President Clinton has ordered federal emergency aid for 48 Florida counties - including Seminole, Orange and Ocoola - because of the extreme threat to populated areas posed by the recent outbreak of wildfires. The order authorizes the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to make federal funding available to the state and affected local governments to pay 75 percent of the cost for emergency measures needed to save lives, protect property and insure public health and safety in the counties threatened by fires starting April 15.

Wednesday was just the kind of rainy day the county needed. More than an inch of rain had fallen in the area, reducing the chances of wildfires for the time being. "Every little bit helps," said one weather service forecaster. There's a 40 percent chance for afternoon thundershowers today and perhaps some weekend rain. Without a drought - good news even though there was some street flooding and minor power outages in the county.

Pan Am looks to step up service in Sanford



Pan American Airlines plan to begin regular domestic service in June and are further discussing more service from major U.S. cities.

SANFORD - Pan American Airlines officials are discussing establishing service through the Orlando Sanford Airport to Atlanta, Chicago and other

cities in the eastern U.S. Pan Am established its line maintenance facility at the airport last month, and plans to begin regularly scheduled domestic service in June. "The maintenance facility has been operating for a

month, mainly working on charter service for now," White said. "They hope to start domestic service in June, although no schedule has been announced."

Pan Am may establish mini-hub service through Sanford to Portsmouth, N.H., San Juan, P.R., Newark, N.J., Atlanta, Ga., and Chicago, Ill., White said.

"We're continuing discussions," White said. "We're just trying to get everything squared away."

Pan Am is also negotiating with airport officials to lease ticket counter space and set up a reservations system, White said.

The airline will provide the Orlando Sanford Airport with its first regularly scheduled domestic service.

The maintenance facility is large enough for flight crews, a lounge, and three 727-200 aircraft.

In March, airport officials said Pan Am is planning to offer flights to Newark, continuing to Portsmouth, later this spring. If the flights are a suc-

cess, officials said the service may expand to daily flights.

The airport handled about 1.1 million passengers last year, White said. The majority of the passengers are British arriving on charter flights from England.

Pan Am is owned by Guilford Transportation Industries, a New England railroad operator and owner of paper mills and other industries. This is the third incarnation of Pan Am. Guilford paid \$24.5 million to creditors of the second Pan Am.

The original Pan Am filed for bankruptcy and liquidated in 1991.

The airline owns eight 727-200 aircraft. Pan Am is looking into purchasing additional aircraft, including several DC-10s. Pan Am currently operates weekly charter services, officials said.

Airport and city officials are seeking \$22 million from the state legislature to improve the joint-use domestic and international terminal, including

Still pumping after 20 gallons of blood

SANFORD - Rich Filippi of Lake Mary will reach a monumental step in his own blood donation history. As of Wednesday, April 28 he will have donated some 20 gallons of blood toward the account with the Disabled American Veterans Chapter 30.

Although he shyly said, "I don't consider myself anything special for this because I know some people have donated so much more. I have just donated this over some 40 years."

He shared that about every eight weeks he donates a pint to the Central Florida Blood Bank. His O+ blood type is the "universal donor" and he feels proud to be able to help.

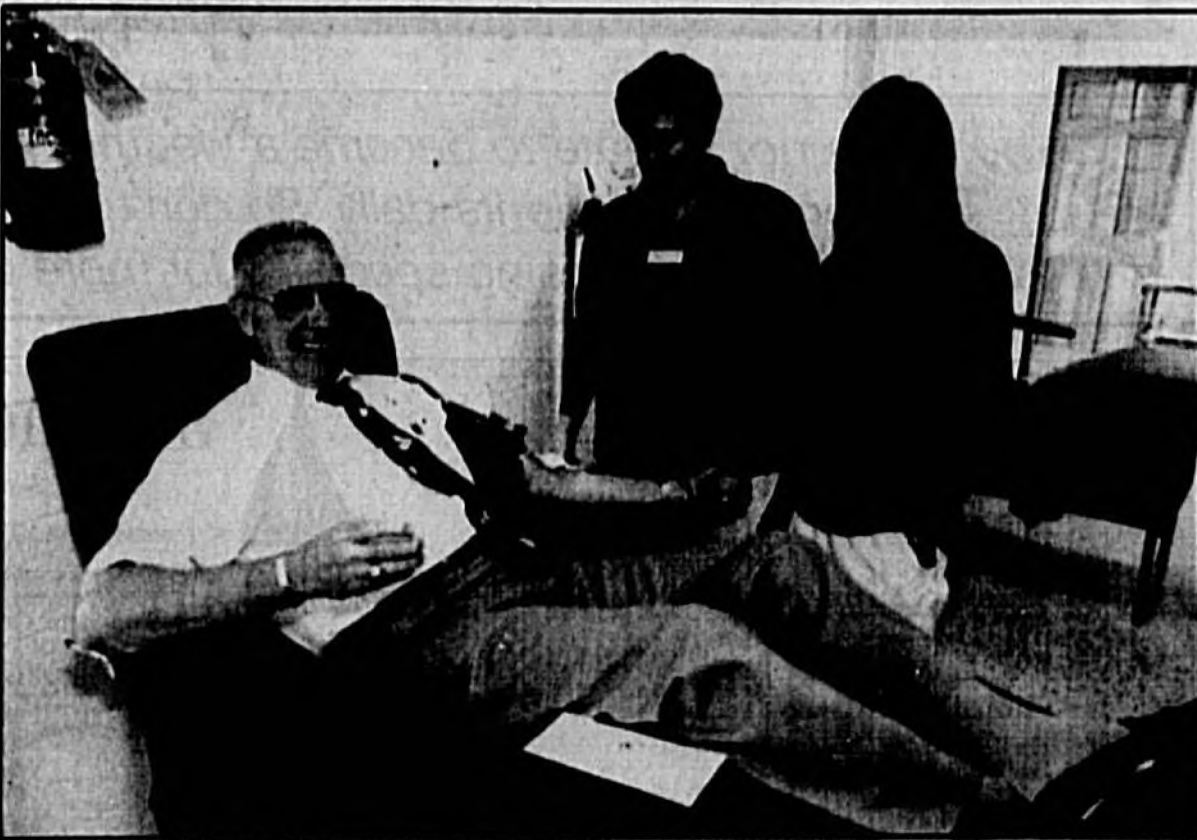
Filippi shared that his motives were not always pure. With a chuckle he said, "I

started donating blood in about 1955 or 1956. My chief petty officer in the service was really miserable to be around. I would do anything to get away from him. One day he mentioned that we could get a half a day off if we donated blood. Since I would do anything to get away from him I did it."

Yet, after many years and as time went on Filippi realized that his "gift of life" could actually help others. His motives changed and he began to donate out of concern for others.

"When you give blood you don't always know who will get it," he said. "With blood, every donation is for a good cause. Sometimes when you donate money or anything else to an organization you aren't always sure how it is being used but with blood it is always for a good cause."

County sees decline in school violence

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The tragedy in Littleton, Colorado casts a shadow over Seminole County following the arrest of a Rock Lake Middle School student Tuesday who police said threatened to kill all the eighth graders in the school.

Brendan A. May, 13, had a map in his locker that included drawings of the school hallways and a note reading "hide bomb in globe in science (room)," according to Seminole County Sheriff's deputies.

Deputies did not find a bomb or any weapons in their investigation. The school day at Rock Lake Middle School proceeded without disruption to classes. May, in the seventh-grade, faces a felony charge of threatening to discharge a destructive device.

Parents of Rock Lake Middle School students arguing against the transfer of principal Paul Cave to Milwee Middle School told the School Board on Wednesday that they feel the school is safe and well organized.

In fact, according to the school district's office of secondary education, the number of weapons, drug and alcohol violations are decreasing.

There is a significant decline in the number of incidents involving aggressive behavior

and violence in county schools, according to Ron Pinnell, director of secondary education.

"We have got a lot of good kids who understand the rules and are there to learn," Pinnell said. "A small percentage don't follow the rules, and the idea is to decrease that number."

There were 55 weapons violations in county middle schools and high schools in 1997-98, down from 81 in 1996-97 and 121 in 1995-96. Statistics for the current school year were not available.

"Just having one incident is disturbing," Pinnell said. "It is one too many. Given the reality of schools and life today, we have to be ready to respond."

In middle schools, there were 31 weapons violations in 1997-98, down from 46 in 1996-97 and also in 1995-96.

In high schools, there were 24 weapons violations in 1997-98, down from 33 in 1996-97 and 75 in 1995-96.

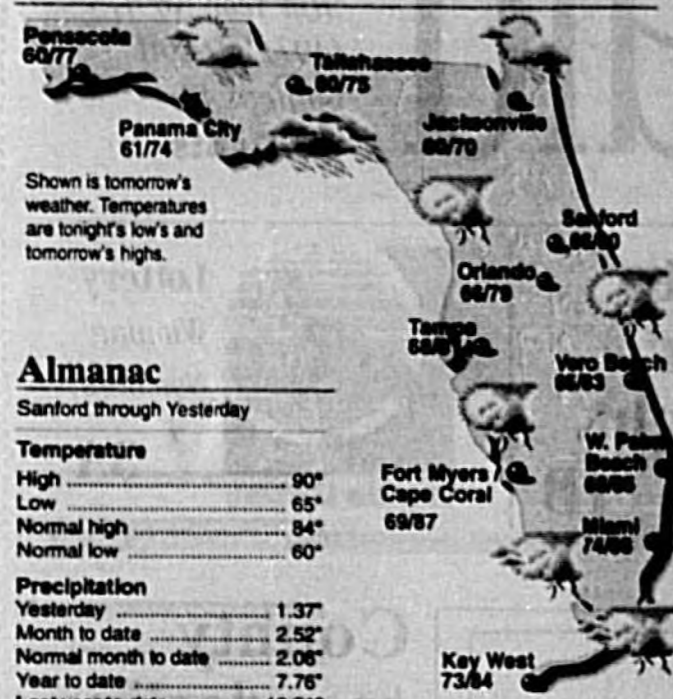

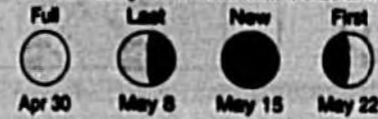

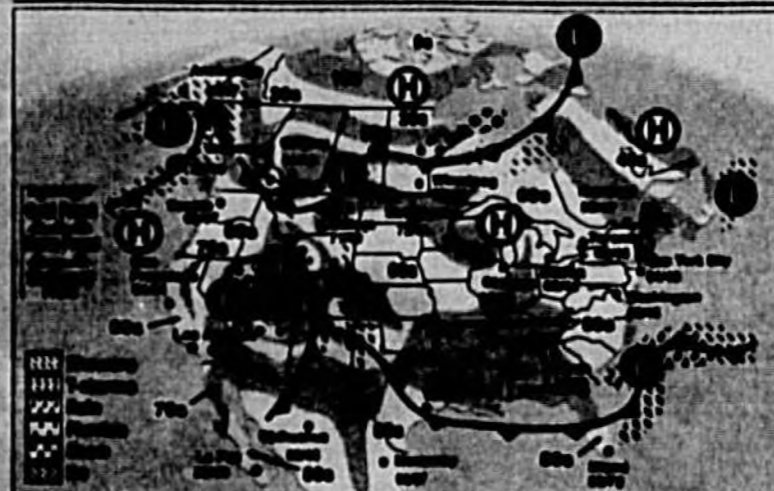

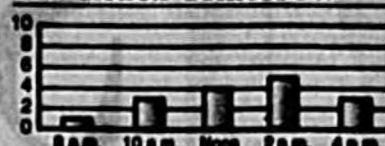

'Yes'am, I'm doing fine'

Loved ones bid farewell to "Big Momma" Bell

OVIDO - When Janie Robinson Bell died this week, much of Geneva and Ovido felt the loss.

"Big Momma" Bell, 94, was born in Geneva in 1905, grew up in Ovido - and never strayed.

Everyone called her "Big Momma" because of her great heart. She was small in stature, huge in care and compassion for others.

The daughter of Olasco and Dasha Spiling Robinson, she became the Old Town nurse who gave her tender loving care of everyone who came to her with ailments of any kind. She would go into the woods and pick herbs for treatment.

When the children in Old Town came down with what was known as the Trash, an infection of the mouth and gums, Big Momma Bell cared for them.

She married, raised a family that today extends to 12 grandchildren, 34 great grandchildren and 26 great great grandchildren. She is also Big Momma to hundreds of others - some of whom she cared for in her home.

"I was one of those other children of Big Momma Bell," James Golden said Wednesday. "I enjoyed her company, her wonderful cookies and her every kindness. Anyone who lived in Geneva or Ovido any amount of time knew and loved Big Momma Bell."

Although grieved at her death, 81-year-old Golden is working to prepare a fitting burial for this woman he loved. Golden's Funeral Home, Inc., independently owned and family operated, is handling arrangements for the burial.

The Rev. Victor Blair will begin a service at 11 a.m. Saturday at Fountain Head Missionary Baptist Church. Grandsons and great grandsons will be the pall bearers. Mrs. Bell was a member of the church for more than 90 years.

covered on school campuses so far this school year, and none were found in 1997-98. Four firearms were discovered on campuses in 1996-97, and two were found in 1995-96.

Wolfgang Halbig, director of security, said that schools have a system in place called "code red" to shut down the school in the case of danger.

There were 128 drug and alcohol violations in Seminole County schools in 1997-98, down from 147 in 1996-97 and 179 in 1995-96.

Pinnell said school administrators have been given the discretion to level the punishments students deserve when they break rules. He also said that having security specialists

"I remember my momma taking my hand as we walked two miles from our home to the Fountain Head Missionary Baptist Church," said her daughter, Ollie B. Davis of Ovido.

"Momma dressed us up nice for church," said Mrs. Davis, 74. "Momma had two church dresses - both long dresses that were popular once and then again. She had a purple church dress and a pink one."

Although many of the years were a struggle for John Robert Bell and Janie Robinson Bell, they worked to make certain their children were not hungry. "My daddy passed away in 1977," Mrs. Davis said. "He worked hard all his life. He'd catch fish for us to eat. We were never hungry."

"My momma did the domestic work," Mrs. Davis said. "She prepared the food, took care of my brother, sister and I and later - Lillie R. Hall - who we all love as a sister. She taught us to pray and she took care of us when we were ill."

"Momma was almost a doctor - I mean when the other children had any kind of illnesses they came to Momma, and she would make them better."

Mrs. Davis attended to her momma in later years at her home in Ovido. She said her mother needed a walker in recent years and began to have eye troubles two years ago. She said her mother enjoyed watching TV soaps like *All My Children* and *One Day to Live*.

"My momma loved life and never complained," Mrs. Davis said. "When she came out of intensive care at the hospital, I asked her if she knew I was there. 'Yes'am' she said. She always said, 'yes'am, I'm doing just fine.'"

"I would make her comfortable as I could, fluff her pillow, prop her in bed and say 'Just like that.' And Momma would answer, 'Just like that.'"

"Momma's last words were: 'Yes'am, I'm doing fine...Just like that.'"

at each high school and a close relationship with law enforcement helps cut down on violations.

Schools teach students character education, and "how to resolve your problems in a non-violent way," Pinnell said.

The school district's save a friend hotline played a role in saving two lives last year, Pinnell said.

the apron where the planes park.

The terminal would be designed to handle overflow traffic from the international terminal.

Inadequate terminal facilities have hampered the airport's efforts to add domestic flights, according to Victor White, executive director of the Sanford Airport Authority.

The airport has received \$5.5 million from the state in the past two years for expansion. The airport has used about \$1 million for parking and building improvements, plus \$500,000 for ramp repairs.

If the state approves the request, the terminal would be built to accommodate seven domestic airplanes at a time and 750,000 passengers annually.

gaping holes during the ensuing rain. They walked fields around devastated property collecting anything that resembled a lost treasure such as a photograph, marriage license, school books, jewelry and even money, which was carefully sealed in plastic bags.

Black cited that volunteers also answered the call during the fires that swept through Geneva. They have "worked rebuilding homes, landscaping yards and served on the Seminole H.E.A.R.T. Board to see that the unmet needs of victims were being answered."

She further said that "we couldn't possibly recite all of the agencies, places, people and communities where RSVP and Volunteer Center Volun-

teers serve, suffice it to say you are involved."

Serving in schools as tutors, feeding the hungry, comforting the homeless and serving the disenfranchised is what Black gave as examples of "how graciously the volunteers have served because they have received so much from this great nation throughout a lifetime and volunteers want to give back to the communities."

Remarkably, Black pointed out, there are RSVP volunteers in their 80's and 90's who have been serving through this organization for more than 20 years. "The citizens of Seminole County are blessed," she said.

According to Black, last year RSVP volunteers provided

More on using salt to kill weeds

DEAR ANNE AND NAN: Some questions about using salt to kill weeds, which you recommended in a previous column:

1. What is the proper ratio of water to salt?
2. There are many different kinds of salt. Are you referring to sidewalk salt?
3. How close to vegetables, flowers and trees can you apply this solution without it having a negative effect on the plants?
4. Are you sure asparagus plants aren't affected by this solution? The asparagus bed is one of the areas where I need something like this.

DEAR JOHN: In the column you refer to, we recommended the "rock salt treatment" ONLY for asparagus beds and for weeds growing through cracks in a patio or terrace ... and then only when there is no possibility of the salt leaching into surrounding foliage or flower beds. Answering your questions: Rock salt is used in homemade ice cream freezers, water softeners and to de-ice sidewalks, and is available at any hardware store. You can make the solution as strong or weak as you like. For an asparagus bed, simply hand cast the salt over the surface in the early spring. Rock salt will not harm asparagus, which is naturally salt resistant; in its uncultivated state, it grows in salt water tidal basins.

Now for the kicker: A number of people write to vehemently disagree with the use of rock salt ANYWHERE where things (including weeds) are growing. Their reason is that it is virtually impossible to keep the salt from leaching into the soil and harming surrounding growth. The alternative, completely harmless and ecologically sound alternative? Liberal applications of white vinegar!

P.S. We recently read this definition of weeds. We loved it and thought we'd pass it on: "Weeds are any plant that no one has yet found a use for."

TO OUR READERS: PUH-LEEZE don't write to us asking where and how to sell your accumulations of old 78-, 33- and 45-rpm phonograph records, or ask for our advice on what they may be worth. These are impossible questions for us to answer accurately. Same goes for art (paintings, prints, lithographs, etc.) and, with very rare exceptions, musical instruments.

STUMPED: Emma Steege of Waterloo, Iowa, writes: "I'm looking for a product that I used to use, and now need again, called something like 'Stick Um' or 'Handi-Grip.' It's a body glue that comes in a purse-size roll-on bottle. I found it so helpful for keeping my 'tent' stockings up. I stopped needing the stockings for a while, but have to wear them again for medical reasons — and I can't find the glue!"

We wrote about this a couple of years ago. One product was called "Body Glue" and the other was "It Stays." We found Body Glue on the

Internet and e-mailed the independent distributor for ordering information, but never got a reply. As for as It Stays, the source we had is no longer viable. We KNOW we've seen It Stays in one of our 50 million catalogs — but, of course, we can't find it, now that we need it. Readers?

All about the art of inanity

My friend, Davis Diamond, makes me laugh.

He'll leave inane messages on phone-mail. He'll speak in different dialects and invent characters. "Squidley" is one of his pseudonyms. "Precious" is another.

Squidley called the other night to talk about celebrities with pencil-thin mustaches.

"You know," he said, "The John Waters kind of mustache."

"David Niven had one," I said, falling for Squidley's foolishness.

Adolph Menjou's name came up, too.

Squidley said he felt badly about women with mustaches. "Aren't we all?" I told him. And so it went.

Lynn Berger of Longwood has a business she calls LightenUP. For the past nine years, she has helped hundreds of stressed out men and women LightenUP.

Sometimes, all it takes is to get down and silly, Berger said.

"We have these smiley cheeks you can use on or pig noses," she said. "It's hard to take yourself too seriously when you're wearing them."

Berger said now and then she'll put on a duck's nose when she bathes. "I quack myself up," she laughed.

People need to turn to laughter and being a little goofy in order to remain sane, Berger said. "You have to know when to do it and how to do it," she said. "And know who to do it with. You can't take it to the edge."

The hardest thing for most people to accept, Berger said, is change. "And that's what most of us are dealing with today. Change. Companies are downsizing and many are out of work for the first time. That's one of the biggest changes."

"I tell my clients to try and look on the bright side. There's a bright side to everything. Even if someone gets fired, there's a bright side. There's a new job somewhere. A new challenge. New people to meet."

"Changing a negative situation to a positive one is a big challenge," she said. "And it's not all that hard if you're willing to have a go at it. Willing to lighten up."

Berger's advice is to "savor the moment - not just find a solution to next week or next year but to just enjoy the moment for what it's worth."

Go ahead, she said, pretend you're somebody that you're not.

After talking to Lynn Berger, I called my friend, Davis Diamond.

He wasn't home, so I left a message.

"I said the call was for an endorsement to the Foundation of the Arts and Inanities."

Gore is blowing it but can recover

Poor Al Gore! His moment to move into the spotlight is drawing near and he's in danger of blowing it. But he can recoup.

My reading of the vice president is that he has, among other things, a touch of Newt Gingrich Syndrome, an exaggerated sense of the grandness of his own destiny and the unfortunate tendency to let it show in public.

In former Speaker Gingrich's, R-Ga., case, he thought he was Winston Churchill and he told everyone about it. He believed his own political ascendancy was about "Renewing American Civilization."

He was a gifted political strategist and orator, but after he achieved his first big success — the Republican takeover of 1994 — he failed (in part) because he harbored an outdated sense of vanity and revealed it.

In early November 1995, he famously told a group of reporters that he'd shut down the federal government in the budget fight with President Clinton partly because Clinton didn't let him exit Air Force One by the front door on their return from the funeral of slain Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

People began laughing at Gingrich — even more so when it was proved that in political combat with Clinton, he was constantly outfoxed. Churchill? He seemed ridiculous.

The danger is, people are beginning to laugh at Gore. It's bad enough being vice president, the office ("a bucket of warm spit") is inherently demeaning. But what people are laughing about — and they are laughing at Gore, not with him — are his gaffes, hyperboles and exaggerations of his own place in history.

The latest, of course, is the claim that when he was in Congress, "I took the initiative in creating the Internet." Just last week, he claimed that the new Senate Republican budget was going to throw the nation into "the worst economy since the Great De-



pression."

After impeachment, he pronounced Clinton among the "greatest" of American presidents. With farmers, he represented himself as having spent his youth plowing behind a mule, when he really was at St. Albans, the Washington prep school for the well-born.

What accounts for all this, I think, is Gingrichism: a grandiose sense of destiny and massive frustration that other people simply don't appreciate it.

People have been expecting great things of Gore since he was a child. Some have hung on to him since Harvard, expecting he'd be president some day.

In keeping with a sense of destiny, he has tackled The Big Problems: the nuclear arms race, global warming, the Information Age.

Now, some people really are Winston Churchill, and Al Gore may be one of them. People laughed at and scorned Churchill during the 1930s, but when Adolf Hitler conquered Europe, the British turned to him, recognizing he was right about the danger.

Gore has this going for him and most people don't appreciate it. In the 1980s, he genuinely was the person who invented the concept of the mobile, single-warhead missile (later named "Midgetman") as the solution to the problem of nuclear instability created by U.S. and Soviet reliance on vulnerable multiple-warhead missiles.

Of all current politicians, Gore deserves credit for making environmentalism a major issue. He held the first congressional hearings on toxic waste

and helped invent Supertund.

Gore was among the first politicians to put global warming and the greenhouse effect on the public agenda. It's now almost universally accepted as a matter of concern, although what to do about it is still deeply controversial.

In fact, I suspect that global warming will be one of the key issues of the 2000 presidential campaign, with Republicans charging Gore would shut down factories and outlaw automobiles to deal with it.

And, while Gore certainly did not invent the Internet, he did — as some of the Internet's real inventors attest — help convert it from a defense-oriented research tool to a key new "information superhighway," a term Gore popularized and may have coined.

So, this is a talented man. But he may lose his chance to lead because he hypes himself instead of letting others do it for him.

He's been a loyal vice president — too loyal, considering the messes Clinton has gotten into, of which the Chinese espionage campaign donation-technology transfer miasma is just the latest.

The vice presidency is a handicap, which is why most polls show that despite high job approval ratings, Gore trails nationally unknown Texas Gov. George W. Bush by 20 points. Bush is seen as a strong leader, Gore isn't.

Gore needs to step out on his own, start talking about where he'd lead the country, have his staff dribble out details of his role in Clinton policies bigger than re-inventing government and empowerment zones — and also stop taking himself so seriously.

Gore won't stay 20 points behind Bush in the polls as the 2000 campaign gets real, but he does have to take steps now to ensure that derisive laughter doesn't put him 25 or 30 points behind.

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Bush and the hot potato

While his brother, Texas Gov. George W. Bush, is gearing up for a run at the White House, Florida Gov. Jeb Bush is trying to decide what to do with a very hot potato that has recently landed in his lap.

Conservatives have generally regarded Jeb as, from their standpoint, the more dependable of the two brothers. In his losing race against the late Lawton Chiles in 1994, and again in his winning bid against Democrat Buddy MacKay last November, Jeb rang just about all the right changes on the conservative carillon. In addition, there are many who think his personality is more appealing than his elder brother's. And in a state with a large Hispanic population, thanks to Castro, the fact that Jeb's wife is of Mexican origin certainly doesn't hurt. (There are those who think it would even be a plus at the national level.)

So things have been looking pretty rosy for Jeb, and not long ago they got even rosier when two black factions in the Florida Democratic party fell to fighting each other, and one of them signaled that it was ready to do business with the Republican governor.

The chance to make serious inroads into the black vote (which in Florida, as elsewhere, is normally overwhelmingly Democratic) was an almost unbelievable stroke of luck for Bush, and he wasted no time seizing the opportunity. The cement sealing the new alliance was barely dry, however, before Ward Connerly paid a visit to Florida.

Connerly, you will recall, is the courageous black California businessman who spearheaded the drive to pass Proposition 209 in 1996 — the initiative that amended the California constitution to prohibit race and gender preferences in public contracting, employment and education. The initiative passed by a handsome majority, and has subsequently defeated all attacks launched against it in the courts.

Connerly thereupon formed the American Civil Rights Institute (not to be confused with the American Civil

Rights Union, recently founded to take on the ACLU), and has been encouraging the passage of similar initiatives in other states. In 1998 he scored a tremendous victory in Oregon, where voters approved a nearly identical initiative over the bitter opposition of the Democratic governor and the business establishment (including both Boeing and Microsoft), who outspent proponents many times over.

Not long ago Connerly requested, and received, an interview with Gov. Bush, and was treated civilly enough. But the governor's subsequent comments, not to mention those of other leading Florida politicians, suggested that Connerly was about as welcome as a skunk in a submarine. Bush commented that Connerly was "about war," whereas he was "about love."

Gov. Bush, of course, is well aware that — thanks to "affirmative action" — black Florida businessmen are getting state contracts unjustified by their bids, and black applicants are getting state jobs and being admitted to state universities at the expense of better-qualified whites. And what he is saying is that this is perfectly OK with him. That is what he is bound to say, if he hopes to maintain his new alliance with disaffected black Democrats.

The trouble is that, according to a poll conducted on February 17-18 by the respected firm Zogby International, 83 percent of likely Florida voters would support a law to prohibit governmental discrimination and preferential treatment on the basis of race, color, gender, ethnicity or national origin in public contracting, employment and education. The poll, which was commissioned by the ACRI, shows remarkably consistent support among all voter categories: Democrats (82 percent), Republicans (84), Independents (84), East Florida (87), West Florida (82), the Miami area (83), Catholics (86), Protestants (84), Jews (96), with similar results among all education levels and age and income brackets. Even among blacks, 74 percent say race should not be a factor in admission to a public university or college, and 80 percent do not want race or sex to be a factor in government hiring.

These figures won't change the minds of Florida's black establishment, but Connerly has indicated that he plans to back a Florida initiative modeled on Proposition 209. And that presents Jeb Bush with an agonizing choice. Does he opt for simple fairness, as Florida voters overwhelmingly do, or hold out for black quotas? A lot of conservatives are waiting to see.

The way we were: Church came from humble beginnings

The following was edited from a booklet entitled "Holy Cross Church, the First Hundred Years" which was prepared for the centennial celebration in 1973. This history of Sanford's Holy Cross Episcopal Church will be continued for two more weeks.

At the conclusion of the Civil War, the Episcopal Diocese of Florida was in disarray. Three churches had been burned by enemy action and one had been sold by its impoverished congregation for debt. Of the 12 original church academies, all but two had been destroyed or were in ruin. Only four clergymen remained and the only two parishes not disturbed by the events were Tallahassee and Montecello, but they, too, were in poverty. The financial resources for the diocese had collapsed along with the Confederacy and the plantation system.

To add to the problems, the much-loved Bishop Frances Huger Rutledge had died in the fall of 1866. To replace him the Diocese selected an outsider—John Freeman Young, the assistant rector of Trinity Parish, New York.

Bishop Young was consecrated in Trinity church in 1867 and shortly thereafter left for Jacksonville. He soon began to survey his prostrate domain by visiting every church, or where a church had been.

In 1871, he appointed the Rev. F.R. Holeman and the Rev. Edward MacChure as missionaries for the upper and lower St. Johns.

On December 16, 1871, Bishop Young and the Rev. Holeman left Daytona for Enterprise, camping on the ground midway into their journey. The next afternoon, they reached Enterprise and soon afterwards took the steamer across Lake Monroe to Mellonville. That night, the Bishop preached at the Hotel. The hotel guests, which were the majority of his congregation,

were leaving by boat on Sunday, so a service was scheduled for Saturday night in the schoolhouse. A pouring rain, though, prevented the service.

Shortly afterwards, the Rev. Holeman moved his base of operations to Sanford where General Sanford donated land for a church and rectory. Mrs. Sanford took great interest in the church; she and her friends greatly aided the building's construction with their contributions.

In 1872, there were four families, three individuals, and a total of 14 souls in the church. That year there were four baptisms, four catechisms, one marriage, one funeral, five Sunday school teachers and 19 scholars. Contributions totaled \$201.70.

The area to be reached by the church was so large that Holeman organized and taught a catechism class for adults which prepared them to teach others. The system worked beautifully and the congregation grew.

Mr. Holeman also organized missions at Maitland, Orlando, Apopka, Lake Jesup and Enterprise. Because of the large area to be covered, he de-

Francis Epps was of foremost importance in Orlando.

Bishop Young stated at the 1873 Convention that a beautiful church after the designs of Upjohn was ready for consecration in Sanford. A rectory was to be built beside it. He projected that with the completion of the large hotel there,

the parish should soon become self-supporting.

It is not known who selected the name Holy Cross, but the Journal for 1874 lists Mr. Holeman as rector of Holy Cross, Sanford.

Richard Upjohn was the celebrated designer of Trinity Church in New York City and was noted for this Gothic church architecture. Since he was a friend of both Bishop Young and General Sanford, his work was no doubt at their request.

General and Mrs. Sanford had hoped that the \$5000 church would be consecrated on Easter Sunday, 1873, but it took place the following Sunday. The only clergymen able to attend were the Rev. Thacker of Fernandina and Hole-

man. Bishop Young preached and celebrated Holy Communion. A considerable number of people came down the St. Johns River from St. Augustine, Jacksonville and Fernandina and they acclaimed the occasion pleasant and enjoyable.

The Rev. Holeman left Holy Cross in 1874 and the Rev. Lyman Phelps came as rector from Connecticut. He was not only a priest, but also an agriculturist, student, banker and General Sanford's friend. He appeared to be an active missionary and was able to report in 1876 that he was holding regular services at Holy Cross and also at Orlando and Maitland. By 1877 he reported 19 communicants at Sanford, a Sunday school organization at

Fort Reed and he was also working in Zellwood.

The parish grew during the next few years with the growth of the citrus industry. However a disaster struck in the summer of 1880 when a hurricane completely destroyed the church and also many of the citrus groves that supported the church families.

Bishop Young appealed for aid in various church papers which must have been forthcoming, for a new church was completed in 1882. It was along modified Upjohn designs with a high spire which became a landmark seen from the St. Johns River. It contained 150 sittings and became a parish during the diocesan council of 1883. The Rev. S.B. Carpenter, who had

become rector, reported 42 families in the parish.

Losers are worthy of praise too

You don't often read about the losers.

Talk to the winners after any game. Same old clichés, same old sound bites.

(they all say either that or that they are just taking it one game at a time).

So this column is about the losers.

The high school kids who play for free, stay with the team when things aren't going well and, sometimes, see it all pay off by their senior year.

We won't mention the teams, but if you check the standings, you know who this is about.

It's about the losing football team that plays well in the spring jamboree at the end of May and spends the next few months giddy with excitement about the coming season.

It's about softball teams and baseball teams that get the 10-run slaughter rule invoked against them on a nightly basis, but still giggle its way through the games, knowing they have little chance, but enjoying being a high school athlete.

Have you ever been to a cross country race, or followed it in the media?

That's losing at its best. The stars trot across the line barely breaking a sweat.

But that doesn't mean the race is over. Minutes later, huffing and puffing, you still have racers trying to finish, with sweat cascading and nothing to accomplish except the thrill of not finishing last.

That's where the stories are.

It's easy to write about the winners, but it's more fun to watch the losing teams. Sometimes it seems like they are having the most fun of anyone.

I'll never forget covering a girls lacrosse game last year that ended up in a blowout. The losing goalie was absolutely tattooed all night. The score reached 20-0.

Then, she just started laughing and dancing in the goal.

She was having more fun than anyone on the winning team.

That's what sports is all about.

Counsel advised for grand jury witness

Last month we discussed the power of the grand jury, through the court, to summon witnesses and to compel testimony and to issue subpoenas duces tecum requiring the production for inspection of other evidence such as business records, handwriting exemplars, voice exemplars, and samples of a witness' hair. At times, however, the evidence the grand jury is seeking from an individual may incriminate that same individual.

Compelling incriminating testimony would violate the protections afforded all citizens by the United States Constitution and, under certain circumstances, the production of incriminating evidence may also violate these protections. Therefore, a witness issued a subpoena or subpoena duces tecum to appear in front of a grand jury would be ill advised to show up without having, at the very least, consulted with counsel. There is no constitutional right to counsel in grand jury proceedings. However, depending on whether the grand jury is authorized by state law or by federal law, the witness



has different options available or may be required to invoke certain privileges that may be deemed waived if not raised and ruled on by the court. Assistance of counsel is therefore critical.

For example, one of the major differences between the procedures followed in state and federal courts is that, even though there is no constitutional right to counsel in grand jury proceedings, in state court, a witness may be represented before the grand jury by one attorney and the attorney is allowed to advise and counsel the witness. Naturally, in exchange for the "privilege" of appearing as

counsel for a witness before a grand jury, the attorney for the witness must comply with the "secrecy requirements" concerning the grand jury proceedings in the same manner as all who appear before the grand jury. Additionally, the attorney for the witness may not at any time address the grand jurors, raise objections, make arguments, or otherwise disrupt proceedings before the grand jury. An intentional violation of the provisions of this section shall constitute indirect criminal contempt of court and, additionally, may lead to the exclusion of the attorney for the witness from any further grand jury proceedings.

In federal court, however, different rules of procedure apply. In federal grand jury proceedings, the rules of procedure specify that only attorneys for the government, the witness under examination, interpreters when needed and, for the purpose of taking the evidence, a stenographer or operator of a recording device may be present while the grand jury is in session. This can make it very difficult on a witness that is served

with a subpoena or subpoena duces tecum because, although a witness may, depending on the circumstances, be afforded the opportunity to confer with counsel upon request, he or she will be "alone" before the grand jury.

As noted above, there is no constitutional right to counsel in grand jury proceedings. However, depending on whether a grand jury is authorized by state or federal law, a witness may be permitted to have counsel present with him or her before the grand jury which is likely to facilitate the protection of the witness' rights. In the coming weeks we will discuss another major difference between grand jury proceedings in state and federal court, the grant of immunity, as well as other aspects of criminal law.

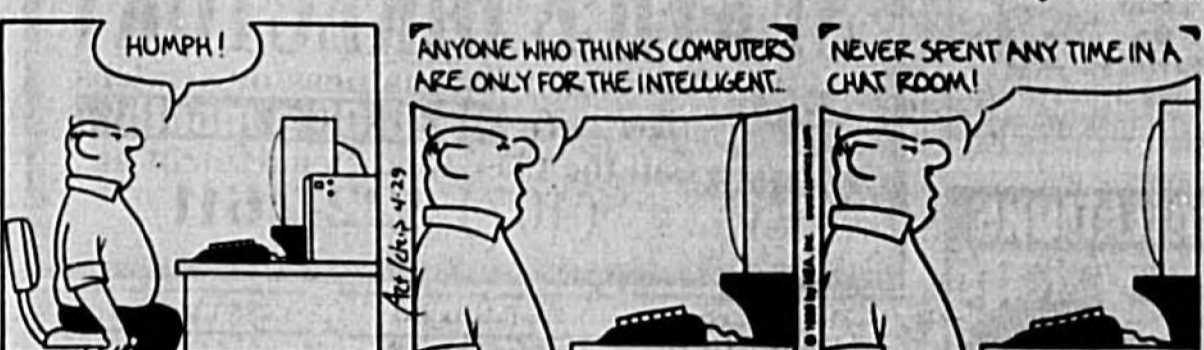

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WIN AT BRIDGE

Talk can be costly

We all dislike passing. We come to play, not to sit silently like Trappist monks. However, there are times when descriptive bids are costly. First, the lengthy auction may paint a beautiful picture for the opposition. Second, the extra space might allow the opponents to find a good sacrifice. Third, a defender may be able to throw in a lead-directing double.

Take this deal as an example. After West's weak jump overall (showing a good six-card suit and some 6-10 high-card points), North cue-bid four clubs. This showed a high-card raise to four hearts. Yes, it is a slight overbid, but North was hoping all of his partner's points would be outside clubs. The major problem, though, was that it

gave East the opportunity to double to show a high club honor.

Against four hearts, West led the spade six. Some Easts would have put in the nine, keeping a tenace over dummy's king. That is often the right move, but it couldn't have been correct here. As South was known to have at most a singleton club, and must have the diamond ace for his opening bid, the defenders couldn't collect more than two spades and one club. Also, after a pre-emptor leads a different suit, it is (almost) always a singleton.

So, East won with the spade ace. Then he returned the spade five, his lowest card being a suit-preference signal for clubs. West ruffed, underled his club ace, and got a second ruff.

If North had jumped straight to four hearts, this defense would have been much harder to find.

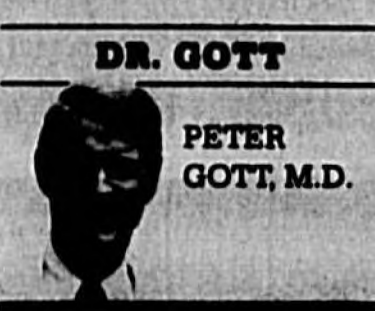

ASK DR. GOTT

No medicine for hypoglycemia

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have been diagnosed with hypoglycemia. My doctor put me on a 1500-calorie diet that doesn't help my weak spells. I have to consume sugar to overcome my periodic attacks of dizziness. Isn't there a medication for hypoglycemia?

DEAR READER: Unfortunately, there is no medicine for hypoglycemia. Your best bet is to avoid sugar and alcohol, eat several small meals a day (rather than two or three large ones), and snack on cheese or dry fruits, such as pasta and bread. If your symptoms of weakness and dizziness persist, insist that your doctor investigate further.



ment of the arm is hampered. After a time, the joint "freezes" and range of motion becomes severely limited.

You are doing all the right things — but you may need to do more. The initial approach (pain management and special exercises) is appropriate but may be insufficient. If you haven't experienced significant relief from this program, you should see an orthopedic surgeon, who will probably order an MRI test to examine the interior of your shoulder. Then he or she may suggest a cortisone injection. If this doesn't do the trick, arthroscopic surgery may have to be considered. The specialist should be your next step.

DEAR DR. GOTT: How can I find out which vitamins and minerals are present in what foods?

DEAR READER: There are many publications that list the nutritional makeup of foods. In addition to the ever-present supply of paperback references in most bookstores, your local library has source books about nutrition. The dietitian employed by your local hospital can also give you specific advice about various foods. Finally, you will find that food manufacturers list major ingredients, including vitamins/mineral contents, on their food packages.

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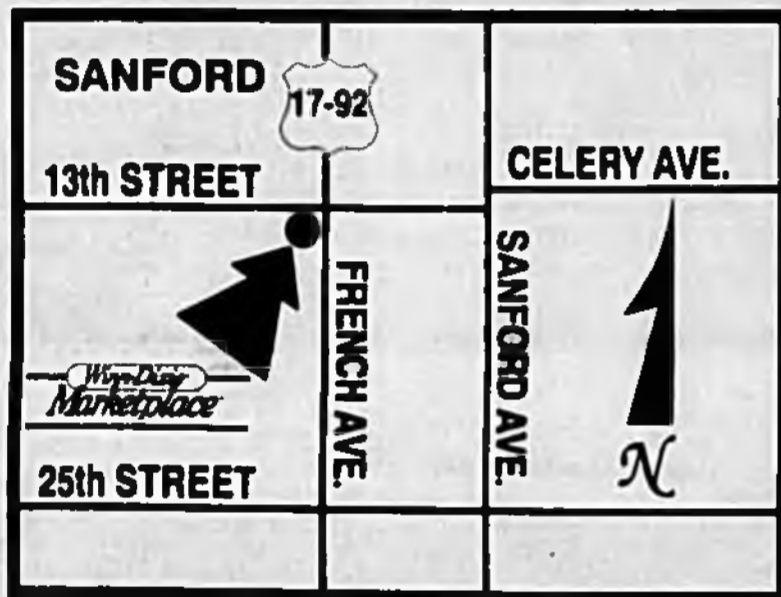
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
