Court Voids Dade Ban On Books

MIAMI (UPI) — Two controversial books — "Tropic of Cancer" and "Pleasure Was My Business" — will apparently go back on sale here soon.

The U. S. Supreme Court yesterday overthrew a Dade County ban on them as obscene. In the case of Henry Miller's "Tropic," the Dade County Circuit Court had imposed the ban on sales in 1962 as crude and obscene by local standards. Publishers argued, however, that national rather than local standards should be used.

S. Robert Trullins, author of "Pleasure Was My Business," defended his book in the high court saying it was a "relation of the true trials and travails of one 'Madam Sherry' (Rose Milled) during her sojourn in Dade County, Florida, as the protagonist, procuress, and proprietress of a house of well-known but nonetheless ill repute." Lawsuits have been heard in a number of courts around the nation in recent years over "Tropic of Cancer."

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No Need For Heart Attack, Doctor Says

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Nobody need have a heart attack because nature gives a clear and definite warning a year in advance. And the potential victim can avoid it by taking simple and easy steps.

These rather startling assertions were made today at the 113th convention of the American Medical Association by Dr. Robert S. Green, director of the Heart Research Foundation of Cincinnati, Ohio.

He described what he called the pre-heart attack syndrome. This is "being more tired out than you should be

for what you have done." A typical case, he said, would be a hard-driving executive who battles the world six days a week and looks forward to the Saturday night party.

The warning comes when he unexplainedly feels too tired before the party to take a shower, for example. Being tired after hard labor, or bored, or depressed, or even chronically tired, are not warnings of impending coronary trouble, he said. The key is the unexpectedness.

Green said that if the executive ignores the warnings, his periods of fatigue will increase in frequency until he may even feel "fraid of livin' and 'fraid of dyin'."

Then, if lucky, he will have the pang of angina pectoris and time to be treated. If not so lucky, he will have a heart attack and survive. And if unlucky, he will collapse and die.

But Green said the potential fatality can cheat death by following some simple rules.

They are that he must avoid fatigue, act his age, condition himself for each and every new activity and, if he has had an attack, accept the limitations of his scarred heart.

Six months after the attack, the patient can resume a virtually normal life, just as President Eisenhower and Johnson did, according to Green.

The lecturer based his conclusions upon interviews and correspondence with more than 1,000 coronary victims and their relatives.

County Seeking Land Fill Sites

Val Robbins, county sanitation officer, was authorized by the Seminole Board of Commissioners Tuesday to make a survey of the county to locate new sites for land fills.

It was reported at Tuesday's Commission meeting that the present land fill serving the Cameron City area will soon reach capacity and that another site, preferably within a mile of the present one, will be needed. Robbins was authorized to locate a new site and look for others throughout the county.

J. C. Lavender, county road superintendent, told the Commission that the old clay pit on Country Club Road will soon provide its last load of clay. The supply there, Lavender declared, will be exhausted before the work of extending 26th street to the Country Club Road's junction with the entrance to Loch Arthur is completed.

South Seminole Bank To Mark 3rd Anniversary

The South Seminole Bank at Fern Park, which will observe its third anniversary Friday, is inviting the public to make advanced estimates of the institution's growth after a full three years of operation.

J. P. Toole, vice president and cashier, announced that a contest will be conducted during the week to predict the bank's deposits as of closing on June 28.

Awards, including a savings account, safety deposit boxes and personalized check-books will be presented to the six persons coming closest to the exact figure.

As a starting point, Toole said the winning entries will most probably have to be "between \$5,000,000 and \$8,000,000, in order to accurately reflect the growth of South Seminole."

The bank, which now has more than 400 local stockholders, opened on June 28, 1961, with first day deposits in excess of \$1,000,000.

By the end of the first year, deposits had climbed to \$3,227,739, and had reached \$4,406,849, by the end of the second year. Toole reported. Members of the bank's board of directors are: A. G. Bush, chairman; E. G. Banks, president; Toole; Amos G. Carroll, Herman J. Heldrich and Arthur O'Heir.

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Lodge Decision Last-Minute Attempt To Help Scranton

'Too Little, Too Late,' Say Barry's Backers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Henry Cabot Lodge, who helped persuade Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower to come home from Paris in 1952 to run for President, is coming home from Saigon on an even tougher task.

His new goal is to upset the Goldwater bandwagon by promoting the 11th hour candidacy of Pennsylvania Gov. William W. Scranton for the Republican presidential nomination.

Lodge's decision to resign as U. S. ambassador to Viet Nam did not jar the confidence of Sen. Barry Goldwater's backers that the Arizona is too far out in front to be denied the nomination at the San Francisco convention opening three weeks from Thursday.

"It's too little and too late," they chortled.

But the Lodge move gave a timely lift to the slow-rise Scranton campaign. It followed Scranton's disclosure that he has former New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey working in his corner. And it came in advance of next week's important Illinois delegation meeting, one of three being held.

Goldwater ignored the political implications of Lodge's decision to give up his diplomatic post. Instead, Goldwater said, Administration "indecision and vacillation" in Viet Nam had "undoubtedly motivated his resignation."

But Scranton announced that the 1960 GOP vice presidential nominee "is returning because he wants to campaign for me."

Goldwater has told Senate associates he does not think the Scranton campaign has gotten off the ground. He is said to feel Scranton's last-minute bid actually has worked to solidify Goldwater delegate strength, while enlivening the convention outlook and helping to put the party in fighting trim.

Lodge, with 46 convention delegates of his own, is not expected by Republicans to start a political grassfire for Scranton by himself. His decision to drop his diplomatic immunity to help a fellow moderate is viewed, however, as a significant piece in a pattern of developments which Scranton desperately needs.

Many other events are scheduled for entertainment throughout the day including a greased pig contest, greased pole contest, presentation of more than \$5000 worth of donation prizes and finals in the "Miss Flame of Seminole County" beauty contest and many others.

Climaxing the day's activities will be fireworks displays which the firemen say will be the biggest ever seen in Seminole County.

Proceeds from the annual Fiesta have been used in the past for radios and monitor equipment, new sirens, warning lights, two high pressure nozzles, rebuilding and equipping of an emergency vehicle and purchase of a 3,000 watt portable power plant.

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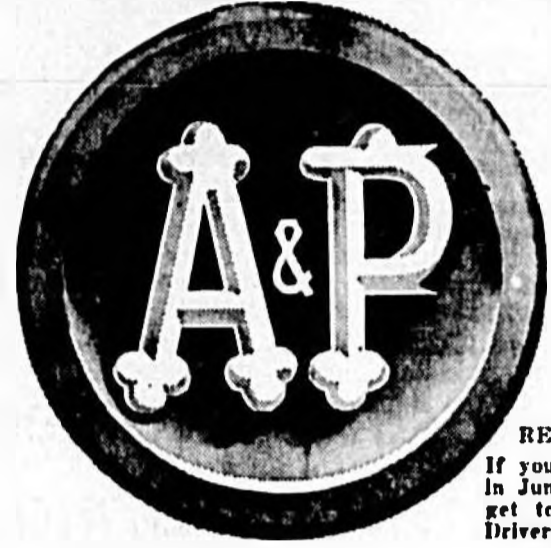

What was scheduled to be a talk on evolution or theories of how life began on earth, at the Civitan meeting last week turned into a discussion, with everyone getting into the act.

Bud Laver, Sanford Junior High School teacher was the speaker and explained several theories of the beginning of man, as advanced by philosophers and scientists over the centuries.

However, other members of the club had their own theories and frequently interrupted the speaker to disagree with him at various points.

It seems that everyone has their own die-hard ideas on evolution and take strong exception to all others.

In closing, Laver advanced the idea that the two theories that are most prevalent, that of human development from a single one-celled organism into a complex organism of man; and the Biblical story of creation by God, could be reconciled.

This reconciliation could be possible, Laver theorized if one interprets the passage of the Bible that says, "God breathed into man the breath of life and man became a living soul" to indicate that the developed creature that evolved from a one-celled organism had no soul and God, "created him in His own image by giving him a spirit or soul, as God Himself is a spirit and not a human creature."

Laver emphasized that all remarks made were in the realm of "theory" and not to be taken as "gospel."

When one recalls that mankind today only uses seven to 15 percent of his potential brain power, it is perhaps easier to conceive of God as a Supreme Intelligence, whom our small minds cannot even begin to comprehend.

It was a most interesting discussion and one that provoked a great deal of deep thought, if "thought" can be separated from superstition, pre-conceived notions and dogma.

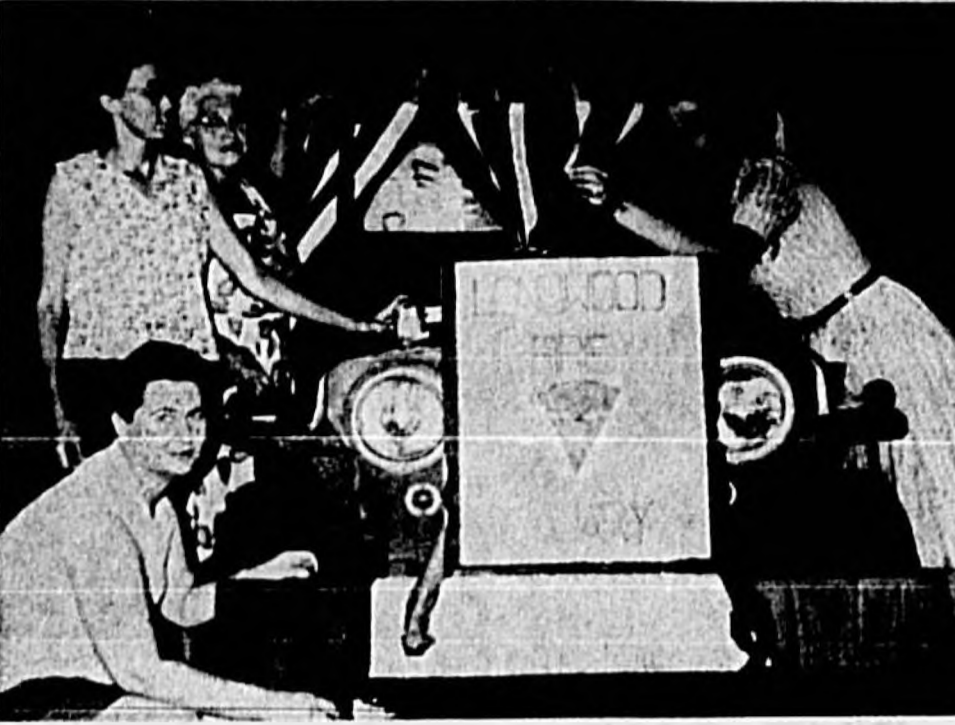

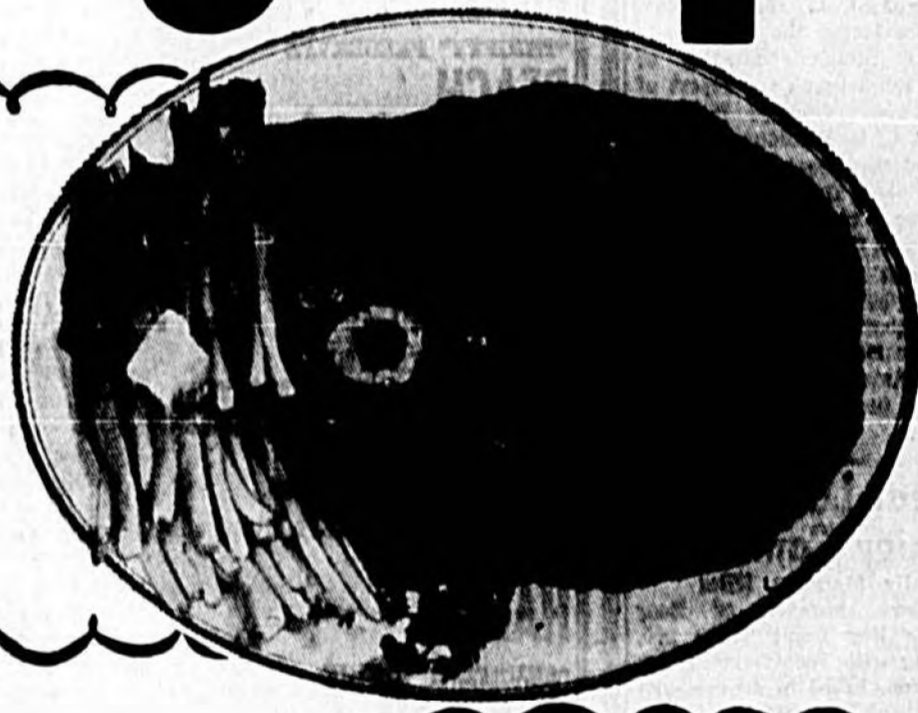

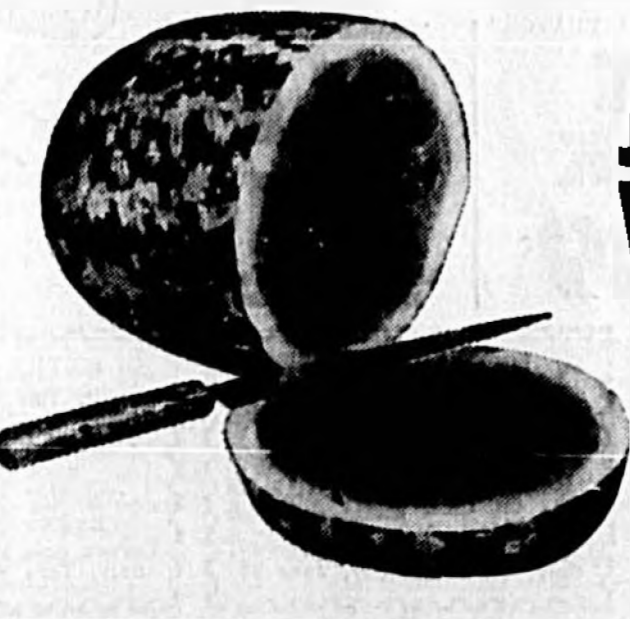

Westside Fire Proposal Put Before Council

Drew Warren, who has been instrumental in an attempt to create a west side volunteer fire department, appeared before the County Commission Tuesday to get, as he put it, "the reaction of the Commissioners toward making funds available to the organization" so that it can proceed to organize a fire control district. "My experience in these matters," said Chairman James Avery, "is that it is extremely difficult to get a majority of registered freeholders to the polls to vote on the creation of a fire control district."

But Avery and the Commission did express the opinion that if the district can be created the board, according to permissive legislation, would give consideration to advancing funds to the district which would be repaid from district receipts at a later date.

Warren said he would convey this information to the present committee attempting to create the district. The Commission asked its attorney, Harold Johnson, to look into the law providing the Commission authority to advance funds and invited Warren to be present at the next meeting of the board.

Rights-Of-Way For 427 Sought

The State Road Department will be asked by the Seminole County Commission to acquire rights-of-way along the west side of SR 427 for the eventual widening of the roads.

At Tuesday's meeting of the Commission the report of appraisers Richard McCanna and A. B. Peterson Jr., indicated that acquiring rights-of-way along the west side of the highway would be more feasible and "the least expensive."

Upon this advice and the recommendation of County Engineer William Bush, the Commission voted to request the State Road Department to begin acquiring the rights-of-way.

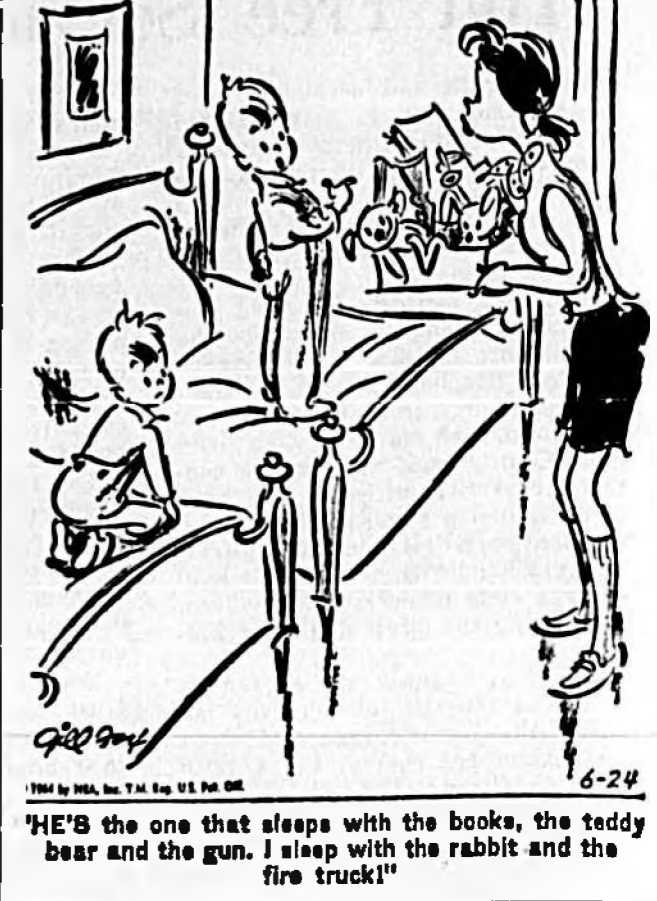
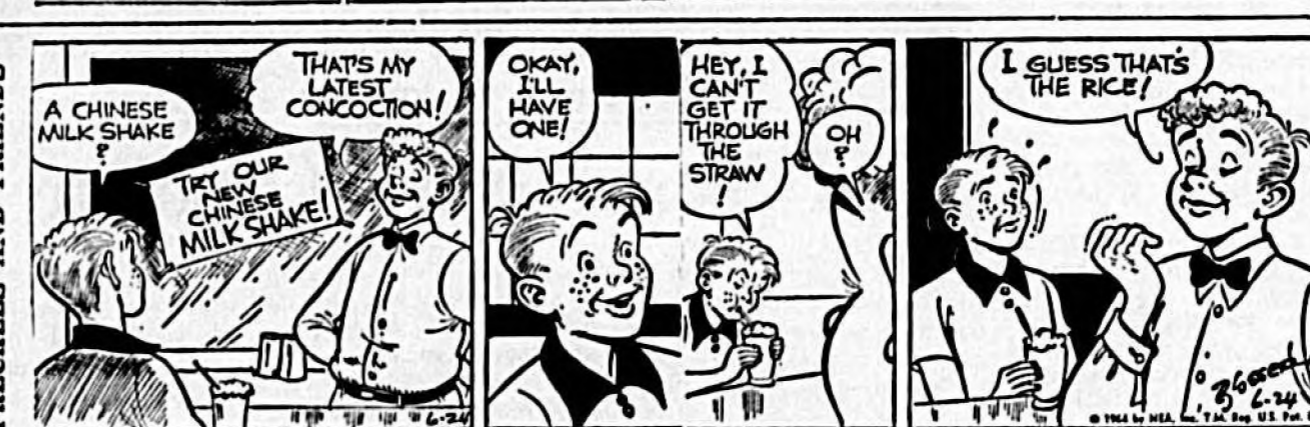

Resources For Development Of Area Discussed

Five kinds of resources were listed as pertinent to an area's industrial development, by Byihel Warrell, General Industrial Agent for the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, speaking to members of the Rotary Club, Monday.

The resources which must be good to interest potential industry include natural, industrial, trade, social and financial.

"Often the decision to locate in a community can hinge on unfavorable aspects concerning such things as cost of living, recreation, schools, trade areas or lack of civic organization, or other factors affecting the mental stimulation and development of the plant personnel," said Warrell.

Transportation facilities, electrical power, water, waste disposal, tax structures, climate, insurance rates, all affect favorable or unfavorable decisions to locate in a community, Warrell noted.

He praised the Chambers of Commerce for their help and cooperation in supplying pertinent information, and noted that the railroad's industrial development division employs geologists, agriculturists, chemists, civil engineers and forestry experts to guide them in their planning for future developments.

Warrell also emphasized the importance of dealing with prospective clients on a confidential basis, and cautioned those interested in industrial development not to overlook the possibility of the expansion of existing industry.

He noted the importance of providing jobs for young people, so that they need not leave the community or the area in order to find employment.

Next week, Rotarians will install new officers and will hear Kenneth Wacker, of Winter Park, former Lt. Governor of Rotary.

County Requests Larger Ad Fund

At the suggestion of Chairman James Avery, the County Commission today unanimously directed County Attorney Harold Johnson to prepare a bill for presentation to the county's legislative delegation which would permit an increase of Seminole's advertising fund from \$25,000 to as much as \$50,000.

The bill, if approved by the delegation, would be submitted to the 1965 session of the state legislature for its action.

Avery pointed out that if no action were taken at this time and no measure was presented to the 1965 session of the legislature, the county would have to await the 1967 session and, as he put it, "that would mean we could not increase this budget item until the 1967-68 fiscal year."

Avery said in making his proposal that the county could not wait that long for an increase in view of the growth and development of Seminole.

Lawmakers Will Go To Hearing

State Sen. Mack Cleveland and Rep. Joe Davis, both of Seminole, will be in Jacksonville Friday for the fifth in a series of public hearings by an interim special commission established by the 1963 session of the Legislature to study the abolition of the death penalty in capital cases.

Cleveland is one of three senators and Davis one of five representatives on the commission which has held previous hearings in Miami, West Palm Beach, Tampa and Winter Park.

Neither Cleveland nor Davis today would comment on the hearings except to say that the 15-man commission, which has seven non-legislative members, agreed that no public statements would be made until its report and recommendations, if any, are made to the 1965 session of the Legislature.

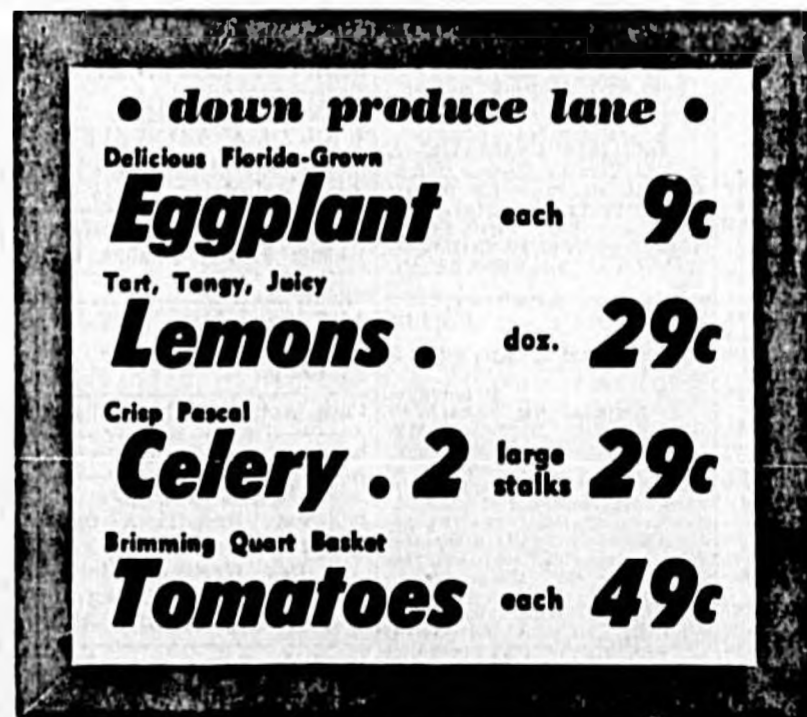
