

SCORES DIE IN STORMS WHICH SWEEP EUROPE

Shipping Badly Damaged As Gales Whip Coastal Regions Of Africa And Europe

LONDON, Dec. 14.—(A.P.)—Sixty or more lives were lost in gales which swept three seas of Europe over the week-end.

Shipping was damaged, badly particularly off the coast of North Africa in the Mediterranean.

The Italian patrol tug Teseo went down off the coast of Sardinia yesterday with an estimated loss of 30 lives. More than 100 other persons on the Teseo were rescued with difficulty by the cruiser Trieste, which was pulled from Italy.

In a direct appeal to Chairman John J. Raskob of the Democratic National Committee, Senator Sheppard of Texas asserted "no step could be more perilous" to party success in the 1932 elections than Raskob's own endeavor "to involve the Democratic party in the prohibition controversy."

G. McIntyre, 72, on Thanksgiving Eve, returned a verdict of guilty, but recommended mercy. The recommendation coincides with the automatic sentence of life imprisonment.

U. S. Will Permit Delay In Debt Payments Pending Action By Congressmen

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—(A.P.)—The administration has decided to permit postponement of foreign debt payments totaling \$2,000,000 a day pending action by Congress on the moratorium.

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Understandably, Mr. Byrnes of the Treasury, in stating the administration's intention yesterday, also assured that this has been read to Senate leaders Saturday, and his opinion was voiced by any one present.

Senator Borah of Idaho, who was one of those present, pointed out while he had some objection, he had informed Mr. Byrnes that he would not be bound by the administration's action. He added that so far as he is concerned the foreign nations will be in "technical default" if they do not pay.

Despite the confusion over the Tuesday's payments, congressional leaders, including Borah, predicted ratification of the moratorium. They said they think the question of whether the debts were paid Tuesday would not affect the ratification of the moratorium which will be begun this week in the Democratic House.

Meanwhile, the administration apparently is heeding the advice of the large congressional leaders to keep the controversial proposal of President Hoover for further delay in making the debt payments.

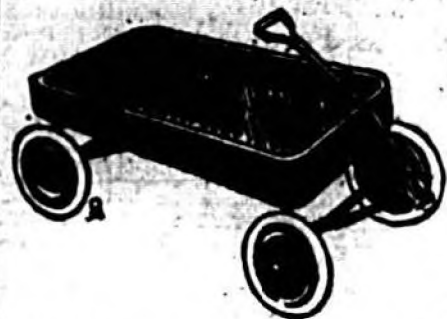

Christmas Business

Some who deplore the gradually increasing commercial aspects of Christmas and of the spirit of giving which predominates it, will gain little popularity this year by expressing such sentiments. Christmas should, and does, mean much more than an opportunity for merchants to dispose of their goods, but in any period of hard times when ledger sheets for all months in the year, perhaps, except December, are written in the red, or at least in shell pink, the one good month finds a hearty welcome.

"Experts in retail trade," the Miami Daily News declares, "estimate that \$2,600,000,000 will be spent in the United States during the four weeks preceding Christmas in stores affected by Christmas shopping. Of this total \$1,300,000,000 would be the normal increase due to the purchase of gifts. Employment will be given to approximately 600,000 additional persons by these stores, which will pay about \$45,000,000 in extra compensation during the Christmas season.

"Such an increase does not tell the whole story of the strictly economic benefits of the spirit of Christmas giving. It will not only help overcome losses from earlier operations in industry and retail trade, while aiding in unemployment relief, but it will continue to have its effect in stimulating business after Christmas, as the stores must order new stocks after the holiday for immediate or future needs. "Most important of all, in 'Christmas economics,' is that in maintaining the spirit of Christmas giving this year we may break down the unreasonable practice of hoarding that develops in times of business recessions and returns recovery. Thus there is a very important business phase to Christmas giving that should not be deplored, but should be recognized gladly for just what it is.

"This year, of all years, is the time to maintain and to extend our giving; for it is a definite factor badly needed in speeding the return of general prosperity, with widespread industrial activity and ample employment opportunities, as well as representing the perpetuation of the occasion when, as on no other day, the heart of the world swells with human love."

A World To Gain

A "practical" person, in common parlance, is a person who keeps his feet on the ground, who regards the means as well as the end, who does not indulge overmuch in idle dreams of success or vague plans to attain the unattainable. In a more limited sense, a practical person has come to mean one who is concerned chiefly with the physical aspects of existence whose common denominator is money.

The odd thing about this fetish is that for many people, to treat money and its accumulation as the be-all and end-all of existence is highly impractical, for it means continued discomfort and unhappiness—and anyone who deliberately lets himself in for unpleasantness isn't very practical.

The greatest—if sometimes unconscious—desire of human creatures is for happiness, in some form or another. The struggle to attain the state is and has always been the major preoccupation of mankind. Insofar as a man learns wherein happiness will lie for him, and strives to attain the condition resolutely and intelligently, to that extent is he practical in the broadest application of the term.

To attempt to lay down a single rule whereby all men can achieve happiness or contentment even, is the height of stupidity. That is why mass judgments are never valid for all. The modern conviction (or is it strictly modern?) that gold is a panacea for all human ills, does not work out in practice, in every instance.

Among the unappetizing of mortals are many who do not lack for wealth. Congenial work, fortunate human relations with one's fellows, the healthy functioning of the body and mind are at least as essential to happiness as the size of one's bank account.

To confuse "practical" with materialistic is a common error. To define "success" narrowly as the mere accumulation of material wealth, is to demean the word. The fullest life is theirs who know what they want most and strive single-mindedly to obtain it undeterred by fear or the opinion of their world.

GIVE AT CHRISTMAS

Because of rather than in spite of prevailing business conditions it would be well for the community, for the people of St. Petersburg to give Christmas presents this year. The gifts need not be expensive, nor need they be purely ornamental. Useful things now have a very important place in civic life. For several years there has been a trend toward useful gifts at Christmas, and this year more than ever before it is likely that the people will give presents that have real use.
