

A Traffic Jam On Passports

WASHINGTON (AP)—Passport director Francis G. Knight urged American tourists not to get stuck in line at the State Department's passport office here as they apply for passports. "Wait until the traffic jam is over," she said Thursday. Miss Knight's remarks in an interview were directed primarily at the New York area where a deluge from would-be travelers has set off a passport-issuance crisis reverberating in Washington. The rush began in New York after the State Department on June 21 lifted its Middle East wartime ban on travel to Israel and mass advertising called for "travel to Israel now" to pump tourist dollars into her war-torn coffers. At latest count, the backlog of applications at the State Department's passport office in New York was still a mountainous 7,000—despite issuance of some 5,000 passports a week there and extra processing of 1,500 passports for New Yorkers weekly by Washington and Philadelphia offices.

Calls have been coming to the White House, Congress and State Department brass from anxious passport seekers. A 15-line telephone bank in the passport office here was still jammed Thursday with more inquirers than there were officials to answer. Normally a passport application runs through the bureaucratic mill in three or four days. The traffic pileup at New York is reported causing delays there of several additional days. Whether political pull helps much in speeding a passport application is open to question when there are so many trying to get their hands on one.

Port Law Jeopardized

The Port of Sanford could be jeopardized by Governor Kirk's appointment of Ellsworth Bassett to the board, Commissioner Lawrence Swofford told the Commission today. The constitutionality of the Port Authority legislation which has been questioned by Kirk, according to report by County Attorney Harold Johnson, should be decided in the courts, the Commission unanimously agreed.

The attorney was authorized to take the necessary "legal action" to clear up the matter of the Governor's appointment to the Port Law. The Governor's office, last Thursday, announced the appointment of Bassett, father of Rep. E. Pope Bassett, to the Authority despite the law's requirement that the appointment be made from names submitted by the County Commission. The commission had not constitutionally approved the appointment of Bassett.

Commissioner Lawrence Swofford said that the constitutionality of the law is in question. The port is in jeopardy," Swofford declared. "Let's get this matter settled once and for all before a person not legally appointed is seated."

Commissioner Chairman John Alexander remarked, "If it is to be determined that any part of the law is unconstitutional, the courts should make this determination. The board must meet its responsibilities under the law and the law requires that we make recommendations for appointment to the Port Authority."

Port Moves To Overcome 'Time Woes'

Completing essential preliminary steps, selecting the engineering firm, approving the 1967-68 budget was done by the Seminole County Port Authority at its meeting last night as every effort was made to meet the deadline for the creation of the Port of Sanford with Housing and Urban Development Agency assistance.

Andrew Caraway, chairman of the board, set the stage for the various moves as he commended the board for its handling of the time problems but we shall do our best to meet them." What Caraway was referring to was the August 1, legislative deadline for local actions to assure the receipt by the authority of the \$600,000 in race-track funds which is basic to the completion of the bond issuance of the \$900,000 which HUD has authorized.

These resolutions were approved which deal with the securing of the bonds at a 4 percent rate, the Florida State Bank and the Florida State Bank—each of which have a \$500,000 share of the bonds at a 4 percent rate, with the county commission assuring the receipt by the authority of the \$600,000 in race-track receipts; and the land acquisition requirement of HUD (largely devoted to securing the rights of property owners).

The authority members also voted to have Lockwood Greene as the project engineer and authorized the signing of a contract with them by the chairman. This contract provides a 3 percent fee for the engineers on money expended for the project. It is not actually in force until notice is given by the engineers but it is expected that Lockwood Greene will be preparing their work before the lengthy legal steps are completed.

The members of the authority approved the 1967-68 budget which has a total of \$2,000,000, a considerable drop from the \$2,800,000 of 1966-67. During the discussion it was brought out that the affairs of the authority will be easily different as the actual construction begins.

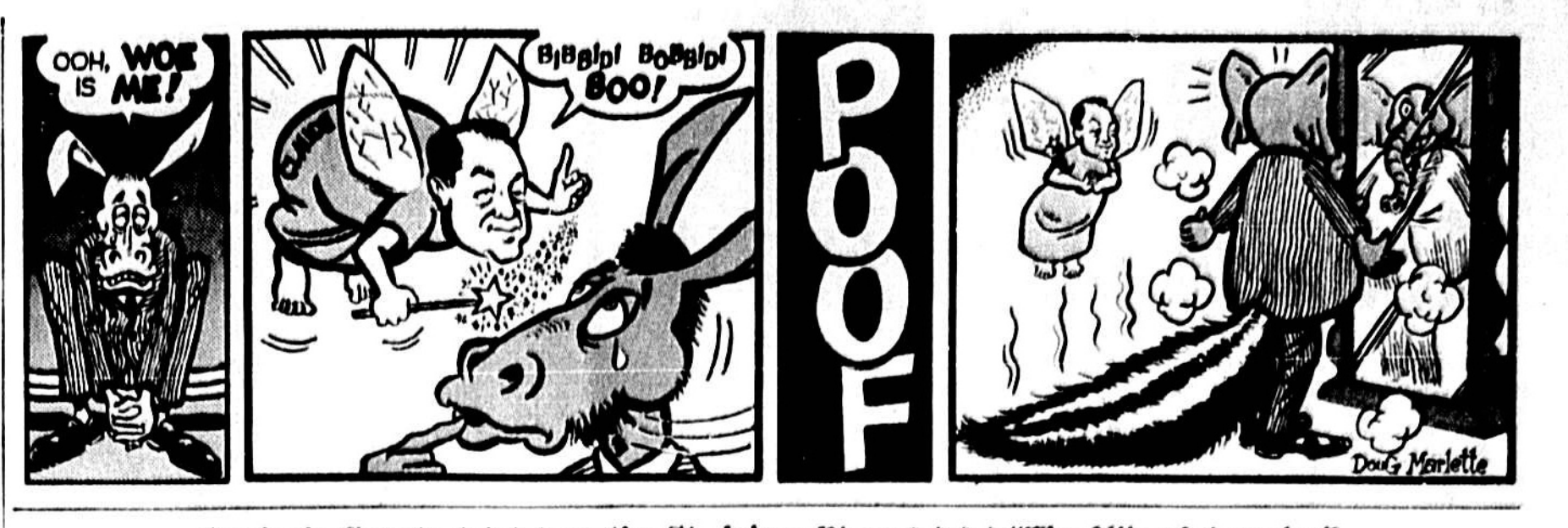
Sand Clogs SR 46 As 2 Trucks Crash

Commissioner Higginbotham Urges ... 'Let All Use Civic Center'

City Commissioner Earl Higginbotham urged the youth wing at the Civic Center open to all to avoid wasting money on a Goldsboro recreation center.

Higginbotham made the remarks after the city commission last night designated the Mallory and 11th St. areas for the proposed community center.

"We got a \$175,000 building there (the Civic Center) and sometimes there are less than 300 kids present," Higginbotham said.

To build a Goldsboro center would cost in the neighborhood of \$110,000 with the city matching federal funds of \$11,000.

Mayor Joe Baker and Commissioners A. Wilson and James H. Johnson were present at the meeting. The city commission last night designated the Mallory and 11th St. areas for the proposed community center.

However, commissioners agreed to proceed with original plans and also authorized City Manager W. E. Knowles to look over sites at 14th St. and Mangrove, Southwest Rd. "Just to make sure" the best location is selected. They ruled out the N-11th plant at sixth and Pavan as well as the Olive Ave. and 8th St. sites.

Pay Boost In Line For City Employees

A proposed pay schedule for all city employees that would total around \$80,000 for the 1967-68 year was presented to the City Commission last night.

City Manager W. E. Knowles presented the schedule for city fathers to ponder and discuss in detail when budget hearings start next month.

Last year's schedule total \$72,840 and indications are with a cost of living increase as well as using laborers to a minimum raised the schedule will be increased some \$15,000.

Most of the cost of living increase total a 2 1/2 per cent hike.

On Condemnation

"They're better than many of the homes that people occupy," Higginbotham emphasized.

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Sanford's Terry Cordell Memorialized In Virginia

In a colorful and impressive ceremony at Fort Eustis, Va., recently the Air Transportation Building, Classroom 1028, became Cordell Hall, memorializing Capt. Terry Cordell, a Green Beret officer of Sanford. The highly esteemed son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Cordell, 2415 Elm Avenue, was killed in action in Vietnam on October 15, 1962.

The eulogy and dedication was given by the commanding general, Major General William N. Hottel, who praised the valor and personal qualities of the young officer who was so devoted to his country. Following the general's comments, and with Capt. Cordell's mother personally last tearfully looking on, the memorial plaque and portrait were unveiled as Mrs. Terry Cordell and daughter, Judith, pulled the draw curtains of the screening cover. The 28th U.S. Army band struck up the national anthem as a full complement of the military stood at salute.

Capt. Cordell as an athlete and student officer in Seminole High School showed the qualities of character and leadership that led to his nomination, Cordell led by example through many duty assignments. In qualifying for the rigorous tasks before him, he graduated from the Paratrooper school and the Army Ranger school.

His death occurred at the helicopter from which he was directing intense battle action was shot down.

His widow and daughter, who now live in Anniston, Ala., are frequent visitors to Sanford.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Russians always leave themselves an out when the chips are down.

The Moscow Communists talk intelligently. They've taken thousands of square miles of territory. They've started numerous local guerrilla wars. They've moved in on small countries. They've pushed satellites and underground subversives on and over.

But for the past 50 years Moscow has been very cautious about getting into major war.

When a determined country of any size has stood against them, the Russians have veered—when they could.

In World War I, the Lenin government sued for peace with Germany right after it seized power in Russia.

In the late 1930s, Russians and Japanese fought major battles on the Manchuria-Siberia border. More than 20,000 soldiers were killed in the fighting. The Japanese didn't give. The Russians veered and did not let the Manchurian

battles "escalate" into a "war."

In 1945, the Russians made a deal with Hitler's Germany. They didn't fight the Germans until Hitler's troops invaded Russia. But they did invade weak Finland.

In 1945, the Russians entered the war against Japan only to find themselves in a stalemate. In 1947 to 1949, the Russians sponsored the Communists in an underground guerrilla war in Greece. But Moscow was careful not to openly commit itself.

In 1948 to 1949 Moscow set up the Berlin blockade. But when the United States kept on supplying Berlin, the Russians stopped short of expanding the blockade into a general war.

In 1950, Moscow sponsored North Korea's invasion of South Korea. But when U.S., Korean and United Nations troops advanced north, the Russians made certain they did not become openly involved.

In 1956, Russian tanks moved against Hungarian Communists revolting against Communist rule. Hungary was a small nation. The Russians, before moving in, apparently made certain that no important power would oppose them with armed forces.

In the 1956 Suez war, the Israelis, the British and the French invaded Egypt when Nasser nationalized the Suez Canal and closed it to Israeli ships. The Russians threatened to bomb Western Europe and the Soviet Union if the Israelis did not withdraw.

In 1962, the Russians made a strong secret move to plant ballistic missiles in Cuba. But when the United States gave him an ultimatum.

The Russians have given a considerable amount of aid to the North Vietnamese in the current war in Vietnam. But they have been careful to keep clear of direct involvement.

For the past several years there have been border clashes between the Russians and Communist China.

In the Jassol-Aral war, the Soviet Union gave millions in military aid to the Arabs. Moscow pushed Nasser on from behind the scenes. But again the Soviet Union was careful not to get directly involved.

This is not to suggest the Russians are not good soldiers. They have consistently furnished wars and underground subversion. But regardless of who was in power in the Soviet Union, Moscow has preferred to keep its satellites or obedient underground warriors on to battle while it stood by and watched.

Royal troops normally have moved in only when the risk of war was certain and the victory was assured. A strong nation seems slight.

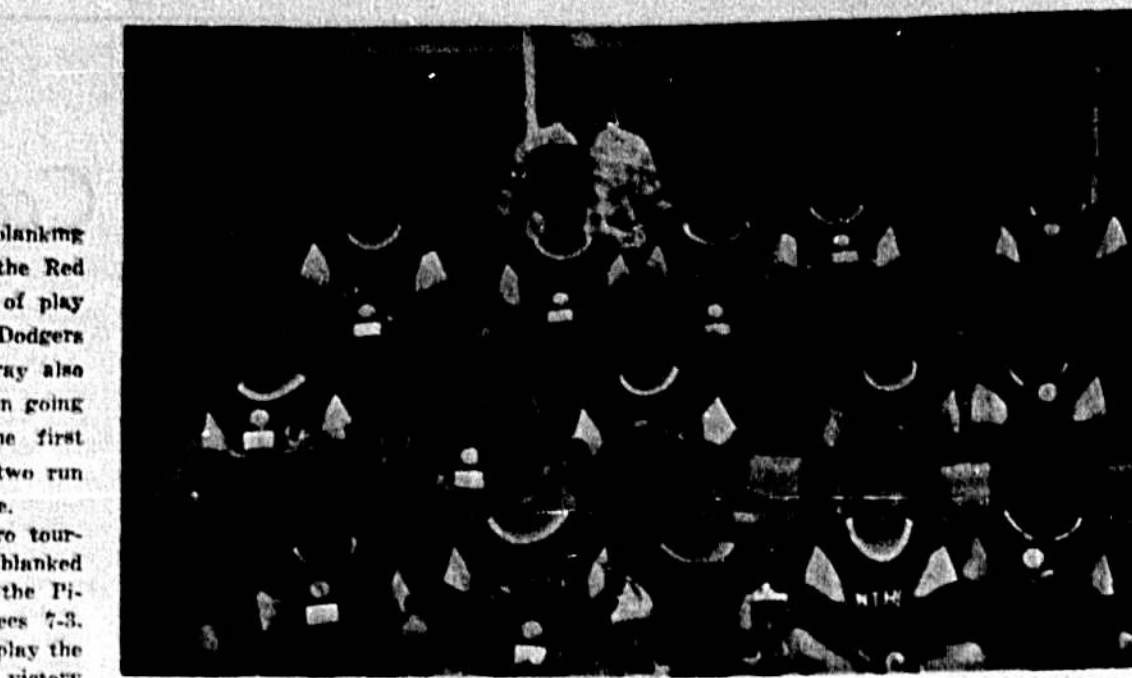

Why Construction Is Booming In Sanford

By WALLY KING LEBBY

The rapid growth and future of Sanford is being recognized by businessmen, politicians and citizens alike. The country over is being relieved of a population crisis, according to reports, and Sanford may account for part of this upward in construction.

With the increase in population and commercial activity, Sanford has come to the attention of other economic planners to indicate a curve upward is real, if not phenomenal.

Telephone and electrical installations, water systems, a d.w. drilling, septic tanks and allied building factors report a boom in the building industry in Sanford.

The local tranquility of the area has been a factor in the boom, and more by the sound of the pipe digger and the starting sign.

Large tracts are being sold for the present and future by the Seminole County Commission (and would-be owners). Most of these sales mean demands for new utility connections.

Orville Touchton and his partner, Western Rogers, report that Stine Machine Company has been drilling more wells in recent months than for the same period in several years. 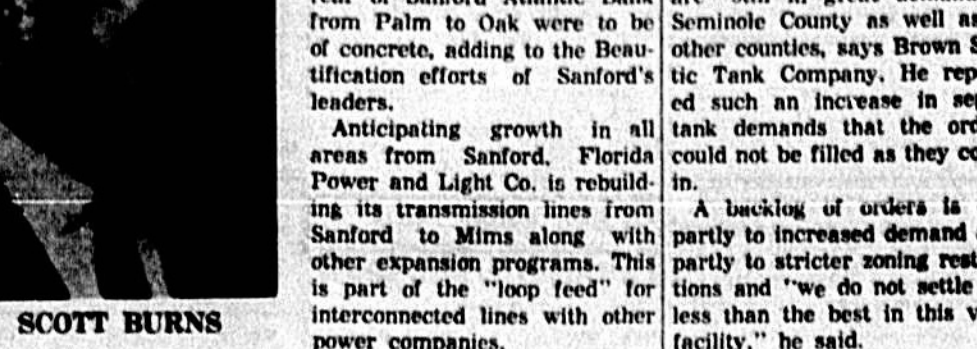
"Rate reductions may account for the increase in extension phones," Sheehan reported, "but color sets and 'princess' phones are also on the increase."

Florida Power and Light Company listed a slight increase in their electrical connections. Scott Burns, district manager, said the upturn could not be called high but it is an increase over recent years. There were installed the first five meters of 1967, while 31 new meters went into commercial and industrial buildings. Some of the meters may service several departments or apartments. Burns said, thus the kilowatt hour usage would definitely be on the upswing.

Anticipating growth in all areas from Sanford, Florida Energy plants at Turkey Point, with two plant facilities, indicates the confidence of Florida in Sanford's future.

Sanitary systems may be on the way "in" but septic tanks are still in great demand in Seminole County as well as in other counties, says Brown Septic Tank Company. He reported such an increase in septic tanks demands that the orders could not be filled as they come in.

A backlog of orders is due partly to increased demand and partly to stricter zoning regulations and "no do not settle for less than the best in this vital facility," he said.

More Planning \$\$\$ Urged By Goodin

The job classification and pay plan under which the county is currently operating in all departments was termed "biased" by Agriculture Agent Cecil Tucker during presentation of the requested budget for the Extension Service before the County Commission.

Tucker made the remark following his request that the salary of the assistant agriculture agent be increased from \$6,200 to \$7,040, the maximum provided in the plan for the position.

"From the work load standpoint, he should receive the raise," Tucker insisted. "Would you like us to show you how valuable our work is to the farmers?"

In answer to a question from Commission Chairman John Alexander as to "how far do you go in giving assistants any amount of a central county salary," Tucker stated, "As far as we can go."

Total of the budget requests submitted by Tucker was \$28,704, an increase of more than \$8,000 over the current budget of \$20,482.

The 1967-68 single item in the increase was \$2,198 for a proposed new position of technical assistant to operate the laboratory and assist in field trials, demonstrations, etc."

Also requested was \$183 in general maintenance repairs to the Agriculture center and \$1,385 for renovations to the center including installation of a central air-conditioner and the removal of a partition to enlarge the meeting room at the center.

Tucker's current salary is \$9,833 and no increase was requested. Pay plan calls for the prisoner in the county jail for the month of July.

The Sheriff's Department budget requested was \$24,822 up from the budget for the current fiscal year of \$21,351.

Major items of increased expenditure reported by the Sheriff to the Board of County Commissioners this morning during budget hearings were \$10,000 for radio equipment and a new washing machine for the county jail.

It was also budgeted for trade-in of five vehicles for the department, Baker's salary increase of \$900 for food for the prisoner, a request for the chief deputy of \$600 annually and for the head jailer of \$180 annually. Increase of \$900 for food for the prisoner was the county jail's request.

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Planner Asking Hike Of \$5,040

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More Planning \$\$\$ Urged By Goodin

The necessity for more detailed planning on the county level with the resulting need for a full time draftsman in his department was given as the major reason for the \$5,040 increase in the budget request of the county planning office by Jack Goodin, county planner, during budget hearings before the County Commission Tuesday afternoon.

Goodin submitted a proposed budget of \$18,240, including addition of \$4,940 for a full time draftsman, a small increase in the planning secretary's salary and an increase of \$25 for telephone allowance (no matter what you read elsewhere). . . . Last year's budget totaled \$13,200.

"The planning office has worked out well in the 19 to two years since its beginning with a skeleton staff, but now we're outgrowing it. It needs an escalation in staff," Goodin stated. "Up until now most of our work has been in the information stage. We have been working with and feeding information to the Orange-Seminole Commission and received the support of at least one of the commissioners.

Bush, while presenting his requested budget totaling \$46,062, increase of nearly \$10,000 over that of the current fiscal year, urged the dates of inspection on roads be placed in his department and that an additional employe be hired to handle the inspections.

Commissioner W. Lawrence Swoford endorsed the recommendation stating, "We should have a close inspection of the roads we are building to make sure they comply with the rules others must follow."

Bush also requested a \$1,000 annual increase in salary from his present pay of \$11,000 to \$12,000. J. C. Lavender, road department head, also requested a pay raise from \$11,000 to \$11,500.
