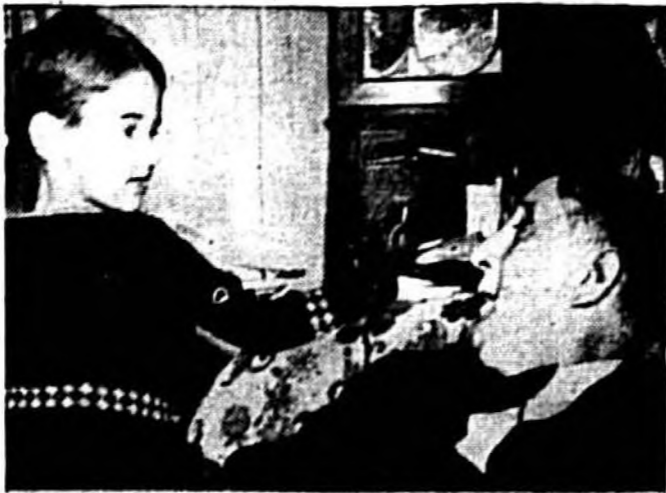

Methods Used In Processing Iron Given Kiwanians

(Continued from Page One) dominate the charge for the blast furnace in which the melting and reduction takes place, it is composed of alternate layers of coke, stove and iron ore. The simplest possible statement of each of the reactions in the blast furnace is that the oxygen of the ore combines with the carbon of the coke to form the acids combined with the bases to form a fluid slag. The iron, being heavier, settles to the bottom or hearth of the furnace and the slag, being light, floats on top of the iron. At various intervals, a plug is drawn from the side of the furnace and the slag runs off. At other regular intervals, a hole is tapped to the bottom of the furnace and the iron is forced out. This iron may be at once molded into suitable size pigs for shipment as pig iron or it may be taken in the molten state to a steel mill for further refining to various grades of steel. The principal difference in pig iron and steel is the carbon content. Pig iron contains from 3.50 to 4.00 percent carbon while steel may contain as low as 10 percent of carbon. Automobile body sheets contain 10 percent or less of carbon while cutlery steel will contain in excess of 50 percent of carbon. The air, furnishing oxygen to support combustion, is pumped in at the bottom of the furnace and the weight of such air is in excess of the solid materials used. Three and one-half tons of solid, and approximately three and three-fourths tons of air. It will thus be seen that all blast furnace plants must be equipped to supply hot air in generous quantities. The iron blast furnace may properly be called a chemical laboratory and the action and reaction, physical, chemical and mechanical, which occurs is so vast and complicated that volumes have been written about it and yet much remains to be learned. 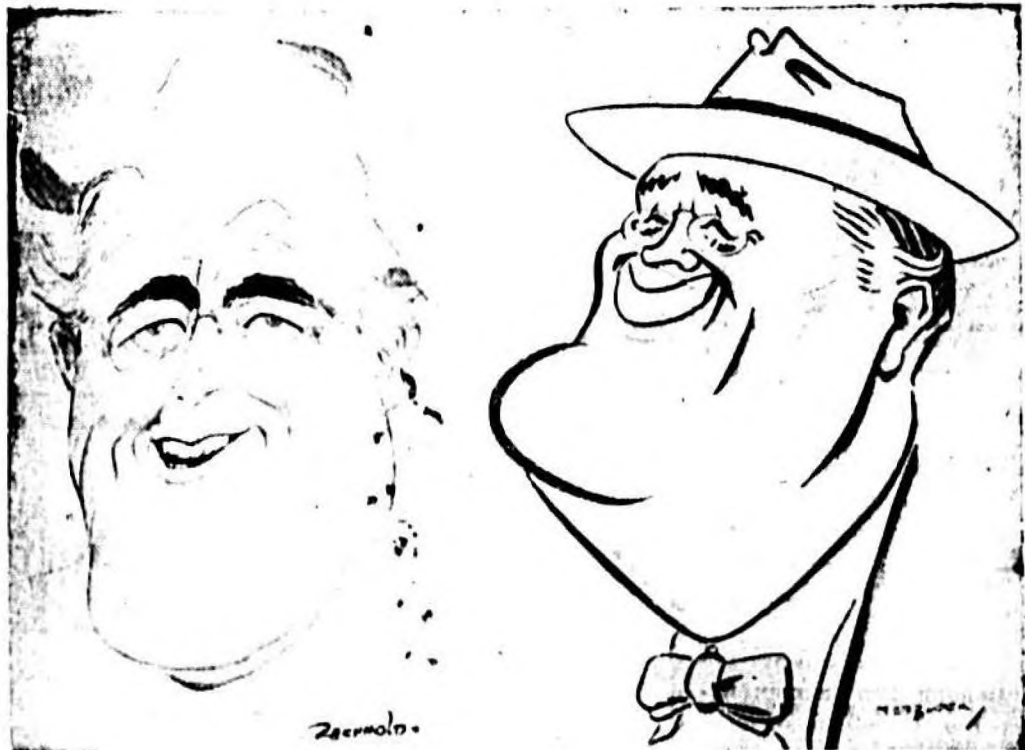

### Carl Snively And Lynn Waldorf Will Coach Northern

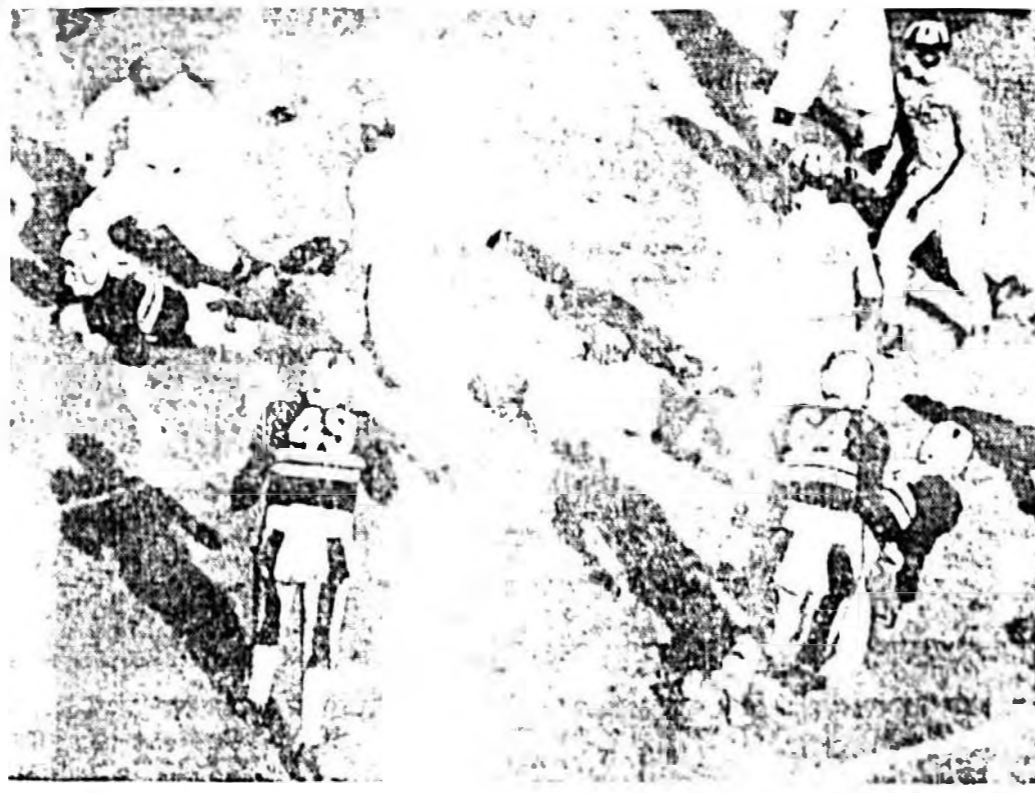
MIAMI, Nov. 25.—Carl Snively and Lynn Waldorf will coach the Northern team in the upcoming season, according to reports from the coaching staff.

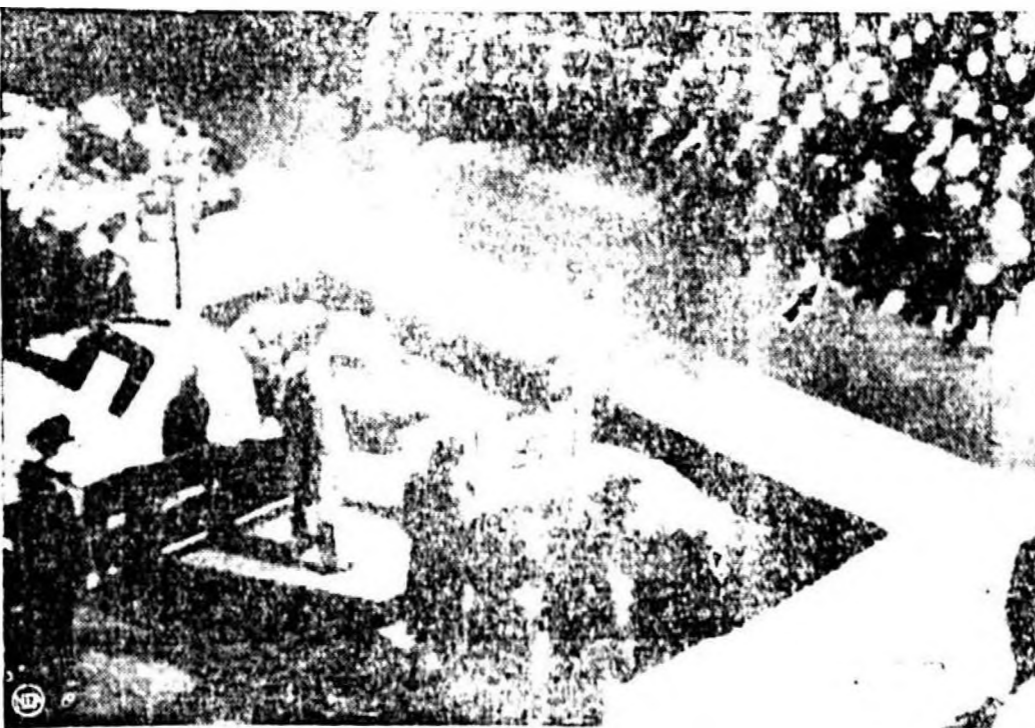

LAKELAND, Nov. 25.—With the finest eating quality ever produced Florida and other citrus producing areas will this week offer for the consuming public of the nation a "real buy" on oranges, grapefruit and tangerines, when the record crop of citrus goes to market in the first of a series of national sales drives.

Millions of buyers will be urged to consume more citrus than ever before in the first of three gigantic sales efforts undertaken by the 37,000 organized members of the National Association of Food Chains, at the request of growers' representatives from Florida, California and Texas.

Simultaneously with the chain store endeavor the Florida Citrus Commission's advertising agency inaugurates its ad program with a sensational \$2,000 center double page spread in the Saturday Evening Post. During the first of these ten day sales, food and other chain stores will spend unprecedented sums to merchandise and publicize citrus.

Chas. H. Walker, recently appointed member of the Commission, commenting on these national sales efforts, said: "This is the third straight season Florida citrus growers have appealed to the food chain stores for assistance in moving a bumper crop. As a grower and member of the Commission, I feel considerably more optimistic over the possibilities of getting a little money for my fruit. The chains are willing to pay a good price but it is up to the growers to organize. We must all co-operate by real support of a definite marketing plan to give further impetus to the chain store promotion."

W. F. Marvin, sales promotion manager of the Commission, announced that more than 4,000 members of the National Association of Chain Drug Stores would further co-operate by undertaking a juice sale in the period from January 15-31 on grapefruit and February 1-15 on oranges.
