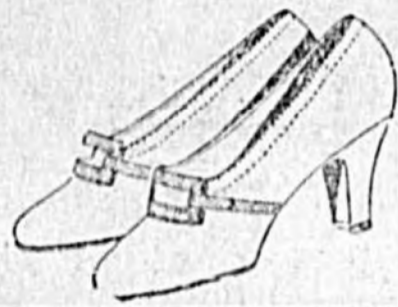

Tampa To Get \$5,000,000 Cement Manufacturing Plant Within Short Time

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April 15. (INS) — Another industry within the next few months to Florida's growing list of achievements, according to Charles A. McKeand, assistant to the president of a large Chicago engineering company.

Florida has never produced a sack of Portland cement within her own borders yet the state is wealthy in raw material and is consuming the product at a rate of more than 5,000,000 barrels a year, McKeand said while visiting here.

His company, he stated, has been for more than a year building a cement plant at Tampa at a cost of \$5,000,000 which will utilize barrels of high quality Portland cement.

Since 1903 the United States Geological Survey has known of the high quality of Florida rock and clay for the manufacture of Portland cement but not until recent years did the state become a great cement consuming territory, he re-

lated, and it was not until then, after his company had conducted comprehensive tests, including actual manufacture of cement from a carload of Florida material, that it was decided on the cement undertaking in this state. These tests, he said, disclosed that cement made of Florida raw material would more than meet government standards and private specifications.

While the new Florida industry will rank with the leading mills in the country, it will be able to produce only about one fourth of the present state demand, and new uses for the product are developing almost daily, McKeand asserted. He pointed out that Florida also is in a favorable position for export to countries in central and south America.

McKeand's company is developing rock and clay properties at Brooksville from which 375,000 tons of raw material will be needed annually to operate the plant.

tion. This is provided for in the bill, which is no change from the present law.

"The bill further provides that, if the acreage tax is not sufficient to pay the interest on the bonded indebtedness and to create a sinking fund, the board is authorized to levy an ad valorem tax on the land to a sufficient amount to apply with the present drainage tax to keep up the payment of the interest on the bonds and create the sinking fund.

"The bill also provides that all moneys derived from the sale of internal improvement lands in the area; and also all moneys collected from mortgages that the state now has on internal improvement lands in the area to be held by the internal improvement fund in a separate account and can be used only to pay the state's taxes on the state's land in the area, which are now going in accordance with the present law; also to pay the ad valorem tax, if it is necessary to levy such, in order to create the sinking fund and pay the interest on the outstanding bonds.

The governor said that the bill also provides that 25 per cent of all internal improvement lands be paid into the state school fund and that any residue left of the payment of this and all other taxes, be kept in a separate account to be paid in trust until all bonds are payable against the area and that if the drainage tax and the ad valorem tax are not sufficient to keep up the interest and meet the principal when it becomes due, that this residue may be used for that purpose. The residue, after all bonds and interest have been paid, goes into the state treasury.

"In substance, these are the terms and arrangements I have made with the financiers to advance this money for the reclamation of the Glades, making it stand on its basis and only giving them a

fair guarantee of the return of their money with reasonable interest, and in no wise bringing the state of Florida in for any tax or any additional area, the governor said. "I have their assurance that they will take the bonds if this is done and I am satisfied the financing of the Everglades is settled if this bill is enacted into law.

"With due modesty and proper consideration, keeping in mind that the question of legislation is solely in your hands, the exigencies of the occasion demand that I say to you frankly that this bill has been drawn by some of the best legal talent in Florida and with the attorneys of these financiers and in no wise commits the state of Florida beyond what I have stated, and if it is altered in any way it will possibly upset the whole financial arrangement that I have negotiated for the financing of the area. If it is adopted I am sure that the reclamation of the Glades is settled.

"If, in your judgment, it should not be approved, I am at a loss to make further recommendations to you as to what should be done with the project. To my mind, the arrangements are most satisfactory, not taxing the state, not taking in more area, making it stand on its own basis and its own merit, and settling the financial troubles which have, for 24 years, harassed the people of this state and succeeding legislatures, as well as the board.

"This terminates the finances of the project and should be dealt with separately and distinctly from the physical work. The drainage board now has a commission of the best engineers in America going over the entire work and I expect to have from them a report as to whether the work has been done properly to date, with their recommendations as to how it should be concluded. When this report is received, I shall send it to you for your information.

"If the legislature feels that a new board should be created, taking the matter out of the hands of the state officials, then it will be useless to proceed further with the present financial arrangements. If a new board is created in response

United States Not Pleased With Note On Nanking Affair

king is regarded by State Department officials as a piece of bluff and incorporated largely for home consumption. Nevertheless, it is admitted that the shelling of Nanking makes the determination of actual damage to foreign property a difficult matter. The Chinese can claim, and doubtless will, that some of the damage to foreign property for which the powers demand indemnity and reparation actually was caused by the shelling by foreign warships.

SHANGHAI, Apr. 15.—(INS)—The Chinese Nationalists' reply to the American note protesting against the Nanking anti-foreign outrages on March 24 proposes a joint American-Chinese Nationalist commission of inquiry to investigate responsibility for the attacks, postponing punishment until guilt is definitely established, it was learned today.

Eugene Chen, foreign minister in the Cantonese government at Hankow, handed the Chinese answer to the United States consul at Nanking Thursday.

Minister Chen says that the Nationalists are preparing to indemnify the United States for damage to the American consulate at Nanking regardless of the identity of the persons causing the damage, because the consulate, which is upon Chinese soil, was violated.

As regards preparation for personal injuries and other material damage to the consulate, the note states that the Nationalists are ready to make "reasonable and necessary" reparations, except where it can be proved that the damages were caused by the American and British bombardment or by northern soldiers.

The note declares that the demand for punishment of the perpetrators of the crime is not to be applied to the appeals of some of the people in and around the area, probably they will be able to arrange for financial help on a different basis. But I am unable to finance it by a change of the personnel of the board, much as I would like to do and give them a voice in the conduct of its affairs.

"The project must be completed; the area must be reclaimed. Its immense advantage to this state can hardly be calculated. The state of Florida began it and we must see it successfully concluded. Its financing has been the greatest problem. The enormous work that develops upon me as governor is hardly realized, yet if it be the will of the legislature that I should continue to battle with these problems, I shall cheerfully do so and give my best efforts for the permanent reclamation of the area, leaving it as a monument to the name of the man who began it and to the state that has carried it on."

patrols is a resumption of national guilt and that, while this presumption is contradicted by the preliminary inquiry, the Nationalist government is still making an investigation and proposes that punishment be withheld by an international commission to be created by the Nationalists and the United States.

Chen's reply says that, as the laws of nations and civilized practices prohibit the bombardment of a city or territory of a friendly state, it is proposed that the commission also investigate "the bombardment of unfortified Nanking by United States forces." The document suggests an apology, but says that the Nationalist administration will await the determination of guilt.

Effective measures are promised to protect foreign lives and properties in the future. But the document emphasizes that the "best guarantee of effective protection would be removal of the fundamental causes of the present 'trouble relations'—namely, unequal treaties."

The city was quiet today, interest centering upon Nanking where Gen. Chiang Kai Shek, Gen. Pei Chung Hsi, Show Feng Chi and others are attending the all important Kuomintang conference.

This meeting, it is believed, will result in an open split between the conservatives and the Communists. If this comes to pass it is understood Gen. Chiang plans to establish a new government ignoring both Wuhan and Peking administrations.

that went on in the legations. The police are still holding 35 Chinese Communists arrested at the time of the raid. Nineteen others were released.

The Soviet charge d'affaires, who was recalled last Saturday by the Moscow government as a result of the embassy raid, has asked the Chinese foreign office for passports for himself and the principal embassy secretaries. Minor attaches already have departed.

The Peking government has called the Chinese charge d'affaires at Moscow the text of the reply to the Soviet note protesting against the embassy raid. This answer declares that the diplomatic immunity of the embassy could not be extended to activities subversive of the Peking government and that such activities had been carried on within the embassy premises.

Chinese police still occupy the Soviet embassy compound and Russian property which was seized has not been released.

Aviator Has Narrow Escape From Death

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(INS)—Lieut. S. A. McClellan, marine corps flyer, was travelling so fast today doing a nose dive from 4,000 feet that the flipper and wings of his airplane were torn off.

McClellan jumped in a parachute to within 15 feet of the Potomac River, then released himself and dove head first into the water. He swam safely to shore, sustaining only slight bruises in the fall.

It was estimated that the plane was making a speed of more than 300 miles an hour when the accident occurred.

SOUTH CAROLINA LAW FIGHT OPEN SOON

Observance Laws As Enforced Have Been Object Of Battle Begun Liberal Thinking Group

COLUMBIA, S. C., Apr. 13.—(INS) South Carolina, probably the only state in the South where the law forces are planned to stage the Sunday observance laws, is expected to open a legal battle with the Association Opposed to the Enforcement of the Sunday Laws, a national organization, according to Linn A. Adams, president of the organization.

Start Test Case
The test case at Asheville, Ga., is expected to be the first Sunday baseball game or other sports. Should the spectators be arrested, they would appeal to the courts.

Bill Is Defeated
The bill would have placed the South Carolina prohibition sale of gasoline, smokes and drinks on Sunday.

Legislature Overwhelmingly Opposed
The legislature overwhelmingly opposed the bill in so far as it applied to the state as a whole, and the bill finally went unamended so as to apply only to the city of Asheville.

AMERICAN FLIERS PLAN TO REGAIN MAJOR RECORDS

Review Of Records Shows France Holding 33, Italy 21 And United States 11; Germany Makes Big Strides

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(INS) American fliers are planning to regain the major air records for the United States.

"We feel sure that nearly every air record that the United States has lost will be won back before the end of the year," Porter H. Adams, president of the National Aeronautic Association, told International News Service today.

With two records retaken in one day through the great endurance flight of Bert Acost and Clarence Chamberlain at New York and the altitude record for a C-2 airplane made by Lieut. George Henderson of the navy, Adams declared that the American public would be aroused by other great feats to be attempted soon.

"The National Aeronautic Association has been consulted with regard to many contemplated efforts to establish new world air records," said Adams. "These plans are confidential for the present, but I expect 1927 to be a wonderful year for American aviation."

Navy fliers are known to be considering another Hawaiian flight to retrieve the heroic but memorable failure of Commander John Rodgers and his fellow aviators. It is possible that the flight may be made this year. Civilian air enthusiasts are said to be planning an American entry in the Schneider Cup races to be held at Venice, Italy, next September, to recover the laurels navy fliers lost last year at Norfolk, Va.

American supremacy in air records reached its high pitch after the war but Europeans have been gradually taking records away until on March 1 the Federation Aeronautique Internationale credited the United States with but 11 out of 89 major records. The standing was France 33; Italy 21; United States, 11; Switzerland, 7; Germany 4.

During the last year Italy and Germany have made great strides in aeronautics, experts say. Since March 1 five of the French records have been transferred to Germans.

DESTROYERS SENT TO CHINA
MANILA, P. I., Apr. 15.—(INS) A rush order from Admiral C. S. Williams, in command of the American forces in the Orient, sent the destroyers Simpson and McCormack at full steam for Shanghai today.

The Blackhawk and Macleish, now undergoing repairs, will be sent to China by Monday or Tuesday and earlier if possible.

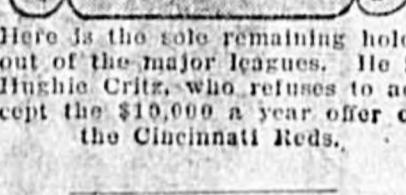
Prohibition Is Joke Says Chas. Schwab

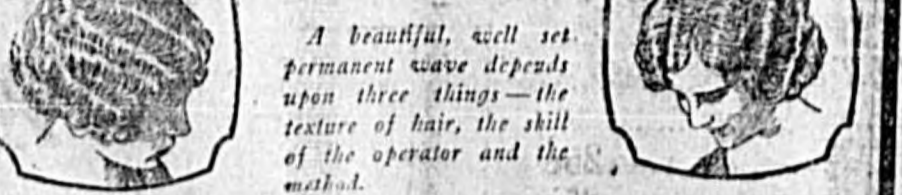
