Schools remain under court order By Bill Kerns **Department of Justice letter outlines**

improvement areas for schools

SANFORD - According to a letter from the United States Justice Department released this week, the Seminole County school district needs to improve conditions at Crooms Academy

and hire a greater number of black teachers.

Since 1970, the United States District Court has had supervisory jurisdiction over the Seminole County School Board

in matters such as school site purchases, school construction, and student attendance zones.

Seminole County school-district officials are hoping to convince the U.S. Department of Justice that court oversight is no longer necessary.

"I'm optimistic," said School Board Chair Sandra Robinson. "This (letter) is much better than I had hoped for."

The Justice Department conducted an inspection of Seminole County and other school districts this year to determine whether equitable racial and ethnic conditions exist. District officials this week received a letter based on the inspection.

"There's language in (the letter) that we are interpreting as 'Let's get together and talk about this," said school-district Superintendent Paul Hagerty.

In addition to conditions at Crooms Academy and the hiring of black teachers, the Justice Department also said it is concerned about low black representation in higher level academic courses at the high school and middle school levels.

State considers HOV lane for I-4

Another new plan to help alleviate traffic on Interstate 4 has been announced.

The latest plan would involve a 10-mile area from Altamonte Springs, to Central Parkway in Orlando. According to Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) spokesman Steve Homan, the new plan involves the addition of a HOV (high occupancy vehicle) lane. This would be one lane, put on land which presently serves as the

"I expect either our people (FDOT) or the Florida Highway Patrol will end up doing that every day," he said.

HOV lanes are for vehicles containing two or more people.

"Motorists better have two or more in their cars," he said. "With those barriers, there won't be any way to change lanes if they see a cop, and they could get a ticket if they are caught."

He explained that there will be adequate entrance and exit areas for the gated HOV lanes, "but it should certainly help

Prairie dog makes Lake Monroe home

Sanford city employees made an exotic discovery last week - a four-legged rodent who should be more at home in the western plains than in Central Florida.

People began seeing the rodent last week alongside Lake Monroe. On Tuesday, officials from Central Florida Zoological Park confirmed the animal is a prairie dog.

"When I first saw it, I really didn't know what it was," Sanford Director of Engineering and Planning Jay Marder said. "I had to get

an expert opinion.

"When I found out it was a prairie dog, I was thrilled about having another foreign fauna happening at the lakefront," he said. "We have a lot of different birds there, and now we have a prairie dog."

A prairie dog is an American burrowing rodent basically found in the Great Plains from Montana to Northern Mexico. The animal's color is plain grayish or reddish buff with a black tip on its tail.

Prairie dogs usually live in large colonies or villages, throwing up a mound of earth at the See Prairie, Page 5A

Before the end of this month, the Sanford Police Department will send patrol officers in pairs to visit city residents and discuss their concerns.

By the time "Operation

Knock Knock" is complete, police hope to visit every home in Sanford. They will deliver a bag full of crime prevention tips to each household that is visited.

"We hope to become better acquainted with the city's residents and foster good relationships," said Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley.

Patrol officers will visit 12

homes per week. They will introduce them-

According to latest traffic estimates, Homan said there were approximately 130,000 to 175,000 vehicles per day traveling over that 10-mile stretch of I-4.





Proposals will be sought for design and construction as early as next month, with a decision to be made by June.

"We have already done a lot of the preliminary work on the design," Homan said, "so if everything goes right, we expect the actual construction for that stretch to begin in 2001.

The additional HOV lane will

be similar to lanes presently in use in such cities as Washington, D.C., Atlanta, Denver, Los Angeles, and a number of others.

This particular project is expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$40 million.

Regarding other plans for 1-4, Homan said work is still continuing.

"For the bridge over the St. Johns River, between Seminole and Volusia Counties, we are

now planning for three lanes in each direction." He said new bridge structures would be added to each side of the present bridge.

"While we are planning on that for the year 2003 to 2004, the legislature has been discussing giving the DOT a \$600 million dollar surplus it has, which could advance the bridge project to the year 2001," Homan added.









Other areas of concern include a low number of black students identified as gifted and an apparent tendency at certain schools where black students appear to be disciplined more often than non-black students.

The letter from inspector Kathleen Devine of the Justice Department took issue with the maintenance of Crooms Academy, an historically black school in Sanford prior to 1970 now serving as a school for "atrisk" middle and high school students.

"I think the inspectors picked up on the fact that we need to decide what to do about Crooms," Hagerty said.

Devine said that during her inspection she observed "a classroom where the air conditioner didn't seem to work and where the students complained that it was always hot, a poorly equipped library . . . and substantially fewer course offerings than at the other high schools in the district."

In addition, the letter from Devine said that the percentage of black faculty in the school district has dropped since the desegregation plan was implemented in 1970.

According to the Justice Department, during the 1998-99 school year only 8 percent of the teachers in the district were black. During the 1969-70 school year, the racial composition of the district's teachers was 25 percent black.

The Justice Department said the percentage of black teachers hired is low in comparison to neighboring school districts. Orange County's teachers are 15 percent black and Volusia's are 16 percent black. The percent of teachers hired in Florida is 15 percent black, the Justice Department said.

As of June, only 8 percent of the new teachers hired for this school year were black, the Justice Department said.

In addition, for the 1998-99 school year, there were no black certified employees in Purchasing and Warehousing,

Personnel and Human Resources, Ombudsman, Executive Director-Secondary Education, In-Service Education and Curriculum, according to the Justice Department. Devine's letter said the Justice Department is concerned about an apparent "pattern of low black representation in higher level courses at all of the high

schools and most of the middle schools in the District." For example, in four high schools, Lake Brantley, Lake Howell, Lake Mary and Oviedo, at least half of the advanced placement classes offered for college credit had no black students enrolled, the Justice

Department said. Other areas of concern include the number of blacks in mentally disabled and in gifted classes. The racial composition of students in the school district is 14 percent black, and only three percent of the students identified as gifted are black, the Justice Department said.

Data regarding the proportion of black students in mentally disabled classes was unavailable for the inspection, but Devine said she observed what appeared to be a disproportionate representation of black students in the classes.

In addition, in 23 schools in the school district, black students are at least twice as likely as non-black students to be disciplined, the Justice Department said.

The Justice Department's letter also cited a concern about the low number of black students participating in cheerleading at high schools in the district.

Lake Howell, Lake Mary and Winter Springs high schools had no black cheerleaders in the fall 1999 season, Lake Brantley and Oviedo high schools had one black student on the squad, Lyman High School had two black students on the squad, and Seminole High School had five black students on the squad, according to the Justice Department.

"This is a very moderate let-

ter compared to what could have been the possible reaction," Hagerty said.

The key areas inspected by the Justice Department include equitable conditions in faculty and staff assignments, resource allocation, facilities, transportation, student assignment, and extracurricular activities.

"She's just raising some issues in her report," Hagerty said. "But she isn't saying what, if anything, should happen."

If the school district is found in compliance and granted unitary status, meaning that a dual system of education for blacks and non-blacks no longer exists, it would be released from the supervisory authority of the U.S. District Court.

Seminole County and other Florida school districts were sued in 1970 by the Justice Department for operating a "dual system" which separated schools for black and non-black students.

In 1970, the school district was ordered to dismantle the dual system, and to merge black and non-black students into a unitary system.

The U.S. District Court can find the district in compliance with desegregation requirements, granting "unitary status," on each key factor separately, or the court may grant complete unitary status.

If unitary status cannot be negotiated, the School Board would seek a resolution of the issue in court.

From 1996 to 1998, the School Board negotiated four consent decrees with the Department of Justice that are designed to move the school district toward relief from court oversight. Other consent decrees have also been negotiated since 1970.

The consent decrees allowed the district to open three new elementary schools and create new elementary school attendance zones. The district also agreed to establish magnet or enrichment programs at

"It's got a nice little burrow on the side of the lake," Marder said. "It seems to be very happy there.

"It even seems to be stashing things, and its got various items in its burrow."

Marder, who has lived in Florida for almost 25 years, said this is the first time he has seen a prairie dog in Sanford. However, he said several people have told him pet store's do sell the rodent.


As for the animal's sociability, Marder said it is rather shy.

"It won't come up to a person, but it will stare at you," he said. "People feed it carrots and other things, and I just hope noone harms it."

Tuesday morning, employees at the Central Florida Zoological Park checked to make sure the prairie dog wasn't an escapee from their facility.


"The zoo has a pair of prairie dogs in its education department, but we checked them and they are both accounted for," Central Florida Zoological Park Marketing Director Andrea Farmer said.

Since its origin doesn't lead back to the zoo, Farmer said there is a good chance the prairie dog is someone's pet. Additionally, the lake's new res-

"There are several factors a person should consider before purchasing a prairie dog for a pet," she said. "They are not very manageable, and they are rodents whose bites can be quite bad.

"And, it needs space so it can burrow," she said. "It's not the type of animal you let loose in your backyard."

According to Farmer, the zoo receives numerous calls everyday concerning exotic pets, including pot belly pigs, pythons and iguanas, that have become too large or uncontrollable.

"People don't understand that we have limited space and can't accommodate them," she said, "They are not aware that when they are looking at a 2foot python in a pet store, it is eventually going to grow.

"People have to look at the long-term picture before buying a pet — any pet," she added. "It's a big commitment toward any animal."

Farmer suggested research should include finding a veterinarian in the area who serves animals other than domestic breeds.

And, she said she always suggests an alternative to the exotic.

"There are so many cats and dogs that are available for adoption," she said. "They are domestic animals that make great pets."



FIVE FORMER STARS ADDED TO **UCF ATHLETICS** HALL OF FAME

ORLANDO - Five former athletes, including firsts for football, men's soccer, and women's basketball, will make up the 2000 class of the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame as Scan Beckton, Bill Giovanetti, Susan Patz, Winston **DuBose, and Karen Richter** will be honored in a ceremony on campus March 10.

This is the third class of the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame, which honors those individuals who, through their demonstrated athletics achievement or service, have distinguished themselves and the University of Central Florida. An eightmember panel comprised the selection committee for the 2000 class, trimming the list from more than 100 nominees.

Beckton and Glovanetti are the first football players to be named to the UCF Athletics Hall of Fame.

Beckton played wide receiver from 1987-90, end currently serves as the receivers coach at UCF. He was instrumental in the team reaching the semifinais of the NCAA Division ll playoffs in 1987 and the semifinals of the I-AA playoffs in 1990. Throughout his career he set numerous school records. some of which have been eclipsed by players he has coached. He set the record for career receptions with 196 and career yardage with 2,493, and currently ranks third in both categories. He is fourth in career all-purpose yards with 3,652.

Giovanetti played line-backer at UCF from 1979-82. He was a starting linebacker on UCF's first football team, even though he was the youngest to try out at age 17. He started all 37 games of his four-year career. He led the team in tackles three of his four years and set a record for career tackles that lasted

for 10 years. He is currently second in career tackles with 429. He holds the school record for tackles in a game with 23, and earned All-America honors in 1981.

Patz, whose married name is Pringle, is the first women's basketball player to be enshrined at UCF. She played from 1982-86, and was instrumental in the team's transition from Division II to Division I. She set the school record for career scoring with 1,587 points, a record she held for 10 years. She is currently second in career scoring, second in career blocked shots with 85. and is fourth in career rebounding with 563. She was the first woman in school history to score more than 1.500 points and pull down more than 500 rebounds.

DuBose is the first athlete from men's soccer to be selected to the UCF Athletics

Hall of Fame. He played goalkeeper from 1973-76, and helped usher in the sport of soccer on the varsity level. He was named All-American three times and led UCF to a 15-1-1 record in 1976. He was chosen in the first round of the North American Soccer League draft and went on to become a star with the Tampa Bay Rowdies. He still holds the school record for career shutouts with 25, season shutouts with eight, career goals against average at 0.91, and season goals against average at 0.49.

Richter is the third women's soccer player to be enshrined and the second goalkeeper. She served her alma mater as a player from 1987-90, and as a coach from 1993-98. As a player she earned Adidas/ISAA and NCAA Goalkeeper-of-the-Year honors in 1990. She was named to the Soccer America MVP team. in 1989, as well as the Adidas scholar-athlete team in 1989 and 1990. She

holds the school record for lowest career goals against average at 0.59, lowest singleseason goals against average at 0.25, and also holds the record for career shutouts with 30.5. As a junior she led the team to an 11-1-2 record and allowed only two goals in 14 games. As a coach she led the team to five Trans America Athletic Conference championships in a six-year span.





have their criminal history record

Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) for a certificate of eligibility for sealing.

FDLE will issue a certificate of eligibility for sealing to a person who is the subject of a criminal history record provided that such person: (1) Has submitted to the department a certified copy of the disposition of the charge to which the petition to seal pertains; (2) Remits a \$75 processing fee to the department for placement in the Department of Law Enforcement **Operating Trust Fund, unless such fee** is walved by the executive director; (3) Has never previously been adjudicated guilty of a criminal offense or comparable ordinance violation or adjudicated delinquent for committing a felony; (4) Has never previously been adjudicated guilty of

a criminal offense or comparable ordinance violation or adjudicated delinquent for committing any of the following misdemeanors: assault; battery, carrying a concealed weapon, unlawful use of destructive devices or bombs, negligent treatment of children, open carrying of a weapon, exposure of sexual organs, unlawful possession of a firearm, petty theft, cruelty to animals; or arson; (5) Has not been adjudicated guilty of or adjudicated delinquent for committing any of the acts stemming from the arrest or alleged criminal activity to which the petition to seal pertains; (6) Has never secured a prior sealing or expungement of a criminal history record; and (7) is no longer under court supervision applicable to the disposition of the arrest or alleged


criminal activity to which the petition to seal pertains.

Finally, if a certificate of eligibility is issued by FDLE, the person may petition the court to seal the record by filing a sworn petition attesting to the information required for the certificate of eligibility.

As discussed in the past, the existence of a criminal history record can have lasting repercussions. However, those repercussions can usually be minimized by having a criminal history record sealed. In the coming weeks we will discuss who may qualify for an expungement as well as other aspects of criminal law.
