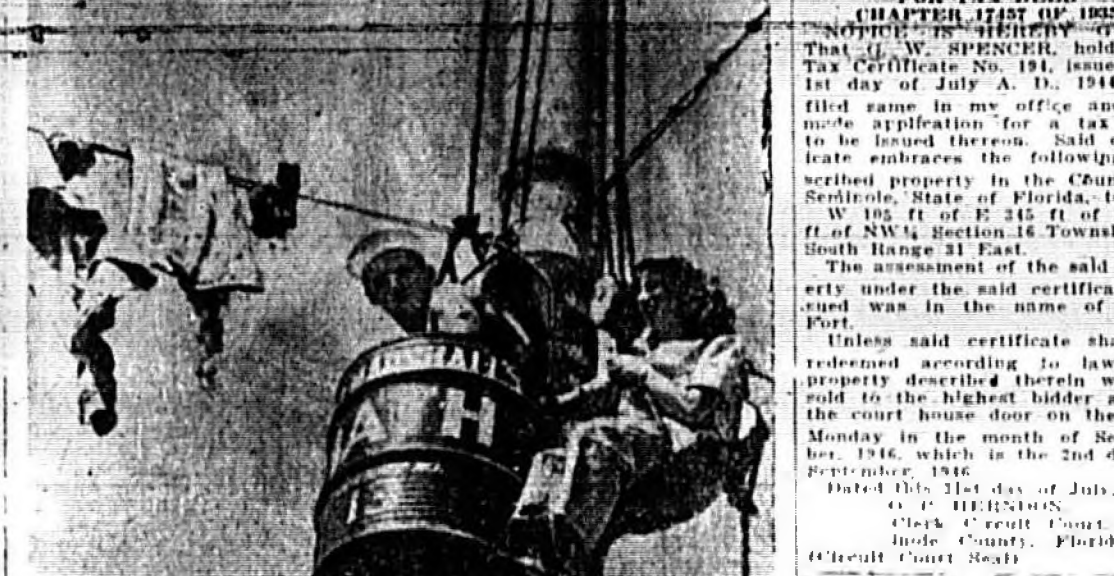

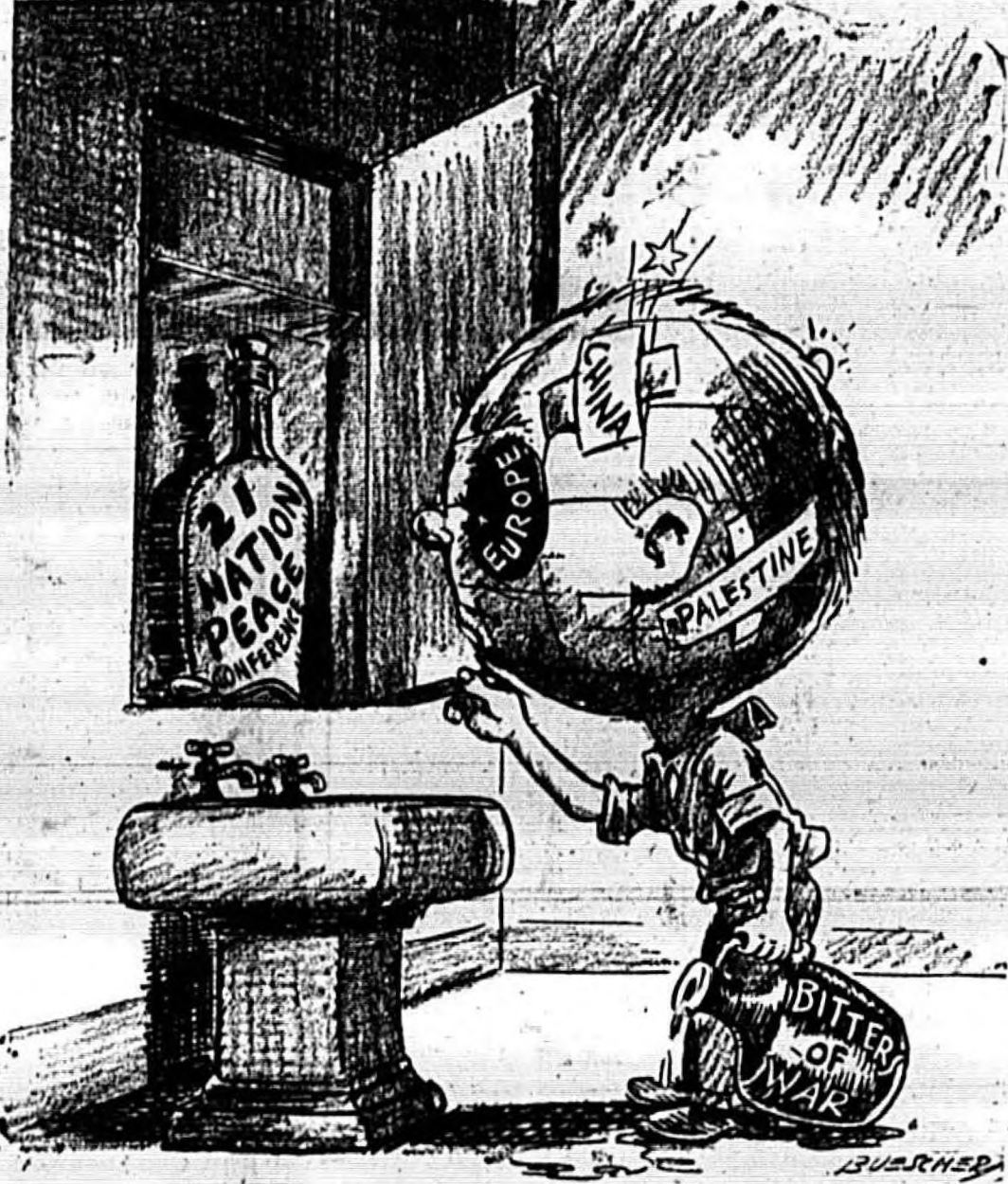

A number of social affairs have been planned by the association for the immediate future and plans for these will be announced later.

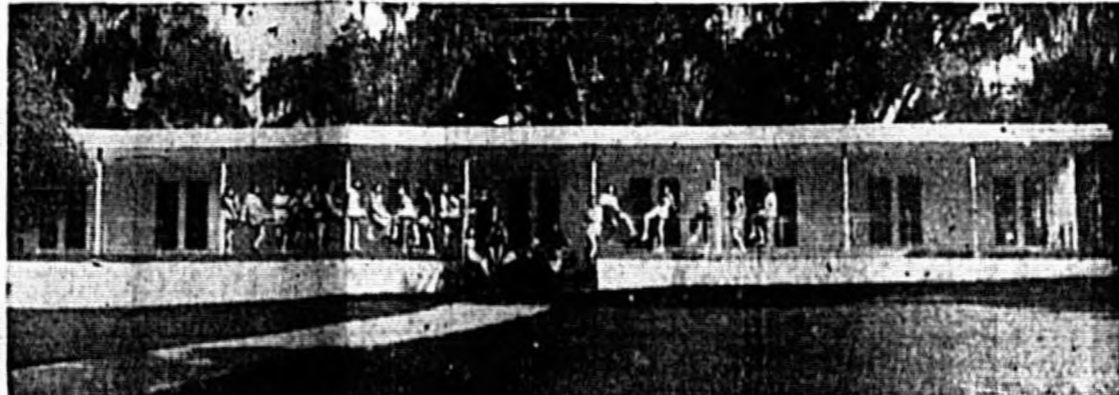

monthly rental of \$45.00 a month. Landlords who changed their rental basis contrary to the rent regulations, such as from a monthly or weekly to a daily basis during the interim period in effect for the unit on July 30, 1946.

5. On July 1, my landlord raised my rental from \$30.00 to \$45.00 a month. I paid \$45.00 for July. Can I get a refund for the \$15.00 difference?

Landlords who charged more than their ceiling rents for the interim period, when penalties for violations of OPA controls were necessarily suspended, are not required by OPA to refund the amount collected in excess of ceiling rents for that period.

6. In July, my city passed a local ordinance permitting a 15 percent increase in rent. Must I continue to pay this increase?

No, regardless of local legislation in effect between July 1 and July 25, 1946, rent in excess of the maximum permitted under the Federal Act and regu-

lations cannot legally be collected after July 25, 1946. The Federal Act expressly states that Federal rent control supersedes local and state laws.

7. I was evicted in July. A new tenant now occupies the premises. Can I now regain possession?

No. Tenants who were actually evicted during the interim period when penalties for violations of OPA regulations did not apply, cannot regain possession.

8. My landlord has given me an eviction notice but has not notified OPA. Can he proceed to evict me?

Landlords are now prohibited from proceeding with eviction actions without complying first with all OPA requirements covering evictions. The requirements are the same as those in effect on June 30, 1946. Any incomplete eviction proceedings contrary to the regulations, may not now be completed. Consult your nearest OPA rent office for all details.

9. In July the local court issued a judgment permitting my eviction but I have not been put out. Can I now be evicted?

No, unless your landlord com-

plied with OPA eviction requirements and then were given eviction judgment in the local court during the interim, may proceed to evict legally.

10. I rented my apartment to a tenant for the first time on July 15. How soon must I register the apartment with OPA?

You will have 30 days after July 25, 1946, in which to register property.

11. I first rented my apartment to a tenant on June 15, 1946. How long will I have to register with OPA?

You must register within 15 days after July 25, 1946. A landlord who first rented a dwelling until during June 1946, must register within 30 days of first renting, not counting the number of days between July 1, 1946, and July 25, 1946, inclusive.

12. I rented an apartment on July 1, 1946, and was required to give my landlord a security deposit of \$100.00. Is this legal?

Your landlord must return this deposit to you within 30 days after July 25, 1946. Otherwise, he is in violation of OPA regulations and subject to penalties.

in bonds is the proper way to handle any payment of the \$1,000,000 in cash would definitely increase the inflationary trend in this country," Gutierrez said. He also intimated that in his opinion President Truman would okay the bill.

Julian Stenstrom, a member of the Herald staff, said that he believed the measure was appropriate since officers received leave pay. "As far as I'm personally concerned," he declared, "the payment of the money in five-year non-negotiable is all right with me. I have no doubt that Mr. Truman will place his signature on the bill."

George Steele, Army veteran, stated that he approved of the passing of the bill but thought that it should have been paid in cash exactly as it is paid to officers. However, Steele said he felt that he would be satisfied if the method of payment of leave money to officers would be changed to conform with the plan to pay enlisted men. But he went on to say that he thought that legislation would be enacted during the next session of congress decreasing the length of time the bonds would be non-negotiable.

Braxton L. Perkins, Jr., Navy veteran, declared "Yes sir! The leave bill is okay. I realize that many men will probably not be satisfied with the bond situation and would rather have the cash. However, I would just as soon have the bonds." Perkins added that "I think the bill will be signed by President Truman."

A former Naval officer who asked that his name not be revealed, said that he was in favor of the legislation as long as officers and federal civil service employees were accorded such benefits. He related instances where government office clerks and typists were given leave time and sick leave of 18 days per year in addition.

"And I believe that the method of payment adopted by the congress is proper," he added. He continued by saying that "I believe a majority of the men would rather have the cash but in the long run most of them will be better off with the bonds."

Hundreds Of Profiteers Nabbed When Cost Of Living Climed To An All-Time High 26-Years Ago

WASHINGTON—Aug. 1—Buyers' strikes swept the country, and hundreds of alleged profiteers were arrested when the cost of living climbed to an all-time high 26 years ago this summer.

When retail prices began their rise after World War I, they already were 75 percent above pre-war figures. By midsummer of 1920 the cost of living was more than double its pre-war level, according to Department of Labor surveys. Consumers called the situation "outrageous" and "profiteering" became a household word in the days of the "red" scare.

Business men, judges and preachers, school students, were overall as a protest against "500 prices for \$50 suits," "barefoot clubs" campaigned against high priced shoes. Members of the "Hoovers' League" and civic groups took pledges to abstain from candy and ice cream until sugar prices were reduced.

Overalls in Public Office

The newspapers reported that a judge of the Kansas Supreme Court joined the overall brigade. A Missouri minister wore blue denim in his pulpit, and the mayor-elect of Emporia, Kans., denied overall for his inauguration.

Members of the "Hoovers' League" and civic groups took pledges to abstain from candy and ice cream until sugar prices were reduced.

The Kansas Supreme Court affirmed a decision granting a divorced wife an increase in alimony on account of the high cost of living.

Coal prices skyrocketed. The department of justice arrested scores of coal operators and dealers on charges of " gouging." The switchmen's strike aggravated the coal shortage. Some speculators exploited the situation, and prices of \$22 a ton for soft coal were reported from Massachusetts to South Dakota.

Sugar went to 30 cents a pound in some cities—five times as high as the pre-war price. Fruits and vegetables were almost four times as high. A United States attorney said he was informed that a Boston hotel charged \$1.70 for two tomatoes. Another hotel was reported to have charged 20 cents for a boiled potato.

Profiteers Hunted Down

"Flying squadrons" of the Department of Justice hunted profiteers and hoarders in various sections of the country. The department announced in midsummer of 1920 that 1,834 arrests had been made and 151 convictions obtained in the anti-profiteering drive.

The department also helped sponsor a "Save Money on Meat" week in which 16,000 New York City butchers were reported as cooperating. Buyers were urged to pass up the higher priced cuts of beef, pork and lamb and to shop for less expensive cuts. "Carry your lunch" clubs were organized in an attempt to force down restaurant prices.

A study made by the New York City health department showed that out of some 2,000 families, "offering a fair cross-section of the city," about 40 percent entirely dropped meat from their diets, another 40 percent eliminated eggs, and 15 percent did without milk.

High prices were a hot issue in the presidential campaign that year. Republican and Democratic platforms contained "high cost of living" planks. The Republicans said the prime cause was a "50 percent depreciation in the purchasing power of the dollar due to a 200 percent expansion of currency and credit" by the Wilson administration.

The Democrats' Version

The Democrats said the remedy lay "in increased production and a relentless pursuit of those who take advantage of postwar conditions and are demanding and receiving outrageous profits."

Republican Candidate Harding pleaded for thrift as a cure for high prices. Democratic Candidate Cox charged the Republican-controlled Congress with protecting profiteers.

Many other theories were advanced for the high cost of living. Economists cited scarcity of commodities, heavy increases of exports of foodstuffs, increases in wages and decreases in hours of labor, a multiplicity of strikes, hoarding and profiteering as reasons for booming prices.

The exact effect of the buyers' strikes cannot be measured statistically. But they undoubtedly had some influence.

Food and Wages

An index of food prices compiled by the Bureau of Labor Statistics which put 1913 food costs at 80 percent 1920 prices at 185. In that year the upward curve was broken.

Pot-Type Heaters Used In U. S. Have Been Streamlined

AP New-features

NEW YORK—The pot-type oil burner used in hundreds of thousands of American homes has been streamlined by petroleum engineers to improve efficiency, cut operating cost and make it easier to install in low-cost house construction.

The pot-type burner is the commonest type of burner. It is used where there is no central heating system. Its lower initial cost compared with mechanical gas-burner systems, has been offset by the fact that it could burn only premium fuel instead of the cheaper fuel used in more elaborate installations.

Engineers of the Socony-Vacuum Laboratories have just completed a year-long project of redesigning the burner. They made five changes, altering the fuel intake and method of mixing air, so that the No. 2 fuel, which also has more heat units per gallon than the premium grades, can now be used.

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
