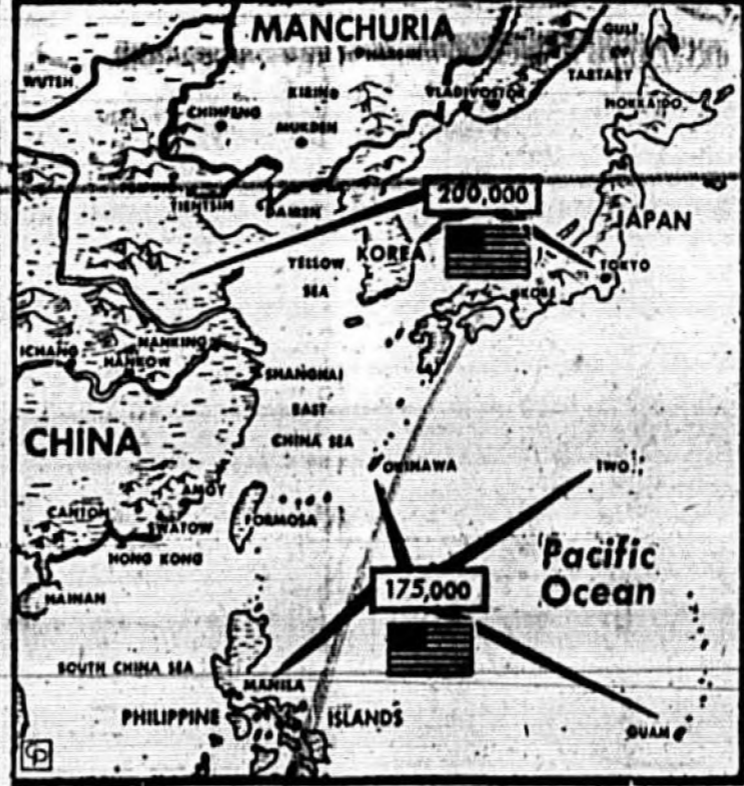

Entire Valleys Are Inhabited By Women, Children

There are whole valleys in Yugoslavia, where only women and children live today," said Nada Kraigher, 34, former underground worker and lieutenant in the Yugoslav Partisan Army. "People wonder what effect living like that without any man would have on a woman's emotional life. But they don't have any emotional life and they don't miss it. They are so overworked rebuilding those devastated valleys—cutting wood, gathering mud to make houses, trying to scrape together enough food to live—they don't have time to think of anything else."

"But they will go back to being women again eventually. I'll all 'id—even after all that time we fought in war. The young ones said they never would, but they did."

"Of course we all thought we would go crazy trying to get used to a skirt again after living so long in pants in the woods and mountains. I was unhappy in that skirt. I found me. I couldn't sit in a jeep or a chair. I thought everyone was looking at my legs. Finally I got an American uniform and after that I could bear it."

"Then my uncle said I must wear lipstick. But I couldn't hear all that woman stuff at once. I just said I wouldn't do it. After a while, though, we all got lipstick and cold cream and things again."

"There was one thing we could not change. Our feet had grown so big from marching barefoot or in those big army shoes, we could not wear little shoes again."

Kraigher—smartly coiffed, but without a sign of lipstick—glanced

at her new number sevens and sighed. She is making her first trip to the United States as the Yugoslav Red Cross delegation here to study American Red Cross methods. She was born in Trieste in 1911 of Slovenian peasant parents, learned five languages, married a sculptor and mothered a son. After her divorce and the invasion of Yugoslavia, she worked in the underground for years, then fought in the Partisan army with men under her command.

"The war has made a revolutionary change in the status of Yugoslav women," she said. "Back in the old days the men of the country were kings. When a peasant went to market, he rode the donkey and his wife trudged behind, carrying the load."

"But during the war women played a very strong part in the country's defense and men got used to taking orders from them. Today Yugoslav women have the vote, equal rights and equal pay for equal work. If their ability is superior to a man's, they get the job and men work under their direction."

"Lots of young women have married the men they fought with during the war and are going right on with their careers. Women are active in every phase of the country's economic and political life. They also have unity and strength through the Anti-Fascist Women's Union which was formed several years ago. They are even playing with the idea that Yugoslavia will have to go right from now on, because they have so much power."

Asked for the men's reaction, Kraigher said this young man who had fought side by side with women took it as a matter of course, but the old peasant was a different story. Not long ago, she said, the peasant was padding down a country road with a pack on his back and asked where he was going.

Said the peasant: "I'm leaving home. I don't like this new government. If they are going to make this kind of mistakes in the beginning, I might as well go now. What mistakes? Giving women the vote. There was a time when a man had some rights in his own home. But now the house is full of women running politics from morning till night. I'm clearing out."

French Demand Death For Nazis On Trial

Defendants Display Visible Signs Of Fear As Prosecutor Makes Request

BERNBERG, Jan. 17.—(AP)—The French prosecutor at the Nuerberg war crimes trial, Francois de Menthon, has demanded that stern punishment be meted out to all members of Nazi terror organizations. Hundreds of thousands would be involved in the mass punishment for which de Menthon argued. For the 22 top men of the Nazi regime, the French prosecutor demanded death.

De Menthon himself is a wounded war veteran. He drove home his points against such organizations as the Elite Guard, the Storm Troopers, and the Gestapo with such eloquence and fervor that the Nazi defendants in the prisoners pen showed visible signs of fear.

The French prosecutor conceded that there might be objections to the mass punishment of members of the various Nazi organizations but, he declared, without the existence of these groups, without the spirit which animated them, it would be impossible to understand how so many atrocities could have been perpetrated. Sentences of death for the leaders and punishment for the members of the terror organizations, he argued, serve as a foundation for the moral uplift of the German people.

Congress Told Army Cut Will Weaken Power

MacArthur Says Too Much Demobilization Will Affect Military Control

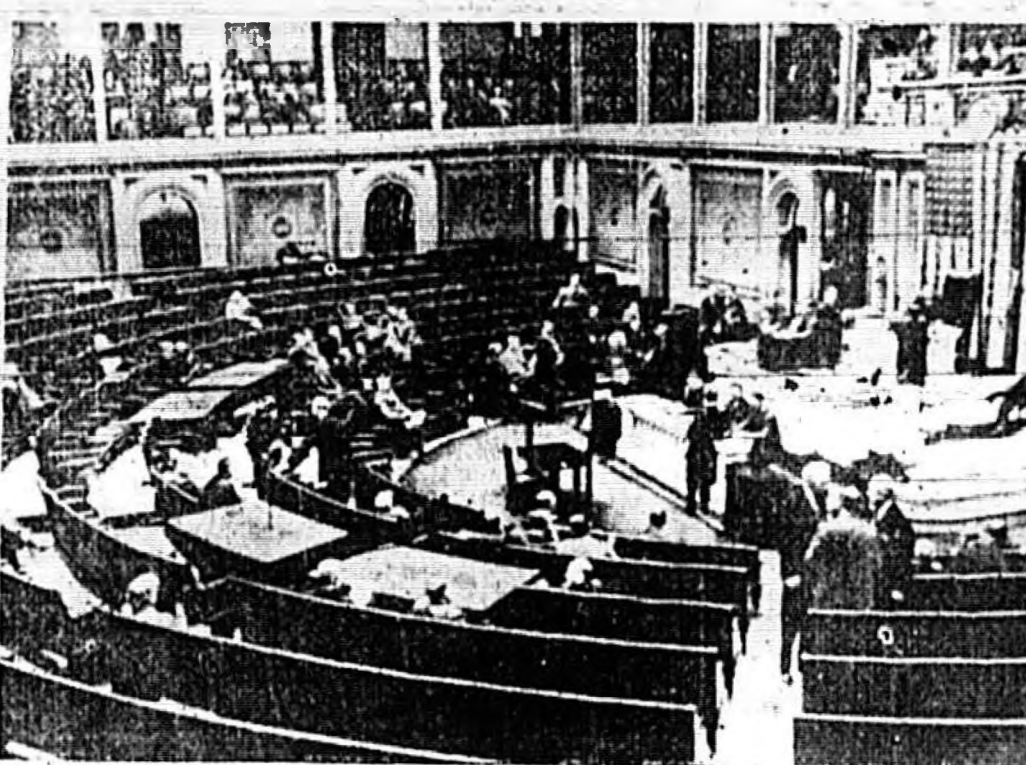
WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP)—General Douglas MacArthur today warned Congress that any attempt to cut Pacific forces below the mark contemplated by July 1 would—in his words—mean to a dangerous degree the military control over Japan and Korea. He expressed this viewpoint in a cable which was placed before a Senate Committee by General Dwight Eisenhower. The July 1 mark under consideration is 400,000 men. At a meeting earlier this week, Eisenhower had said the army demobilization policy in the Pacific Theater would be cut to 475,000 by July 1. Today's reference to 400,000 men apparently includes an additional 200,000 who would be on duty in Alaska and the China area on July 1.

The cable was given to the Senate committee after General Eisenhower had appeared to explain further the Army's demobilization policy. He gave his testimony before the special Senate Military subcommittee.

In response to a question about the 475,000 Eisenhower explained that this represented an adjustment in Air Force numbers.

Bevin Says British Planning To Place Mandates Under UNO Trusteeship

LONDON, Jan. 17. (AP)—Czechoslovak Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk has proposed to the UNO General Assembly that the United Nations control the entire world armament industry including atomic bomb factories.

Delegates applauded Masaryk several times, especially when he said he hoped that "the production of armaments produced in Czechoslovakia will ever be used for wholesale destruction and annihilation."

Masaryk also spoke of anti-Semitism. "After what has happened to the Jews," he said, "the solution of their problem is undeniably the duty of all decent people."

Earlier, British Foreign Minister Ernest Bevin spoke to the delegates on the British matter of mandates. He said Britain already is negotiating to place Tanganyika, Tangania and the Cameroons under UNO Trusteeship.

Bevin also said that the British would be glad to discuss the possibility of placing mandates under UNO Trusteeship.

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Richard Brown Is Discharged From U. S. Army

Served In Pacific Area With 11th Airborne Division

First Sgt. Richard B. Brown, son of Mrs. Jesse E. Moseley and grandson of Mrs. J. G. Ball of Sanford, recently received his discharge from the Army at Camp Wendling after nearly three years of service. He is to be married in the near future to Miss Louise Perkins.

Sgt. Brown received three battle stars for action at New Guinea during the invasion campaign, and the bronze arrowhead for invasions of Nausubu and Batangas as a member of the 127th Airborne Engineer Battalion at Leyte. The Division had 15 months of combat from the jungles of New Guinea through Leyte and Luzon, and after being flown to Japan on Sept. 1.

His battalion sailed May 5, 1944 from Los Angeles, and was in New Guinea for six months, where it underwent training for combat. On Nov. 18, hard action came in the invasion of Leyte. There was heavy fighting in mountainous jungles and difficulty of removing wounded men and quite a few losses resulted in hand to hand fighting. Sudden descent of 200 Jap paratroopers on an air strip resulted in a desperate battle. The invaders were wiped out, said Sgt. Brown.

On Jan. 31, 1945, the division landed at Luzon and at Taytay had its first major engagement, followed by fighting at Nichols Field, Ft. McKinley and Northern Batangas. After mopping up operations at Batangas, the group remained at Lipa for reorganization during the summer months and on Aug. 13 were flown from Clark Field to Okinawa. All types of planes were used for the flight and Sgt. Brown said he made the trip in a B-24. From Okinawa they were taken to Japan on Aug. 21.

While in Luzon he was visited by Capt. Volte Williams of the Army Air Corps. Sgt. Brown's ribbons include Philippine Liberation, Japanese Occupation, American Defense, Victory and Good Conduct ribbons.

The enlisted reservist, he was called to active duty at the University of Florida on Feb. 10, 1943, and trained as a paratrooper at Camp McCall, N. C., Ft. Benning, Ga. and Camp Polk, La.

Kimmel Reveals Fleet Not Meant To Defend Pearl

Tells Inquiry He Intended To Use It For Jap Offensive

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP)—Rear Admiral Husband Kimmel testified today that he never assumed that the Pacific Fleet was based at Pearl Harbor to protect Hawaii. He said that he had assumed the Fleet was there to conduct offensive operations in the event of war with Japan.

Kimmel made the statement before a Senate House inquiry while describing the so-called war warning he received from the Navy Department ten days before the Pearl Harbor attack. Kimmel—who was commander of the Fleet in 1941—said today that the warning added little, if anything, to previous messages.

The Admiral maintained that the message received ten days before the attack of war was not a warning of a surprise attack by the Japanese on Pearl Harbor. Kimmel said—while discussing the message—that he had never seen before in a Naval message, he had not asked an explanation because he did not consider the phrase, war warning, an extraordinary term. He said that for this reason, he was not influenced to order the Fleet to drop all training and go on all-out security basis.

Churchill Is In Excellent Health Following Journey

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17. (AP)—Winston Churchill, who reached Miami yesterday, is in excellent health after his 4,200-mile journey.

A Florida physician gave Mr. Churchill a routine checkup this morning and announced that the 71-year-old English war leader suffered no ill effects from his trip across the Atlantic to New York and thence by train to New Orleans, and from the tropical southern Florida, Mr. Churchill also is described in good health.

The couple were invited to attend the opening of Hialeah race track's 40-day season today, but they have announced that they plan no immediate appearances.

Last night, before dinner, Mr. and Mrs. Churchill and their host Col. Frank Clarke, a Canadian pulp paper magnate, took a leisurely drive around the famed fringed canals and along the ocean front in Miami Beach, accompanied by a Scotland Yard man. The famed Briton was in high spirits and occasionally waded his familiar "V for Victory" sign to cheering throngs.

Comedy, "The Patsy" Opens At The Pico

The unique little Pico Theater was jammed with 150 patrons last evening who heartily applauded "The Patsy" by Barry Corner and demanded that Reginald and Rita Goode, Carol Stone, Jane Gilmour and Simon Dingfelder return for five curtain calls after their opening production.
It was an excellent evening's entertainment and if the enthusiasm with which this production was received is any indication, "The Patsy" will run successfully for four weeks. This is the third production of the Provincetown Players in Sanford but the first using local talent. Carol Stone, Jane Gilmour and Simon Dingfelder were trained in their parts for only two weeks revealing the talent of Reginald Goode as a fine director as well as an actor.

"The Patsy" concerns the Harrington family of average income and their trials and tribulations. Mrs. Harrington, portrayed convincingly by Carol Stone, is a neurotic and socially ambitious woman while her favorite daughter Grace, Jane Gilmour, is beautiful, socially ambitious and with an unforgivable disposition. She is hateful to her less attractive sister Patricia, played by Rita Goode.

Patricia is a victim of mistreatment by her mother and sister and turns to her henpecked father, Reginald Goode, for confidence and understanding. Together they scheme and finally demand a respectable position in the family household. How they do it is a screen. The effort ends happily with "The Patsy" capturing the heart of Tony Anderson, Simon Dingfelder, a former beau of Grace's, and Grace winning the hand of one wealthy, socially prominent, Billy Caldwell, a character that never appears.

The play suits the ability of Rita Goode who plays the pixie, Patsy part to perfection. Her "repertoire," as she calls it, goes something like this: "Well, life is like that. One-third of our lives we spend in bed and the other two-thirds in bad." "There's no use crying over spilled milk; there's enough water in it already." "I always thought husbands were like measles; you catch them or you don't catch them."

Reginald Goode's natural acting carried the show, but the amateur Carol Stone, Jane Gilmour and Simon Dingfelder, did proud by themselves and our town with their abilities.
The criticism to be made is that most amateurs do not realize the value of suppressed emotion and some scenes were overacted.

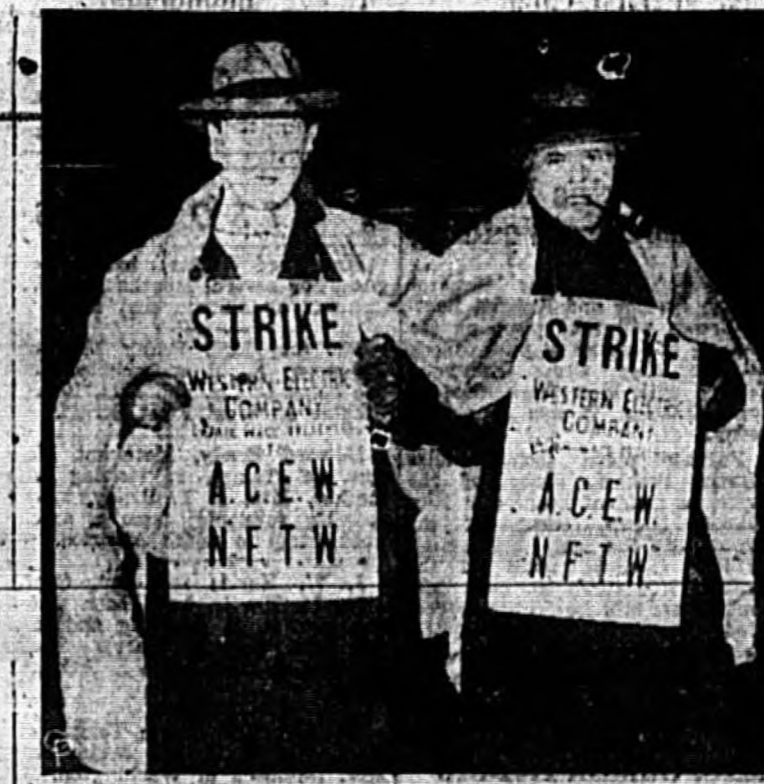

20,000 Mile Trip Begun By Experts Of Pan-American

MIAMI, Jan. 17, (Special)—Two dozen technical experts of Pan American World Airways have left New York aboard a 24-ton Clipper on a 20,000 mile survey trip which will take them through 13 countries of Europe and Asia to Calcutta, India and return.

On the six-week survey flight, airports and facilities will be inspected and preparations made for the beginning of commercial passenger service...

Arrangements for passengers to transfer to the national lines of the countries to which Pan American will provide service are being worked out...

On its trip halfway around the world and back, the four-engined Clipper will stop in France, Belgium, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Austria, Yugoslavia, Italy, Greece, Turkey, Syria, Iraq, Iran, and Karachi, New Delhi and Calcutta in India.

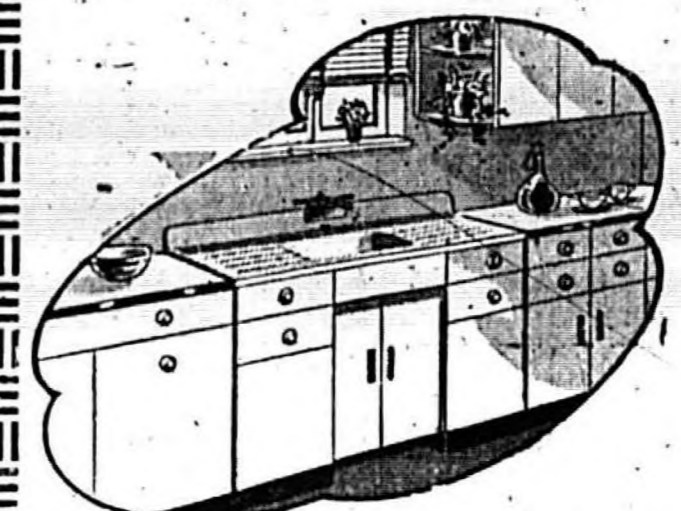

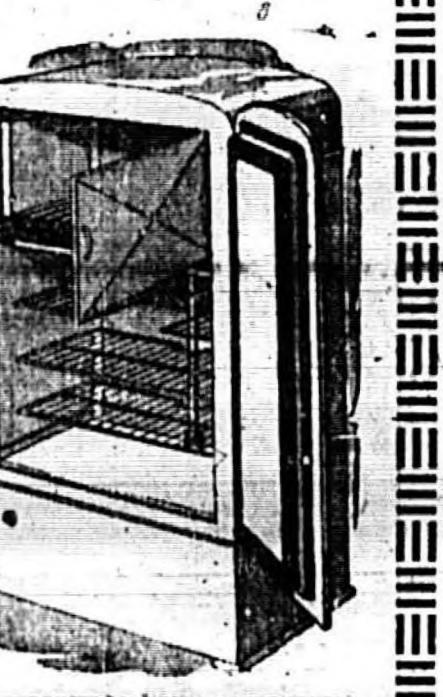

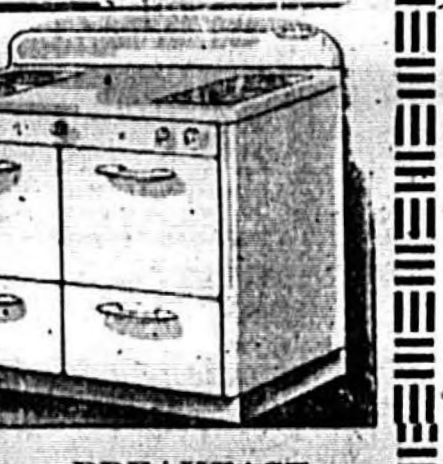
