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AROUND THE CLOCK

A LONG CONVERSATION WITH A SPARROW DURING A 4 HOUR SCHOOL BOARD MEETING OR, I DIDN'T SAY ANOTHER WORD.

(Scene: School board office. We hear various school officials pleading the case for The Florida Education Assn. In the background is a large portrait of George Dabbs. SPARROW - You couldn't get a \$5 bond issue passed in Seminole County now... Of course, I guess public officials could raise a \$36 issue for a one-way bus ticket for you back to New York.

(I didn't say another word.)

REPORTER - Say, the school board is finally going to get some legislation.

SPARROW - Yeah, they want to set the salary for the superintendent of schools.

REPORTER - What's wrong with that?

SPARROW - Well, they'll probably want him to make more than the Junior College president. My guess is they will try for \$16,500. He gets \$12,500 now while Earl Weldon makes \$18,000.

(I didn't say another word.)

REPORTER - Shhh! They're opening bids on printing the Junior College catalog. Orlando firm is low with \$1,497. Sanford firm bid price is only \$80 more.

SPARROW - Yeah, listen, they just gave it to the Orlando firm.

(I didn't say another word.)

REPORTER - Hey, school board is hiring a maintenance man. Will pay him \$500 per month for April, May and June. That's not bad.

SPARROW - Well, keep listening. After that they will pay him \$8,500 annually.

(I didn't say another word.)

REPORTER - I'll say one thing for the school board. See they just clamped down on principals going to all these out of town conferences. Listen, they just said no to two going to Mobile and one to Boston.

SPARROW - Yeah, wouldn't it be something if the County Commission did that.

(I didn't say another word.)

REPORTER - Man I'm falling asleep. Anything going on at Folton St.?

SPARROW - Well, you'll hear about it tomorrow but the police rounded up the eight kids who stole seven cases of beer in Sanford yesterday.

REPORTER - Well, that's great.

SPARROW - Will you keep quiet. Wait Teague is giving you dirty looks.

REPORTER - Sorry, I got carried away with my enthusiasm.

SPARROW - Well, don't. Yeah, they caught the kids but, no charges will be pressed by the guy that got robbed.

Double Sessions For 4,000

Some 4,000 Seminole County youngsters will be forced into double sessions during the next school year. Double sessions in five schools, extended days in possibly two others was ordered by the School Board in an effort to alleviate inadequate school facilities.

Three elementary schools will have double sessions in the first and second grades - Altamonte, South Seminole and Bear Lake. Double sessions were

also authorized for South Seminole Junior High and Lyman High School.

Schools that will face extended days will be Oviedo High School which will have a seven-period day.

School administrator Walter Teague said that Sanford Junior High School can avoid double sessions on an extended day by renovations to the present facility.

He explained that the only way to avert double sessions was temporary classrooms at these schools. However, it was pointed out that it would cost some \$70,000.

Over 4,000 youngsters are expected to be affected by the double session move.

Teague also pointed out that the transportation budget will have to be increased during the next school year to "finance the taxing of these children."

Okay For New Schools

A \$2,500,000 school construction program was given the go-ahead by the Board of Public Instruction last night. The program will include the first phase of three new school facilities.

The new schools will be Sanford Junior High School, a new senior high school for Lyman and a combined junior and senior high school for Oviedo.

The board agreed to hire three architects at the standard 6 percent fee to draw plans for the three schools. The architectural firms are John Burton, Switzer and Switzer and Watson and Co.

In 1965, a state survey team estimated cost of the three schools complete at \$6,000,000.

The first phase program at Sanford Junior High school will include: eight classrooms; six science laboratories; art room; two DCT and DE rooms; two business education rooms; office practice room; home-making suite; two industrial shops; mechanical drawing room; band suite; vocal music suite; language laboratory; shower and locker room; cafeteria; library; administrative suite; teacher work area, 16 restrooms and a mechanical storage facility. Cost is estimated at \$1,515,686.

For the first phase at Oviedo there will be 13 classrooms; two science labs; band suite, vocal suite; home-making suite; six restrooms and mechanical and storage facility. Estimated cost is \$1,418,722.

The board hopes to let bids on the first phase construction in early fall.

Indications are to complete the three schools including cafeterias at Oviedo and Sanford Junior High as well as a school at Oviedo will take "local financing."

Back McDonald, Herlong Urges

Endorsement of Rep. Tom McDonald, along with other Democrats up for reelection in Tuesday's legislative balloting, was expressed this morning by U. S. Rep. A. S. Herlong Jr., in a telephone interview with The Sanford Herald from his home in Leesburg.

The Democratic Congressman is home from Washington for the Easter vacation and said he will spend today in Orlando, cutting TV and radio tapes in support of the Democratic legislative ticket.

"We have an outstanding state," Herlong said, "but we must not leave anything to chance. Back in 1956 I warned my supporters that we had to 'work to get out the vote,' but they were apathetic and I almost lost the race. We don't want that to come back to haunt us."

He accused the Republicans of campaigning on the basis of national party while the local race should be kept on the local level.

"If I were hiring anyone to represent me in Tallahassee, I would hire these same Democrats," he said. "They have no difference in their philosophies; it's only a matter of electing the best man."

He charged the Republicans with using "hokum" in their campaigns and added, "If we are not careful, a lot of voters will fall for it."

Congressman Herlong reiterated his statement that as far as running for reelection next year "I must wait for the proper time. It all depends on the matter of congressional redistricting. For example, if there is a change and my office should be placed in the same district with (Republican Congressman) Ed Garney, I could not let him have free away."

Predict 'Big' Vote In Seminole Tuesday

Seminole and Orange County voters are expected to turn out in near-record numbers Tuesday to choose three members of the state senate and eight members of the state House of Representatives in a special "one-man-one-vote" election ordered by federal court.

Both based their estimates on absentee ballots already cast, such as 74 in this county. There were only 20 absentee ballots cast in the first party primary last month, and only 1,400 votes were counted.

Most candidates, Democrats and Republicans, have been spending near-record amounts of money in this campaign in attempts to win election.

Sanford To Hear Zoo Relocation Plan Monday

Architects John Burton and Eoghan Kelly will present proposals for moving the Sanford zoo to an 11 acre site west of the treatment plant at the City Commission meeting Monday night.

Estimated cost of the relocation and redesigning of cages is estimated at \$75,000 and will take close to two years to complete.

There are no funds at the present time for the zoo relocation.

In other business, during the meeting, the City will sign a contract with the Shoemaker Construction Co. of Sanford to build a Community Facility Building at the Lakefront. Shoemaker was awarded the bid for \$128,000.

FEA Proposals Aired

The School Board appears slightly edgy to the Florida Education Association's priority legislative program to provide \$425,800,000 in new state and county revenue.

Members of the local legislative committee headed by Ernest Moore and JoAnne Rowe emphasized the need for "quality" education on the state level at the school board meeting last night.

The question of whether the city of Sanford is the temporary or permanent county seat appears to be the deciding factor in the courthouse injunction suit, ruling by Circuit Judge Roger Dykes indicated Thursday at the hearings on the suit.

Judge Dykes held the first and second court of the complaint filed by three South Seminole residents to be good but reserved ruling on the third court.

The first court asserts that Sanford is the temporary county seat while the second charges the public notice of the county's intent to construct a new courthouse was given.

people of the county "acquiesced" to the city being the permanent county seat by not taking action at an earlier date was also held back by the judge.

By holding the conflicting claims good, the judge declared they are sufficient in law to receive release.

Next step in the three months old injunction suit will be filing of answers to the rulings by the county and setting of the date for trial on the suit.

The legal action was filed last December by three residents, Casselberry and Forest City in a "class suit" seeking an injunction to halt further expenditure of county funds to construct a new courthouse adjacent to the present one. Representing the complainants is Harlan Tuck, while County Attorney Harold Johnson and City Attorney William Hutchison represent the county and city of Sanford, respectively.



Transfer Of 323 Ordered

The County School Board, in special session last night, agreed to close the seventh and eighth grades at three Negro schools and transfer some 323 students to other schools in an effort to comply with the Civil Rights law.

Under federal guidelines the county must double in desegregation policy for the 1967-68 school year. According to Tom Ritchey, administrator for the freedom of choice program here, thus far only 159 youngsters have crossed the racial barrier.

With the transfer of the more than 300 the county will be complying with the U. S. Supreme Court guidelines.

The schools whose seventh and eighth grades will be eliminated are Jackson-Hestley's at Oviedo in which students will be transferred to Oviedo; Rosewald, where youngsters will go to South Seminole Junior High and Midway where students will be transferred to Sanford Junior High School.

Ritchey told the board that some 16,000 "freedom of choice" forms were sent out and that thus far some 1,400 have not yet been returned. However, he hoped any problem would be eliminated after the first grade survey roundup.

Pastor's Corner

He Is Risen

By REV. LEROY D. SOPER, Holy Cross Episcopal Church. "He is risen! He is risen! He is risen! Can you imagine the impact these words had on the disciples of Jesus when they went to visit His tomb? He had told them that He would overcome death, but they probably didn't believe He meant it literally. Peter, the rock, had denied even knowing Jesus just a few nights before. But here they were, faced with the fact: The tomb was empty. The Lord was victorious over death. The words have echoed down through the years to us, and they still have power. Easter is the one Sunday of the year when the resurrection of Jesus Christ is commemorated. It is the day when we have seen since last year, "He is risen!" which sounds the bright trumpet call of victory. What does it all mean? What does an empty tomb in far off Jerusalem have to do with us in Sanford, Fla., thousands of miles away? Why should I thrill as I do to these words? The fact of the resurrection of Jesus Christ is well established. It is attested to by the witness of the time. Even more, it is attested to by the Church. No religion established on a hoax or a misunderstanding could have survived for two thousand years. No man would be willing to lay his life on the line for something he knew was not true or even doubted. But the years are full of men, from Peter the Apostle to Dr. Carson in the Congo, who have laid down their lives for this cause. The fact of the resurrection of Jesus Christ means to all men that they need no longer fear living or dying, for now there is a promise which makes fear of life, and removes fear from death. I am the resurrection and the life. He that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth in me shall never die. This is the promise Jesus gave Martha as she mourned her brother, Lazarus. And this is the promise He gives each of us. All of us are conscious that we are sinful. We may not exactly recognize the word itself, but we are aware of the fact that we do things which we end up being ashamed of, and we say things we wish we hadn't. We hurt and get hurt. All of us are also conscious of the inevitability of death. We shall all die sooner or later. Somehow or other, mankind in general has linked up these two ideas. "Sin breeds death" is the summation of man's religious experience. We may not know how this comes about, we just know it does. Therefore, for any of us to have any hope for the future—in life or beyond—we must accept that which the Christian Church acknowledges as fact—that there is a way to be forgiven our sins, and that there is life beyond the grave. This is where the fact of the resurrection of Jesus Christ touches each of us. He has shown us that sin can be vanquished. He has shown us that God does not desire that we should be lost, but that we should live. Having conquered sin, the next step is to recognize that death is an opening into a greater life in the presence of God, and not a drop off the end of the world into a void. This is the message of Easter, and it speaks to each of us. From the Cross of Good Friday, Christ looks down upon us all and forgives us. Then on Easter Sunday we are ready to face the empty tomb and to see the risen and glorified Son of God. Christ is risen! And so shall we be raised, too.

Eastern Orthodox Church Dedicates Seminary

The first unit of the Three Hierarchs Seminary of the Eastern Orthodox Church in Fern Park was dedicated Thursday night following a special Vespers Service conducted by Bishop Gregory Adair of New York at St. John Chrysostom Chapel. A happy combination of ancient and modern, the \$30,000 structure is patterned after a Seventh Century monastery on Mt. Athos in Greece. The poured concrete construction is coated with a copper-finish to give it a spiritual appearance. The red tiled roof slants to the outside and high clerestory windows on the outside wall illuminate the rooms. Arches that are a replica of the one at the monastery and will serve as a Baptistry. It will be covered with gold mosaic tile on the outside and aqua tile on the inside. The beautiful site overlooks Lake of the Woods and features large spreading trees. The first building will serve as Seminary and Eastern Diocese headquarters and office for the national church publication "American Review of Eastern Orthodoxy." A small bell tower at the entrance will contain a bell which is more than 100 years old and was obtained from an old church being torn down in Ireland. A large bell tower, a Russian, or so-called "union dome" similar to the one atop St. Isaac's Cathedral in New York City, will be a feature of the structure. Future plans call for the construction of a dormitory, library, recreation hall, cafeteria, and administration building and a retirement center for priests and their wives. A non-sectarian nursery and kindergarten, with 100 children, will be constructed, already is in progress. Mission of the Seminary is to train priests to bring the Eastern Orthodox Faith to the American people in the English language. The Eastern Orthodox Church was the first Protestant Church in America. Father John Adair, brother of Bishop Adair, is priest of the local church which has 70 members. Father Andrew Johnson is dean of the Seminary, which already has two young men enrolled.

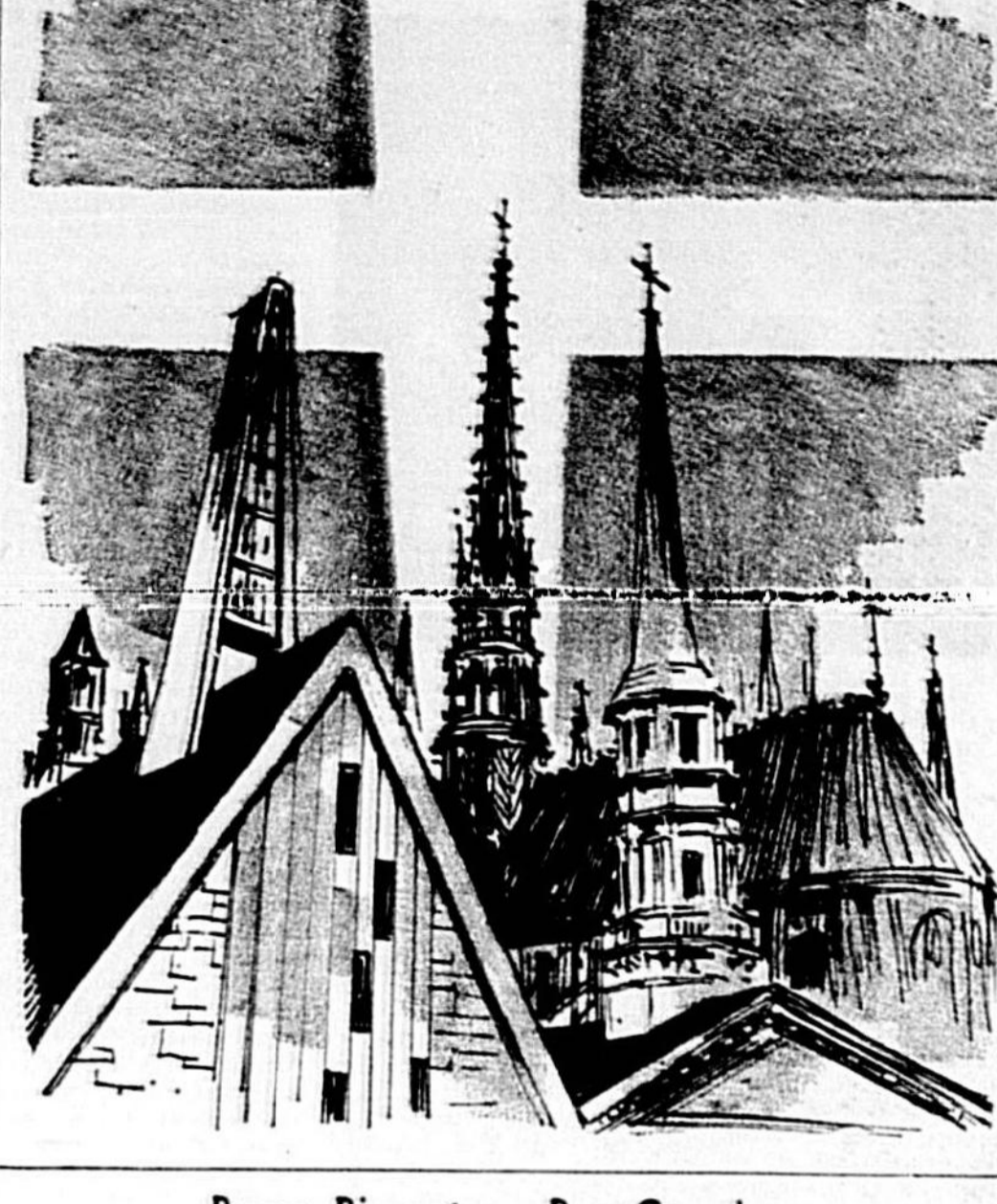

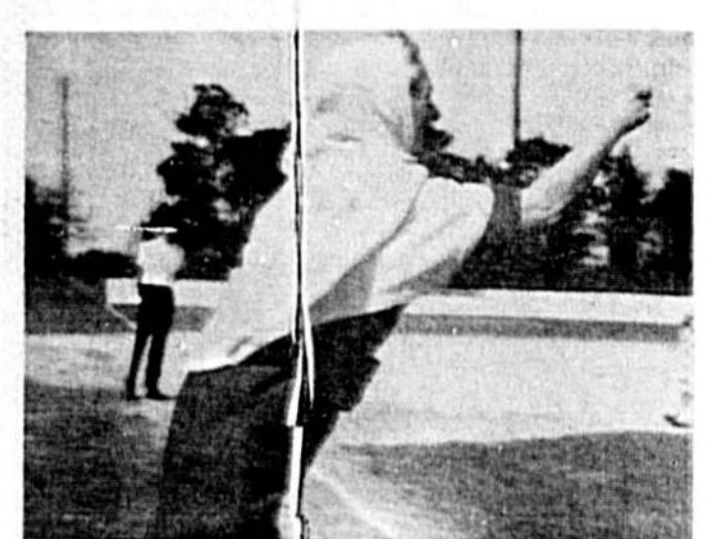

NEW YORK (AP) — The east Easter in 16 years Sunday and wintry weather in many parts of the country apparently didn't dampen plans for traditional sunrise religious services and displays of finery in the Easter parade.

While preparations were being made for the services and parades, Pope Paul VI led Roman Catholics in the annual Good Friday observance today and Christ's Crucifixion. Thursday night in Rome, the Pope washed the feet of 13 boys, emulating in a Holy Thursday Mass at the Basilica of St. John Lateran the action of Christ at the Last Supper.

Good Friday is not a legal holiday, but still many business offices across the country were closed today, including the stock and principal commodity exchanges in New York.

Banks, retail businesses and department stores were generally open for Easter shoppers.

In an extended five-day forecast which covers Easter Sunday, the Weather Bureau said temperatures would average below normal in the West, Southwest and along the Eastern seaboard. The forecast called for rain over most of the nation except in the far Southwest. No snow was forecast anywhere.

An Associated Press survey showed retail sales of spring clothes down two to five per cent in the Northeast and Midwest, but up as much as 25 per cent in Richmond, Va., and about five per cent nationally.

New York's Easter parade up Fifth Avenue is expected to be as grand as ever.

Many will join the parade after attending sunrise services at Radio City Music Hall where such observances have been held every year since the building opened 31 years ago.

Washington will have its traditional sunrise services, and the egg rolling on the White House lawn Monday. Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson's Easter outfit will be a mimosas yellow silk dress with matching coat.

Los Angeles will observe Easter with dawn services in the Hollywood Bowl for the 45th time. The 3rd annual sunrise service will take place in the most spectacular setting of all — Arizona's Grand Canyon.

The Need To Vote

The Herald asked Mrs. James Bildebeck, president of the Provisional League of Women voters of Seminole County for some comments on Tuesday's election.

"If as Theodore H. White has said, 'Politics is the number one spectator and participation sport in the United States,' it has not been apparent in the recent voting records in our county."

Yet men have died for the privilege of voting. Women of America spent 72 years, millions of dollars and many untold lives so that women could have the franchise. Negroes have faced jail, economic reprisal and bodily harm to make the promise of a Constitutional Amendment. The ballot box, the vote is the primary instrument of political power in a self-governing country. The vote is a fundamental political right, a symbol of equality, a weapon for self-protection and a tool to get things done.

We urge you to vote.

The vote makes a difference and often a major difference. Thomas Jefferson was elected President of the U.S. over Aaron Burr by a single vote in 1800, when the disputed election was thrown into the House of Representatives. One vote made Washington, Oregon, and Idaho a part of the United States. Woodrow Wilson was elected to the presidency in 1912 by less than one vote per precinct in California over Charles Evans Hughes. John F. Kennedy barely topped Richard M. Nixon with a national plurality of 112,253 votes out of almost 69 million cast — a margin of less than one vote per precinct. More recent and nearer home — last fall Forest City became a fire district because of one vote at the poll.

We urge you to make yours an informed vote.

If we value our one vote, it is not enough just to exercise our right; we must also make our one vote count the way we want it. In order to do this we must be informed on the candidates and the issues. — This often takes real effort. It can be done by reading the newspapers, watching TV programs featuring candidates, attending political rallies, following the recommendations of groups whose outlook we approve, and seeking the advice of friends.

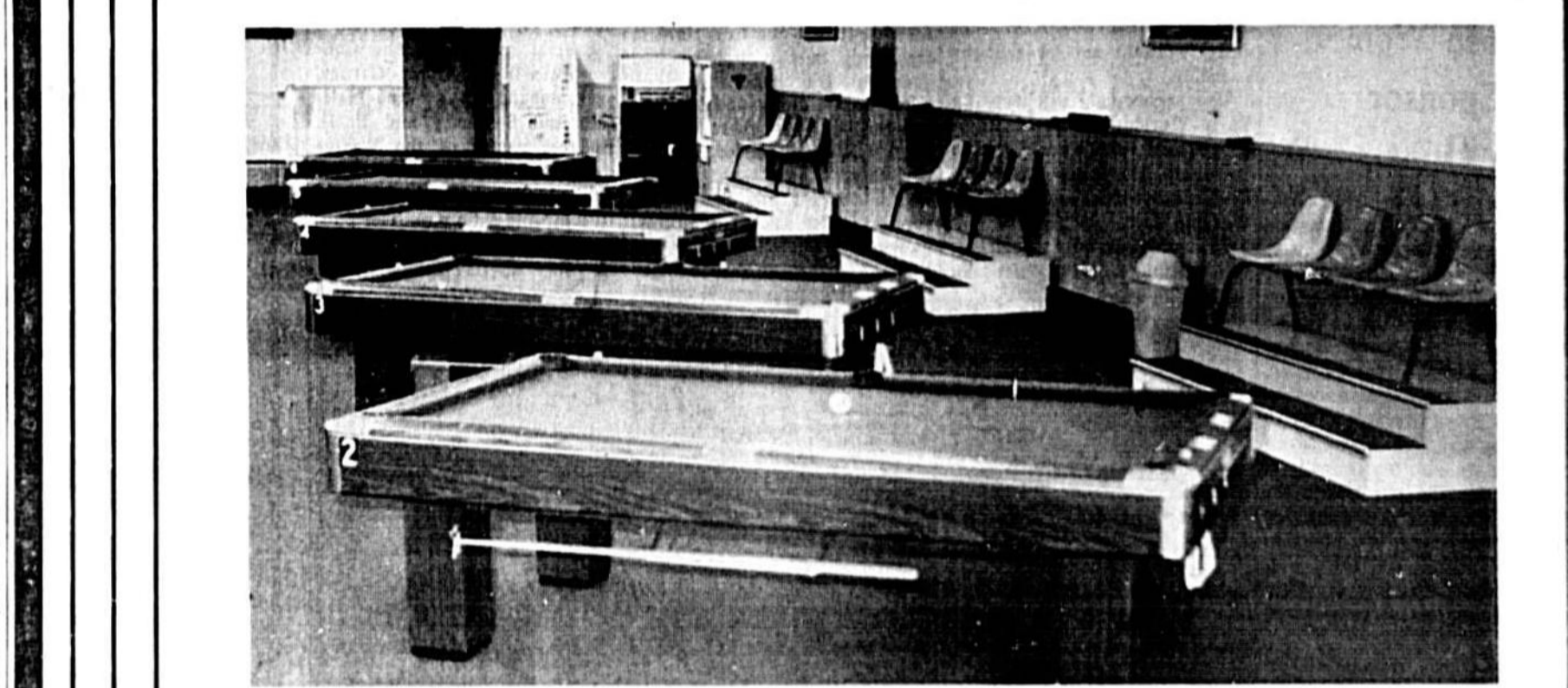

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U. S. Jets Hammer Thermal Power Plant Near Hanoi

SAIGON (AP) — Warplanes from two U.S. aircraft carriers penetrated the missile envelope around North Vietnam's industrial heart on Friday to attack the Thai Nguyen thermal power plant 39 miles from Hanoi.

It was the second big strike against the power plant, which is close to the vital Thai Nguyen steel plant. The steel plant has been bombed four times. Both targets were barred to U.S. pilots until early this month but have since been subjected to heavy bombing despite continuous bad weather over North Vietnam.

Pilots from the 85,000-ton nuclear-powered carrier Enterprise and the 76,000-ton Kitty Hawk streaked through the Thai Nguyen antiaircraft defenses under cover of the darkness before dawn. Flying A5 all-weather intruders, they rained down 1,000-pound bombs aimed by radar and computers.

While one group of raiders was going after the Thai Nguyen plant, more intruders from the two carriers winged 32 miles south of the Red capital to blast an army barracks area at Chi Ne, where North Vietnamese troops may be staging to infiltrate the South.

The Thai Nguyen steel plant and power station are a significant segment of North Vietnam's industry. The steel plant, though incomplete, had been producing oil tanks and bridge sections. The power plant produces the electricity for the Hanoi-Haiphong area.

Both are well within the ring of sites for the Soviet-built Thor missile attacks, but previous raids on air missiles that comprise the "missile envelope" around the Hanoi-Haiphong area, U.S. pilots call this "Indian country."

Air Force spokesmen no longer say when U.S. planes run into missile attacks, but previous raids on the Thai Nguyen complex are known to have provoked a volley of the Red rockets. However, no losses were announced for Friday's strikes.

Although carrier Navy jets and Air Force planes from Thailand have now passed the Thai Nguyen area half a dozen times, no comprehensive report has been made on the effects of the raids. Spokesmen say heavy weather has prevented good visual or photo reconnaissance after the raids.

Heavy weather continued over the North Thursday, but pilots flew 40 missions. Most of their targets were road, rail and water supply points on the Hanoi area south to the 17th Parallel.

In South Vietnam, there was some scattered but sharp ground fighting, but the war generally slackened. It was one for lack of allied effort, however. Currently 18 ground operations are under way, involving U.S., South Korean and Australian troops.

The heaviest reported fighting came in the northern part of South Vietnam where U.S. Marines killed 92 North Vietnamese regulars Thursday — 81 of these in an unusual duel between Communist mortars and the unproved 100mm howitzers aboard two Marine amphibious craft. Three Marines were killed and 1 were wounded.

In the central highlands, in the jungles along the Cambodian border and in the delta ricefields, the Viet Cong generally stuck to long range mortar attacks, now their chief weapon in the growing war of attrition.

2 Million Yanks Going Overseas

NEW YORK (AP) — Tourists planning summer trips to Europe under the new lower air fares are boosting business for travel agents and airlines.

Two million Americans are expected to travel to Europe this year, up from 1.6 million in 1966.

"We're completely booked until September," said Henry P. Huff, executive vice president of Trans International Airlines, an Oakland, Calif., supplement carrier.

Trans International has scheduled more than 200 charter flights to Europe from San Francisco, Los Angeles, Chicago, St. Louis, Columbus, New York, Boston and other cities this summer, Huff said. Business is up 25 per cent over 1966.

British Overseas Airways Corp. said its New York reserve airbus department has been swamped with calls. BOAC is offering 39 itineraries with room for 25,000 to 30,000 travelers.

American Express reports its European tour bookings are up 25 to 30 per cent over last year and attributes about half the increase to the lower fares.

"Mostly they are people who wouldn't have gone before," said an American Express spokesman. "But now the word is out—if you plan to spend \$600 or \$700 on a vacation, you can go to Europe just as well."

HONG KONG (AP) — Canton Radio said today the Red Chinese army has taken over the communist party apparatus and most major facilities in the south China metropolis, but others, frequently unnamed, disapprove because of the risk of killing civilians.

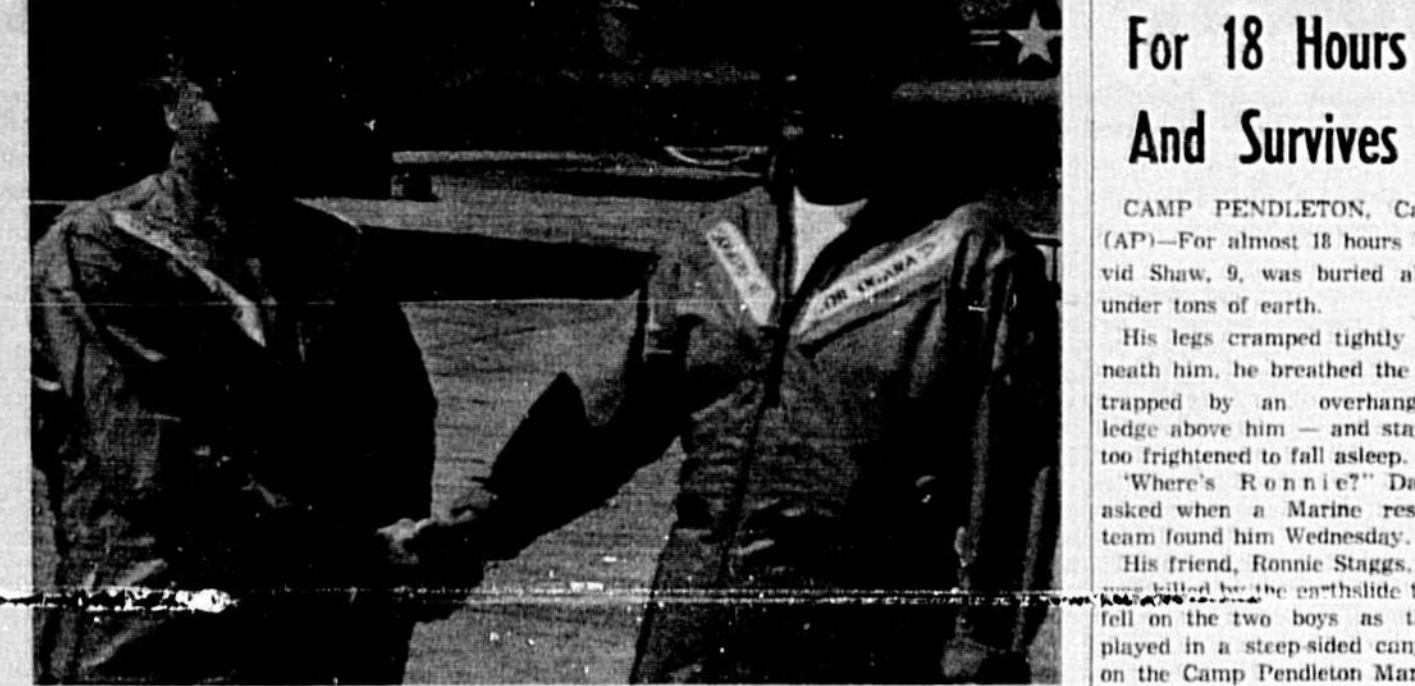

Services Held In Strange Chapel

WITH 25TH DIVISION, Vietnam (AP) — They held the service two days late in the strangest chapel you could find in Vietnam. Then, the prayers finished, more than a ton of dynamite blasted the room to bits.

The service was held by Chaplain (Capt.) Tucker for the "tunnel rats" of his battalion who had spent a week crawling around through a vast Viet Cong underground tunnel complex 30 miles west of Saigon.

The eerie job of "running" the tunnels falls to the slight of build who can maneuver through the underground labyrinth that the Communists have bobstrapped when forced out by advancing American troops. The job is vastly complicated by nature. Big black ants charge the flashlight-aided tunnel rats. Swarms of smaller ants can cover the tunnel's walls, ceiling and floor for hundreds of feet.

Chaplain Tucker, of Monticello, Ark., said, "Somewhat it seemed fitting to hold a service close to the men who have such a terrible job. We couldn't do it on Sunday because the men were too spread out and too deep in the complex. But we made it on Tuesday."

The six men from the 2nd Battalion, 27th Infantry Division, in one of the main rooms at

Chaplain Tucker crawled in. His steel helmet with a black cross inked on the front of the camouflage cover was the altar. A New Testament was carried in the helmet's elastic band. Roman Catholics and four Protestants.

Chaplain Tucker read St. Luke's description of the aftermath of the Crucifixion. "And he took it down and wrapped it in linen and laid it down in a satchel that was heavy in stone which never man before laid."

The tunnel rats began dragging charges into the complex for the final act, a chain of heavy explosions that destroyed the underground Communist camp.

Spec. 4 William Lowery of Greenville, Mich., said, "They've held services all over the place for GIs, but I've never heard of it being done for our tunnel rats. It was a nice thing to know the chaplain would crawl underground into a place like that to be with us."

Pfc. Donald Ellis of Emmetsburg, Ky., wryly admitted later that it was the first time in his Army career that he had ever blasted a chapel.

"It was striking and hard to breathe down there," said Spec. 4 Richard Carfara of Jersey City, N.J., "but it really was a day for me. Sometimes running those tunnels you feel like you're cut off from everything. And I mean everything."

Boy, 9, Buried For 18 Hours And Survives

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP)—For almost 18 hours David Shaw, 9, was buried alive under tons of earth.

His legs cramped tightly beneath him, he breathed the air trapped by an overhanging ledge above him — and stayed too frightened to fall asleep.

"Where's Ronnie?!" David asked when a Marine rescue team found him Wednesday.

His friend, Ronnie Staggs, 10, was the one who told him that the two boys who were playing in a steep-sided canyon on the Camp Pendleton Marine Base.

"When the dirt first fell, I heard Ronnie scream 'Get me out,'" David said.

"I said 'I didn't think we could get out. Then I heard him crying and it was the last thing I remember until I heard foot steps and the noise the shovels made. I thought they were going to kill me because all the dirt was falling on me."

The boys—sons of non-commissioned Marine officers stationed at the base—wandered into the canyon Tuesday afternoon in search of a model airplane. Search parties hunted through the night and found the victims by mistaking the cave for mudmarring.

Lance Cpl. James Sylvester of Portland, Ore., dug a shovelful of dirt and uncovered a deep hole. Pfc. Charles Perkins of Lexington, Ky., put his hand in the hole and touched David on the head.

"He began to cry," Sylvester said. "I shouted that we found him."

Then Pfc. Terry Womack of Shelbyville, Tenn., crawled into the hole and tied his belt around David's waist, and the other Marines pulled him out.

A few minutes later several more tons of earth fell into the area where David had been trapped. The body of the Staggs boy was uncovered nearby.

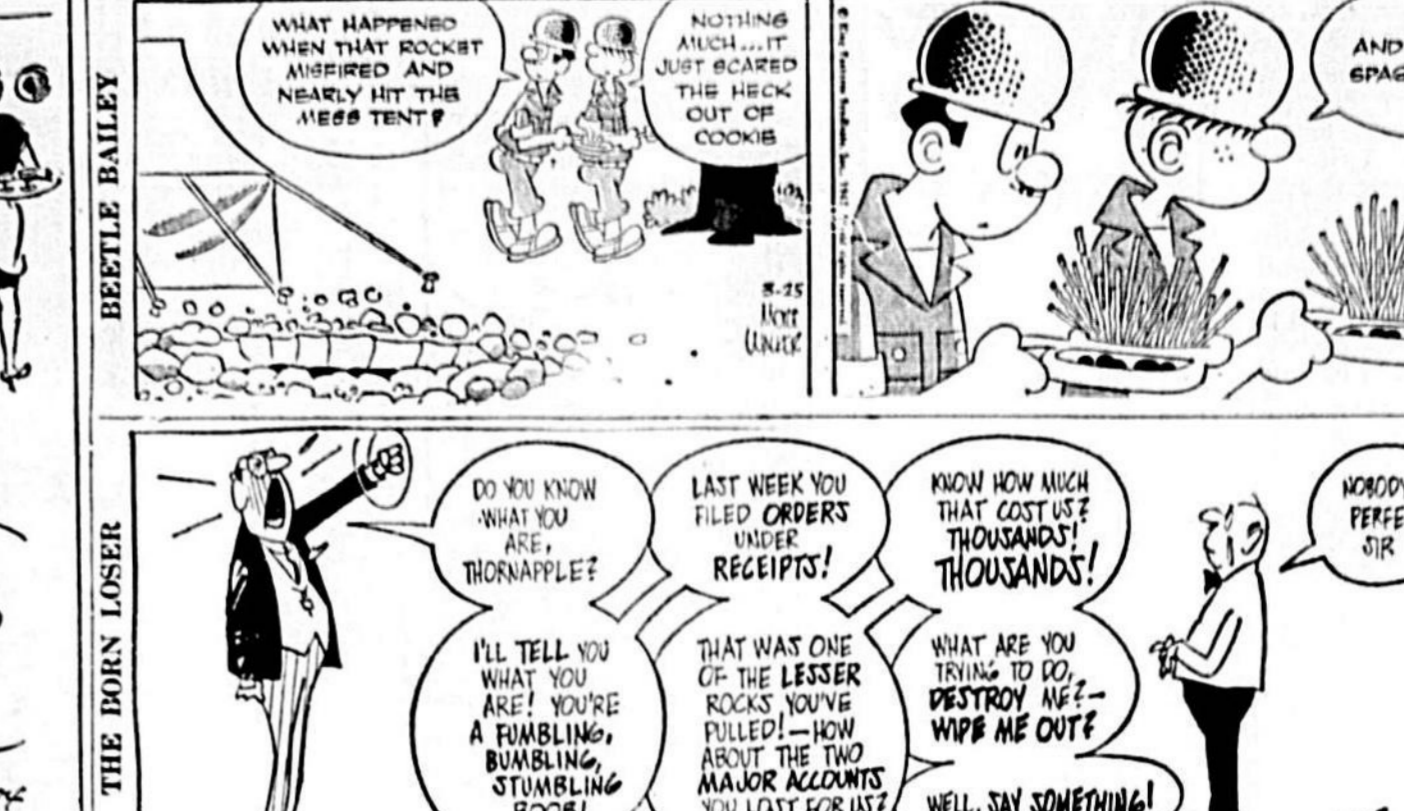

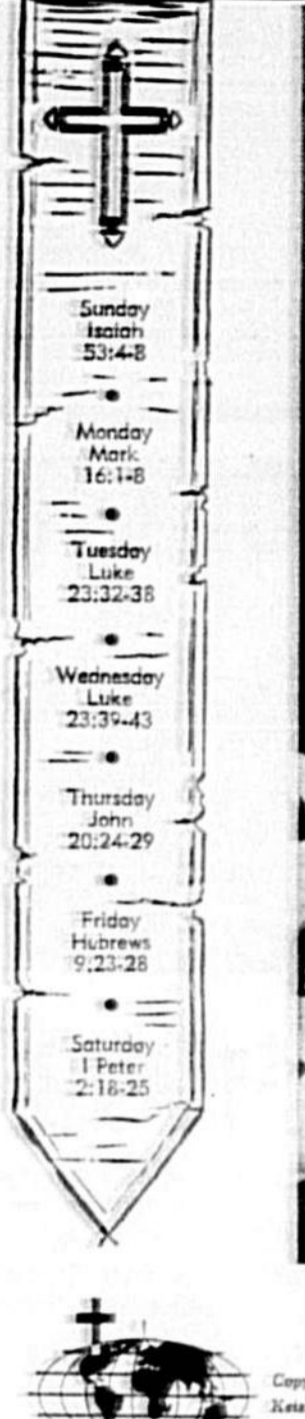

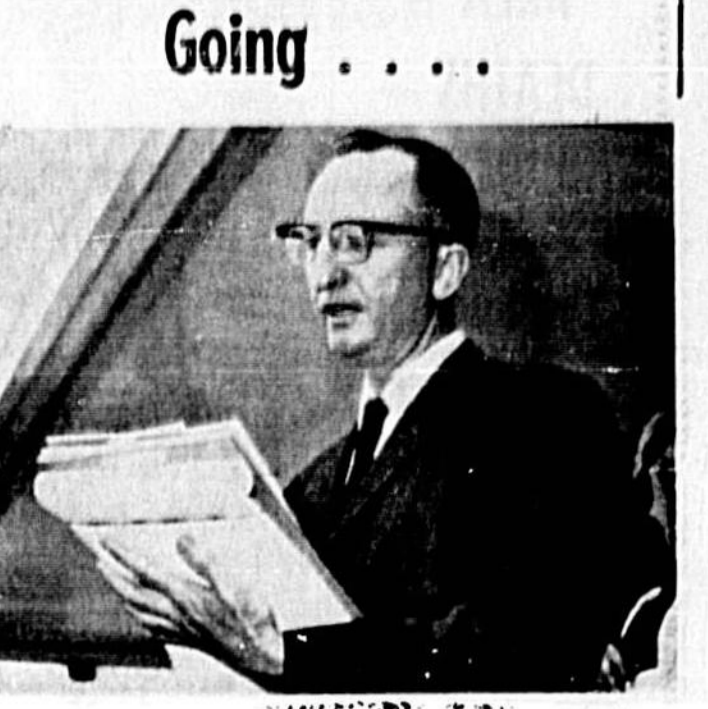
City May Shut Swim Pools
