New county motto: Hang on to your receipts

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The county commissioners gave a helping hand to Seminole Community College Tuesday and then went to school on one of their own.

By a 3-0 vote, the commission gave tentative approval to a 180-acre satellite SCC campus north of Oviedo. On with education.

By a 3-0 vote, the commission amended an old ordinance and created a tougher travel receipt policy that amounted to a resounding thumbs

down to District 3 Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide in his efforts to get back \$1,082 that Clerk of the Court Maryanne Morse withheld from his paychecks.

Van Der Weide and Morse have been locked in a legal battle that began after the commissioner returned from a business trip to Europe late last summer. Morse maintains Van Der Weide was not authorized to make the London portion of the trip and that he did not bring back receipts for meals.

Citing the ordinance the commission passed that allowed \$50 in meals per diem, Van Der

Weide said that receipts were not necessary. There has been confusion about what the commissioners actually had passed.

"There shouldn't be confusion," Commissioner Daryl McLain said today. "Receipts are necessary and Dick Van Der Weide is no exception. He has intentionally been trying to mislead the board."

After study of the board's taped meetings, McLain said he could not find evidence that Van Der Weide was authorized to go to London. His trip was approved for Holland. "Whatever he did in London was on his own not for the county,"

McLain said.

Each of the commissioners has given depositions in the case. "Now," Commission Chairman Randy Morris said, "this commission has been removed from the equation. Dick Van Der Weide can't use it as an excuse that he lost his receipts."

McLain made a motion Tuesday that would require receipts of county officials on all trips and another that would rescind the 1997 ordinance that created confusion on travel.

"We're accountable like anyone else," Commission Chairman Morris said. **Please See County, Page 3A**

Park site investigated

SANFORD - The city plans to continue looking into the possibility of establishing a lakefront park on property immediately north of the Seminole Herald office, which would be surrounded by U.S. Highway 17-92, North French Avenue and Fulton Street.

Meanwhile some area citizens have indicated they may fight to keep Fort Mellon Park as the city's lakefront park.

"I've spoken to a number of people regarding whether or not a park near the Herald along the lakefront might be a good replacement for Fort Mellon Park," said Mayor Larry Dale, "and some said yes while others said no, so I don't really have a feeling about it either way."

Adult fines to help troubled youngsters

SEMINOLE COUNTY - There is currently \$35,700 available in the Substance Abuse Trust Fund that Seminole County began collecting in fines 4 years ago - and some of it is targeted to the county's Prosecution for Youth Program (P.A.Y.).

Anyone guilty of a misdemeanor in which the unlawful use of drugs or alcohol was involved, has chalked up \$15 - \$1 for the Clerk of the Court and \$14 that was deposited in a trust fund to be used by local public or private agencies for substance abuse prevention, intervention or treatment services.

On Tuesday, the Board of Seminole County Commissioners approved moving \$10,000 of the trust fund money into P.A.Y., which is getting 50-percent more referrals than it did a year ago.

Jean Jeffcoat, the P.A.Y. manager, said that the requested funds will allow P.A.Y. to provide approximately 5 counseling services each to 50 additional clients. She said the number of clients has grown dramatically since the opening of the new Juvenile Assessment Center. "More juveniles are being held accountable for their actions," Jeffcoat said.

P.A.Y. extends its services to delinquent juveniles referred from the State Attorney's Office. These clients (mostly first-time of-

fenders), along with the families receive counseling, treatment and education. Issues covered include cycles of addiction, anger management and impulse control.

"These funds were put away for this purpose," Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide said. "Now is the time to do something. It makes sense to have it used properly."

Commission Chairman Randy Morris said he was pleased that the Juvenile Assessment Center was able to get so many youngsters headed over for help before they became a more violent offender. Early intervention in their lives was a must. Less than 14 percent of the juveniles who complete the P.A.Y. and Department of Justice **Please See Pay, Page 3A**

350 to receive GED diplomas tonight

Seminole Community College Health building.

College spokesman Robert Lyles said those people receiving diplomas were not affected by the theft of testing material from the Okaloosa-

Walton Community College testing center.

Donations make a difference for Safehouse

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Imagine the bill for providing food, toiletries, electricity and water to a household of more than 30 women and children.

The estimated operational budget for Safehouse of Seminole, the county's only domestic violence shelter, is approximately \$280,000, with the largest part of this amount coming from government funding.

The HRS certified shelter opened 2 years ago to provide shelter, counseling, case management, and crisis intervention. Safehouse has the capacity to shelter 38 victims and their children and they usually stay for 6 weeks.

While grants and foundations

contribute in a large part to the operation of the shelter, Safehouse depends on contributions to make up a difference of approximately \$65,500. One group which has taken on a part of that task is the Heathrow Women's Club.

The club will hold its largest fund-raiser of the year tonight, a fashion show to be held at the Country Club at Heathrow. Proceeds of the show will benefit 5 charities the club has identified; Safehouse, Sanford Middle School "Adopt A School", the Lake Mary Heathrow Festival of the Arts, Seminole Community College scholarships and Lisa Merlin House.

"The Heathrow Women's Club has been an ongoing source of donations for us," said Laurie Kemp, education coordinator for Safehouse.

The club first presented Safehouse with a check for \$1,100 at the May 1997 General Membership Meeting. The funds went toward covering the utility bill which averages \$800 a month. In addition to donating 40 percent of the money it has raised in the 1997-98 fiscal year, which includes the proceeds from the fashion show, it is providing \$800 per quarter toward the electric bill through the generosity of Longwood Lincoln-Mercury.

"It just means that general funds can be used for other programs," said Kemp.

The club also collects in-kind contributions for the shelter. Each month members are asked to bring specific items to the general membership meeting, to be given to the shelter. Kemp said they have received linens, hair products

and cosmetics, to be used by the residents, through this program. In December, there were 6 babies in residence and desperately-needed diapers were donated by the club.

Sponsored by Longwood Lincoln-Mercury, the second charity fashion show will feature the best in spring fashions presented by Our Boutique, of Longwood, and Adriana's, of Winter Park. The evening includes a buffet of champagne punch, hors d'oeuvres, delicious desserts, coffee and tea.

Linda Moncrief has volunteered for over 15 years for this organization. Her daughter, Leigh, and another Sanford resident, Donna Payne, have been roommates at its summer activities.

Moncrief is also one of the organizers for this event. She, and Ethel Smith, have gathered others to assist with the meal, a country store, arts & crafts, trash & treasure, games and auction.

Other Sanford locals, Jeannette and Cindy Siffey, will assist with the auction while their husbands, father and son, George and Tom Siffey, will talk and rattle as any professional auctioneer would, to sell items at the highest bid. All to help numerous physically challenged individuals to be able to spend some time at Camp Challenge and enjoy all the wonderful things it has to offer.

According to Moncrief other agencies such as the Ixora Garden Club, the Woman's Club of Sanford and the Junior Woman's Club of Mt. Dora and Jack McDonald and friends of the Fraternal Order of Police will add their own expertise to the roast.

Kathy Kraanoff has headed up the country store and Billie Kolowski has co-chaired, with items such as baked goods, jams and jellies to be sold. Lori Hartsock and Leslie Wilbur have worked diligently to retrieve plants for purchase. Sue Narrow has made sure that plenty of arts and crafts will be available. Tom Wilson will be conducting games to be played. The sorority, ESA, is in charge of decorating the tables in "early American pig motif" with checkered tablecloths to accent.

Local nurseries have donated various plants. Creative Clay in Mt. Dora will send terra cotta pigs. But, many other treasures will also be waiting for those in attendance.

It is hopeful that merchandise signed by Tim Raines and Jeff Blake will be available for the auction. RiverShip Romance has donated cruise tickets. Hotel visits, theme park passes, lounge chairs, furniture and golf outings are also among the many things to be auctioned.

Crafters may set up a table for their wares at the cost of \$20. "Chances" are also being sold and the winner will receive a dollhouse fully furnished and topped with a small dog on the front porch.

Cottages are air-conditioned and the grounds hold a crafts center, swimming pool, archery and rifle range. A one-acre fishing pond, recreation center, dining hall, nature corral, petting zoo and a half-mile nature trail accent the spacious spread.

They stay on the road during bloom season judging at various shows. Their neighbor doesn't mind flower sitting when they have to be away for a day.

Jean is the former owner of the plant nursery, "Jean Norris Ferns and Exotic Plants" located on Celery Avenue. Daylilies were second to roses in sales at the nursery during bloom season.

A few tips on growing daylilies. You do not have to purchase the more expensive plants to have a beautiful display. The older varieties that sell for \$2 to \$10, when taken care of properly, can be appreciated as much as the \$100 ones. Do not plant them too deep. They are shallow growers and like to be planted almost on the top of the ground. Plant in a sunny area, they love sunshine. Water is very important, water them regularly when we do not have abundant rain. Plenty of

water during the bloom season encourages big lush blooms. Use a balanced fertilizer when you first plant and then fertilize again in the Spring and again in the Fall after they have finished blooming. Daylilies will bloom and flourish better if you dig up the clump every two or three years. Shake and wash all of the old dirt from them. Divide the fans (plants) by working each of them loose or cut with a sharp knife, being very careful not to damage the crown (section between the foliage and the roots). When you replant make a small mound of the soil under each fan. Spread the roots over the mound and sprinkle soil over all of the roots. Do not plant too deep. If your lilies grow grassy and do not bloom well it is a good sign that they are too deep.

There are many growers and hybridizers in the Sanford area. David Kirchhoff and Mort Moras

at Daylily World just off of State Road 46, on White Cedar Road; Big Tree Garden, located at the site of the Big Tree Park on General Hutchinson Parkway, are just a couple. There are also growers in Eustis and Enterprise. All of these gardens are commercial. Telephone before you go to be sure they are home.

Saturday, May 2, the Sunbelt Daylily Chapter will hold their 19th Annual Daylily show at the Sanford Civic Center. The show will be open to the public at 1 p.m. until 5 p.m. There will be a daylily plant sale beginning at 9 a.m. Bargains galore! Admission is free and there will be a door prize given out each hour during the show (1 until 5 p.m.). Exhibitors will come from many sections of Central Florida. This accredited show will be judged by AHS Judges.

April 23 will be screened for unusually high scores. Lyles said tests for tonight's honorees were taken as much as 8 weeks ago and sent to Tallahassee to be scored.

However, 135 test-takers in Seminole County will have to wait until testing resumes, possibly by May 8.

A study conducted by Harvard researchers shows that high school dropouts who obtain a GED earn more money

than other dropouts. In fact, the hourly wage of GED-holders rose at a faster rate after obtaining the GED than before.

Perhaps the increased earning potential and the new career options available to GED graduates are two reasons why 813 students last year completed the GED examination through Seminole Community College's General Education Development program. Ac-

cording to Harriet Little, Seminole Community College's coordinator of Adult Basic and GED, "The number of people coming back to earn their state of Florida high school diploma through our GED program has been on a steady rise for the past three years."

Tonight's ceremony begins at 7:30 p.m. Three students planning to continue their education at SCC will be awarded \$1,000 scholarships.

Commissioner Win Adams said. "The bottom line is everyone else has to produce receipts and no should we. No receipts, no money."

Two other county officials - Tourism Development Director Jack Wert and Economic Development Director Bob Turk - were required to produce receipts - on the same trip Van Der Weide was on and he should not be given preferential treatment, McLain said.

Van Der Weide, nursing a foot injury, was not present when McLain made his motion during the district commissioners report at the end of the afternoon session.

Commissioner Grant Maloy,

annoyed at what was happening, refused to stay for the vote. "It was pre-arranged, obviously staged," Maloy complained. "They were attacking a guy who wasn't there to defend himself."

Van Der Weide called the incident another round of dirty politics. "It was blatant. I suspect they had big time pressure. They realized if you can't win it court, you try something else," he said.

Morse said she had not yet talked to her attorney about what transpired Tuesday. "I'm pleased at the action the board took. That they said they had erred and were taking the appropriate action. I've only been doing what I am supposed to do all along."

and the park property proposed for the development of a major hotel and conference center complex, there has been a great deal of consideration regarding the potential of such a change.

The matter was discussed briefly during the Sanford City Commission work session Monday afternoon. City Manager Bill Simmons said he had received a communication from Sid Vihien, regarding part of the property, to determine if the city might be interested in purchasing it.

Simmons said one of the problems may be because of multiple ownership of the land. "It's about 10 acres," he said, "but there are several owners involved and we would have to deal with all of them if we were to obtain the property."

The city at one time owned the land. "In about 1880," Simmons explained, "a group of investors offered to purchase the land. They said they wanted to build an assisted living center there. But nothing was ever done and while they had indicated they would pay the city \$10,000 a year to hold the land for them, the deal fell through and nothing ever happened." The land has since been sold.

"One of the reasons I imagine," he continued, "is that the sub-surface may have at one time been a dump or something and no one could actually build a physical building on the property. But that wouldn't prevent the development of a park."

Commissioner Kerry Lyons indicated he was in favor of looking into the possible purchase. "It would be an excellent location," he said. "Maybe we could even have our proposed riverwalk go into that area."

Mayor Larry Dale suggested that with the land abutting the city's Public Works facility, the now-abandoned city gun range and the PBA building, "if all of these could be combined, we would have an excellent location for a park."

It was also determined that there may be some difficulty in getting the new park approved, but it would be mostly based on traffic, and Mayor Dale suggested that could be resolved if Fulton Street became the main entrance rather than on the highway.

Regarding the proposed change in Fort Mellon Park however, there is an indication that a citizens' drive may get

under way toward putting it on a referendum.

During a public meeting on the proposal at the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce on April 9, Dale had responded to a question regarding a referendum.

"In our representative form of government in this county," Dale said, "we elect representatives to conduct public meetings...to make decisions they think are best for the community. If we held a referendum for every issue, we wouldn't need a representative form of government."

When asked by a member of the audience, "Shouldn't we have a referendum considering the amount of opposition?" Dale responded, "Opposition occurs anytime something new is introduced. There has been an overwhelming favorable re-

sponse to the project."

A petitioners' committee however, has since filed an affidavit with the City Clerk's office announcing it is intending to circulate a petition to have the question of Fort Mellon Park hotel/conference center put up for a public vote.

In order to bring the matter onto the ballot, it would take signatures from at least 15 percent of the voters who cast ballots in the last city election, and were still qualified to vote. It is expected such a petition would take over 2,600 names which would have to be verified. If that is accomplished in time, the matter could be placed on the next city ballot.

There is no indication at this time that any such petition has been finalized for circulation.

programs re-

offend within a year. "The concept of the trust fund was that adults who broke the law would pay so that kids would not follow the same path," Jefferson said. "We want to help these young people make the most of a second chance."

Failure to provide these services will result in more cases being referred to an already overcrowded juvenile court system, which has limited resources, and long waiting lists for those services that are available.

It is estimated that more than half of juvenile crime is committed by young people under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Without early intervention, these juveniles are likely to re-offend, jeopardizing public safety.

Dances were held with real live bands for local people as well as sororities and fraternities from Stetson University. Ladies dressed in long gowns and gentlemen in coat and tie, sometimes tux. As there was no air conditioning yet, lakefront doors were thrown open and couples strolled along the lakefront between dances.

All the stores in downtown Sanford (including those in the Arcade now gone) were busy and thriving in the Depression?

The neutralizing and compromising of America

Shades of the Korean 50's misadventure! Neutralize, but don't win! Make both sides compromise their way of life! Make both sides sacrifice their sovereignty for "peace"! Make both sides comply with the "doctrine"! The whole world can live as one, right? Wrong! All nations, their people and their sovereign way of life should not be interrupted, intimidated or forced to change by a global, self-induced power or anybody of elite pundits who think they "know best". Since the United States and her allies won WWI and then won WWII, when thousands died to preserve her liberties and freedom, the key has been, under the since-then direction of the United Nations, to neutralize, not win, any conflict between nations or factions.

At Lake Mary High, the training staff is one of the best in the state, and one of its stars, Junior Randy Polito, was named 1998 Student Athletic Trainer of the Year for the state of Florida by the Athletic Trainers Association of Florida.

Polito applied for the honor last fall. He works for the football team and the girls state championship soccer team where he said he is considered an equal member of the team despite being a guy.

To qualify, Polito needed two letters of recommendation and needed to write one letter himself as to why he wanted to be a trainer.

The letters of recommendation were easy. Soccer coach Bill Eiswale and trainer and Assistant Athletic Director Brenda Welch wrote the letters and Polito had a chance to send in his letter.

"I just fell in love with training," Polito said. "I tried to play football as a freshman but that stopped after a few days in the heat. I couldn't contribute as a player, so I decided to become a trainer."

Now, that desire takes up a lot of time. Besides varsity football and

girls soccer, he also does the junior varsity football team and all three girls soccer teams. Polito is used to spending a lot of time at sporting events, but he said he used to always wonder who the people were on the sidelines stretching the players and getting them ready to play.

Polito said everyone looks to him as a key part of the team, especially the soccer team.

"I feel like I'm a part of the team," he said. "I'm treated just like a player and they've always included me in everything they've done."

A lot of his job is taping and routine stretching, but he also deals with everything from knee injuries to small, nagging problems.

In his first game working without supervision, a football player suffered a dislocated finger.

"They told me I had to set it and I panicked," he said. "I got lucky, I just touched it and it fell back into place."

Polito said he isn't concentrating on the medical field as a profession because he wants to get into broadcasting instead, but now he just wants to help the Rams win. He takes the same kind of treatment from the coaches as the players do, especially when someone goes down during a game.

"I always have coaches screaming at me to get the player back onto the field," he said. "Sometimes I have to tell the coach the guy just can't play and that's pretty hard to do during a game."

But Polito is learning to handle it, and the state of Florida seems to recognize his talent.

Take the brick taste out of lasagna



Recently, we received a letter at the *Seminole Herald* asking us to help with a lasagna problem. The following is a part of that letter. "My husband brags about mom's lasagna...and calls mine 'lasagna bricks'..."
Theresa, Winter Park

Dear Theresa,
First, let me thank you for your letter. We will gladly help any of our readers any time we can. I hope one of the recipes work for your "picky eater". Well, one way to fix the problem is to give your husband the apron and tell him to make it himself. Granted that may not result in an edible meal so here are three different lasagna recipes you can try.

Tip Of The Week
The main reason that lasagna tends to get thick or chewy is over cooking or ingredients that tend to pack too tightly. As I have said before in this column, the base for a good pasta dish is good pasta. Preferably, make your own from scratch, but in a pinch buy only a top quality pre-made noodle.

LASAGNA RICCIE IMBOTTITE (BASIC BAKED MEAT LASAGNA)
1 lb. curly edge lasagna noodles (lasagna ricci)
4 lbs. virgin olive oil
2 lbs. butter
1 medium onion chopped fine
2 cloves garlic crushed
3/4 lb. lean beef or veal (ground twice)
3/4 lb. lean pork (ground twice)
1 lbs. Italian seasoning

1 cup fresh grated parmesan
2 lbs. dry red wine
1-1/2 lb. Ricotta cheese, drain off excess liquid
1 lb. fresh Mozzarella, sliced thin
salt, pepper, parsley
3 cups of basic tomato spaghetti sauce (home-made is best)

Cook your noodles in 4 quarts of water with 2 lbs. olive oil and 1 tsp. salt. When water is rapidly boiling, add noodles and gently stir occasionally to keep the noodles separated. Check noodles and cook to a firm al dente finish (DO NOT

OVER COOK THE NOODLES). Remove noodles from heat and rinse in ice water. Cover noodles in cold water and put aside until you are ready to assemble the lasagna.

In a large fry pan, melt butter and remaining olive oil and sauté onions and garlic until translucent. Add meats, salt and pepper lightly, 1 lbs. Italian seasoning, wine and cook until browned. Pour mixture into a strainer to remove excess fat and liquid.

Use a large covered casserole dish and coat bottom and sides with olive oil. Put enough sauce to cover the bottom of dish. Place an even single layer of noodles on the sauce, paint the top of noodles with sauce and spoon a layer of meat evenly about 1/2 inch thick over noodles. Cover thinly with sauce, sprinkle with Parmesan and layer with one layer of Mozzarella.

The next layer starts with noodles, paint with sauce, cover with 1/2 inch of Ricotta, sprinkle with Parmesan and one layer of Mozzarella. Spoon sauce over cheese. Repeat layers alternating meat and cheese until casserole dish is full. Pour remaining sauce over the lasagna and sprinkle remaining Parmesan over the top.

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Cover the casserole dish and bake for 15 minutes. Remove cover and bake for 10

more minutes or until top is lightly browned. Remember, all your ingredients are pre-cooked. The only reason you are baking is to melt the cheese and reheat the ingredients.

The baking stage is where most lasagna is overcooked. In addition avoid pressing down on the layers as you assemble them. The chewy thick result generally comes from pressing the layers too tightly together

and removing the air that gets trapped inside. When done, allow the dish to sit for five minutes before slicing. This allows the cheese to cool slightly and set-up. Garnish with fresh chopped parsley.

The basic cooking and assembly of the lasagna remains the same for the next two ingredients. The meat layers are replaced by the ingredients given in each one.

This recipe will easily serve 6 people. Have a nice seasoned Italian bread and a wedge of lettuce with Italian pesto dressing and a good bottle of dry red wine for a complete meal.

LASAGNA CON ARAGOSTA GAMBERA E PESTINI (SEAFOOD LASAGNA LOBSTER, SHRIMP AND SCALLOPS)
1/2 lb. each lobster, shrimp & scallops
1 lbs. chopped shallots
1 lbs. dry white wine
1 lbs. chopped chives
2 cloves chopped garlic
1 lbs. butter
1 lbs. extra virgin olive oil
1 tsp. Italian seasoning

Wash seafood and chop to a medium size approximately 3/8 inch. Pat dry with paper towel. In a hot frying pan melt butter and oil, sauté shallots, chives,

garlic until just translucent. Add seafood and seasoning. Stir until just turning golden. Remove from heat and stir in wine.

I personally prefer to use a Marinara sauce for this recipe, but a basic tomato sauce is acceptable. A variation on this recipe is using a white clam sauce in place of the tomato sauce. This recipe with clam sauce is a definite all time favorite of mine and many of my guests.

Retain the liquid from the sautéed seafood using all the sauté ingredients. Spoon layers and follow above assembly method to make your lasagna.
LASAGNA CON MELANZANE E SPINACI (VEGETARIAN EGGPLANT AND SPINACH LASAGNA)
1 medium eggplant, sliced 1/4 inch thick
1 cup of fresh spinach leaves for each layer
1 tsp. garlic powder
1 tsp. onion powder
1 tsp. Italian seasoning
1 large egg, beaten
1/2 cup all purpose flour
salt, pepper to taste
olive oil

Mix the dry ingredients together in a bowl. In a large frying pan heat oil to a high temperature, coat eggplant slices with egg and lightly dust with flour mixture. Sauté the slices for approximately 1 minute per side until they get a light golden tint, add oil as needed.

When assembling the lasagna, use 1 cup of fresh spinach leaves. Drizzle with olive oil over the leaves. Cover with sautéed eggplant slices and coat with sauce for each layer.

This recipe works well using basic tomato sauce, but in my opinion a fresh basil and shallot pesto sauce is exceptional for this dish.

Because of the way the educational system was set up, he was put into classes with students who had severe learning disabilities. He wasn't even taught addition and subtraction until his senior year. Despite the odds against him, Timothy enrolled in community college. The lowest-level college classes are a huge jump from his high

For the last year or two, we've had a serious problem with one member of our group. She causes discord and irritates the rest of us. So far, we have avoided a direct confrontation with her.

Another thought: Not everyone learns in the same way. Some people learn more easily when they hear a lecture, rather than from a book. Others learn faster when they see something demonstrated. A trade school may provide a less frustrating environment in which Timothy can learn. Another alternative might be a

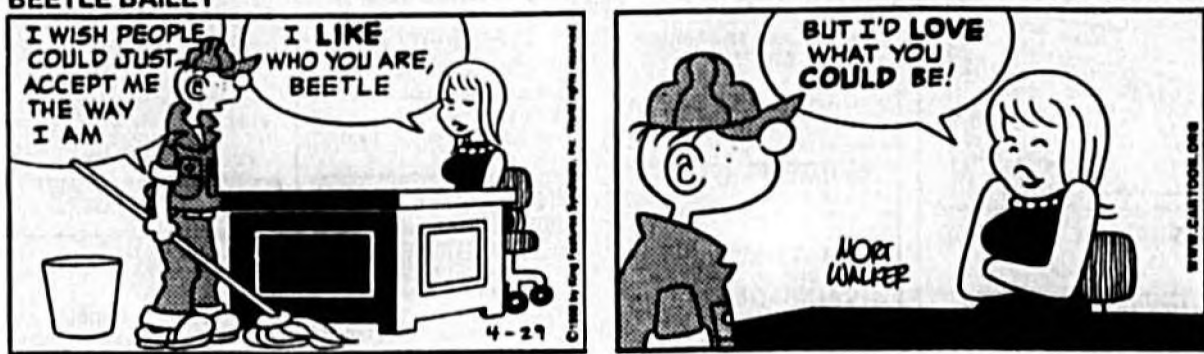

Shrinking an enlarged heart

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 39-year-old male beer-drinker with high blood pressure. A few weeks ago, after a party weekend, I was hospitalized for congestive heart failure. Is there anything I can do to reverse my heart enlargement?

DEAR READER: Stop drinking beer or any other alcohol.

Congestive heart failure means that your heart was beating so ineffectively that fluid built up in your lungs. This is an extremely serious situation that is rare in young people.

You may have "beer-drinker's heart," muscle damage caused by an overconsumption of alcoholic beverages. Or the beer may have further raised your blood pressure to the point that your heart couldn't take it anymore. In either case, abstinence is the answer.

Of course, you will have to take medicine, too. If you abstain and use the proper medication, your heart will probably return to its normal size. It's enlarged now because it has to overwork, and has become flabby and stretched as a result. Follow your doctor's instructions to the letter. And oh, did I mention this? Stop drinking.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 28-year-old daughter has dieted most of her life. Now she eats only fat-free foods. For the past couple of months, she's felt cold all the time, has no energy, is constipated, and is losing her hair. Her doctor says she is iron-deficient. Would iron pills and vitamin supplements help return my daughter to normal?

DEAR READER: Possibly, but I believe a thyroid supplement might benefit her more.

Granted, the description of your daughter is sketchy and doctors should be cautious about diagnosing ailments without full information. But the symptoms you describe are certainly typical of hypothyroidism, a deficiency in the production of thyroid hormone. Moreover, your daughter is anemic, yet another sign of an underactive gland. (She is probably not iron deficient.)

Raise this issue with your daughter's physician. With a simple blood test, he can check her thyroid gland, and if it's underproducing, prescribe appropriate supplements. Hypothyroidism is completely treatable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: If your diet consisted of fast-food burgers with plenty of salt washed down with five or six beers three times a day, what would be the effect on overall lifespan or general health for a 35-year-old male?

DEAR READER: I certainly wouldn't write a large life-insurance policy on the guy. He is doing just about everything wrong: too much fat and salt, not enough vegetables and fruit, and an excessive amount of alcohol. Most people who abuse themselves in this way also smoke cigarettes and engage in unsafe sex, two

additional factors that are sure to shorten a potentially productive life. A person whose diet is so limited is not merely asking for trouble; he is virtually assuring it.

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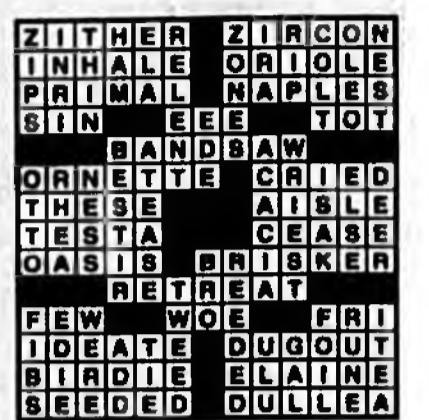

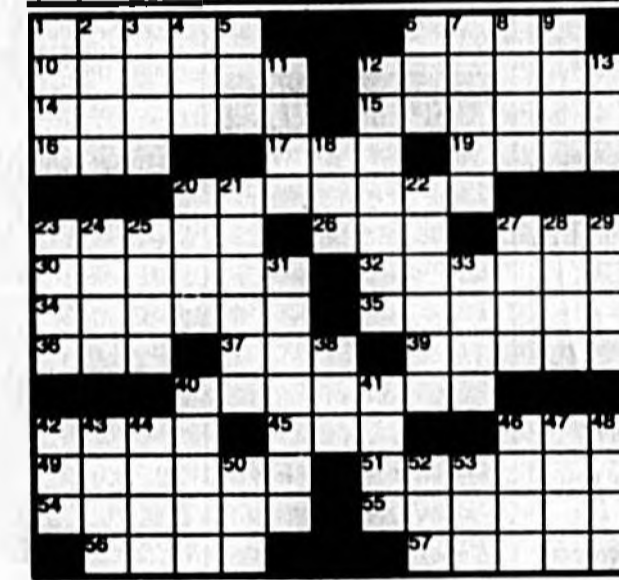

WIN AT BRIDGE

Landing on one's feet

Frederick the Great of Prussia, who died in 1786, had the right idea about government. He said, "My people and I have come to an agreement that satisfies us both. They are to say what they please, and I am to do what I please."

At the bridge table, though, it helps if partners are in agreement about their bidding and defensive-carding methods. Any agreement is usually better than none. Yet sometimes one can get lucky. This deal was declared at the Fall Nationals in St. Louis last November by Jill Mellstrom, who hails from Sweden. She thought they were using transfer bids, hence her two-diamond response. But her partner took this as Forcing Stayman, showing

game-forcing values. Now it was impossible to put on the brakes short of four hearts.

Mellstrom won the diamond lead with dummy's king and ruffed a spade in hand. She repeated this process three more times, using dummy's minor-suit tops to permit spade ruffs in hand. Having eight tricks in, declarer cast adrift with her last diamond.

After winning with the queen, East returned a trump to South's ace. Next, a club exit was won with West's queen. It was trick 12 and West led the 13th diamond. Dummy remained with the queen-10 of hearts. With the contract on the line, Mellstrom guessed correctly, ruffing with the 10. This forced East's king and established dummy's queen as the contract-fulfilling trick.

Afterward, West bemoaned, "Accidents will happen, but why do they always happen to me?"
