School Safety Tips for Motorists

Now that classes have started in the Seminole County public school system, there are 13 safety tips that the Altamonte Springs Fire Department is recommending students follow while getting to and from school,

Parents should: 1) practice the route with children; 2) choose a route with the fewest roads to cross; 3) teach children to go directly to and from school; 4) use crosswalks or corners if possible; 5) cooperate with crossing guards, and 6) stop, look both ways, and listen before crossing any road.

Other tips include 7) obey all cross-walk and traffic signals; 8) allow time for travel across major roads and highways; 9) when waiting for a bus, stay at least five feet from the roadway and scan for traffic hazards; and 10) if waiting for the bus on a dark morning or in poor weather, wear reflective clothing and be

Additional tips include 11) face traffic if walking on roads without sidewalks; 12) always wear a helmet when riding a bicycle; and 13) If a stranger is following you in a vehicle, yell for help and turn the other way.

No action taken on soup kitchen

SANFORD - Appealing for an end to the "mean-spirited attitude" in the community, Sanford City Commissioner Whitey Eckstein on Monday refused to approve a land development ordinance that he said hinders rather than supports efforts to help the needy.

Commissioners Velma Williams and A.A. "Mac" McClanahan also disapproved of Ordinance No. 3502, which would require social service agencies to gain a special exemption from the com-

Eckstein calls for residents to 'End the mean-spirited attitude'

mission before opening at sites throughout the city.

Eckstein said the ordinance "goes against everything I believe in ... If I were to die tonight, I would have to say to the Lord that I gave in to a mean-spirited attitude in this town."

Ekstein praised Jean Metts, whose social service facility at 407 W. Fourth St. instigated the complaints by residents of

the downtown historic district. Williams said that there were several "pockets of poverty" that the city needed to recognize. She said that the city ought to embrace rather than fight efforts such as those by Jean Metts. "In my opinion, this ordinance is sending a message and it is not a good one."

Annoyed, Commissioner Brady Lessard withdrew his motion for the ordinance. "I'd rather withdraw the motion than see it fail," Lessard said. "This is a zoning issue."

By a 5-0 vote, the commission opted to hold a workshop later this month.

Mayor Larry Dale argued that the ordinance wasn't intended to prohibit or deny agencies the right to serve the needy but for the city review each application "case

Dale said some areas were more conducive for such facilities to be located. He See Kitchen, Page 4A

Joshi plans to develop 41 acres

WINTER SPRINGS - Las Vegas developer Rohit Joshi told the Winter Springs Commission Monday that even though a crucial deal to purchase 436 acres of proposed town center property is on hold, he still will begin developing 41 acres of property in October.

Joshi, who is chairman of Joshi and Associates, said that 360,000 square feet of commercial and office space will be developed in the northwest corner of the proposed town center along State Road

However, Joshi and representatives of the Schrimsher Group agreed that Joshi's deal to purchase 436 acres of property from the Schrimsher group is on hold. The property lies in the northeast corner of the proposed town center.

Representatives of the Schrimsher Group said that the property is for sale to anyone, including Joshi. Joshi said that the reason he did not make a July 1 payment for the property is that the performance of a Development Impact Review study on the Schrimsher property required by the state will take about two years.

Had a July 1 payment been made, the interest on the Schrimsher property while environmental reviews are performed would have cost \$4 to \$5 million per year, Joshi said. Joshi said he intends to complete the deal with the Schrimsher Group and start construction on the property in 18 to 24 months.

However, there is also a dispute over how much the property is worth. Joshi said that the price the Schrimsher Group is asking is too high. Schrimsher

representatives said that the asking price is fair for the market. Proposed terms have not been released.

Joshi said that he wants to build apartments in the back end of the Schrimsher property, and that the Schrimsher Group is asking for commercial prices on the property.

Joshi said he still intends to develop the 900-acre town center with commercial stores, a hotel and conference center, and upscale apartments, homes and condominiums.

Joshi's April agreement with the city that enables him to purchase properties toward the town center development lasts until Oct. 1. A deposit was made on the Schrimsher property in May, Joshi said, and the deposit is still being held in escrow.

"That's the part of the puzzle that makes the town center whole," Joshi said.

Longwood adds to fire, police ranks

LONGWOOD — Pending final budget approval, Longwood city commissioners moved Monday night to bolster the ranks of the city's fire and police departments.

Fire chief Charles Chapman and public safety director Terry Baker made their pitches for more manpower at a budget workshop session and found the board in a mostly receptive

Commissioners voted 4-0 to add three fire fighters to the city payroll, the first new hires since 1991, as well as adding a new transport ambulance to the city fleet. By a vote of 3-2 the board also gave the green light to hire two additional police officers who will function in both road patrol and traffic patrol capacities.

Chapman pointed to Longwood's growing number of ambulance and fire truck calls the city has experienced and the See Longwood, Page 4A

ENTERPRISE - If there is water in heaven, Margaret Wilcox Richards probably has found it.


Mrs. Richards, 106, of Enterprise died Thursday, Aug. 5 at her home. She became a

favorite at the Golden Age Games in Sanford, winning gold medals year after year in canoeing. She competed until she was 103, failing vision prevented her from continuing.


"Mother set a wonderful example of aging gracefully," said her daughter, Mary See Richards, Page 5A



and Lessard want to revise zoning requirements that would restrict where social service agencies could be set up. The city's planners wanted it that way, too. "Soup kitchens" they said hurt the character of the historic areas.

Dale emphasized that the Jean Metts's Fourth St. facility, Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, Inc., was not affected by the ordinance. The ordinance would affect future social service facili-

Eckstein at one point looked at Dale and said, "I know you are a good fellow. I know you care

about the poor. I also know Jean Metts and know what she is doing is right." Ecksteln said all the riches in the world mean nothing if "we were to lose their souls."

Before the ordinance was withdrawn, there were complaints from a number of Historic District residents. Linda Kuhn said one of the "soupkitchen" recipients ripped off a rocking chair from her front porch. "He wasn't stealing from me because he was hungry — he was stealing because he was a thief," Kuhn said.

For more than an hour, Metts

listened to a number of residents complain that the transients who go to her facility for food urinate on their lawns, sleep under their homes and steal from them.

Art Harris was one of several residents who lauded Metts for her efforts and pleaded with the commissioners to help her.

The next hurdle for Metts is getting city approval for 10 parking spaces at the facility. "I've heard complaints that we need 50 spaces," she said. "That's absorb. Ten is more than enough. The people who come to us do not have cars. They come here on bikes or they walk."

took on in 1996 by entering the ambulance transport business.
"In 1991 our load level was

less than 2,000 calls per year," Chapman told commissioners. He added that by the end of 1999 the city might break the 4,000 call

"We're right on the bubble, close to the saturation point where our service level to residents will begin to suffer," explained Chapman. "We need to be proactive and put some things in place for the future."

Salary and benefits packages for the additional fire fighters will cost approximately \$100,000.

The board also approved the expenditure of \$190,000 for a new transport ambulance for the fire department. Chapman cited the demand load of mutual aid agreements with other municipalities and Seminole County as justification for the request.

"We currently have two ambulances. The oldest one (1965) we try to use as a back-up.

It we keep it much longer we can apply for an antique license plate," he joked. "We're wearing the wheels off if it and at times the demand leaves the city in a vulnerable position."

Commissioners discussed the addition of a new nursing home in Longwood and the likelihood of another being built in the future prior to approving the purchase.

The board also moved to increase the cost of an ambulance transport from \$211 to \$250 for responses inside the city limits to help offset the cost of the new vehicle.

Mayor Paul Lovestrand said comparing transport costs to what other municipalities currently charge gave Longwood some justification for the increase.

We are at \$211 and Medicare allows a maximum of \$280. We have increased demand and a reasonable need hyfor withe increase.",

Commissioner Dan Anderson supported that position.

'If this was a continuous bill like a monthly water bill I would have a hard time voting for it. It is more like a user fee. The majority of Longwood citizens would not be affected because and ambulance call is not an every day event, it's an extraordinary event."

The city will continue to charge the Medicare maximum of \$280 for ambulance calls outside the city limits.

Commissioner Steve Miller then made a push to boost the ranks of traffic control officers, citing the city's cost effective lease program for motorcycles.

"I see a need for more units on the street. We have some major league construction going on and more down the road," said Miller.

After discussing how best to utilize additional police, the board asked public safety director Terry Baker for his prefer-

"It depends on what the commission and city residents want," Baker replied. He acknowledged that additional traffic officers would generate more revenue for the city and agreed pending construction projects on SR 427 and Rangeline road would warrant the need.

Following lengthy discussion the board approved hiring two additional police officers that will serve as both road patrol and traffic patrol police depending on the needs of staffing and scheduling shifts at a given time. The city plans to lease an additional Harley Davidson motorcycle but will not need to purchase an additional patrol car at this

Salary and benefit packages for the additional police will cost the city approximately \$70,000. Both Chapman and Baker told

commissioners some of the cost of additional fire and police could be recouped by a reduction in budgeted overtime, additional revenue from traffic tickets, and the increase in the charge for ambulance transport.








Bullington resigns from Seminole Bar Association

By Joe DeSantis

SANFORD — Bobbi Bullington, the executive director of the Seminole County Bar Association is stepping aside

after nine years in the position.

Bullington said without a special dues assessment from the bar's 268 members, the organization is facing a revenue shortfall as a result of a decision by the Seminole County judiciary to take over the county's Civil Mediation Program in June.

The bar association has handled the administration of the program since 1993, receiving about \$28,000 per year in low cost user fees from the court system. The mediation program has handled an average of 760 cases in recent years, mostly at

the civil level for amounts of \$5,000 or less, freeing up court dockets for more substantial cases. Amid contentions and denials the mediation program was being re-assigned because of political grudges between some judges and the bar, judges notified the association in May that county staff would take over the program that has enjoyed a successful arbitration rate of about 90 percent under the bar's administration.

"It's my decision to leave," said Bullington. "It would be inappropriate of me to stay. We have a serious revenue shortfall due to the county judges removing the mediation program."

Bullington said her departure comes sometime after the logistics of a fund raising legal seminar for September are complete. "It's the logical thing to do,"

Bullington has been the association's only employee. As its executive director her annual salary was \$35,000.

Bullington said that Circuit judge Tom Freeman has offered to conduct a legal seminar in September as a fund raiser for the bar. She plans to stay on until then to help prepare for the event and insure a smooth transition.

"The seminar will provide attorneys the opportunity to meet with judges and discuss the court system and contemporary legal issues," she said. "Attorneys can meet the judges in different divisions and break



report to campus until last week had to complete 16 110yard runs in under 20 seconds, which every player was able to


Strength and conditioning coach Reese Bridgman, who put the team through its paces in the weightroom and on the field during the summer was pleased.

Saltwater guides use chumming to attract fish

guides quietly utilize the technique of chumming to literally bring fish up to the

Chum is ground-up fish that can be purchased in frozen blocks at bait and tackle shops.

Chumming is most effectively accomplished by anchoring up-current from the fish or structure, putting a block of chum in a net bag, and hanging it over the side of the boat. Tiny pieces of chum drift back, along with fish oil, and attract bottom-

dwelling fish. Chumming is most effective when done over a wreck, reef, or a similar type of bottom

SANFORD - Many saltwater - structure which attracts and holds fish.

Chumming is a very effective technique for catching bottom fish, but the position of the boat is critical. If the boat is not anchored pre-cisely up-current of the structure, the chum will not drift over the structure and attract fish.

Chums works well because the fish can see, smell and taste the tiny bits of ground up baitfish.

Once fish begin to rise to the chum line, anglers hook a piece of cut bait and "freeline" it into the chum line. It is important for the hooked bait to resemble a piece of chum drifting in the

FISHING FORECAST

Bass fishing will be as slow as it gets for the next month or so, Intense heat has pushed bass into heavy cover or into deep water, where they are very lethargic. Bream and catfish are the only specles that continue to bite on a regular basis.

Snook are roaming the beaches in large numbers just off Schastian Inlet.

These fish tend to school over rocky bottom. Boats anchor and fish with live batt for fast catch-and-release action with fish to 20 pounds. A few flounder, tarpon, redfish and trout are biting in




