Trouble At The Colleges

Just how superficial is the thinking of those who believe in a planned economy and who like to say "We planned it that way", is shown by the crisis confronting the nation's colleges and universities where the GI Bill of Rights has promised to send some 10 or 15 million men with accomodations for only about two million.

To be sure, not all of the GI's whom the government said it would send to college want to take advantage of this opportunity. Many of them have wives and children and are anxious to get on with the business of earning a living and building a home. But many of those who are planning to go to college also have wives and children and intend to take them there with them.

What would happen if everyie who thought he had liver trouble could go to the doctor at government expense?

And the government as usual has the cart before the horse when it offers to pay the doctors' bills before it has the doctors. You cannot just go out in the street or to an mployment agency and hire doctors as you would a litch digger. 

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2-679-President Truman's veto of the Tideland Oil Bill was upheld by the House today and thus the legislation is dead. The President sent back the hill to the lawmakers yesterday with the declaration that the issues involved should be decided by the Supreme Court and not by Congress.

The House vote today for overriding they veto was 139 to 95. However, this was 17 ballots short of the two-thirds majority required to pass the measure over the Presidential veto.
