#### Kidnapped teen returns home

NEWARK, N.J. — A cheerleader who returned Thursday from a three-day odyssey to the Southwest with the suspected killer of a teenage boy said she was abducted because "he needed me for protection," a newspaper reported.

Donna Shaban, 17, arrived at Newark International Airport shortly after midnight aboard an American Airlines flight from Texas, where she had escaped her alleged abductor shortly before his arrest. Port Authority police said.

The Sparta High School cheerleader and her mother, Patricia Shaban, were taken from the plane through a private exit and made no public comment.

#### Accused murderer innocent

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — Computer professor Howard Lee Haupt, described by his lawyer as an innocent eccentric, openly wept Wednesday when found innocent of kidnapping and killing a young boy.

Haupt, 38, was accused of slaying 7-year-old Alexander Harris of Mountain View, Calif., who disappeared Nov. 27, 1987, from a movie arcade at Whiskey Pete's, a hotel-casino resort near the Nevada-California border.

The youngster's body was found a month later under a trailer on the resort grounds behind a cardboard box.

#### Martinez' budget criticized

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. Bob Martinez' proposed budget drew fire Wednesday from government officials and human services lobbyists who branded it a "status quo" budget incapable of meeting the needs of the country's fastest growing state.

"Status quo in North Dakota makes sense," said Jack Levine, director of the Florida Center for Children and Youth. "Status quo in Florida does not, because of growth."

House Speaker Tom Gustafson called the budget a "straight jacket for disaster."

"It's a status quo, tread water kind of budget that does not answer the critical problems on our immediate horizon," Gustafson said. "We are not talking about the upper quartile anymore, we are talking about the national average. Some might call that mediocrity."

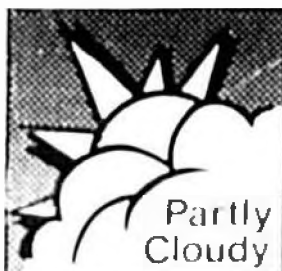

### Fewer students will be affected

LAKE MARY — The wishes of a countywide committee and the Seminole County Superintendent of Schools took a back seat last night as hundreds of middle school parents protested a rezoning plan.

The plan, released Friday, had already reduced the number of middle school students affected from 841 to 418.

However, parents filled the Lake Mary High School auditorium last night demanding further reductions. Their appeals nearly resulted in a cancellation of a middle school plan that took months to develop. Before the evening's end, board members voted to move only 150 middle school and 264 high school students. The high school decision was less controversial and represented no change. The board decision will be advertised for 21 days before final adoption.

"I have to recommend what I feel is best for all of the students."

### Dreams can come true at auction

SANFORD — Seminole Community College will be auctioning off dreams tonight.

At Dream Auction 1989, bidders can have their pick of dreams, a week in Calgary, a trip to the Bahamas, a year of orthodontist work or some shingles.

The auction, which is in its fifth year, brings in about \$100,000 annually for the college.

The biggest package on the auction block, expected to go for as much as \$3,000, is a week's vacation in Calgary, Alberta, in the foothills of the Canadian Rockies. The package includes flight and lodging at a condominium, babysitting lessons at the Calgary Olympic Center, and passes to the Calgary Stampede, the world's largest rodeo.

But Dream Auction is more than glamour dream trips, auction spokesman Lori Booker said. "It's things you need to buy anyway that you can go ahead and get at a great deal."

## Sanford faces local competition in campaign for new VA facilities

SANFORD — Sanford city officials now face local competition in the campaign to win a 400-bed Veterans Administration hospital and nursing home on 2,200 acres southeast of the city.

A VA spokesman confirmed Wednesday that federal officials are considering two sites in Seminole County, along with eight other east-central Florida sites.

The newest site is east of Oviedo, on County Road 126. VA spokesman Bonner Day refused to release the name of the owner of the property or give details about its exact location or size.

Sanford officials want to offer the VA a portion of their

wastewater sprayfield site in return for the federal agency helping to pay the costs of extending water and sewer lines to the area.

The U.S. Bureau of Prisons is actively considering another portion of the same site for a medium- and minimum-security prison. City officials say the site is large enough to accommodate both facilities.

City manager Frank Faison said he is undecided by a competing site in Seminole County.

"It's for (VA) officials to determine which is the best site," Faison said. "We think ours meets the criteria that they put out. We think we have a good site and a reasonable offer."

VA officials have considered building a new hospital. See Hospital, Page 5A

## Brush fire threat not that great here

Although brush fires have increased in central Florida, the area is not as dry as other parts of the state, according to a Seminole County fire official.

There has been a slight increase in that type of alarm brush fires here in the past several weeks, said Terry Schenk, Assistant Chief of Seminole County Fire Rescue Division. "But so far, we have not had the same level of increase as other county departments. Most of

ours have been small. From our experience so far, we haven't had real big fires that cover a substantial amount of area," he said Wednesday.

Florida is parched and dry from the Everglades to the Alabama border and forestry managers warned this week that the wildfire season could start early and last hard unless the state gets a good soaking soon.

The National Weather Service forecast, however, called for more of the same warm, dry weather Florida has had all winter.

Schenk said that the central part of the state hasn't had a freeze this winter, which kills vegetation covering the land to become dry.

What will frequently happen, you'll get a freeze in December, January or February which kills off vegetation and makes everything dry. We have not had a freeze here. Everything is still pretty green here," Schenk said.

Seminole County Urban Forester Mike Martin said that the uncertainties are more common because of the dry weather they are

## City will turn French Avenue into drag strip

SANFORD — City officials want to make French Avenue a drag strip.

The city commission Monday gave its support to a proposal to turn central Florida county to be a drag strip.

Last year, the city parks and recreation department contacted Soap Box Derby, Inc., an Akron, Ohio, company, to express interest in obtaining a regional headquarters in Sanford. Last month the department's Sports Department sponsored the race and classes by Florida Department of Transportation in conjunction with French Avenue.

DOT has approved the city's application for classifying French Avenue as a drag strip and 150 streets for 112 drag strips.

City manager Mike Barfield said he is interested in the idea because of the popularity of Soap Box Derby and because of the economic benefits from the city's involvement in the sport. "We hope to have a drag strip on French Avenue and other streets in Sanford."

Sanford is the only city in Florida that has a drag strip. The city is currently in the process of applying for a license to operate a drag strip on French Avenue. The city is also in the process of applying for a license to operate a drag strip on other streets in Sanford.

## Cruise liner hits Navy ship

**PALM BEACH** — A 400-foot cruise ship attempting to dock at the port of Palm Beach hit a Navy supply vessel Wednesday night, causing flooding on the Navy ship but no serious injuries.

Water pumps controlled the flooding and cargo was taken off the 135-foot Navy vessel, said Coast Guard Petty Officer Jerry Snyder.

"All flooding is under control and subsiding," he said.

The incident occurred Wednesday about 7:30 p.m. The cruise liner Viking Princess, owned by Crown Cruise Lines, was trying to moor when it hit the Navy vessel, which was moored with five people aboard, Snyder said. No one was seriously injured, but minor injuries were reported aboard the cruise ship, he said.

The crash punctured several holes into the Navy vessel, a supply ship based at Andros Island in the Bahamas, but many were plugged by Navy personnel and Coast Guardsmen. No major damage was reported to the cruise ship.

There were no fuel leaks, Snyder said. Snyder said officials from the cruise ship attributed the collision to problems in the vessel's steering system. The incident is under investigation.

## Martinez to meet missing girl's father

**TALLAHASSEE** — Gov. Bob Martinez said Wednesday he will meet with real-estate executive Patrick Seasons to discuss ways of aiding the search for Seasons' missing daughter, University of Florida student Tiffany Seasons.

"It could have happened to any of us who have children," Martinez said. "We certainly will do all we can to find her, hopefully well."

The 20-year-old left her Gainesville apartment on Feb. 9 and never returned. Police have said they suspect foul play in the disappearance.

"Everyday, somewhere in this country, some youngster is being abducted, some never to be heard from again," Martinez said. "The high visibility of this incident reminds all of us how much care we must provide all of our children."

## Hurricane hunters get reprieve

**MIAMI** — The Air Force said Wednesday it will continue its hurricane reconnaissance flights, squashing threats it would quit funding the flights or transfer the responsibility to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

"The Air Force announced today, 'We're in the hurricane reconnaissance business indefinitely,'" said Harry Glenn, spokesman for U.S. Rep. Bill Young, R-Fla., who led an effort in Congress to require the Air Force to fund the operations.

Bob Sheets, director of the National Hurricane Center in Miami, said his department would have had to rely on less complete information without the reconnaissance flights.

Sheet said the Air Force flights allow forecasters to "get the information we need to do our job. Without those flights, we'd have to do more over warning than we do and it could be detrimental. People wouldn't listen if we cry 'Wolf' too often."

The reconnaissance flights measure wind velocity and direction and air pressure inside the storms.

## New Yorker reunited with dead wife

**ORLANDO** — A retired New Yorker vacationing in Florida was reunited on Valentine's Day with the ashes of his dead wife.

"As soon as I get back to Staten Island I'm having Millie's ashes interred at a mausoleum with a spot right beside her waiting for me," Philip Giraldi said after recovering his wife's remains with the help of a newspaper columnist.

Giraldi, a 69-year-old former longshoreman, has been carrying the little metal urn containing the remains everywhere since Millie died in 1980. He decorated the urn with photos of Millie and their two daughters.

The canister fit inside his coat pocket and Giraldi said it comforted him to know the remains of the woman he met in 1954 was still by his side. Millie died at 56 of multiple sclerosis.

But Giraldi took the wrong bus from the airport when he arrived about two weeks ago to visit a daughter living in the area. He ended up at a hotel and left all his belongings outside briefly to make a telephone call. Everything, including Millie's remains, was stolen.

Bill Gregory, a rental car company worker, had found Millie's urn while eating lunch at a roadside hot dog stand near the airport. He learned of Giraldi's sad tale in Monday's "Column World" by Bob Morris in The Orlando Sentinel.

"I knew right away what it was," Gregory said. "To tell you the truth, though, it started giving me the creeps, keeping someone's ashes in my house. I started sleeping on the living room couch because I didn't want to sleep in the same room with the urn. But I couldn't just get rid of it either."

Gregory called Morris and later met with a tearful Giraldi to return the urn and Millie's remains.

"She was my life," Giraldi said.

## Legislators blast Martinez budget

might call that mediocrity."

Senate President Bob Crawford was less pointed in his criticism, but suggested the Senate would take a far different approach when writing its budget. Crawford, who like Martinez is insistent on a budget that includes no new taxes, said it is possible to cut government waste without slashing worthwhile programs.

"The governor has made recommendations, but they are just recommendations," Crawford said. "The work of the Senate Appropriations committee in ferreting out \$250 million is more important than ever."

Crawford has directed his budget committee to find \$250

million in unnecessary programs that could be cut from the budget. He believes that would allow the state to continue important programs without raising taxes.

Crawford and Gustafson both were unhappy that the budget proposal for the Department of Transportation was far from complete.

DOT is in the middle of a "cash-flow debacle," as Crawford put it, and has been unable to provide Martinez with a bottom-line figure on how much work it has contracted out or money it has left.

Both legislators rejected Martinez' plan to have no pay increase for state workers. With

the cost-of-living rising about 5 percent over the next year, Gustafson said, that would in effect mean a pay cut for state employees.

Gustafson also said Martinez' 5 percent increase in teacher pay is inadequate. But the governor got a vote of thanks from Education Commissioner Betty Castor, who said 5 percent should be seen as a sign of support in a tight budget year.

"If we don't get a little more than 5 percent, we will be falling a little behind (other state teacher salaries)," she said. "But when I look at what's out there it's encouraging the governor is even making this a priority."

Florida teacher salaries are now the 28th lowest in the United States, Castor said.

Castor was unhappy that Martinez directed some \$117 million in excess lottery proceeds toward school construction.

## Titusville officer shot during search

**TITUSVILLE** — A 36-year-old SWAT team member of the Titusville police force was shot and killed Wednesday night during a search for drugs and stolen property inside a house, police said.

Stephen Franklin House entered a Titusville residence with seven other officers Wednesday at 9:43 p.m. when he was shot

once in the face with a small caliber weapon, said police spokesman Jay Cullen. The officers had a warrant to search the house for drugs and stolen property, he said.

Five adults and several children were in the house.

"The entry team made entry into the house, and during the normal process of sweeping the house to make sure no one else was hidden in the house, a shot

was fired when a couple of officers entered one of the bedrooms," Cullen said.

House, a six-year veteran of the department, died at Jess Parrish Memorial Hospital in Titusville shortly after being transported.

Police had five adults — including the shooting suspect — in custody around midnight, Cullen said.

House is the second Titusville

police officer to die in uniform, Cullen said.

Jack Schnell was in uniform coming to work aboard his police motorcycle when he was fatally injured by a drunken driver Dec. 31, 1982, Cullen said.

"We have a lot of very distraught officers. We have a trauma team talking to them," Cullen said. He said there were 68 officers on the police force.

Superintendent Robert Hughes said. "That's what I've done."

What angered middle school parents was that all 318 students proposed to move attend Greenwood Lakes Middle School. Parents said it was unfair to move their children, and not those of Jackson Heights Middle and Tusawilla Middle schools, as had previously been proposed. Results of a just-completed school plant survey, and advice from the school district's facilities department caused Hughes to change that proposal, which resulted in the split.

"We feel that if Jackson Heights can handle more students, so can Greenwood Lakes," Cindy Dale, Greenwood Lakes parent and committee member told the board.

Hughes explained that the situations were not at all alike. Jackson Heights requires classroom portables to handle overflow crowds now, but the Oviedo campus is large enough in terms of such things as restrooms and library, to manage. Moving those students to the proposed campuses of South Seminole Middle and Tusawilla Middle would mean moving classroom portables along with them, but to a far smaller campus that is less equipped for big populations.

Hughes said it was not a move he could justify, but such was not the scenario for Greenwood Lakes. The superintendent said both Milwee and Lakeview middle schools have the room to

handle Greenwood's overflow, and where there are permanent classrooms children should be in them.

"I don't want this board in three years to have Greenwood Lakes with 1,800 students and 10 portable classrooms, and have Lakeview Middle School up the road with 10 empty classrooms," Hughes said. "I don't believe that is educationally sound."

His case failed to sway parents of the Highlands, Cardinal Oaks, and Skylark subdivisions — parents who swamped board members yesterday with telephone calls. They so convinced Pat Telson, a 14-year board member, that she proposed ditching the entire middle school rezoning plan. Telson also had the support of board member Larry Betstanger.

"I cannot overlook the fact that 400 people signed this (Highlands) petition asking that neighborhood not be rezoned," Telson told the audience. "And I cannot overlook Bob Rainey's (Jackson Heights principal) appeal for the emotional, physical and social aspects of moving kids."

Not all were happy with the board's decision. Among them are the Winter Springs parents whose middle school-age children are still slated to move, and those concerned with financing school construction for the growing school district.

"Tonight is a temporary postponement. Carey E. Ferrell, assistant superintendent of business and finance, said at the meeting's 11 p.m. conclusion. "It cannot be a final decision, we

cannot have empty classrooms."

Ferrell was referring to the money granted the school district for construction purposes. All board members and the superintendent agree those funds are too tight to meet all their needs. The difficulty, Ferrell explained, is that state money can only be used for construction that is recommended by a Department of Education survey. As an example, if the survey reveals a need for 1,000 student stations within the next five years, that is what it will recommend. However, if seats are empty within the district they will be subtracted from the recommendation. This limits the district in what it can and cannot spend on school construction.

Board member Joe Williams also voiced concern for this issue. "We cannot build another school until we fill the schools we have," Williams said. "We need to do this."

Last night decision will move 264 current eighth-graders to different high schools. Students in current ninth, tenth, and eleventh grades may transport to newly rezoned schools if they want to.

Current fifth, sixth, and seventh-graders will be affected by the middle school rezoning. However, seventh-graders, have the option of staying put at their current school — Greenwood Lakes — if they so wish. Transportation must be provided by parents, and they too must meet the May 1 deadline with the Special Appeals Board.

would pick up 11 students from Seminole High. These students live in Lake Monroe Terrace and Higgins Terrace subdivisions.

●Lake Brantley would add 62 students to their enrollment from Lake Mary High. These students live in the area south of 434, or the Spring Oaks and River Run subdivisions.

●Lyman High School would pick up 175 students from Oviedo High. This includes students living in three zones. This includes the area west of Mockingbird Road, and subdivisions off Lake Drive. The first zone includes the area north of 434 and south of 418/19 to the point where the roads intersect. The second zone includes the area south of 434 to Winter Springs city limits but west of Mockingbird Road. The third includes Camelot north to Casselberry city limits and east including Spicewood and the area south to Center Drive and the area north of Lake Drive to Bird Road.

●Lake Howell High will have 16 students from Oviedo High. This includes students living in the Sunrise, Amherst and Lafayette Forest subdivisions. The south boundary to Red Bug Lake Road and west boundary is Tusawilla Road. The north boundary is Citrus Road extended to 426, and east boundary is 426.

●Milwee Middle School will receive 150 students from Greenwood Lakes. This includes students in the Longwood area between General Hutchinson on the north and 434 on the south and 427 on the west and 17-92 on the east, and includes the Skylark subdivision.

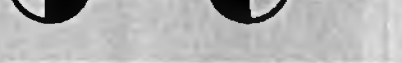

## Longwood commission considers car purchase

LONGWOOD — Although city commissioners have recommended buying a Chevrolet Celebrity station wagon for the city administrator's use, Acting City Administrator Don Terry said Wednesday a Ford Taurus would be cheaper.

Terry said that since Monday night's meeting, he discovered that the Chevrolet Celebrity station wagon has a 4-cylinder and not a 6-cylinder engine as the commissioners believed when they made that recommendation. To purchase a 6-cylinder engine Celebrity would mean an increase of \$643.70, according to Purchasing Director Rhonda Ledford.

The cost of the Celebrity, to have been purchased on a state contract through Ken Rummel Chevrolet of Sanford, was quoted to be \$9,861.83. To buy the 6-cylinder automobile would cost the city \$10,505.53, according to Ledford.

She said the Ford Taurus comes standard with a 6-cylinder engine. Cost of that vehicle is \$9,898 through Don Reid Ford, Maitland.

Ledford said the city mechanic recommended the 6-cylinder vehicle because of better performance and endurance. She said that after the Chevrolet Celebrity, the Ford Taurus was the mechanic's second choice. City officials said the purchase of a vehicle would save the city the \$300-a-month car allowance for the city administrator.

In another matter discussed at the commission's Monday evening work session, Commissioner Richard E. Bullington suggested holding informal sessions between city commissioners and Longwood citizens who don't normally attend commission meetings.

He said he wanted it to be something like Caselberry's "Coffee with Council" meetings which will start March 6. Caselberry will send invitations at random to about 100 residents monthly. They will have the opportunity to discuss their concerns with several council members, according to Caselberry Mayor Owen Sheppard.

## Threat to safety

It is a pointed commentary on the state of U.S. civil aviation that air travelers now perceive inadequate maintenance of aircraft to be a greater threat to their safety than terrorism. In a recent, nationwide survey, 64 percent of respondents said poor maintenance was their greatest fear. Only 24 percent cited terrorism.

The travelers' concern is plainly related to the incidence of accidents affecting America's aging fleet of airliners, hundreds of which are more than 20 years old.

Recently, an engine fell off a Piedmont Airlines Boeing 737 after takeoff in Chicago. Fortunately, the plane was able to return and land safely. This was the third incident of its kind in three years and the 15th caused by failure of the bolts that hold the engine to its mount.

Late last year, an Eastern Airlines Boeing 727 flying between Rochester, N.Y., and Atlanta made an emergency landing in Charleston, W.Va., when an exterior skin panel ripped away, causing the cabin to lose pressure. No one was injured.

Last April, part of the cabin walls and the roof of an Aloha Airlines Boeing 737 blew off in flight, sweeping an attendant to her death.

These and other incidents have led to increasing concern about aircraft maintenance and a growing realization that maintaining an older plane is far different from servicing a newer one.

When manufacturers and the Federal Aviation Administration first worked out maintenance schedules for various planes, they assumed that the design life would be adhered to. The Boeing 727, for example, was designed to be used safely for 60,000 flights, or 50,000 hours, or 20 years, whichever came first. By contract, the plant in the Aloha Airlines accident had made nearly 90,000 flights. Of the 1,649 Boeing 727s in service around the world, about 900 have exceeded their design lives.

Because the aircraft were not expected to be used this long, there are no approved inspection procedures to discover metal fatigue and corrosion of structural elements deep inside the fuselage. Aviation experts assert that learning how to maintain today's older planes is turning out to be uncharted territory. That is truly worrisome.

Meanwhile, the FAA has issued ad hoc orders about inspection and maintenance after each incident. More frequent inspection of engine bolts followed Piedmont's accident in Chicago. Replacement of tens of thousands of rivets on older Boeing 727 and 737 passenger jets followed Aloha's alarming experience.

A task force representing airlines and plane manufacturers is presently examining shortcomings in the maintenance of older aircraft. It has already challenged dozens of maintenance inspections based on age, which it believes should be changed to compulsory replacements or repairs.

Once the new maintenance programs have been established, the FAA should seek to restore the confidence of airline travelers by ensuring that its orders are adequately carried out. The threat to passengers' safety will be lessened more effectively if FAA inspectors spend more time actually watching repair work that ought to be carried out and less time on paperwork and profitless bureaucratic procedures.

WASHINGTON — Mark the date down as one of the finest ever for the American people, a day Americans proved you not only can fight city hall, but you can simultaneously take on the U.S. Congress, the president of the United States and the Supreme Court — and win!

Feb. 8, 1989, is a day that will forever dignify democracy.

It was a day that made you want to climb to the top of your city hall and shout Samuel Adams' proud words after he heard the gunfire at Lexington: "What a glorious morning for America!"

Millions of Americans came together in haphazard unity to roll back one of the most unconscionable rip-offs ever concocted by the carnivorous mentalities of congressional Lilliputians.

Radio talk show callers ... aroused letter-writers ... a true American conscience, Ralph Nader ... Mr. and Mrs. Main Street America, from Portland, Ore., to Portland, Maine ... all combusted in a glorious burst of righteous indignation.

More incredible than the degree to which the arrogant congressional leaders are out of touch with the soul of the American people was their failure to see the amoral irony of raising their

salaries 50 percent when the federal budget is still spiraling out of control.

It wasn't just the outrageous increase in salaries that had been recommended for Congress. It was the larger outrage that these already overpaid pretenders believed they deserved it!

Typical of the Democratic leadership's disdain for the people's sensibilities was the newly elected chairman of the House Democratic Caucus, Rep. William H. Gray III (D-Pa.).

Unfortunately, the well-deserved salary increases for federal judges and federal executives

Twice before the outrage of 1989 — in 1817 and 1873 — an aroused electorate forced Congress to roll back salary increases that had already taken effect.

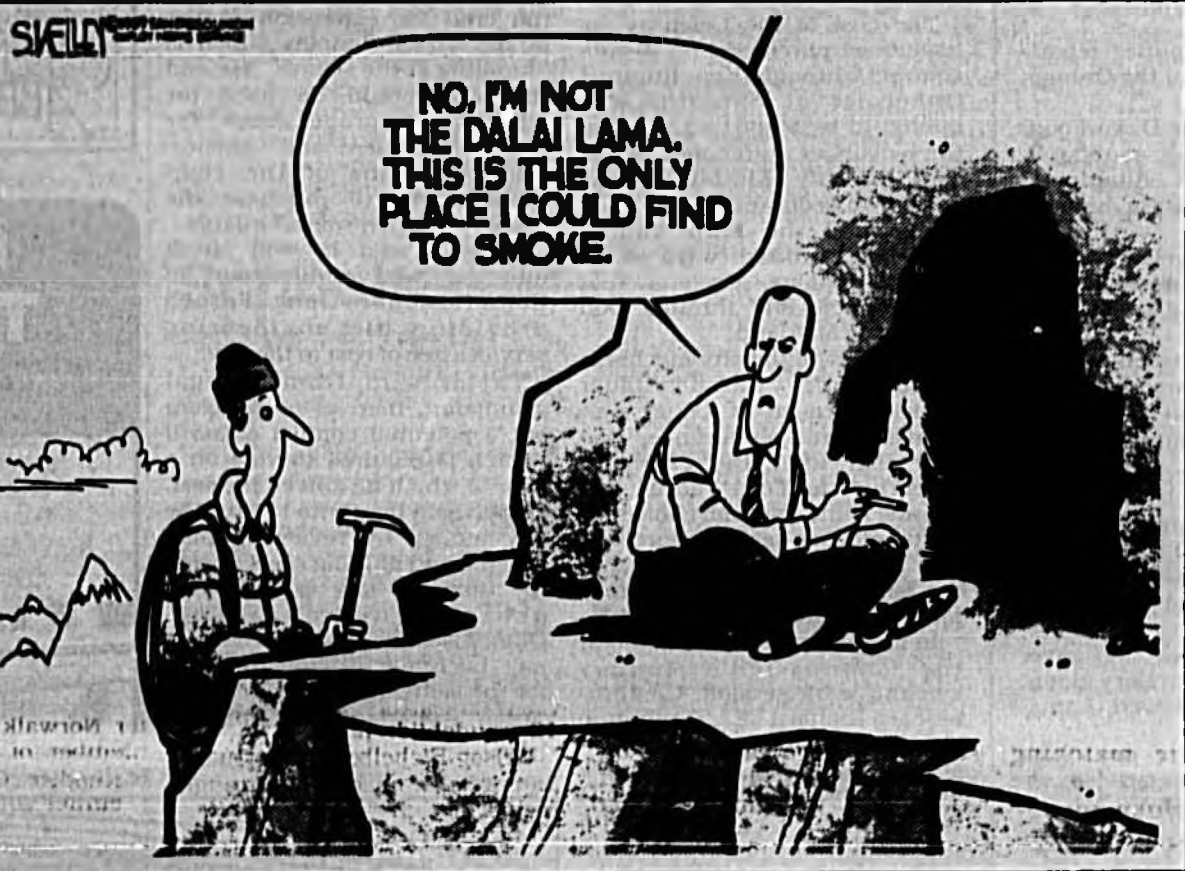
But there's a downside to this populist success.

# So many bills, so little time

WASHINGTON — The way people are talking, you'd think the members of the 101st Congress had been sitting around the past month, just waiting for their pay increases to take effect. Nothing could be further from the truth.

Our senators and representatives have been busy. It's true they haven't passed many bills. But they've introduced hundreds. And you've got to admit that's a good first step.

The lawmakers want to help. They want to provide more day care centers and Head Start programs for kids, better vocational education for teens. They want to offer more liberal earning limits for Social Security recipients and increased benefits for veterans. They want to raise the minimum wage.

While looking after all God's creatures, the lawmakers have not neglected Mother Nature. Extensions and improvements in the Clean Air Act were introduced in both houses. Acid rain got a lot of deserved attention, too. But my favorites are the bills that pick out particular pieces of the planet for rescue.

Sen. Alan Cranston (D-Calif.) got in early with legislation he's pushed for years to extend the protection of the federal government to 4.5 million acres of the California desert. Among the treasures in this sandy expanse are "an 11,000-year-old creosote bush which may be the oldest living organism on the planet Earth."

Cranston wants to protect the bush before some Hollywood agent uproots it for an appearance on the Johnny Carson show. In the last Congress, the Cranston bill was S. 7. This time, it's S. 11. "Seven, come eleven" is an old conservationist slogan.

Not to be outdone, Sen. Daniel P. Moynihan (D-N.Y.) introduced the Onondaga Lake Restoration Act, saying he was "determined" to make the rescue of that upstate New York lake "a model to the rest of the nation. Some might say that such an effort is hopeless. Not so... Clearing up Onondaga Lake can show there are very few environmental problems that cannot be overcome."

Recognizing that "some may be not intimately familiar with the history of the lake," ex-Professor Moynihan recounted the sad tale. Early in the 1800s, before the discovery of Miami Beach, it was a "well-known aquatic playground." But for most of the last century, soda ash manufacturers dumped 25 pounds of mercury a day and unmeasured amounts of chemical sludge in its waters. The city of Syracuse also did unspeakable things with its sewage.

"For all practical purposes," Moynihan conceded, "the lake has been considered dead for as many years as most of us can remember." But now the soda ash plant has moved to Wisconsin (wake up, you Badgers,

before it's too late) and "there have been small stirrings of hope that perhaps the lake can be reborn...But this will not come cheap."

When a Democrat says something "will not come cheap," one is wise to be on guard. Still, it was startling to read the next sentence: "My bill will provide \$100 billion in federal funds for the lake." The figure was repeated in the next paragraph, but I believe it was a typographical error. Even the persuasive Pat Moynihan would think that a bit extravagant, and the fine print of the bill makes it look like he's seeking a mere \$100 million.

After all these fine plans were outlined by their sponsors, it seemed positively churlish for Sen. Terry Sanford (D-N.C.) to come along in S. 101 and try to call off the party. His language can only be called extreme. "Nothing we have done, including implementation of Gramm-Rudman-Hollings (the three-year-old "automatic" deficit-reduction plan) has reduced our real deficit one dime. Under Gramm-Rudman-Hollings, we are merely dabbling at a nosebleed while blood is gushing from the jugular, threatening the strength of our great nation."

This kind of uncouth medical metaphor has no place in Congress — especially in the early weeks of the year, when so many enticing spending schemes are being hatched. But Sanford is a first-termer and does not understand the protocol.

He has the temerity to propose that Congress create an operating budget for the government — separate from the interest payments on past debts and also separate from the surpluses in Social Security and other trust funds. It's those trust fund surpluses which allow Congress to claim that the real budget deficit of about \$300 billion is only \$155 billion.

Sanford's bill would require honest accounting and set a tight timetable not only for the elimination of the real deficit but for the accumulation of subsequent surpluses to start reducing that national debt. Further, in any year when the targets weren't going to be met, it would require that Congress vote on whether to make up half the shortfall by added revenues.

# Faulty bolts sold to commercial airline

WASHINGTON — Frequent flyers, take note. The fake-bolt scandal facing the military and the space shuttle has found its way to the friendly skies.

United Airlines bought bolts from the same company that federal investigators say sold dangerously fraudulent fasteners to defense contractors and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The bolts came from Lawrence Engineering and Supply Inc. of Burbank, Calif. A federal grand jury is expected to reveal the results today (Feb. 16) of its investigation into allegations that Lawrence peddled bogus bolts to government contractors. Federal investigators say the company routinely faked certificates indicating aerospace bolts met strict industry standards for strength. The required tests were rarely performed, according to the federal investigators.

We broke the story in 1986 that so-called shock houses sold millions of substandard bolts to the government. Since then, we have reported on dangerously weak bolts in tanks, trucks, bridges and nuclear power plants. In 1987, we reported that bogus bolts had failed in private and military aircraft.

A purchase order from Lawrence Engineering files, obtained by our associate Stewart Harris, is the first hard evidence showing that Lawrence was doing business with a commercial airline. That order says the company shipped 1,000 bolts to the United maintenance center at San Francisco International Airport on March 30, 1987. United had previously said it had no record of doing business with Lawrence.

When confronted with the purchase order, a United spokesman told us the bolts were installed on pneumatic pressure controls, anti-skid systems and air-conditioning units. However, testing of many bolts revealed no problems, the spokesman said.

Bolt experts told us the tiny bolts sold to United are also commonly used on aircraft instruments and electrical motors. And, the experts warned, a broken bolt could fall into other critical flight components. The bolts were too small to be used on wing or engine attachments.

The shipment to United was during the time when federal investigators say Lawrence routinely falsified results of bolt tests that never took place. Information about the bogus tests comes from Roland Gulke and Saverio Goffredo, Lawrence laboratory technicians who talked to Defense Department investigator Mike Kreps. According to an affidavit filed in federal court by the investigators, Lawrence stopped faking the test results in September 1987 after the company was caught by Teledyne Brown Engineering Inc., a space shuttle contractor.

Defense investigators allege in that affidavit that many aerospace bolts sold by Lawrence failed strength tests. Martin Marietta Astronautics Group flunked 26 lots of aerospace bolts bought from Lawrence for use on Air Force missiles.

NASA also bought bolts from Lawrence. Testing showed structural defects in those bolts, even though they arrived at NASA with a certificate signed by a Lawrence employee saying they met specifications.

Lawrence also sold bolts to foreign airlines and governments, according to an alert issued by the Government-Industry Data Exchange Program.

Lawrence is just one of dozens of bolt companies under investigation by a task force of federal agents from the Defense and Transportation departments and the Customs Service.

# Stocks open higher

NEW YORK — Prices opened higher Thursday in moderate trading of New York Stock Exchange issues.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which rose 22.68 Wednesday, was up 3.39 to 2307.32 shortly after the market opened.

Advances led declines 433-226 among the 1,119 issues crossing the NYSE tape. Early turnover amounted to about 7,599,000 shares. Stock prices Wednesday closed sharply

higher in moderate trading as investors took advantage of the market's recent weakness to purchase bargain-priced blue chips and other selected issues.

Prices dipped briefly at the opening but strengthened through the rest of the session. Late-afternoon buying pushed the Dow sharply higher as investors focused on IBM and other selected blue-chip issues.

Analysts said investors did some bargain hunting in hopes that the market would soon move higher after a two-week slump.

## Dollar, gold open higher

The dollar moved higher Thursday in slow trading on most major foreign currency markets as most traders stepped to the sidelines to await Friday's key government report on the nation's trade picture. Gold was mostly higher.

In early New York trading the dollar edged slightly higher against key foreign currencies.

Currency traders said market forecasters are looking for a U.S. trade deficit of around \$12 billion, or slightly below the \$12.51 billion reported for November.

They said the dollar was helped by the West German Bundesbank's decision not to raise key interest rates. The decision was announced by the central bank after a regular bimonthly meeting in Frankfurt of its policy-setting board of directors.

This leaves the West German discount rate at 4 percent and the Lombard rate — the rate the central bank charges commercial banks for short-term emergency loans collateralized against securities — at 6 percent.

Traders had expected the Bundesbank to raise rates in response to rising inflation. In Tokyo, the dollar rallied

against the Japanese yen, closing at 126.33 yen, up 0.43 yen from 125.90 Wednesday.

The dollar closed unchanged in Hong Kong at 7.8015 Hong Kong dollars, and slightly lower in Singapore at 1.924 Singapore dollars, down from 1.925 Wednesday.

In Europe, the dollar began the day in Frankfurt at 1.8415 West German marks, up from 1.831 marks on Wednesday.

The dollar began the day in Zurich at 1.5635 Swiss francs, up from 1.56. In Paris, the dollar opened at 6.2735 French francs, down slightly from 6.2765.

spreading at a faster rate than normal.

"We even had a helicopter from Brooksville to help us with some fires in Brevard County," Martin said.

Because of a recent downpour several weeks ago, Martin said that the dryness is not a critical concern yet and that rainfall is monitored daily.

"There's still moisture in the swamps and there is no threat of muck fires," he said.

However, Martin said that tree seedlings will begin to suffer stress if the area does not get an ample amount of rainfall soon.

Meteorological Technician Mike Turner at the Orlando International Airport said Wednesday that the forecast calls for below normal precipitation within the next 90 days.

Turner said that there was 1

inch of precipitation during the month of December, with the normal rainfall being 1.8 inches for that month.

January had an excess of 1.7 inches, but the 3.8 inches of rainfall poured down in a two-day period and most of it was "wash-off." Other than that, January was a "totally dry month," Turner said.

February continues to be dry, with "not even a trace" up until today. Normal rainfall by this time of the month is at least 1 1/2 inches, Turner said.

By NWS standards, Florida is not having a drought, though the winter has been unusually dry.

"It would have to persist for some length of time yet before we consider it a drought," said forecaster Noel Rlanychok in Miami.

"This is the dry season and it

has been drier than normal. We haven't had a real good wet, cold front come all the way down the state at all this year."

Water managers said rainfall amounts have run as much as 50 percent below normal since September. Fire risk indexes show virtually no difference from Pensacola to Miami.

Through Monday, the state forestry division had responded to 1,298 fires that burned 25,707 acres since Jan. 1. That is slightly below the 10-year average number of fires for the period and nearly 38 percent below the 10-year average of acres burned.

"However, it needs to be emphasized that fire activity has really increased in the past few days. It's getting worse," Maynard said.

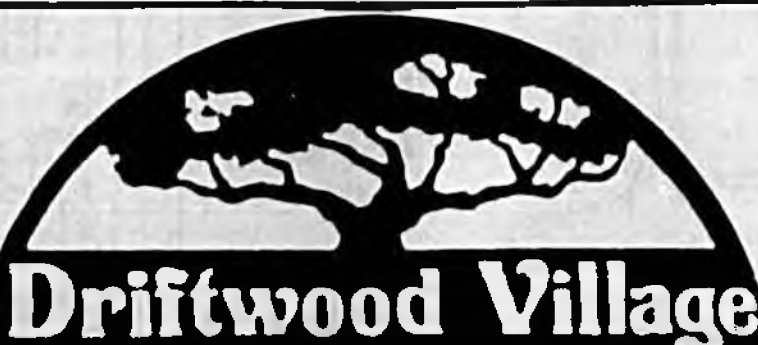
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# Man shoots co-workers, himself

BETHESDA, Md. — The bank employee who shot and killed three female co-workers and then himself at his job was a former state mental patient described by one colleague as having "a lot of demons in him."

Emanuel Tsegaye, 33, of Silver Spring, Md., used a .38-caliber Smith & Wesson revolver to shoot the women, wound a male co-worker and then kill himself Wednesday inside the seventh-floor office of the Chevy Chase Federal Savings Bank's credit card center, Montgomery

County police said.

Police called Tsegaye, a bill collector who had worked for the company for less than a year, a "disgruntled" employee, and co-workers said he had quietly feuded with supervisors for weeks.

But an official with the bank refuted claims that Tsegaye had fought with his bosses, and said the company never knew of his criminal and psychiatric past.

"It's the first I ever heard of that," Alexander Boyle, vice chairman of the bank, said Thursday after being told Tsegaye had been incarcerated

at a state mental hospital for two years. "We certainly were not aware of that. It seems to me you try and get as much information as you possibly can on an employee. I don't know what can be done to find out information that is concealed by an employee."

The dead were all bank employees: Cynthia Mitchell, 28, of Landover; Tanya M. Walker, 23, of Fort Washington, and Mahasty H. Agha-Khan, 29, of Silver Spring.

All the victims were shot at close range.

# Accused molester free on bail

LOS ANGELES — The chief defendant in the McMartin Pre-School molestation case was released on bail Wednesday night after spending nearly five years in jail awaiting the outcome of his trial.

Former preschool teacher Raymond Buckley, 30, walked out of the County Jail shortly after 8 p.m., got into a brown Mercedes Benz and rode off without speaking with the crush of reporters who had gathered.

Attorney Danny Davis said Buckley, who left jail dressed in a dark blue suit and open-necked shirt, would be in court Thursday when his trial resumes.

A news crew from KABC-TV interviewed Buckley at a Chinese restaurant, where he, his attorney and a security man went shortly after his release. He said he was concerned for the safety of his family.

"I still realize there are people out there ... who have gone off the deep end," Buckley said, adding he has learned of threats and saying he plans to "keep a distance from my family for their safety."

Buckley said he has been in jail so long that "I don't remember emotional feelings that everybody out there takes for granted. I've been isolated in a nightmare."

Peggy McMartin Buckley was freed on \$395,000 bail in January 1986.

# North's trial may resume

WASHINGTON — Attorney General Dick Thornburgh Wednesday dropped a Supreme Court appeal blocking the start of Oliver North's trial, reassured that an independent prosecutor would assist him in protecting classified information during the proceedings.

Thornburgh cleared the way for the case to go forward after the trial judge clarified procedures in the case, and the administration and independent prosecutor Lawrence Walsh reached a new understanding about how to implement his order.

The trial could begin as early as Friday, although U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell may choose to wait until the end of the three-day President's Day weekend before swearing in the jury.


Until Wednesday, Thornburgh had demanded that the administration have a representative in the courtroom to raise objections over the release of state secrets. Thornburgh told reporters following the announcement, "The independent counsel has agreed to be my representative."

In a statement, Thornburgh said, "I am pleased that a mechanism has been developed that will permit the trial to go forward, while ensuring that I can fulfill the responsibility imposed upon me by Congress to protect the national security interests of the United States."

After meeting with senior Justice Department lawyers, Walsh informed the trial judge Wednesday in court papers that he would notify Thornburgh whenever classified information had been ruled relevant to the case. That would give the attorney general the option of scuttling any or all of the 12 criminal counts against North.

Thornburgh said Walsh's plan provided the administration "with the substance of what we have been seeking for the past week" — a means of stopping the case if it appeared state secrets would be exposed.

At 6:10 p.m. EST Wednesday, at Thornburgh's direction, Acting Solicitor General William Bryson delivered to the Supreme Court a motion to dissolve the stay. The order to stop the trial from proceeding was granted last Sunday by Chief Justice William Rehnquist until the full Supreme Court could consider an appeal at its regular conference on Friday.




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

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


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

#### Cheeks scores 10,000th point

Maurice Cheeks reached a personal milestone and Scott Brooks provided a fourth-quarter spark to lift the Philadelphia 76ers to their third straight victory.

Cheeks, an unsung point guard in his 11th season in the NBA, scored his 10,000th career point in the second quarter and Brooks scored all 13 of his points in the final period to help Philadelphia hand the Indiana Pacers their ninth straight loss, 113-98.

"I guess it's a memorable occasion," said Cheeks, who finished with 10 points in the game and has 10,002 in his career. "Everyone gets excited about 10,000 points. It makes me feel good. I'm happy. I don't know what else to say."

Elsewhere, Atlanta topped New Jersey 119-112, Cleveland blitzed New York 129-107, Denver dumped Washington 117-106, Phoenix defeated Seattle 135-112, and Golden State stopped San Antonio 133-96.

#### Sox sign Clemens for big bucks

BOSTON — The Boston Red Sox signed two-time Cy Young Award-winning pitcher Roger Clemens to a three-year contract Wednesday for a reported \$7.5 million, making him baseball's highest-paid pitcher.

The contract was reached on the eve of an arbitration session scheduled for Thursday in New York.

The new contract reportedly calls for base pay of \$2.2 million in 1989 and \$2.5 million in both 1990 and 1991, with a \$300,000 signing bonus. Dwight Gooden of the Mets will be the highest-paid player in the majors this season, earning little more than \$2.41 million, but Clemens' three-year package is greater than Gooden's.

Orel Hershiser of the Dodgers could receive the highest single-season salary by a major league pitcher if he wins his arbitration case. Hershiser has filed for \$2.45 million.

#### Sooners hold off Kansas in OT

Oklahoma brought the Kansas Jayhawks out of a slump, but not out of a losing streak.

Kansas had lost five straight games heading into Wednesday's tilt with the top-ranked Sooners and gave the mighty visitors plenty of fight, but fell 94-89 in overtime.

Oklahoma was the team that appeared somewhat down, due perhaps to wins last week against the then-No. 3 (Missouri) and No. 1 (Arizona) teams in the nation.

"It didn't surprise me," Oklahoma Coach Billy Tubbs said. "We didn't go into the game thinking they were in a slump. We kind of bring people out of slumps."

#### Slumping Jets suffer Flame-out

Hockey is fun for the Calgary Flames, but there is nothing funny about the troubles facing the Winnipeg Jets.

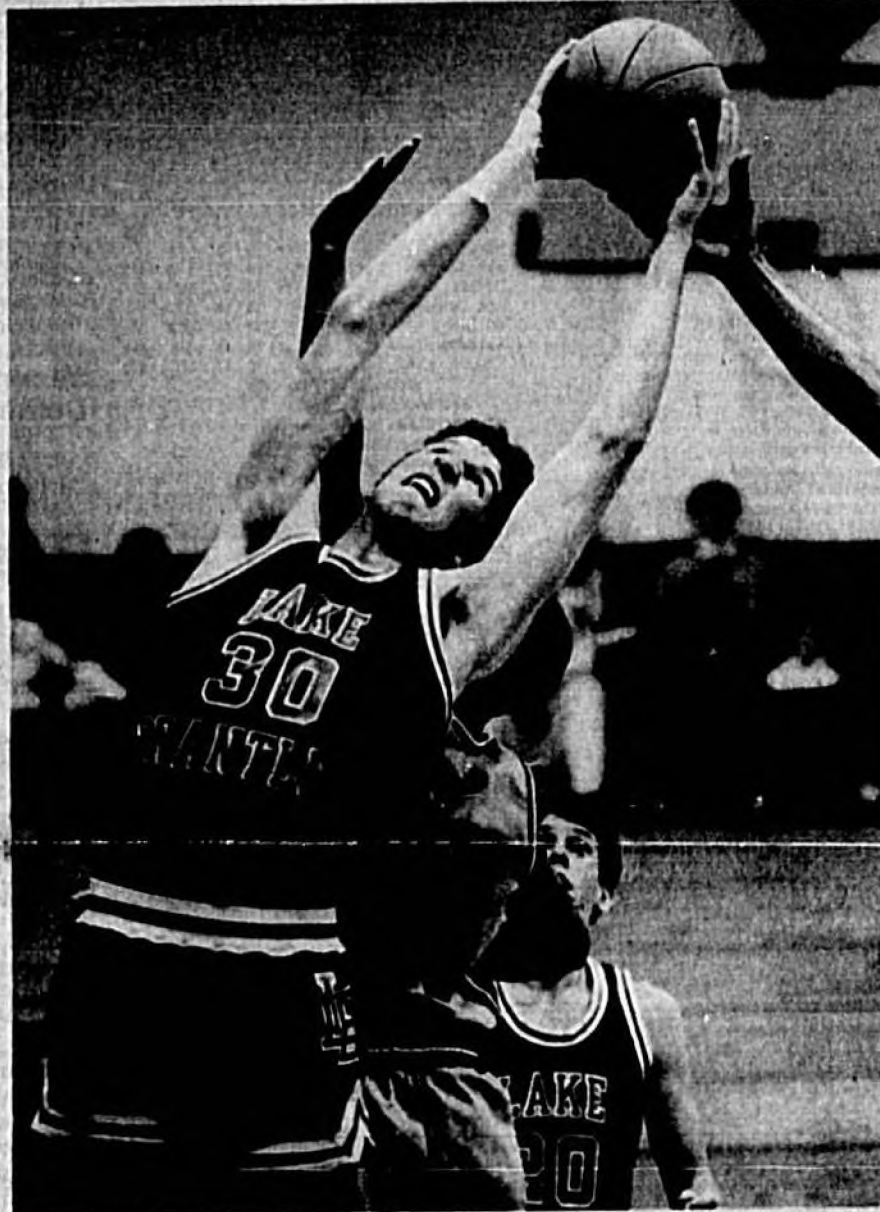
Lake Mary came alive in the second quarter as Washington scored the first three points of the period to cut the Brantley lead to 15-11 with 6:25 to play in the half.

## 'Grandparents' melt kids with love

### Volunteers rainbows to stormy lives

A widow, Fannie Powell was lonely and bored.

Friends, hoping to help her out of the doldrums, told her about a program that had brought them joy and excitement: the Central Florida Foster Grandparents Program.

Now a "grandparent" at Wilson Elementary School in Sanford, Powell has found the same joy and excitement.

"Most of these kids have never been loved," she said. "The most important thing I can give them is love."

The Foster Grandparent Program offers men and women over the age of 60 the opportunity to serve as volunteers for 20 hours a week working with children who have special needs.

Some of the children are emotionally disturbed, some find it impossible to function in normal school settings, others have been abused or have been in trouble with the law.

Like most of the volunteers, Powell has no advanced degree and no experience as a special education instructor. Successful completion of 40 hours of pre-service orientation and training coupled with a desire to give of themselves and to help are all that are required to become a Foster Grandparent.

Powell works with children who have special learning disabilities. She said she has no teaching experience, but raised four children of her own and has had a hand in the rearing of her six grandchildren and a great-grandchild.

"That's a lot of life experience that she has combined with work experience ranging from homemaker to factory worker."

"The key to helping these kids is letting them know that someone loves them, that someone cares," she said. "Once they know that, it's easy to get through to them."

She tells of a young boy who was disruptively defiant. He wouldn't listen to teachers and created disturbances in class. He couldn't seem to grasp the basic concepts of math.

Powell made sure she always patted him on the back and told him that she was proud of him and that she loved him. At first, he responded with a scowl and



by saying that no one loved him. But as time went on, he gradually accepted the love and in time he learned the math as well.

Said Powell, "One of the best things about this work is seeing a kid learn. It's a big challenge to see how much they can take in."

Powell feels that the \$2.20 per hour stipend she receives is just icing on the cake. The satisfaction she gains is invaluable.

Joseph Bostic is another of the 160 Central Florida Foster Grandparents. Like Powell, he has no formal training.

"It's just something that comes to me," he explained.

A retired plumber who moved from Rochester, N.Y., Bostic works with mentally handicapped children at Winter Springs Elementary School. He assists them in their physical education classes and teaches them woodcrafting.

In addition to a son of their own, Bostic and his wife have taken in a number of foster children over the years.

"I really missed that part of my life," he said.

Bostic said he likes bringing some satisfaction into the children's lives. The challenge, he added, of seeing them master a skill is his greatest reward.

Ann Smith, director of the Central Florida Foster Grandparent Program, emphasized that while the volunteers may not be college-educated, they are nonetheless qualified to work with the children.

"The pre-service training they receive is pretty comprehensive," she said. "They learn what a volunteer is, what his rights are and what his limitations are. They are taught how to spot abuse. They even have some training in basic child development so they know what to expect from a child in certain situations."

The Foster Grandparents work closely with the professionals on staff at the facility where they work. In that respect they are never alone when it comes to helping a child.

Because the program is federally funded in part, the areas of special need that are addressed are often determined

by the "pet projects" of the president's administration.

"Barbara Bush has taken up the banner of defeating illiteracy," Smith said, "so we will continue to work heavily in that area."

The local project is sponsored by Florida Senior Programs, Inc., and funded by the national volunteer agency ACTION, the United Way and community contributions.

The relationships between Grandparent and child are not long-term ones. The duos stay together only long enough for the child to stabilize emotionally and be on the road to recovery.

"The number of needy children is far greater than the number of Grandparents," noted Smith. "Also, we don't want the Grandparents to begin to play favorites."

Smith, Bostic and Powell all agree that the children in the program have one common problem: a lack of nurturing, which puts them at risk of not thriving. Many of the most difficult cases are solved, when

the child realizes that there is someone who cares.

For the most part, the Grandparents do not deal with the parents of the child. There are occasionally some exceptions.

For example, an unwed teenage mother may be having problems showing affection for her child. Feeling unloved, the child becomes a discipline problem. In such a case, the Grandparent might try to help the mother which, in turn, helps the child.

The Foster Grandparent Program gives older citizens an opportunity to use their talents, fill their days and give of themselves to others. It gives love and assistance to children who are in need of caring. It is a unique opportunity to help two groups of people to help themselves.

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# Science fiction wave believed to be over

GAINESVILLE — A University of Florida English professor says he believes we have seen the end of the wave of blockbuster science fiction movies, which replaced fairy tales in the minds of many Americans.

Andrew Gordon, a science fiction expert at Florida, said the movies peaked in popularity between 1977 and 1987, but they have reached a dead end created by expensive special effects.

Novelty suffers with the push for a blockbuster film like "Star Wars" because the need for increasingly advanced special effects drives up the cost of a film and makes film producers more conservative in trying to protect their investment, he said.

"Too many bad fantasy movies and ones that were simply imitative were made, causing the audience to become saturated and bored," Gordon said.

Fantasy and science fiction are more likely to succeed in smaller scale, lower budget films or in computer animation and video, which are much cheaper than traditional films and are just beginning to be explored, he said.

But he said science fiction and fantasy films already have become modern replacements for fairy tales and folklore of bygone times as people substitute television and movies for books and storytelling.

"People don't tell stories orally very much anymore," Gordon said. "Fairy tales and folk tales were exchanged around the hearth and most families don't have a hearth anymore. The television set has replaced the hearth."

The boy Elliott in the movie "E.T." makes contact with the alien the same way the little girl

does with the Frog Prince in the fairy tale — by throwing a ball and having it retrieved. Just as the girl overcomes her natural repugnance for the frog, taking it home to her bedroom and kissing it, Elliott conquers his repulsion to E.T., and keeps it in his bedroom, Gordon said.

"E.T. is also Peter Pan in the sense that he's ageless and can fly," he said. "These characters are extremely suggestive and their power lies in the fact that they can evoke so many different associations."

Fairy tales treat home as sacred, a recurring theme in both science fiction and contemporary horror films. "In 'Poltergeist,' alien spirits invade the home, interestingly, through the television set," he said. "And in a key scene in 'E.T.,' a woman holds her child and defends it against scientists dressed in space suits, saying, 'This is my home.'"

A powerful hunger for fantasy in a culture in which films and television have become increasingly realistic has helped create the tremendous success of science fiction and fantasy films, Gordon said.

Driven by the success of a few blockbuster movies using new special effects technology, this boom has spread throughout popular culture, he said.

"All of the figures in 'Star Wars,' for example, are instantly recognizable and they have become incorporated into political cartoons, children's video games and even into popular discourse, such as the Strategic Defense Initiative being dubbed 'Star Wars,'" he said.

Today's books and films often blend science fiction and fantasy, such as by incorporating dragons onto alien planets and unexplained mystical concepts like The Force in "Star Wars" with robots and spaceships, he said.

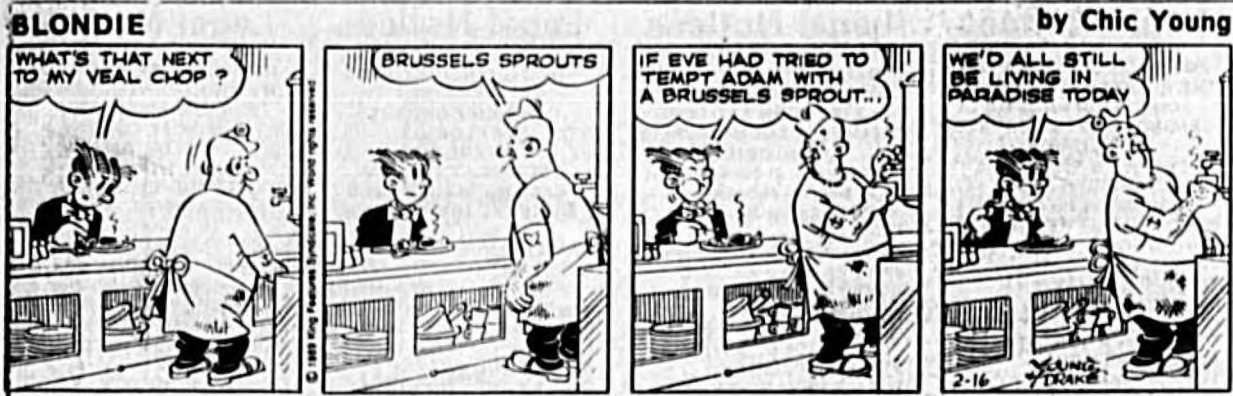

# Heart trouble may be causing her wheezing

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I seem to wheeze most of the time. I'm an older lady.

**DEAR READER:** Wheezing means that the air that is expired from your lungs is meeting some resistance in the breathing passageways. This can be due to excess fluid in the lungs from low-grade heart failure, to excess mucus from air pollution or to a combination of added mucus and bronchial constriction from asthma.

In an "older lady," I'd worry a bit about the possibility that a treatable heart condition might be the cause of your wheezing. I urge you to seek an examination by your doctor, who will be able to diagnose the problem and offer appropriate therapy.

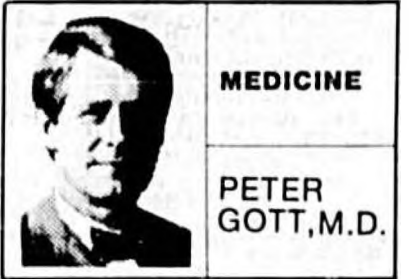

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Last fall my husband, age 46, was hospitalized with nephrotic syndrome. It was determined that he'd had a bad reaction to ibuprofen which he took for back pain. He's been told to eat plenty of protein, eliminate salt and use non-steroid drugs. Could you explain this disease to me?

**DEAR READER:** Nephrotic syndrome is a form of kidney damage marked by excess amounts of protein in the urine (with a corresponding protein-loss in the blood stream), elevated blood-fat levels and edema (accumulation of tissue fluid). The syndrome may be caused by a variety of diseases, including nephritis (kidney inflammation), diabetes, cancer, allergies and infections. In some people, such as your husband, adverse reactions to medications and drugs can cause nephrotic syndrome.

For patients who have drug-induced nephrotic syndrome, the prognosis is quite good; the kidney damage heals with time. During the healing process,

nephrotic patients need to maintain a high level of dietary protein (to counteract urinary losses), avoid salt (which contributes to edema) and use prescribed medicine under a doctor's supervision. In short,

## WIN AT BRIDGE

**By James Jacoby**

It was precipitous of North to jump right to five clubs after his partner's vulnerable preempt. He might have first responded three spades, just on the off-chance that South had three cards in that suit. (In standard methods, the bid of a new suit below game is a forcing response to partner's pre-emptive opening bid.) The final contract would no doubt be the same, since North was apparently convinced that South had a solid club suit.

Against five clubs, West led the king of hearts. The defense then continued with a heart to East's ace. Then at the third trick East led back the jack of spades. Is there some conclusion that declarer should be able to draw from this sequence of

defensive plays? One thing is certain — whatever else may be in East's hand, there is no possibility that he holds the queen and two more clubs. With that holding he would certainly be playing a third round of hearts in the hope that dummy would be forced to ruff, thereby preventing declarer from leading a club from dummy for a finesse. Since defender East did not force the dummy, it's safe to say that he is perfectly willing for declarer to take a finesse in clubs. Declarer should not fall into that trap. Instead, South should simply play out the A-K of clubs, dropping West's queen to make his contract.

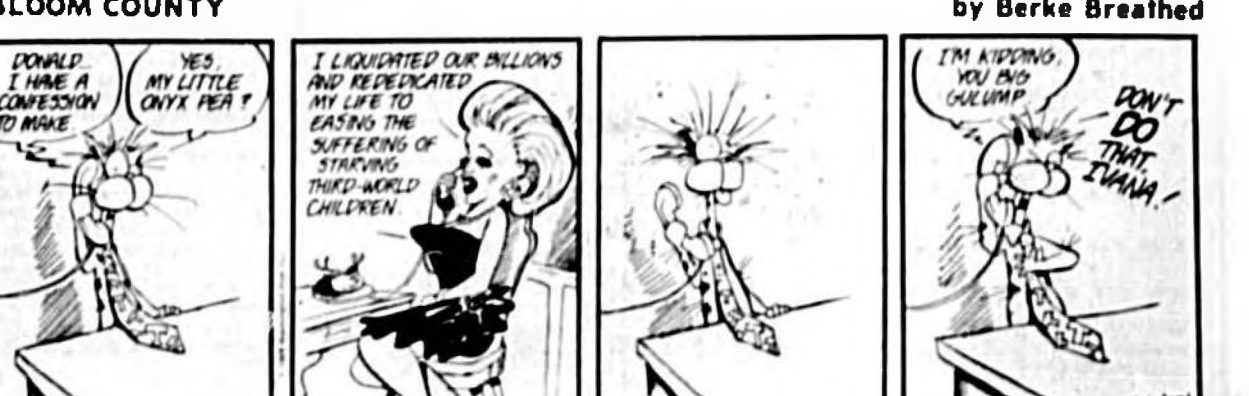
