

Accusations stack up against Perrotta

Buyer beware at the Orange County Convention Center Home & Garden Show this weekend.

The legal problems for Sunrooms of Florida continue to modifit, but it's business as usual, as they continue to sell sunrooms at the Home Builders Association of Mid-Florida show.

More than a dozen Central Floridians are at odds with Sunrooms Of Florida owner Josh Perrotta. Perrotta is holding an estimated \$500,000 in deposits from customers who ordered a sunroom anywhere from five

months to two years ago. Civil suits against Perrotta have already been filed in Charlotte and Osceola counties and a third suit in Lake County was filed last week.

The Show Goes On "He pulled a quick one on me," said Lake County resident Terry Jobe.

In June 2001, Jobe contracted Perrotta to build a sunroom and screened-in porch for

his home near the city of Umatilla. He worked for two days building the screened porch and "that's the last I've seen of him," obe said.

Approximately 25 phone calls and eight months later, Jobe said he still has not reached Perrotta. He filed a lawsuit last week against Perrotta for the \$28,662 he paid to Perrotta. According to state statues, if Perrotta doesn't respond to the suit Jobe

The lawsuit also implicates Four Seasons Sunrooms. Perrotta's Sunrooms of Florida is a franchisee of the international company.

"I contacted Four Seasons and this is the jerk they sent me," Jobe said. "He's representing Four Seasons."

Despite the swirling allegations about Perrotta's illegal business practices, a Home Builders Association of Mid-Florida representative said Friday that his table would not be pulled from the show.

Not only are the number of lawsuits pil-

The long-time Kiwanis Club member is a mainstay at Pancake Day. Flipping flapjacks, pouring orange juice, cleaning tables, organizing the auction — whatever needed done, Phil did.

But not today.
Phil suffered a heart attack a week ago Friday night. He had open heart surgery two days ago. He's doing well, all things considered, but attending the 38th annual Pancake Day — an event he's participated in for at least two decades — was out of

the question.

That's too bad for Phil, More importantly, it's too bad for the rest of us because Phil's the type of guy who puts the unity in community. A native of New York, Phil Gunster has integrat-ed himself into Sanford's fabric to such an extent that you'd think he grew up here. He's Sanford Proud and then some.

"For a guy who lives in DeBary, he does a whole neck or a lot more for Sanford than some of the natives," said Walt Smith, a fellow Kiwanian.

Lisa Jones concurs. As a supervisor in Sanford's Recreation Department, she relies on volunteers to help the department run smoothly. She counts on Phil, and he's at her office nearly every day, ready to

do whatever needs doing.

Open and shut decision



For two months, the back doors of JP pets remained open during business hours despite a Planning and Zoning Commission order that fall doors and windows (should be) tightly closed/secured and will remain closed at all times.

City should revoke conditional use for reptile wholesale business

How many snakes are too many? That's a question Sanford City Commissioners must answer Monday night.

In January, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved a conditional use permit for JP Pets, a wholesale business that sells snakes, lizards and other non-venomous reptiles, at 210 and 212 Sanford Avenue. Despite complaints from nearby commercial and residential property owners, P&Z granted JP Pet's owner Joe Krefetz the right to house thousands of reptiles in the Sanford Avenue business.

This is not an appropriate use of the property. The city and groups like Sanford Main Street are working to reinvigorate downtown, including Sanford Avenue, as a viable retail district. The nature of the plan includes a mix of uses. Retail stores, professional offices and restaurants are a part of the plan. The City is also encouraging residenhal development in some of the 1st Street buildings; as evidenced by the \$25,000 grant it recently awarded Dr. Sherwood Jacobson to renovate the second floor of his


building into modern apartments. Admittedly some folks are squeamish about reptiles in general, but that is not a reason to revoke JP Pets' conditional juse permit. If, for example, JP Pets' were a traditional pet store with the majority of business generated through walkin retail sales, the store would add diversity to downtown shipping options. However, JP Pets' current operation as a wholesale business doesn't is too intense for an area of the city that has traditionally been a retail center.

That's not to say that the city should dictate Mr. Krefetz's business plan. He obviously has decided to make his living in the wholesale market, as is his right. He should, however, relocate his business to an area better suited for this enviroliment, the airport for example, or the Port of Sanford or NorthStar industrial park.


Infortunately, the inappropriate land use is not the only issue before the city commission. Krefetz has failed to follow the planning commission's regulations. One of the six conditions imposed upon the business is the demand that all doors and windows be tightly secured and closed at all tirles. The planning commission instituted the regulation because adjacent property owners complained of lizards and snakes escaping from the business.

Clearly that has not occurred. Repeated observations of the business during the two months since the P&Z issued the conditional use permit indicate that employees disregald this regulation.

The city commission should revoke the conditional use. It should also direct city staff to help Mr. Krefetz to identify a more appropriate place to locate his business. By doing that, commissioners can maintain the land use integrity downtown while helping a small businessman continue to add to the city tax base. Who isn't in favor of that?





The Way We Were: The history of Southern Bell in Sanford, part 3

We continue today with memories of Southern Bell Hurricane employees as edited from the booklet "Sanford Telephone Pioneer History 1915-1983.

Avis Starnes began working for Southern Bell right out of school in 1954 and first worked nights in the 1st Street Building. One night a pair of cords had

been up for a long time, so she monitored the connection and heard two distinct anores. Both parties had fallen asleep. Frances

Traffic and Assignment. One of her memories in Sanford was of the "Squad Car." Almost every morning the bosses would go for coffee, usually at the Pinecrest Inn, and the car they used was fondly called the Squad Car. When it was out, the underlings relaxed.

Raiph Patten came to Sanford in 1957 from Iowa. On his first day, he was taken out to the Sanford Naval Air Station and told "It's all yours." Much of his time was spent at the base, but he also installed the first switchboard at Seminole Memorial Hospital and at the Florida State Bank.

He also recalled Hurricane Donna, which knocked down so many poles. One of his jobs during that time took him down French Avenue where he installed ringers in each business so they could have service even though the power was off.

He and Britt Yates then rode into the rural areas of Sanford looking for downed wires, poles, etc. When she first started with

Donna through, Elizabeth Harman came in to help. They had a very busy night. Glenn McKendrick came in to

She recalled that

take them home the next morning in a company truck. There was so much flooding, he couldn't get through to her house, so she had to wade the rest of the way in knee-deep water.

Mr. McKendrick remembers it a little differently. He states that he volunteered to spend the night in the telephone office. The next morning there were three operators who needed transportation home, so he took them in his 1941 Chevy. He states that he had to stop on Summerlin Avenue at the railroad tracks and watched while a lady walked for several blocks in knee-deep water. The flooding was also bad out West 1st Street and Country Club Road.

Libby Mossman remembered hurricane (she didn't give it a name) when Mr. Turner and Mr. Penners hung tarpaulins over the switchboard as the roof was known to leak. It didn't take long for the tarp to fill with water, but neither the equipment nor the the operators got

Mr. Heard had the privilege of installing the first concentrator in Southern Bell. The Osteen customers had so much noise in their line that they couldn't even hear the dial tone. After three weeks of hard work and long hours, the installation was completed and the problem was solved.

Bill Slayback recalls taking coffee breaks at the Pig 'n Whistle. The employees weren't supposed to gang up in the same place, so one day the supervisor came by and took the keys from all the Bell trucks. They were surprised when they went to leave, but they learned a lesson.

Art Lee, who transferred here from Michigan in 1960, worked in installation, PBX, Central Office #5, Crossbar and E6S, etc. He remembers the installation

came new addition to the 9th Street office which ended the need for operators. He believed that was in 1964.

> Ralph Patten remembers during the Bay of Pigs invasion in 2 1961, Herb Watson, Warren Penners, David McGillis and Patten were at the Navy base for days. Military personnel were arriving constantly and people wanted a telephone behind every bush.

Bobby Heard smiles when her remembers the addition to !! the 9th Street building. There was a water problem and efforts had been made to correct the problem. But when he entered the building one day, water, came out like a "magic carpet."

The call that Geneva Owen remembered the most was made in the new dial office on 9th Street. The first signal she answered was a surprise --"Operator, could you tell me how to dial the dash?"

Thomas McElroy told of the Sanford Ploneers. When he came to Sanford from Orlando in 1973, he found that they had 12 1 no Pioneer group. They were 2011 affiliated with the Orlando 175 group, but only a fewicto Sanfordites attended any of the functions. Maxine Henn, chief operator, lobbied for a group } and with the help of Paul Higgs of the state organization, Sanford became a Pioneer Club. Maxine was the first president; and McElroy was the second. (Russ Kitner recalls that he was the first president).

McElroy recalled some of the notable Sanford Pioneer pro-uri iects. One was participation in the the first "Clean up the Wekiva," at which time they floated down the river, pulling trash out and taking it to Katie's it Landing.

They also cleaned up the black cemetery in Sanford that had been sadly neglected and raised funds to help build the boardwalk through the Sanford 14 Zoo wetlands.

Popular grass needs careful selection to thrive

St. Augustine grass is one of the most popular turfgrasses in Central Florida. Its tolerance to shade makes it very attractive for use in heavy

landscaped gardens. Cultivars differ in their tolerance to plant pests, cold damage, and shade; you must know those differences in order to select the best cultivar for your particular needs.

Fertilization

A good all purpose lawn fertilizer for the spring is a 16-4-8 with a slow release form of nitrogen, preferable with micronutrients. Always follow the rule that nitrogen should be applied at a rate of 1 pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. Therefore, if you use a 16-4-8 fertilizer, you need to apply 6.25 pounds per 1,000 square feet or, if you use a 10-10-10 fer-

tilizer, you will need 10 pounds. A high maintenance fertilizer program will require 4 fertilizer applications per year. For central Florida, it means one in March, May, July, and September. Iron may be applied in the summer (June) to give the grass a better color, specially, if some yellowing appears in your lawn.

Apply 2 ounces of ferrous sulfate in 3 to 5 gallons of water per 1,000 square feet or use a chelated form of iron as Indicated In the label.

Irrigation

Watering your lawn may be a tricky business, if you water too

much you can promote diseases or if you do not water enough you can encourage insect build

up or poor growth of your lawn. You should irrigate only when needed, generally, when the grass blades begin to wilt. Apply 3/4 inches of water and do not water again until wilting starts to occur.

Ferrer

Weed Control A general rule to fol-

low in weed control is to apply a pre-emergence herbicide around Feb. 15 and post-emergence herbicides in May as needed. Do not apply herbicides if the turf is under stress of water or if air temperatures exceed 85 degrees.

Mowing is a very important practice and many problems arise because of improper mowing practices. Mow the lawn at 3 inches on regular varieties and 2 inches on semi-dwarf varieties. Do not remove more than 1/3 of the leaf blade in each mowing.

Make sure that the blades are sharp during the mowing opera-tion, otherwise the leaf blades will be injured more than necessary and the recovery may be slow and predispose the plant to other problems.

Pests and Diseases

St. Augustine grass is affected by many insect and disease problems. Learning to recognize their symptoms is important

because if the damage is allowed to continue for a long period of time, the problem could be more difficult to control and the damage could become very expen-

Chinch bugs are probably one of the most important insects in St. Augustine grass. The best way to control them is to use resistant varieties such as Floratam or Floralawn. There are known cases of chinch bug damage to these cultivars and therefore you should be alert of this insect even if you have a resistant variety.

Brown patch occurs in warm, humid weather (spring and fall months) and is associated with excessive nitrogen levels. Gray leaf spot occurs during the summer rainy season and it is also associated with high nitrogen

The use of fertilizers containing slow release forms of nitrogen can be used to minimize the damage caused by these diseases. Fungicides can also be used to control these diseases. Another disease, known as takeall disease, has been reported frequently in St. Augustine and other grasses. This particular disease is harder to diagnose and very difficult to control.

It is usually necessary to replace damaged turf.

Clippings show life in the early days of Seminole County

The Museum of Seminole County History collects and stores wonderful artifacts concerning the history of Seminole County. One of our recent ongoing projects is collecting articles from old newspapers, wherever we can find them.

We have stumbled across some wonderful and enlightening articles that pertain to different areas in our county and we would like to share them with our readers. These articles have been copied from micro-film, then typed and stored in a notebook and open for the public to view. When this project is completed we should have a daily record of what was happening in our little settlements throughout the county in the 1880s. This project is expected

to be completed in 3-4 years. Most of the information has been taken from the 1800's Times Union Newspaper from lacksonville. This was the state newspaper for Florida estab-lished in 1865. It started off printing once a month and then once a week , and then daily etc. The paper is still in existance today.

We feel that by recreating these bits and pieces of history in the Herald today, the information would inform, clear up mysteries, entertain and help veryone — from the Florida rackers to newcomers - to etter understand our humble eginnings. 





ing up against Perrotta, but so is evidence that he committed forgery and fraud in Seminole County.

Allegations of Forgery

Cindy and Dana Hoyt of Apopka ordered a sunroom from Perrotta on March 15, 2001. A year and \$10,000 later they still have no sunroom. The Hoyts found something interesting when they went looking at the Seminole County building permit obtained by Perrotta - someone forged Dana's signature.

The signature appeared on the building permit as well as the contractor's signature. Also grabbing the Hoyts attention was the contractor's name. Not Josh Perrotta, but instead Alvin Bailey of Punta Gorda.

They wondered why Perrotta's name wasn't listed as the contractor. That's simple, according to Tom Forbes, Seminole County deputy building official. Perrotta is not a contractor. Perrotta uses Bailey's license, which is not illegal, but Forbes said it is against state statues if the contract does not stipulate Bailey as the contrac-

"He's putting himself out there as a contractor and he's not," he said.

A document filed with the county for notice of commence-

ment on the Hoyts' surroom does name Bailey as the contractor. Cindy Hoyt said when she and her husband reviewed the document it was blank. An original document held by the Hoyts reads Sunrooms Of Florida across the top, but that portion was apparently whited out when it was turned into the county.

The homeowner's signature wasn't even required on the building permit because of a previously filed power of attorney document.

"There's no reason to forge it," Forbes said.

Oddly enough, Bailey's signatures between the power of attorney document and the building permit also differ.

Another family from Lake Mary is upset their sunroom hasn't been constructed after contracting Perrotta a year ago. They confirmed signatures were forged for

city of Lake Mary building permit. "Someone notarized my wife's signature and it wasn't even my wife's signature," the Lake Mary homeowner said.

built without a permit and Hoyt said her old screened-in porch was tom down without a permit.

The county building department is in a reorganization phase. Currently there are six different regulatory boards. That could change next month when county commissioners are expected to vote April 23 to create one single 11-member board. Until then, hearings for Perrotta's permit violations may be put on hold.

"Of all our contractors in the county this is atypical," Forbes said about the problems with Perrotta.

Joane Hodge of Longwood contracted Perrotta to build a sunroom five months ago. Her old screened in porch was forn down without a permit, Forbes said. Hodge is also the leader in uniting all the unhappy Sunrooms of Florida customers.

She reports her house was broken into last week and as many as 12 documents pertaining to the sunroom were allegedly stolen. Hodge and several other cus-

tomers also report that they received a phone call from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office last week.

Hodge and several other customers had previously reported Perrotta's bad business practices to the sheriff's office. Home owners were advised hat the sheriff's office would no longer be the lead investigator. A statewide economic crime investigator, George Cumingham, is leading the inves-tigation. Cunningham was unavailable for comment Friday.

"mixed emotions" about the merger. He said he was worried the merger could result in loss of services for the city.

"The big thing is it appears the services aren't going to be diminished in any way," Rose said.
"That's what we want to

ensure, that city residents are receiving the same service," Wolfram said.

Only three city fire department employees could lose their jobs as a result of the merger. The position of fire chief would be eliminated Oct. 1, the deputy fire chief would be slowly eliminated as he would help facilitate the transi-

tion and the city would retain one existing administrative employee. The elimination of the fire chief is not substantial since the chief is planning to retire, said Rose.

The merger study also details several future capital improvements. The city and county had both planned to build a new fire station near the area of state roads 436 and 434. By combining the facilities, a projected \$5.9 million will be saved as only one station will be constructed.

Commissioner Sarah Reece said another issue that appears to be resolved is if the city firefighters were going to get the same or better benefits with the county.

"We don't want to just look at this as saving the city money," she said. "My concern is how do the firefighters feel about it."

According to the study, city firefighters that moved into the county fire department would receive basically the same insurance, retirement plans and pay. Commissioner Patricia Freeman noted another possible benefit. She said many Altamonte Springs firefighters do not live in the city and by moving to the county fire department they could perhaps be transferred to a county fire station closer to their home.

The largest problem may occur in the city's ongoing union contract negotiations with the city firefighters. City commissioners will be try again to resolve that issue at an April 30 meeting.

To me the county is not a done deal until everything is signed on the dotted line," Freeman said about the contract negotiations. "I'll certainly be looking at it from that standpoint."

Although several details need to be worked out such as what becomes of the city owned fire stations and land, Mayor Russ Hauck believes those issues can be worked out.

"If we can work out the details we're prepared to move pretty quickly," he said. "I just don't see any show stoppers from the city's perspective."

When the streak reached five games on Wednesday, coach Mike Powers, while never wanting to lose, was probably hoping for a nice steady rain or something as his charges were starting to


get a little ripe.





It doesn't take a golden goose to uncover this gem of a recipe: Provencal Style Pork Roast. A gourmet meal that takes virtually no preparation time, tastes great and virtually cooks itself (no basting, I promise).

This Easter, wow your guests and family with Roasted Potatoes and Broccoli Gratin. It tastes delectable. Your guests will wonder how you did it. When you see how easy it is, you will wonder why you haven't thought of it before now.

There is one great dessert done on top of the stove that does not require constant

attention. Pears poached in red wine is a favorite dessert in my house. The key is reducing the poaching liquid into a succulent syrup. Serve with a little cinnamon

whipped cream and you have a winner!

Caution: Once you serve this dessert, be prepared to make it often. Seriously, people go crazy for this one. Don't say I didn't warn you!o taste

A little note about kitchen equipment. If Culinary you don't own a good roasting pan, you should consider getting one. They are



Broccoli Gratin

1 lb Broccoli florets

2 eggs One medium onion, sliced

thinly 1 TB butter

1/2 cup cream

1/4 tsp. nutmeg 8 ounces grated cheddar cheese

Salt and pepper to taste.

Clean and cut broccoli into florets. Discard the tough stems. Blanch in boiling, salted water for about five minutes. Remove from pot and drain. Set aside to dry.

Saute onion in the butter until just translucent. Remove from heat. Set aside.
Mix together eggs, cream,

nutmeg, salt and pepper in a small bowl.

In a 12 x12 deep baking dish, put a layer of the onion, a layer of the broccoli, another layer of onion etc. until all is used up. Pour egg/cream mixture over, cover and place in oven with the roast about one hour before the roast is done. Fifteen minutes before the roast is done, take out gratin, uncover and add the cheese on top. Place, uncovered back in oven, until top is toasted and bubbly. Allow to cool slightly before serving. Serves 6 to 8.

Pears Poached in Red Wine with Cinnamon Whipped

© Elizabeth Dougherty 2002 6 Bosc or Bartlett pears, not too ripe.

1/2 bottle of 750 ml. red wine (not cooking wine)

2 cloves

1/4 tsp. nutmeg

ten cinnar 1/4 cup granulated sugar

Cinnamon Whipped Cream I cup heavy whipping

2 - 4 TB confectioners sugar 1/4 tsp. Cinnamon

Wash and peel pears leaving them whole and stems intact.


Place them in large sauce pan with wine, adding water until the liquid reaches at least halfway up the sides of the pears. Add spices and sugar. Bring to a boil and then, simmer uncovered for about an hour. Occasionally, turn pears so all sides are positing evenly. When you can easily insert a knife into the pears, they are done. Remove pears, let them cool slightly and then refrigerate them. (This can be done the day before) Turn up heat and begin boiling the poaching liquid. Reduce, reduce, reduce until the liquid is down to about 1/4 cup. Set

Take out whipped cream from refrigerator and let it sit at room temperature for a few minutes. Whip cream at a moderate speed until it just starts to take shape. Stop mixer and add sugar and cinnamon. Continue mixing at a moderate speed until soft peaks form.

Serve each person one pear, with sauce drizzled on top and a dollop of whipped cream. (It's nice if the sauce is still warm but not necessary.

Serves 6.

Monday morning SCSO Chief Deputy Steve Harriett and County Commission Chairman Daryl McLain helped christen the new designation. Project SafePlace

is a national program that helps youth under the age of 18 find temporary shelter during crises. Kids may go to a SafePlace site if they feel threatened, scared or fear harm.

"It seems very fitting, giving our focus on the community's youth, for the sheriff's office to be by the state to provide to the area.

In 1997, fire station No. 35 was the first designated SafePlace site in Seminole County. Today, more than 35 Seminole County businesses and public locations display the yellow SafePlace logo including RaceTrack gas stations and all the fire halls.

Girls and Boys Town of Central Florida work in conjunction with the national Project Safe Place to help administer SafePlace sites in the area. The group has helped more than 12,000 children in Central Florida.

"By 2003, we hope to have 50 SafePlace sites in Seminole County," said Mary Kate O'Leary of Girls and Boys Town of Central Florida.

Future locations could include hospitals and other 24-hour service stations, she said. The Girls and Boys Town helps coordinate sites by training employees on how to help children in need. The local organization also distributes the large black and yellow placards
