Clinton Group Sees Assistant To Ike; Bomb Clue Hunted

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower's Presidential Assistant Roger Sullivan was to confer with four American county, Tenn., officials today to discuss the bombing of Clinton High School.

Frank Wilson of Oak Ridge, Tenn., acting attorney for the group, said there was a possibility the officials would get an opportunity to talk to President Eisenhower.

"We have a prepared statement to deliver," Wilson said, "but I don't believe it would be proper to say what is in it until the President gets it."

Wilson said the group will not ask for an end to interference which started in 1956 under a federal court order. "A stay of the court order has not entered the discussion," he added.

Other members of the delegation are County Judge J. D. Varnell, and Board of Education members O. C. Hayes and R. G. Crosson.

The pre-dawn blast Sunday ripped up the inside of the 50-year-old building and did an estimated \$300,000 damage.

Crosson was chairman of the education board in November 1956 when the group passed a resolution calling on the U. S. attorney general for federal help in enforcing racial integration at the school. The board said the alternative would be to close.

Janice Is Blamed For Deaths Of 19; Speeding Seaward

MIAMI (UPI)—Janice, most dead, hurricane of the season but perhaps the last, packed its forward speed in the Atlantic today and moved further from the U. S. mainland.

At least 19 persons were dead in the Bahamas as a result of her passage.

Top winds near the storm center remained of hurricane strength, but the weaker breeze lowered gale warnings from Willington, N. C., to New Beach, Fla. The stretch of North Carolina coast from Wilmington north to Cape Hatteras was under the alert for gale winds.

Five states said the storm probably would continue on the same general direction for the next 24 hours but with some decrease in forward speed.

Eighteen Haitians drowned Tuesday when their 45-foot boat capsized and sank in high waves off Tortuga. Long Island Sound, 200 miles southeast of Nassau in the Bahamas.

F. Joseph Swan, one of the passengers, was a 20-year-old victim here and was the only survivor, according to Capt. Darwood Knowles of the Nassau air-sea rescue unit.

The previous day a sailboat shipped to Nassau has been boy when his limbs were severed. He was later identified as William Johnson.

Chief forecaster Gordon Dunn of the Miami weather bureau said Janice "could well be the last storm" of what has been a busy hurricane season.

"There may be one more, but I doubt it," Dunn said.

'Rebuffed' Negro Moving To Africa

GULFPORT, Miss. (UPI)—Negro minister Clarence King, rebuffed in two integration attempts in Mississippi, was prepared today to sell his "worldly goods" and move to Africa.

King put an ad in the Biloxi Gulfport Daily Herald Tuesday declaring: "I am going back to Africa in search of the freedom our African American people lost 350 years ago."

The former professor at Moreau A&M college said the sale of his home and "most of my worldly goods must be sold."

King said his possessions included a television set and automatic washer and that they had to be sold at any price.

"Promptly having all or some of these items will help me to secure my passage home," he said, "and I will try to assist in the white University of Mississippi during the summer and attempt to register his oldest daughter in a white school here this fall."

While King was at Moreau he was a student critic of the NAACP, and students protested by boycotting the college.

His most recent action was a prayer fast until some Mississippi Negro family attempts to enroll a child in a white school. It apparently failed.

King concluded his newspaper ad: "Please help."

Schools To Close In Token Of Aid

GENEVA, Ala. (UPI)—Fla. Geneva County schools will be closed Monday as a token of support for Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus and his segregation stand against the federal government.

James A. Mulvey, chairman of the county board of education, said the resolution was adopted unanimously Monday night. It declared the school board "unqualifiedly opposed to federal enforced integration in our public school system."

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Officials Say U.S. To Orbit Man

Will Use Capsule; Goal Three Years

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A plan to put a man in space in an orbiting capsule was described today by officials here.

Officials said the goal will be to keep the manned capsule circling the earth for 24 hours, and possibly 48 to 72 hours, before returning the vehicle safely to earth.

The project, for which \$5 million in dollars is now available, is expected to be completed within three years.

Wallops Flight Facility director of the Advanced Research projects Agency, mentioned the plan briefly in a speech at Stamford, Conn., Tuesday night.

Departing from his prepared text, Johnson said "It is our plan to have a man in space in 24 to 36 months."

Speculation at first was that Johnson might be referring to the X-15 rocket plane, which will exceed 100 miles but will not go into orbit.

Officials said today, however, that Johnson was referring to an entirely new project. They said the manned space vehicle will be a "capsule" with a winged plane like the X-15.

The experiment will be considered successful if the capsule orbits the earth once but that the goal will be 72 hours in space.

When the capsule is available, the experiment will probably be repeated several times to gain as much information as possible for space flight.

The mission of returning the man to earth have not been definitely determined, but they will probably involve "retro-rockets" to slow the capsule from its 18,000 miles per hour orbiting speed, and a drop parachute large enough to assure a safe descent to earth.

It was assumed that one of America's intercontinental ballistic missiles, either the Atlas or the Titan, would be used as a "booster" for putting the man in space.

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Somebody Goofer Tax Official Says On Faubus Charge

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—The district director of the Internal Revenue Service took a "blatant" jab today for telling Gov. Orval Faubus that the total included cost and operating expenses on the executive mansion for two years, campaign expenses and a gift automobile that Faubus and his wife received in 1954.

"Somebody goofed," IRS District Director Curtis R. Mathis said, explaining that anything a state executive is not taxable.

Faubus took the opportunity to accuse the government of using the IRS to punish him for his stand against integration and demanded that President Eisenhower pay for use of the White House, if he had to pay for use of the executive mansion.

Faubus said he got a letter which said he had 10 days to protest the IRS charges.

Persons Takes Oath As Ike's Assistant

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Maj. Gen. Wilton B. (Jerry) Persons took office today as Sherman Adams' successor in the post of chief assistant to President Eisenhower.

Persons was sworn in by Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers as the President smiled approval. Adams watched the ceremony from the rear of the room, then went silently back to his desk.

As soon as Rogers finished administering the oath, Eisenhower reached for Persons' hand.

"Well, Jerry," said the President, "a new diploma — this is one of the many capacities in which we have been together."

The gray-haired, affable Persons was immediately surrounded by an admiring group of family and friends, including members of the Cabinet.

Adams returned to his own office without joining in the handshaking.

Adams, who served for nearly six years as the assistant to Eisenhower, resigned under heavy political fire on Sept. 22 and has since been arranging what he described as the "orderly transition" of his duties to a reorganized staff.

Press Secretary James C. Hag-

erty said the White House expects to announce shortly completion of its staff reorganization with appointment of a deputy to Persons.

Adams slipped unobtrusively into the back of the room just as Rogers began to read the oath of office, and remained standing in a group of White House stenographers until the formal ceremony ended.

His quick departure reflected Adams' desire to stay out of the limelight as much as possible. He has long been a close friend of Persons.

He Lost Clothes, Tip Of His Nose; Pleads Innocent

CRESTVIEW (UPI) — James Turner, 33, of Miami, who lost his clothes and the tip of his nose in an encounter with a girl at Death Bridge, pleaded innocent Monday to charges of assault with intent to kill and indecent exposure.

Turner entered the plea before Okaloosa County Judge Wilbur Osburn. Bond on the assault charge was reduced from \$10,000 to \$1,200 and bond on the indecent charge was set at \$150.

Deputy Heuben Hendrix said Turner was found dressed only in a discarded paper picnic plate, trying to hitchhike along U.S. Highway 90, about 4 a.m. Sept. 4.

The girl, who was not identified, later turned up and said Turner had driven her to a beach in her car and had torn off some of her clothes. She said she bit him on the tip of his nose and ran off, but doubled back and drove away in the car, with his clothes inside.

Man Robbed, Left in Field; 3 Held

DEFUNIAK SPRINGS (UPI) — Three young men were being held in jail here today for Baldwin County, Ala., officers, after they admitted robbing, stripping and binding a Brewton, Ala., man and leaving him in a field Sunday night.

Joe Parner, 23; Paul Helton, 25, and Billy Hensley, 25, were arrested Sunday night about five miles west of here on U.S. Highway 90, by a state trooper.

Trooper Billy McDaniel said he stopped the car after it almost collided with his patrol car going the opposite direction on the road.

Parner, the driver, was charged with driving on the wrong side of the highway. Hensley and Helton were charged with drunkenness.

Officers said they signed written statements admitting they robbed James Turner, a Brewton paper mill worker, of \$3 in cash and his car, after dumping him bound, gagged and naked, in a field near Summerdale, Ala.

Turner was found by residents of the area, who were attracted by barking dogs. He said he met the men in a Mobile, Ala., tavern and they had offered to drive him back to Brewton, about 92 miles from Mobile.

Objects Continue To Puzzle Experts

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Air Force says it has been unable to explain 21 reports of unidentified flying objects (UFO's) during the 12 months ended July 31.

It listed 84 per cent of all such reported sightings as balloons, planes, birds, hoaxes, or natural phenomena. In its report Monday, the Air Force said it had checked 1,270 UFO reports since June 1957.

Of these, it reported that only 21 cases, or fewer than 2 per cent, are still regarded as "unknown." An object cited is considered unknown when at least one valid conclusion can not be drawn from the facts available and when the description of it cannot be related to natural phenomena in the skies.

But the report said there "are no Air Force documents which prove the existence of flying saucers or show that the earth is being observed, visited, or threatened by machines from other planets."

Embassy Probing Cuban Plane Crash

HAVANA (UPI) — The American embassy was investigating today the forcing down of an American Cessna plane by Cuban authorities Saturday, in which one of the two occupants of the plane was killed.

A Cuban army communique said the plane, registered in the name of the Fort Myers Airways Corp., Page Field, Fla., was forced to land near a place called Limpias de Guayaba, Pinar del Rio Province, because it was "violating Cuban laws."

The communique said there was an accident in the landing and that one of the occupants of the plane was killed. The other was "being treated through the jungle. Neither of them had been identified."

Government forces, the communique said, seized the plane and its cargo, which included Thompson machine guns, Terri rifles, a quantity of small arms, Sam Browne belts, two canvas pouches and other articles.

The plane was believed to have been stolen from near Alachua, Fla., last Friday.

Tobacco Unique; Store Owner Fined

Testimony in court Monday showed pipe tobacco sold in McMahon's cigar store contained stained paper, metal foil, buried tobacco and dirt.

McMahon was fined \$70 for possessing tobacco containing substances not authorized by the Home Office. He had made the tobacco by strapping down cigarettes that had been in his shop a long time.

The Notomar's skipper scans the seas ahead and orders the engine room to start her up. Bells clang, and the Notomar moves prancing backward and dents the Farquhar.

No one is hurt, and the Notomar's engineers admit they don't know what happened. Not only that, they just can't make the ship go any way but backward. It's 3,700 miles to Spain, so they have the Notomar pulled back into port.

There, shipyard workers quickly diagnose the trouble. The Notomar's propellers were put in backward, and Supt. E. L. Pickler notes it as a nautical first.

"It's never happened before in maritime annals," he says.

Officers To Share \$700,000 Jackpot For Soccer Scores

MARGATE, England (UPI)—Fifteen policemen and three civilian employees at a police station in this coastal resort were in line today to share a record \$700,000 jackpot for correctly forecasting the results of eight soccer matches.

The prize, which they will share as members of a "syndicate" who entered draws against eight games in last Saturday's British football games will be the biggest in "football pools" history. The last highest, \$383,421 was won by coal miner Tom Riley last April.

Officials of Littlewoods, British "biggest pools firm," said the Margate syndicate won the entire "first dividend" because its entry was the only one of several million entered that qualified for 24 points at three points per draw.

Under the legalized pools betting system, a "treble chance" coupon allows three points for a draw, two for an away win based on the second-named team winning and 1 for a home victory.

Unstable James Upton, father of seven children, organized the syndicate and had five 14-cent shares in it. The \$33.60 a week coupon stands to get about \$140,000 as his share.

Members of the syndicate said they had shared the cost of a \$2.50 coupon every week for the last seven years. Their coupon contained a complicated permutation, but the actual line that won cost two cents.

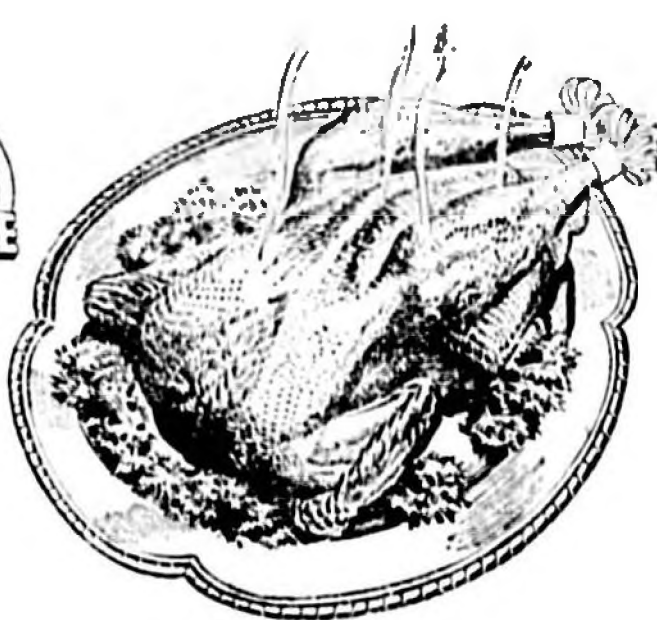

Pre-Cooler Will Aid Vegetable Production

Sanford will get a vacuum pre-cooling plant for vegetables. Such a plant, in the opinion of officials who are familiar with this operation, will mean a higher price for vegetables and more diversification on local farms.

Establishment of this plant would enrich Sanford, Seminole County and the surrounding area, vegetable producers were told by officials of the Jet Vac Co., Inc., which plans to erect the pre-cooler here. Using this process prolongs the life of vegetables on the shelf, assuring a higher price and a ready market.

John Krider, secretary of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce, said this area produces some of the finest lettuce grown anywhere in the South. Lettuce production, however, gradually has declined due to the inability of local growers to successfully market it. As a result, the emphasis has been shifted to the growing of cabbage.

With a pre-cooling plant here, officials predicted that the trend would be to greater production of lettuce, which generally brings a better price than cabbage. These same officials predicted that a greater diversification as to variety would result.

Sanford now is known as the "Celery City." Production of celery is expected to continue at a high level. Cabbage, too, will continue to be an important vegetable. The emphasis is expected to be on lettuce, however.

Jet Vac officials told local growers that the company wanted no guarantee that local farmers would use the plant. Building of the plant is a financial gamble the company is willing to take. These officials are confident that the gamble would be successful financially.

Principal equipment for the vacuum process already is half-completed in New Jersey. It will be assembled in Sanford. When structural steel for the building starts going up, this will be another visible sign that Sanford's on the go. To Jet Vac, Sanford extends a hearty welcome.

Ministers' Privilege

The Seminole County Ministerial Association has requested the local legislative delegation to sponsor a bill in the Legislature to prevent ministers from being forced to give testimony about privileged communications.

Ministers want that protection. The Herald thinks they deserve it. Due to his position, a minister on many occasions is the person sought out by a man or woman in trouble. A minister is a man to whom these troubled people believe they can talk.

During these talks, in confidence, the troubled person often unburdens himself, thereby giving out self-incriminating facts. This information would not be imparted, at least not voluntarily, to anyone else.

Forcing a minister to reveal what was said to him in confidence destroys, to some extent, the effectiveness of his office. Too, it violates what ministers consider their code of ethics.

We believe that a confession, or other privileged conversation, between a minister and another person to be as important as the matters between an attorney and his client.

We doubt that any minister in Seminole County would withhold information that courts think essential. There have been many cases in which ministers convinced criminals to give themselves over to the law. Failing to convince the criminal, other ministers have notified the proper authorities.

If ministers accept information in confidence, they should be allowed to keep it in confidence. We do not believe ministers would take advantage of such protection so as to hamper the operation of the courts and law enforcement agencies.

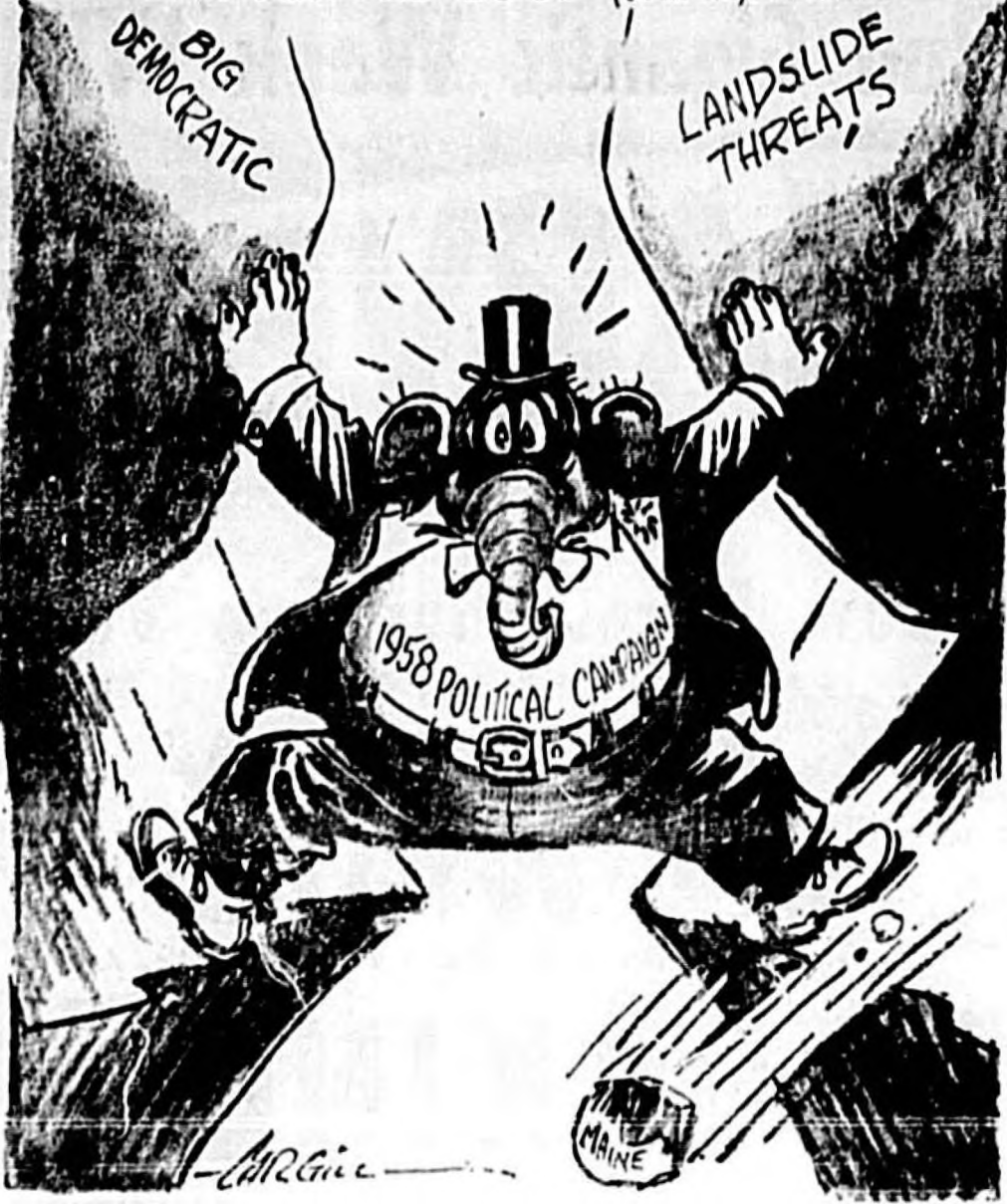

Confusing Jargon, Great Deal Of It

WASHINGTON (UPI)—CSAGI is dead (or at least dying); long live SCG, COSPAR, SCOR, SCAR, and IWDS (for a year or so, anyway, and, of course, ICSU).

This is by way of saying that IGY is coming to an end Dec. 31 but that some phases of it will live on to June 30, others to 1960, and still others into 1963 whereas one or two will keep functioning indefinitely.

ICSU, which stood all the other, hopes to live forever. ICSU is the International Council of Scientific Unions which Monday concluded its eighth general assembly here. Back in 1952 ICSU created CSAGI, a set of initials standing for French words translatable as "Special Committee for Inter-Union Cooperation in Geophysics" (the aforementioned SCG).

SCG will manage IGC, otherwise known as the International Geophysical Year 1958. Its name seems to indicate IGC will die at the end of 1959, but don't bet on it.

Meanwhile, international satellite, rocket, and lunar probe, activities started in the IGY will be continued for one year by COSPAR, an ICSU "Committee on Space Research."

This committee was almost named "The Committee on Outer Space Research," but the delegates from France said you can't

say "outer space" in French. After a year COSPAR will recommend future world space pursuits. In the meantime, COSPAR will take over the work of CETEX, the "Committee on Contamination by Extra-Terrestrial Exploration" of the moon and planets.

CSAGI with ICSU's approval long since voted to keep SCAR activities going in Antarctica. ICSU also endorsed an ambitious post-IGY program by SCOR, the "Special Committee on Oceanic Research."

Another IGY program to get an extension of its life is IWDS, the "International World Day Service." IWDS alerts the nations in days on which something special is expected to happen, such as a flare on the sun, so they can all study it simultaneously.

How long all this activity will go on depends to a considerable extent on MONEY. This is a capitalizing agent without which science cannot operate.

Layne had pleaded Detroit to a pair of NFL titles and three divisional crowns before Rote came on the scene. Rote didn't have any title clubs at Green Bay.

During the 1957 season, Rote went to Lion President Edwin J. Anderson with the complaint he wasn't playing enough.

Anderson admitted there was friction between the two Texans but no one knew how much.

"Both thought they should start every game," Anderson said. It was Wilson's practice to alternate the starting assignments, depending on who looked best in practice the week before a game.

Choose Younger Rote "They got along fine, openly," Anderson said. "But there must have been some resentment. No one knows how wide the breach was because they never discussed it."

Wilson said he picked Rote to stay because he's two years younger.

Others nominated for the lineman award were tackle Dave Sington of Alabama and centers Max Fugler of Louisiana State and Maxie Baughan of Georgia Tech.

Nixon Gets GOP Campaign Rolling

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The new Republican "army" campaign gets rolling today with Vice President Richard M. Nixon, its apparent author, at the throttle. Nixon planned to leave here by

Paying Dividends The new GOP "get tough" approach showed signs of paying dividends, at least in the public statements of Republican leaders.

House Republican Leader Joseph W. Martin Jr. (Mass.) told United Press International today he now thinks Republicans have a "fighting chance" to capture control of the House next month.

Hitherto prevailing opinion among both Democrats and Republicans has been that Democrats will keep control of both houses or even increase their majorities.

Democrats had not officially decided whether to answer the GOP "socialism" charge. The Democratic National Committee thus far was advising Democratic candidates to stress unemployment and the high cost of living and not answer the socialism attack.

However, Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler lashed out at Nixon personally, asserting the vice president was "back in his old form as the leading advocate of gutter campaigning."

Trade Foreign Policy Charges Both parties likewise traded charges of foreign policy blunders.

Butler accused both President Eisenhower and Nixon of trying to "throttle" all criticism of administration Far East policy. He said this showed "how desperately the administration now considers its deteriorating situation as regards both the offshore islands and the Republican prospects in the election."

GOP Chairman W. M. Alexander issued a statement accusing the Democrats of taking a "position of appeasement" on the Formosa issue. He released a Republican pamphlet charging the Democrats with involvement in three wars, agreeing to "some of the biggest giveaway deals in history" at foreign conference tables and declaring:

"During Democratic administration, world Communism has made its greatest gains."

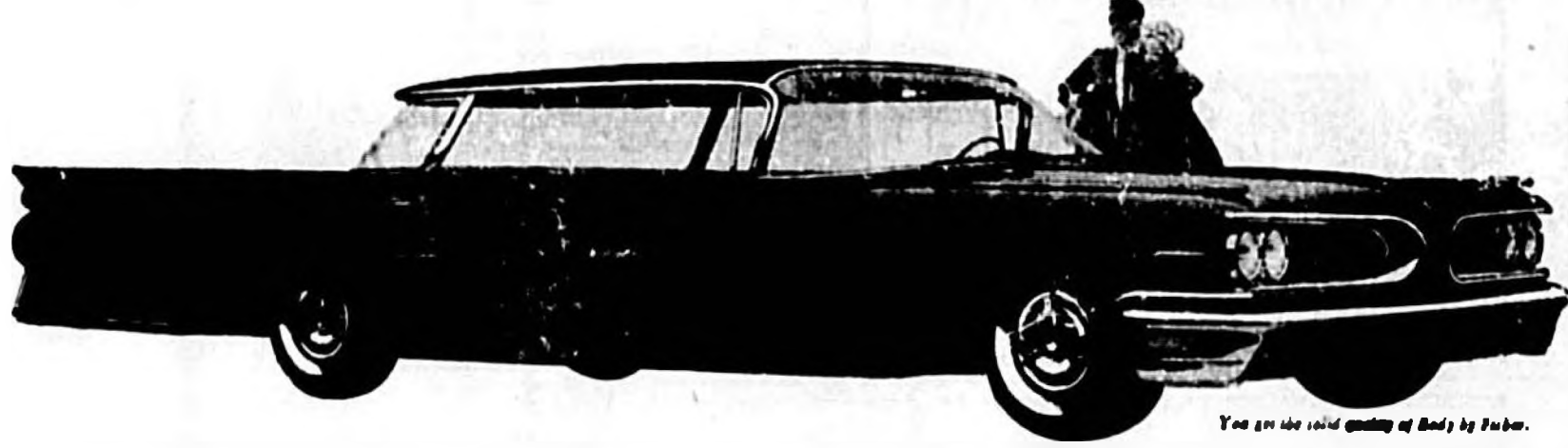

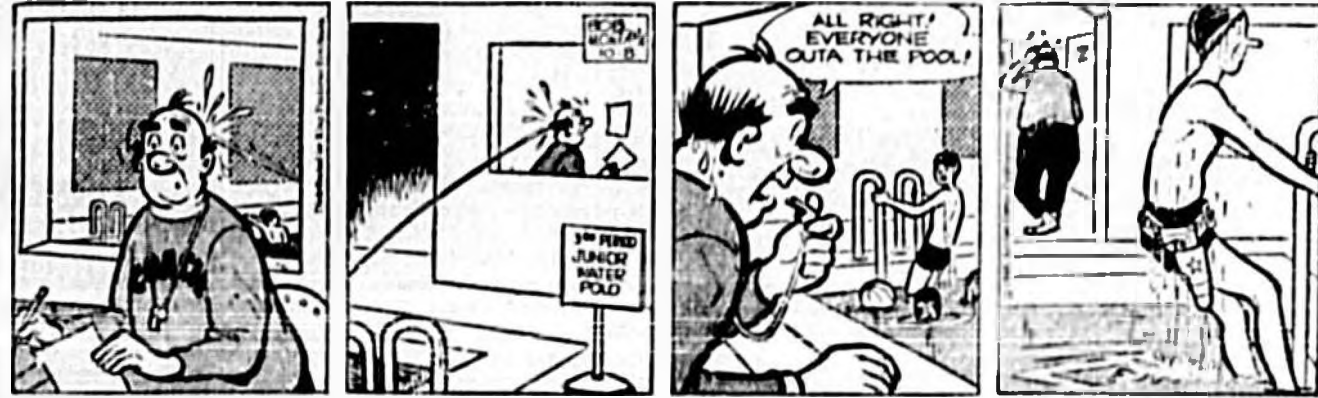

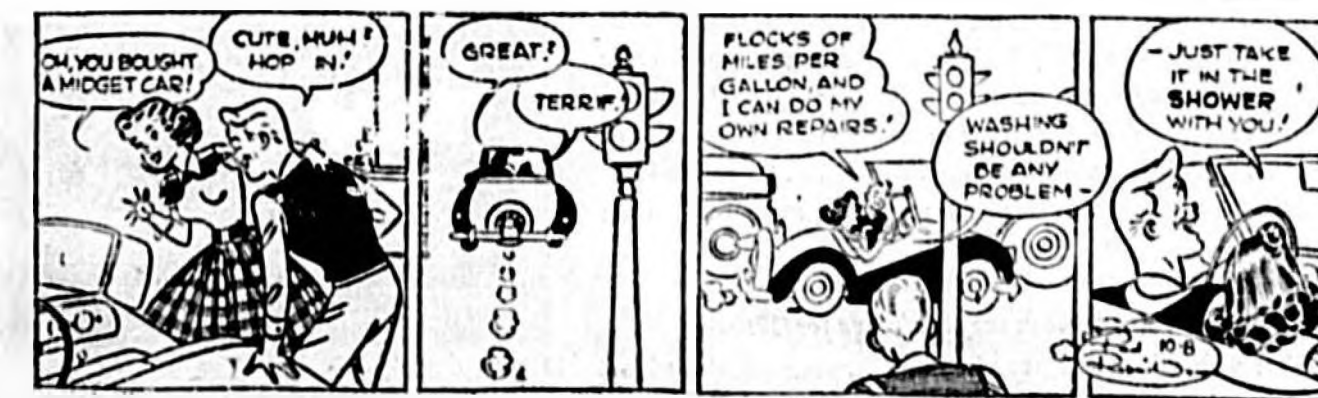

Judge Curious About Mexican Divorce

LONDON (UPI)—The dashing, handsome Marquis of Milford Haven—Prince Philip's cousin, the royal couple's best man and actress Eva Bartok's close friend—tried today to get a British court to accept his "quickie" Mexican divorce.

Milford Haven and wealthy New Yorker Homaine Simpson received a divorce from a Chihuahua, Mexico, court in early 1954, two years after they separated in New York and four years after

their Washington wedding. The 35-year-old marquis ran into a certain amount of judicial skepticism on the Chihuahua proceeding when a hearing on his petition opened Monday.

Judge Arthur Davies, hearing Milford Haven's petition, asked "do I understand correctly that this divorce was granted the day after petitioning?"

Lawyer Rowdon Temple, representing Milford Haven, replied quickly. "Yes, my lord."

Judge: "A bit quick, it was a final decree?"

Temple: "It was."

"Had either of the parties ever been to the state of Chihuahua?"

"The wife for the purpose of making the complaint."

"For 24 hours?"

"Yes, my lord."

The judge let his line of questioning go at that point, announcing that he was asking the government for divorce authority, the so-called queen's proctor, to sit in on the rest of the hearings and assist in fixing a decision.

Milford Haven, a man-about-town whose name has been especially associated with that of actress Eva Bartok in the past few years, gave the court a brief intimate post-mortem on his marriage's break-up.

Mrs. Simpson kicked him out of their Park Avenue apartment at the end, he said, and in another instance took away his British passport.

Mrs. Bartok, presently unmarried, gave birth to a daughter out of wedlock a little over a year ago.

Explorer Silent; Vanguard 'Talks'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced today that the Army's Explorer IV satellite, launched July 2, has gone silent.

This leaves U. S. Vanguard I, launched March 17, and Russia's Sputnik III, launched May 15, the only satellites still broadcasting.

Explorer I, though still up, lost its voice Feb. 28, about a month after its launching Jan. 31.

Explorer IV's tracking transmitter went silent Sept. 9. The other transmitter stopped sending scientific information Sept. 22 but continued to broadcast another signal until Monday.

Vanguard I is transmitting on power supplied by the sun and is expected to continue for an indefinite period, possibly as long as the more than 200 years it is expected to stay aloft.

Negro Cook Says She Won't Accept School Job Again

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (UPI)—Mrs. Hilda G. Hundley, fired as a cook with the Alexandria school system because she took part in a desegregation suit against the school board, said today she will not accept an offer to be reinstated.

In a letter to School Supt. T. C. Williams, Mrs. Hundley said she had taken work as a cook in a private home here at a higher salary than she received as a school cafeteria cook. She offered her resignation, effective Monday.

Two of Mrs. Hundley's eight children were among 14 Negro children named in a desegregation suit. She was fired a few days after the suit was filed but Williams later offered reinstatement after the case received national publicity.

By AL KUETTNER United Press International Two private school groups in Virginia faced a brand new problem today: How to pay teachers need for emergency schools. Efforts to provide private classes for displaced students in Warren County and Charlottesville received a setback Wednesday when Federal District Judge John Paul ruled that use of publicly-paid teachers would constitute an evasion of integration orders. Classes were to have begun at Four Royal Warren County and 125 private schools in the 11th and 12th grades and an Monday for grades eight through 10. But the nonprofit Warren County Educational Foundation postponed the opening until attorneys can study the judge's order. Leaders of the private school movement in Charlottesville said they would mean to devise some plan which would not violate the new ruling, which becomes effective next Wednesday. Private classes now are being provided for 1,600 students in Charlottesville. A regional supervisor of the Internal Revenue Service presided near the Little Rock to look into the filing of an accidental tax claim against Gov. Orval Faubus. Faubus issued a nationwide plea Wednesday on behalf of the Little Rock Private School Corp. saying that citizens contribute money to the group. It is urgent that the students center school at the earliest possible date," said the letter, mailed to thousands who have made inquiries about the private school plan. U. S. Atty. Gen. William P. Rogers urged in a speech in California that the South accept integration as the law of the land. "Continued resistance cannot fail to damage the fabric of our government and the standing of our nation in every corner of the world," he said. More than 8,200 watched as the Strategic Air Command's massive B52 nuclear bombers stole the show from the nation's fastest fighters in simulated combat strikes. A formation of six bombers, the world's largest, winged over the northwest Florida base on a 2,500-mile non-stop round trip from Westover Air Force Base, Mass., and made a simulated attack on the Eglin target range. They made mock nuclear attacks on Atlanta and Raleigh on the return route. CASTEL GANDOLFO, Italy (UPI) — Pope Pius XII died early today in his summer palace, finding at last in death the peace he had sought for the world during the 19 years and seven months of his reign. He was 82. The "pope of peace" an implacable foe of Communism, never regained consciousness from a second stroke he suffered Wednesday morning. He died at 3:32 a.m. Mourning Near Here The tolling of church bells throughout the world signalled the start of nine days of mourning by the world's 400 million Roman Catholics. Messages of condolence poured in from world leaders of all religious faiths. Only the Communists showed no sympathy. They had fought him bitterly, and for many months had not even mentioned his death. During the final hours of his illness, Russia jammed news bulletins on his condition. The London Daily Worker imposed him to-day in death. In Rome where the solemn ceremonies will be held bells tolled in pre-dawn darkness and the altars of the city's many churches were draped in purple, the sign of mourning. Italy declared 15 days of mourning, and closed schools and places of entertainment.

The Pontiff's death came less than three hours after Vatican Radio broadcast a Solemn Mass from a chapel adjoining his bedroom, a mass said by Monsignor Domenico Tardini, assistant secretary of state. The end followed swiftly. Prof. Antonio Gasbarri, one of the four doctors, signalled that death was near. All gathered at the bed — the family and the high papal officers. They recited prayers for the dying. There was a checkered, rasping sound from the patient. At 3:52 a.m. Prof. Gasbarri put a stethoscope to the Pontiff's chest, felt the pulse, turned around and said, "E morto." He is dead.

Space 'Startling Sight,' Airman In Balloon Says

ALAMOGORDO, N. M. (UPI) — Lt. Clifton M. McClure huddled in secret sessions with Air Force officials early today to describe his reactions to conditions on the edge of space during his flight in a giant balloon 21,000 feet 19 miles above the earth's surface. The 280-foot, helium-filled bag touched down early Wednesday night at the White Sands missile range, about 20 miles northwest of Alamogordo. McClure, 26, of Anderson, S. C. stepped from an instrument-jammed gondola under his own power and then was hoisted off by an Air Force helicopter to a top secret area for a routine physical examination and questioning. A terse report by the Air Force indicated McClure was forced to return to earth earlier than expected apparently because of a failure in refrigeration equipment on the gondola. The flight was scheduled to last for 24 hours. McClure went aloft at 6:45 p.m. McClure outlined that he could "see the edges between darkness and light" from his highest position of 99,300 feet above the rolling desert floor. He described it as a "very startling sight." "Some experts followed the flight of the balloon in a van on the ground, constantly firing questions at McClure as to what he saw. The data recorded will be coupled with McClure's verbal account to give scientists some answers to questions about what future space travelers will encounter.
