**Population In U. S. In 2000
Will Be Over 226,500,000
Federal Experts Estimate**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—If the United States keep up its present rate of growth, the country will have a population of well over 226,500,000 in the year 2,000. This estimate was based upon the announcement today by the bureau of the census, that by July 1, the population will have passed 118,528,997, a gain of 1,422,000 in a year and 12,918,000 since 1920. The census bureau's estimate gave the population of each state those which had showed a decrease between 1910 and 1920, or from 1920 to 1925. Pennsylvania gained 1,109,993 in population between 1920 and 1925.

McTIGUE WINS AN EASY FIGHT FROM ASTORIA MAULER

Irishman Startles Big Crowd By Severely Walloping Big Paul Berlenbach And Obtaining Decision In 4th Go

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—(INS)—The asslan is no more! neither is timorous Mike McTigue.

Before the startled gaze of 20,000 at Madison Square Garden last night, Mike, brave as a bull agent, gained a technical knockout in the fourth round over Paul Berlenbach, the man they once called the Astoria assassin, and other names denoting the fearsome punch that was in his left hand. Even that punch is no more.

He scored heavily with it only once, cutting McTigue's eye with a left hook early in the second round. A year ago, this would have been the offset for Mike to flash upon his bicycle but last night he snorted disdainfully and went back to an attack that soon had Berlenbach helpless. He finally hit Paul so many times with a right hand that referee McPartland was forced to stop it in the fourth round. After Berlenbach twice had sought the canvas for counts of nine.

He was out on his feet, weaving here and there and oblivious to his surroundings, when the end came. McTigue proved that his recent series of successful fights was not symbolic. He went after Berlenbach in the outset and the only time the old defender Mike was his impious. He had Berlenbach down and almost out when the bell ending the third round saved him temporarily.

(MY LIFE STORY) by Jack McAuliffe

The original Jack Dempsey and myself came very nearly being wrestlers instead of prizefighters!

Martin Dempsey, Jack's brother, was a wrestler and tried his hardest to make Jack and me into matmen shortly after he became acquainted through a chance mutual friend and meeting out the Bowery.

But Jack and I kept right on working as roosters. We used to read in the Clipper about the famous fighters of the period, Jim Mace, Mike McCoy, Joe Goss and Tom Early. We learned the best offense was a straight left and a right cross counter.

Dempsey and I made gloves out of socks. Our punching bag was a pillow. Our gym was the kitchen. Our first pair of gloves cost us \$3.45. The leather was as stiff as shoe leather.

Dempsey's first fight offer came from Harry Hill, a big sport around New York in 1883. Hill offered Dempsey \$50 to fight the sensational Ed McDonald, a middle-weight. We all agreed off to Flushing and the ring was pitched at dawn in back of a roadhouse, London ring rules with bare knuckles were agreed upon.

DEMPSEY PLANS TRAINING GRIND IN EASTERN CAMP

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Jack Dempsey, convinced that he can come back like a roost receipt, is planning to begin a campaign of training in the east late in April and will establish headquarters at Tom Luther's White Sulphur Springs camp, the writer learned today.

There, the ex-champion will undergo a final self-inspection, after which he will declare himself definitely about his proposed return to the ring—if and provided he likes what he sees.

High and Dry—Water runs from it in all directions.

"Do's" and "Don'ts" For the Road

An Orlando business man says that making traffic safe for all is more a matter of "do's" than "don'ts". "Too often," he says, "the emphasis is placed on what motorists should not do, rather than what they should do."

1. Keep to the right side of the road; be sure the way is clear before going around a car ahead and sound your horn before passing.

2. Always signal to drivers approaching you when preparing to stop or to turn right or left. Remember the "fast dangerous turn is the left turn."

3. Observe all speed laws—for the safety of others and for your own safety.

4. Be sure your brakes are in perfect order. They must be well lined, tight and equally effective on each wheel.

5. Use your headlights in descending hills. Always make the motor help hold back the car by using the brakes.

6. Don't put your car in reverse without first looking back to see if the way is clear. Don't allow anybody to ride on your running board, rear bumper, or tow from a bicycle behind.
