





Education Notebook

Education Commissioner's Record?

One of the U. S. commissioner of education's most important jobs is to earn the trust of the Congress that approves education legislation and funds.

A commissioner's failure to establish rapport with Congress could cost states and school districts millions of federal dollars. No commissioner has succeeded in alienating more congressmen than Sidney P. Marland Jr. and as a result he no longer is an effective spokesman for education in the nation's capital.

Brademas traced the history of the Education Amendments of 1972 (P.L. 92-218) through Senate-House conferences and letters from committee members to show that "an assistant secretary for education...would act only as a spokesman advocate for education but not as a policy-maker for the Office of Education and the National Institute of Education." (The NIE is a new research organization

established under the law.) Time and again conferees stressed they did not want "a new layer of bureaucracy within the federal effort in education," but Marland announced plans to staff his new offices with 100 assistants, even before Senate hearings began on his nomination..."a plan in clear violation of the conferees' oppositon to adding another bureaucratic layer to the federal effort in education."

Campaign Assay: * **Dull, Pointless**

Political Notebook

Sitting in my study on a day away from the presidential

campaign trail, I find myself engulfed by the confusions not merely of the season but of the age. I can say easily what most of my political reporting colleagues are saying privately if not publicly: This is just about the worst, the dullest, the most pointless political campaign imaginable. I can say it with more force than most, since I've been involved, in varying degrees, in all of them from 1940 on.

But, in my judgment, the reasons the 1972 "exhibit" is so bad are much more profound than most of us have

been getting at. There are plenty of obvious things to take note of. The excitement of confrontation is missing, since President Nixon is busy playing chief executive and making only occasional, carefully contrived forays into the countryside. A truly disgusting air of shabbiness is imparted to the Republican effort: Moreover, by the piling up of apparently persuasive evidence that Nixon operatives from the White House on down have engaged in serious undertakings to spy upon and sabotage Democratic candidates and their party-thereby subverting the free Democratic

On the other side, Sen. George McGovern has proved himself a fumbling Democratic rival, an indecisive, confused manager, and a practitioner of atrocious exaggeration in a realm of endeavor where exaggeration has been

common since George Washington's time. He is an alleged Mr. Clean who somehow cannot make an effective argument against "corruption" in the Nixon regime. He is a Mr. Antiwar who has to use valuable moments on television to try to recapture lost credibility as a "peace candidate. The two running mates, Vice President Agnew and R.

Sargent Shriver, do nothing to impart excitement, enhance credibility, or suggest relevance. Indeed, the clipped, planned dullness of Agnew and the monstrous verbal gyrations of Shriver strike the professional watcher as deliberate exercises in irrelevance.

At the top of the voters' minds there certainly are issues, and the candidates certainly are talking about them: The Vietnam war, the erratic economy, the welfare mess, crime, city blight, the tax burden. Yet I think it is fair to say that both sides are continu-

ously guilty of gross mishandling of the facts pertaining to these issues. In the past 32 years I have never seen the level of public "debate" fall so low the candidates make statements which are not only outrageous but postively ludicrous. McGovern and Shriver even misquote themselves. We still, however, are not at the core. Surveys like the Wall Street Journal's newest get us a little closer, Many, many millions of Americans feel frustrated, strangely beaten down, lost. The poor sink deeper into hopelessness. Those who have moved toward the bright rainbow hues of greater affluence and freedom find the world gray when they get there.

As the Journal significantly notes, their disenchantment goes far beyond politics. It seems to touch everything. America's vaunted spirit of volunteerism and self-help has nearly evaporated. Much work is not liked and not performed well. Products are shoddy, repairs worse. People are rootless, unanchored, and hence uncaring of things or places or people other than themselves. The "self," always strong, is turned so far inward it does not serve itself well. People want change, but at the same time hate it. They want some new solidity.

There is much more in these barely probed depths. On the road, I don't hear Mr. Nixon or McGovern saying a single convincing word about any of this. And that's the real reason 1972 is a noncampaign.

Long Campaigns? There's a Reason


Speaking a few days ago to a group of labor leaders from 24 countries who are in the United States to observe the presidential election. President Nixon remarked that "the British have a much better system" because they


limit their campaigns to three weeks. It is interesting to reflect that if we had this "better' system in this country, Richard Nixon would not be presently running for President of the United States but for Member of Congress from California.

The reason that the British can limit their campaigns to three weeks is that nobody runs for, and hence nobody votes for, the office of prime minister. Every Member of Parliament runs (or in Britain "stands") for his own seat in his own constituency, including the party leader who everyone knows will be named prime minister should his party capture a majority of seats.

Thus as party leader, a potential prime minister is already well known to the public. Even if his party is defeated, he remains its leader until the party-not the voters-decides to replace him.

Former Prime Minister Harold Wilson, for example is still head of the Labour party. Should his party defeat the Conservatives in the next election by winning a majority in Parliament, Wilson would again be prime minister No doubt President Nixon would have welcomed an election only three weeks after the nominating conventions. George McGovern had hardly had time by then to find someone who would agree to run with him, much less begin to get his message and his personality across to



SAIGON (AP) — The United States reduced its fighter-bomber strikes against North Vietnam again Tuesday and confined them to the southern panhandle below the 20th parallel in a sort of a partial bombing halt aimed at improving the atmosphere for peace negotiations, informed sources said today.

The Air Force's big B52 bombers resumed attacks on supply caches in the panhandle after a 24-hour diversion to targets in South Vietnam.

The curtailment of the air war began Sunday when the total of fighter-bomber strikes dropped from an average of 250-300 to about 140, and

In breaking American silence on the status of the peace efforts, Kissinger said the nine points outlined earlier today by North Vietnam are essentially correct. He also said: "I want to stress that what remains to be done is the smallest part of what has already been accomplished."

The presidential adviser said the remaining

details are essentially linguistic and technical but need to be settled before the United States and South Vietnam can sign a pact.

He listed what were "six or seven very concrete issues that with anything like the good will that has been shown can easily be cleared up."

He included in his examples the need from the U.S. side to specify that no move will be made to grab additional territory between the time of the cease-fire and apolitical settlement. He also said there needs to be clarification on

the timing of the Vietnamese settlement relative to the settlement of the conflicts in Laos and Cambodia. While the United States had indicated it "hoped"

to draft a proposed pact by that date, it never committed itself to such a deadline, Kissinger

When asked what would happen if the Oct. 31 deadline passes without a signing, Kissinger indicated his belief that negotiations would continue. Kissinger went over the nine points already disclosed by North Vietnamese, listing them in the main as a cease-fire to be observed in South Vietnam in place and "at a time mutually agreed

U.S. forces would be pulled out within 60 days of the signing with a total prohibition against any infiltration of forces from North Vietnam either across the demilitarized zone or from Laos or

Military supplies to forces in South Vietnam will be banned except for replacement on a one-to-one basis of worn-out or damaged equipment.

All prisoners, military and civilian, are to be returned parallel to the withdrawal of American forces and will be completed within 60 days of the agreement's signing.
