The boys out here who are the real McCoy—Babe Ruth and Bob Feller, Lefty O'Doul and Mark Koenig and Bill Dickey—won't give me any arguments on a matter like this. There's not one of them who wouldn't think our Gary is a swell fellow.

But if you recall that Gary played a baseball of sorts in "Meet John Doe," and if you comment on his rangy ease, his apparent inexperience as he did a wind-up or practiced a catch, you find out how little you know about diamond "form." To your surprise you learn that John Doe was "prettily stiff" and not at all convincing, and you run smack into the problem Gary is having playing the role of the late Lou Gehrig in "Pride of the Yankees."

Frank ("Lefty") O'Doul, manager of the San Francisco Seals and trainer of the DiMaggio boys, is technical adviser on the film and personal coach to Cooper. All he had to figure, taking over the latter's job, was how to make Gary a right-hander, throw and bat like Lou, a southpaw.

Lefty started early. Weeks before the picture began under Sam Wood's direction, Lefty had Cooper warming up.

In a way he had a break in that Gary had no youthful baseball habits to unlearn. At the end of period of Cooper's life, Gary was in school in England. When he came back, the other boys were ahead of him and baseball never figured much on Gary's schedule. So Lefty started from scratch—three hour sessions daily. He started Gary throwing pellets, underhand, overhand, then rocks, then ball. He had Cooper bowl left-handed, punch the bag ditty. He had him study B-be Herman, coast league southpaw both in life and in slow-motion movies. When Cooper went hunting in Mexico, Lefty had him take bats, balls and gloves along, with Bob Taylor for practice partner. When Cooper went to San Valley, Lefty went along himself.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18. (V.V.)—It is becoming more and more likely that some drastic—and I mean drastic—congressional session will be taken soon to provide government agencies with new weapons to combat fifth columnists and spies.

TAX NOTICE TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY IN SEMINOLE COUNTY

Under the new law enacted by the legislature the following interest and penalties begin on April 1, 1942, on all unpaid taxes assessed for the year 1941:

On Real Estate:
 A penalty of 3% on April 1st with interest at 18% per annum from April 1st, plus cost of advertising and tax sale, where not paid before tax sale.

On Personal Property:
 Interest at 18% per annum from April 1st plus cost of advertising and tax warrants.

On Intangible Personal Property:
 10% penalty added on April 1st plus 24% per annum, cost of advertising and Sheriff's costs on executions.

Under this new law all unpaid taxes for the year 1941 become delinquent on April 1, 1942 and the penalties and interest become a part of the taxes which are a first lien on the property assessed, except that Intangible Personal Property taxes are a lien on all property owned by the taxpayer.

Property owners who have not done so are urged to pay their taxes on or before March 31, 1942 and avoid penalties and costs.

Statement Is Issued On War News Policy

WASHINGTON, Mar. 18. (AP)—The office of facts and figures issued a comprehensive statement of the government's policy on war news last night, including an announcement that casualty lists will be made public.

The casualty lists will be made public with the stipulation that newspapers not publish and radio stations not broadcast the names of any victims outside their own localities. The statement said that the lists would be made available with all possible speed.

The statement also promised that the War Production Board will publish at frequent intervals a production communique which will enable the public to judge whether the production program is progressing satisfactorily or not.

In regard to military information the statement was principal on an outline and explanation of the policy already followed but it announced that the joint chiefs of staff will shortly begin to issue a series of bulletins from time to time which will furnish an authoritative general view of the military situation in various theaters of war.

The statement was issued through the Committee on War Information of the Office of Facts and Figures, of which Archibald MacLachlan, director of the office, is chairman.

plane factory in New Jersey. There was a string of similar arrests in New Orleans, in San Antonio, suspects were caught with code books, maps of vital military establishments, binoculars, weapons and gas masks.

In Norfolk, Va., federal agents arrested German and Italian agents with short wave receiving sets, cameras and ammunition. By trials in New York and Washington have brought out alarming testimony as to pre-war activity of enemy agents.

On the West Coast, civilian observers attested that just before that submarine shelling near Santa Barbara, lights flashed from the hills and a signal—ship at sea. . . . Police said they found secret bomb mechanisms, a list of consignments of ammunition to several defense posts.

The deluge has given Washington officials theitters. Already the necessity for a search and seizure warrant in spy cases has been removed. By executive order and justice department rulings, other restrictions against counter-espionage work have been lifted. From the West Coast particularly come complaints that existing measures are inadequate.

I asked a high counter-espionage official where he thought the real problem lies.

"Espionage can be fought effectively," he said. "It is the so-called fifth column that is the real problem. A good fifth columnist is a media citizen. His very effectiveness depends on it. He may even be contributing to OUR war effort. This waiting to give aid and assistance to the enemy."

"With existing laws, we can deal with the spies and saboteurs, are saying now that the United States will have to get tough but how to handle the fifth columnists without starting a nationwide witch-hunt is another problem."

IMPORTANT—NEW LAW
 RELATING TO TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY TAXES IN FLORIDA

CAUTION: IT IS MANDATORY under the law that every person, firm, corporation, trustee, executor, administrator, receiver or other fiduciary, owning or having control, management or custody of taxable personal property in the State of Florida, file annually, a sworn Tangible Personal Property Tax Return with the Tax Assessor of the County in which such property is situated.

READ CAREFULLY the following Sections of Chap. 20725, Laws of Florida, Acts of 1941, for the Assessment and Collection of Revenue and Relating to the Assessment and Collection of TAXES on Tangible Personal Property.

Section 1. DEFINITION OF TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY.
 "Tangible Personal Property" shall include all goods, chattels, boats, vessels, vehicles (except motor vehicles), animals and other articles of value capable of manual possession and whose chief value shall consist of the thing itself and not what it represents. The words "Personal Property" as used in this Act shall mean only such Tangible Personal Property."

Section 5. BASIS OF ASSESSMENT.
 The tax assessor shall assess all tangible personal property at its full cash value.

Section 7. SWORN RETURNS OF TANGIBLE PERSONAL PROPERTY FOR TAXATION.
 It is hereby made the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning or having the control, management or custody of tangible personal property of whatever character in this State which is subject to taxation under the laws of Florida, including trustees, executors, administrators, receivers, and all other fiduciaries, to return the same for taxation to the county assessor of taxes in the proper county on or before the first day of April of each year, giving the character, description, location and full cash value of the same according to the best of the knowledge and belief of the person making the return. The tax assessor may reject or refuse to receive or file any tax return which is not made out in the form required or prescribed in the event of the refusal of the person making such return to answer the same upon the demand of the tax assessor by supplying such information as may have been temporarily withheld therefrom. All such tangible personal property tax returns shall be verified by the declarant and both of the person making the return that such return is true to the best of the knowledge and belief of the person making the return and that the valuations shown thereon are in the best of the knowledge and belief of such person the full cash value of the property described in the return.

Section 14. TAX RETURNS TO SHOW ALL EXEMPTIONS AND CLAIMS.
 In making tangible personal property tax returns under this Act it shall be the duty of the taxpayer to completely disclose and claim any and all lawful or constitutional exemptions from taxation in which he may be entitled or claim to any such exemption in tangible personal property. The return in which he makes such claim, if any, in a tangible personal property tax return, shall be subject to the same review of the taxes on the part of the assessor and all such exemption or claim claimed shall determine as allowed for that tax year.

Section 24. FAILURE TO FILE RETURNS AND PAY TAX WHEN DUE.
 Any person who fails to make a tax return as required by this Act shall pay on a penalty in addition to and in part of the tax a sum equal to 10% of the tax owed by him. A taxpayer who fails to pay the tax on or before the date when the same is due shall be liable for the same and in addition to the tax and the penalty thereon a sum equal to 2% of the tax and penalty thereon for each month or fraction of a month which he fails to pay the same. All such penalties and interest shall be in addition to the tax and the penalty thereon.







Germans Prepare To Retreat From Vital Stronghold

Nazis Claim Victory In Donets Basin; City Of Kharkov Is Now In Flames

A Stockholm dispatch reported today that the Russian industrial city of Kharkov is in flames with the Germans preparing to retreat from this vital stronghold. The Germans claimed, however, that the Russians were thrown back in the Donets basin east of Kharkov.

Axis reported increased activity in the Libyan desert today, as Italian disclosed a renewal of aerial patrol activity over the north African front.

The fiercest fighting of all raged in an unidentified sector of the southern front, the Red Army newspaper Red Star said last night.

Trying to relieve several units from a grave predicament, the Germans threw in every weapon of war, but were repulsed and lost another settlement, Red Star related, and added that the Russian advance there was continuing.

The story was similar on the central front, where Red Star reported the Russians encircled a German garrison in an important town after several days of battle in a blinding blizzard.

A dispatch from that front said that the Germans were trying to smash the Soviet units with munitions and food by plane and that captured orders showed the commander of the 101st German rifle regiment had already reduced his men's rations.

In the St. Petersburg sector of the Russian front, the Soviet government yesterday said Hitler's "starving half-frozen, lice-covered, 700,000 army, 50,000 strong is perishing."

Reserve gathered with difficulty for his so-called spring offensive, but sent instead to aid this army find themselves encircled with those they are sent to relieve," it was said.

For example, it said, the 255th German infantry division, which arrived from France about the end of January, has now lost 45 percent of its men, and the fifth Jaeger division, brought from France in February, has lost more than 50 percent.

Chinese Troops Stand In Way Of Burma Invaders

Stilwell, In Charge Of Chinese Forces, Promises Offense

The Associated Press Chinese troops under United States leadership continued to menace the Japanese advance in Burma today, the east branch of the Burma road, according to British military advisers.

China's Chief of Staff, General Joseph Stilwell, announced he has been placed in command of U. S. forces in China, India and Burma, and promised an offensive. He said, "We won't be satisfied until we see American and Chinese troops in Tokyo together."

A communique issued at Chungking yesterday revealed that the United American Volunteer Group pilots, whose fighter planes knocked down more than 200 Japanese bombers near Rangoon and over the Burma Road, were now using bombers and that they have "blinded" Japanese troops and mechanized forces and shot down a Japanese plane.

Accompanied by British bombers, the AVG pilots blasted and strafed Japanese airfields and landing fields Wednesday, including a big field at Moulmein, and these raids are believed to have been necessary for the Jap planes, a communique issued at General Sir Archibald Wavell's headquarters in New Delhi reported.

Chinese troops, however, may not be the only force to look up the conquered Burma delta and dig upon the native population for armed recruits, battleships, British imperial look up new defensive positions well south of Rangoon.

A London spokesman said this involved the abandonment of the Burma Road, above Hanoi on the Burma Road.

The president said that MacArthur should be prepared to leave Batuan at any time and to organize an offensive against the Japanese in the Philippines.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20 (AP)—Donald M. Nelson, War Production Chief, and Robert P. Patterson, Undersecretary of War, opposed new war legislation Thursday, while the Administration endeavored to obtain labor consent to a sweeping double-pay law for Sunday and night work.

Meanwhile, Representative Smith (D Va.), for years a critic of the closed shop and the wage-hour law, took a view directly contrary to that of Nelson and Patterson. He told the House Naval Committee that the country wanted to know whether Congress is running the war effort, or labor.

Hill Will Head Naval Relief Campaign Here

James R. Stockton of Jacksonville, State chairman of the Florida Citizens Committee for the drive to raise funds for the Navy Relief Society, announced today that Mayor W. C. Hill had accepted the chairmanship for the Navy Relief campaign in Sanford.

"I want to highly commend the patriotism of Mayor Hill for his generous offer to help with this great cause," said Mr. Stockton. "There is no better way to show the men of the Navy now fighting on the far-flung battle fronts of the world that we are behind them."

Mr. Stockton stated that the Navy Relief Society has always pleaded that no widow, orphan, child or family of Navy, Marine or Coast Guard personnel would suffer hardship without receiving assistance.

"To the men who are fighting and dying today, this pleader means much—we must make it come true," said Mr. Stockton.

Hitler Wants French War Trial Dropped

BERLIN (From German Broadcast), Mar. 20 (AP)—Ferdinand Bruns, Vichy's envoy to the German authorities in Paris, has requested to withdraw the trial of the trial of French war leaders be dropped, German dispatches from Vichy said last night.

Mr. Bruns usually conveys the German view to Vichy. The German authorities in Paris, however, contend that the trial is based on the wrong charges, that the real offense was going to war against Germany, not unpreparedness for war.

Labor Shortage Is Seen In War Work

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20 (AP)—President Roosevelt today suggested the possibility of some shortage in war production by next fall. He told a press conference there probably would be enough workers for available work until then. He said plans are not ready for the allocation of labor to the war industry under the manpower mobilization program.
