Westside Fire Proposal Put Before Council

Drew Warren, who has been instrumental in an attempt to create a west side volunteer fire department, appeared befor the County Commission Tuesday to get, as he put it, "the reaction of the Commissioners toward making funds available to the organization" so that it can proceed to organize a fire control district.

"My experience in these matters," said Chairman James Avery, "is that it is extremely difficult to get a majority of registered freeholders to the polls to vote on the creation of a fire control district."

But Avery and the Commission did express the opinion that if the district can be created the board, according to permissive legislation, would give consideration to advancing funds to the district which would be repaid from district receipts at a la-

ter date. Warren said he would convey this information to the present committee attempting to create the district, The Commission asked its attorney, Harold Johnson, to look into the law providing the Commission authority to advance funds and invited Warren to be present at the next meeting of the board.

Rights-Of-Way For 427 Sought

The State Road Department will be asked by the Seminole County Commission to acquire rights-of-way along the west side of SR 427 for the eventual widening the roads.

At Tuesday's meeting of the Commission the report of appraisers Richard McCanna and A. B. Peterson Jr., Indicated that acquiring rights-ofway along the west side of the highway would be more feasible and "the least expensive."

Upon this advice and the recommendation of County Engineer William Bush, the Commission voted to request the State Road Department to begin acquiring the rights of-

Toll Free Service Helps

The growth and development of the eastern, western, northern and particularly the southern sections of Seminole County has been closely followed by the growth of the county's school system. In fact, the numerical growth of both has and is still going hand in hand.

Sometime ago the Sheriff's Department, attempting to serve the constituents of this area, installed toll free telephone service throughout the county. In an emergency, or even in routine matters, when Seminola County residents need to contact the Sheriff's office all they have to do is dial a number. There is no toll charge, no long distance operator must handle the call and no local or area code numbers are involved, even using the direct dialing techni-

Recently, because of the growing need and the cost of toll calls between the Sanford area and other sections of the county, the County Clerk's office installed toll free lines. It enhances service and is actually less expensive than the accumulated toll charges, even though the lines run between \$60 and \$75 dollars a month each.

Now a third county agency - the Seminole County Board of Public Instruction - has authorized the installation of toll free service lines.

This service, despite the monthly expense of the lines, will be provided at less cost to the board and the taxpayers than the accumulative total of toll charges on individual calls to and from the various schools and other individuals and businesses in the outlying parts of Seminole,

The Herald reviews all of this to point out that in the long run Sanford area citizens would have been better off financially to have voted in favor of the proposed metropolitan phone system when the poll was taken by Southern Bell last February,

Sooner or later the metro system must become a reality. We can only hope that these instances will serve to remind us that support of the metro system should be given - if and when we have another opportunity to express ourselves in favor of












Resources For Development Of Area Discussed

Five kinds of resources were listed as pertinent to an area's industrial development, by Bythel Warrell, General Industrial Agent for the Atlantic Coast Line Rallroad, apeaking to members of the Rotary Club, Monday.

The resources which must be good to interest potential industry include natural, industrial, trade, social and financial.

"Often the decision to locate in a community can hinge on uniavorable aspects concerning such things as cost of living, recreation, schools, trade areas or lack of civic organization, or other factors affecting the mental atimulation and development of the plant personnel," said Warrell.

Transportation facilities, electrical power, water, waste disposal, tax structures, elimate, insurance rates, all affect favorable or unfavorable decisions to locate in a community, Warrell poted.

He praised the Chambers of Commerce for their help and cooperation in supplying pertinent information, and noted that the railroad's industrial development division employs geologists, agriculturists, chemists, civil engineers and forestry experts to guide them in their planning for future developments.

Warrell also emphasized the importance of dealing with prospective clients on a confidential basis, and cautioned those interested in industrial development not to overlook the possibility of the expansion of existing industry.

He noted the importance of providing jobs for young people, so that they need not leave the community or the area in order to find employment.

Next week, Rotarians will install new officers and will hear Kenneth Wacker, of Winter Park, former Lt. Governor of Rotary.

County Requests Larger Ad Fund

At the suggestion of Chairman James Avery, the County Commission today unanimously directed County Attorney Harold Johnson to prepare a bill for presentation to the county's legislative delegation which would permit an increase of Seminole's advertising fund from \$25,000 to as much as \$50,000.

The bill, if approved by the delegation, would be submitted to the 1965 session of the state legislature for its action. Avery pointed out that if no action were taken at this time and no measure was presented to the 1965 session of the legislature the county would have to await the 1967 session and, as he put it. "That would mean we could not increase this budget item until the 1967-68 fiscal year." Avery said in making his proposal that the county could not wait that long for an in-
