





# Reds Down 4 U. S. Planes

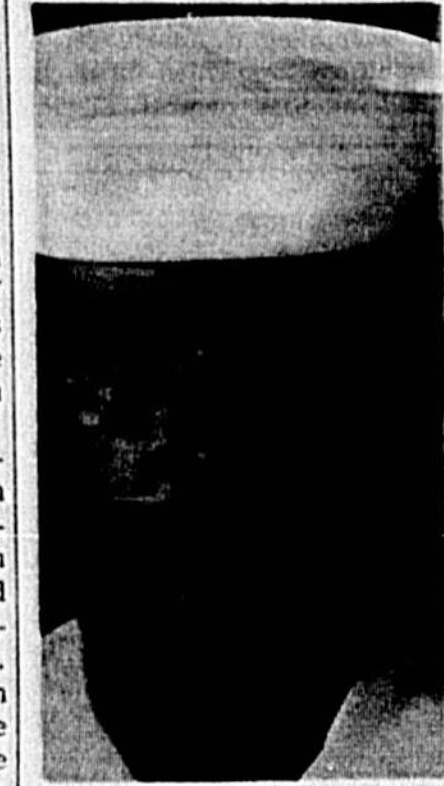
**SANFORD, Fla. (AP)** — North Vietnamese fighters shot down three U.S. B-57 bombers during raids on Hanoi Sunday and another American plane was knocked down further south today, the U.S. command announced.

Only one of the five pilots was rescued, a spokesman said. The aircraft losses brought the number of U.S. planes reported shot down over North Viet Nam to 30.

While American jets pounded oil depots, missile sites and other targets in the North Vietnam heartland, government troops in South Viet Nam reported wiping out nearly half of a 400-man elite Communist force in a three-day operation in the sweltering swamps of the Mekong Delta 120 miles southwest of Saigon. The fighting broke a 10-day lull in ground action in the south.

As the allies braced for increased Communist terrorism in advance of the national election next Sunday, 5,500 South Korean troops arrived aboard three U.S. transport ships at the central coast port of Nha Trang. They bolstered the air-transport allied force, more than 700,000 Vietnamese troops, to 941,000 men.

Missiles plagued air operations in the South. A U.S. twin-engine Army transport plane crashed into a Vietnamese village Sunday shortly after taking off from Dong Tra airfield about 100 miles from Hanoi.

# GOP Scores Demos For 'Hitting' LBJ

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Sen. Thurston B. Morton assailed the Senate Democratic leadership today for "embarrassing" President Johnson by proposing a reduction in the U.S. troop commitment to Europe.

Morton, who heads the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee, took the lead in an attempt to force hearings on resolution offered by Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and Democratic Policy Committee members to put the Senate on record favoring a cutback in North Atlantic Treaty Organization forces.

"The proposal at this time is untimely and embarrassing to the commander in chief," Morton said in an interview, "an upset and concerned that the Democratic leadership is so little disciplined that it would come out with a proposal like this."

"If we do this — and we won't — Europe would consider NATO as going down the drain and the rest of the world would think we were concerned only with Viet Nam," the Kentucky Republican said.

An Associated Press canvass disclosed that of 65 senators willing to take a public position at this time, 46 favor early withdrawal of some American troops from Europe while 17 oppose the action as likely to

# Seminole Bar Joins Suit To Fight Free Aid

Seminole County Bar Association members have voted unanimously to join Orlando attorney Russell Troutman in his suit against Senator Shriver, director of the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity.

Troutman's suit claims that Shriver's decision to initiate a program of federally paid attorneys in neighborhood law offices to give free legal services is unconstitutional.

The suit, filed in Federal court several weeks ago, asks that Shriver and the OEO be enjoined from establishing the proposed neighborhood law offices.

"We feel that most associations are already providing these proposed services without necessity of federal assistance," a prepared statement of the Seminole County Bar reads.

The principal objection is that the (Economic Opportunity) Act of 1964 does not authorize the OEO to establish neighborhood law offices, the Office of Economic Opportunity director sets his own guidelines for operation and these guidelines have neither been established nor approved by Congress," the statement concludes.

It has been reported that a motion is pending before the Orange County Bar Association which would petition the Florida Supreme Court to prohibit the OEO from establishing neighborhood law offices.

Thirty-two Democrats and six Republicans say they think the time has come for Western Europe to bear a large share of the burden of its defense.

Among them Sens. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y.; Joseph P. Clark, D-Texas; John S. Sparkman, D-Ala.; and Vance Hartke, D-Ind., said they believe any withdrawal ought to be geared to a reduction in Soviet troop strength in Eastern Europe.

# Electronic Test Machine Installed At Junior Hi

A Gradenmaster electronic test scoring machine has been obtained by South Seminole Junior High School as part of a pilot testing program.

The machine will be introduced into the science department for use of the equipment throughout the school.

It will grade and mark 300 tests in an hour, each containing up to 65 multiple choice questions. The instructor programs the machine by marking a master form.

It will not only lighten the teacher's load but will help him design better tests and make more effective use of tests in teaching and re-teaching.

In cases of incorrect answers, omissions, or multiple answers, the machine will grade the question wrong, making a mark by it and the total number of errors will be written at the top of each test form.

Several other government and professional groups have reportedly expressed agreement with the suit filed by Troutman and are considering joining it.

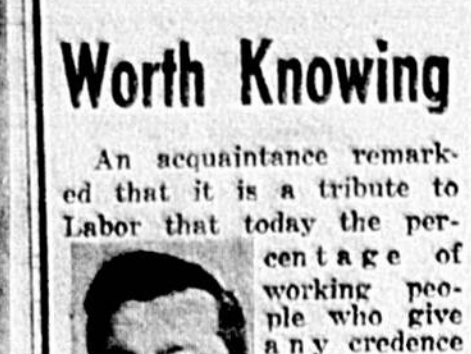

## Sandwich Making Tips Simplified

August was sandwich month, and September begins a new school year. Thus Miss Myrtle Wilson, Extension Home Economics Agent, suggests that it's wise to work out a scheme that helps you make sandwiches faster and easier when you make a big batch for freezing or for a crowd. Here are 10 steps to simplify sandwich making suggested by Extension food specialists of Cornell University and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.  
1. Make as many sandwiches as are practical at one time. Label and date each one you plan to freeze. Today's sandwich wrappings keep them moist and modern refrigerators store them safely. Freeze them for holding a week to a month or so. Don't plan to freeze fillings with egg white, raw vegetables, or mayonnaise.  
2. Make sandwich fillings and keep egg, meat, cheese, fish and poultry refrigerated until ready to use.  
3. Keep all ingredients and equipment within easy reach.  
4. Lay 2 or more pairs of slices of bread in rows, working from the back of the table toward you. Open each pair of slices like you open a book, with the bottom crusts touching.  
5. Using a wide knife or spatula spread one slice in each pair of slices with softened butter or margarine, if your filling is meat, cream cheese, or peanut butter. If your filling is jelly or a moist mixture spread butter or margarine on each slice, otherwise the bread gets soggy.  
6. Do not lift slices as you butter and fill them.  
7. Put meat, cheese or other filling on one slice in each pair.  
8. Refrigerate or freeze sandwiches until used. It's best to individually wrap those you freeze. For freezing, use moisture-vapor proof wrapping.

**U. S. Traffic Deaths Over 600; 32 Die In Fla.**

Traffic deaths across the nation during the three-day Labor Day weekend soared well above 600, a record for any summer period.

There were no traffic deaths reported in Seminole County.

Delayed reports of deaths in accidents up to midnight Monday night showed a total of 624 persons killed in the 76-hour period.

This compared with 565 deaths in a non holiday weekend of equal length.

Labor Day weekend accidents in Florida killed at least 32 persons, including seven young people in a single traffic crash north of Clearwater.

## Apartheid Leader Of S. Africa Stabbed

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (UPI) - Prime Minister Hendrik Verwoerd was assassinated today in Parliament by a six-foot white messenger who stabbed him repeatedly in the neck and chest with two silver daggers.

Verwoerd, who would have been 65 on Thursday, was the architect of South Africa's apartheid policy of almost total segregation of the races.

He had won the emmy of Black Africa and much of the world. His assassin was identified as Dimitri Stefanidis, a hulking six-footer of Greek descent who came here recently from Portuguese Mozambique.
