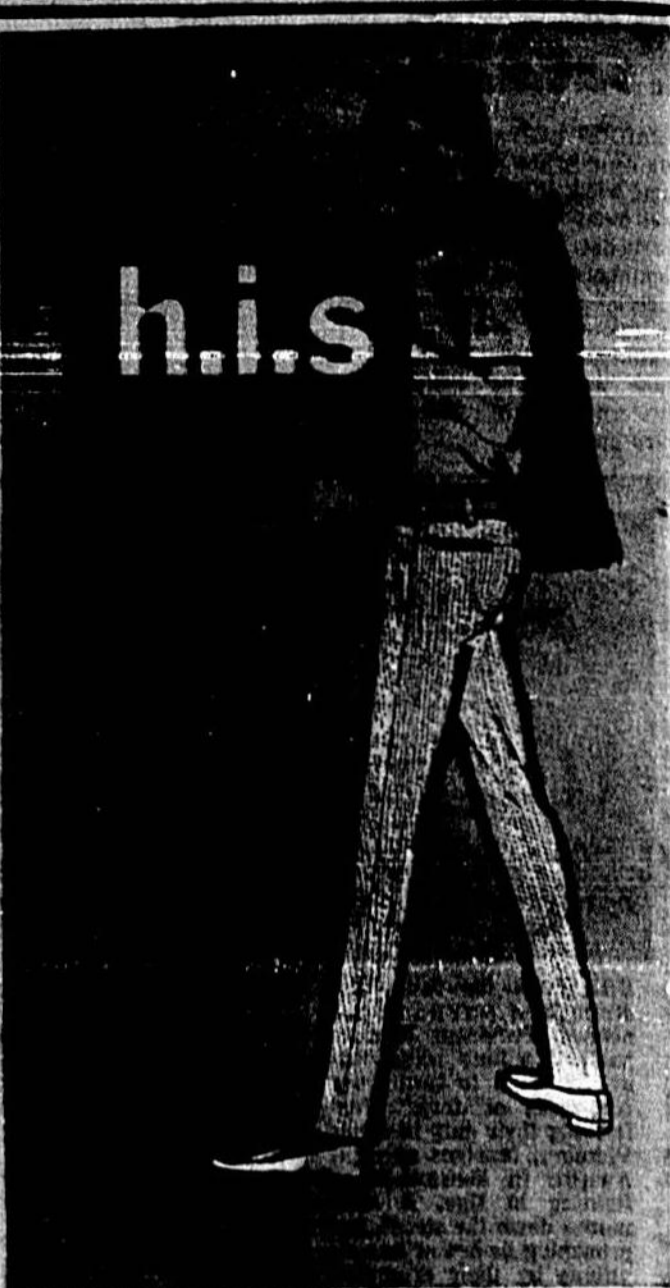

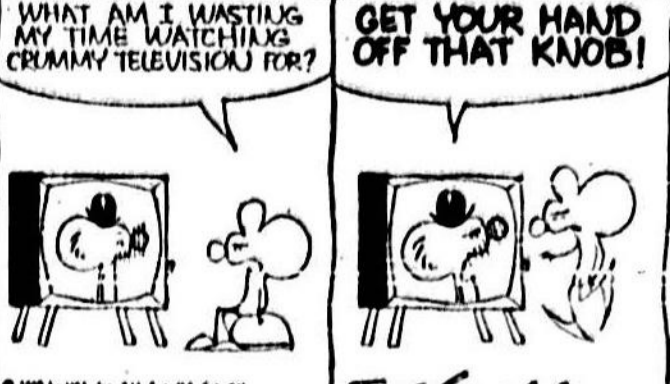

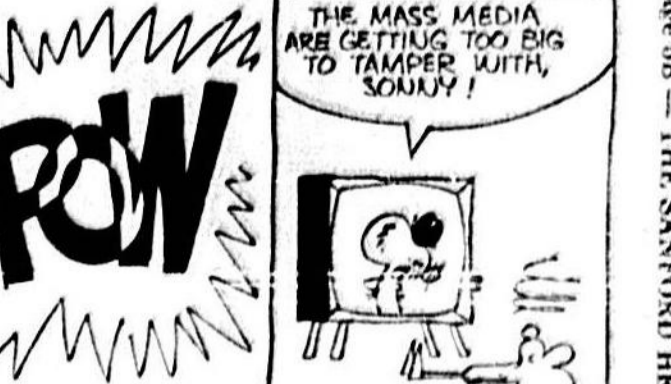

Jacoby On Bridge

Victor Mollo credits the defense player in today's hand to Rafael Munoz, who has represented Spain in the European championships some five or six times. It is a fine play, indeed, but it also has been called a "book" play, since a similar one can be found in most books.

South wins the heart opening in dummy and plays the three of spades. The first tendency of anyone is to duck in accordance with the rule of second-hand law. All Senior Munoz rose with the ace. He had marked South with the queen of hearts from his partner's bidding. It appeared that South also had the ace. In addition, he had the 10 of diamonds among his aces. The ace of clubs was needed was one spade trick for his contract.

The ace's next problem was to find a way to get four more tricks, and the club suit. Here is where the book play came in. Senior Munoz led his king of clubs. South dropped the 10 and West signed common with his eight. His was a necessary warning signal. It also was a necessary unblocking play. The five of clubs dropped South's queen West was in with the ace and returned the deuce to give East two more club tricks with the jack and seven.

This whole play is worth studying. You should note that there is no way for East and West to collect four quick club tricks unless East leads by leading his king but if West holds on to his eight the suit will block, provided declarer plays the six and not the nine on the third round.

Of course, an opening low club lead would have made the defense easy, but West does have a very normal heart opening.

Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY:—Since you're a seamstress, it is so widely read I think it is an ideal place to get a guide across to manufacturers. They are making some numbers so poorly shown on appliances we use every day! Even with glasses one has a difficulty reading some of the dials, for example, on the electric blanket. Schools Due For 'Hard Look'

The long-awaited look at educational conditions in Seminole County, declared Mrs. Lawrence Swafford, Parent-Teacher Association district president, at a meeting of the Seminole County Council PTA last evening at Longwood.

Forming a panel to lead a group discussion was Mrs. Swafford, school Supt. William J. Phillips and Floyd Richards, principal of Lake Lake School.

Richards pointed out that in September 1,409 children in Seminole County did not have adequate elementary school space. "We need," he said, "at least two more elementary schools in September not counting the new ones. In our secondary schools we have 3,000 students with inadequate space. We're increasing at the rate of 1,000 students per year."

A question-and-answer period followed "hazy group" sessions, with Phillips answering questions concerning the proposed bond issue.

The bond issue would be \$14.1 million and would be paid by ad valorem taxes. One mill increase would yield approximately \$3 million, said Phillips.

Longwood Law OK'd, City Attorney Says

MIAMI (AP) — A walkout by 60,000 public school teachers that would close the state's schools is expected today as the heels of legislative action approving a quarter-million dollar school spending bill which the teachers call misleading and insufficient.
