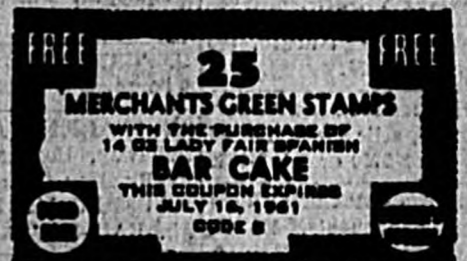
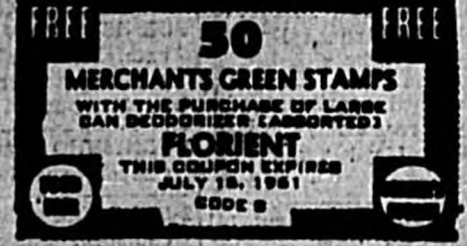

# 50 Man posse close in On Killer Of 2

KREMMLING, Colo. (UPI) — A fifty-man posse waited with bloodhounds for first light today to close in on a young gunman who killed two officers and wounded two others before he was trapped in a steep canyon. The slight-built fugitive shot a state patrolman, a sheriff and a game warden on U. S. Highway 50 near Kremmling Wednesday. Then he shot an undersheriff at a roadblock 30 miles to the southwest.

The young man pulled a luger from his pocket and started shooting. Short was fatally wounded in the stomach. Van Pelt was hit in the chest. Hoover went down with slugs in both arms and the abdomen.

The killer drove off, leaving the officers to be found by passing motorists.

Eagle County Undersheriff John Clark, 33, was helping to man a roadblock southwest of Kremmling when the suspect's car pulled up. The killer jumped out, fired at the officers, and ran into the underbrush.

A bullet struck Clark in the jaw. He died Wednesday night at a Leadville, Colo., hospital.

## Ayub Facing Tough Task

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Pakistan's President Mohammad Ayub Khan, killed by American congressmen and officials as a "super salesman" today faced the toughest selling job of his mission here.

The bitter dispute between Pakistan and India over fabled Kashmir was the main item on the agenda for his final conference with President Kennedy.

Ayub wants the United States to intervene, using its influence with India either to submit Kashmir's future to a plebiscite or to negotiate a settlement guaranteeing Pakistan's economic and military interests there.

Game warden Bob Hoover stepped Wednesday afternoon to assist a "young guy w' a wavy hair" whose car seemed to be stalled two miles east of Kremmling. Hoover saw a .38 rifle and several boxes of ammunition in the back seat of the car.

The game warden went back to his own car, and radioed the state patrol.

Patrol Lt. Elram Short and Game County Sheriff Cassady Van Pelt answered the call. The young man did not have satisfactory identification, and they began searching his car.

## Rocket Shot Seen As Bonanza For East Coast Tourist Trade

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — The nation's second "man-in-space" rocket shot scheduled for next Tuesday is proving to be a bonanza for the Florida East Coast tourist industry.

Tourists and Florida residents by the hundreds already are battling for a grandstand view. Motels in the caps area are filling to capacity. All indications point to a record number of civilians "bird watchers."

U. S. astronaut John H. Glenn Jr., and Virgil I. Grisson have begun the final phase of tests that are expected to send one of them on a rocket ride 115 miles high. Their vehicle will be an 8-foot piece of machinery known as "Mercury-Redstone 4."

MR-4, using the reliable Redstone as a booster rocket, is supposed to send either Glenn or Grisson soaring into space Tuesday on a flight similar to Alan B. Shepard's mission of last May 5. Scientists kept an around-the-clock series of checks on the rocket and its bell-shaped capsule to make sure it is ready for the job.

The Federal space agency said it already has requests from 100 news reporters and photographers for accreditation for the shot, and more were coming in daily.

Glenn and Grisson are working in comparative privacy, running through simulated missions in a ground trainer.

Officials said the astronauts will wrap up their intensive exercises this weekend, then undergo final physical examinations during the final hours before the morning rocket flight.

# Brothers Stresses Free Public Health

If you passed a sign that read, "Free: Better Health," you would probably stop. Or would you?

Everyday, many different organizations attempt to "give away" better health to the American public — and the job isn't always easy.

The process is called health education. It is an effort to improve the health of the public by encouraging the use of every known means of maintaining health and preventing disease.

The Public Health Nurse serves as a counselor and teacher of health. She tries to help them in matters affecting health. While giving nursing care to one member, she supports and guides the other members of the family toward meeting their health needs. She is able to teach by what she says as well as by what she does.

Here are a few ways in which we can work toward the goal of better health. Modern living conditions have become so complicated that no person can live his life without taking into consideration how his thinking, behavior, and health will affect another.

Whether we are aware or not, happiness is the goal of all human effort. Of the four essentials to happiness, health is basic of the rest. All you, an intelligent human being with many possibilities before you for interesting and worthwhile experiences, must understand the value of a strong and healthy body as an aid to successful living.

The human body has no value except in use. It is only worth as much as we have the intelligence and the desire to make it work. Health habits are simply routine practices developed for the purpose of giving you greater freedom and more efficient use of your body and mind.

You have heard much about vitamins and their value, each has its own value in promoting health. The most important thing to know is if you eat sufficient quantities of foods which contain these vitamins you will be protected from the so called deficiency diseases and will have better health.

Good eating habits: Don't eat while preparing food or between meals. Avoid emotional upsets and overindulging. Don't rush, don't wash food down and hurry to work or play, habits of these over a period of time will cause digestion disturbances.

Keep in mind food is the substance for life and growth. It protects the body from illness and regulates the body processes. Select food on the basis of body needs rather than likes and dislikes.

Least of nutrient sleep probably causes more disharmony in human relationship than any other factor. There are very few people who do not "doze" their bodies out of sleep time. In the morning when you get up if you are tired and lacking in energy you are (1)

not getting enough sleep or (2) not sleeping under the right conditions or (3) suffering from disorder which requires medical attention.

Sleep is only one way of providing a rest period for tired muscles. Recreation is another. This is not a luxury, but time should be allowed in the daily program just for sleep and eating.

Mental Health and Physical Health are inseparable. Few people live under conditions which are entirely satisfactory to them. Every person has disappointments, anxiety, and grief at some time in his life. The habit of facing these disturbances with courage and action instead of allowing them to worry us unnecessarily and to warp our points of view is one of the most important lessons in life.

Although much illness can be prevented by right living, some illness might be expected in the life of everyone. The factor of early detection, by a doctor, is important in diseases such as tuberculosis, cancer, heart di-

sease. Everyone should have a routine physical examination annually or earlier if symptoms are present.

Don't depend on patented medicines that promise everything and cure nothing.

The Public Health Nurse is always ready to support and guide all members of the family toward meeting their health needs. She must always be alert to new developments and must be prepared to transmit to the public the best advice and information currently available.

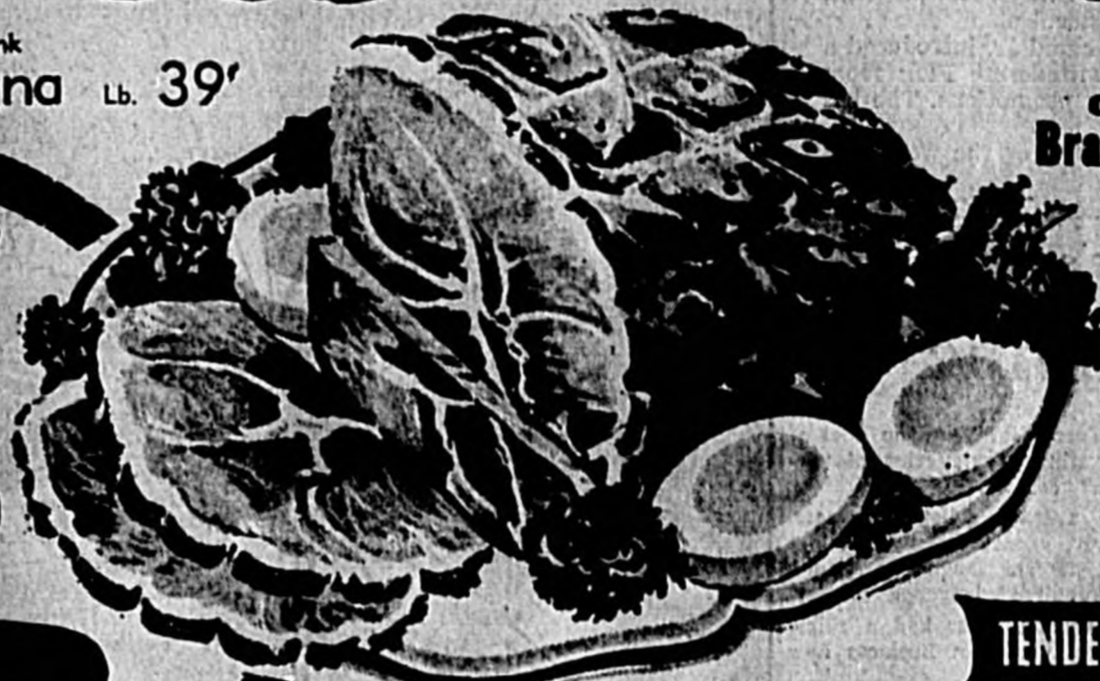

# 2nd Half Of Majors Underway

They start the second half of the major league races today and the odds-makers feel that the New York Yankees and Cincinnati Reds will lead all the other teams to the wire.

Even though they're in second place as the second half of the season gets underway, the Yankees officially are quoted as 9-11 favorites (or 2 to 1 in man-to-man betting) to win the American League pennant.

The Yankees have been favored from the start but it's an entirely different story with the Reds, who opened the season as 25 to 1 long-shots.

With a five-game lead in the National League, Cincinnati now is a 7-1 choice or 8 to 5 if you care to bet the guy in your office. That means the Reds have become an even stronger favorite than the Yankees.

Detroit is the second choice in the AL. If you think the first-place Tigers will go on to win, the odds-makers are willing to wager 4 to 1 they don't. Baltimore and Cleveland follow at 7 to 1, and Boston, Washington, Los Angeles, Minnesota and Kansas City all at 10 to 1.

In the NL, the Los Angeles Dodgers are second in line at 3 to 1, Pittsburgh and San Francisco are 6 to 1, Milwaukee 10 to 1, St. Louis 50 to 1, and Chicago and Philadelphia 100 to 1.

Like the odds-makers, Yankee manager Ralph Houk likes his team's chances.

"I think we're in an excellent position," said Houk. "We may be a half game behind in the standings but we're actually a game ahead in the lost column."

The Yankees can take over the lead by beating the White Sox in Chicago tonight because the Tigers don't resume action until they face the Twins in Detroit Friday.

Detroit manager Bob Scheffing isn't claiming any pennants yet, nor is he conceding to anyone. "We've got a half season to play," he said, "and we're not counting anyone out. That includes us, too."

In the National League, the Reds open a 12-game home stand against the Chicago Cubs tonight with Jim O'Toole (7-7) hoping to add a bit of luster to Cincy's record of nine victories in the last 10 games.

Apart from the pennant races, two other personal races also are commanding considerable attention.

In one of them, Yankee outfielder Roger Maris is hot after Babe Ruth's home run record of 60 in a single season. Maris has 33 so far and that puts him 12 games ahead of the Babe's record pace of 1957.

Maris' teammate, Whitley Ford, also is in a race to become the major league's first 20-game winner. He has a 16-2 record so far, but Houk says with the hot weather coming up, Ford will pitch every fifth day instead of every fourth one.

Before Lema, a native of San Leandro, Calif., checked in, three other little-known pros, Bob Pratt, Jon Gustin and Jacky Supit, shared the lead with 67's.

Lema, was best showing this year was a third place at Caracas, Venezuela, shaved four shots off par on the front side and one on the back nine.

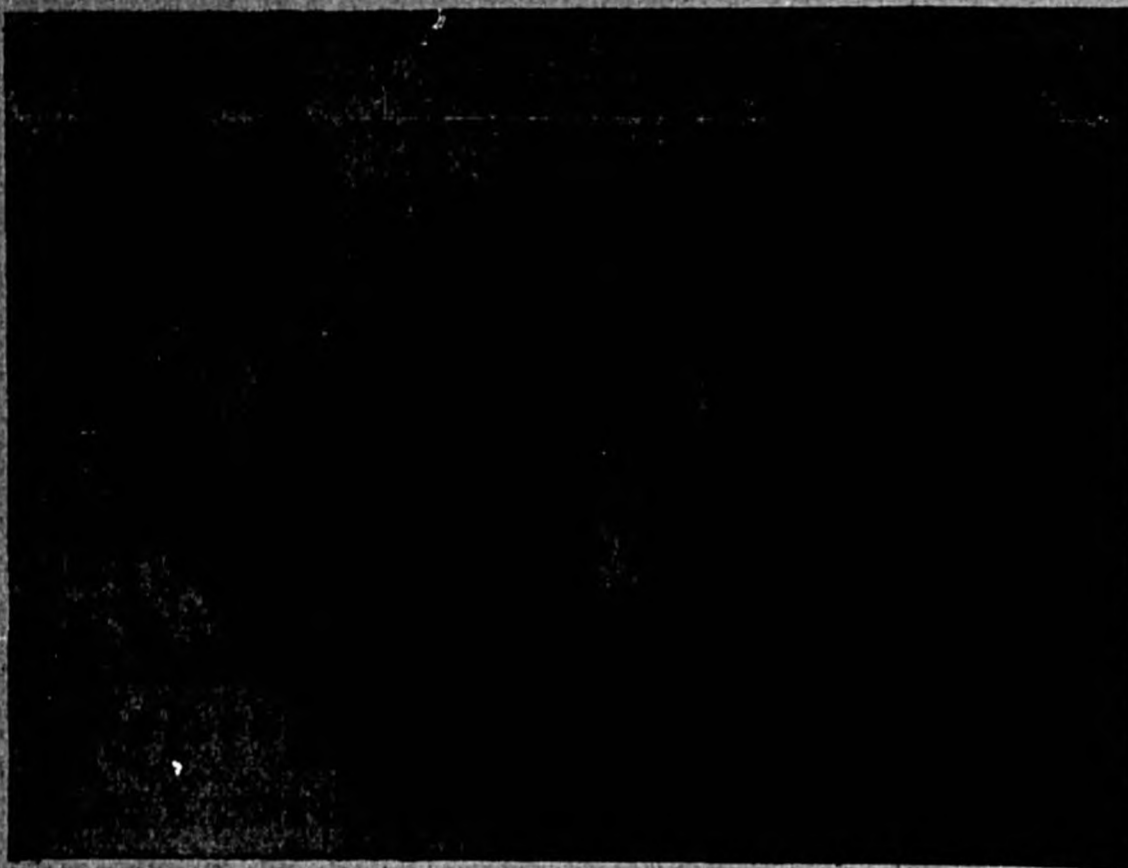

# School Board Faced With Increase In Millage

## 1 Mill Hike In Support Budget Expected

The County School Board is faced with the bleak prospect of raising the support and maintenance budget millage for the 1961-62 fiscal year by one mill.

The only alternative to this, school officials said Thursday afternoon as they spent close to five hours discussing the forthcoming budget, is to slash the school's bond construction program which would mean there would not be enough funds available to complete a new Bear Lake Elementary School or the new Junior High School in Casselberry.

## Double Growth Predicted For Dynatronics

Dynatronics, Inc. should double its gross business during the coming year, its top officials predicted Thursday.

Dynatronics President Parker Painter Jr. and Vice President George F. Anderson told stockholders at Orlando that "presently negotiated contracts already assure your company of more than \$3 million in business" and announced that "we anticipate reaching the \$4 million mark before the end of the fiscal year."

This was the first annual stockholders meeting for Dynatronics, which specializes in research, design and manufacture of electronic systems to support the nation's space and missile efforts.

Total business for the fiscal year was reported at \$2,324,577. Earnings showed an increase from \$40,480 to \$112,343.

Directors elected at the meeting included Painter as president and Anderson as vice president and general manager; George C. Daniels, vice president in charge of engineering; Edward A. Hughes, secretary-treasurer; Robert P. Bishop, assistant secretary; and Hugh G. Ashcraft, vice president of R. S. Dickson and Co., Charlotte, N. C.

Citing the opening of the Van Nuys, Calif., plant and the expansion of the Seminole County facility from 21,000 square feet of space to 41,000, the officers said Dynatronics probably will need another 20,000 feet of plant space to do its job in another year.

"The increased emphasis placed on the missile and space programs by the Kennedy administration assures a greater volume of available business during the coming year and we already are feeling the impact of this in the industry," Painter told the stockholders.

Answers to Nikita Looms Wednesday

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy will hold a news conference next Wednesday morning, the White House announced today.

Press secretary Pierre Salinger said he expected the President's session with newsmen to follow issuance of a reply to Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev on the Berlin crisis.

Salinger said he thought the message, answering Khrushchev's threat to sign a separate peace treaty with East Germany, would be issued early next week, in time for the President to be questioned about it at his news conference.

Officials said today that Kennedy had ordered preparation of a "white paper" to give American and world opinion a clearer picture of Soviet action with regard to Berlin and Germany.

The "white paper" in effect will be a revision and bringing up to date of previous State Department analyses of the problem.

Ernest Lindley, former columnist now on the State Department policy planning staff, has been given the task of writing the initial draft.

## Bryant Hurls Charge At Cramer

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant fired a charge of "misinformation" today at U. S. Rep. William C. Cramer's claim that Bryant administration road plans will lose federal funds for the state and ruin a proposed East Coast freeway.

Cramer said in Washington Thursday that if Bryant goes ahead with plans for extending the toll road northward, the state will lose more than \$60 million in federal funds, as well as a planned freeway between Daytona Beach and Fort Pierce.

Bryant's plan is to extend the Miami-to-Fort Pierce turnpike northward to Wildwood in Central Florida — providing the Federal Bureau of Roads agrees to move Interstate Route 75 slightly eastward to hook up with it.

This would provide a link with the Florida West Coast, which the Interstate route will serve.

The bureau has made no decision on the request to move Route 75 eastward.

House Okay

The Senate was expected to give final congressional approval to a bill designed to crack down on water pollution and increase federal grants to communities for building sewage disposal and treatment plants.

The House passed the measure Thursday. It gives the federal government new powers to police lakes and streams and punish polluters.

Man Space Shot May Be Delayed

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — Bad weather in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean is threatening U. S. plans to rocket another man into space next Tuesday.

Scientists running the nation's \$400 million "Project Mercury" astronaut program were keeping a close watch today on an area of thundershowers about 300 miles east of the Lesser Antilles.

The "weak to moderate easterly wave" was reported moving westward early today. A more northerly course might carry it east of Grand Bahama Island into the spot where the astronaut's capsule would plunge into the sea.

Eickmann made the admission when asked about an order to send 10,000 Jews unfit for work to the Auschwitz gas chambers in 1942.
