Decline In National Economy Shows Signs Of Nearing Bottom

WASHINGTON (UP)—The decline in the national economy showed new signs today of nearing or touching bottom.

From this low plateau government economists hoped for upward movement in the not too distant future although no responsible official would predict exactly when an upturn would start.

Industrial production, one of the key measures of the current slump, declined again in March according to Federal Reserve Board estimates. The rate of decline was less than in February.

The Labor Department reported today work was begun on 79,000 new homes and apartments in March, an increase from the "unusually low" February figure of 64,000, but still 8 per cent below the figure for March, 1967. The department predicted a bigger pickup in coming months due to a sizeable increase in March applications for GI or FHA-insured home loans.

Until the Eisenhower administration gets a better fix on the mood of Congress and until new figures are received some weeks hence on business activity in April, there is no indication of a change in the President's basic policies toward the recession.

Outside the administration, economists and officials of private organizations continued to argue for speedy action by Congress.

Sen. Paul M. Douglas (D-Ill.) said "I can see no sign of a pickup and if the decrease in industrial production continues at this rate, we will have a decline of 30 per cent in one year."

In years past industrial production usually has run comparatively low in April and May. This meant that figures for this month might see another slight decline.

MIAMI (UP)—The Miami Weather Bureau today issued a tornado alert for central Florida this afternoon.

The severe weather forecast also warned that the area would be raked by severe thunder storms.

A few severe thunder storms with one or two isolated tornadoes are expected from 12 noon EST until 6 p. m. in the central portion of Florida south of the Cross City-Daytona Beach line and north of the Fort Meyers-Palm Beach line, the advisory said.

The message that central Florida has been alerted for the severe thunderstorms was received by the Seminole County Sheriff's office from DeLand. The alert was relayed to DeLand from Daytona Beach.

A check of the barometer at noon today revealed that the reading was 29.78 and falling.

However, thunderstorms and tornadoes do not occur until the barometer drops to approximately 29.4. It has been explained.

Sanford is in the area alerted for the thunder storms and severe weather but it is expected that the tornadoes, if they do occur, will be confined to the East Coast between Daytona Beach and Palm Beach.

At noon today, there was an overcast, and some occasional slight rain, with sun occurring intermittently. There was no indication from cloud formations that either thunderstorms or tornadoes would be occurring.

Such Sanford radio stations alerted alerting their listeners on the possibilities of thunderstorms and tornadoes.

Sanford immediately on receipt of bulletin from wire services. It was reported earlier that television stations are also broadcasting the alert as a public service.

The Weather Bureau, according to United Press, said one unconfined tornado was reported by the Highway Patrol 25 miles south of Tampa near the Hillsborough-Manatee county line.

A possible second tornado was reported in the Mullet Key area near the entrance to Tampa Bay. The location was about the same place where an Air Force B-47 jet bomber went down about an hour earlier in the Gulf of Mexico.

The Highway Patrol reported that winds of 83 miles per hour hit Mullet Key during the morning.

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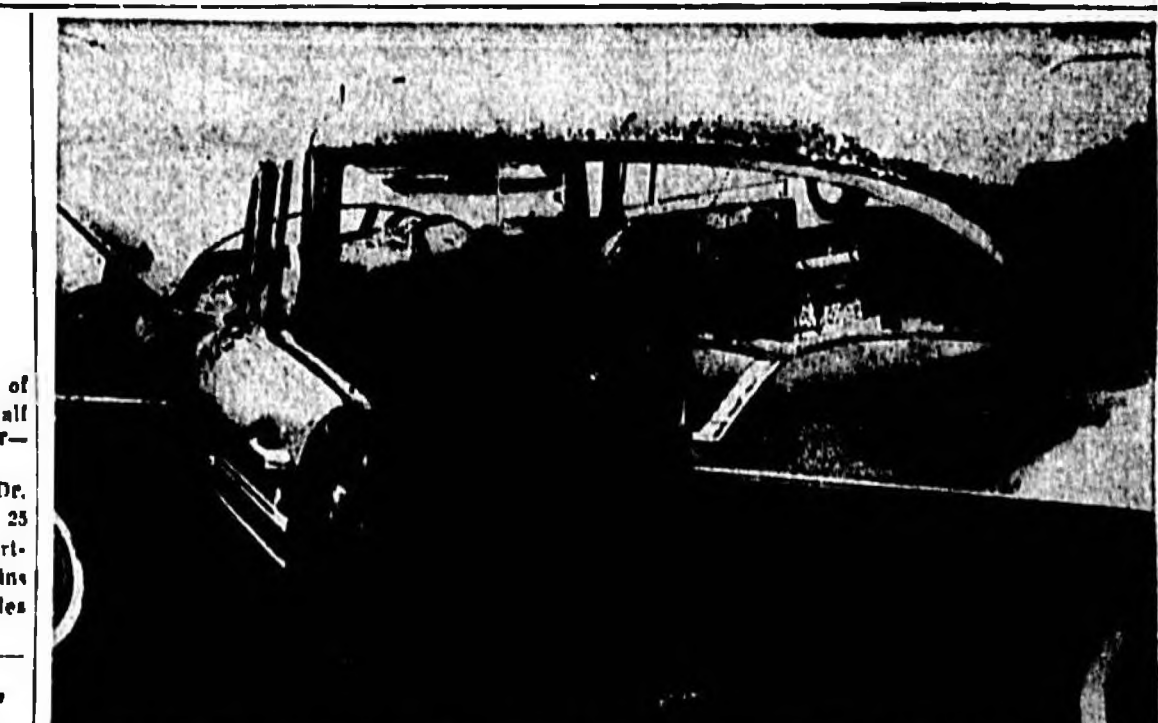

Gunman Nets Only \$45 In Armed Robbery

The armed robbery of a French Ave. service station netted the Negro gunman only \$45, Chief Roy G. Williams of the Sanford Police Department said this morning.

B. S. Hinson, operator of an Amoco Service Station at French Ave. and 24th St. was counting his money last night at 10:17 when a "brown skin" Negro, as he was described, came in and held him up at the point of a pistol.

Hinson was locked in a back room of the service station, told to "be quiet" while the gunman made his escape.

The entire Sanford Police Department and Sheriff J. L. Hobby and his deputies rushed to the scene immediately in an attempt to pick up the Negro gunman in the vicinity.

However, at noon today, the Negro was still at large and had not been apprehended.

Hinson was able to furnish the law enforcement officers a fairly complete description of his assailant.

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Pre-Summit Talks To Start Thursday

LONDON (UP)—The United States, Britain and France drafted notes today in Russia agreeing to begin pre-summit diplomatic talks in Moscow on Thursday.

A British foreign office spokesman said the three Western allies completed the drafts of the notes today and that they probably will be delivered in Moscow Wednesday.

The note agrees to a meeting of the U. S., British and French ambassadors with Soviet foreign office officials to lay the groundwork for a summit conference.

The North Atlantic Council approved the text of the notes earlier today and work on them was completed today by a special U. S. short notice in asking for the talks.

In Moscow, Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev talked at length during a Kremlin reception Monday night with U. S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson and French Ambassador Maurice Dejean. Informed sources said the conversation dealt with preparations for a summit conference.

The Big Three note was drafted in reply to a Soviet proposal calling for four-power ambassadorial talks beginning in Moscow Thursday to set up a foreign ministers' conference. The foreign ministers' session, in Moscow's plan, would be followed by a summit conference whether or not the ministers made progress toward narrowing East-West differences on such issues as disarmament and German reunification.

Insist on Progress
The United States and its allies have insisted that lower-level preliminary talks must go into issues and make progress before they will agree to a summit conference. Russia has tried to limit preliminaries to discussing time, place and composition of a summit conference.

City Fathers Get 'Down To Business' On Annexation

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners "got down to business" last night in the matter of considering the annexing of areas adjacent to the city limits.

Commissioners called for a list of property owners in sections "A" and "B", areas that had been designated by the group being adjacent to the city limits.

"Before we could set up any plan," said Commissioner David Gatchel, "we would have to know the number of property owners, the number of owners of vacant property, the owners of residential homes, and the owners of business or commercial property."

"Until that point," said Gatchel, "we are pretty well tied. At that time we will set the boundaries for annexation."

He explained that "Then and only then would we set up step by step, our program of providing service to the property owners in the area or areas designated."

The City Manager and the City Clerk were instructed to secure the lists of property owners for commissioners and that the county be requested to furnish them.

"We have got to know what we are dealing with before we can consider boundaries, services, or any question concerning annexation," said Commissioner A. L. Wilson.

VAH-5 Is Leading In Weapons Meet

The Savage Sons of Sanford have started in a better than two to one lead in the Heavy Attack phase of the All-Naval Weapons Meet at El Centro, Calif.

The local squadron, representing the East Coast in competition with the West Coast, has scored heavily in the first day of competition.

After simulated radar bombing runs on the western cities of Los Angeles, Phoenix and Salt Lake City and a celestial navigation leg

of more than 700 miles, the Sanford Squadron totalled 4817 points to 2005 points for their rivals.

Leading the Savage Sons, and the weapons meet, was VAIL-5 Crew Cdr. C. O. Donnad III, T. H. Walton ATC, and R. J. Blessener AM3. In one day they have the top scores on individual targets, total targets, navigation and total score. Three more days of competition are to follow.

Two VAIL-5 Skywarriors brought back the news in two record breaking coast to coast unofficial speed records. The former record of three hours and 28 minutes was shattered twice in one night.

LeDr. Louis "B" Hoop Jr. with Bombardier Ena. Don Lupton and Third Crewman W. A. Wheaton A43, first raced the 2,000 mile distance in three hours and 16 minutes.

Less than two hours later, LeDr. Leas Taft sped from San Diego to Sanford in the amazing time of three hours and 14 minutes. Taft, with his crew of Lt. (jg) A. J. McCarthy and W. C. Schultz A42 hit speeds of over 700 miles per hour to establish the unofficial record.

The competing VAIL-5 Detachment left Sanford for San Diego Thursday, April 10 to represent the Atlantic Fleet in the Weapons Meet.

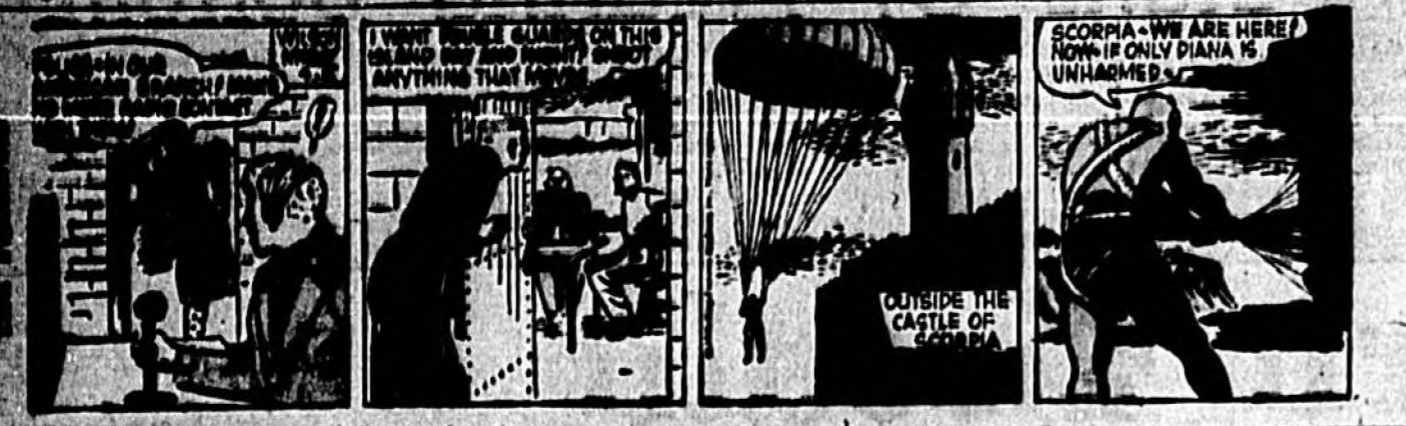
Liz Taylor Returns To Movie World

New Construction Worker Code Told

TALLAHASSEE (UP)—A new and tougher safety code for non-union workers has been adopted in Florida next month.

The code was adopted Tuesday by the State Industrial Commission after a public hearing.

The two key provisions prohibit workers from riding on construction hoists and require effective grounding of portable electric power tools.

Industrial Commission Chairman James T. Vocello praised the new code and says it will go a long way to reducing industrial accidents in Florida. Florida has one of the worst industrial accident records in the nation, accounting for 10 per cent of all injuries.

Since 1926, 43 persons have died in Florida through faulty grounding or wiring of portable electric tools.

Chicago Grand Opera House Will Be Torn Down

CHICAGO (UP)—The echoes are over at the Chicago Grand Opera House.

The windy city land mark which once echoed in the voices of Katherine Cornell, Fannie Brice, Al Johnson, Ted Lewis, Ethel Waters and George M. Cohan, will be torn down to make way for a skyscraper.

The last hint of the theatre's former glory is a sign prepared for its marquee—"Chicago say goodbye to the grand opera, George M. Cohan once played here."

Many of the attractions which once "played" the theater had long since been transferred to the civic opera house.

The old grand was opened as a show in 1860, when it housed an auditorium with dress circles and gallery.

A decade later minstrel shows provided the theatrical fare, but only briefly, as the six-story building housing the theater was a casualty of the Chicago fire of 1871. Rebuilt, the building briefly housed a beer garden, but by 1880 had been named the Grand Opera House and became a legitimate theater.

At the turn of the century, the "Wizard of Oz" and "Babes in Toyland" had their premier at the theatre.

In 1912 George M. Cohan and his partner, Sam Harris, leased the theater. Later it was known briefly as the "Four Cohans."

But by the early 1920's, the Grand Opera House had become a movie theatre. Its last film was run a couple of weeks ago. Workmen have moved into the building and the interior is being stripped prior to the start of actual demolition work.

"The show's over now," a workman said.

Claiming Dependency Exemptions

(This is one of a series of articles on federal income tax filing. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Florida Institute of Certified Public Accountants, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service.)

When you total up the exemptions on your 1934 tax return, remember that you are permitted to claim at least one exemption for every qualified dependent—and this includes yourself.

Count your exemptions carefully because each one takes \$600 off your taxable income. Take one for yourself and two if you are 65 or over. This rule applies to both husband and wife on a joint return, and an added exemption may be taken if either is blind.

In addition, you are entitled to one exemption for each person who fits the definition of a dependent, but the extra exemptions for age and blindness cannot be taken for a dependent.

To qualify for an exemption a dependent must:

- (1) Have received more than one-half of his support from you unless you file a Multiple Support Agreement (see below).
- (2) Have less than \$600 gross income unless he is your child and under 19 years of age—or a student of any age.
- (3) Not file a joint return with his spouse.
- (4) Have been either a member of your household or closely related to you, as defined in the official instructions.
- (5) Be either a citizen of the United States or a resident of the U. S., Canada, Mexico, Canal Zone, Panama, or (in some cases) the Philippines.

Your exemptions usually depend on whether you and your dependents qualify under these rules at the end of the year. However, if your husband or wife died during the year you can file a joint return and take the same exemptions that both of you would have otherwise had.

If you shared with others in the support of a dependent, but none of you provided more than half, you may still be able to arrange for one member of the group to have the \$600 exemption. You might agree, for example, to take

Chicago Grand Opera House Will Be Torn Down

WASHINGTON—The Agriculture Department has opened a referendum at Morehead, Ky., June 5-7 to determine whether farmers who sell tobacco on the market there want free and mandatory tobacco inspection and market news service.

The referendum will be held under authority of the Tobacco Inspection Act. It is a tobacco grading referendum.

All growers who sold tobacco on the Morehead market last season are eligible to vote. Ballots will be mailed to growers whose names and addresses are known. Growers who do not receive ballots may get them from the county agent or from the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee at Morehead. Ballots must be postmarked not later than midnight, June 7.

If two-thirds of the growers voting approve tobacco inspection, the department will consider designating the market for the free and mandatory inspection and market news service.

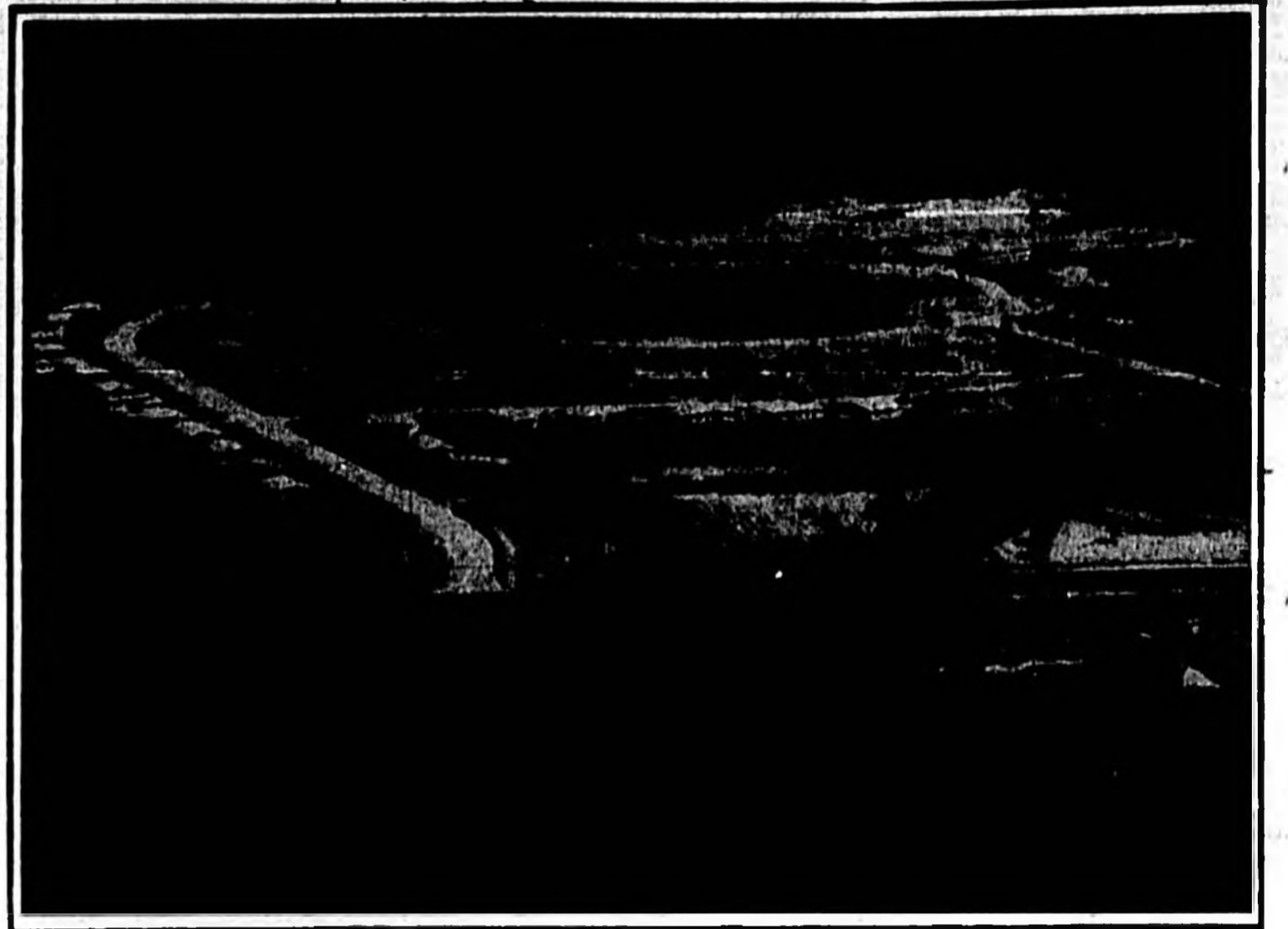

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Over 60 Injured As Tornadoes Slash Across State Yesterday

FORT PIERCE (UP)—A series of vicious tornadoes slashed across the Florida Peninsula Tuesday, wrecking about 75 homes and injuring more than 60 persons. Damage was expected to be over a million dollars.

No deaths had been attributed directly to the severe storms, although an Air Force B47 Stratofortress bomber which crashed near the mouth of Tampa Bay may have run into trouble flying low to avoid the storm front.

Over 60 persons had received hospital treatment for injuries

suffered in the series of twisters. Most were not seriously injured, but 30 had been hospitalized, all of them here, and four were reported in critical condition.

Some 75 homes and buildings were destroyed or badly damaged in the slash of the storms across the state—54 of them here—and damage was expected to be over a million dollars. Officials were unwilling to make any estimates until surveys had been completed. The Weather Bureau in Miami, meanwhile, forecast clearing weather today and an end to the

rains which accompanied the storms.

Worst at Fort Pierce was the hardest hit by the tornadoes. Wind gusts of hurricane strength were reported as the twister, moving in from the ocean, cut a two mile wide swath of destruction across the town to the Everglades on the west.

The Red Cross dispatched case workers to Fort Pierce Tuesday night from Fort Lauderdale and Atlanta, and supplied extra beds for the injured and homeless at

the Fort Pierce Memorial Hospital.

The downtown area was completely blocked off to prevent looting and injury to sightseers and armed National Guardsmen patrolled the streets. All traffic was re-routed.

WIS at St. Augustine

Another severe storm struck the outskirts of St. Augustine, injuring 10 persons and damaging eight to 10 houses.

Seven houses were destroyed or damaged and 12 persons slightly injured in the Bereah community

in south Polk County where still another tornado struck.

A fourth storm hit the ground causing only minor damage, near Ruskin in the rural Tampa Bay area.

But at least two more tornadoes which apparently never touched the ground were reported elsewhere in the Tampa Bay area and northwest of Palm Beach. A waterpump was spotted near Fort Meyers on the west coast and violent thunder storms slammed into other Florida towns.

There was some damage along

U. S. 90 south of Tampa and at Mullet Key at the mouth of Tampa Bay.

The storm front rolled over Florida from the Gulf of Mexico Tuesday morning, striking first the west coast then whirling over the state to smash the east coast some four hours later.

Over in 16 Minutes

At Fort Pierce, photographer Ed Finley said the tornado struck without warning and was all over in about 10 minutes, leaving residents aghast and "not really realizing what had happened to them."

A display window was blown out of a jewelry store and diamonds scattered over the sidewalk in the wind. The tower of radio station WIRA, which has stood up under four hurricanes since 1946, was toppled into the Indian River. All power was knocked out in the city.

Trees were uprooted and concrete block buildings torn down by the terrific force of the winds. The wal of a bottling company building toppled onto three empty cars.

"I watched a fantastic parade

of signs, tree limbs—a whole tree once—parts of houses and roofs tumbling up the street from the direction of the ocean," Finley said.

St. Lucie County Commissioner Doug Silver said the blow caused more damage than the 1949 hurricane which hit the city with winds up to 115 miles an hour.

The critically injured were listed as Esther Minhorn, 63, Lois Minhorn, 23, Ella Cleor, 75, and John Terry Jr., 9.

Gaillard's Government Resigns Early Today

PARIS (UP)—The government of Premier Felix Gaillard resigned early today in the wake of an adverse 23-223 vote in the National Assembly.

Gaillard had put his Tunisian policy up for an "unofficial" vote of confidence.

President Rene Coty immediately named the 38-year-old former finance minister as caretaker premier—a post with no power, no voice in crucial NATO meetings

now being held, and no authority to answer an expected onslaught on French policies in the United Nations.

Gaillard's defeat at the hands of right-wing forces led by Gaullist Jacques Soustelle and the large Communist bloc was a serious blow to U. S. — British efforts to mediate France's dispute with Tunisia.

Fear Loss of Algeria
Rightists feared Gaillard's "soft"

policy towards Tunisian President Habib Bourguiba would eventually cost France Algeria as well. They look upon Algeria as an integral part of metropolitan France, like Alsace-Lorraine.

Leftists maintain France should settle her costly embroilment in North Africa by granting independence to Algeria.

Eight weeks of tireless efforts by British and U. S. diplomats to

mediate the dispute arising from the French bombing of the Tunisian village of Sabet Bidi Youssef evaporated Tuesday night in an outburst of ill feeling against the United States and President Eisenhower.

A letter last week from Eisenhower to Gaillard urging him to seek a peaceful settlement with rightwing extremists denouncing American policy and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

While 2,000 riot police gathered outside to head off possible demonstration, Gaillard assured the Assembly that "if the government has acted in a certain way toward Tunisia, it is not because of this Eisenhower message but because it felt it was wise to do so."

2 Small Children Narrowly Escape Death in Wreck

Two small children, one of them two years old and the other only eight months old, narrowly escaped being crushed to death yesterday afternoon when they were thrown from an automobile out of control.

John Lloyd Griffin, 31-year-old Navy man, attached to the Heavy Attack Training Unit at the Sanford Naval Air Station, was traveling south on Sanford Ave. when apparently the brakes on his Plymouth station wagon locked, throwing the car into a ditch on the east side of the highway.

Constable J. Q. "Slim" Gallows was checking traffic only a short distance from the accident and saw the station wagon leave the highway, crash into the ditch, and then into a culvert.

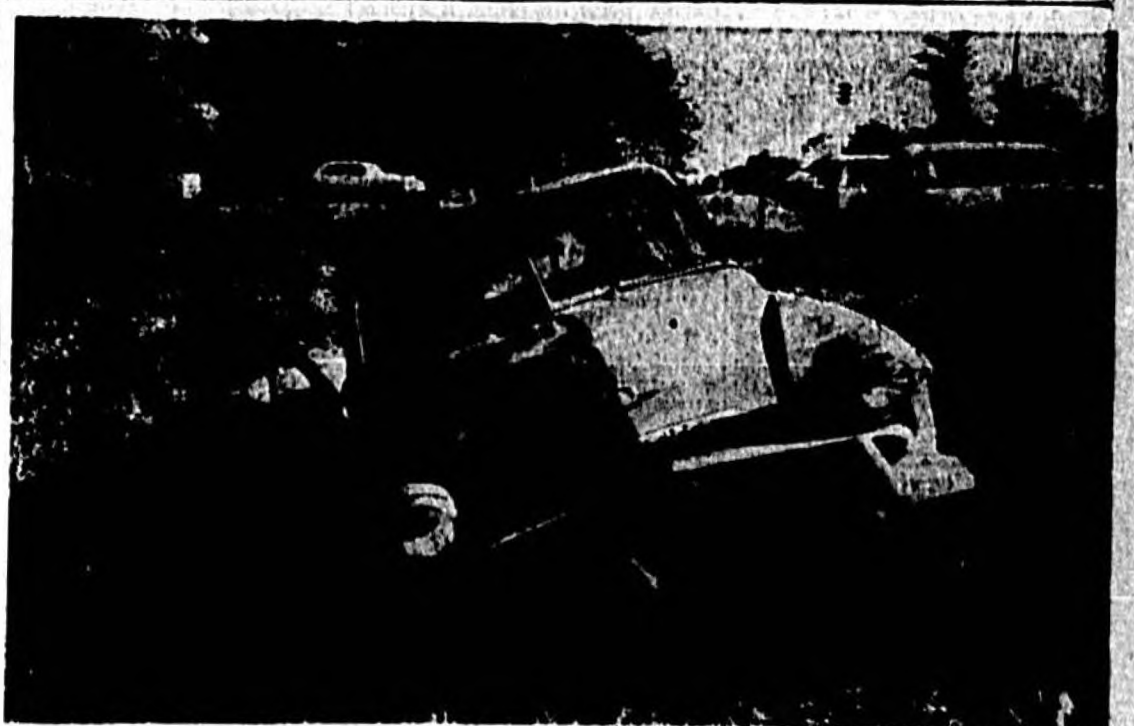
The children were riding on the front seat with their father and were miraculously thrown out onto the ground and received no injuries. The Navy man received abrasions on his face.

Florida Highway Patrolman J. L. Sikes said the automobile was a total loss.

The accident occurred just yards north of the Ocoee Road entrance to the Sanford Naval Air Station.

A Navy ambulance took the children and the Navy man to the NAS Dispensary for checkups.

No charges were filed against the driver, said Patrolman Sikes.

Soustelle, who was governor-general of Algeria two years ago, rasped back: "Where is French policy made? In Washington?"

Five months in office had left Gaillard looking haggard. After the vote, he walked through the Assembly lobbies, a cigarette as usual drooping from the corner of his mouth, and made his way to Coty's residence to hand in his resignation. Delegates sat in stony silence.

This was like the other 23 cabinet crises since the war—but worse. None could think of a suitable coalition that could give France a new government. There was talk that the postwar Fourth Republic might end and that only a Gaullist dictatorship could save France.

Perhaps the biggest winners were the Communists, who have long sought a "popular front" government. There was a strong possibility also the developments would drive many Frenchmen toward the extremist right.

Reports this morning said that Boston, the son of Joe and Ora Boston of Ovelo, died from injuries received in the accident sometime shortly after noon yesterday.

Fire in Museum Of Art Causes \$300,000 Damage

NEW YORK (UP)—Fire in the Museum of Modern Art Tuesday 24 an estimated \$300,000 damage to six paintings, one of them totally destroyed, museum officials said today. Firemen, the museum staff and volunteers, including Nelson A. Rockefeller, chairman of the museum board, saved about 11,000 other art objects, valued at four million dollars.

One workman was killed and three women visitors and 24 firemen were treated for smoke poisoning.

Now Legal To Trim Shrubbery, Destroy Shade Trees Here

It's legal to trim your shrubbery now—and you can even destroy a shade tree if it's in the way, too.

The Board of Sanford City Commissioners, Monday night, repealed a long standing ordinance which prevented the killing of shade trees or the trimming of shrubbery in Sanford.

It was one of those "long forgotten" ordinances that had been adopted at one time in an effort to beautify the city and to make it a more attractive place in which to live.

The most valuable painting in the building, the one-million-dollar "Un Dimanche a Grande Jatte" known in English as "Sunday Afternoon on the Island of Grande Jatte" by Georges Seurat, survived the fire under a heavy cover of tarpaulins spread by members of the fire patrol.

Art experts feared today that the fire—almost an unheard-of occurrence in a major museum—might seriously curtail further loan exhibitions.

The painting judged to be a total loss was an 18 1/2 foot canvas of "Water Lilies" by Claude Monet. The museum was believed to have paid about \$40,000 for the work.

A smaller "Water Lilies" by Monet was hanging on the staff landing between the second and third floors and also appeared to lay observers to be a total loss.

All the damaged paintings, and the destroyed Monet, are part of the museum's permanent collection.

Cuban Troops Stop Rebel Threat To U.S. Navy Base

HAVANA (UP)—The Cuban government reported today it had eliminated a potential rebel threat to the huge American naval base at Guantanamo.

An Army communique said government troops had driven off a number of rebel bands operating in the Guantanamo area, near the eastern tip of Cuba.

Rebel troops, awarming out of the Sierra Maestra Mountains, had engaged the army in sporadic clashes in this section for the past 48 hours, but the government said the rebels were retreating and the fighting here was "nearing an end."

The communique also claimed two other government victories, at Palmarito and at El Dorado, near Bayamo, in Oriente Province, chief center of rebel activities against the government of President Fulgencio Batista.

Heavy Casualties

It said heavy casualties were inflicted on the rebels in the Palmarito fighting and that much arms and equipment were captured in the El Dorado skirmish. The communique said the capture of nine more rebels brought to 30 the number surrendering this week.

Batista said there was no possibility of an all-out civil war against his regime because the rebels did not represent public opinion. He said their methods were "communist" and that the

solution to Cuba's troubles lay in free elections.

"This is the only way," Batista said.

"If one speaks about democracy and wants democracy, if liberty in its true sense is to be achieved, how can we go about it?" Batista asked. "The only road that leads to peace and a solution of the country's problems is through the voice of the people."

Space-Age Weapon Could Paralyze Enemy

WASHINGTON (UP)—An Air Force general today drew an imaginary picture of a space-age capsule that could paralyze an enemy without killing him. It's not impossible, he said, although some will doubt it.

Lt. Gen. D. L. Putt, deputy chief of staff for development, said it is "entirely possible" that this fantastic weapon will be developed for use by U. S. space ships of the future.

Putt conceded that this was "a highly imaginary possibility now" and some may call it impossible. He recalled that in 1941, there were those who didn't believe there could be an atom bomb.

Putt, who announced his retirement, testified before the House Space Committee.

Man In Space

Dr. Werner Von Braun, Army missile expert, told the committee Tuesday the Army has proposed to send a man 150 miles above the earth's surface in a capsule borne by a Redstone rocket. He would drop into the ocean and be fished out alive, after a 10-minute flight.

Von Braun said the service had not yet received official permission for the project. But he said there were volunteers ready to make the trip.

If it would take about a year to prepare for the attempt if permission were granted immediately.

Von Braun said he was convinced the Redstone space flight could be made before the X15 rocket plane is scheduled to carry a man into space near the top of the earth's atmosphere.

Cheap Experiment

Von Braun, director of the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, told the committee the passenger would be

far above the earth's surface "for well over five minutes."

"But this program has not yet received final approval," he said. "I don't know why... it's relatively cheap."

But said today that the air force is investigating several proposals for putting a man into a similar capsule but lifting it into an orbit around the earth, recovering him alive later.
